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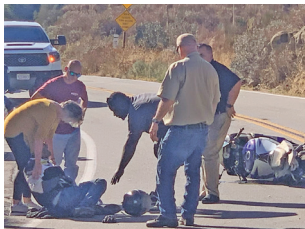

**Idyllwild School
interim approved

The Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) Board of Trustees approved Idyllwild School Interim Principal Tim Poseley as new principal Tuesday, Sept. 13. An email to Idyllwild School parents announced, "We are thrilled to announce that after completing the interview process at last night's board meeting, action was taken to approve Tim Poseley as the Principal of Idyllwild School TK-8. We welcome Mr. Poseley and are excited to have him officially join the Idyllwild team."

"As many of you know he has served as the Interim Principal to start the school year and comes to Idyllwild School after serving as an Assistant Principal at Hemet High School over the past three years. Prior to his time as an administrator, he taught Math, AVID [Advancement Via Individual Determination], and Computer Science at Heritage High School in the Perris Union High School District. Please join us in welcoming Mr. Poseley to the Idyllwild Team."

Idyllwild Trustee Vic Scavarda commented. "I did speak with Mr. Poseley on Tuesday night and he is very enthusiastic about being principal of Idyllwild School. Put another way, he wants to be here. I am excited for our school and I wish him all the best in his new position."

The Crier spoke with Poseley last week. TC: "Tell us how you began your career in education."

TP: "I was born and raised in Perris. I started teaching at Heritage High. I taught math, AVID and computer science. I also did other things: coached boys soccer; ASB (Associated Student Body); I was a National Honor Society adviser; I helped with Friday Night Live (a club that helps with drug use prevention, providing positive alternatives for students.)"

TC: "How many students at Heritage?" TP: "Heritage was 2,900 students."

TC: "And Hemet High?" TP: "Hemet High is 2,400."

TC: "How did the move to administration happen?"

TP: "I just wanted to get involved in helping to influence education, wanted to help get better outcomes for students. I was always raised to believe that if you want to improve things or change them you have to get involved. That compelled me to make that jump. I got the opportunity at Hemet High."

TC: "What did you learn as assistant principal at Hemet High?"

TP: "I started the year when we closed down, in March 2020. That was my first year. At the school I had the chance to oversee, discipline, attendance, testing, counseling, and curriculum and instruction."

TC: "All the things a principal does." TP: "Yes."

TC: "And you've been at Idyllwild School since this summer?"

TP: "I've been up here since July. It's exciting, outstanding to work for such a great group of people."

TC: "Do you have any goals?"

45-day moratorium on

At its Sept. 13 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved a revised Ordinance 927.1, "Regulating Short Term Rentals" (STRs), and a moratorium on new STR certificates for two areas within the county.

The new ordinance will be effective in 30 days.

Effective immediately, however, a 45-day moratorium was placed on new STR certificates in two unincorporated county areas. The moratorium applies in the Idyllwild area, including Pine Cove and Mountain Center, and the Temecula Valley Wine Country Policy Areas.

The moratorium expires Friday, Oct. 28. Planning Commission staff will provide a progress report to the board at its Oct. 18 meeting.

The moratorium would not prohibit operating STRs that have already obtained a county STR certificate.

Afterward, Idyllwild resident Joel Feingold opined, "It was a win for Idyllwild — more good than bad for Idyllwild."

Discussion of the proposed ordinance and a possible moratorium took more than four hours. The board heard from several dozen concern citizens, including several from the Idyllwild area.

Jeanine Charles-Stigall, former Idyllwild Fire Protection Department commissioner, told the board, "We have a monster next door to our house. There are five STRs on our block and only one is registered ... We're losing our neighborhood."

She noted that one time when she visited an STR to express concern about the noise, she encountered "... a guy teaching a child how to shoot squirrels."

Following her was Feingold who urged the board to "protect our serenity and our rights to the peaceful neighborhood."

After the public comments, the supervisors discussed the ordinance and its need — protection of property rights.

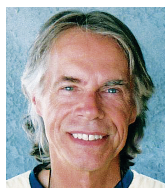
First District Supervisor Kevin Jeffries stated it directly, "My philosophical beliefs are pretty tough. To accept a lot of what's proposed — personal responsibility, personal freedom — says hands off, except for going after the bad actors. Our obligation is to protect private property rights on both sides of the fence."

And 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington stressed, "I'm not anti-STR, but STR property rights are subservient to residential property rights. These trump rights of someone running a business."

And that was the lens through which all were evaluating the ordinance and its consequences. The board wanted to ensure that people had a right to use their homes or properties however they wanted, including as rentals. And the board also was insistent on protecting the rights of neighbors who bought homes in quiet, non-commercial areas.

The issues dominating the board's discussion were maximum occupancy of a facility, whether to require fire sprinklers and whether accessory dwelling units could be part of an STR.

Maximum occupancy

At the beginning of the session, Planning Director John Hildebrand described the revisions made since the board’s July 26 meeting. Originally, the maximum occupancy criterion was two people per bedroom plus one floater. Then Hildebrand added, “we heard loud and clear from the board that was too restrictive.”

In this version, staff recommended three tiers of occupancy. The first tier would limit occupancy to 10 people. The number of bedrooms would not matter.

Owners could increase occupancy to a maximum of 16 if they complied with a pre-approved list of upgrades. On a separate list independent of the ordinance language were examples of possible improvements such as smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms, fire extinguishers, sprinklers, an exit plan and no exposed wiring.

Occupancy could be increased to a maximum of 16 if an application were submitted to the Building and Safety Department who would determine maximum occupancy and any necessary upgrades.

Washington emphasized that maximum occupancy is “... not unlimited over 16, but up to a certain number for safety.”

But Supervisor Manuel Perez, 4th District, was concerned whether the upgrades for STRs to increase occupancy was dependent upon state law requirements or was the county “... putting policy into place.”

Hildebrand explained that occupancy greater than 16 effectively changes the zoning condition from R3, residential, to R1, commercial. That is equivalent to hotel occupancies and certain upgrades would be required.

Beginning the supervisor’s discussion, Perez expressed concern that the three tiers were also too restrictive. “I prefer a case-by-case approach that gives us flexibility. I’m worried about the large estates,” in his district.

“I tend to lean toward no cap or on square footage,” Perez added. Referring to one of the public comments, Perez added, “I tend to lean in that direction of some sort of policy based on square footage rather than free-for all.”

Later agreeing with Perez, Jeffries said, “I like the idea of square footage and acreage. It makes sense. It allows more flexibility and is a more reasonable approach to small home and small occupancy and protects neighbors.”

During his time, Washington cautioned about the idea of no maximum occupancy and stressed some limits were necessary just to protect the visitors.

“[The] more people we put inside a house the more dangerous it becomes in an emergency. How can we ensure when people come to our Wine Country or our Idyllwild and we welcome them with open arms that they have a right to expect if something happens, such as fire, that they can get out of that home without losing kids or without someone dying,” Washington said, expressing his concern.

After more discussion, the supervisors finally came to a consensus that maximum occupancy would be a function of both structure square footage and acreage of the lot.

For lots smaller than 1 acre, the maximum STR occupancy would be one renter per 200 square feet up to 10 people. If the structure is on a lot, whose size is between 1 acre and 2-and-a-half acres, maximum occupancy would be limited to 16 people. If the STR property is larger than 2-and-a-half acres, maximum occupancy will be 20.

Fire sprinklers

The second major issue was whether fire sprinklers would be required to be installed in STR facilities that did not already have them. The question arose from the list of possible upgrades that would permit maximum occupancy to increase from Tier 1 to Tier 2.

Although the tier concept was discarded, several supervisors strongly believed the county should not be requiring fire sprinkler systems.

Chair Jeff Hewitt (5th District) was the first to raise concern. He argued that requiring fire sprinklers could be very expensive.

He acknowledged that state building code now requires fire sprinklers to be part of new home construction, but homes built before 2016 are not required to have these sprinkler systems. He feels that a large number of STR facilities were built before 2016, and it “wouldn’t pay to put sprinklers into these older building.”

While the staff replied that the checklist was not mandatory, Jeffries expressed concern that staff could change that “on a whim” and could not sup-

port a mandate for sprinklers.

Again, consensus was reached that fire sprinkler systems would be recommended and not mandated for any STR certification.

Accessory dwelling units

The third major issue was how to treat accessory dwelling units (ADU), such as a separate building in which a person could live. Examples are plenty, such as a casita, cottage, guest house or apartment over the garage —ones that cannot be sold separately from the main lot and structure.

Senate Bill 9 prohibits residential development such as ADUs, built to expand the housing market, from being used for STRs. The county’s General Plan includes ADUs in its count of housing and, according to Deputy County Counsel Sarah Moore, would have to be amended to permit ADUs as part of STRs as well as the county’s Land-use Ordinance (348).

Washington suggested the board approve 927.1 and direct staff to return with new language regarding the provision of ADUs. But Jeffries was adamant, “No, ADU has to be resolved now. I’m not going to adopt 927 that unnecessarily harms property owners for using their guest homes.” And Hewitt agreed.

Hildebrand replied that the staff could return with an amendment to Ordinance 348 and changes to its state housing element.

“Staff was directed by the board to revise the proposed ordinance to include those ADUs that are not specifically restricted by state law ... We will need to revise Ord. 348,” Assistant County Executive Officer and Director of the Transportation and Land Management Agency Charissa Leach confirmed in an email to the Town Crier.

Other changes

In the draft presented, changes were made from the early version presented to the board.

For example, the revised ordinance still requires installing noise monitors outside the building, but interior noise monitors will not be required. Also, the length of an STR rental remains two consecutive days and one night. And outdoor fires are only permitted if state or local fire regulations or rules do not prohibit them.

The signage providing the STR certificate number, the name and phone number of the responsible operator, the maximum occupancy, and the phone number for the county’s 24-hour Code Enforcement must still be clearly visible, but specifically from the street.

And inspections as part of the certificate application process will be only of the exterior, not inspections of the STR interior. This would include the exterior sign, the off-street parking and the noise monitor.

And the fine for a first violation of the ordinance is \$1,500, not \$1,300. The second and third violation fines remained at \$3,000 and \$5,000, respectively.

Vote

The new Ordinance 927.1 was approved unanimously and replaces the original STR ordinance enacted in January 2016. Efforts to revise the 2016 ordinance began in Feb-

COVID boosters with regular flu shots

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends everyone ages 12 and older receive an updated COVID-19 booster and — with flu season fast approaching — obtain an annual flu shot “at the same visit.” Receiving both together results in only a “slightly more likely (8% to 11%)” likelihood of reporting reactions like fatigue, headache and muscle ache than people who receive the COVID-19 booster alone, “but these reactions were mostly mild and resolved quickly.” CDC suggests that if you’re concerned about getting both shots together, check with your health care provider.

CDC continues to rate Riverside County’s Community Level as low. The county no longer is posting total COVID cases, deaths and recoveries for individual communities on its website.

As of Tuesday, Sept. 20, the Hemet Unified School District’s dashboard showed that Idyllwild School reported no students and two staff members with COVID, while Hemet High reported three students (23 fewer than last week) and three staff members with COVID. Hamilton Elementary reported no students and one staff member with COVID, while Hamilton secondary reported no students and no staff members with COVID.

February 2020 when Washington and Jeffries proposed a review and possible revision.

Moratorium

The board next undertook a public hearing about the proposed moratorium of new STR certificates in Idyllwild and the Wine Country.

This moratorium period will allow time for staff to evaluate the impacts of concentrations of STRs in local areas. These two areas are the location of nearly 62% of all county STR certificates. During this period, staff will evaluate possible mitigating measures for this situation.

An extraordinary concentration of STRs in local neighborhoods can result in negative effects, unnecessary and improper in residential areas. Examples of these impacts include unpermitted, large-scale events, violations of the county noise ordinance, disorderly conduct, traffic congestion, illegal parking, and rubbish and trash left on streets or lawns, according to Hildebrand.

The moratorium expires Oct. 28. But Hildebrand promised that a progress report will be presented at the board’s Oct. 18 meeting. This should include a “... description of the measures taken to alleviate the conditions which led to adoption of the Urgency Ordinance,” Hildebrand told the board.

A moratorium extension, adoption of amendments to the new ordinance or other actions might be proposed then.

Speaking to this issue, Feingold told the board, “Idyllwild has approximately 400 registered STRs and, at least, 250 more ... I think we’re maxed out.”

The Urgency Ordinance 449 also was approved unanimously.

Paul Angulo seeks 4th term as county auditor

Editor's note: On Nov. 8, the state's general election will be held. Voters will have a choice for the Riverside County auditor controller. The two candidates to face off are incumbent Paul Angulo and challenger Ben Benoit. The Town Crier interviewed each candidate and both stories appear in this edition of the paper.

Paul Angulo is the current Riverside County auditor controller. He was first elected in 2010 and reelected without opposition in two subsequent elections.

In the June 2010 primary, Angulo barely finished second. He was only 1,100 votes ahead of Justine Quinones and 31,000 votes behind the leader, Ivan Chand. However, in the November election, he garnered 57.8% of the vote to defeat Chand, who had the support of departing Auditor Controller Robert Byrd and the five supervisors.

"They solicited me to run and I did a lot of soul-searching," Angulo said, describing the reason for entering his first election. "I couldn't believe what I saw. I was number two in the June 2010 primary and immediately fired. But in November, I won in a landslide."

In the June 2022 primary, Angulo finished second to challenger Ben Benoit, mayor of Wildomar. Benoit received 46% of the vote and Angulo trailed with 39% or about 22,000 votes out of 327,000 cast. And again, this year, the five sitting supervisors have endorsed Angulo's opponent.

Angulo is an Army veteran and has a political science degree from the University of California, Berkley. He has a master's degree in management from the University of Redlands and is a certified public accountant. He and his wife live in the Coachella Valley and have a son in college.

After his initial election, Angulo said he drove the department to pick up its pace and it did. "I'm very proud of the team," he said. "That dedication continues," he added. During COVID, Angulo spent three weeks in the hospital, "But I continued to work and so did the department," he said with pride.

In this election, Angulo is campaigning on his training and integrity. He said the training to be a county auditor is a "moral duty" to residents. He believes this is an important and critical difference between him and Benoit.

Benoit has been a locally elected official and worked with many government agencies and commissions. However, he does not have a degree nor a certified public accountant credential, which disqualifies him to serve as auditor, in Angulo's opinion. "He's taking the taxpayers as a fool and it bothers me," Angulo stipulated. "It's a fabrication of his credentials"

The state Government Code Section 26945 specifies the qualifications for an individual to hold the office of county auditor. The options include a degree in accounting, a certified public account license or experience as a county auditor.

While Angulo points to this section to dismiss Benoit, section 26946 specifies, "The provisions of this article shall become effective in only those counties in which ... the board of supervisors by a unanimous vote, at a regular meeting with all members present, enacts an ordinance adopting the provisions of this article. The ordinance so adopted may be repealed by the board of supervisors at any time." And this is what Riverside County did in 2001, more than 20 years ago.

Former board Chair Tom Mullen told his colleagues, "If this ordinance is adopted, these enhanced qualifications for candidates will be repealed and the minimum requirement for candidates for auditor will be a registered voter in the county of Riverside." On Aug. 28, 2001, four supervisors supported the repeal that became effective Sept. 27, 2001.

"California Government Code 26945 only applies if it has been enacted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to California Government Code 26946. While the Riverside County Board of Supervisors did adopt an ordinance requiring additional qualifications in 1980, the Board voted to repeal that ordinance in 2001. No additional action has been taken since then to increase the qualifications to run for Auditor," wrote Yaoska Machado, county Senior Public Information Specialist, after discussion with the Registrar of Voters Office.

Consequently, Benoit is qualified to run for county auditor and to hold the position.

Angulo claims the county has threatened him because they don't want the public to see the truth his audits reveal. "They don't want a trained eye looking at the financials," he alleged.

But it was a May grand jury report that questioned the adequacy of county audits, their thoroughness and their acceptance from client offices. Angulo's response to the grand jury disputed each finding and acknowledged no support for its recommendations.

However, the supervisors and chief executive officer offered a less contentious response to the grand jury.

Of the 12 grand jury findings, the board responded "disagreed wholly" to six of them and only partially disagreed with the other half. Of the 13 recommendations, the supervisors' response stated that they had "... not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the future" for 11. And the joint response gave the implementation date of Jan. 1, 2024 for all. Angulo offered no implementation dates.

In March, Angulo filed a general financial statement with the Registrar of Voters Office. Since then, he has not reported any contributions or expenses for this election. Also, no financial reports exist for the 2014 and 2018 elections. He said he is financing his campaigns as a grassroots effort. Consequently, expenditures are personal and not great. He doesn't need a second mortgage and ensures there is savings for his son's education.

"I'm the only independent person; that's why they don't like me," he stated. He attacks Benoit's supporters, especially the Riverside County Sheriff's and Deputy District Attorney's associations for financially supporting Benoit. Both the Sheriff's Office and District Attorney are subject to audits.

Since Benoit is not the auditor, these contributions are not a conflict, but Angulo argues that they certainly have that appearance. "That's not right," he argued.

So, Angulo concludes it's his "moral duty" to run because he alone "understands the plight of working people because he has worked in factories after college."

Ben Benoit seeks county auditor position

Editor's note: On Nov. 8, the state's general election will be held. Voters will have a choice for the position of Riverside County auditor controller. The two candidates facing off are challenger Ben Benoit and incumbent Paul Angulo. The Town Crier interviewed each candidate and both stories appear in this edition of the paper.

Ben Benoit is currently on the Wildomar City Council and serving his fourth term as mayor. He was first elected to the council in 2010.

While serving on the council, Benoit has been involved with many other local and regional governmental groups. Examples of his breadth of service include the Western Regional Council of Governments, the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC), the Riverside County Habitat Conservation Agency, the Southern California Association of Governments and the Southern California Air Quality Management District where he is currently chair of the governing board.

Benoit's active and broad involvement in government programs comes naturally. His father was John Benoit, who represented the Hill in the state Assembly and the state Senate and became the supervisor for Riverside County's 4th District.

Benoit's interest in the auditor controller office (ACO) position does not evolve from a career in accounting. He is not a licensed certified public accountant nor a student of accounting. But he believes he has developed the experience and knowledge to manage the department.

Through his involvement in multiple audit committees for government agencies on which he has served, as well as Wildomar's Finance Committee, he has learned to read and to assess government audits. On his website is written, "... he has made it a priority to serve on financial committees and audit committees. Ben recognized early on that ensuring the financial health and well-being of the taxpayer-supported entities he served on is the most effective way for those organizations to serve their communities."

Consequently, he has been concerned about the ACO for several years. "I recognized a few years back, that the auditor controller was critical for Riverside County." And Benoit stressed that the head of the department is responsible for managing the staff, not conducting day-to-day audits.

As a member of the RCTC, he became aware of an employee issue that involved ACO Paul Angulo. "It was a person abusing his position and not appropriate for an elected official," Benoit argued. And over time, Benoit came to believe that it was repeated behavior.

The Press-Enterprise has reported that the county has paid hundreds of thousands of dollars to settle ACO employee suits brought against Angulo and the county.

This is Benoit's motivation for seeking the ACO position. "I can lead the organization," he said firmly. "I had heard the rumors, but not until I started the campaign and did the research did I learn that this was repeated behavior."

Besides Angulo's personal attitude and style, Benoit agrees with the June grand jury report recommending multiple changes in the ACO's organization and activities, including an oversight committee.

"I would accept all the changes the grand jury discussed," Benoit stated. "There is a need for change and he [Angulo] is not willing to change. 90% of the grand jury report is true."

With respect to the board of supervisors' and chief executive officer's joint response to the grand jury, he added, "[This] shows they understand change needs to happen."

Benoit has vast support within the county. Not only have the five current supervisors endorsed Benoit, but so have four retired supervisors, including Jeff Stone, Marion Ashley and John Tavaglione. Mayors and council members of various Riverside County cities are listed on his endorsement page.

Both the Riverside Sheriff's Association and the Riverside Deputy District Attorneys Association endorsed him. The Sheriff's Association has contributed \$25,000 to his campaign. The Riverside Firefighters Legislative Group also has made a contribution to his coffers.

Angulo believes this is a clear conflict of interest. The ACO is responsible for auditing the Sheriff's Office, the District Attorney's Office and the Fire Department. If these groups are supporting and funding Benoit's campaign, Angulo questions the quality and integrity of any audit conducted under Benoit's aegis.

Benoit acknowledges his broad support. But he knows from his experience as an elected official and son of one that "when running for political office, no one can dictate or direct what you do in office."

My contributions are public knowledge and I'm always open to talks. My phone number (951-226-5030) is on the website and business card.

As of the end of June, Benoit's campaign chest had \$10,500 in cash. However, since then his contributions have approached \$50,000. So far Angulo has not filed any financial reports with the Riverside County Registrar of Voters Office. He said he is running a grassroots campaign. Yet, Benoit has reported a \$25,000 personal loan to his campaign effort.

"I'm running to restore accountability and transparency in the office of auditor controller," said Benoit. "I've seen the expense reports and legal challenges coming out of the auditor controller's office firsthand and it's truly appalling ... I plan to implement reforms to provide transparency and establish ethical leadership to reign in the out-of-control spending."

Benoit went on to say, "I want to create a positive, collaborative work environment in the auditor controller's office, and then work with all the county departments to help make them the best they can be ... I know our county employees can do better when we take the time to listen to them and advocate for their needs. Sometimes those transformative changes need someone from outside of individual departments to make those suggestions and share what's been successful from one department to another."

"I hope that with a win in November, there will be a great opportunity for a change in the auditor's office," Benoit said proudly.

Prop 30 is a climate change tax for the wealthy

Editor's note: Seven propositions will be on the November ballot. The July 14 edition of the Idyllwild Town Crier had an article describing all seven propositions. Between now and the election on Nov. 8, the Town Crier will report on each proposition individually. In this edition is the second of these articles, Proposition 30, that "provides funding for programs to reduce air pollution and prevent wildfires by increasing tax on personal income over \$2 million."

Proposition 30 imposes a 1.75% tax on Californian incomes greater than \$2 million. This extra tax begins in 2023 and would end in 2043. It could end sooner if California's greenhouse gas emissions fall below certain levels before then.

The added revenue, which the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) estimates would be between \$3.5 billion and \$5 billion annually, would be earmarked for purchasing zero-emission vehicles (ZEV), constructing more ZEV charging stations, and prevention and suppression of wildfires.

Prop 30 is proposed to help the state meet its air pollution goals. For example, by 2050, emissions are to be 80% less than 1990 levels. Since transportation is the largest source of air pollution in California (50% of greenhouse gas emissions), changing the source of vehicle energy from gasoline is critical to achieving this goal.

In 2019, Gov. Gavin Newsom urged the California Air Resources Board (CARB) to develop a plan to eliminate gasoline-powered vehicles. Last month, CARB approved regulations to prohibit the selling of new gas-powered vehicles by 2035. Over the next 10 years, the percentage of new gas-powered vehicles sold in the state must gradually decline to zero in 2035.

Prop 30 is intended to enable this shift to occur. Electric cars are expensive. Subsidizing their purchase for low- and middle-income households would hasten achieving the goal. Higher-income households will have tax incentives to reduce their cost of purchase.

In July, Mark Baldassare of the Public Policy Institute of California reported that more than 70% of Cali-

fornia's likely voters believe it is a "... good thing that a majority of voters can make laws and change public policies about environmental issues by passing initiatives."

Nearly 63%, mostly Democrats, are early supporters of Prop 30. Baldassare did caution that this survey was in July, months before the election, and addressed the proposition's concept, not its specific language.

Nearly 80% of the new revenue would be targeted for communities with high pollution or low-income households. For example, most of the rebate funds would be directed to low- and middle-income families.

Besides individuals driving to work or shopping, California's other large vehicular polluter is the new taxi ridesharing industry — Uber and Lyft. In May 2021, CARB approved a regulation requiring that they begin electrification of their California fleets starting in 2023. The agency noted, "Though rideshare vehicles are a relatively small portion of California's vehicle fleet, they often travel many miles beyond the average of other vehicles, so electrifying them can provide significant environmental benefits."

Senate Bill 1014, approved September 2018, requires that rideshare companies operating in California meet annual greenhouse gas emission and electrification targets. By 2030, rideshare companies are to produce zero greenhouse gas emissions. Electric vehicles must be the vehicle for 90% of the miles driven by their operators.

Consequently, Lyft sees Prop 30 as a means to help it achieve this mandate. Lyft has donated millions to support the approval of Prop 30. In its review of Prop 30, the LAO agreed.

With CARB's issuance of the new regulations eliminating gasoline-powered vehicles, the LAO analysis noted that Prop 30 "... would not have much effect on the total number of ZEVs driven in California. This is because the ZEV mandate would already require a significant increase in the number of ZEV sales, even without the additional spending."

However, it would shift some of ZEV buyers' added costs to high-income taxpayers. And this has created a

split in the Democratic Party support for Prop 30. In a television ad opposing Prop 30, Newsom said, "I need to warn you about Proposition 30. One company's cynical scheme to grab a huge taxpayer-funded subsidy. Don't be fooled ... Prop 30 is a Trojan horse that puts corporate welfare above the fiscal welfare of our entire state. Vote 'No' on Prop 30."

Some recent polling suggests Newsom's message is switching support against Prop 30. Last month, George Skelton, Los Angeles Times political columnist, wrote, "It would be a boon for Lyft and other ride-hailing outfits because the state has ordered them to use zero-emission vehicles for 90% of the miles they drive by 2030. Lyft has been Proposition 30's bankroller ..."

The committee supporting Prop 30 is titled, "Yes on 30: Clean Air California, a coalition of state firefighters, working families, rideshare companies, and environmental groups." As of Sept. 7, the Secretary of State reports that the committee has received \$15.6 million in contributions and spent \$14.4 million. Its cash balance is \$2.2 million.

Of the contributions, Lyft has given \$25 million. Cal Fire Local 2881 has given \$25,000, but that was a loan as was the \$50,000 donation from the California State Electrical Workers Association.

The committee "Vote No on Prop 30" had not filed an official report as of Aug. 1; however, it has posted contributions greater than \$5,000 since then. Total contributions in the past seven weeks exceed \$9.7 million and 25 contributions have been \$100,000 or more.

Three venture capital investors — Michael Moritz of Sequoia Capital, Mark Heising of Medley Partners LLC and William Fisher of Manzanita Capital — and Catherine Dean of Govern for California have given nearly \$1 million each. Many of the other donors are venture capitalists, too.

Mental hygiene workshops continue

From 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 24, the Butterfield Amphitheater will host the second of six Community Mental Hygiene Workshops, "Finding Our Resilience in a Time of Crisis and Rapid Change." The focus of the series is not on treating mental illness but on developing coping strategies for a changing world, and building a community that supports healthy individuals.

The workshop series is another project of the Idyllwild Forest Health Project and its offshoot, Mountain Communities Mutual Aid. The series, organized by Robyn Winks (LMFT) will, each Saturday through October 22nd, bring a different mental health professional to help participants "gain healthy, updated coping skills and practices to thrive during challenging times."

Local therapist Cindy Brooks, LMFT, SEP, will facilitate "Live Like a Mountain; Reconnect with Self, Reconnect with Others, Reconnect with the Natural Environment." She also will address "Experiencing Grief as a Natural Process." Brooks said, "This gathering offers participants the opportunity to understand grief is a natural process and it is essential to acknowledge and honor our pain during difficult times in order to live full and expansive lives."

Asked about using the outdoors in her workshop, Brooks said, this "... connects [to] my topic by getting outside, connecting to the natural environment. We will do activities that involve the outdoors, so this will be a perfect location. We will circle up on the stage."

From 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday at Town Hall, Dr. Tima Ivanova, LMFT, will assist children and teens to engage in ways "that will increase their

self-knowledge and self-acceptance, as well as help build trust and healthy boundaries with other peers and participants."

Ivanova described the first session for the Crier. "We did all kinds of activities: painting rocks, dancing with bubbles and expressing feelings with movements; drawing scary things and talking about triggers of fears; the older kids wrote a story about something that is scary (the story was also funny); one of the kids taught us how to breathe and relax; we played hide and seek and practiced standing still. The kids had a lot of fun and they bonded with one another ..." Parents and guardians wishing to

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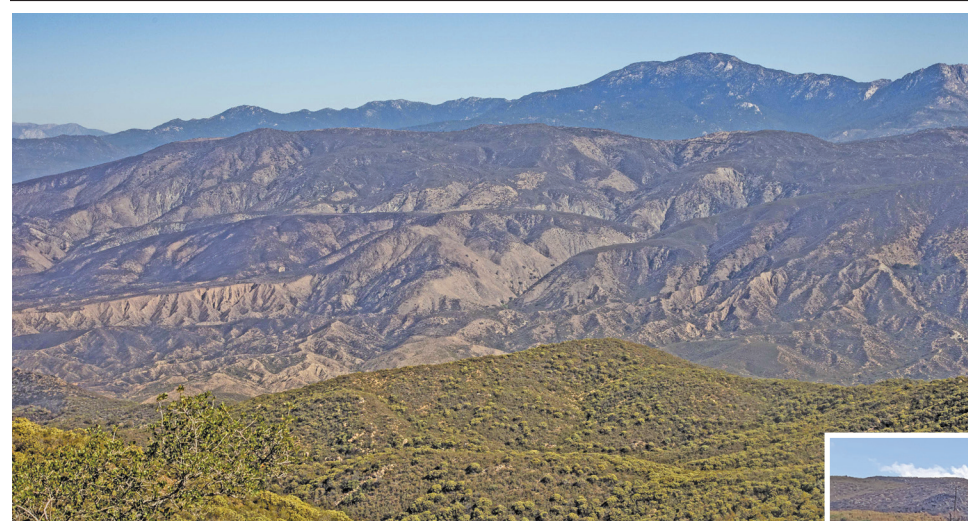

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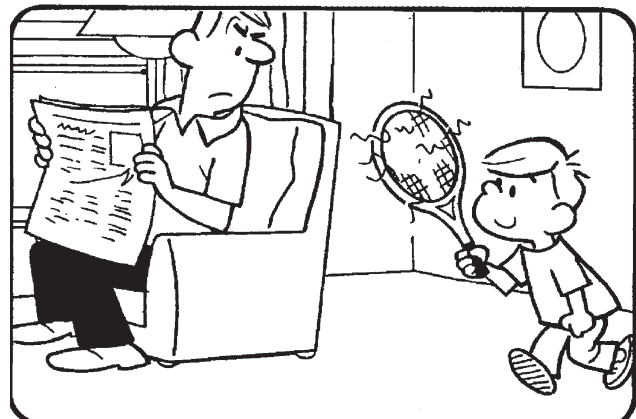

Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival this weekend

This weekend will mark the inaugural season for a new Idyllwild event, the Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival. It is a project of the Manhattan Chamber Players (MCP), three of whose members will perform, augmented by a roster of guest artists. This first year, two concerts are scheduled: Saturday, Sept. 24, at a home on Middle Ridge Drive, and Sunday, Sept. 25, at St. Hugh's Episcopal Church.

Readers may well ask, "Manhattan in Idyllwild?" But the festival has deep local roots: two of the three visiting MCP members bear the name "Speltz," a family well known locally as the nucleus of much chamber music making. Brendan (violin) and Brook (cello) Speltz will be joined by their father, Idyllwild resident David Speltz, who like Brook, plays cello. David's wife, violinist Connie Kupka, also will perform.

Co-Artistic Director and Violist Luke Fleming responded to the Crier's questions by email: "Because we will have four cellists present at the festival, which is somewhat unusual, the programs are really built around the incorporation of multiple cellos into a chamber setting. The programs will indeed be 'heavy' with cello: The Manhattan Chamber Players are focused on music for ensembles a little larger than the duos and quartets that are more commonly heard. They will perform a quartet, but have programmed several string quintets, a quintet for string quartet and piano, and a piece for three cellos and piano. The two string quintets feature second cellos. They have also added several all-cello items to Saturday's program, ranging from Bach's 'Jesu Joy of Mans Desiring' and a fugue by Handel to 'The Stars and Stripes Forever.'"

TC: "Why Idyllwild?"

LF: "The reason for Idyllwild is the strong connection the Speltz family has to it. They have been doing concerts on their own lawn in Idyllwild for many years, and I personally have been a performer on these concerts and have been to visit their home there numerous times as a good friend and colleague of their two sons, Brook and Brendan."

Brendan filled in more detail about that: "For my family, Idyllwild is the home of homes. We've had a cabin for me and my siblings' entire lives, and it remains a special place where gatherings of all varieties for friends and family have taken place over the years. For example, every new year's eve we host a group of musicians and friends to read chamber music late into the night to ring in the New Year."

TC: "MCP has done its Crescent City Festival (in New Orleans) that involves community outreach (schools, seniors, etc.). Is that the plan here?"

LF: "For this inaugural season, our only concert plans are the two ones listed on the website. Moving forward, we may be able to expand into more in the area in subsequent years and seasons, but this year is really more exploratory. There is no specific association of the festival with Idyllwild Arts Academy, but Brendan Speltz and his brother, Brook, both performers on this season's concerts, attended the academy as children."

TC: "Is there any connection to the Idyllwild Arts Academy?"

BS: "Because both my parents (festival participants) taught at the chamber music program every year at the Idyllwild Arts Summer Program (they even participated as young students themselves!), my two brothers and I (one of whom is a cellist at this year's rendition of the festival) started at the Idyllwild Arts Summer Program as toddlers and continued every year into adulthood. We started at the youngest of all multi-arts programs at the Children's Center and eventually worked our way all the way to concertmaster and principal positions in the festival orchestras. To say that it was an essential experience for us in our growth toward becoming professional musicians would be a massive understatement!"

Both concerts include a Boccherini quintet. Boccherini was a pioneer in using two cellos in quintets. His early classical or "galant" style is full of innovative sonorities and is sometimes called repetitious, but this repetition is delightful and comforting to the listener. Many of his quintets, including Sunday's D major, were published in alternative versions with a guitar instead of a second cello.

TC: "Will the Boccherini quintet include a guitarist?"

LF: "We will be performing the two-cello version of the Fandango Quintet, not the more commonly performed and better-known guitar quintet version."

TC: "Can you give any info about your guest artists?"

LF: "The guest artists performing during the festival are various friends and colleagues of ours that we perform with regularly throughout the normal concert season. Brendan, Brook and myself are the only roster members of the Manhattan Chamber Players performing, but the other performers are also wonderful, and are some of our favorite frequent performing partners."

TC: "The program seems a balance of very accessible (Boccherini, and the Schumann is pretty sunny except for that funeral march) and 'elegiac' music: Popper's 'Requiem' and 'Shadows Lengthen,' also about loss. Any thoughts about the program?"

LF: "Chris Rogerson, [composer of 'Shadows Lengthen'] beyond being an exceptional composer, is also a good friend and colleague of Brendan, Brook and myself. 'Shadows Lengthen' was written for and premiered by MCP on our very first concert shortly after our founding in 2015. He composed it while at the bedside of his grandmother, who died during its composition."

Each concert is free with a \$20 suggested donation.

MCP is hoping to make the Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival a yearly event, and seeks support to do so. Readers may donate to the Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival through the Manhattan Chamber Players, a 501(c)(3) organization.

Doors open at 3 p.m. Saturday at Pearlman Mountain Cabin, 52820 Middle Ridge Drive, with an optional tour of the house (on the National Register of Historic Places). A pre-concert talk and Q&A begin at 3:30 p.m. with music at 4 p.m.

Doors open at 1 p.m. Sunday at St. Hugh's Episcopal Church, with pre-concert talk and Q&A at 1:30 p.m. and concert at 2 p.m.

Deer season opened on a quiet note with 68 bucks taken on the first weekend. District Ranger John Gillman reported the opener was one of the quietest on Forest Service record.

60 years ago - 1962

No measurable rainfall was recorded in Idyllwild all summer long.

55 years ago - 1967

"Idyllwild has been host this month to a distinguished and infrequent visitor from afar," Dorothy Bryant confided to her readers. The visitor: the Rosebreasted Grosbeak.

50 years ago - 1972

A Piper Cub crash landed in the mountains between Idyllwild and Hemet but the pilot walked away uninjured.

45 years ago - 1977

Hill residents were seeing a lot of logging vehicles. Golden Bear Logging Company had been hauling away thinned trees for two months. The company created the Strawberry Fuelbreak.

40 years ago - 1982

Following a long-distance telephone outage, several local resi-

dents expressed concern about the Hill being cut off from emergency services. Because of this concern, Idyllwild residents were told by an official at General Telephone that a direct telephone line to Hemet would be installed at the Idyllwild Fire Station in case of such emergencies.

35 years ago - 1987

Immediate water conservation measures were requested by the Idyllwild Water District because of a dramatic decrease in water availability. Customers were asked to restrict their use of water in irrigating plants and washing their cars and driveways.

30 years ago - 1992

Mike Hamilton, University of California biologist and director of the James San Jacinto Mountain Reserve, returned from a three-week trip to

Russia and the Ukraine where he helped map the area of the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant Disaster. He also helped set up a computerized educational system for government and city officials about the levels of radiation.

25 years ago - 1997

Idyllwild Chamber of Commerce members selected a new director of Town Hall. Lori Swenck was selected to start her position on Oct. 1.

20 years ago - 2002

CDF named Kevin Turner division chief in charge of prefire management for Riverside County. He had previously been assistant chief of the Bautista division.

15 years ago - 2007

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors appointed Stanley Sniff to succeed Sheriff Bob Doyle,

who had announced his retirement.

10 years ago - 2012

Pine Cove Water District was about to receive more than \$330,000 in federal money. At a board workshop, General Manager Jerry Holldber told the board he had received confirmation that the district's applications would be accepted.

5 years ago - 2017

A recent spate of business break-ins, such as at Fairway Market and the American Legion, raised concerns among local residents. Locals began seeking a private security alternative to fewer sheriff patrols.

1 year ago - 2017

At 97, former Miss America Jo-Carroll Dennison of Pine Cove on Sept. 13 published her memoir, "Finding My Little Red Hat."

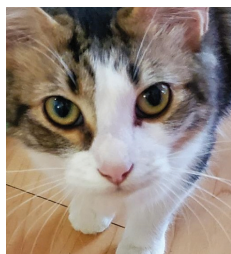


