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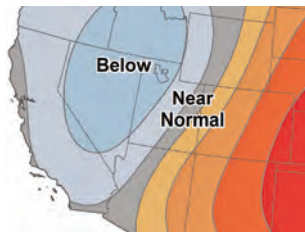

Supervisors to consider 45-day moratorium on STR certificates

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors will consider a 45-day moratorium on issue new Short-term Rental (STR) Certificates in Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Mountain Center and the Temecula Valley Wine Country Policy Area.

The moratorium specifically will not prohibit using existing approved STRs in these areas or renewing certificates for properties that already have an approved certificate.

The action will be in the form of an urgency ordinance (449.251) and will require, at least, four of the five supervisors to approve it.

The "urgency" has come about because of the large increase in STR certificate applications since the grand jury report on STRs in June 2021. The accompanying background paper says that prior to the grand jury report, the county received an average of eight new STR applications a month. In the month following the report's release, the county received 48 new STR applications. Since then, the Planning Commission has held two hearings on the proposed new ordinance and at the board meeting last month, which also included this subject, the average of new applications had increased to 54 monthly.

According to the county's Transportation and Land Management staff, 62% of the current STR applications are for properties in these areas. And nearly 12% of housing in these areas is available for STRs. The density of STRs in these areas far exceeds any other neighborhood in the unincorporated areas of Riverside County.

Consequently, the board wants to allow its staff time to "... consider density control measures and potential caps, as recommended by the Planning Commission for both of these unique areas."

The staff is proposing a 45-day period to ensure there are no negative effects on the residential neighborhoods, no increased threat to public safety and no possible conflict with new policies.

If four supervisors agree, the ordinance will take effect immediately and expire Friday, Oct. 28.

While the proposed moratorium would only apply to areas within the current District 3, Supervisor Chuck Washington's Chief of Staff Joe Pradetto said in an email that the county staff developed it.

"We support the action but, due to the Brown Act, don't know about the other supervisors," wrote Pradetto. Following the redistricting, the Hill areas will be part of District 4 in December. At the time of publication, neither Supervisor Manuel Perez nor his staff has responded to a request for comment from the Town Crier.

The proposed ordinance acknowledges that STRs have been available in the county for a long time and offer benefits, by expanding the number and type of lodging facilities. However, their rapid, extreme growth in these neighborhoods has caused health and safety concerns, such as noise, garbage and parking.

The threat and danger of fires in the three Hill areas is one of the concerns the staff hopes to address. This includes evacuation procedures and fire safety.

Mountain communities survive Fairview Fire

A semi-post-COVID week in the San Jacinto Mountains came and went with no significant events other than the usual weekly meetings, book clubs and spiritual events followed by Labor Day weekend barbecues, music and art shows.

But before the three-day weekend was completely over, at 3:37 p.m. Monday, Labor Day, a wildfire was reported in Valle Vista, an unincorporated area outside of Hemet just below the mountains on Fairview Avenue at Bautista Road.

By 10 p.m., the fire was at 2,000 acres, 5% contained and had taken two civilian lives and injured one other who were trying to escape in a car from their Avery Canyon Road property.

An Incident Command Center (ICC) formed quickly and Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire brought in both ground and air resources to fight the quickly moving blaze.

But high-record temperatures hampered efforts as fingers of flames spread toward not only Hemet, but Sage, Anza, Mountain Center and Temecula.

Evacuation orders (mandatory) and warnings were set in place and Hemet Unified School District canceled all school classes. This would be the case for the rest of the week as the fire continued to spread into thousands of acres, some of which had not burned in decades.

Community meetings were held in Garner Valley and Temecula to explain fire-fighting strategies, conditions and fire behavior. The fire's behavior was unpredictable, one fire chief said, a common sentiment fire officials have expressed about wildfires throughout the West over the past decade or so.

By Tuesday afternoon, the fire was approaching Bautista Creek, a concern that it would move into Bautista Canyon and threaten Mountain Center. It eventually did cross into the canyon and up Rouse Ridge. Radio traffic considered evacuating

Mountain Center and Idyllwild. But firefighters, with the help of the Rouse Ridge control road, were able to hold it back 2 miles from Highway 74. Hurricane Kay was expected to impact the fire area Friday. Though that might mean moisture to cool temperatures and dampen the fire, it also meant strong winds that could fuel the flames more.

Along with death and injury, the fire destroyed structures in Valle Vista and Sage. Wednesday night, both Highway 74 between Hemet and Mountain Center, and Sage Road were closed. The fire had burned 11,500 acres and was still only 5% contained. By Thursday morning, it was nearly 19,000 acres — mostly an increase in the Sage area — but with no increase in containment.

That evening, Highway 371 was closed, as well as westbound Highway 74 from Palm Desert as the fire grew to nearly 24,000 acres. Gov. Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency in Riverside County. The Riverside County Board of Supervisors was expected to do the same at its Tuesday, Sept. 13, meeting.

Then came the remnants of the hurricane Friday morning and as moisture fell throughout the fire area, mandatory evacuation orders started becoming warnings and highways began reopening. Sunday, Highway 74 between Hemet and Mountain Center was the last to reopen in the mountains.

Since Friday night, the fire has remained at 28,307 and is now 62% contained as of Tuesday morning. The mountain communities escaped this inferno whose cause is under investigation.

Many local weekend events, including the Idyllwild Animal Rescue Friends’ Friday afternoon fundraiser and Robyn Winks’ mental hygiene series, were postponed or canceled.

Structures destroyed numbered 21 with four damaged. Minor structures destroyed numbered 14 with two damaged.

Two first responders were injured. The Compton family were identified as the three civilians burned in the fire Monday — Ian, Tina and daughter Mikayla. Ian and Mikayla did not survive. Tina is in a burn unit with third-degree burns. She lost not only her family but her home, pets and belongings. A GoFundMe page for Tina is listed under The Compton Family.

The U.S. Forest Service, as well as numerous city and county agencies, are in cooperation with Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department to fight the Fairview Fire.

COVID BA.4 & BA.5 and local stats

Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that everyone ages 12 and older receive an updated COVID-19 booster that targets two Omicron subvariants, BA.4 and BA.5. Further, CDC recommends that, since flu season is approaching, we obtain our annual flu shot and the updated COVID booster “at the same visit.”

CDC continues to rate Riverside County’s Community Level as low.

As of Tuesday, Sept. 13, county stats showed 349 total COVID cases have been reported in the Idyllwild-Pine Cove area (same as last week), with 342 recoveries and seven deaths, leaving no currently active cases in our area.

Anza reported 437 COVID cases with 427 recoveries and eight deaths, leaving two active cases in the Anza area.

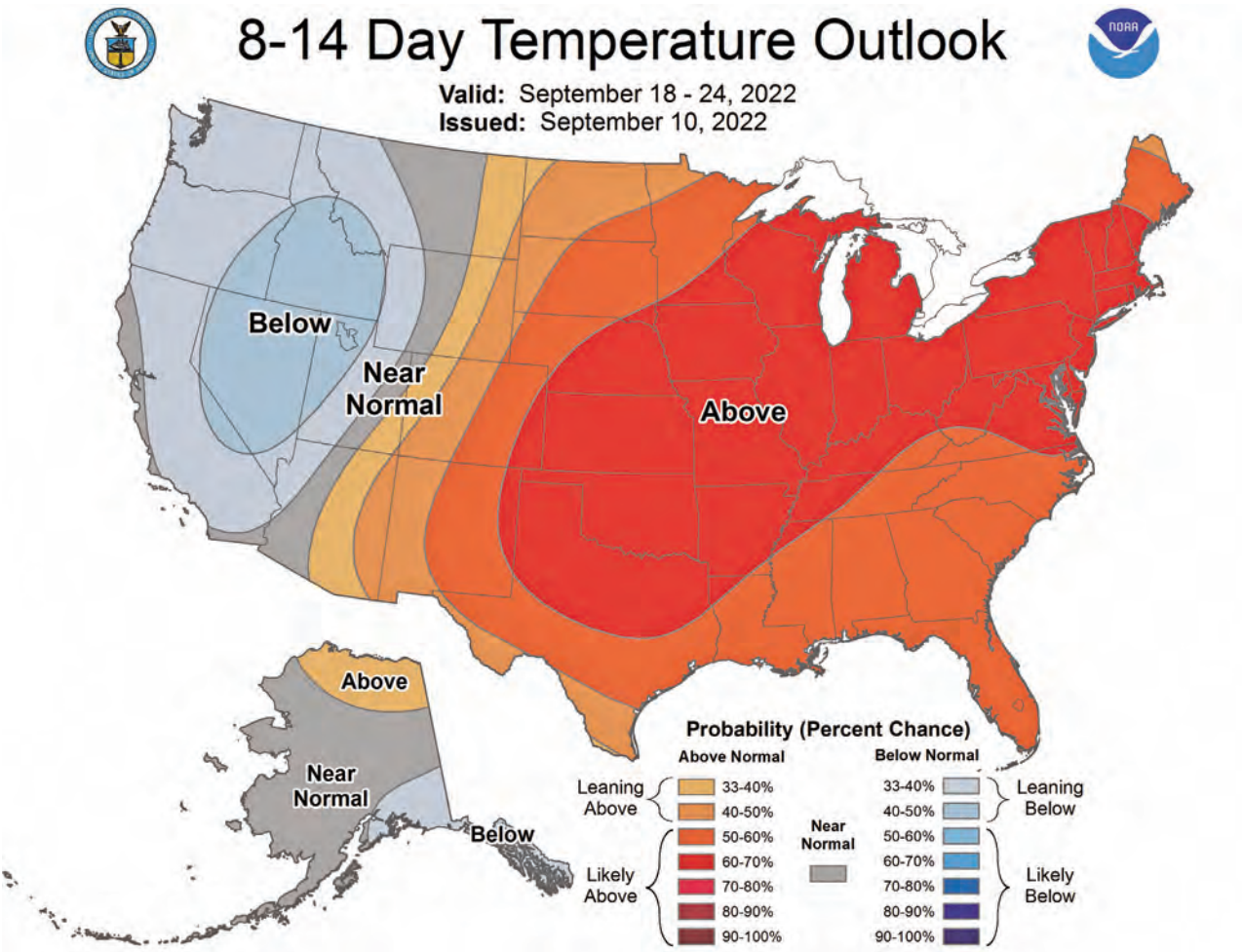
According to Riverside University Health System Public-Health, the county does not report cases, recoveries and deaths for communities with populations fewer than 2,000, such as Mountain Center and Garner Valley.

As of Tuesday, Sept. 13, Idyllwild School reported no students and one staff member with COVID, while Hemet High reported 26 students (45 fewer than last week) and three staff members with COVID. Hamilton Elementary reported no students and one staff member with COVID, while Hamilton secondary reported no students and one staff member with COVID.

Fire, wind, then rain

Weather, weather: Whether we like it, whether we enjoy it, whether it frustrates us, whether it interrupts something, weather is ubiquitous. Some may be oblivious to it and some let it dictate where they live, such as Southern California sunny beaches. Sometimes it totally controls our lives, such as when rain caused Highway 74 closures in the winter and spring of 2019.

The last story on local weather reported on the number of record-high temperature days recorded in Idyllwild from the end of August into early September. That continued. On Wednesday, Sept. 7, Idyllwild scored two record-high temperature readings in one day.

During the day, the temperature reached 97 degrees, 2 degrees greater than the previous high of 95 set in 1955, which is more than half a century ago. For the Gen Xers and Millennials, that was when the first operational nuclear-powered submarine sailed, Jonas Salk’s polio vaccine was declared safe and effective, “The Mickey Mouse Club” debuted, the first Guinness Book of World Records was published, and Disneyland opened in California.

After the sun set Sept. 7, cooling began, but the nighttime low was only 63 degrees. This minimum temperature also was recorded more recently — in 2020.

During this period of excessive heat, the Fairview Fire started east of Hemet. It moved east, south, a little north and south. It threatened the Hill and Garner Valley.

Weather played a role in this danger, too. When the fire started and began spreading, high temperatures did not help abate it and certainly slowed firefighters also struggling with the fire’s heat. The current drought had dried vegetation which was then burned and flamed more easily.

Eventually, over the weekend, with the help of unusual weather, control of the fire then quickly exceeded 5% and total control was within sight.

Hurricane Kay, a surprising Pacific storm, moved north toward the Baja California area and then drifted north and west. But it brought wind and rain — a lot. According to Ari Sarsalari, a meteorologist at the Weather Channel in Atlanta, the last time a true hurricane crossed California was in 1958.

The winds began Thursday and continued into Saturday. These gusts also set more records. On the Hill, a wind gust of 76 mph was recorded at Rocky Point weather site. The National Weather Service (NWS) also reported a 77 mph gust at Toro Peak.

The strongest recorded gust, 109 mph, was at Cuyamaca Peak in San Diego County.

On Friday and Saturday, Tropical Cyclone Kay did bring rain. The greatest rain fell near the coast. Mt. Laguna recorded more than 5 inches.

On the Hill, Mt. San Jacinto received 2.23 inches of precipitation. Locally, Dutch Flat recorded 1.2 inches,

Vista Grande vicinity, but about a quarter of an inch was recorded at Thomas Mountain.

NWS reported that cooler temperatures and thunderstorms were still likely throughout the week. On Monday, the NWS Twitter comment was, “Temperatures this week will be quite a bit lower than they were last week. Mountain highs will be in the 60s,”

Longer term, the drought may continue. The latest NWS prediction is that La Niña conditions will continue through the end of 2022. Neutral conditions may return in late winter or early spring 2023. The long-range, three-month forecasts continue to indicate the chances of normal precipitation are below 50% until the April-May-June 2023 period.

If the La Niña pattern does continue into 2023, that will be another record — a three-year La Niña — the first of this century, according to many meteorologists. “It is exceptional to have three consecutive years with

Pine Cove 0.9 inches, Idyllwild Fire Station 0.88, Thomas Mountain 0.7 inches and Keenwild Station 0.67 inches.

Palm Desert was drenched with nearly an inch of rain. And on Friday, Sept. 9, San Jacinto’s rain total of 0.6 inches set a record for that date. In fact, this was the first recorded rain on Sept. 9 in San Jacinto.

Sunday, most of the rainfall was centered in the San Bernardino County, where between 1 and 3 inches of rain were recorded. Locally, the greatest rain was in the

a La Niña event. Its cooling influence is temporarily slowing the rise in global temperatures — but it will not halt or reverse the long-term warming trend,” said professor Petteri Taalas, secretary-General of the World Meteorological Organization, in a press release last week.

The last El Niño period was from August 2018 through May 2019. A return of El Niño conditions is not in the recent predictions. Possibly neutral conditions may begin late next winter, according to NWS.

County supervisors respond to grand jury report

At its Sept. 13 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a response to the June grand jury report, entitled “County Leadership Failures Result in Unnecessary Financial Risks: Internal Audits Marginalized.”

The response to the grand jury’s 31-page assessment of the county’s auditor-controller audit work is a joint response from both the board and the County Executive Office.

Auditor-Controller Paul Angulo sent a separate response the week before and the grand jury has already posted it online.

In his submission to the board, County Executive Officer (CEO) Jeff Van Wagenen made his position clear, “In summary, the intent is to implement 12 of the 13 recommendations of the Civil grand jury, with one of the recommendations requiring further analysis. It is important to note, however, that while the recommendations are well taken and are aligned with our goal of continuous process improvement, the proposed response disagrees in part or in whole with all of the findings as written.”

The board also referred to the Penal Code (Section 933.05) which says that respondents must agree or disagree wholly or partially with each grand jury finding and, also, state whether the recommendations will be implemented.

Of the 12 grand jury findings, the board responded “disagreed wholly” to six of them and only partially disagreed with the other half. Angulo “completely disagreed” with all 12 findings.

The joint response was less defensive and acerbic, and accepted offered recommendations without retaliatory language. In his conclusion, Angulo described the recommendations as lacking substance or backed by law.

For example, the grand jury’s Finding 3 stated, “The County’s internal audits are marginalized and, in many cases, just ig-

nored.” The board and CEO partially disagreed.

They replied that the audit process is “well documented and followed,” but noted that the grand jury did recommend more “frequent communication” between the board members, the CEO and the Auditor-Controller’s Office (ACO). This has started, the response added.

In addition, the CEO also has begun to share audit results more widely and increased its follow-up with department heads regarding implementation of ACO recommendations.

“The grand jury is finding the ACO leadership at fault because of the lack of follow-up to the audit recommendation ... The ACO has zero responsibility to manage the oversight of the corrective actions,” was Angulo’s comment about this finding.

While all three county responders rejected Finding 5, “The County consistently fails to rectify known limitations in its internal Audit Unit,” their accompanying comments were subtly different.

This finding refers to the grand jury’s research that the Riverside County audit staff is the lowest paid in the region and has the fewest auditors. Angulo replied, “The ACOs inability to fill the vacant positions is due to low pay and poor benefit packages. ... The ACO leadership has reported this multiple times to Human Resources [HR] ...”

The grand jury is encouraging higher pay, filling vacancies more quickly and increasing staffing. Angulo doesn’t disagree, but says it’s not his responsibility to pursue the changes any further since he has told HR.

But the board’s and CEO’s response said they haven’t seen any of these requests and therefore, have neither rejected nor denied them. “It is the responsibility of each department head to assess their staffing needs and make necessary budget requests ... The BOS and EO support departments working with the HR to identify the proper job descriptions and requirements for each

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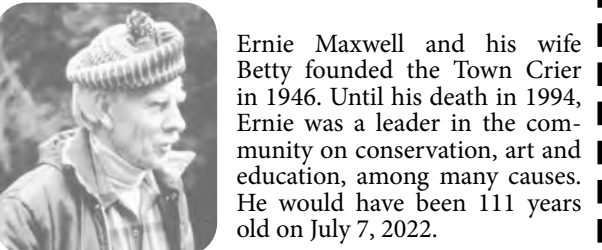

classification for their respective departments. The EO has not made a recommendation of denial, nor has the BOS denied, a budget increase request by the ACO.”

Of the 13 recommendations, the board response stated that it had “Not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the future” for 11. And the joint response gave the implementation date of Jan. 1, 2024 for all. Angulo offered no implementation dates.

In response to the recommendation to create an Audit Oversight Committee, the CEO said he would review how other counties do this. The recommendation would be implemented with qualifications. But it promised an appropriate structure and composition of this type of committee for Riverside County will be developed and implemented by Jan. 1, 2024.

The recommendation to consider reorganizing the audit staff to separate the internal auditors from the specialists will be further reviewed. “The EO will work with the ACO to determine if the separation of the units into separate divisions is feasible.”

Angulo replied, “Splitting the two Divisions would require another set of supervisors, mid-level managers and Chief. Yet another cost to the taxpayer ... The ACO does not serve the grand jury, the ACO serves the people — 2.5 million residents — and will not fix what is not broken.”

The grand jury report mentioned several times that county officials did not accord proper attention to the ACO audits and findings. But, the board did note that “audited departments may disagree with the audit findings, but that doesn’t equate to a marginalization of the audit findings.”

Air National Guard deploys two C-130 aircraft

The USDA Forest Service activated two Department of Defense (DoD) C-130 aircraft equipped with modular airborne firefighting systems (MAFFS) to assist with increased fire activity in several western states. The aircraft, from the California Air National Guard’s 146th Airlift Wing and the Nevada Air National Guard’s 152nd Airlift Wing, joined the USDA Forest Service and other wildland fire agencies fighting wildfires across the West. The aircraft reported to the Boise Airtanker Base last Friday.

“We greatly appreciate the assistance of our military partners,” said Kim Christensen, deputy assistant director for operations for the USDA Forest Service. “These aircraft will help provide additional capacity for aerial firefighting.”

Having military C-130s that can be converted into airtankers provides a critical “surge” capability that can be used to bolster wildfire suppression efforts when commercial airtankers are fully committed or not readily available.

“We take to heart our team’s effort to help protect property and critical infrastructure, with the ultimate goal of saving lives,” said Lt. Gen. Kirk Pierce, commander, First Air Force - Air Forces Northern (AFNORTH). “Our MAFFS-trained team of professionals completed rigorous annual aerial wildland firefighting training in April with the USDA Forest Service to ensure they were fully prepared for the wildfire season.”

First Air Force - (AFNORTH), headquartered at Tyndall AFB in Pensacola, U.S. Northern Command’s Air Component Command, is the DoD’s operational lead for the aerial wildland firefighting military efforts. The team is committed to excellence through training and interagency relationships.

The C-130 aircraft are equipped with the U.S. Forest Service’s MAFFS, which can drop up to 3,000 gallons of fire retardant in less than 10 seconds across a quarter-mile line. The system slides into the back of the military aircraft, and retardant is released through a nozzle on the rear left side. In addition to the 146th and 152nd Airlift Wings, MAFFS program aircraft are from the Air Force Reserve Command’s 302nd Airlift Wing, Peterson AFB, Colorado and the Air National Guard’s 153rd Airlift Wing, Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Tuesday, Sept. 6, the National Wildland Fire Preparedness Level was elevated to 4 (out of 5), indicating increased wildland fire activity across the U.S. The level was raised by

the Multi-Agency Coordination Group (NMAC), composed of wildland fire representatives from each wildland fire agency based at the National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC) in Boise, Idaho.

NIFC is the nation’s support center for wildland firefighting. Eight different agencies and organizations are part of NIFC, including the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, National Weather Service, U.S. Fire Administration, and the National Association of State Foresters.

MAFFS is a portable fire-retardant delivery system inserted into an aircraft, temporarily converting it into a firefighting airtanker that provides a critical “surge” capability to bolster wildfire suppression efforts when commercial airtankers are fully committed or not readily available.





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

Village folk and summer residents alike turned out for the official opening and dedication of the new community building.

70 years ago - 1952
Joe and Leona McCaugh purchased the Idyllwild Market from Harold Sanborn and Bob O'Donne.

Thirteen hybrid Coulter-Jeffrey pines were counted in the Idyllwild area. There were said to be only 25 in the entire state.

55 years ago - 1967
There was a heavy downpour Saturday, and Labor Day weekend campers were rained out in most recreation spots.

50 years ago - 1972
While observers in Humber Park watched the entire operation, rescuers reached an Ontario man who had fallen from the Long Climb route on the northwest face of Tahquitz Rock and became lodged in a crevice.

45 years ago - 1977
Funds for a community beautification program, in memory of Betty Maxwell, passed the \$1,000 mark. The memorial was initiated by the Izaak Walton League.

40 years ago - 1982
Homer Hegwood was again elected president of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association.

35 years ago - 1987
Judge Ronald Deissler granted a motion to throw out two of four causes of action against the San Jacinto Mountain Area Water Study Agency made by the Idyllwild

Arts Foundation.

30 years ago - 1992
Hill resident Walter Schmidt hired Patrick Bradley to cut down the tree on his property in Mountain Center. The tree was supposed to be dropped in the meadow but landed in the intersection of highways 74 and 243. Hundreds of people were without power because the tree snapped three power poles and two power lines when it fell.

25 years ago - 1997
Idyllwild School passed the Individual Test of Academic Skills with high marks in reading.

20 years ago - 2002
"An Afternoon of Music For the Forest" at Buckhorn Camp raised about \$2,000 toward maintaining and improving fuel-breaks in the Idyllwild and Pine Cove areas.

15 years ago - 2007
Marijuana with an estimated street value of \$15 million was taken from a grove on Highway 74, about 3 miles from the Cranston Forest Service station. Sixteen helicopter

loads took out 5,063 marijuana plants 5 to 7 feet tall and ready for harvest.

10 years ago - 2012
Marijuana plants were eradicated from three separate sites near Lake Hemet in a joint effort among the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, the Drug Enforcement Agency and the U.S. Forest Service.

5 years ago - 2017
Riverside County firefighters responded to reports of an injured hiker at Humber Park. One hiker died, the other was severely injured.

1 year ago - 2021
Stephen Patrick Medlock, 56, who was arrested and charged with starting the 2013 Silver Fire that burned more than 20,000 acres in Poppet Flats, Twin Pines and throughout Banning, and reportedly caused physical injuries to more than a dozen individuals, including firefighters, was court ordered to a Mental Health Court hearing on motion of his defense attorney, Skip Feild.
