


Almost all election winners determined

As of Tuesday morning, Nov. 15, in Riverside County about 94,000 ballots from Election Day Nov. 8 remain to be counted. About 10,000 of these ballots are provisional. Based on total ballots already counted and the uncounted ballots, turnout in Riverside County appears to have been about 41%.

While the leaders from election night have changed in some races, since Thursday the leaders have remained the same.

Local representatives

The local Congressional race for District 41, which includes the Hill neighborhoods, had national implications. After the initial ballot count Tuesday night, Democratic challenger Will Rollins had a 9,000-vote lead over incumbent U.S Rep. Ken Calvert. By Thursday morning, Calvert had taken the lead from Rollins and it has slowly but steadily grown. With about 177,000 votes cast, Calvert's lead is about 5,500 votes or 51.6% of the counted votes.

After Monday night's vote totals were posted, the Associated Press called the race for Calvert. Earlier in the evening, Calvert had issued his own victory press release, saying, "I want to thank the Riverside County voters for once again choosing me to be their voice in the

U.S. House of Representatives." And later that night, Tom Emmer, chair of the National Republican Congressional Committee, issued a concurrence, "Congratulations to Ken Calvert on his reelection. Californians know Ken is an experienced leader who will always fight for them. I look forward to our

continued work together." Prior to the release of Monday evening's totals, Rollins' team said they "remained optimistic." With thousands of ballots still to be counted, they are expecting these to be dominated by Democratic and Independent

voters who favored Rollins. In this district, the number of registered voters is 463,351 and turnout, based on ballots counted, has been about 39%. Total county turnout appears to be about

41%, including the uncounted balances. This was a very competitive race. Both candidates collected more than \$3.3 million in contributions by Oct. 19. Data for the weeks leading up to Election Day have yet to be reported.

Which party will have a majority of seats in the 118th Congress was still undecided as of Monday morning, so the results of California's 41st District are likely to help Republicans regain control of the House of Representa-

This attention was manifest when the House Committee on Administration sent several staff to observe

the ballot counting.
U.S. Rep. Zoe Lofgren of California is the committee's chairperson and said in her Nov. 9 letter to Riverside County Registrar of Voters Rebecca Spencer, that the observers were only to collect information in case there might be a challenge to the results that the full House would have to consider.

Caution was raised before Nov. 8 when Jason Gagnon of Calvert's staff contacted the committee. "Prior to Election Day, our office indicated to the Minority Staff of the House Administration Committee that we were interested in having someone from the House Election Observer Program present during the canvass here in Riverside County. The House of Representatives holds the final constitutional authority to determine the winner of the election of its members, so it is vital that the Committee of jurisdiction has the facts and information See Election, page A4

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) continues to rate Riverside County as a "low community level" location with regard to COVID. Candidate thoughts on the election and results

In contrast to the months of campaigning, when candidate statements, ads, television promos were nearly omnipresent, since Election Day, Nov. 8, the silence and tranquility have been noticeable. Much of this is attributable to the closeness of so many races — nationwide and local. Determining the ultimate victor is taking more time than in past elec-

However, as the vote totals increase, more decisions are being made and candidates are speaking out, some with press releases and one in an interview with the Town Crier. This is even true especially for local races affecting the Hill communities.

Assembly District 47

Christy Holstege leading her Republican opponent, Greg Wallis, for state Assembly District 47 seat. Although Holstege has not been declared the victor, she has led and continues to lead Wallis.

state and legislative leaders, Holstege spoke to the Town Crier regarding the campaign and the tentative results.

"I am excited and honored," she replied when asked how she felt about the current results. "I am ready to roll up my sleeves and get to work."

As of Monday evening, Holstege, a Palm Springs City Council member and former mayor, noted that her 66,000-vote total was "more votes than the population of Palm Springs. It's quite an opportunity,"

When asked if the results had any surprises, she replied, "No, we lost in San Bernardino in the primary. It is much more Republican than Riverside, which is 76% of the district. I knew it would be close and tough to flip from red to blue."

However, the campaign took on a significant and unexpected turn. Holstege was surprised at how personal the attack ads were. She was expecting more attention directed to priorities and district issues.

"I started this campaign almost one and half years ago and reproductive rights were not an issue, but they became important," she said. Also, the LGBTQ attacks were not part of her initial campaign

She also acknowledged how costly this race was. Total spending was between \$3 and \$4 million because both state parties — Democrat and Republican — kept sending money.

> And Sen. Alex Padilla won his election to finish the term of former senator, Vice President Kamala Harris, and won his reelection for a full term beginning in January.

However, in Riverside County, the majority of voters favored the Republican candidate in all but one of these races. The lone Democrat currently getting a majority (by only 100 votes) of Riverside County votes is Padilla. The Republican advantage in Riverside County will not be nearly sufficient to offset statewide results.

The most recent statewide vote counts have not changed the results for the propositions on the ballot. Three (Props 1, 28, and 31) appear headed for approval and four (26, 27, 29 and 30) are losing.

California voters overwhelming declined Prop 27, the online sports wagering measure. So far, 83.2% of voters chose "No" for Prop 27. Its companion, Prop 26, the sports wagering on Tribal lands, garnering only 69.5% "No" votes, also appears defeated.

Prop 29, the kidney dialysis proposition, could only capture support from 30.4% of voters, the third consecutive defeat for a dialysis measure.

Prop 1, the reproductive freedom amendment to the state Constitution, received a "Yes" from 65.8% of voters. Both Prop 31, prohibition on sale of flavored tobacco products, and Prop 28, directing more funding to art and music education in schools, each garnered slightly more than 62% support.

The closest proposition contest is Prop 30, the tax on with 58.6% opposed.

The local State Assembly seat race is still close and a Democratic candidate for 47th State Assembly District, continued to lead her Republican opponent, Greg Wal-

Within Riverside County, she has a 10,230-vote lead with nearly 105,240 counted. But the San Bernardino portion of the district, which is about 30% of the total district voters, is strongly supporting Wallis. In total, Holstege's lead is 4,119 votes. Her districtwide vote total is 66,140 or 51.6%.

In Riverside County, the total ballots counted is about 44% of registered voters. Of the remaining uncounted ballots, it is unknown how many are from this Assembly district.

In other state legislative races, Eduardo Garcia, the Democratic Assemblyman, maintains a significant lead over his Republican opponent Ian Weeks for the District 36 seat, which includes Garner Valley.

Garcia's total districtwide vote count is 54.7%. Within the entire district his lead is about 6,060 votes over Weeks. Within just Riverside County, Garcia and Weeks are much closer. Only 1,067 votes separate Weeks from Garcia. In 2018, 63,000 votes were cast in Garcia's district. This year, already 67,422 have been counted with more to be counted.

The first announcement of the votes counted for the 32nd State Senate District had Republican Assemblyman Kelly Seyarto leading Democrat Brian Nash. Statewide Since election night, Seyarto has continued to build on his lead. As of Tuesday morning, he had 61.3% (about 130,550 votes) out of nearly 211,000 votes counted in the four counties which comprise the district.

Riverside County makes up about 80% of the district, which includes portions of Orange, San Diego and San Bernardino counties.

In the Hemet Unified School District race for District 7, which includes the Hill communities, former law enforcement officer Jeremy Parsons leads incumbent Megan Haley and challenger Al Fernandes. Parsons has a 383-vote lead over Haley with about 4,700 ballots counted.

In the only Riverside County office race, challenger Brian Benoit has expanded his lead over incumbent **Propositions** Paul Angulo. On Tuesday morning, Benoit had 54% of the vote and a 29,368 lead over Angulo (46%).

Earlier in the day, Benoit issued a press release acknowledging his victory. "While there are still ballots that must be processed, the current results show that we are leading with a large enough margin to officially declare victory," he said in the release.

In the race for 5th District supervisor, incumbent and board President Jeff Hewitt still trails his challenger Yxstian Gutierrez, Moreno Valley mayor, by 5,600 votes with 79,900 counted, about 31.5% of registered voters in the district.

It appears the Democrats swept the statewide races. Every Democratic candidate from Gov. Gavin Newsom and other state officials, including U.S. Senate, are still ahead. With the exception of Malia M. Cohen, Democrat for controller, all of the Democratic statewide candidates have garnered at least 58% of the vote. Cohen, with a near high incomes to fund zero emission vehicles, is trailing 597,000-vote lead, had 54.7% of vote in her race.





Visual arts theme show returns unmasked

Last Friday, Nov. 11, Idyllwild Arts Academy's Visual Arts program held an opening reception for this year's Visual Arts Student Theme Show, "Identity." Students submit candidate themes each year; teachers then narrow the field to three on which students vote. The works are thus conceived and completed in about two months.

The show's statement lays out some markers that make up identity: "What could identity mean to you? Where you're from, who you are, what you look like, who you love, what you love, what you want to be, how you are perceived by the world and the people around you." Also present in the minds of the artists is their own youth and plasticity: "How we define ourselves will change countless times over the course of our lives and, as artists, we can capture these snapshots in our artwork to look back and reflect on each stage and how we have evolved." The artist statements that accompanied each work bore out these various themes and introduced others, from the daringly personal to the technical and philosophical.

The opening reception had a festive atmosphere; last year everyone was masked up and more subdued — now the artists were mostly happy to talk about their work, and even happier to point out and praise their colleggies

Last year's juror was virtual, corresponding by internet, but this year's juror, Devon Tsuno, was in person. Tsuno is an associate professor at California State University Dominguez Hills. His vibrantly colorful, deeply layered work focuses on plant life, but contains stories about his family and heritage, and California's environmental issues. His latest high-profile commission includes four works to enliven the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's new Wilshire Rodeo station, slated to open in 2025.

The juror's choices often affirmed the casual viewer's judgment: some of these pieces had inescapable presence that impressed and arrested. Other works Tsuno singled out were subtle and understated in their mastery. The artists' statements attached to the work allow (or force) the artists to put a piece of themselves out there into the world. The statements all lined up with the work; a viewer would usually get the gist of each work (as we should) from the work itself, but it was gratifying to get confirmation from the source.

Senior Adrain Wang, who last year was awarded third place, received first honorable mention (HM) for the digital media work "Magical Live Stream" that suggests the addictive but threatening and ultimately unsatisfying nature of online life.

Second HM went to freshman Audrey Everson's hydra-headed "Personality." The digital media work presents a character made of animal, human and mechanical selves blending uneasily.

Third HM was senior Lilikoi Amlin's Goya-inspired dry point etching, "Brother and I." An unsettling, perhaps strait-jacketed, Siamese-twin clown grins at the viewer. Behind are tables stacked with papers and what might be surgical implements, invoking the artist's fear of separation. Ironically, this reporter learned, the artist has no brother, but an inseparably close friend who takes that role.

Fourth HM went to a first-year senior, Maria Barcelo Tous, for "Resilience," which combines Lino printing on acetate with ceramic. The ceramic invokes the coral that grows in the sea around the artist's native Mallorca, its fragility and resilience. It appears to be healing from a break. The prints on transparency suggest the ocean and the coral-like tangle of neurons in the brain.

Painting and drawing teacher Rachel Welch, commenting about the excitement of a student asking, "Can I do watercolor on canvas?" — the beginning of an exploration that led to Day Side's third place "The Exhaustion of Comfortability." The painting is both radiant and challenging. The watercolors remind of William Blake's work, and the seated figure seems to be tearing themselves apart, an expression of gender dysmorphia.

Second place went to sophomore Luna Lee for "Kiss the Rain," a mesmerizing, single-frame digital animation in which a figure kisses a spirit in the rain, having connected with a part of themselves.

First place went to Nil Delfin Uslu's "Thank You," one of the subtle pieces that were easy to walk by in a crowded gallery, but which are as full of detail as fingerprints. The artist's statement expresses gratitude for even the difficult experiences that have shaped their identity. The acetone transfer method allows laser printed images to be transferred to canvas where the artist can further modify and distort them.

Best of Show went to junior Jiho Kim's "Peccavi." Last year, Jiho took second place with "Reflection," another commanding oil. "Peccavi" is a work with a room-dominating presence, and its spiritual import is no less arresting. Although many works here (and in the canons) explore an artist's wounds, here the "sinner" is the artist, and they show themselves taking ownership of their selfishness. The artist stands, back turned to a prone figure seen only as booted feet protruding into the frame. They seem to be facing a moment of guilt and self-awareness. The heaviness of the moment is not without a sense of humor, as the "crime" of self-absorption is lighter than the suggestion of murder. The large canvas invites a scrutiny of its breath-taking, old-master style photo realism

Artists put a lot of thought and feeling and a lot of themselves into their work and this is a show worth checking out. The artists' statements lift the veil and let the viewer know the makers' thoughts. The Parks Exhibition Center is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday. The show will remain until Thursday,

ART'S CORNER

The prospect for the reopening of the Lowman Hall performance space to the expecting public was quite favorable this past Sunday, with mild enough temperatures and despite brisk winds and partial cloudiness. Inside, the stage itself resembled an operating theater, with a scrupulously clean setting, with only chairs and microphones interrupting a whitened, bare and illuminated circle. Nevertheless, the anticipation in the atmosphere was salutatory enough, with many of the attendees unmasked and at the ready, to welcome once again David Pelham and the "Art of the Guitar" series to the Idyllwild Arts campus.

After a short introduction by Pelham, the long anticipated return began by welcoming the Mexican guitarist Alberto Daniel Quintanilla with a varied program of well-chosen works, beginning with John Dowland's "Lacrimae Pavan" in an appropriately somber mood, which served as a display of the artist's talent as well as the hall's acoustic capabilities. Both qualities also were observed in the following piece, Mauro Giuliani's "Rossiniana #1"; fulfilling the task of presenting the craft of virtuosity as well as the fitting of operatic excerpts together.

Further artistic deftness followed in the two movements of Cuban composer Leo Brouwer's "Sonata I," with the "Sarabanda de Scriabin" paying tribute to the mystical aspects of the Russian composer, and the "Toccata de Pasquini" emphasizing the coloristic contrasts of the entire fretboard.

The two concluding offerings by Señor Quintanilla were designed to put the listener at ease with guitar sonics; in a tribute to his teacher, Rodrigo Nefthali's composition "Del otro lado del puente" ("From the Other Side of the Bridge") sent a message of calm in the midst of U.S. and Mexican border relations, and Luiz Bonfa's "Passeio no Rio" ("Walking Through Rio") provided happy relief in the composer's most popular, jazz-influenced vein.

The second part of the performance, featuring Turkish guitarist Aysegül Koca, began with a virtuoso display quite unparalleled in any location (and certainly in Idyllwild). Playing a specially tuned instrument, Ms. Koca assayed the Italian composer Carlo Domeniconi's tribute to his travels in Turkey titled "Koyunbaba," which fused the countryside's Oriental modes with a Western sensitivity, and provided the audience with an exhibition of appropriate displays of Arabic oud (or more accurately, Turkish baglama) technique; this listener could discern quarter-tone effects with relative ease.

There followed a meditative piece by 19th century composer Giulio Regondi titled "Reverie" (on regularly-tuned guitar), which gave forth a similar calmness to the overall setting after the initial display; the piece's general effect (including the tremoli sections) was of tender care, which Ms. Koca's playing demonstrated in abundance.

The remainder of her program (as was the case with the first part) was a convenient blend of classical and popular sonics; Astor Piazzolla's two vignettes of Buenos Aires in winter and spring ("Invierno Porteno") ("Primavera Portena") gave out distinct




