Two hooded thieves victimize Pine Cove Market

At about 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 20, Pine Cove Market was entered by two, young-appearing men wearing hoodies cinched up tightly around the fronts of their faces. (See security photo.)

Clerk Liz Ratcliff, a four-year Hill resident, told the Town Crier the young men expressed interest in some of the products displayed on the front counter inside a clear case. They picked out expensive tobacco, vaping and CBD products totaling about \$450, which Ratcliff placed in a store bag. She said they had asked her to put the items in the Champion backpack one of them carried, but she told them she couldn't do that. Suddenly, one of the men grabbed the store bag off the counter, and the two of them bolted out the door, without paying

At no time did either of the young men display or refer to a weapon, Ratcliff said. She then called 911 for the Riverside County Sheriff's Department and eventually gave a sheriff's deputy a full report of the incident over the phone. The market remained open for business, closing at 9 p.m., as usual.

Pandemic years take toll on education progress

Monday, Oct. 24, was a big day for education administrators and possibly for the election in two weeks. The California Department of Education released the student scores from last year's statewide assessments and national results from a separate testing set also were released.

The overall message was "recovery is occurring." The COVID pandemic's effect on schools and teaching methods was sad. The statewide 2021-2022 scores in English language and mathematics remain below the scores from 2018-2019, the year before schools were shutting because of COVID.

However, the recovery in many areas is hopefully seen in the improvement of this year's results compared to 2020-2021.

"California focused on keeping kids safe during the pandemic while making record investments to mitigate learning loss and transforming our education system," said Gov. Gavin Newsom in a press release after the testing results were released. "While California's students experienced less learning loss than those in most other states during the pandemic, these results are not a celebration but a call to action — students are struggling academically and we need to keep getting them the resources they need to thrive ..."

Nationwide the results were similar. The U.S. Department of the Education reported, "A majority of states saw scores decline for fourth and eighth graders in mathematics and reading between 2019 and 2022, according to the latest results from the National Assessment of Educational Progress [NAEP]."

And in the Hemet Unified School District (HUSD),

results were the same. The percentage of students meeting or exceeding standards on the English language arts portion of the 2022 assessments was 30.7%, nearly 6.7% less than 2019 results of 37.4%.

Board imposes new moratorium on new STRs until September 2023

At the Oct. 25 meeting of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, Ordinance 449.252 (a Temporary Moratorium on Short Term Rentals [STRs]) was approved unanimously. The board has now imposed a moratorium on issuing new STR certificates within the Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Mountain Center neighborhoods, and the Temecula Valley Wine Country. This moratorium will extend for 10 month and 15 days and expire Sept. 9, 2023. It was passed with a minimal amount of board discus-

On Sept. 13, the board approved a 45-day moratorium on issuing new STR certificates in these areas. That moratorium was to have expired on Oct. 28 unless extended. The moratorium does not prohibit operating STRs that have already obtained a coun-

However, Ordinance 449.252 also requires that the Planning Department prepare and submit a report to the board before any action on the moratorium, such as extending or letting it lapse, occurs. This report must also be submitted at least 10 days

Extending the moratorium is intended to give the Planning Department staff more time to develop possible changes to the STR Ordinance 927, which will directly address the significant problems identified in Idyllwild and the Wine Country, according to Planning Director John Hildebrand.

The next step moving forward will be for staff to continue working with those two communities to craft phase 2 amendments to the ordinance which would look at some kind of framework for those limitations on STRs, and coming up with a density or a limitation of some kind and a mechanism for allowing new [STRs] when the threshold goes below that," he said.

He also stated that the planning staff would continue to have community meetings that could include industry representatives. Within six months, he promised a report back to the board.

After slightly more than an hour of public comment, the board discussion lasted about 10 minutes before the vote.

3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington began with an appeal to his colleagues to approve the extension. He also stressed that the planning staff needs more time to address the problems some STRs have created in these two 3rd District communities. "This is not a permanent moratorium," he emphasized.

Idyllwild man sentenced for two felonies

An Idyllwild man pleaded guilty to two felonies in Riverside County Superior Court July 29 and was given probation of 36 months.

Roman Brandon Cordova, 20, was arrested on three felony charges of conspiracy to commit a crime; second degree robbery; and grand theft on July 27 on Sanderson Avenue in Hemet. The crimes occurred at Home Depot on Monterey Drive in Rancho Mirage and at Lowes on Monterey Drive in Palm Desert on April 29.

He pleaded guilty to filed charges of grand theft over \$950 and robbery. His bail was set at \$40,000. He was jailed with the Riverside County Sheriff's Department for 25 days; and was ordered to pay restitution to the victim; not to associate with any unrelated person he knows to be on probation, parole, mandatory supervision or post release community supervision; not to leave the state without obtaining written permission from the parole department; not to own, possess, have under his control or have access to any firearm, deadly weapon, ammunition or weapon-related paraphernalia or incendiary device; maintain gainful employment or attend a full-time school or vocational program; among other things. He also must stay 100 feet away from the two stores.

Son to be sentenced for father's death in 2021

Sentencing has been set for Tuesday, Nov. 22, in the case of an Idyllwild man found guilty of shooting his father to death.

Riverside County Sheriff's Department deputies responded to a call Wednesday, Feb. 10, 2021, at the 53000 block of Country Club Drive in Idyllwild to find Adrian David Denava, 50, of Idyllwild, deceased. The incident occurred about 10 p.m.

The department said Denava senior "appeared to have been shot." Adrian Denava Jr., 24 at the time, was located and arrested after fleeing the area.

Denava junior was charged with second degree murder and pleaded not guilty. His bail was set at \$1,000,000. He is still being held at Southwest Detention

On Monday, Oct. 31, he pleaded guilty to felony voluntary manslaughter and admitted to using firearm.

Denava senior was released from Southwest Detention Center Jan. 5 after being arrested Dec. 13, 2020, and sentenced on two felony charges. He also was a registered sex offender.

RCPH website now shows Idyllwild-Pine Cove as being 29% unvaccinated

A few weeks ago, we reported that the Riverside County Public Health Department (RCPH) was informing the world via internet that — at "79% unvaccinated" — Idyllwild-Pine Cove was, by far, the most COVID unvaccinated community in our entire county. That was a shocker, and it turns out RCPH's report was inaccurate.

As we reported last week, the fault came from RCPH's procedure of not counting the vaccinations of people who gave only post office box addresses on the half-page form they filled out at the time of vaccination, which is what most Hill folk would do.

After several discussions between the Town Crier and RCPH personnel, the agency agreed to re-examine and adjust its figures. The RCPH website now shows that Idyllwild-Pine Cove is 29% unvaccinated, a reduction of 50 percentage

points from the original estimate published over the internet.

As of Tuesday morning, Nov. 1, the Hemet Unified School District dashboard reported two students and no staff members currently with COVID at Idyllwild School, and Hemet High reported two students and one staff member. Hamilton elementary reported no students or staff members, while Hamilton secondary reported no students and one staff member with COVID.

He also encouraged the staff to establish stakeholder groups including industry so that "folk could talk about how we arrive at something we can all live with."

"These communities need some special attention," Washington told his colleagues. "How do we carve out some additional framework within 927, so 927 which nesses can't find employees." we already passed can be most effective to achieve what we want?" he added.

With Washington's motion to approve the extension, the board voted unanimously to approve it.

Public comment

During the public comment period, 10 speakers were from Idyllwild. Actually nine spoke; the 10th could not unmute their phone.

"When is 'enough' enough!" Then he offered the answer, "Enough has already happened ...

"While Idyllwild is a vacation destination, it does not make the entire town eligible to be taken over by vacation rentals," he said, imploring the board to enact the moratorium. He also hopes that during this time the community, including both sides, can come together and find a solution giving both sides something.

"Please give us time to come together as a community to find solutions that will take time, that are reasonable and giving both sides something," Feingold said ending his comment.

One of several new attendees at the board meeting, Marsha Kennedy also spoke in support of the moratorium. In her view, "STRs are crippling Idyllwild businesses. Employees can't find housing and that means busi-

While she believes residents are also suffering from the number of STRs, she did advocate an alternative solution, "Long-term rentals are what Idyllwild needs!"

Molly Cozens, who with her husband moved to the Hill several years ago from Seattle, was another fervent supporter. Because of the number of STRs on her Idyllwild street, she said, "There was more of a community feeling in the city of Seattle.'

Several other speakers, some experienced and sever-Joel Feingold was the first and he asked the board, al speaking out for the first time, encouraged the board to extend the moratorium.

> However, Alex De Cordoba was less enthusiastic about the moratorium and tightening regulations for STR operation. He and his family have recently purchased a second home in Idyllwild. He said he hopes to become more involved in the community.

> However, he stressed that they could not have afforded the purchase if they were not allowed to offer it as an STR

occasionally. And he added, fortunately he did obtain a STR certificate before the moratorium was implemented.

'Please respect the rights of all property owners," he stressed. "If getting more [long-term] rental properties is the goal, let's have public housing."

Winter 2022-2023 will be a re-run of past two winters

In late October, the National Weather Service (NWS) issued its forecast for this year's winter — December through February.

For the third consecutive year, La Niña patterns will continue in the Pacific Ocean and influence weather on the mainland. With no surprise, that forecast looks like a repeat of the previous two winters — 2021 and 2022.

In Southern California, including the Hill communities, higher-than-normal temperatures and lower-than-normal rainfall are most likely based on the NWS computer models. However, during the past two winters, rainfall has reached about 60% of normal, according to Alex Tardy, meteorologist at the NWS San Diego Öffice.

La Niña conditions are defined by abnormally colder water in the central and eastern tropical regions of the years in the past 125 years; however, by 1975-1976, Cal-

and drier conditions across the southern U.S.

"Drought conditions are now present across approximately 59% of the country, but parts of the Western U.S and southern Great Plains will continue to be the hardest hit this winter," said Jon Gottschalck, chief of the Operational Prediction Branch at the NWS's Climate Pre-

The drought conditions in Southern California will continue and perhaps worsen, according to the NWS forecast. The drought will continue to expand eastward this winter to the Mississippi Valley.

Southern California is entering its third consecutive year where La Niña is influencing our weather. Three consecutive La Niña winters have previously occurred twice since this data has been collected.

The first was from fall of 1973 through the winter of 1976 and the second began during the winter of 1998 to 1999 and ended in early spring of 2001.

Interestingly, 1973-1974 was one of the wettest rain Pacific Ocean. The result creates a pattern of warmer ifornia experienced its sixth driest year in the period. terthis year," he added.

During the second La Niña triumvirate, the first two years had below-average precipitation and the third year was the 29th driest.

Unfortunately, the current trifecta began with the


driest year since 1895, followed by the 17th driest. "La Niña conditions remain in place in the Pacific Ocean and its influence continues to contribute to the temperature and precipitation outlooks through the upcoming winter months into early spring 2023," said Gottschalck.


NWS forecasts that the chances of La Niña or El Niño will drift to equal by the months of February to April

Of course, the forecasts are the result of the models' predictions of the probability that rain will fall or temperatures rise. However, Tardy has noted that 2010-2011 was a La Niña year. Unexpectedly, it turned out to be one of the wettest ever in Southern

"But the models still show odds favoring a dry win-

Monday. Woman killed in single-vehicle collision

An Aguanga woman was killed in a single-vehicle collision last week.

Heather Wilson, 30, was driving a red 1999 Dodge Durango westbound at about 12:05 p.m. Friday, Oct. 28, on Highway 74 about 7 miles west of Palm Canyon Dr.

She was the solo occupant of the vehicle traveling at an unknown rate of speed, according to California Highway Patrol (CHP) Officer Jason Montez, who said there were no witnesses who came forward at the time of the crash.

For unknown reasons, Wilson swerved to the left and then crossed over the center divider line, swerved to the right and lost control of the vehicle, hitting the guard rail on the side of the roadway. The vehicle rolled and Wilson was ejected with no seat belt. Valley Auto towed the vehicle.

In other CHP reports on the mountain, two vehicles were traveling westbound on Highway 74 at 12:10 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 24, and sustained minor damages.

Stephanie Jackson, 52, of Madison, Alabama, was traveling westbound on Highway 74 1.2 miles west of Morris Ranch Road in a white 2022 Chevy Malibu at about 45 to 55 mph. Vartan Nazerian, 53, of Los Angeles, was traveling in a white 2019 Toyota Tundra at the same speed behind her when he moved into the eastbound lane to pass the Malibu. After passing, he moved back into the westbound lane but the rear right of his vehicle clipped the front left of the Malibu.

Both parties drove to the side of the road with minor damage to their vehicles and no injuries.

At 6:35 a.m. Friday, Oct. 28, a 15-year-old male from Pine Cove was riding a green Diamondback mountain bike at an unknown speed southbound on Highway 243 south of Foster Lake Road when he allowed the bike to travel off the main portion of the road. He lost control with the bicycle landing on its right side and he landing on the road's shoulder.

He was transferred to a hospital with suspicion of having a serious injury.

A similar outcome is seen in the mathematics results. In 2019, 22.3% of HUSD students met or exceeded the standard. In 2022, it declined by 6.5% to a total of 15.8%. Idyllwild was not an exception. Its 2022 scores also declined from the 2018-2019 results. In 2022, nearly half the students met or exceeded the English and literacy standards, but in 2019, more than 60% achieved this result. And the decline in mathematics was almost 15%.

'Although the Smarter Balanced Assessment System tests are only one measurement, at one point in time of student achievement, we recognize the important role they play in helping our school district identify areas of growth and focus in the areas of math and English," said HUSD Superintendent Dr. Christi Barrett. "For many students, the last time they took a summative assessment test was in the spring of 2019 — over three years ago. Throughout the last three years, our district has sought to support students and families in many areas, including social-emotional and mental

health supports, as well as hybrid and online learning." For 2022, Idyllwild scores are good compared to the entire HUSD, but less so compared to the whole state. For example, 17.1% of Idyllwild students exceeded the standard for English language and literacy compared to sic level increased only 9.4% in the entire district, but statewide, 20.4% of across both subjects students exceeded the standard.

And nearly half of Idyllwild students met or exceeded this standard, whereas only 30.7% of HUSD students did and 47% of students in the state accomplished this.

Similar results are seen in mathematics testing. Statewide, 16.1% of students exceeded the mathematics standards. In HUSD, it was only 4.7%; but 12.4% of Idyllwild students exceeded this standard.

Combining students who met the standard with those who exceeded it, nearly 33.5% of Idyllwild students achieved those levels. Statewide the total was 2022. 33%, but in HUSD, the combined percentage was 15.8.

"The results show the profound toll on student learning during the pandemic, as the size and scope of the declines are the largest ever in mathematics," said Peggy G. Carr, commissioner for the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).

Specifically in Idyllwild School, more than 55% of both the fourth and eighth grade students met or exceeded the English language and literacy standards. But 63% of the eighth graders were either slightly below standard or just didn't meet it.

In none of the six grade levels were more than half of the students able to either meet or exceed the mathematics standard. Schoolwide, 66% of the students were not able to meet the standard. That includes 77.8% of the fourth grade students and 80% of the eighth grade stu-

"As a school and staff, we are diligent about understanding the snapshot provided by the recent test scores. Although the results represent the first time these students took the SBAC test, we believe that the scores provide helpful information that can support our efforts of improvement," Idyllwild School Principal Timothy Poseley said in an email to the Town Cri-

"Since 2019, the district has added one literacy-focused teacher along with two paraprofessional support staff to assist students in meeting grade-level expectations," Poseley added. "Additionally, Idyllwild School provides targeted support services based on both academic and social/emotional assessments. A central tenant of this approach is to consider the needs of the whole student as a function of overall student achievement."


National results evinced similar declines between 2019 and 2022. The percentage of students performing below the NAEP ba-

met math in 2022

and grade levels. In reading, the percentage of fourth graders below the basic level increased from 34% in 2019 to 37% in 2022, and the percentage of eighth graders below basic increased from 27% in 2019 to 30% in

Mathematics results for below the basic level showed similar increases from 2019 to 2022. The NAEP basic level is the least stringent of the three achievement level goals for American students that are set by the National

Find at least six differences in details between panels.





Assessment Governing Board.

There were no improvements in mathematics in any state or large urban district, and eighth-grade mathematics scores declined in 51 participating states and jurisdictions since the assessment was last given in 2019, according to the NCES press release.

Statewide, 47% of students met English language arts standards, 33%

The proportion meeting English language arts standards dropped 4 percentage points from prepandemic levels, while the number meeting for math dropped 7 percentage points.

Second San Jacinto 50k trail race is a success

Ultra endurance runners from across the country gathered in Idyllwild Saturday, Oct. 29, for the second-annual San Jacinto 50k trail race. The course covered 34 miles of rugged terrain including (with intervening descents) over 10,000 feet of elevation gain. The race was again organized by desert physician and running enthusiast Alex Charmoz and his wife Liliana, and the route was the same as last year, starting at Cowbell Alley at 7 a.m. and visiting Tahquitz Peak (twice), San Jacinto Peak and Suicide Rock.

This year the race required a qualifier: Each runner had to prove they had competed in a race of 50k or more with 8,000 feet of elevation. Thus, although last year's race included many participants who did not finish before the 12-hour cutoff, this year out of 40 runners, only one did not finish.

The best time overall was claimed by George (Jorge) Torres with 6:44:01. Torres, a 2002 NCAA cross-country champion and a 2006 U.S. outdoor champion for the 10,000 meter, competed with the U.S. track and field team in the 2008 Olympics and has since transitioned to marathon running.

The Crier was unable to reach him for comment, but we did get a note from the woman with the fastest time, Jade Belzberg of Sedona, Arizona. Belzberg's time, 7:57:10, was fifth overall.

Boulder, Colorado, at 7:10:08, and third, Eric Lee, (also from Boulder) at 7:22:05. Top females besides Belzberg were second place Kiana Newmann with 9:32:33 and and friends to run this race next year.'

third place Brooke Rose of Riverside with 9:56:26. Rose finished first among women last year, with a time of

Last year's first place, Rod Farvard, still holds the record at 6:01:14. Two Idyllwilders were included in the results, Kevin Cadeux (33rd, 11:10:14) and Christopher race like this: stocking the aid stations. "It's really hard Kruse (36th, 11:45:13.)

Belzberg was also speedy enough with answering the Crier's request for comment that we are able to let her describe the race for our readers: "The race was beautiful! I traveled out to the race from Sedona, Arizona, because I knew the course would be beautiful and, especially attractive to me, quite challenging.

"In the first half of the race, the course brought us up and over Tahquitz Peak, then toward the summit of San Jacinto. I found the altitude difficult but did my best to run as much of the trails as I could. I summited San Jacinto at just after 9 a.m. around mile 14 and stopped for a minute to take in the views. I had previously hiked Cactus to Clouds, and so had been to the top before, but having ran it in a race was even more exciting.

"I think we lucked out with the weather this year; while cold at the start, the day warmed up nicely and actually felt quite warm during the latter stages of the race and particularly while climbing up and over Tahquitz Peak the second time. I even saw a large black rattlesnake on the trail in the final few miles (I made a detour around him.)

"Race Director Alex and his wife, Lily, put on such Other top runners included second, Guy Love of a terrific event. I'm so thankful for them and the volunteers that made this possible. While I know this needs to stay a small event, I plan on encouraging my husband

Last year Alex, told us: "Each aid station was fully stocked with chips, candy, fruit, sports drinks and water to help the runners get to the finish line. It was a massive effort to get these supplies miles into the backcountry. Volunteers carried at least 5 gallons of water each along with personal hiking gear, tables, jugs for water and food to these aid stations.'

After the race, Alex reported, "We had a really smooth day out there logistically, partly due to having Riverside Mountain Rescue Unit (RMRU) on scene. You can give some credit to Caleb Milner for getting his team involved."

Alex is an emergency room physician at Eisenhower Medical Center and Liliana is a yoga teacher. Alex added, "I've been running trails and competing in ultrarunning events for the past three years up here. These trails are close to my heart and I wanted to show them off to the running community."

New card for CalABLE members

Account holders and their authorized legal representatives can choose to receive a card, which can be requested at the time they open the account or any time afterward. Account holders can load funds onto the card by logging into their CalABLE accounts, requesting an ACH withdrawal and selecting "U.S. Bank Solutions Premier Visa Card" as the target account.

This new card is an improvement of the previous prepaid card CalABLE offered. Account owners or their representatives can request cards, view their card balance and make transactions all from the CalABLE website. 

Charging stations coming to I-10

Last week, Caltrans approved spending \$2.9 million to install Zero-Emission Vehicle charging stations at various safety roadside rest areas on Interstate 10 in Riverside County near Banning and Blythe and in San Bernardino County near Yucaipa. Completion date is tentatively May 1, 2024.

"This allocation – which includes a significant federal investment – allows Caltrans and our local partners to continue building the equitable, sustainable, and safe transportation system on which future generations will depend," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares.

The funding came through Senate Bill 1 of 2017. No completion date was given by press time.

Worker's comp will be required

Starting Jan. 1, 2023, concrete (C-8), HVAC (C-20), asbestos abatement (C-22) and tree service (D-49) contractors will be required to have workers' compensation insurance, regardless of whether they have employees, according to the The Contractors State License Board (CSLB).

The new requirement is the result of CSLB-sponsored Senate Bill 21 Gov. Gavin Newsom signed into law Sept. 30, 2022. The bill also requires that all contractors — with or without employees will need to have workers' compensation insurance by Jan. 1, 2026.

CSLB research confirms that many of the approximate 50 to 60% of licensed contractors who currently claim an exemption to workers' compensation insurance do use employees.

This problem creates an unfair competitive disadvantage for law-abiding contractors who are subject to higher business costs and puts employees and the public at risk for workplace injuries.

Consumers may verify a contractor's license status and whether a contractor has workers' compensation insurance at https://www.cslb.ca.gov/OnlineServices/CheckLicenseII/Check-License.aspx.


