Forest fire restrictions raised last week

Officials with the San Bernardino National Forest raised fire restrictions Thursday, May 26, due to the danger from current and anticipated worsening conditions, such as drying vegetation and continued hot temperatures.

Lower elevations of the forest have reached critically dry fuel moisture levels this week, causing fire officials to raise fire restrictions almost one month earlier than raised in 2021. The restrictions prohibit the following:

- · Campfires and wood/charcoal barbecues at unhosted campgrounds and picnic areas
 - Discharging of a firearm
 - Smoking
- · Operating an internal combustion engine off paved, gravel or dirt National Forest System roads and
- Welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with

Some exemptions exist. Some hosted campgrounds and picnic areas will allow campfires, barbecues and smoking (see www.fs.usda.gov/Internet/FSE_DOCU-MENTS/fseprd1026545.pdf).

Gas-powered stoves and fire rings with a fuel shut-off will be also allowed, including when dispersed camping, if used with a free California Campfire Permit, which can be obtained online at www.fs.usda.gov/detail/sbnf/ home/?cid=fseprd769862. It is important for permit holders to read and follow the terms of the permit.

Another exemption addresses discharging a firearm. While target shooting at recreational sites like Forest Road 1N09 will be prohibited, it will continue to be allowed at shooting ranges under a special use permit (see first link, Exhibit B). Also, visitors with a hunting license will be able to shoot at legal game bird or mammal.

As fire restrictions and related prohibitions may increase again later this year, forest visitors are highly encouraged to always "know before you go" before each visit by checking current fire restrictions at the second link or calling a ranger station.

What victims can teach us after the fire

Fire is reshaping the American West. Communities in Wildfire Urban Interface zones, like ours, live in constant tension with a devastating force that can, in a single day, incinerate the homes and earthly possessions of neighborhoods and even towns.

The stories of the big fires that have captured the attention of the world, names like August and Dixie, Tubbs and Camp, dwarf our experience here, but with the Cranston Fire we had an example in microcosm of the forces, physical, legal and economic, that govern these disasters and the recovery from them. The homeowners who lost homes here are few in number, but their losses were just as great, and their experiences cover the gamut; some are once again living in homes they love on the land they love. Some are

The stories homeowners shared emphasize one thing above all: the quality of your outcome is dependent on the quality of your insurance. Further, the quality of your insurance is not guaranteed by high premiums, or an agent who was recommended, and that, perhaps above all, the policy you have may not be the policy you think you

Those who had "positive" outcomes (successful rebuilds) were very forthcoming in telling their stories. Those who had more negative outcomes (paying to rebuild themselves or homes not yet rebuilt) were sometimes more guarded, being still engaged in mediation or legal action with their insurers. But enough have spoken to the Town Crier "on the record" to allow reporting on the spectrum of conditions and re-

Congressional candidates' coffers before the primary

Editor's note: On June 7, Riverside County will hold a primary to choose two candidates to face off in the November Gubernatorial Election for the U.S. Congressional District 41 seat. Five candidates are on the ballot. The Republicans are Rep. Ken Calvert, the incumbent, and John Michael Lucino. Two candidates, Will Rollins and Shrina Kurani, are Democrat,s and Anna Neveni, is registered as No Party Preference. Interviews with four of the candidates were in the May 19 issue of the Town Crier.

Ken Calvert

Through May 18, Calvert had nearly \$1.2 million cash in his campaign coffers, a decrease of about \$140,000 since the end of March. Despite the 10% reduction in cash, Calvert still retained a significant lead over Rollins in available cash.

During the seven weeks between the two reports, Calvert's campaign collected \$182,000 and expended \$325,000.

More than 50 contributors have given \$5,000 or more to Calvert's reelection effort. This includes \$93,000 from the "Take Back the House 2022" political action committee (PAC) and many corporate PACs, such as Booz Allen, Boeing Corporation, General Dynamics and PG&E employees.

Will Rollins

During the latest reporting period (March 31 to May 18), Rollins garnered nearly \$240,000 in contributions, while spending about \$412,000. This reduced

his cash available for the final three weeks to about \$446,000, down \$172,000 from the end of March.

Rollins has one contribution of \$5,000 and two others, including one from himself, of greater than \$4,000. He does a multitude of contributions via ActBlue, a conduit for individuals to make contributions to campaigns.

Under federal law, these contributions are small-dollar donations made by individuals; they are not considered PAC donations. ActBlue provides the tools and platform for campaigns and organizations to fundraise online.

Shrina Kurani

In the first three months of 2022, Kurani raised about \$150,000 and kept on the same pace through the next six weeks, raising \$79,000 by May 18.

Her spending accelerated during this period, resulting in a cash availability of \$85,000 in the middle of May for the final three weeks of the primary.

Kurani has received two donations greater than \$10,000. One was from the New Blue Interactive and the other was from Run the World, a progressive, grassroots consulting firm. She also has given more than \$18,000 to her campaign. And she has received 70 donations between \$2,500 and \$3,000.

Other candidates

Neither Lucino nor Nevenic have reported any finance data to the Federal Election Commission since announcing their candidacy.

District 47 campaign financing

Editor's note: On June 7, Riverside County will hold a primary for the new State Assembly member from the 47th District. The Democratic candidate is Christy Holstege of Palm Springs. The Republicans have two candidates in the race — Gary Michaels and Greg Wallis. The two candidates with most votes will face off in the November General *Election. Interviews with all three candidates* were in the May 12 issue of the Town Crier.

Christy Holstege

Holstege, a member of the Palm Springs City Council and former mayor, announced her intention to seek a California Assembly seat in July 2021.

By the end of 2021, she had about \$163,000 in her campaign coffers. During the first third of 2022, she received another \$218,000 in contributions. After expenditures, she had \$183,000 in cash on April 23. In the past four weeks, she garnered \$86,000 more in contributions, while her campaign spending was over \$205,000. Her cash availability for the campaign's final weeks had dropped to \$69,000 on

In July, to start her campaign, Holstege loaned it \$25,000. Since earnestly campaigning, she has received 10 contributions of \$9,700. These have come from employee Political Action Committees, such as the Service Employees International Union local 721, the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters, and the California Teachers Association.

Greg Wallis

Greg Wallis is one of two Republican candidates seeking the nomination for the 47th Assembly District seat. The 31-yearold is currently the District Manager for Assemblyman Chad Mayes (Neighborhood Preservation Program [NPP] District 42), who announced in January that he would not seek re-election.

His campaign did not get started until January. By the April 23 reporting period, he had received \$125,000 in contributions. His campaign committee spent nearly \$50,000 during this period, leaving a cash balance on April 23 of \$82,000.

During the next four weeks, Wallis collected another \$29,000 in donations and used \$85,000. As of May 21, his cash campaign funds were \$30,000 for the final weeks.

Thus far, his largest single contribution has been \$4,900; but he has received 17 donations of that amount, many from Republican State Senate candidates. Other campaign donors include the Pechanga Band, the California Dental Association and Anheuser Busch companies.

Although trailing Holstege in contributions, in late April, Wallis was confident of finishing in the top two for the primary and facing her in the November election. "We have more than enough for primary. I'm feeling fully funded," he told the Town Crier.

Gary Michaels

Ås of May 29, Michaels has not filed any campaign financial reports with the California Secretary of State's Office.

District Attorney candidates' coffers

Editor's note: On June 7, Riverside County will hold a primary for the District Attorney. The three candidates are Michael Hestrin, the incumbent, Lara Gressley and Judge Burke Strunsky. All three interviews are in the May 5 issue of the Town Crier. If none of the candidates receives more than 50% of the votes cast, the two with the most votes will be on the November bal-

Mike Hestrin

Whatever the outcome of the primary, Mike Hestrin, the incumbent, is also the financial leader in this race. If he can win the primary battle with more than 50% of the votes cast, Hestrin would avoid the November clash.

At the end of 2021, Hestrin had \$417,000 in cash to begin the primary campaign and that grew to \$480,000 by April 23.

As of May 21, cash had fallen to \$223,000 for the final three weeks. This is less than half of his cash a month ago. During those four weeks, Hestrin spent nearly \$470,000 to close out this race. That is nearly nine times what his challengers, Lara Gressley and Burke Strunsky, spent in combination.

About a quarter of that total were nonmonetary contributions such as \$87,000 from the Riverside Sheriff's Association Public Education Fund for mailers and Facebook advertising. The Pechanga Band and the Soboba Band of Luiseno Indians provided about \$17,000 for fundraising, including a golf tournament.

During the most recent reporting period, Hestrin received \$237,000 in contributions, including nonmonetary donations. One contribution, from Harold Matzner, owner of Spencer's Restaurant in Palm Springs, was for \$25,000. There were four \$10,000 contributions and five between \$2,000 and \$5,000. Eighteen donations were for \$1,000.

Lara Gressley

In 2018, Lara Gressley challenged Hestrin for the first time. Despite the experience of the previous campaign, she began 2022 and her campaign to unseat Hestrin with only \$17,000 in cash.

Available cash fell to \$11,000 on April 23, after contributions of \$58,000 and expenditures of \$64,000 in the first four months of 2022.

During the most recent four weeks campaign reporting, Gressley received \$5,000 in cash and \$9,500 in nonmonetary contributions. Couture Medical Group gave the cash contribution and AMG Outdoor Advertising gave billboard space worth \$8,000.

As of May 21, Gressley had \$12,000 for the final three weeks.

Judge Burke Strunsky

Burke Strunsky is the other challenger to Hestrin's effort for a third term as county district attorney. Until announcing his candidacy in January, Strunsky had been on the Riverside County Superior Court since 2017. After his announcement, he took a leave of absence to campaign.

Since he was a sitting jurist until the middle of January, Strunsky began the year with no cash for his challenge of Hestrin.

Four months later, he had a cash balance of \$50,000. He loaned the campaign \$28,000 and received \$72,000 in donations. David Greenberg, an attorney, gave \$10,000. Much of the rest came from several dozen donations between \$1,000 and

In the next four weeks through May 21, Strunsky received \$10,000 in contributions and spent \$36,000 on his campaign, resulting in a cash balance of \$17,000 on May 21.

The only candidates in the primary are Kelly Seyarto (Republican) and Brian Nash (Democrat). Both will move to the General Election ballot in November. Interviews with both candidates were in the May 12 issue of the Town Crier.

Kelly Seyarto

Assemblyman Kelly Seyarto is currently finishing his first term representing the voters of the 67th Assembly District. He lives in Murietta with his wife, Denise. In 2015, he retired as a battalion chief for Los Angeles County Fire Department.

As of May 21, Seyarto had \$151,000 in cash available for the rest of the primary season and to begin the General Election campaign. Since both eligible candidates — Seyarto and Brian Nash — will advance to the November ballot, the primary battle has not been heated.

Since the beginning of 2022, he has raised \$194,000 in contributions and spent about \$43,000, of which only \$8,000 has been in the past four weeks.

Cal Fire Local 2881 is one of two donors giving Seyarto's campaign \$9,700. He has also received eight contributions of \$4,900. Among those donors are Philip Morris, the California Medical Association and the Riverside Sheriff's Association.

Besides the Cal Fire group, several firefighters' groups have contributed to Seyarto including the Murrieta Firefighters (\$4,000) and the California Professional Firefighters (\$3,000).

Besides independent contributors, Seyarto transferred about \$115,000 from his Assembly District campaign fund to his new Senate District fund in February and April.

As of May 29, Nash has not filed any campaign financial reports with the California Secretary of State's Office. Since both he and Seyarto will be on the November ballot, he has little Seyarto's cash balance in May was need to collect or to spend during the



square foot it would take to rebuild. He was on it. Our limits were high enough, but it's something you need to verify every couple of years. I have nothing bad to say about our insurance company, they were fabulous."

TC: "You are rebuilding now?"

IG: "We're in the final stages. We've been under construction for a year and 10 months. That's physical construction, that doesn't count getting the design and permits. It took six months to get just the permit. (The county was probably the worst part.) It should all be happening in May, we're very close." [The interview took place earlier than have

TC:" What was your experience with the insurance and her claim is still in mediation.

JG: "They couldn't have handled it better. Our claims adjustor was out at the house while Idyllwild was still under evacuation. Nothing was left; it was like it had never been there except the chimney and the debris. The attitude of the insurance company was that it was catastrophic and their objective was to give us policy limits on everything. They would call us to ask if we needed anything, if we were OK.

TC: "The name of the company?"

JG: "North Light, a subsidiary of Allstate. They were amazing. One thing I was dreading was dealing with the insurance company.

TC: "Your advice to homeowners?"

JG: "Review [your insurance] regularly, every two or three years, if this inflation continues, more frequently. The appliances took nine months to get; it would have cost 30% more to order them the day they arrived. You can imagine how much more it would cost to build from scratch right

Most of us are 'underinsured'

Andrea Bond lost her house, too, and also is completing the rebuilding process.

TC: "What was your experience like dealing with your insurance company?'

AB: "Positive all around. Like most, I was underinsured. I had a new policy, three years old. I had to build smaller. One part I want to raise awareness about: We are replacing a structure from the ground up. What we don't see is what's under the foundation. When a contractor comes out and calculates costs, he can't see boulders or underground wa-

There is an allowance for code upgrade in policies; I'm glad I had it. They give you a 'bid' or 'time and materials estimate,' but they have to say, 'I can't see underground.' If they find unknown issues, they don't know how much that's going to cost. The homeowner is thinking they are inside their budget, but these unknown things may cost a few thousand or \$50 thousand."

Another pitfall Bond highlighted is the importance of updating the limits on your policy.

AB: "People are starting to become aware that they are insuring their home for the cost to replace it, not for its market value. Their cabin may have been built in 1960. It may be insured for \$200 per square foot. The cost to rebuild now may be closer to \$450 per square foot. You have to update with the actual cost of materials and labor as they go up and down, mostly up. During COVID, demand spiked costs, labor became scarce. Contractors are not as willing to do bids these days; fluctuations in prices are too much. My contractor was very keen on buying materials ahead of time when prices are lower and storing them, looking out for the client's pocketbook.

"Maybe they insured in 1989, maybe the agent never saw the house. Decades pass, the house burns down, now they can only replace half the house. A lot of people go to mediators, asking, 'Why did the agent not look at my house, why did they not say 'Hey, you are up for review, it's been five years.'

"My company has a decent process. It's best for everyone if we get the right data and understand the consequences of underinsuring. Maybe a smaller house, no landscaping, things you may not be able to do for a while. This year they sent me a form letter saying I might want to revisit my policy. Companies seem to be more aware ... People beat up on insurance companies. We have expectations, we pay our premiums, but there is an aspect of all insurance; we have to know our coverage."

TC: "What was the rebuilding timeline like?"

AB: "The time it takes to rebuild is different for everyone. At first, I was just trying to survive mentally and emotionally. I couldn't even think about designing a house. It was months and months before I was able to sit down with

a designer. Six months, and the clock was ticking. From that time until they were able to pour the foundation was a year and a half. It's been four years now. I am still working on it. I moved in late January."

Bond, like several others interviewed here, wanted to point homeowners to the nonprofit group United Policyholders. "They educate on all aspects of insurance, helping homeowners become aware about their policies, getting help in lots of arenas." Their website, uphelp.org, is a good place for every insurance consumer to visit and get to

The policy you have may not be the policy you think you

Alta Kavanaugh is not finished rebuilding her home,

AK: "It has been three years since I filed a claim with the California State Insurance Commissioner's Office so that I can have mediation with my insurance company, (State Farm.) [It provides] a mediator in cases where there is a dispute. I was underinsured and State Farm gave enough funds to build approximately 'half of a house' and that was with building costs of three years ago."

Kavanaugh was working as a school teacher in Sonoma County and renting out her Deerfoot property. She had re-

course to local groups there for guidance and advocacy. AK: "Sonoma County Legal Aid offered me the services of an attorney who specializes in disasters, and she has been very helpful. It is estimated that approximately 60% of homes lost in Sonoma County ... to fires were underin-

She explained the process by which her property became underinsured without her being aware: "When I left my home on Deerfoot Lane to take a teaching job in Sonoma County, my cabin became a rental, I requested my policy be changed from a homeowner policy to a rental policy. I was never informed that the rental policy would have less coverage, and indeed it does. In 1984 when I purchased the cabin ... I was assured by the agent that we were like 'partners' and that in case of disaster I would have the coverage to rebuild a similar house. Like so many people I felt confident that my insurance coverage was adequate. I never was told otherwise or contacted about increasing my coverage.

"Since the fires, I have talked to homeowners who were contacted yearly to meet with their agent for a review of coverage. Many of the plans that were available 40 years ago with complete coverage are no longer available; in the '90s, companies began offering a variety of plans. I suggest all homeowners request a meeting rather than wait for the agent to contact them."

Like Bond, Kavanaugh suggested "doing some research" at the United Policyholders site. "They really are 'on your side.' ... established to help the homeowner translate their coverage and ... prepare in case of a disaster. When the fires struck Sonoma County they sent staff to organize and set up monthly meetings for anyone who had been affected. They did the same after the Paradise and Woolsey fires."

Specifically, Kavanaugh advised homeowners to check their policies to see if they have "extended coverage,' because that is what you will likely need to rebuild a similar home to what you have now My home is currently under construction, and it is going to be a challenge to complete with the cost of building materials rising so drastically. I qualified for a Small Business Disaster loan [because the house was a rental property at a low interest rate and worry that it will not be enough. I am a 76-year-old retired school teacher, a cancer survivor whose earning days are over. I live on my pension and have my fingers crossed that State Farm will do the 'right' thing and help me with 'gap' funding to allow me to complete my home. At this point they claim they have no further responsibility. I have

spent three years looking for funding to fill in the 'gap'; applying for any possible grant I could find. FEMA funds were not available since the Cranston Fire did not qualify in size. I have not received any additional funds and mediation with my insurance company is my only option. I am hoping that State Farm will stand by their iconic slogan, 'Like a good neighbor, State Farm is there."

- Strong partnership with Riverside [County] Sheriff and Hemet Police Department through ongoing twoway communications, regular updates on community safety issues, and contractual agreements which place officers full time at many of our school sites
- Conduct regularly scheduled lockdown and shelter-in-place drills at every school site
- Regular monitoring of site surveillance cameras during and after school hours
- Vigilant campus security officers who provide monitoring and supervision support
- District level advanced security notification system for all sites (triggers an automatic lockdown in the event of an emergency and an immediate call to police)

We know that providing safe and welcoming school environments is instrumental to the success of students. We need the support of staff, students, families and the community to be the eyes and ears of the district. Please reach out to district administrators or contact the police directly should you see or hear any potential threats to school sites or students. This has proven to be a very effective method of prevention to help mitigate tragedies

Lastly, we know that acts of violence like these can be deeply upsetting to students. They are hard to understand and can create a great deal of fear and anxiety.





"This was truly an amazing event and a great example of what can happen when the community comes together to reach a unified goal," said Will Steichen, ICC recreation and program director who attended the event along with ICC President Stephanie Yost.

Besides music, the event featured multiple skating contests for various age groups, including an event for Best Trick and the game of S.K.A.T.E. (In S.K.A.T.E., Skaters compete round-by-round to execute a particular trick. If the skater fails at the trick, they are assigned a letter (first "s," then "k," etc.). Once they earn the word "skate," they're out.

Skaters at all levels and ages skated together throughout the day to an appreciative and enthusiastic crowd of spectators.

The event organizers and ICC express their appreciation to Idyllwild Pines for their patience and support for the event.



Steele to play in the Memorial


