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Supervisors expected to approve Ordinance 927.1 July 26

On Tuesday, July 26, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors will consider a new ordinance for regulating short-term rentals (STR) in the county's unincorporated areas. Draft Ordinance 927.1 (unless amended) will replace the current Ordinance 927, "Regulating Short Term Rentals," adopted in January 2016.

This draft ordinance is very similar to the draft presented to the Planning Commission on May 18. But it has grown to 21 pages of text compared to five pages for the current Ordinance 927. Download the PDF at <https://idyllwildtowncrier.com/dl/927.1.pdf>.

Many Hill residents have followed the process for revising Ordinance 927. Whether opposed to STRs or, possibly, an owner of one, most feel the version presented to the board has improved in the past year. Some would still prefer further modifications and others feel it has gone far enough, if not too far.

But when asked what one critical change he would like to see, Joel Feingold, Idyllwild resident, who has been deeply and intimately involved in the revision process, opined, "The one critical thing that I would ask the county supervisors to do to the latest draft presented to them by the planning board, who went through a tedious process over the last few years, is nothing, approve it as it now stands."

STR caps or limits

Nevertheless, one issue many residents consider to be of prime importance, will not be resolved at this board meeting. Setting a cap or limit on the number of STRs in a certain area is deferred. The Planning Department staff made this recommendation to the commission, which agreed when it approved the revised draft for the board's decision.

The planning staff felt there were too many issues affecting an adequate definition and implementation of a cap. Consequently, Planning Director John Hildebrand recommended more time to review and analyze this issue and promised workshops to further discuss the subject in detail.

Among the issues affecting caps that staff believes need further study and discussion are which areas of the county should have limits and how to draw a boundary for that area; what are the criteria for a limit, such as population, dwelling units or percentages and what is the data source; and how to manage the STR certificate process when an application falls within a designated area.

A cap or limit is necessary on the Hill, in the opinion of Woody Henderson, Pine Cove resident. He notes, "Idyllwild has about half of all STRs in unincorporated Riverside County. We have double the percentage of STRs to residents of surrounding communities. And that number continues to grow. In a town that had fire evacuation traffic issues before the STR influx, a 10 percent cap on STRs is completely reasonable."

Idyllwild resident Peter Szabadi is frustrated that the two years it took to develop a revision for the ordinance was not sufficient time to study and resolve the "cap" issue. More forcefully, he averred, "The surrounding communities have no problem making reasonable controls for the number of STRs to protect their constituents. They have found reasonable ways to set limits on the number of STRs."

Grand jury report highly critical of Auditor-Controller's Office

In May, the Riverside County Superior Court issued several grand jury reports. Every July, a new grand jury is convened and over the next 12 months, it may investigate and issue several reports. In fiscal year 2020-2021, it issued three reports, one of which was an assessment of the short-term rental ordinance. This year, the grand jury issued six reports.

One of the 2021-2022 reports addressed significant concerns with how the county's Auditor-Controller's Office (ACO) conducts its internal audits and how county officials respond to those audits.

The grand jury had 13 recommendations addressing 12 findings. The ACO, the board of supervisors and the county executive are to respond to the grand jury by the end of August.

"The Board, Executive Office, and ACO have known about the issues surrounding internal audits for many years. Now, they have the opportunity to demonstrate their leadership abilities by rectifying issues. The question is, 'Will they?'" was how the grand jury summarized its report.

This is not the first grand jury report critical of the ACO. In 2012, a previous grand jury reviewed the internal audit division. Many of the same conclusions were identified in the most recent investigation.

"The Riverside County Civil Grand Jury's report makes one thing very clear — we need to restore accountability in the Auditor-Controller's office," said Ben Benoit, Wildomar mayor and challenger for the ACO position in the November election. "The report lists a dozen issues that stem from failed leadership by the current Auditor-Controller."

Among the grand jury's findings were the "Follow-up" and "Change of Department Head" audits to meet the state's legal requirement for biennial audits of every department.

The grand jury felt the internal audit unit staff "... do not have the combined knowledge, skill and experience to perform their responsibilities as required ..." And they lack critical professional certifications and experience to conduct audits in specialized areas. One example was that none of the county internal auditors currently

FVWD selects Chrissie Teeling as new director

Following a fairly short Fern Valley Water District (FVWD) Board of Directors meeting Friday where Director Kevin Scott (calling in from Germany) was attending for the first time, the directors held a special meeting to interview three candidates for Walt Bonneau Jr.'s vacant seat. Scott replaced Richard Schnetzer. Both Bonneau and Schnetzer sold their Fern Valley homes and moved off the Hill.

General Manager Victor Jimenez's reported that customers consumed 882,272 cubic feet of water in May and June compared to 946,854 cubic feet in May and June 2021, down 6.82%.

Unaccounted-for water dropped from 21.7% between July 2020 and June 2021 to 14% between July 2021 and June 2022. Directors thanked Jimenez and staff for responding quickly to any reported leaks. In one instance, Jimenez said short-term rental owners were staying at the rental, saw a leak while out walking and reported it.

Director Jon Brown asked if all the customers' water meters have been replaced and Jimenez said they had.

have the qualification as a Certified Fraud Examiner.

Consequently, some high-risk areas have been missed, in the grand jury's opinion.

However, the county's incumbent Auditor-Controller Paul Angulo argued in an email to the Town Crier, "It must be also noted that not one of the Grand Jury interviewers were licensed CPAs, nor had any of them ever led a substantive government office with the kind of risk entailed in tracking and reporting on \$38 Billion in county cash flows and assets ... In short, the Grand Jury acted like a passenger on a commercial aircraft telling the pilot how to fly the jet through a thunderstorm."

The grand jury also was critical of how the ACO's completed audits were presented to the board of supervisors and monitored. For example, the completed audits lack a summary of the seriousness of the results, the potential consequences on the county and the time needed to correct problems, the grand jury believes.

The county also lacks the capability to follow up on audits or to oversee the various audit plans.

Also, the grand jury asserts that the other county agencies "... marginalize [the audits] and, in many cases, [they are] just ignored." The working relationships between the ACO and other departmental leaders are often "dysfunctional," according to the findings, which obstructs corrections and improvements.

"Many County and department leaders perceive the ACO department as hypocritical ... The appearance of the ACO's hypocrisy results in mistrust of the ACO," opined the grand jury. This can lead to inadequate departmental responses to audits.

For example, over a 40-month stretch ending in April 2022, county departments totally or partially concurred with 45 ACO recommendations in 35 different audits. During this period, there were 15 follow-up audits and the grand jury found that less than half the agreed-to recommendations were implemented or completed. And follow-up may occur two years or more after the original audit.

Some of the mistrust of the ACO comes from travel expenses, which seem unnecessary, the grand jury noted. For example, nearly \$90,000 for professional development courses on the East Coast were viewed as excessive "... when similar professional development opportunities were available locally for far less money," the report stated.

Benoit said, "For nearly a decade, the current Auditor-Controller has prioritized his own unnecessary expenditures, like trips to New York and Washington D.C., over much-needed training for his employees and hiring qualified staff."

The grand jury reviewed a Peer Review of the County's Internal Audit Division, which Santa Cruz County performed in 2019. This review found "results of the previous external quality review were not communicat-

ed to senior management and the Board of Supervisors," which may be contributing to the lack of response to the audits.

Angulo commented on the relationship between his staff and departmental leaders and the grand jury's specific suggestions to him. "... the Grand Jury wanted me to 'be more friendly' and to grade the county's departments A-F. I declined.

"They could not explain the logic behind this obvious dissonance, that is, wanting me to 'be more friendly' with departments heads, and then giving some of them a D grade or F grade," Angulo continued. "I report on the facts, plain and simple. It is up to the Board and the Executive Office to take it from there ... As a professional auditor I must keep an arm's length to avoid a conflict of interest — evidently a concept that the Grand Jury does not understand."

The grand jury also noted that Riverside County does not have an audit oversight committee, which adjacent counties have implemented. This, in the grand jury's opinion, may have resulted in a failure to review certain critical programs such as the Public Guardian and Information Technology.

The Public Guardian Department has been the center of the recent controversy over the county's treatment of the Turpin children. According to the grand jury, this department was last reviewed in 2014.

Contributing to the sparse number of audits and the skills of the staff is its small number and high turnover, the grand jury argued.

The ACO budget has decreased \$130,000 in nine years to the fiscal year 2021-22 level of \$1.475 million. During fiscal year 2011-2012, only seven internal auditor positions were filled. The number of internal auditors nearly

Local COVID Stats

As of Tuesday, July 19, Riverside County statistics showed 334 COVID cases have been reported in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area (three more than last week), with 325 recoveries (again, three more than last week) and seven deaths, leaving two active cases in our area, same as last week.

Anza reported 408 COVID cases with 399 recoveries and seven deaths, leaving two active cases in the Anza area, as well.

Idyllwild School, Hamilton Secondary and Hemet elementary schools all report no active cases among either students or staff. Hemet High reports no active cases among students, but one among staff.

No statistics are given for either Mountain Center, Garner Valley or for the ZIP Code 92561. The Town Crier is awaiting response from Riverside County Public Health as to COVID stats for these two areas.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, "Mandated COVID-19 reporting requirements omit at-home tests, and there are no standard processes for test takers or manufacturers to share results with appropriate health officials ... Therefore, with increased COVID-19 at-home test use, laboratory-based reporting systems might increasingly underreport the actual incidence of infection."

doubled to 13 the next fiscal year. Since fiscal year 2012-2013, the number of filled positions has fallen to nine.

San Bernardino County has 15 internal auditors, Orange and San Diego counties have 13. This is not a new concern. The grand jury acknowledged that since 1990, eight grand jury reports have identified this problem.

"The Auditor-Controller is the chief accounting and disbursement officer of Riverside County. I find it deeply disturbing and concerning that the current Auditor-Controller is recklessly spending taxpayer dollars and failing to meet the minimum requirements of the office," Benoit said about the grand jury report.

Basically, the grand jury gave the ACO and the county 18 months, until Jan. 1, 2024, to develop, revise or act upon its recommendations. Examples include establishing an Audit Oversight Committee, procedures to resolve disputed findings and a policy to indicate the seriousness of an identified risk.

The grand jury's recommendations were not limited to the ACO; the supervisors were advised to include internal audit findings in the review of departmental leaders' annual performance.

In summarizing his initial opinion of the report, Angulo wrote, "Sadly, the Grand Jury's report is nothing more than a political hit piece given it was published in May, intentionally a few days before the election when it was due much later on June 30th."

Changes or additions to 927
The new draft does incorporate two changes the commission recommended. The more substantive change addresses the issue of a “hosted stay.” During the Planning Commission’s final review, there was significant discussion about hosted versus unhosted facilities and whether unrelated multiple groups could be booked concurrently.

A “hosted” stay or site referred to an STR where either the owner or responsible operator were on-site overnight along with guests. The draft ordinance now defines hosted stay as “A Short Term Rental which is occupied by the Owner for the duration of the rental to a Responsible Guest(s).”

Later, when the ordinance limits the STR to one “Responsible Guest,” an exception is provided “for a Hosted Stay.” And the number of rooms is limited to five.

The initial reason for limiting bookings to single parties or groups was STRs are in residentially built structures. The building standards for residential facilities are less rigorous than the commercial, and stricter, codes for hotels and motels. Booking unrelated parties or groups seemed to be for facilities such as motels.

However, county counsel shared that the state code defines hotels and motels as offering more than six rooms for rent and occupancy. That was sufficient to convince the commission to allow facilities with an on-site host and five rooms or fewer to offer their occupancy to multiple groups concurrently.

STRs are defined as lodging or sleeping for less than 30 days, but at least two consecutive days and one night.

Section 5 lists the facilities that do not qualify as a potential STR, such as dormitory, bed-and-breakfast inn, hospital and rest home.

All property owners who wish to offer their homes or other facilities as an STR must obtain an STR certificate from the county. There will be an application fee (set in Ordinance 671) and an inspection of the site.

Off-street parking and noise monitors are required. One on-site parking space is required for every four occupants. On-site parking sites must

be within an approved driveway, garage or carport area. “Off-site parking is not permitted for Short Term Rentals,” pursuant to section 8(h).

Noise monitors will be installed both inside and outside of the facility. They must be capable of collecting and providing data to ensure compliance with county Ordinance 847, “Regulating Noise in Riverside County.”

And the county will determine the maximum number of permitted occupants. The principal guideline will be the California Building Standards Code. For most STRs, the criterion will be “the lesser of: two (2) persons per Bedroom plus an additional one (1) person in the Short Term Rental or ten (10) persons total,” according to Section 8(g)(1).

However, an exception to set the maximum number of renters to 16 can be obtained in two ways. One is to submit an application to the county Building and Safety Department demonstrating compliance with the state’s Building Standards Code.

The second means to obtain an occupancy limit of 16 is if the structure is located on a parcel of at least five acres and has at least five bedrooms as well as complying with county and state building codes.

Owners or their designated responsible operators must respond to complaints within 60 minutes and report to the county Planning Department within two days. Failure to meet these deadlines could result in a code violation

If the complaint involves “health and safety concerns, such as blocked streets, or excessive noise during quiet hours,” it may be made to the county’s 24-hour Code Enforcement phone number.

The outside signage, which must be visible from the street, has to have the following information: the STR certificate number, the name and phone number of the responsible operator, the maximum number of occupants, and Code Enforcement’s call center phone number.

The written notification for obtaining an STR certificate is required to be given to the greater of all property owners within 300 feet of the STR property line or, at least, 20 surrounding properties.

While not totally satisfied with the draft ordinance, Henderson, shared this thought with the Town Crier. “July 26 will be a special day for Idyllwild communities. At the Riverside County Supervisor Board meeting, we expect the most

recent version of 927.1 to be passed. A new version of 927 was proposed to solve some of the outsized issues created by the original ordinance and bring back some quality of life for residents that are most affected. We are expecting the final version of 927.1 to have some improvements to that end.”

Most of these proposed changes do limit and restrict some STR behavior to protect the ambiance of the neighborhood. But some people remain skeptical and believe that these changes are directed at the wrong target.

In the opinion of another Idyllwild resident, Jon Brown, “My biggest overall concern remains that the proposed revisions make part-time and owner-operated STRs in Idyllwild nearly impossible. This seems to be predicated on the presumption that professional management companies are better at neighbor relations than owner operators. Personally, I remain skeptical that that is true.”

Enforcement of ordinance
Enforcement is another issue that will not be settled at this supervisor’s meeting. Regardless of the ordinance’s language, enforcement requires county staff — Code Enforcement or sheriff’s deputies. Ultimately, that requires funding to hire the adequate number of staff. In November, the board did provide another \$770,00 for 10 more enforcement officers to work weekends and evenings. This also was included in the fiscal year 2022-2023 budget.

Yet, stricter enforcement is favored by many on both sides of the issue. Brown, an STR owner, wrote in an email to the Town Crier, “What all sides in Idyllwild agreed [what] we wanted was more enforcement and revoking permits from any habitual offenders.

“However, at the previous planning commission hearing they clearly admitted (paraphrasing from memory) ‘planning doesn’t have the power to do anything about enforcement, as that’s a budget issue for the BOS.’” Brown continued.

He concluded, “So, I’d like to see the county pause the regulation, see what comes of the new Deckard management contract, and additional code enforcement officer hours promised on nights and weekend. Wait and see if the county [is] now capable of effective enforcement without additional regulations unrelated to enforcement.”

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The steep climb in mortgage rates has significantly eroded home affordability and the Southern California housing market is finally shifting out of its insane pace. Google and Facebook have enormous economic and political power in society — especially over the news industry. Many ask if they have played a role in the misinformation that erodes our free press and plagues our democracy.

Google and Facebook have a duopoly of the dis-

tribution of digital news content, which drives people to their platforms where they make money. The platforms hoard critical data and use clever tactics, like reframing stories in rich previews, to keep users on their sites — siphoning off the advertising revenue that small and local publishers need and weakening their ability to be rewarded for their own content.

Google and Facebook generated \$4 million in U.S. advertising revenue every 15 minutes during the first quarter of 2022. That amount could fund hundreds of local journalists in every state in the country.

It's no wonder that, despite record news consumption, local newspapers across the country have seen diminished revenues — leading many to lay off journalists or go out of business. Local newspapers simply can't compete with these national platforms, Google and Facebook. The imbalance of power between these platforms and local newspapers — let alone any single local paper — is so vast that newspapers cannot negotiate the exploitation of news. But antitrust laws shield Google and Facebook from the possibility of news publishers working together to demand better terms.

No company should have this much control over the news. Congress must take action to curb undue

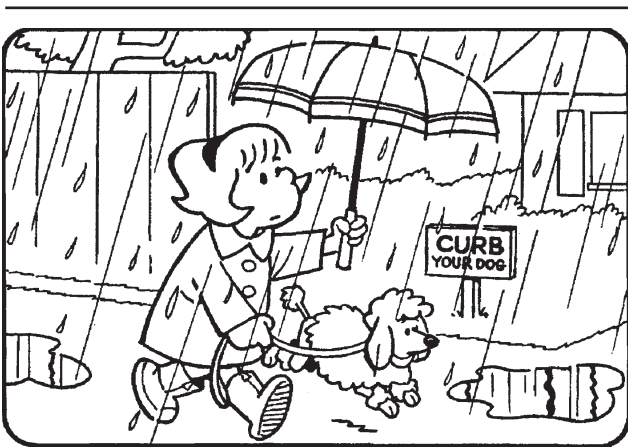
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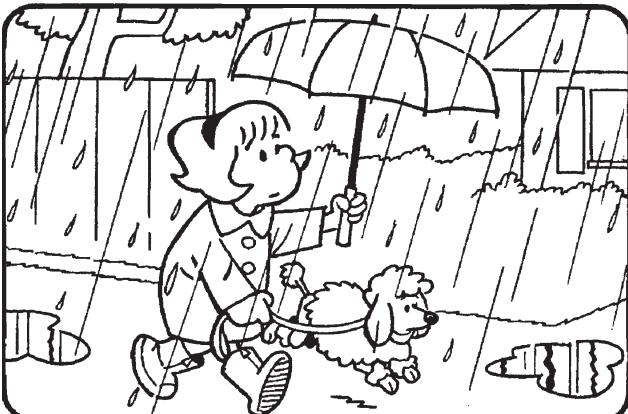

Swing City II this week; The Ghost Notes up next

Idyllwild's Summer Concert Series continues Thursday, July 21, with headliner Frank DiSalvo's Swing City II. The Toasted Clovers will get the music started at 6:15 p.m. DiSalvo has been a regular at these series, and this year, Swing City will bring a tribute to Earth Wind and Fire, Chicago, and Blood Sweat and Tears.

DiSalvo is an all-around musician at equal ease fronting his great Sinatra tribute band (12 years and counting at the Indian Wells Resort) or a straight-ahead rock and roll show, and has chops as a singer and guitarist. Swing City usually appears as a full-sounding, eight-piece show/dance band. Helping DiSalvo out with the high notes will be Terri Olsen. A veteran of Broadway and the Palm Springs Follies, she is the featured vocalist with her band The Perfect Blend. Anyone who has caught one of her shows at an exclusive night spot in "the desert" knows she puts everything she's got into a song.

DiSalvo's story is a long one. It started with family listening to recordings by the great crooners, dabbling in uke, clarinet and accordion, then came the British Invasion. A friend who owed his dad some money "worked off" the debt by giving young DiSalvo a few guitar lessons, and soon he and an uncle were out entertaining. Later, he discovered Clapton and Hendrix and all the rest, and as a young buck became known as one of the top guitarists in his hometown, Santa Cruz.

He paid his dues and got real professional experience fronting top 40 bands, then began studying jazz. During the '80s he was frequently on the road — Reno, Tahoe, Vegas. For a while he backed up an Engelbert Humperdink style singer. He also led an all-Italian band in San Jose. He played it all, but still loved swing and jazz.

He thought about settling down. He opened up music stores around Redding. He taught and played, and music took him and his bands to Florida, Germany, Indonesia and Russia. Finally, another musician asked

him to start a swing band, what would become the first Swing City. Then in 2009, a friend got the idea to play up his physical and sonic resemblance to another famous Frank, and so began the Sinatra tribute. After three years he decided to "take the plunge"; he rented a condo in La Quinta and worked the angles to "find a gig" in the desert. Within a week he was offered a contract at the Indian Wells Resort, where he continues a busy schedule. As if all this is not enough, he also is a talented luthier (guitar maker) and has been putting fine instruments in players' hands since 1966.

Getting things started will be Idyllwild's latest Irish sensations, the Toasted Clovers. They are an "offshoot" trio of St. Christopher's Bazooka, made up of the versatile Sam Kesler on banjo and vocals, and Idyllwild legends John King and Steve D. Sam. They have performed together all over the Hill, have headlined celtic festivals, including the most recent Idyllwild Celtic Festival, and have been featured performers at Renaissance Faires throughout the country. They offer a blend of Irish traditional tunes, drinking songs, toasts and session music paired with some "rip-roarin'" solos, and "toe tappin'" tunes.

This will be the third year for the Summer Concert Series at the new Butterfield Amphitheater. Before Idyllwild had this venue the concerts were held wherever "the board" could make it happen. The first few happened on the land now occupied by the Village Centre shops, where the gazebo stands.

Summer Concert Board Vice President Pete Holzman filled in the rest of the chronology: "After the empty lot, we moved to the State Park in that grassy field, trying a few different configurations. These were the years when folks really started dancing, and there would be a huge dust cloud raised. One year there was a broken ankle due to the uneven ground, so the following year we tried a portable dance floor, but that wasn't so great either.

"After just a few years, the park said we could not return due to liability and we were in a quandary as to where to go. The current site of the new recreation cen-

ter was the answer. (Where the parking lots are now). There was a large concrete area initially used as a tennis court and we finally had a professional, multi-tiered stage. This was set up at one end of the concrete. Logistics have always been an issue, mainly power, but we were able to get a feed with enough power to add lights, so folks didn't have to stumble around in the dark after or during the concert."

Coming up next week (July 28) will be The Ghost Notes, Mike Hammon's Grateful Dead tribute band, so get your tie-dyes ready and watch out for dancing bears. Opening will be Sandii Castleberry and fiddler Dan Sankey with special guest, Robert Hewitt on the rope drum. They will be bringing the bluegrass and Celtic tunes.

The Summer Concert Series started in 2000, the brainchild of bandleader and Idyllwild resident Ken Dahleen, whose crew provides the sound and lighting necessary for a professionally produced concert series.

Holzman reminds us: "Even though these are free concerts, we do ask for donations, both from businesses and individuals ... we pass the hat at the concerts and those that can contribute do so. So far we have met our budgets every year, sometimes by the skin of our teeth." This year's budget is over \$34,000, and the fundraising is just getting started.
