## Local groups receive county funding

Several actions at Riverside County's June 21 and 28 board of supervisors' meetings focused on Hill organizations.

Before the business portion of the June 21 meeting, 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington recognized both the Idyllwild Arts Foundation and Living Free Animal Sanctuary at the board's rostrum.

A week later at the June 28 meeting, the board approved Washington's requests to provide nearly \$20,000 of Community Improvement Designation Funds (CIDF) to several local agencies.

Living Free was the largest beneficiary. Washington requested an allocation of \$10,000 to support Living Free's War Horse Creek project. This program uses rescued wild mustangs to help war veterans make the transition back to civilian life.

At the June 21 session, Washington spoke to his fellow supervisors about his and his staff's recent visit to Living Free in Mountain Center. After describing the organization and the War Horse Creek effort, Washington said, "I'd like to thank Ray Barmore and his team at Living Free for the incredible work they do for our veterans."

Four other Hill organizations were beneficiaries of the county's CIDF.

The next largest grant was \$4,000 to the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (MCFSC). This will help pay for MCFSC's continuing work to remove dead, dying or diseased trees, and to provide defensible space for low-income, elderly and/or disabled property owners.

The Idyllwild Help Center is the recipient of \$3,500 to provide gas vouchers to low-income residents who need to drive to medical appointments off the Hill.

Washington also targeted \$1,375 for the Idyllwild Community Center to share the cost of repairing the fence around the pickleball courts.

The Art Alliance of Idyllwild was granted \$1,000 to support the free shuttle service for its 24th Art Walk and Wine Tasting event Saturday, Oct. 8.

Also, the board approved the new fiscal 2022-2023 property tax rates for Community Service Areas (CSA). On the Hill, this affects Idyllwild properties. A \$35 per parcel assessment will be applied to the property tax bill and the funds are directed to the use of CSA 36. This excludes Pine Cove and Mountain Center.

Also at the June 21 board meeting, Washington presented Idyllwild Arts with a proclamation designating June 25, 2022 as Founder's Day. Accepting for President Pamela Jordan was Rose Colella, special assistant to Jordan.

In his remarks, Washington stated, "I was first aware of Idyllwild in 1974, when my wife and I were camping at Lake Hemet. Idyllwild will always hold a very special place in my heart. We'll miss you."

The final sentence was reference to the board's redistricting action in December 2021 to shift the Hill communities from Washington's district to District 4, whose Supervisor is V. Manuel Perez.

In one other action at the June 28 meeting, the board approved Washington's recommendation to re-appoint Idyllwild resident Terry Shirley to the Local Review Board of the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District. His term expires Jan. 30, 2024.

### Closed areas

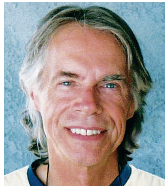

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# Local water suppliers’ responses to state restrictions

Gov. Gavin Newsom directed urban water supplies (UWS) throughout the state to adopt certain policies by May 25, 2022, to reduce water usage during the drought.

Two of those guidelines are:  
• Urban water suppliers shall submit a draft annual water supply and demand assessment, as required in Water Code section 10632.1, by June 1, 2022. The final draft remains due on July 1, 2022.  
• Urban water suppliers shall activate their Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) Level 2 requirements (anticipating up to a 20% reduction in supplies), or an equivalent standard if there is no adopted WSCP, by a date to be determined by the Water Board. CEQA requirements for projects relating to implementing WSCP Level 2 requirements are suspended.”

The Idyllwild Water District (IWD) attorney at the directors’ June 15 meeting, Ryan Guiboa of Best Best & Krieger out of Ontario, told the board that it does not have to follow the state water conservation policies being put into place due to drought because it does not qualify as an urban water supplier.  
He said a UWS requires 3,000 accounts or uses 3,000-acre-feet of water annually, of which IWD has neither.  
IWD General Manager Leo Havener, when later asked, agreed with the attorney on his approach to the state water policies. He had been resistant for many months to put IWD into Stage 2 from Stage 1 but finally did June 1.

“Finally, the Order encourages more stringent conservation on a voluntary basis, e.g., activation of WSCP Level 3, anticipating shortage levels of up to 30%. It also encourages all Californians to limit their summertime water use and generally use water more efficiently both indoors and out,” according to the order.

Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) General Manager Victor Jimenez told his board recently that customers soon will be limited to outdoor watering two days a week, even though it is a smaller district than IWD, and it is following the state policies. FVWD is in Stage 3. Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) is in Stage 2.

PCWD General Manager Jeremy Potter did not respond to the question by press time.

When asked why he follows stage policy, Jimenez said, “Although we technically are not Urban Water Suppliers individually, as ‘the Hill,’ we would be and I personally have found that the more that we do to comply with what is required of everyone else, the better the chance that they won’t come after us to implement offi-

cial revised water shortage contingency plans and that type of thing, which are costly to produce and implement ...

“The order allows for watering of trees and plants, and was more directed at turf, so I don’t think that it is asking too much of our customers to do their part when all of the flatlanders are being forced to lose their lawns with the new order.

“Technically if we wanted to play the ‘we aren’t urban water suppliers’ card, we could, but that could also result in a redefining of ‘urban water supplier’ to include everyone, which could be very costly for all of us.

“The fact that we fly under the radar on a lot of the regulations, not necessarily water quality related, but costly ‘plans and regulations’ that are required of urban water suppliers to establish, while we are not required to, prompts me to comply with whatever no cost requirements we can implement, to avoid catching their attention and causing them to take a closer look and decide to revisit the urban water supplier threshold and re-define it to include us.”

### New statewide emergency water conservation regulation now in effect

**SACRAMENTO** – A new statewide [emergency water conservation regulation](#) that bans using potable (drinkable) water on decorative or non-functional grass at commercial, industrial, and institutional properties went into effect Friday. It also requires urban water suppliers to implement all demand-reduction actions under Level 2 of their Water Shortage Contingency Plans.

The State Water Board adopted the regulation at its May 24 board meeting, and the Office of Administrative Law gave it final approval on June 10. The new restrictions are in response to Governor Newsom’s March 28 Executive Order calling for water conservation directives to address California’s new normal of climate extremes.

The regulation’s ban on watering non-functional turf (turf is defined as mowed grass) at commercial, industrial and institutional properties includes areas like the grass in front of or next to large commercial buildings and common areas managed by homeowners’ associations. The ban does not include watering grass used for human recreation or other community activities, watering residential grass or watering trees. The ban also does not prohibit the use of recycled water for irrigating non-functional turf.

“With increased aridification as our new reality, there is an urgency to all of us understanding and acting to ensure that water conservation is a California way of life. These regulations are part of our shared responsibility to address non-essential outdoor water use as our communities experience record-breaking drought and plan for dry conditions into next year,” said Joaquin Esquivel, chair of the State Water Board.

There also are new options for addressing water waste. In addition to the State Water Board, agencies that are already authorized to enforce infractions, like water suppliers and local government, are empowered to address violations of this regulation. A violation of the non-functional turf irrigation provision, for example, would be an infraction and subject to a fine of up to \$500. This is the second State Water Board water conservation emergency regulation of 2022: the prohibitions of the [first emergency regulation](#), adopted in January, also are infractions and are still in effect.

The regulation also requires urban water suppliers to implement all demand-reduction actions under Level 2 of their Water Shortage Contingency Plans, which are actions meant to address a 10% to 20% water shortage. In addition, urban water suppliers are required to fast-track their submissions of supply and demand assessments to plan for potential extended dry conditions.

“Level 2” actions vary for each water supplier, but they often include things such as:

- Increasing communication about the importance of water conservation
- Limiting outdoor irrigation to certain days or hours
- Increasing patrolling to identify water waste
- Enforcing water-use prohibitions

Some water suppliers already have imposed strong new restrictions on customers’ water use in accordance with their drought management plans; property managers should check with their local suppliers for details. However, about half of the state’s 436 water suppliers have not yet activated Level 2, and 36 have not submitted drought plans.

The emergency regulation requires suppliers without drought plans to take certain conservation actions, such as conducting outreach to customers about conservation, restricting outdoor irrigation to two days a week and enforcing against wasteful water practices.

Water suppliers are expected to communicate the requirements of the emergency regulation to their customers. The State Water Board encourages agencies to provide additional assistance to disadvantaged communities and translate conservation announcements and materials into the languages spoken in their service areas. People who see water waste should report it at [savewater.ca.gov](http://savewater.ca.gov) or to their local water supplier, city or county. # New meters result in lost revenue

The last week's Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors meeting, both General Manager Leo Havener and Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman told the board that a glitch in a software program resulted in the district losing about 20% of data while transferring from the old meter to the new meter system. The lost data the two said cannot be recovered, Shouman estimates, meant IWD lost between \$25,000 and \$30,000 in income.

The total system "loss" for May was 29% or 330,116 cubic feet of water unaccounted for.

"How many people didn't get billed?" President Dr. Charles Schelly asked. Havener said everyone got billed but the readings were not all accurate.

At the meeting, Havener estimated that 20 or fewer new meters were yet to be installed of just under 1,700. Some of the meters have required plumbing repairs to be installed. If plumbers are required to repair, IWD reimburses them. In May, IWD's budget was \$200 for water maintenance and supplies. In actuality, it cost \$10,825 for reimbursements to plumbers.

A few months ago, IWD had a storage tank repaired. "Where did we drain it?" Schelly asked. "We drained to the street," Havener answered. "Why did we not capture the water?" Schelly asked. Havener explained that the repair personnel were coming up the Hill in a short three-day period and IWD had nowhere to put it.

"Is there any way we can plan to empty a tank into usage?" Schelly asked. Havener said he would look into preparing to do so in the future.

IWD produced 1,838,264 cubic feet of water in May, 1,281,210 from Foster Lake wells and 557,054 cubic feet from downtown wells. Lilly and Strawberry creeks are no longer flowing.

The board tabled its water shortage contingency plan. Havener said staff is "still in the process of putting all the data together but it is a time crunch. But we still have to do it."

Vice President Peter Szabadi asked that it be postponed for the next meeting to discuss but Havener said, "That's not going to happen."

In discussing whether to increase rates during a drought, Havener said, "I'm not recommending we increase rates ... We're going to go out of it [Stage 2] as fast as we moved into it. Also, because of the glitch, I don't want to add this to it." Stage 2 requests customers to reduce water usage by 10%.

Schelly told the audience in attendance that the community is very concerned about water shortages "and we are very concerned, too." He pointed out the lack of a snowpack in the wilderness for the past couple of years and even though IWD has an abundance of water right now, "we know that our water supplies may go down ... We want to be able to supply water well into the next century."

The board also tabled its housing stipend policy, a benefit policy for employees residing within 6 miles of the district.

The surveyor has completed his part and submitted the documents to IWD for the new wastewater treatment plan. Havener said the next step is property negotiations with Idyllwild Arts Foundation.

Schelly had requested an equipment asset list that Havener provided. Directors and staff ran through a list of vehicle and rubber tire to discuss disposing of certain vehicles no longer in use or operable.

After Szabadi opened a discussion of the budget with an adamant refusal to approve any office construction listed in the budget, a \$150,000 line item, Schelly asked him, "What would you see that at?" Szabadi responded, "Zero."

The capital expenditure is not one of the high priorities on the list and Shouman said, "We may have to do it next year if it is more than \$150,000." The primary area for construction is in Havener and Shouman's working areas. "The interior walls are rotting," Havener said.

Director Les Gin said, "The building is in very bad shape." IWD has searched for other buildings to possibly purchase. "We looked and couldn't find anything," Havener said.

"There is no plan and you don't know what you're going to do. How did you come up with this number?" Szabadi said. Havener told him it was a guestimate from contractors — rough estimates.

Despite his objections, Szabadi approved the budget along with the three other directors present (Steve Kunkle was absent) 4-0. Total water and sewer revenue is expected to be \$3,112,178; expenditures \$2,302,586; capital improvements \$1,492,000; and a net fund deficit of \$589,493 for a drop in the reserve fund from \$3 million to \$2,317,592.

Gin had been forced to leave his home within the IWD boundaries when the owner sold it. He eventually found another home but it is within Fern Valley Water District boundaries. He has 180 days in which to resign from IWD.

Failed state

Flaw Number 4: The Supreme Court

As others have pointed out, there is a problem when you can predict how a justice will vote based on the president who appointed them. Vetting by Congress? Right! Lifetime appointments? Ridiculous!

County unanimously approves \$7.4 billion budget

At its June 21 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a final budget for fiscal year (FY) 2022-2023, which begins July 1.

The vote was unanimous and without any comments.

The county's total budget is \$7.4 billion and the projected surplus at the end of the fiscal year is \$368 million. The discretionary budget is slightly more than \$1 billion and remains balanced after the board's adjustments following last week's budget hearing.

The largest change from the initial budget County Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen submitted was another \$9.8 million for the Sheriff's Department. This will fund increased staffing at correctional facilities, patrol equipment, supplies and training.

The board also approved adding \$5 million to the \$5 million base for the Unincorporated Communities Initiative. During this fiscal year, the funding level was \$2 million.

The Fire Department and the district attorney's office respectively received \$3.9 million and \$3.6 million increases. The Fire Department will use some of this funding for more staffing at the Emergency Command Center, the Fire Marshall's office and training. Also, more equipment for the increasing occurrence of fires and for the county's Combustible Material Task Force will be acquired.

The district attorney also will use this funding for more staff due to the increasing case load.

Other agencies whose requests for more funds were at least partially met with acceptance were the Department of Public Social Services, Behavioral Health, Code Enforcement and Animal Services.

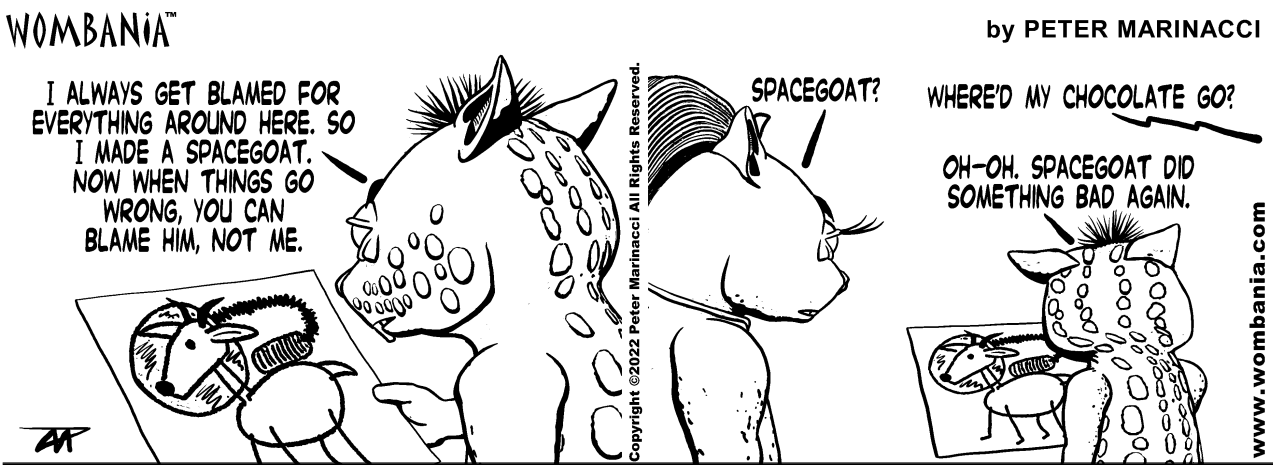

# ACLU discusses redistricting lawsuit in county

On June 14, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) filed a lawsuit on behalf of Inland Empire United (IEU) and six individuals, challenging the legality of the Riverside County redistricting plan. The plan was based on the 2020 Census results. The board of supervisors adopted it Dec. 21, 2021 and it was applied to the primary election held June 7.

The first hearing for the challenge will be Aug. 15 in Riverside.

Since the lawsuit was filed after this election, were the results to be accepted or would the suit challenge them? Julia Gomez of the ACLU spoke with the Town Crier to help answer these questions and clarify what steps lie ahead.

Gomez did stress that neither the June primary nor the November General Election are targets of the litigation. If the ACLU prevails, she hopes the 2024 primary and election will be held with revised districts.

Although the board’s action to approve the new districts was about six months ago, the lawyers took time to ensure they were working directly with the communities affected. They were not waiting for the primary, she said.

The suit alleges the plan is discriminatory and unrepresentative of the county’s population. The suit argues that the board should have chosen a plan that would have created two districts with a majority Latino population. By failing to make that decision, the board and county are diluting the Latino vote and limiting the Latino population’s opportunity to equally participate in the county political process, according to the ACLU filing.

“... the 2021 Redistricting Plan splits up politically cohesive Latino communities among districts 1, 2, and 5, shutting out Latino voters in cities like Jurupa Valley and Moreno Valley from the opportunity to elect candidates of their choice,” the filing claimed. The complaint ACLU is making alleges, “The 2021 Redistricting Plan perpetuates this history of disenfranchisement and marginalization by abridging Latino residents’ fundamental right to vote on account of their race, color, or membership in a language minority group in violation

## Postal Service increasing rates

The U.S. Postal Service is raising rates effective July 10. The new prices include a two-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp from 58 to 60 cents.

The single-piece letter added ounce price will increase to 24 cents, the metered mail 1-ounce price will increase to 57 cents and the price of a postcard stamp will increase to 44 cents. A one-ounce letter mailed to other countries would increase to \$1.40. The Postal Service is also adjusting prices for special services products, including Certified Mail, Post Office Box rental fees, Money Order fees and the cost to purchase insurance when mailing an item.

## Jif peanut butter recalled

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA), along with Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and state and local partners, are investigating a multistate outbreak of Salmonella Senftenberg infections linked to certain Jif brand peanut butter products produced at the J.M. Smucker Company facility in Lexington, Kentucky.

J.M. Smucker Company has voluntarily recalled certain Jif brand peanut butter products.

of the California ‘FAIR MAPS’ Act [Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions] and the equal protection provisions of the California Constitution.”

The solution, according to the plaintiffs, is for the board to adopt a supervisors’ district map that comports with the FAIR MAPS Act and the state Constitution. The purpose would be to ensure that neither of the Latino communities of interest centered around either northwest Riverside and Jurupa Valley or around Perris and Moreno Valley are split across different supervisors’ districts.

Supervisors Karen Spiegel (2nd District), V. Manuel Perez (4th District) and Jeff Hewitt (5th District) were up for re-election in the June 7 primary. Perez and Spiegel were unopposed and, therefore, re-elected. Hewitt finished second in a close race with Moreno Valley Mayor Yxstian Gutierrez. They will be competing for the seat on the November ballot.

Although the lawsuit was filed after this election, the results are not the focus of the challenge, Gomez stated.

“I’m looking for the 2024 election,” Gomez said. “If by 2024, there are new maps that’s great.”

The new county districts place the Hill communities — Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Mountain Center, Sage and Anza — in District 4, which Perez currently represents. If Gomez is correct, that neither of the 2022 elections will be challenged, then Perez will become the Hill’s supervisor in January.

Also, she opined that adoption of the IEU’s proposed redistricting map, referred to in the filing as Community Map 1.4, is not the specific goal of the litigation. “It’s a process with the court and the county. It’s essential that the Riverside and Jurupa communities and the Perris and Moreno Valley communities remain together like 1.4 did.”

While a new plan might be similar to Community Map 1.4, it does not have to be identical if the separated communities are re-united and a Latino candidate has a fair chance, given the Latino total and voting age populations.

Gomez could not estimate a reasonable time frame for a conclusion to the litigation. There are too many variables, including the county’s actions in response to the suit, to offer a reliable prediction, she averred.

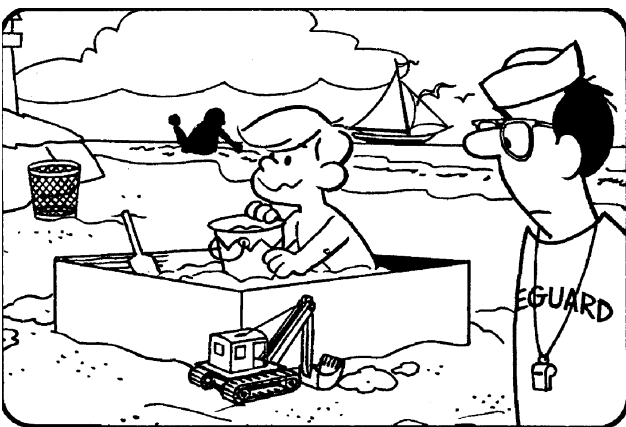

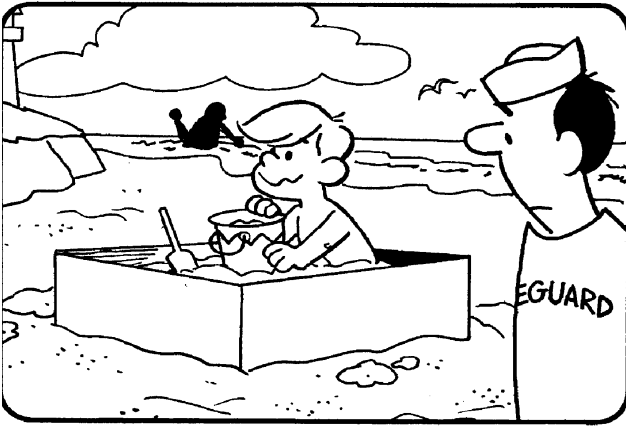

Alcohol servers and their managers must have a valid Responsible Beverage Service (RBS) certification from ABC. Servers and their managers must pass an online ABC-administered RBS exam. If they are newly hired, they must pass the exam and be certified 60 days from the first date of employment.

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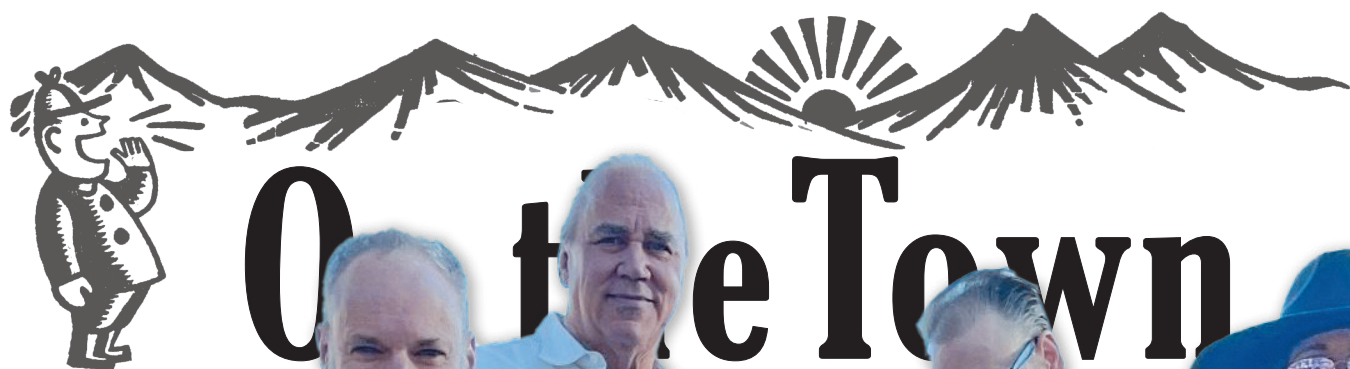

## Lisa Lynn and Broken Hallelujahs open concert series

It's summertime and the time is right for dancing, or just tapping a toe, at the Butterfield Amphitheater, as Ken Dahleen and the Idyllwild Summer Concert Series (ISCS) board bring back the Thursday night bands. The eight-week series starts at 6 p.m. Thursday, July 7, and is free to all. The series has been ongoing since 2000, and always features top-notch, crowd-pleasing acts.

Each year, Dahleen and his crew book the entertainment, make the necessary financial arrangements, and provide the sound and lighting set up to give the community eight weeks of professionally produced and memorable summer evenings. Dahleen's Big Band Staff always provides a special program, this year on July 14, when they present a tribute to 140 years of Broadway. That show starts at 7 p.m. without an opening act.

This year's series is dedicated to the memory of Idyllwild's departed "Gentleman in Chief" Doug Austin. Austin will live on in the hearts of all who remember his years of service to the community, and his humble and entertaining way with a mic and a crowd at the series.

The first headliner is Lisa Lynn and the Broken Hallelujahs. Singer and frontwoman Lisa Lynn Morgan has gotten the ISCS crowd dancing before, when her band was called the Country Gents. The group serves up what it calls "Southern fried Y'all-ternative rock 'n soul." The band covers everything from classic country to classic rock and newer material, including originals. The list runs from Patsy Cline and Tammy Wynette to Hendrix and Joplin, Rolling Stones to Foo Fighters, Merle Haggard to Bruce Springsteen ... something for everyone. "We choose the songs that move people the most — that meet them right where they're at. We want to leave our music family in a better place than when we found them. That is our goal and purpose," said Lynn.

The band has won several Coachella Valley Music

Awards over the years, and Lynn has been nominated several years running for Best Frontwoman and Best Female Vocalist. She has sung with Paul Rogers, Mickey Thomas, Terry Reid, Great White and New Christie Minstrels, and Travis Meadows, not to mention touring and performing in bands with residencies in Las Vegas.

Among the Desert Sun's Top Picks in 2016, critic Bruce Fessler had this to say about the band: "They (LLBH) aren't a cryin'-in-your-beer honky tonk band. Morgan has a passionate, upbeat sound that is fresh, yet traditional. ... Lisa Lynn Morgan, a backup singer for one of my favorite country bands, R Buckle Road, stepped up front in a new band, Lisa Lynn and the Country Gentlemen (now Broken Hallelujahs), and went on to win Best Country Band at CVMAs. They premiered an original song at that awards show and it sounded like a Dolly Parton classic." Award winning Nashville singer/songwriter Travis Meadows called her "... a fire, a contagious fire. A true artist and an inspiration to everything the fire touches."

Opening the show is Nathan James, appearing as a one-man band, singing and playing a variety of instruments including percussion, harmonica and his trademark washboard guitars. The emphasis is on well-crafted songwriting and artistry; the "how does one guy make all that music?" soon gives way to "What a groove! What a song!"

James has recently moved to Idyllwild, and was born and raised in Fallbrook. James was attracted to the individuality of self-made music and artistic expression from an early age. Growing up in a small agricultural town he could relate to music originating from a rural environment. "There wasn't a lot to do here, so you either got in trouble or found something productive to do with what you had around you."

Having supportive parents who didn't force him into college after high school allowed James to go straight into the real world of a "working musician." At age 19, James

got the call from internationally known blues veteran James Harman to join his band and tour the country. With Harman, he gained the experience that has shaped his own career. In 2007 he, with Ben Hernandez, took first prize at the Memphis International Blues Challenge. For the last 15 years he has been moving audiences across the U.S. and around the world.

Asked by the Crier for comment, James wrote, "I am excited to be a fairly new resident to Idyllwild for the past couple of years, and I grew up camping at Lake Hemet and Thousand Trails in Pine Cove when I was learning to play guitar and was dreaming of playing music for a living. The mountains are a big part of my inspiration and now I'm very fortunate to live here, which is a dream come true as well as being able to play music for a living. Another thing to mention — I will be returning to Europe for a tour performing in the fall to the Netherlands, Germany and Denmark."

The concerts are all free, but donations are gratefully accepted. The funding is met through contributions from the community, and the series always starts on a wing and a prayer. The budget this year is more than \$34,000. Contributions, checks payable to "Idyllwild Summer Concert Org," may be sent to P.O. Box 1542, Idyllwild, CA 92549-1542, or call (760) 413-4638. Brendan Steele notched his seventh top-25 finish on the PGA Tour this season, posting an eight-under-par 68-66-69-69 — 272 at the Travelers Championship at Cromwell, Connecticut last week. Fifteen birdies against seven bogeys earned his third top-25 finish in a row and his eighth consecutive tournament without being cut.

The Idyllwild native's drives averaged 302 yards into 77% of the fairways and he hit 86% of the greens in regulation, but he gave away about six strokes to the field with the putter.

Brendan now stands in 47th place on the PGA's FedExCup points list, and he is ranked 108th on the Official World Golf Rankings.

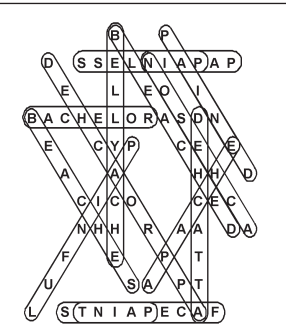

**Don:** And me.

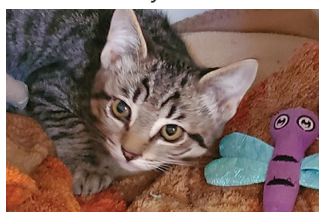

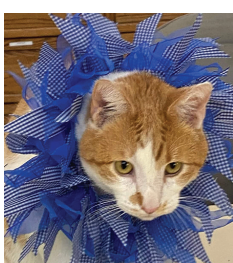

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# Native American Arts Festival Kabotie lectures

The Michael Kabotie Lectures are named for artist Michael Kabotie (Hopi) who consulted with the Idyllwild Arts Native American Festival organizers for nine years until his passing in 2009. His work was grounded in the visual and musical rhythms of his tribe but was often compared to that of non-native artists including Picasso, Braque and Kandinsky, whose work of which he grew up unaware. Festival Organizer Shaliyah Ben (Diné) spoke of his leadership in bringing forth a broader emphasis of the early festival, work this year’s speakers carried on.

The lecturers shared the insight garnered from three careers, work that included what could be described as decolonizing. As the artists at the opening roundtable brought up, just because an institution has a department of American Indian Studies (AIS) does not mean that department is looking out for the interests of Indigenous people. Institutions have their own agendas, inertia and culture. All the lectures at the festival last week were dense with ideas and examples.

In the first lecture, Dr. Meranda Roberts (Numu, Xicanx) discussed her experiences when she answered the call for postdocs to participate in the renovation of Chicago’s Field Museum Native American collection. The collection began as a home for artifacts gathered for the 1893 “Columbian Exhibition,” mounted to “celebrate” Columbus’ arrival in the New World. Later generations began to see the problematic nature of a collection that, like many others, was designed to document a people who were thought of as “vanishing” and unable to speak for themselves. How can a museum address stolen items? Human remains? Displays of clothing mixed to reflect the aesthetic whim of a curator and not the traditions of a culture?

“The alternative to having non-natives going into a collection and picking out ‘pretty’ pieces and telling a story about them is having knowledgeable people with first-hand experience of cultural practices and history, and their unresolved trauma and grief ...,” said Roberts. “Curating should not just be telling the story that one person wants to have told. How do communities wish to have their stories told?” Roberts encouraged us all to ask ourselves, “What can I do to make room for native

sovereignty in whatever work I do?” Her work at the Field came to include taking the non-native staff to tribal events, and the heavy lifting and delicate art of educating “experts.”

Debra Utacia Krol (Xolon Salian) gave Wednesday’s lecture, “Native News from a Native Lens”. Krol is an award-winning journalist who writes for USA Today and the Arizona Republic, where she is Indigenous Affairs reporter.

The topic, she said, could be rephrased as “The Good, the Bad and the Truly Horrific.” Krol provided examples of journalism, past and present, from across that spectrum. The “bad” includes Bandwagon Journalism, as reporters with superficial knowledge try to jump on the “latest thing in Indian reporting” without regarding the people who have been doing that work for a long time. Then there are the tropes and myths, including casinos, poverty and vanishing peoples. Even the most serious conferences and events often appear over photos of “dancing Indians in pow-wow regalia.” Tribal experiences are varied, and even journalists from other tribes need to educate themselves, so that goes double or triple for non-natives.

When asked for advice for aspiring journalists, she stuck to the facts: “Learn to research quickly, write clearly and concisely, and learn the AP Style Guide.”

The last lecturer was Dr James Riding In (Pawnee), Professor Emeritus of American Indian Studies at Arizona State University. In his talk, “Exploring Indigeneity’s Place in Modern Academia,” he traced his own path, beginning by recounting the depictions of American Indians he grew up seeing in media and in school, where he was taught “Manifest Destiny History.” When he challenged the prevalent stereotypes, his teachers would shut the inquiry down with, “How do you know? You weren’t there.”

He became a member of a first generation of academics, legal workers, artists and activists who made their way in the institutions. “Folks began to get their degrees, enter into academia. But without autonomy new strategies were doomed, marginalized, dominated or co-opted ... The goal is programs grounded in the experience of American Indigenous nations and peoples. To recognize the disparate world views, literatures, knowledge systems, political structures, languages, but also the shared commonalities .... AIS calls for partnership be-

tween Indian nations, communities and organizations that seek tangible and sensible solutions rooted in Indigenous and non-Indigenous knowledge to address problems facing American Indian Nations.”

He also presented the changes over time in the way the federal government interacted with the tribes; treating them first as foreign nations, then “wards” unable to care for themselves, and then as sovereign entities. He himself was a consultant on the Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative, a massive coming-to-terms with one institution that was part of the larger project to assimilate Native American young people exploitatively.

Gerald Clarke (Cahuilla) was a presence at much of the festival events. He is a University of California Riverside Ethnic Studies professor, has taught at Idyllwild Arts, and was recently appointed by Gov. Gavin Newsom to the California Arts Council. He contributed work to the Parks Gallery Exhibition, participated in the initial roundtable artist event, emceed the Opening Celebration, and responded to a request for comment. Asked about the expansiveness of the festival, bringing together arts, education and journalism, all these different disciplines navigating the institutions, he said, “Tribal people are often seen as ‘spiritual, intuitive and natural,’ they take away your intellect. Romanticized stereotypes have deprived native people to be seen as intellectuals. The entire world can benefit from our Indigenous intellectual tradition, which is knowledge that has been handed down generation to generation for centuries. I think there is a hunger in mainstream America for access to this authentic knowledge that has been hidden for centuries.”

Events began with an invocation: Speakers acknowledged the people on whose land they stood, and festival literature “respectfully acknowledges the Quwishpa Cahuillangnah (also known as Cahuilla Band of Indians) and all nine sovereign Bands of Cahuilla people who have stewarded this land throughout the generations and continue to steward this land for all future generations.”

Sponsorship came from Agua Caliente Band of Indians, Chickasaw Nation, Morongo Band of Mission Indians, San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, Soboba Band of Mission Indians, Soboba Band of Luiseño Indians, the Tribal Alliance of Sovereign Indian Nations and an anonymous foundation.
