Funding available to harden homes

The Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council (MCFSC) is accepting applications from property owners for home hardening. FEMA-4569-DR-CA, September 2020 California Wildfires, Cal OES PJ0507, Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council Home Hardening and Defensible Space Project is funding the program.

The grant provides in excess of \$2,000,000 worth of funds to be used to reimburse local homeowners for home hardening and defensible space projects to help mitigate the hazards increased fire frequency and the ember cast created by fire pose.



The program will be conducted in two phases:

Phase I is effective immediately and through January 2023. It comprises outreach, education, accepting applications from homeowners, project/site assessments, reviews for program suitability, verification of defensible space compliance in advance of home hard- By Stephanie Yost ening, and vetting and onboarding of licensed contrac- IDYLLWILD COMMUNITY CENTER PRESIDENT

All eligible homeowners with qualified projects selected for participation in the program will receive notification at the conclusion of Phase I.

Phase II is effective February 2023 through June 2025. It is comprised of continued education and outreach, environmental and historical surveys, project implementation, completion, verification and close

Some home hardening retrofit activities that may be applied to structures include:

• Wood shingle roof replacement with fire-resistant Class A roof material.

 Install non-combustible corrosion resistant metal gutter covers.

 Cover chimney and stovepipe outlets with noncombustible corrosion-resistant metal mesh screen (spark arrestor), with 3/8-inch to 1/2-inch openings.

• Cover all vent openings with 1/16-inch to 1/8inch noncombustible corrosion resistant metal mesh screens

• Inspect exterior siding for dry rot, gaps, cracks and warping. Caulk or plug gaps greater than 1/16inch in siding and replace any damaged boards, including those with dry rot.

• Replace windows with multi-paned windows with at least one pane of tempered glass.

 Replace siding or deck with compliant noncombustible, ignition-resistant, or other materials approved by the Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM).

Eligible homeowners with qualified projects selected for participation in the program will be reimbursed 75% of the approved contracted project costs in two disbursements: 65% upon receipt and approval of itemized invoices MCFSC $\hat{r}eceives$ from the homeowner at the completion of the project, and 10% upon completion and close out of the grant program after June

County supervisors visit Idyllwild

Riverside County Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington and Fourth District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez, as well as several members of their respective staffs, paid a visit to the Hill Tuesday, July 19.

The purpose was for Washington to introduce Perez to the Idyllwild area in preparation for the communities' switch from inclusion in the 3rd District to the 4th District. The change, a result of Riverside County district boundaries being redrawn based on 2021 census population count and other factors set by the state and federal law, goes into effect January 2023.

The supervisors' visit lasted from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The morning stops, led by Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) President Stephanie Yost and Secretary Terry Shirley, started at Idy Park, included a quick tour of downtown Idyllwild with a focus on the Historic Preservation District (HPD) a visit to Idyllwild Regional Park, a drive up through Fern Valley to Humber Park, a brief stop at ICC's skatepark, dog park and pickleball courts (located at Idyllwild Pines), a visit to the Idyllwild Community Playground and the Butterfield Amphitheater, and a tour of historic Town Hall.

Antone "Tony" Pierucci, bureau chief of Planning, Development and Interpretation for Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District, provided information for the tour stops through HPD and Idyllwild Regional Park, with the help of Shirley, who also is the HPD chair, and Idyllwild Regional Park Ranger Supervisor Anthony Miller.


As the morning progressed, Yost and Shirley gave a general overview of Hill communities as well as various local concerns, such as short-term rentals, snow play traffic and trash problems, complaints about airplane flyovers, recent community growth during the pandemic, and the benefits and challenges of off-Hill visitors and tourism.

Yost and Shirley also provided information about ICC's events and programs (such as the Tree Lighting Festival, Halloween Carnival, Easter Egg Hunt and Summer Concert Series, ICC's low-cost child care programs, Feeding America food distributions, the Sunday Farmers Market, and youth and adult recreation opportunities), as well as about many of the services and programs other local organizations provide, including Idyllwild Rotary, Idyllwild Soroptimists, Mountain Communities Mutual Aid, Art Alliance of Idyllwild, Mountain Disaster Preparedness and Mountain Community Patrol.

Following a quick lunch at Idyllwild Brewpub, the supervisors and their staffs spent the remainder of their time visiting with Chief Mark LaMont at the Idyllwild Fire Station and the Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council staff.

Washington and Perez said the visit was just the beginning to their offices' mutual participation in the transition of the Hill communities from the 3rd District to the 4th District, and they expressed enthusiasm for returning to the Hill very soon for the soon-to-be-announced ground-breaking of ICC's new Community Center building next to Idyllwild Community Playground in or around late August of this year.

O'Dell Tucker: Eastern mountaineer manages western summit

West Virginia University graduate O'Dell Tucker is the acting ranger for the San Jacinto Ranger District (SJRD). Tucker also is the public services staff officer for the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF)

Tucker's tenure will end in Oc- Acting District Ranger tober, when Marc Stamer, former O'Dell Tucker. Mountaintop District Ranger, re-

Idyllwild as a permanent replacement for Julie Hall, who left for the Inyo National Forest in March. Meanwhile, Tucker is the current district ranger and he has

been at the SBNF since 2017. He has already earned the prestigious Leading in Public Service Environment Award for his efforts to expedite clearing and approving various special use permits. His team was composed of headquarters staff and private sector. Leading a team from various organizations, they formed partnerships that reduced a significant backlog of permit inspections and renewals. His team also collected more than half a million dollars in owed fees and fines. As the SBNF public services staff officer, Tucker is in-

volved in many forest programs, including staff oversight for forest-wide heritage, lands, recreation and special uses pro-

Tucker also has been a district ranger on the San Gabriel District of the Angeles National Forest, which is one of the major reasons he is here. Stamer, on another assignment, could not begin his tenure in June.

"I have high respect for Marc; we've worked together a long time," he noted.

"The forest supervisor needed someone who could step in," Tucker explained, "someone who knows how to be a district ranger, knows Southern California, and knows the San Bernardino Forest.

"For the last box, I've been an active member of the forest leadership. In January 2023, I'll finish my sixth year here,"

When asked if anything in the SJRD has surprised him since starting this assignment in the middle of June, Tucker said, "No surprises, nothing at all."

Even the ecosystems on the San Jacinto and San Bernardino mountains seem similar, Tucker observed. "There's not much difference. There's some but it's not huge. San Jacinto is drier. The Front County and Mountaintop districts have a slightly different climate.

While district ranger, Tucker plans to continue to build and improve the working relationships between the district and third parties. "I hope to make some new ones and make the current ones stronger," he said. "I want to keep things moving."

For example, when asked about the status of the Wild and Scenic proposals involving the South Fork of the San Jacinto River, Tucker replied, "That next step, which we're in the process of completing, is drafting responses to the comments on

Born and raised in Virginia, Tucker graduated from West Virginia University. He began his national forest career in 2002

Local COVID Stats

The currently predominant Omicron variant in the U.S. is BA.5, which appears to be more transmissible than previous variants, while seemingly resulting in somewhat milder symptoms. The Centers for Disease Control currently rates Riverside County as a "High Community Level," which takes into consideration hospital admissions, beds being used and the number of new COVID-19 cases in the county.

As of Tuesday, July 26, the county stats showed 337 total COVID cases have been reported in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area (three more than last week), with 327 recoveries (again, three more than last week) and seven deaths, leaving three active cases in our area — one more than last week.

Anza reported 412 COVID cases with 399 recoveries and seven deaths, leaving six active cases in the Anza area — three times as many as last week.

Idyllwild School, Hamilton Elementary and Hamilton Secondary all report no currently active cases among either students or staff, while Hemet High reports no active cases among students, but one among staff — all the same as last

The Town Crier inquired as to why Riverside County Public Health does not report COVID statistics for Mountain Center and Garner Valley. Senior Public Information Specialist Jose Arballo, Jr. of Riverside University Health System Public-Health informed that the county is not reporting cases, recoveries and deaths for communities with populations fewer

on the Allegheny National Forest. He started as a forest technician. Within a few years, he was the National Environmental Policy Act coordinator at the Monongahela National Forest. ergy and interest in helping has already drawn her into several local groups, such as food distribution and church.

Now she has been attracted to the water district and its human-friendly contrast with many larger and urban organizations — public or private.

After a whirlwind three-day search, they bought their home last fall and visited nearly every weekend, but a water bill caught Teeling's attention. Curious to understand, she asked about a comparison with a neighbor. For weekenders, she discovered their bill was about double the full-time neighbor's bill.

Needing an explanation, Teeling called the district office, which resulted in her first surprise — another human answered. There was no robotic message telling her to push "1, if"

'Jessica [Priefer, FVWD assistant general manager] was so helpful explaining the bill and suggesting plumbers to fix the problem. I was truly impressed," Teeling said, describing her initial contact with the water district.

Now here a month, Teeling learned of the board vacancy and thought filling the position would be "... a way to get to

Born in Encino, Teeling grew up in Newbury Park. She graduated from Long Beach State University. While planning a teaching career, she chose to marry and have a family. With their two sons, the Teelings have been longtime San Diego residents.

gan discussing retirement and the possibility of finding a home elsewhere than San Diego. This was a surprise to her and not necessarily welcome at first. But after discussions, she opened to the idea that San Diego was not a forever home and they began looking for locations.

Her criteria were to stay in California and be close to family. Big Bear, Arrowhead and other towns were not satisfying. Eventually, a friend suggested Idyllwild. Although the Teelings had heard of Idyllwild, she admitted they had never been

But in early 2021, they made their first visit.

"I loved it! Although I had never been here before, immediately I clearly could picture myself here," she said enthusiastically. "And we kept coming on weekends." By October 2021, they were homeowners and by spring 2022, the Teelings were

Teeling replaces former director Walter Bonneau Jr., who was appointed in October 2019 to replace former Director Trisha Clark who moved away, which is what Bonneau has done. Clark's term was to expire in December 2023. So, Teeling will be up for reelection next year.



Ordinance 927.1

DEAR EDITOR:

I have two small questions about the recent shortterm rentals (STR) article. The first has to do with "All property owners who wish to offer their homes or other facility as an STR must obtain an STR certificate from the county."



Setting a cap on STRs also is an ongoing negotiation: 10% seems right to me. So why would even more STR permits even be offered in Idyllwild at this time?

My second small question is about STRs and noise. Visitors think they are "out in the wilderness," but Idyllwild is a populated community. The article talks about "noise during quiet hours." I have no idea what 'quiet hours" even means.

When I first came to Idyllwild in 1978, my favorite thing was the peace and quiet — hearing the birds, the crickets, the wind through the forest. When my wife Iris

It has been estimated there are about 600 STRs or more on the Hill. So, hypothetically, three cars per 600 and I were finally able to leave "the big city" and move to our home in Idyllwild, we truly loved the quiet.

In the town center, there is music which is totally "right" in the town center. Now we have a local STR and the renters leave their dogs indoors in a strange house or outdoors in a strange yard. So, of course, they bark continuously.

If STR renters want to bring pets, they should be required to bring their dogs with them when they leave the rental, whatever "quiet hours" means. And boom boxes, radios, etc. should not be played outdoors at all and if played indoors, they should not disturb the neighbors, whatever "quiet hours" means. In other words, music should be played at a volume that cannot be heard outside the rental.

I personally do not want to have to try to figure out how to contact the STR owner/manager; call and most likely get a voice mail and leave a complaint that will probably go unanswered. I just want to continue our peace and quiet in Idyllwild.

The STR owners/managers are responsible for the parking, trash, snow, outdoor cooking and fire danger, noise and all other problems their STR investments create. The neighbors who live near the STRs should not have to spend their time policing these investments.

The STR owners/managers should have to provide 24/7 patrolling and checking on every single STR, so the neighbors do not have to waste their time with complaining about these businesses in their (once residential) neighborhood. Rivco has it set up now so that the neighbors are responsible for reporting problems and have to waste their time trying to get through to "somebody" and deal with trying to have the owner/manager "punished."

Ordinance 927.1 disappointment

DEAR EDITOR:

It was with great disappointment that I read the article in last week's TC regarding "Supervisors expected to approve Ordinance 927.1 July 26." Around June 5, I sent a letter to each one of the members of the Planning Commission about the fire issues that need to be considered for Idyllwild and the surrounding areas, and why we need a cap on the number of STRs in order to protect residents and visitors. I invited them all to come up here and observe how all streets on the Hill, including Pine Cove and Fern Valley, end up on Highway 243. I never heard one word from any of them.

All roads up here funnel out to 243, a two-lane, very winding road. If a fire blocked the 243 beyond Pine Cove, all areas must exit the Hill on this one road, until it ends in Mountain Center, and splits off at Highway 74, descending either to Hemet or to the desert.

If a fire should block 243 toward Mountain Center, all people trying to evacuate the area would have to go up through Pine Cove, where 243 is also two lanes and winding all the way down to Banning.

On a normal busy weekend, it would be difficult for residents and visitors to evacuate safely, even if 243 is open in both directions. So, imagine a few hundred STRs each having three cars. That's four people per car,

rentals would be 1,800 more cars trying to evacuate on

Mr. Woody Henderson did mention the fire-evacuation issue; I applaud him for that. I also appreciate Peter Szabadi stressing the need for caps on the number of STRs allowed on the Hill, and wondering why it is taking so long to resolve this critical issue.

Other fire issues include the use of barbecues at STRs. I don't think even propane barbecues should be allowed because there is still a flame involved.

I also don't think indoor fireplaces should be available for use at STRs. There is a certain amount of "science" involved in keeping an indoor fire burning properly and safely. Some woods have resins that heat up, pop and can throw sparks. Log fires have to be stoked so the wood settles, and won't roll out of the fireplace. If a fire screen is not used properly, a fire could easily start.

Chimneys must be maintained. There should also be a special place for cigarette smoking, on a concrete surface, with ashtrays containing sand so there is no chance of cigarette butts smoldering and being blown by a

We locals are not just concerned about ourselves in visitors and STR renters who could suffer the consequences of a fire on the Hill. We all need to be able to evacuate safely. Whenever we hear a siren, or a helicopter, we get anxious. Whenever the wind gets blustery, we get anxious.

We always have important items within reach in case we have to evacuate. We live with the threat of fire, unless there is a good snow pack, or there has been a lot

Covered California premiums may increase

Last week, Covered California (CC) announced that its premiums for 2023 may increase 6% in January. About 1.7 million Californians get health insurance through the CC marketplace.

A variety of reasons are contributing to the increase, including the possibility that the American Rescue Plan (ARP) may be allowed to expire. If Congress does approve its extension, the possible increase may be reduced to 5%.

Earlier this month, a study of 72 health plans in 13 states that have submitted their proposed 2023 premiums indicated that the median proposed increase for next year is currently 10% (The Peterson Center on Healthcare and Kaiser Family Foundation [KFF], July

"Covered California's competitive marketplace continues to hold the line on rates that are well below the national average, keeping coverage within reach and giving Californians new choices," said Jessica Altman, CC executive.

While below the other states, CC's planned increase is well above increases in recent years. In both 2019 and 2020, the actual increase was less than 1% and last year it was 1.8%.

Several reasons have coalesced to produce this dramatic increase. "Health cost trends" that are simply insurers' payments to providers such as physicians and hospitals, and to pharmaceutical companies, have increased.

Also, as people adjusted to the presence of COVID-19 in their environments and lives, they are venturing out more often. This includes more frequent visits to doctors' offices, according to the Peterson Center and KFF study.

"After more than two years of lower-than-normal utilization rates, Covered California's carriers are seeing medical trends return to pre-pandemic levels, accounting for an average of 4 percentage points," according to the CC press release.

Of the 72 plans in the study, only four were proposing increases of less than 5% and eight were requesting increases of 20% or more.

IWD concerned about wastewater treatment plant progress

With General Manager Leo Havener absent, the Idyllwild Water District (IWD) directors' monthly meeting finished up in about a half-hour Wednesday, July

A special meeting had been called for Tuesday, July 12, to discuss the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) progress but was canceled because of illnesses.

Instead, Director Peter Szabadi, at the July 20 meeting, told the other four directors that progress on replacing the WWTP was not sufficient and that's why the special meeting that was canceled was called.

In Havener's report, he wrote that the map for the proposed WWTP project was received and that property negotiations with Idyllwild Arts Foundation (IAF) is the next step. Last year, he told the board that IAF is cooperating on selling some of its property to the district to expand the facility.

Szabadi said Havener is working on remedying the WWTP progress issues. In the meantime, he asked each director to write down questions they would like answered about the WWTP progress. President Dr. Charles Schelly named some of his questions, including,

"Why did the costs go up?" The directors discussed making every employee atwill, meaning they can be fired at the will of a supervisor. However, Szabadi said some employees had been hired under contracts. "We can't change that on certain employees," he said.

Schelly asked that at each meeting, the board review a district policy "to keep us abreast of what our policies

In response to a question from the audience, Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman said IWD has one of the cheapest connection fees on the Hill.

The connection fee for a 1-inch meter is \$6,954. When asked later if this includes the installation fee and capitalization charge, Shouman wrote, "It is including the capital asset cost not the installation fee. The installation fee varies. The customer makes a deposit for the installation fee for \$2,000 and it depends on how big or the small of the job is for installation fee."

In comparison, Pine Cove Water District charges \$14,042 for a 1-inch meter connection and installation is not included. Basic installation starts at \$740.

Fern Valley Water District charges \$5,790 for a 1-inch meter plus \$790 for installation and \$5,000 for capitaliza-

All the districts also offer ¾-inch meters, as well as

try, they vary greatly within California. While the statewide average is 6%, the range is from more than 11% in Mono, Inyo and Imperial counties and 22 other northern California counties, to no change in Fresno, Kings and Madera counties.

For Riverside and San Bernardino counties, the average increase will be 6.7%, slightly lower than Orange County and slightly greater than San Diego County. CC also had news about its health insurance carriers.

A 13th carrier, Aetna CVS Health, has joined the program and will begin offering coverage in the Sacramento area. Also, Anthem Blue Cross is the second carrier, along with Blue Shield of California, to offer full statewide coverage

Now all Californians will have a choice of two plans and, according to CC. 93% will have a choice of three plans and 81% will have the option of choosing from among four plans.

Independent of CC's goals and plans is Congress' action on whether to extend the American Rescue Plan, which provides subsidies for health insurance premiums, or let it expire. If it is not renewed, CC estimates that "... would raise costs for enrollees, including doubling premiums on average for 1 million low-income Californians, and may lead up to 220,000 people to drop their health coverage." ARP funds have probably low-

ered monthly premiums by 20% according to CC.

"The biggest factor impacting what our consumers will pay for coverage in 2023 is whether Congress extends the enhanced subsidies, or not," Altman predicts. "At a time when many people are already facing increased economic pressures, some Californians may make the difficult choice of becoming uninsured in absence of the financial help that the American Rescue Plan provides," Altman continued.

Already, Secretary of Health and Human Services Xavier Beccera has extended to Oct. 13 the public health emergency order regarding COVID-19. This prevents the state from dropping anyone's Medi-Cal coverage.

Grateful Dead tribute band next in concert series

The Idyllwild Summer Concert Series continues this Thursday night, July 28, with a tribute to the Grateful Dead from the Coachella Valley's Ghost Notes. Sandii Castleberry will open the evening at 6:15 p.m. The concert is free to all and takes place at the Butterfield Amphitheater.

As always, professional sound and light production is courtesy of "Mr. Summer Concert" Ken Dahleen and his crew. This year's series is dedicated to the memory of Idyllwild friend and philanthropist in chief, Doug Austin, who died last year at age 74.

While Mike Hammons' Ghost Notes is sometimes described as a "Grateful Dead tribute band," and while that is not inaccurate, lead guitarist Damian Lautiero describes it more broadly as an "improvisational rock 'n' roll band specializing in the music of the Grateful Dead," so that leaves some room for the individuality and chemistry of five well-rounded musicians to create something new every

In addition to Hammons on bass and vocals and Lautiero on guitar and vocals, the band includes Bobby Furgo on keyboards and violin, Robert Peterson on drums and Amy Caddle on percussion. The two percussionists allow the kit drums that familiar freedom deadheads will recognize, with a rolling swing as they reinforce and counter each other.

The Crier talked with Hammons and Lautiero contributed, too.

TC: "A lot of tribute bands copy a recorded arrangement and work at playing just like a famous band, maybe repeating the same solos every night. What you are doing is not like

MH: "You nailed it, that's why we're interested in it. The band's theory is: The Grateful Dead was built on improvisational music. Phil Lesh was amazing. We embrace what they did, and we play their music in the moment, 2022. Everything we ever learned from them, and everything we've learned from other kinds of music [goes into what we play] ... The intrigue is, they go onstage ... and then improv. We

are not re-creating a show from some year.

"The Grateful Dead represent jam band music, a genre all its own. It's in the spirit of when you go to hear a jazz guy play "Autumn Leaves" at one club and then go and hear another guy in another club, and then travel to LA or Chicago and hear another band... they all play it differently, they all play the outline of the song, but they play what they feel in the moment, within the context, within that outline. It's not just a jazz philosophy; you hear a guy play "Sweet Home Chicago" in one bar, then hear another guy in another

"We don't play the same notes twice, we change the set, we change the way we play the songs ... That's what keeps us interested ... along with the friendship. All of us guys have been friends over 30 years; part of the magic of the band is with the friendship. Musically, everyone has put their time in, but there is a chemistry that is based on friendship."

Lautiero points out the broad influences that shaped the Dead, and the Ghost Notes: "The music of the Grateful Dead celebrates so many purely American genres of music ranging from Folk Americana, bluegrass, jazz, blues, country, and rock and roll ... all genres of music we love and are inspired by."

The group is well studied. Hammons studied the bass at Musicians Institute and plays the electric bass and upright bass. Other members Furgo and Caddle have music degrees, in San Diego. He makes his living playing bluegrass and and drummer Peterson stuck it out to get a master's. Hammons describes Lautiero as someone who made his bones on

the road, "a heavy duty touring rock guitarist."

The band sometimes includes acoustic sets, with Hammons breaking out the "double bass."

TC: "Thear you do some work on the upright bass?"

MH: "Absolutely, [especially for] music performed when there was only upright, old blues, old country, old jazz; some of my heroes are Willie Dixon [bass-playing song writer and producer for Howlin' Wolf, Muddy Waters and Etta James] and Ron Carter [jazz bassist with Miles Davis, among many.] I always say at the end of the day I'm a rock and roller but I've studied many styles of music; that's why I'm enjoying playing the stand up."

On their wide-ranging influences and spirit of improv Lautiero writes, "As musicians, we love the ability to explore and expand instrumentally, and this music naturally lends [itself] to wide-open jams and improvisations. The band members each have extensive and eclectic musical backgrounds that are very diverse. When mixed together it creates something sonically interesting and unique. We really enjoy each other's company as people first and foremost, which then really lends to us being able to explore arrangements and push each other musically."

Hammons and Lautiero are looking forward to returning to Idyllwild and the Butterfield.

MH: "We love it. Outdoors in the forest, the community was so supportive last year. We have good friends with cabinsup there."

TC: "You all gonna stay awhile?"

MH: "Yeah, there's a group of us, multiple camp sites

multiple cabins, we have a community of friends." TC: "Kind of like the Dead?"

MH: "Yeah."

Lautiero added one more shoutout to the man without whom this all would not be possible: "The summer concert series was an absolute blast for us to play last year. We are so thankful to Ken Dahleen for inviting us. It is such a beautiful venue, just nestled between the pines under the stars. Our style of music really lends [itself] to the surroundings, and it was beautiful to see so many people up and dancing the night away. We have a really loyal and supportive collection of fans that travel from all over to partake in our shows. We are really lucky to have such a supportive community. The Deadhead community is magical in that way. The shared love for the music is a special bond. That is where the magic is, in the connection with the audience, when everything is moving as one. We are really looking forward to doing it again."

Castleberry, as warmup, is joined by fiddler Dan Sankey, and a special appearance by Robert Hewitt on the rope drum. They will be playing bluegrass and Celtic tunes.

Castleberry said about the friends joining her onstage, "... Sankey is a part-time Pine Cove resident who also lives country music and teaches guitar, mandolin, violin and banjo. I have known him for years and was really excited when I

learned he and his wife Virginia had bought a place up here, and to have his musical talents available up here on the Hill.

"We will be featuring Robert on five Celtic tunes that sound great with the rope tension drum. The rope tension drum is one of the oldest types of snare drums. It was and is a marshal instrument used to signal orders and maneuvers to military forces on the battlefield and on the march. Traditionally [it is] made of wood with animal skin heads and gut snares, then held together, tightened and tuned with rope. Besides the Celtic tunes, we will be playing a few bluegrass traditional tunes and throw in a couple of country music crowd pleasers."

The Summer Concert Series has been going strong since its inception in 2000. It has generated quite a bit of lore, and everyone involved has (at least) a few stories to tell. Castleberry shared one of hers: "On July 28, 2004, I was the summer concert opener with another fiddle player, Paul McIntire. The concert was at the San Jacinto State Park, and it was my birthday. Eighteen years later, I'm the concert opener once again with a fiddle player, and it's on my birthday! After we are finished playing, we'll enjoy the Ghost Notes and I'll get to celebrate my birthday Idyllwild style."

Reminding us of this year's dedicatee, Castleberry added, "It also means a lot to me to get to play in honor of our friend, Doug Austin. Doug and I became close friends because both of our first spouses were undergoing treatment for cancer at UCLA Medical Center at the same time. We stayed at the same hotel as the Austins in Westwood, and we hung out together. I lost my first husband Ron in Decer ber of 2008, and Doug lost Mary a few months later. We both were in the same grief group and worked through it. I was so happy when he took me aside and said he was going to take Pat [soon to be Austin] on a date. She gave him so much happiness. I miss Doug so much and will feel his spirit with us when I take to the stage and play that first note on July 28."

Next week, Aug. 4, the series will welcome Darryl Reed's Lynyrd Skynyrd and Frynds. There will be no opening act that night and the music begins at 7 p.m.

These are free concerts, funded completely by donations, both from businesses and individuals. The "hat" is passed at the event, and those who can are invited to give to keep this wonderful tradition alive.
