California passes budget with tax refunds, other benefits

On June 30, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed the legislation enacting the fiscal 2022-2023 budget. The total state budget exceeds \$300 billion, of which \$234.4 billion is the General Fund. Submitted in January, Newsom's initial proposed budget was for \$286.5 million.

With the nation's economic future still uncertain, the final budget includes \$37.1 billion for reserves.

Earlier that day after the legislature's actions, Senate President Pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) and Sen. Nancy Skinner (D-Berkeley), chair of the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee, described the result of these budget negotiations: "With the budget the Senate passed today, we are putting our state's wealth to work, providing \$17 billion in relief for Californians facing higher prices at the gas pump and in the grocery store, and putting away record reserves for possible future downturns. Funding for important climate and wildfire efforts, schools, broadband, transportation, and other programs will benefit Californians for generations, as does our clear commitment to abortion rights and services in the aftermath of Roe — and beyond."

Tax refunds

One of the most visible actions was the inclusion of \$9.5 billion in tax refunds to help people with the consequences of inflation. Agreement between the governor and legislative leaders on how to address this issue was one of the final steps in securing the budget's enactment.

"The centerpiece of the agreement, a \$17 billion inflation relief package, will offer tax refunds to millions of working Californians. 23 million Californians will benefit from direct payments of up to \$1,050," Newsom, Atkins and Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lake-wood) wrote in an earlier joint statement.

Three levels of refunds are based on the 2020 taxable California income and filing status (single, joint or with dependents). Single filers with income of \$75,000 or less will receive \$350 and another \$350, for a total of \$700, if they have dependents. Joint filers with income of \$150,000 or less will receive \$700, and another \$350, for a total of \$1,050 if they have dependents.

For single filers whose income is between \$75,001 and \$125,000 or joint filers with income between \$150,001 and \$250,000, the refund will be \$250, or \$500 if a joint return, and another \$250 if they have dependents.

The refund level is \$200 for single filers whose income is between \$125,001 and \$250,000 or \$400 for joint filers with income between \$250,000 and \$500,000. Another \$200 will be received if there are dependents for a potential total of \$600.

According to the state Senate Floor Report, about 500,000 tax filers had income above the limit and will not receive any refund. For very low-income residents, who may not have had to file, the budget includes another \$39 per month for those enrolled in the state's Social Security Income Program.

Newsom's initial plan would have provided rebate payments to vehicle owners. The legislative leaders' preference was to make the payments based on income levels rather than car ownership, which would have favored higher-income residents. However, the initial proposal had lower-income limits, while still providing higher relief to lower-income families.

Gas taxes

While a significant cause of the current inflation rate is the dramatically rising gas prices, California's excise tax on gasoline increased 2.8 cents on July 1, for a total of 53.9 cents per gallon. A 2.25% sales tax also applies to the purchase of gasoline.

During the June 30 Senate action, efforts to postpone the increase were rejected without a vote. Later, Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (Yuba City) issued a statement, "This was our last opportunity to prevent a

Fire danger rating level increased to very high

Officials with the San Bernardino National Forest raised the Fire Danger Rating Level to "Very High" on Tuesday, June 28. This change is based on prolonged hot and dry weather, below normal live and dead fuel moistures, and forest-wide severe drought conditions.

As visitors were preparing to celebrate 4th of July festivities outdoors, the San Bernardino National Forest officials reminded the public that fire restrictions remain in effect due to the danger from current and anticipated worsening conditions. Fireworks and pyrotechnics are prohibited on the San Bernardino National Forest — every part of the forest, every campsite, every day.

The restrictions prohibit these activities on federal lands (private, county and state lands have different rules):

- Campfires and wood/charcoal barbecues at unhosted campgrounds and picnic areas
- Discharging of a firearm
- Smoking
- Operating an internal combustion engine off paved, gravel or dirt National Forest System roads and trails
- Welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame

The public is reminded to "know before you go" (www.fs.usda.gov/visit/know-before-you-go) by checking restrictions ahead of each visit in case restrictions increase later this summer.

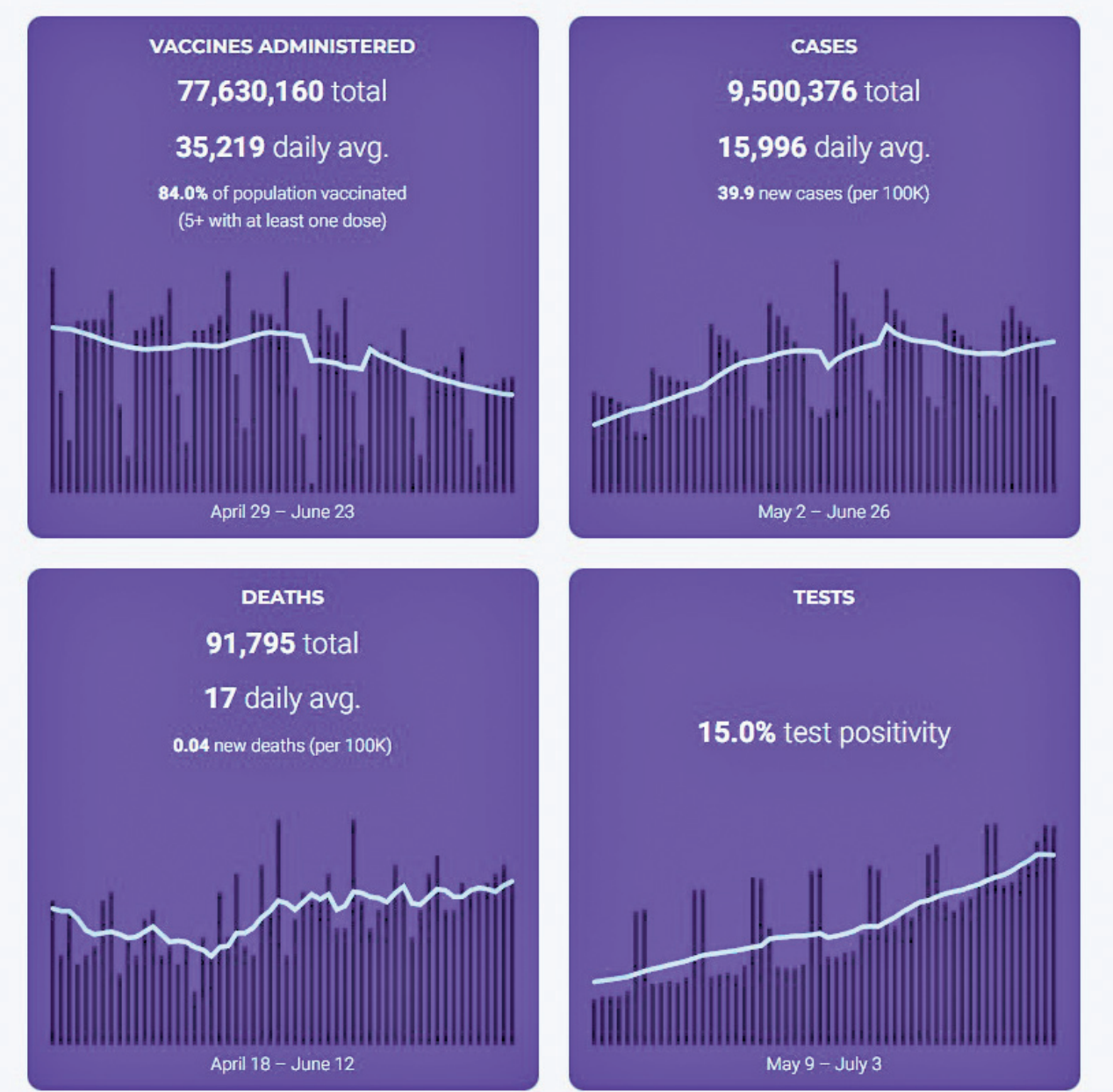

Local COVID Stats

As of Tuesday, July 5, the county of Riverside stats showed 331 COVID cases have been reported in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area, with 321 recoveries and seven deaths, leaving three active cases in our area.

Anza reported 410 COVID cases with 400 recoveries and seven deaths, leaving three active cases in the Anza area, as well.

Idyllwild School, Hemet High and Hamilton secondary all report no active cases among either students or staff. Hamilton elementary reports four active cases among students and none among staff.

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FTC suing Walmart regarding fraud

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is suing WalMart in federal court. FTC says Walmart has known for many years that scammers use its locations to get money for grandparents, romances and other scams, but it didn't properly warn people or train its employees to prevent fraud.

According to the FTC, many Walmart locations didn't display or give people information about potential fraud, which could have stopped them from sending money to a scammer. The company didn't consistently post warning signs, put out fraud awareness brochures, or use the required money transfer "send" forms with front-page fraud warnings.

For years, according to the FTC, Walmart even looked the other way when scammers picked up money at stores. The FTC says that a single Walmart employee could process hundreds of thousands of dollars of customer financial transactions a day.

That's why the FTC is asking the court to order Walmart to return money to people who were scammed, pay civil penalties, and stop violating the Telemarketing Sales Rule and FTC Act.

\$500 million gas tax increase on Californians who currently pay the highest prices in the nation. The increase will add even more costs to California’s nearly \$7-per-gallon-gasoline.”

Health programs and initiatives

The new budget also includes funds to provide health care to all immigrants regardless of age and \$200 million for reproductive care — facilities and costs. “This budget invests in our core values at a pivotal moment, safeguarding women’s right to choose, expanding health care access to all and supporting the most vulnerable among us while shoring up our future with funds to combat the climate crisis, bolster our energy grid, transform our schools and protect communities,” Newsom said in the press release announcing his budget signing.

Rent help

Funding for emergency rental assistance and to help on past due utility bills is part of the budget compromises. Qualified low-income tenants had a March 31 deadline to request assistance. California’s program is the largest unified emergency rental assistance program in the nation, covering about 64% of the state’s population, with local emergency rental assistance programs covering the rest. “California ran the largest and most successful eviction protection and rent relief program in the country,” said Newsom in a press release about the budget. “340,000 families weren’t evicted because of this and the overwhelming majority of assistance went to very low-income households. Homelessness prevented, public health protected, families stabilized.”

Water projects and fire protection

Water supply and fire protection are also important budget components. Nearly \$5.5 billion was allocated to these efforts.

The Department of Water Resources received millions for water supply projects, drought relief, conservation for water suppliers and turf replacement. Cal Fire received \$96 million to acquire four new S70 Fire Hawk helicopters, \$38.6 million for bulldozers and engines, and \$37.8 million for more full-time staffing, more than \$100 million for nearly 24 more hand crews for vegetation management, hazardous fuel reduction projects and wildland fire suppression, and \$3.5 million to establish the Office of Wildfire Technology Research and Development.

Emergency power

Also, \$3.4 billion was budgeted for energy projects and programs, including trailer bill language to help ensure backup electricity during emergencies. “Drought is causing lower energy production. Extreme heat is causing increased energy demand. Wildfires threaten energy infrastructure,” Newsom stated in his press release. “So, we’re investing \$4.3 billion to help keep the lights on this summer, invest in clean and reliable energy infrastructure, help with your energy bills, accelerate our transition to clean energy and so much more. We’re building the energy system of the future.” This includes \$140 million to support long-duration energy storage projects and \$550 million for distributed electricity back up assets.

Education

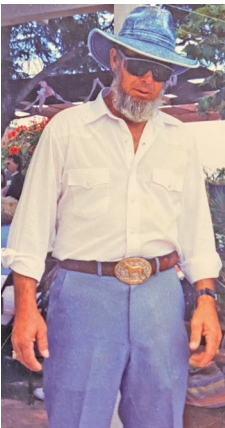
Funding for education programs continues to reach record levels. Funding for local school districts is a 15% increase over the 2021-2022 funding levels, a record for ongoing discretionary base funding. Also, the budget language protects districts facing declining enrollment. These steps and a \$9.5 billion Prop 98 Reserve should alleviate fears of a fiscal cliff or other budget concerns for school districts, according to the Senate’s report.

In their joint statement, Newsom, Atkins and Rendon summarized the new budget, “This budget builds on our

National Night Out on Aug. 2

The annual National Night Out is scheduled from 5 to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 2, at the Lake Hemet Sheriff’s Substation in Mountain Center. Local law enforcement and fire personnel will be on hand to meet. Interactive displays, kids coloring books, vehicles and helicopters will be available to explore.

Postal Service increasing rates

The U.S. Postal Service is raising rates effective July 10. The new prices include a two-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp from 58 to 60 cents. The single-piece letter added ounce price will increase to 24 cents, the metered mail 1-ounce price will increase to 57 cents and the price of a postcard stamp will increase to 44 cents. A one-ounce letter mailed to other countries would increase to \$1.40. The Postal Service is also adjusting prices for special services products, including Certified Mail, Post Office Box rental fees, Money Order fees and the cost to purchase insurance when mailing an item.

Jif peanut butter recalled

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA), along with Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and state and local partners, are investigating a multistate outbreak of Salmonella Senftenberg infections linked to certain Jif brand peanut butter products produced at the J.M. Smucker Company facility in Lexington, Kentucky. J.M. Smucker Company has voluntarily recalled certain Jif brand peanut butter products. FDA has posted a list at www.fda.gov/safety/major-product-recalls/2022-recalls-food-products-associated-peanut-butter-jm-smucker-company-due-potential-risk-salmonella of other recalls being conducted by companies that have used the recalled Jif peanut butter as an ingredient in the manufacturing of a new product (e.g., chocolate products) or in repackaging the product (e.g., snack cups). This list will be updated as the agency receives notification of new recalls. Also, the U.S. Department of Agriculture issued a recall on ready-to-eat Super Asian Chicken Salads that were made with recalled Jif peanut butter and sold at an Amazon Go retail location in Washington state. As of May 25, CDC reports that of the 10 people interviewed, 10 (100%) reported eating peanut butter prior to becoming ill. Nine people reported brand information, and all nine (100%) reported eating different varieties of Jif brand peanut butter. Final June primary county races

On June 30, the Riverside County Registrar of Voters issued the final results of the June 7 primary. And there were no surprises from the ongoing vote counts.

Below are the results of the races in the Riverside County June primary. The top two vote getters for each U.S. and state-elected position will be the candidates on the November election ballot. Regardless of party, the two candidates with the most votes will face off during the fall campaign.

For Riverside County elected positions, if a candidate receives more than 50% of the votes cast, they are declared the winner and will not have to battle in November.

District Attorney Mike Hestrin and Sheriff Chad Bianco exceeded the 50% threshold and are re-elected for their third and second terms, respectively.

Nearly 28.6% (375,610) of the 1.3 million registered voters in the county cast ballots in the primary. The Riverside County turnout for the March 2020 Presidential pPrimary was 43.2%. In 2018 for the last gubernatorial pPrimary, turnout was 35.2% and, four years earlier, in 2014, only 22.3% of registered county voters came to the polls.

U.S. Representative District 41

Running in a slightly modified district, Republican Congressman Ken Calvert was the leading candidate with 48.2% of the votes. His November challenger will be Democrat Will Rollins, a former federal prosecutor. Rollins and his fellow Democrat Shrina Kurani together garnered 69,406 votes, or 46.0%, which is slightly less than Calvert's 72,700 votes.

In the closely balanced district, this indicates a close race in November between Calvert and Rollins. However, if Republican John Michael Lucio's 6,880 votes switch to Calvert, he could easily protect his incumbency.

State Senate District 32

With only two candidates, both Assemblyman Kelly Seyarto (R) and Brian Nash (D) will be on the November ballot. For the primary, where the results did not affect the November ballot, Seyarto received 62.6% of the votes.

State Assembly District 47

Four candidates were in this race. Christy Holstege, Democrat from Palm Springs, garnered 50.2% of the vote followed by Republican Greg Wallis, who had 31.2% of the votes. Although Holstege collected more than 50%, that did earn her the seat until the November votes are counted.

State Assembly District 36

Assembly District 36 includes Garner Valley, Anza and Aguanga. Ian Weeks, a Republican and Eduardo Garcia, a Democrat, have received 91.4% of the total vote and will compete in November.

District Attorney

In a three-way race, incumbent Hestrin was re-elected as Riverside County District Attorney. He garnered 55.0% of the total vote, outpolling his two rivals, Judge Burke Strunsky and Lara Gressley.

Some people who use refined sugar counter with the fact that they see plenty of hummingbirds around, like three or four. The fact is, 50 years ago they would have seen eight or 10.

Loss of habitat, climate change and domestic cats are reducing the numbers of these fascinating and delicate birds.

If you truly love hummingbirds, plant flowers that will provide them with the nectar they eat naturally. We have two beautiful nurseries up here that supply lots of different flowers that will attract hummingbirds, and butterflies, as well.

If you don't have any luck planting flowers in the ground, plant them in pots. If you buy perennial flowers, they will come back next year.

Sheriff

Similarly, incumbent Sheriff Chad Bianco was re-elected with 60.7% of the votes over his challenger Michael Lujan.

Auditor Controller

Wildomar Mayor Ben Benoit and incumbent Auditor-Controller Paul Angulo will face-off in November. The final June 7 results showed Benoit receiving 46.0% of the ballots cast and Angulo with 39.4%.

Assessor-County Clerk and Treasurer Tax Collector

In two separate races, the incumbent office holder was not challenged. Peter Aldana, the assessor-county clerk, and Matthew Jennings, treasurer-tax collector, were elected and will not have to face any November challenge.

County Superintendent of Schools

Incumbent Edwin Gomez was unopposed.

County Supervisors

Two incumbent supervisors, Karen Speigel (2nd District) and Manual Perez (4th District, which now includes the Hill communities) were unchallenged and, therefore, re-elected.

Current Board of Supervisors Chair Jeff Hewitt of the 5th District had three opponents. Moreno Valley Mayor Yxstian Gutierrez outpolled Hewitt by slightly more than 1,000 votes. Neither candidate polled more than 35%. So the fall campaign will focus on gaining support from the voters of the other three candidates, especially Lloyd White's who received 26.2% of the votes.

Judges

There were four Superior Court judgeships on the ballot: Office #4

Deputy District Attorney Natalie Lough, with 49.8% of the vote and will face Senior Deputy District Attorney Amy Barajas (28.2%) in November. Office #11, #26 and #28

In these three races, the top vote- getter garnered more than 50% of votes cast.

In the Office #11 race, Jay Kiel, a deputy district attorney, received 52.2% of the vote to defeat his opponent, Laura Garcia. In Office #26, Jason Stone has 63.9% of the votes and for Office #28, Kristi Kirk has 55.4%.

Statewide votes

Comparing the top two vote getters in the statewide races, Riverside County voters and the rest of the state were remarkably the same except for one second place candidate. In the race for controller, local voters favored Yvonne Yiu (D) over Malia Cohen (D). But Lanhee Chen was the top vote- getter in the county and statewide.

While Riverside County and statewide voters were in step on which candidates they favored, local voters were decidedly less Democratic than the rest of the state. For example, Newsom gained 55.9% of the state voters, but only 45.3% of Riverside County voters. And similar differences in the other races.

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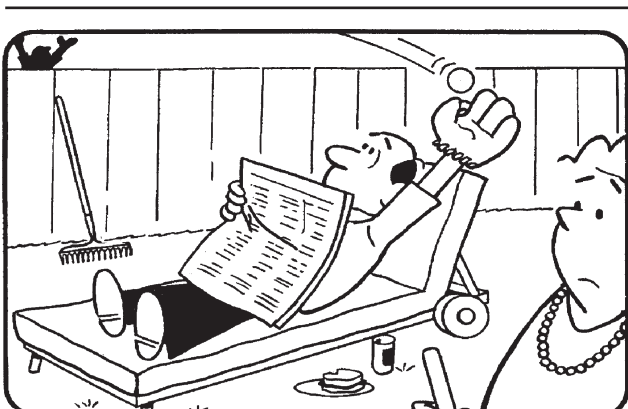
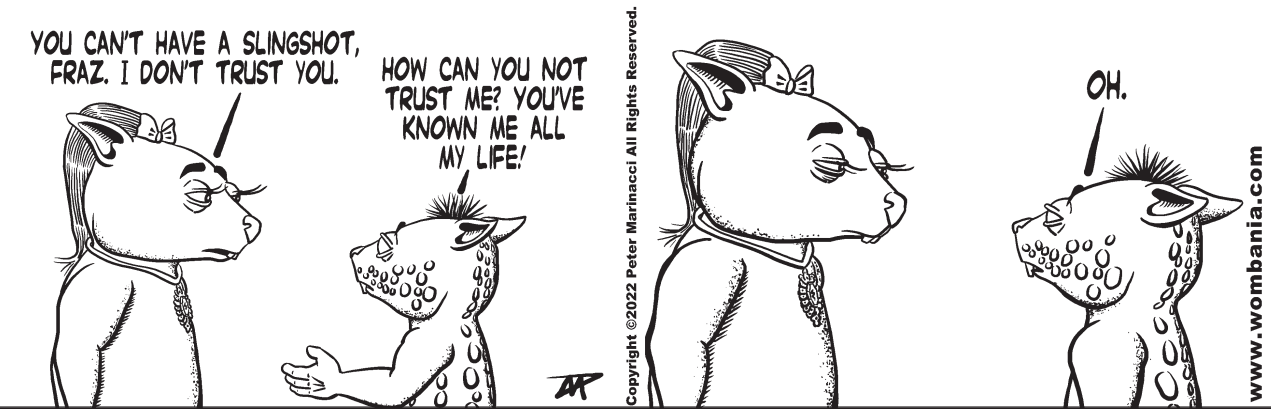

New ABC requirement by Aug. 31

The deadline for alcohol servers and their managers to meet mandatory training under a new law is rapidly approaching. The new law went into effect Friday, July 1, and by Aug. 31, every alcohol server and their managers must be trained under Assembly Bill 1221 and Assembly Bill 82. AB 1221 defines an alcohol server as anyone employed at an Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) on-premises licensed establishment who is responsible for checking identifications, taking customer orders, and pouring or delivering alcoholic beverages. Alcohol servers and their managers must have a valid Responsible Beverage Service (RBS) certification from ABC. Servers and their managers must pass an online ABC-administered RBS exam. If they are newly hired, they must pass the exam and be certified 60 days from the first date of employment.

The Ralph M. Brown Act, which is codified as California Government Code sections 54950-54963, is open-meeting legislation that governs only local public agencies. (State public agencies are governed by separate legislation.)

Five presently active local governmental agencies on our Hill are governed by the Brown Act: the Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Fern Valley the Idyllwild Fire Protection District, and the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District. The

Idyllwild Town Crier is the sole media monitor of these six agencies. The TC also reports on the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District, Riverside County Board of Supervisors, Hemet Unified School District and Mt. San Jacinto College District regarding matters that affect us on the Hill.

These public agencies are not owned by the board members and administrators who run them; they are owned by you. The board members and administrators work for you. They make decisions as to how to spend your tax dollars — and what services you get for them.

The board members hire the administrators,

but you vote the board members in or out. The Town Crier reports to you on the happenings at the meetings of these local public agencies because you are not always able to attend them yourselves.

This is perhaps the TC's most important ongoing work for you.

We could not continue this reporting without your continuing Memberships. Our congratulations and most sincere thanks to all you Town Crier Members for renewing your Memberships, thereby keeping the TC serving our Hill community.

Pamyua, a highlight at the Native American Arts Festival

The 2022 Idyllwild Arts (IA) Native American Arts Festival came to a close with a concert in Holmes Amphitheatre featuring Alaska's most popular Inuit band, Pamyua. Opening the evening of Friday, June 24, were the Mountain Cahuilla Bird Singers.

As the sunset filtered through the forest, the assembled locals and festival attendees were welcomed by the Bird Singers' stirring program of traditional songs, links in a chain that stretches back many generations. The rhythm of shaken gourds and the deep voices told the stories of migration of not just of birds, but of a people. The group explained enough of the meaning of the songs to make us want to know more, and the presentation was warm and inviting.

The evening included a special performance by Alaska's Pamyua (pronounced Bam-yo-ah, and meaning "encore" or "do it again"). Its unique sound, described as "Inuit Soul," melds Indigenous and Afro American sounds. Brothers Phillip and Stephen Blanchett founded the group with Inuit musician Ossie Kairavak, and have since formed a powerful trans-arctic musical family. They were joined by guitarist Ivan Night, Sara Anderholm on keyboard and Derek Haukaas on drums.

Some of Pamyua's numbers are traditional, preserving and carrying forward Inuit culture to the next generation and wider world. Some songs expand and harmonize the old songs, recalling the Blanchette' father and their experience with Baptist church acapella style. Others are soul and hip-hop grooves integrated into the rhythms and sounds of their own music and language. The brothers (and Kairavak) are at home in front of an

audience, obviously loving the "cozy" vibe of our town, complete with kids romping in the meadow.

The Crier was fortunate to meet and speak with Phillip this week. He explained the evolution of his group, and the path of a career taking its sound to National Geographic's "Life Below Zero" and the Library of Congress.

Phillip describes his hometown, Bethel, Alaska, (pop. 6548) as "Kind of like Idyllwild in a way. A strong sense of community and a wonderful sense of Indigenous culture, an incredible environment in which to become aware. It's remote, we don't have a live music industry. But what we saw on TV and heard on radio had a big influence.

"There was a thriving public radio and public TV; we grew up in the boom time of the 1980s. Our TV station produced a gameshow called 'Ask an Alaskan'

that was broadcast statewide. We grew up seeing media produced in different ways; we saw the underground rap culture coming up. [Bethel] represented the vibe of urban culture. We thought 'Let's create!' We have something to say, we have a culture. We saw the progression of urban hip-hop break-dancing style, the identity of what it meant to be part of that community, the importance of creativity and the process of creation for young people in the community. What happened in

The Little Fish with a Really Long Name:

Humuhumunukunukuāpuaʻa

This little fish with strong, powerful jaws grows to be up to 10 inches in length.

The **humuhumunukunukuapuaʻa** (sometimes just called humuhumu for short) is known for its bright, beautiful coloration. It is a kind of tropical triggerfish. Many people don't know that reef triggerfish like humuhumu can change colors!





New vintage store in Fort's live event Saturday

Ephemera, a "vintage pop culture wonderland" on the second floor of the Fort, will host an event with live music from 3 p.m. Saturday, July 9. The theme is "Get Lit with Ephemera," and at sundown, its new "authentic Vegas-style neon sign" on the side of the building will be lit.

Los Angeles experimental artist and musician Nico Turner (opening act for Cat Power) will perform from 7 to 9 p.m., and interviews with guests sporting their best vintage apparel, conducted by neon TikTok influencer @nonstopboogie, will occur from 3 p.m. to sundown. Neighboring Wine Finch will offer specials from its "eclectic list of small production, organic and natural wine" and craft beers.

The award-winning Los Angeles audio-visual production writing and directing team Samuel Markus and Jennifer Thorington, (markusthorington.com) opened Ephemera. The shop has garnered mention in places like Glamour and Desert magazines, and boasts over 9,000 followers on Instagram. The collection includes clothes, art, music, books and assorted stylish swag.

The Crier caught up with Jennifer who explained the multifaceted activities of the creative duo. "Both of us have been self-employed entrepreneurs since our late teens. We own Ephemera together as well as a marketing firm and production company Working Brilliantly. We are currently in the throes of a couple of film projects we are super excited about and cannot wait to share (once everything is perfectly aligned).

"We have lived here in Idyllwild full time for 13 years this year and have run our business Working Brilliantly since 2011. Prior to that, we toured and wrote music as The Morning Birds. Sam had gone to Idyllwild Arts for film school (which is why Idyllwild was our first choice to move) — and after meeting in LA we moved to Idyllwild to write an album.

"Ephemera opened late 2019 and has been a magnificent whirlwind of joy and fun. Sharing our passions

with people has always been at the forefront of our deeply creative relationship and Ephemera was/is a natural progression on our journey. A deep interest in vintage, sustainable fashion, music, film and pop culture has been something we have shared since we first met, and bringing that to our hometown through our store

has enabled us to share that with other like-minded people here and all over the globe. It's taken on a life of its own, as all passion projects do, and the outpouring of support and community we have felt and experienced has humbled and inspired us. We are deeply grateful for it all."

the Bronx, we could relate to back home ...

"I would go to the record store, Borders, and look at CDs and be inspired by how the industry was able to do this and ask, 'How are we going to present ourselves?' We wanted to be part of the industry and represent Indigenous style. It meant something, it had a piece of the identity, an exciting piece.

"It's not something everyone is doing, it's appreciated. We are representing the progression of something that came from an ancient form of ceremony, identity and storytelling."

The Blanchetts have a special relationship to Chuna McIntyre, of the Nunamta Yupik Singers and Dancers, and whose image, since he appeared at the 2019 festival, was used in this year's publicity. "Our mother for many years toured with him all over the world. She would send us postcards from New York, Tokyo, Washington, DC. He's the older school version of what we do. I grew up watching them perform and was inspired."

Phillip would learn the songs and sing them to his brother, who would harmonize with him. Their father heard this and nourished it, arranging their first performances with their mother and a traditional drummer. When they met another youngster who also knew the language and drumming, Kairavak, they became a trio, and began to perform without the elders.

They soon received statewide press and media attention. They met Karina Moeller at the Arctic Winter Games where she was performing representing Greenland. She and Phillip began dating, married, and now

have two children age 24 and 19. Touring in Denmark they met keyboardist Kristoff Reenberg, who Phillip describes as a "retro-Scandinavian jazz virtuoso." "He loves the grit and storytelling," Phillip said. "He has taught me a lot about music on a real time level and how to work with pick-up musicians. I would see him communicate in this masterful way; so incredibly talented and so humble as a player, it brought the best out of those musicians who also speak that language, that's when the magic happens."

The group founded its own company, now called "Arctic Voice" but originally "ellavut," an Inuit word that joins the meanings "our universe," "awareness" and "weather." "In our culture we see a connection," he said.

This is the first visit of Pamyua to Idyllwild, but the brothers have done a virtual meeting with IA students during the pandemic. "The program focused on performing arts and afro-indigenous culture. We were guest speakers over Zoom. The program was student lead and mediated." He looks forward to returning "when all the students are here."

Pamyua is part of the trans-national Arctic cultural and political scene, performing mostly in Alaska, Canada, Greenland, Scandinavia and even Russia.

"[Pamyua is] our own way of representing Inuit art and tradition, we are doing it in real time. It's not a museum piece, we are doing it right now. That's a message that a lot of Indigenous groups recognize and appreciate. We're not holding ourselves to the tradition. We are confident enough in who we are, it's strong enough and beautiful enough to express our identity in new ways. It's honest to who we are and still honors our traditions."

Phillip explains his ideals for performance: "Show your best, entertain, honor tradition. It's actually a prayer, it's staying humble, honoring the song and also the ancestors. There's a certain playfulness and seriousness in our dance tradition, the same thing Kristoff would show me with his music."

About the future, Phillip said had just been at Higher Grounds Coffee shop working on the soundtrack for the National Geographic series "Life Below Zero," a show called "First Alaskans." "It's the first one with all Indigenous cast. They asked us to be part of the production team. We're finishing up the first season. Breaking into production is a whole other level. We used to joke in the studio, put on sunglasses and say, 'Now we are producers.' It's another amazing progression in our career. I like to work with the team and take our time and be on our own deadline, but now ... I have to give them 10 cues by next month."

The group has also just submitted a video to the Library of Congress' "Home Grown Concert Series." The show featured a show in Alaska and "ends with the group being joined by a big community group, showcasing how our dances are done in the community. We went out of our way to make it represent us but also to do it right. All who worked on it are proud of it."

Later this year the group has planned an unusual tour with Arts Midwest, allowing them to engage locals more deeply while avoiding some of the rigors of the road. It will consist of three three-week mini tours. Each week they will visit a different small town, do intimate performances for various community groups, then finish with a concert performance for the whole town. The first set of three will happen in fall, then another set in February and then one more.

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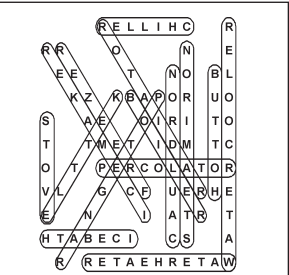

Mac Taylor, who since 1949 had been known for making the best hamburger on the Hill, ended his 28-year connection with Taylor's Lodge in Mountain Center at a party given in honor of him and his wife, Ronnie. They planned to retire to Clear Lake.

40 years ago - 1982
USC-Idyllwild launched an unprecedented series of night courses for the local community. Life Drawing and Native American Art History were the two classes offered the first week.

35 years ago - 1987
Smokey Bear was grand marshal of the 4th of July Parade and 16-year-

old Mark Wheeler realized his dream of driving Hoffman Realty's 1934 Ford.

30 years ago - 1992
A little over three hours apart, the Hill felt two of the strongest earthquakes in 40 years. A 7.4 hit at 4:58 a.m. and then a 6.5 at 8:05 a.m.

25 years ago - 1997
Fourth of July was a weekend filled with activities from live music to bake sales in all the Hill communities.

20 years ago - 2002
Three trucks protesting water exportation off the Hill were severely vandalized while parked overnight at the turnout where tanker trucks loaded water from Paul Black's wells.

15 years ago - 2007
Maria Loutzenhiser accepted the keys to her new Idyllwild home constructed by community volunteers and Habitat for Humanity. Maria's husband, Mark, a Forest

Service firefighter, had begun, but not finished, remodeling their home when he died in the Esperanza Fire in October 2006.

10 years ago - 2012
Max was announced as the elected mayor of Idyllwild and was duly sworn into office at a lavish ceremony at ARF. Vice mayor of Idyllwild was Hogan.

5 years ago - 2017
Cal Fire and Riverside County Fire Department announced full containment of the Manzanita Fire that started burning June 26. The fire eventually reached 6,309 acres.

1 year ago - 2021
The Idyllwild Community Garden had assembled noted experts in how to achieve success in growing edible gardens here in our mountain environment for a series of free classes throughout the summer.

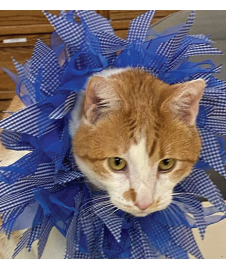

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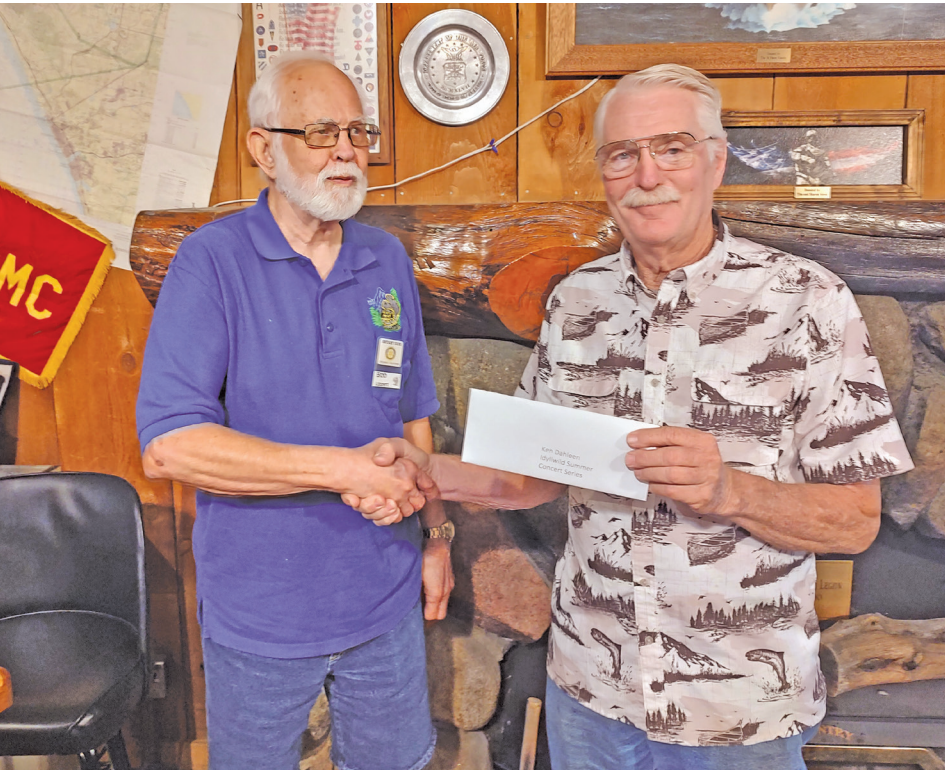
