



State eliminates supervisors from redistricting decisions — Mandates a citizens redistricting

On Sept. 18, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 1307 which creates a County of Riverside Citizens Redistricting Commission, similar to the 2020 California Citizens Redistricting Commission. The state group redrew the boundaries for the Board of Equalization, Congress, state Senate and Assembly, following the 2020 Census.

commission

Assemblywoman Sabrina Cervantes (AD 60), a Democrat representing Corona, Eastvale and a portion of Riverside, introduced Assembly Bill 1307 in February 2021. But it was not until this January, after the county supervisors approved a redistricting plan, that the Assembly held hearings on the bill.

It passed both state houses in August with nearly a 75% majority.

After Newsom signed the bill, Cervantes said in a press release, "This failure of a majority of the Board of Supervisors to protect the voting rights of our Latino community illustrates why we needed to create an independent citizens redistricting commission to draw fair maps for Riverside County."

Cervantes' bill was patterned after laws in 2012 and 2016, respectively, created independent citizen redistricting commissions for San Diego and Los Angeles counties. Proposition 11 in 2008 created the State Citizens Redistricting Commission.

Her bill creates a 14-member commission to redistrict supervisorial districts following the 2030 Census and each future Census. Commission members must be county residents and registered either as no party preference or with a party affiliation for the previous

The commission's composition should be close to the party affiliation or no preference percentages in the county.

During the prior 10 years, commission applicants may not have served or run for any political office at the federal, state or local level. Further, official office staff or campaign staff are also prohibited from seeking a commission seat.

Qualified applicants will be selected as commission members based on a lottery that the county auditor controller must conduct. Each supervisor's district must have at least one resident on the commission.

Districts must comply with the U.S. Constitution and have "reasonably equal populations" except where deviations are needed to comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

The commission must comply with California's open meeting law (Ralph M. Brown Act) and hold at least seven meetings of which at least one will be held in each supervisory district.

In 2019, the Legislature passed a bill giving counties with a population of greater than 400,000 the ability to establish independent re-

Short-term rental community meetings

Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington is hosting two community meetings to discuss short-term rentals (STRs), one in Idyllwild and one in Temecula.

districting commissions. However, Newsom vetoed that Senate Bill 139 because "... local jurisdictions are already authorized to establish independent, advisory or hybrid redistricting commissions."

After the board's December vote on redistricting, Cervantes opined, "[It] violates state and federal law by intentionally fracturing compact and cohesive communities of Latino voters into multiple districts."

During the board's consideration of which map to choose, both supervisors Karen Spiegel (2nd District) and Chuck Washington (3rd District) asked the county counsel for the Executive Office Technical Committee whether the maps being reviewed met the criteria of the Voting Rights Act. And counsel replied that all the maps satisfied the Federal Voting

Nevertheless, Cervantes disagreed and said, "Assembly Bill 1307 ensures that members of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors cannot draw their own district boundaries for their own benefit, and instead places that power where it rightfully belongs — with the people. Members of the State Legislature like myself do not get to draw their own districts. Why should members of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors be any different?"

After AB 1307 was signed, in an email to the Town Crier, Washington said, "Although I believe Riverside County's redistricting process yielded a good product, there is always room for improvement. I would have liked more discussion to develop a local solution, but I support any effort to improve community engagement."

In June, the American Civil Liberties Union filed litigation on behalf of the Inland Empire United and six individuals challenging the county's redistricting decision. This is pending in federal court.

When asked if the new law might affect the lawsuit, Cervantes replied that she does not comment on pending litigation.

Monday, Sept. 19, Cervantes posted the following on her Facebook page, "The Governor signed my AB 1307 into law! An independent citizens redistricting commission will draw lines for the Riverside County Board of Supervisors starting in 2030. This will protect the voting rights of Latinos, & provide fairer maps that better represent our community."

Members of the first County of Riverside Citizens Redistricting Commission will be selected before Dec. 31, 2030, and will serve until the appointment of the first member of the

County board approves **Idyllwild Fire tax advance**

At its Sept. 20 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the request from the Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) for an advance of its property tax revenue.

IFPD requested an advance of \$400,000 from the county in July. The advance will be repaid, with interest, in December and January when Riverside County makes its first distribution of property tax receipts to the cities and special districts. The county estimated the interest would be about \$3,400 this year.

From July through the middle of December, the district's

cash flow is limited to ambulance collections because it receives no property tax or assessments during that period.

The county limits the use of the advance tax revenue to "any normal operating expense of the District included in the district's fiscal year 2022-23 budget."

The commission has requested a \$400,000 advance each year since 2016. In 2014, it was \$300,000 and in 2011, it was

California's Constitution and Government Code have provisions that allow the county to temporarily advance and transfer funds to special districts. The limit is 85% of the anticipated revenues for the current fiscal year.

Wilkerson leads next mental hygiene workshop

From 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 1, the Idyllwild Community Mental Hygiene Workshop Series continues at Town Hall with Cara Wilkerson, a licensed marriage and family therapist (LMFT). Her workshop is titled "Depression and Anxiety in Childhood, Adolescence and Adulthood: Effects on Relationships with Self, Others and Community.

The series is a project of the Idyllwild Forest Health Project and its offshoot, Mountain Communities Mutual Aid. The series continues on Saturdays through Oct. 22. Organizer Robyn Winks, LMFT, will bring a different local mental health professional to help participants "gain healthy, updated coping skills and practices to thrive during challenging times." The emphasis is on community building as an aspect of mental hygiene, rather than on diagnosing or treating mental illness.

Wilkerson specializes in treating complex trauma and post-traumatic stress disorder. She has 16 years of practice in California, Florida and Texas. She graduated Suma Cum Laude from California State University, San Marcos with a Bachelor's of Science in Psychology, and from California Baptist University with a Masters of Arts in Counseling Psychology. She also is certified in a number of alternative therapy modalities including Equine Therapy.

Wilkerson said, "The workshop will be discussion based and we will have some exercises, different grounding or relaxation exercises." She explained that depression and anxiety are more nuanced than the layperson may think, and aims to break some of the stereotypes around these two common disorders and the people who suffer from them.

She describes depression as a dysregulation within mood. "The symptoms may include social withdraw or isolating, harboring negative beliefs about self, lethargy, helplessness, hopelessness — there are so many different ways people at different ages cope, manage and get treatment."

TC: "Most people might not think of that complexity."

CW: "Sometimes depression affects how we see ourselves, sometimes how we see the world. People will distrust the world or isolate, withdraw from it. It is important to individualize it in view and treatment."

Wilkerson explained that anxiety also is more complex than commonly thought.

CW: "I am also going to cover different forms of anxiety. Within anxiety there is generalized anxiety, panic, social anxiety, trauma, phobias."

TC: "All those are contained in anxiety?"

CW: "They are all affecting our nervous system in a way that is dysregulating to our nervous systems. I am also going to touch on separation anxiety; I've noticed a lot of that since COVID. I will deal with how that affects adults and children differently; with kids it often occurs with their caregiver; with adults it can be separation from family, children, animals etc."

Cara also shared that she was born and raised in Idyllwild. "My family goes back generations here. I went to Idyllwild







Democrat Brian Nash vies for state senator

Editor's note: On Nov. 8, the state's general election will be held. Voters will choose a state senator for District 32, which includes the Hill. As a result of redistricting after the 2020 Census, there is no incumbent in this race. The two candidates are Democrat Brian Nash and Republican Assemblyman Kelly Seyarto. The Town Crier interviewed each candidate and both stories appear in this edition of the paper.

Brian Nash, the 42-year-old Democratic candidate for the state Senate District 32 seat, lives in Murrieta and is a Michigan native. After high school, he worked and eventually he and his wife, Nancy, headed to New Hampshire. There he graduated from Southern New Hampshire University and earned a master's in business administration Brian Nash, candidate for degree from Indiana University before moving to Califor- state Senate. nia for work.



"It's an amazing experience. Living in California is new

and a lot of fun," Nash said beaming.

He has been traveling the district to meet voters, to learn local issues and to seek support. But this is his first race for elective office and he said, "I'm an introvert at heart. This is pulling

The first page of his website (https://electbriannash.com/) identifies three issues: mass shootings, Roe v. Wade, and the effect of housing, health care and inflation on families.

In response to the question of why mass shootings is one of the critical issues on his list, Nash said, "The state Senate can help produce policies that govern the state. I want to help write laws governing guns in California. I want to challenge the status quo. This can happen anywhere, like it did in San Bernardino [which occurred in 2015]."

With respect to the U.S. Supreme Court's "Dobbs" decision, which changed its Roe v. Wade decision, Nash stressed, "I am appalled. It is really unfortunate and not in line with the

Thelieve is not my place as a politician to tell a woman what to do," he added.

And he is a firm advocate for a single-payer health insurance system. Since most working individuals have some form of health insurance through their employer, he argues that converting to a single plan would save money.

"Currently, we are paying a middleman and this money could go directly to hospitals or doctors. With 40 million people [California residents], the cost saving would mean no need to skimp on the plan if implemented well," he contends.

Climate change is another issue for which Nash has strong feelings. He is worried about the future so he supports Gov. Gavin Newsom's actions to modify climate change.

In particular, he agrees with the recent Air Resources Board decision to phase out the sales of new gasoline vehicles by 2035. But he does disagree with Newsom's opposition to Proposition 30, which would tax incomes greater than \$2 million and use the money to help establish the electric vehicle culture and wildfires. Newsom argues that Prop 30 is simply a subsidy for Lyft to replace its vehicles.

"I'm not sure why he singled out Lyft. Much of the funds, 80%, goes back to shifting society to electrical vehicles," Nash argued. "This will be a positive benefit on the climate."

If the state is going to shift to electric vehicles, Nash acknowledges that we'll need much more electricity. He wants to see solar, wind and, possibly, new and safer nuclear plants become the source of this needed supply.

He agreed with Newsom's recommendation to keep open the Diablo Canyon nuclear plant in San Luis Obispo County.

He noted that just three to four days after the California Air Resources Board (CARB) issued its regulation to begin reducing gasoline-powered cars in favor of electric, the state had to urge electric car owners to reduce charging because of the potential electric shortage due to the fires and extreme heat.

In a recently released Stanford University study, as the number of electric vehicle owners grows, more charging stations will be needed and it urges charging vehicles during the day,

"Nuclear power is extremely efficient when it works well," Nash stated. He would favor construction of new and safer plants while phasing out the older ones such as Diablo.

But Nash has said numerous times, education is the top issue of this campaign. To Balletpedia, he explained, "As the child of a teacher and principal, I know how important a good education is for people to be able to get where they want to go in life. I will vehemently advocate for both better funding for educators, and more options for our learners."

On his website, he stresses that teachers are overworked and underpaid, and open to conpre-college curriculum.

Nash also advocates changing the state tax system. He believes the system favors the affluent. "Our tax system is not structured in equitable ways. For example, the wealthy have ways to reduce taxes, like hiring an accountant, that lower income folks don't have," he argued.

"We need to update the tax structure rather than simplify components. We need to mediate the gap between highest and lowest earners," said Nash, describing his goal for the tax system. "It's extremely difficult for anyone making the minimum wage to get ahead."

Seyarto seeks move from Assembly to Senate

Kelly Seyarto lives in Murietta with his wife Denise. Besides helping Denise raise three daughters, he was a firefighter for 35 of his 62 years. In 2015, he retired as a battalion chief for Los Angeles County

During his firefighting career, he also served as Kelly Seyarto, candidate for a Murietta Council member and mayor. In 2020, he state Senate. was elected to the California Assembly to represent the 67th District, which stretches from the Temescal

Valley east to south of Hemet. It includes Murrieta, Menifee and Wildomar. California law limits an individual's opportunity to serve in either the Assembly or state Senate to 12 years. Consequently, Seyarto accepts that he will not have the opportunity for three Senate terms. "We knew going into [the race] it was po-

tentially two terms." He accepts this limitation because he believes he can be more effective for his constituents in the 40-member Senate rather than the 80-member Assembly.

As a former firefighter, Seyarto understands what State Responsibility Areas are and how Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service and local fire agencies must work together to reduce the risk of wildfires and to suppress a fire if one starts.

Consequently, he would like to see more emphasis on vegetation management to reduce the risk of major fires. "We need more protection on state and federal lands," he stated. "Over the years, maintenance has dropped, now there is too much fuel. Fire breaks are environmentally unpopular, but we need them now."

Seyarto introduced Assembly Bill 380 to address some fuel reduction issues. "One major issue occurs when fuel reduction contracts [are being developed] by any agency. The [California Environmental Quality Act] can sometimes be frustrating. And it may take years and years to get the contract through," Seyarto asserted. "Sometimes you can't wait that long."

While it didn't pass the Legislature, he hopes its chances will improve if he is elected to the Senate. He also wants Cal Fire to identify critical fuel-reduction projects each year that need to be completed soon and would qualify for these ex-

While a critical issue, wildfires are not the only issue that attracts Seyarto's attention. He has identified many issues (https://seyartoforsenate.com) he believes are important this year. These include energy policy, water storage, homelessness, and education and schools.

With respect to energy, he sees the lack of generators as one of the major problems. "On the horizon, there is an increase in the amount of consumption. But we're making policies that decrease the number of generators."

Since the state policy is to replace gas-driven cars with electric vehicles, Seyarto argues, "We can't take Diablo offline. That would be absolute devastation for charging electric vehicles. We don't have enough generators to accomplish the

In a recent Stanford University study, a conflict with future transportation policy and electricity generation policies was described. In the future, as electric vehicle ownership grows, the demand for power will increase. But as the electric grid shifts to renewable sources, especially solar, it will be easier and safer to charge electric vehicles during the day rather than nighttime. Currently, most electric vehicle owners charge at night at home.

And this perception of "unintended and conflicting consequences" characterizes his position on many policies. As an Assembly member, Seyarto sees how the Legislature's actions can affect individual's pocketbooks. "They are getting hit hard in the wallet. At the state end when creating policies, are we adding to the cost-of-living since not everyone benefits from these actions, but all of us pay for it through taxes?" he noted.

Water policy is another example of these conflicts. The state is not building storage facilities as quickly as necessary to avoid a potential crisis, he believes. He stant criticism. He also favors alternative school paths, such as trade schools, rather than just a added, "We know we're susceptible to the drought, but we are not updating our storage systems nor looking for other sources of water supply such as desalina-

> Unfortunately, he averred, 'We can't do nothing which is what we're doing now."

> Understanding policy consequences influences his views of all legislation, especially homelessness. He believes strongly that the problem needs more work from charitable organizations and legislation that addresses the "root cause."



Prop 31 affirms 'No' to flavored tobacco

Editor's Note: Seven propositions will be on the November ballot. The July 14 edition of the Idyllwild Town Crier had an article describing all seven propositions. Between now and the election on Nov. 8, the Town Crier will report on each proposition individually. In this edition, the third of these articles, Proposition 31, is a "referendum on the 2020 law that would prohibit the retail sale of certain flavored tobacco products."

Proposition 31 is asking Californian voters to approve or to reject implementing Senate Bill 793, which was enacted in 2020. This law did not go into effect because a referendum on it had qualified for the ballot. "When a referendum on a new state law qualifies for the ballot, the law is on hold until voters decide whether to put it into effect," the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) explained.

A "Yes" on Prop 31 will make SB 793 effective. SB 793 bans the sale of tobacco enhanced with flavors, such as fruit, coffee and spices, including menthol. This applies to cigarettes, e-cigarettes, pods for vape pens, tank-based systems and chewing tobacco.

Its intent, based on research about how and why young people become smokers, was to reduce the incentive and ease to begin smoking with flavored products.

The Federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) can also regulate cigarettes, smoking paraphernalia and associated tobacco products. And in September 2009, the FDA banned cigarettes with flavored tobacco except for menthol.

On April 28, the FDA proposed a ban on menthol in cigarettes. Comments on the proposal were accepted through Aug. 2. A final regulation has not been issued.

When SB 793 was being considered, opponents emphasized the ban on menthol would discriminate against black communities, whose smokers use menthol cigarettes more than other communities.

On July 28, a coalition of black legislators, doctors, public health advocates and activists came together to express their views in support of Prop 31, the American Lung Association reported.

The group endorsed a statement from Erica Costa, advocacy director for the American Lung Association in California: "We know that the tobacco industry has long targeted communities of color, and the LGBTQ+ community. Proposition 31 seeks to end the sale of flavored products, including menthol. Voting yes on this measure would save lives and protect young people from getting hooked on nicotine. We strongly encourage voters to vote 'Yes' on Proposition 31 this November so that these deadly products are remove from shelves for good."

Supporters see flavored tobacco products as an enticement to youth to become lifetime smokers. They argue that 80% of kids who use tobacco began with flavored products. In California, the cities of San Francisco and San Jose have already enacted bans on flavored tobacco and the Los Angeles ban on the sale of these products goes into effect Jan. 1, 2023.

As of Sept. 21, Nash has not filed a campaign financial report with the California Secretary of State. "I've kept my contributions very low. There's already too much money in politics."

While he said he has a few backers, including he and his wife, those contributions have not risen to a level to require an official report.

"I haven't looked for [contributions] and I'm not tied to any corporation or PAC," he said adamantly. "I'm trying to do the right thing."

While keeping his campaign coffers small, Nash's Republican opponent, Assemblyman Kelly Seyarto, spent \$60,000 on the primary and had \$178,000 in cash available on Aug. 1. Since then, he has garnered another \$46,000, including \$9,700 from Cal Fire Local 2881.

While the state Democratic Party has endorsed Nash, it has provided little financial support. In comparison, Democratic candidate for the 47th Assembly District Christy Holstege has received more than \$170,000 from the state party since Sept. 6.

Opponents argue that there are already state and federal laws banning the sale of cigarettes to minors. If these existing laws are ineffective, then banning flavored products are not likely to be more effective. Therefore, this law discriminates against adults who would prefer flavored products. It especially discriminates against African Americans who tend to favor menthol cigarettes.

In an August guest editorial in the Orange County Register, Jon Coupal, president of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association, wrote, "Although the law bans the sale of flavored tobacco products to all customers regardless of age, lawmakers named it the 'Stop Tobacco Access to Kids Enforcement Act.' They claimed it was needed to stop underage tobacco use — because only kids, apparently, like flavor. To be sure, no one wants children smoking or vaping, but it's already illegal in California to sell or give tobacco and vapor products to anyone under the age of 21. If prohibition worked, then we wouldn't have a problem."

Enactment of Prop 31 is likely to reduce state revenue from tobacco taxes, according to LAO. "Proposition 31 likely would reduce state tobacco tax revenues by an amount ranging from tens of millions of dollars to around \$100 million annually. (Last year, state tobacco tax revenue was about \$2 billion.)" These revenues support health care, early childhood and medical research programs.

The amount of the loss depends upon whether tobacco consumers switch from flavored to unflavored products (less loss) or totally stop tobacco use (greater revenue loss).

In a Sept. 12 editorial, the Los Angeles Times said, "But it's revenue we'd be happy to lose if it reduces nicotine addiction

Opponents argue that there are already state and federal and the costly health problems associated with tobacco use."

The Times editorial supports Prop 31: "Proposition 31 doesn't criminalize flavored tobacco, as opponents suggest. It prohibits stores and vending machines from selling flavored vapes, cigarillos and menthol cigarettes and levies fines on retailers who ignore the ban, but use or possession would not be prohibited."

On Aug. 25, in a San Diego Union-Tribune guest editorial, Tom Hudson, Mike Genest and Julian Canete opined in opposition to it, "Proposition 31 is adult prohibition. Proposition 31 would enact a sweeping new ban on menthol cigarettes, flavored smokeless tobacco and other flavored non-tobacco nicotine products for adults over the age of 21. Prohibition has never worked. It didn't work with alcohol or marijuana, and it won't work now."

As of Aug. 1, supporters of Prop 31 had \$2.2 million in cash for the final three months before the election. Since March 2021, Michael Bloomberg had given more than \$4 million supporting its enactment. The Kaiser Foundation Health Plan had given slightly more than \$1 million. Since Aug. 1, the committee has received about another \$500,000, half of which came from the California Teachers' Association.

The committee supporting a "No" vote on Prop 31 had about \$63,000 in cash available on Aug. 1. Total contributions through that date were \$15.1 million; however, many from tobacco companies such as R.J. Reynolds and Philip Morris were in the form of loans. Since then, contributions have increased. For example, on Aug. 19 and on Sept. 15, Philip Morris USA Inc. gave \$207,000.

Water board meetings during September

Here is a summary of recent Hill water district activity:

At their Sept. 17 meeting, Fern Valley Water District directors unanimously approved a non-budgeted cost of \$60,000 to upgrade 10 fire hydrants from 3-inch post to 6-inch commercial. This will cover a quarter of the remaining 40 hydrants to upgrade and required a revision to the Capital Improvement Proj-

In public comments at their Sept. 21 meeting, Idyllwild Water District (IWD) directors heard from local tree authority Deborah Geisinger about the need to remove what she called invasive cedar trees because they consume so much more water than native species. She said, "I promise you the creeks will start running again." Since it was not an agenda item, President Charles Schelly asked her to bring a presentation back to the board for a future agenda item. Water loss dropped to about 10% versus 19% last month.

IWD General Manager Leo Havener reported that he has sent feelers to Idyllwild Arts about purchasing property for the new wastewater treatment plant but had not heard back.

The board approved a revised employee manual 4-0 with Director Les Gin absent. The primary change was that employees who were hired since Jan. 1, 2019, will be at-will instead of contract employees.

At the Sept. 14 Pine Cove Water District meeting, General Manager Jeremy Potter reported that the crew has begun "well head protection and maintenance on all the wells."

He also said a retesting of wells that had tested high for lead show they all are below the maximum contaminant level now.

Lake Hemet Municipal Water District (LHMWD) General Manager Mike Gow reported at the board's Sept. 14 meeting that the California Regional Wa $ter\,Quality\,Control\,Board\,sampled\,Lake\,Hemet\,on\,Aug.\,18\,for\,cyan obacteria$ and its associated cyanotoxins. Although toxins were not found, he wrote that the state recommended "advising the public to not swim since the toxins can be harmful to pets and people if ingested."

An off-Hill development called The Boulders with about 360 single family homes is proposed within LHMWD but will need to satisfy the district's ordinance regarding water shortage restrictions to be able to receive service, as well as sewer and traffic issues. The proposal has not been submitted to the county.

Noer and Jimenez take over managing ICC programs

The Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) board has hired a new recreation and program director and an assistant director. The duo will manage programs at Town Hall and ICC's

Speaking with ICC President Stephanie Yost and her two new team members at Town Hall, the impression is that their jobs change every day, and that this is one of the main appeals of the position.

SY: "Since we hired Will Steichen (ICC's previous recreation director) in 2019, the job duties have expanded considerably because we've added more programs and acquired new facilities to care for. So, we now have two people to take his place. Will is leaving to pursue his master's degree at UCLA. It seemed like a good time to look at adding the assistant direc-

TC: "How have the Idyllwild Community Center programs at Town Hall grown?"

SY: "We have expanded our child care program. We have expanded our Fit After 50 program. We have taken on managing the Farmer's Market. We became the local affiliate for Feeding America (monthly free food distributions). The Summer Concert Series has expanded over time. Once the renovation of Town Hall was completed (in 2020, we didn't really reopen until 2021) we have had many more rentals; local nonprofits (like the Actor's Theater, the Art Alliance and Rotary) and businesses, families holding parties and weddings, retreats and conferences. The same with the amphitheater.

Recreation and Program Director Bridget Noer moved here from Hemet about 10 years ago to work at Ferro, but has many connections on the Hill going back further. She was a Girl Scout leader.

Assistant Director Emily Jimenez has been here for 22 years, growing up on the Hill. She was a camp counselor and "horse wrangler" (official title) at Camp Ronald McDonald in Mountain Center. She also credits her efforts in mounting the recent fundraiser to repair the Idyllwild Skate Park as getting her into the position. Yost commented that this provided "an opportunity to see her organizational skills as well as her commitment to the community. Both women, in their paid work experience, and in the community service sense, have a tremendous amount of experience interacting with the community and understand the importance of customer service. We interact with the community constantly and take a very customer-centered approach to providing services to the community."

A Big "Thank You" to the Sheriffs and Firefighters

The Fairview Fire is under control - now we can relax again.

All the years, I lived in Idyllwild, we never experienced such high winds. After them, the heavy rain was welcomed by all.

Life has been very challenging for a number of years. Feeling shut and boxed in made us very impatient and irritable.

While the fire was raging, the Sheriffs were seen in numbers to protect Idyllwild. Seeing them, made me feel safe and protected. They contributed to our calmness. We are so blessed to have them!

Another "Big Thanks" goes to Ken Dahleen. The concerts he put together were loved by all and helped to forget difficulties for a while. I was moved to hear the Marine Band. They

made me feel so proud to be an American and what we stand for.

We love Idyllwild - there is no better place for us.

Thank you again - we love you.



All three seem to love the variety of duties that fall to them. Over and over the words came out: "Every day is different." Another phrase was "super exciting."

BN: "Some days it's just opening and locking doors. Yesterday we had to climb into the tube slide to remove graffiti. While we have a full-time maintenance man, things come up all the time that need to be taken care of quickly. We ask, 'Can we do it?""

Yost wanted to underline the extent of ICC's footprint and responsibilities now. In addition to Town Hall and the Butterfield Amphitheater, they also manage the ICC Playground, the Skate Park, the Dog Park and the Pickleball Courts. All this as progress continues on the construction of the new Community Center itself. "It's a lot of places to take care of."

BN: "They each have their own little area that needs to be

SY: "These two certainly have a lot to do. We've just finished Summer Camp and the kids are back in school. A lot of our focus is now on after-school programs and youth sports."

EJ: "We have 12 [soccer] teams. Organizing it was something I'd never done before. It was really cool to be on this side of the field. There are three divisions, each with four teams; a division for 4 to 6 year olds, one for 7 to 9, another for 10 to 13.

There are over 100 kids in the program."

Jimenez's duties with the sports program included "registration, working with the coaches scheduling practices and games, ordering shirts and equipment, and maintaining existing equipment and working with Idyllwild School. "We do a contract with the district to share the top field," she said.

BN: "This has to be coordinated so there are no conflicts with their programs. We submit an electronic schedule to HUSD; it has to be approved by several different people be-

TC: "You are becoming monsters of organization!"

BN: "There is always so much going on. It's fun, even if you get pulled into so many different directions every day. Everything needs to be well-organized and planned."

SY: "They also need to be prepared to help other staff with eir iobs if we are down a person.

Yost explained that both director and assistant are completing their Fit After 50 certification so they will be able to step in if needed, and they already fill in with the child care programs. Yost also mentioned the on-the-job training the pair underwent to smooth the transition:

SY: "The pair had a chance to shadow Will Steichen for three weeks before he left to see what he did. Even with all that time, new situations and questions come up regularly and they're doing a great job stepping into their new roles. They

just did the Feeding America food distribution for the first time without Will.'

BN: "It went well. We're very thankful that all of our programs in place are running very smoothly. We just need to keep that forward momentum."

TC: "What else can you tell our readers about this new step for you?'

BN: "Out of all the places to land work-wise on the Hill, this opportunity presented itself and we're very fortunate. We're very happy to be here and look forward to adding more programs and events over time."

ŠY: "We have a good, strong team to maintain our existing programs, and as we build out we have more programs and events in the planning stage. It's exciting to have people who use the facilities have a voice, and it's great to have their input

BN: "We were at the Skatepark yesterday, just 'tearing it up." [Note to readers, this means exerting themselves and not performing demolition.]

SY: "We had a number of applicants for the position, over a dozen. The hope at ICC was to find one or more solid candidates who were local; with such variable hours and so much community interaction we thought this would be the best fit. We're delighted to have Bridget and Emily on the ICC staff team."

When the recent Fairview Fire activated emergency plans on and around our mountain, Town Hall took on another of its many roles, opening its doors to those suffering power outages. ICC President Stephanie Yost explained:

"The Idyllwild Community Center has had a contract with SCE since the completion of Town Hall in summer of 2020 to be a cooling/warming/charging center in the event of a power outage because we have a generator there. Edison has used it several times when weather (wind, snow, ice) threatens our power on the Hill. They notify ICC within 24 hours of their intended usage of Town Hall when there is a possibility of an outage, and they bring small emergency kits, water and snacks to hand out to those in need."
