Talking with V. Manuel Perez, the Hill's new supervisor

One result of the 2021 redistricting of Riverside County's supervisorial districts was shifting the Hill communities — from Pine Cove south through Garner Valley — into District 4 from District 3. District 4 Supervisor V. Manuel Perez was unopposed for his reelection, consequently the Hill did not get to vote last fall for a supervisor.

When Perez took his new oath of office Tuesday, Jan. 10, Hill residents formally became his constituents along with the other 400,000 county residents to the east, all the way to the Colorado River.

While Perez may be a new supervisor to the Hill, the Hill is not new to him. As a youth, he served as a counselor at Pathfinder Ranch.

"In the summer, I spent a lot of time in Mountain Center, Idyllwild and around Hurkey Creek," he related. "My dad would take us camping at Lake Hemet and we'd go fishing. Who would have known, because of redistricting, these areas are now in my district."

Now as supervisor, Perez's district stretches from the Hill to Blythe and includes both the lowest, highest, hottest and coldest areas of the county. "These are two different worlds," he agreed. "I understand somewhat the mountain because of my youth."

But Perez did not wait for 2023 to begin getting familiar with his new areas. Last summer, he visited Idyllwild with former Hill Supervisor Chuck Washington. They toured the town, including the Community Center, and stopped at Idyllwild Fire, too.

Hill constituents with need for Perez's help or assistance may visit either his Palm Desert or Riverside offices. (For addresses and phone numbers see below).

"In the meantime, I am interested in identifying locations for listening sessions, perhaps the Community Center," Perez added. "Or potentially just hang out and

He also mentioned that he may try to find a location for an office on the Hill.

When asked if he might reestablish County Service Areas (CSA) for the Hill, since CSA 36 (Idyllwild) and 38 (Pine Cove) were dissolved in 2020, Perez acknowledged that he did not know the reasons. "I'll need to do some research. That occurred during Supervisor [Chuck] Washington's tenure and I'll have to have a conversation with him. You know sometimes they work with you and sometimes - against you."

On one major issue — short-term rentals (STR) that has overwhelmed the Hill in the past several years, Perez is well aware of the local views and has had to cast several votes on the issue during 2022.

He recognizes that the balance between personal property rights and creating a public disruption or nui-See Perez, page A4

Dry spell coming; despite storms, drought continues

Albert Hammond's 1972 lyrics were what us Easterners remember. "Seems it never rains in Southern California. Seems I've often heard that kind of talk before. It never rains in California."

But Hill residents know B.J. Thomas was closer to the truth, "Raindrops keep falling on my head. But that doesn't mean my eyes will soon be turning red. Crying's not for me, 'cause, I'm never gonna stop the rain by complaining ..."

Since Jan. 1, the Idyllwild Fire Department has recorded nearly 10.7 inches of rain and the National Weather Service (NWS) has recorded more than 13 inches at its Pine Cove/Dutch Flats

In comparison, in 1993, 9.5 inches fell from Jan. 6 through 8. Then another 5 inches from Jan. 16 to 17.

Nevertheless, the rainfall through the middle of January is more than double and far surpasses January's average rainfall of 4.97 inches.

The yearly average rain on the Hill has been about 26.2 inches. The local totals are already approaching half the annual rain. Optimistically, this year's rain may reach the long-term average.

But December 2021 was a very wet month with high snowfall. However, little precipitation occurred in January and February, and the drought worsened.

Last week, the NWS reported that Anaheim, Riverside and San Diego have all received, at least, 75% more than the normal rain in January and, at least 70% of the total for a normal rain year (Oct. 1 through Sept. 30).

While the rain is needed for crops, forests and people, so much in a short time can have devastating consequences. In California, since the deluge began after Christmas, more than 20 people have died from flooding, mudslides, rockslides or, even, trees falling.

Consequently, both the state and federal governments have taken steps to help the recovery. On Jan. 4, Gov. Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency for all of California after the first wave of storms and another week was expected. On Jan.9, President Joseph Biden declared a state of emergency exists in California and ordered federal aid to supplement state, tribal and local recovery efforts in areas which were affected by severe winter storms, flooding, landslides

These counties have been included in the declarations so far: El Dorado, Los Angeles, Mariposa, Mendocino, Merced, Monterey, Napa, Placer, Riverside, Sacramento, San Bernardino, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo Santa Barbara Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Sonoma, Stanislaus and

The state has granted some relief for tax payments. Business owners and taxpayers who have been affected by flooding, power outages and other storm-related hardships caused by the spate of these winter storms are now eligible for emergency tax relief from late payment interest and penalties. They may also request up to another three months to file their tax returns. [See accompanying story.]



State and feds offer some tax relief to storm victims

affect taxpayers — individuals and businesses — affected by these storms. Riverside County is included in these declarations. Below is information on what is possible and how to obtain more information.

California emergency tax relief

nia's winter storms are now eligible for emergency tax relief from late payment interest and penalties.

Impacts of the storms have been felt throughout the state, and small-business owners who have been affected by flooding, power outages and other storm-related hardships may request up to another three months to file their tax returns. Taxpayers who face return deadlines between Jan. 4, and Jan. 31, 2023, who are granted relief will not have to pay interest and penalties if they are unable to file their returns and pay taxes and fees by the original due date.

"Help is available for California businesses," California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDT-FA) Director Nick Maduros said. "If you cannot file or make a payment on time because of the storms, please reach out to us, and we can offer some relief."

Federal tax information

Following the disaster declaration issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, individuals and households affected by severe winter storms, flooding Business owners and taxpayers impacted by Califorand mudslides who reside or have a business in [the affected counties] qualify for tax relief.

> The declaration permits the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to postpone certain tax-filing and tax-payment deadlines for taxpayers who reside or have a business in the disaster area. For instance, certain deadlines falling on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before May 15, 2023, are granted more time to file through May 15, 2023.

> As a result, affected individuals and businesses will have until May 15 to file returns and pay any taxes that were originally due during this period. This includes 2022 individual income tax returns due on April 18, as well as various 2022 business returns normally due on March 15 and April 18. Among other things, this means that eligible taxpayers will have until May 15 to make 2022 contributions to their IRAs and health savings accounts.

> The May 15 deadline also applies to the quarterly payroll and excise tax returns normally due Jan. 31, 2023. Also, penalties on payroll and excise tax deposits due on or after Jan. 8, and before Jan. 23, will be abated as long as the tax deposits are made by Nov. 22, 2023.

CDC COVID recommendations for Riverside County

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) continues to rate Riverside County among the "low community level" counties in the country. CDC recommended actions for low community levels are: "Stay up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccines. Get tested if you have symptoms. Wear a mask if you have symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19. Wear a mask on public transportation. You may choose to wear a mask at any time as an additional precaution to protect yourself and others."

On Tuesday, Jan. 24, the Hemet Unified School District dashboard reported one case of COVID among students and two among staff members at Idyllwild School. Hemet High reported one student and no staff members with COVID, while Hamilton elementary reported no students and one staff member with COVID. Hamilton secondary reported two students and two staff members with COVID.

If an affected taxpayer receives a late filing or late payment penalty notice from the IRS that has an original or extended filing, payment or deposit due date that falls within the postponement period, the taxpayer should call the telephone number on the notice to have the IRS abate the penalty.

The IRS automatically identifies taxpayers located in the covered disaster area, and applies filing and payment relief. But affected taxpayers who reside or have a business located outside the covered disaster area should call the IRS disaster hotline at 866-562-5227 to request this tax relief.

taxes and fees by the original due date.

This year, it is more likely that normal precipitation conditions will return. A week ago, NWS predicted an 82% chance that the current La Niña weather pattern will dissipate between late February and April. If so, then normal weather patterns will return.

By normal, many people are focusing on a diminishing drought and its consequences. Lots of rain has fallen and at higher elevations the snowpack is well above the norm for the middle of January. As of Friday, Jan 20, the average snowpack level for all of California is 240% of the average for this date and, in just Southern California, the snowpack is 283% of average.

On Jan. 17, NWS reported 4 inches of snow in er parts of the West Idyllwild, 6 inches in Pine Cove and almost a foot on Mt. San Jacinto.

However, in October, NWS forecast for winter precipitation read, "... drier-than-normal conditions are most likely along the southern tier of the U.S. from California eastward to the southern Plains and Southeast with the greatest likelihood for southern Texas.'

While all this precipitation is helping to refill the state's reservoirs and snowpack is at historic levels for this time of year, the drought has not been eradicated. Scientists estimate that this is the driest drought in more than 1,000 years.

"These storms have not ended the drought," said Water Operations Manager Molly White for the State Water Project. "Major reservoir storage remains below average, and conditions could turn dry again this winter, offsetting has not been overrecent rain and snow."

When rain falls it seeps into the ground or runs off in of little rain, creeks and rivers. Man has tried to modify these results by ating a millennial constructing dams and reservoirs to capture the runoff before it pours into the ocean. But filling them and recharging groundwater takes time and even more rain.

The Lake Shasta and Orville reservoirs are currently at 53% and 55% of capacity. Four months ago, in October, both were at 32% of capacity. Diamond Valley Lake is at er but intense long periods of wet soggy weather. Some-61% of capacity and 84% of its average volume for January.

Some argue that the state has not done enough to address the opportunities to capture the rain runoff and save it for the drought periods. However, the Public Policy Institute of California has noted, "Since 2000, California voters have approved eight water bonds dedicating \$27 billion to various water projects ... Proposition 1, the 2014 water bond, allocates \$7.5 billion to address California's drought-challenged water system across seven project categories. Of this total, \$4.1 billion has already been spent ... Funding for new water storage projects — which involve long lead times — has been the slowest out the door; just over \$150 million of the \$2.7 billion authorized has 2 weeks (will help with storm recovery without melting been spent, though most remaining funds are now earmarked for seven qualifying projects."

The latest NWS comment on the drought was released last week. "The long-term drought continues across California, the Great Basin and parts of the Pacific Northwest. However, a barrage of atmospheric river events streams of moisture in the atmosphere that transport water vapor from the tropics — has reduced the drought intensity over the past few weeks. In California, 1-category improvements were made along the Northern Coast, around the Delta and along the South Coast region. While precipitation over much of the state was over 300% of normal over the previous 2 weeks (2 to 12.5 inches, depending on location), deficits have been years in the making. While this last round of rain has helped return smaller res-

ervoirs to the historical averages, many of the larger reservoirs still remain below the historical average for this time of year. Historically, long-term drought is interrupted by a period of abnormally wet weather. However, it's too early to tell if the wet weather is enough to end the drought. Many othalso saw improvements to drought abnormally

dry areas." In other words, the drought has been significantly mitigated, at least, for the next several months. But if dry and arid patterns return in the spring, as happened in 2022, the drought come. 

Drought chart as of Oct. 17, 2022.



winds will occur ... There are indications of a pattern shift that could bring more precipitation to the state by the end of the month," the Sunday forecast said. 

New smart water meters coming to Pine Cove

Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) Board of Directors met last week with the main item a presentation from representatives of Smart Earth Technologies, (SET) the company proposing to update Pine Cove's valves. The board unanimously approved the proposal.

The smart meters will replace the district's 1,117 mechanical meters. Nick and Robert Gallegos of SET, based in Carlsbad, made a presentation to the board. SET produces automatic metering and shut-off valves, and the software to integrate the systems into water districts' computer systems. The valves are made in Germany, but all electronics are "made here in the U.S., including the circuit boards. They are printed, soldered and sealed all in the U.S., so supply chain is not an issue for us." One director later asked if "any of this is made in China?" The answer was that individual generic electronic components may be, but that everything is assembled in Georgia.

Meter reading at PCWD is currently a semimonthly job that takes two people two and a half days to complete, according to Office Manager Becky Smith. Nick described the advantages of automation: "It allows you to automatically read the meter (from the home office) and operate the valve ... The software has a dash board that users log in to and configure — one just for billing, one for out in the field monitoring and surveillance."

The valves appear on a map of the district as little circles, green for normal, red for problems. The system allows great flexibility for how unusual activity is flagged for investigation. "You can set up parameters that say, 'Let me know and flag a read if it's 200% over last month.' So if a meter doesn't read right it will turn a circle red ... If you expect a lot of fluctuation you can open up that parameter so it's not false flagging stuff. You can always take a look before sending billing out. You can also ask homeowners to let you know, if there is no one there, to flag any usage at all. That way you can catch a leak or broken pipe immediately," said Nick.

There is a customer side, too. Customers will be able to monitor their water usage from anywhere they have access to the internet. The data is transmitted from the valves to the district office through cellular technology, but not exactly the same as we use for phones. One board member asked, "Will elevation or trees interfere with transmitting the data?" Nick answered, "We're using cellular, but we're using what's called the machine grade cellular. It's similar to the FirstNet system that first responders are using. All the cell companies have agreed with the government to provide a back channel on every cell tower. This uses a different kind of signal; not designed to send images and text messages and phone calls and voice, it's just meant for small strings of data. Higher powered and more streamlined connection. Just because you can't get cell reception for your phone doesn't mean you can't get machine grade out. They require a different FCC license. We had AT&T do a propagation study where they looked at all of your addresses. They found [a] really strong signal. They didn't foresee any issues.'

Another director asked, "If a meter gets covered by mud like with all this rain, does it still get a read?" The answer: "At the lid we have an antenna that comes out. We have a pilot program at Lake Arrowhead. We just read this last winter through 6 feet of snow, and plows pushing up banks onto the bin lids. We were successfully reading through that. You could, if you had 3 to 4 feet of mud packed up on it, if you had a landslide you would affect the signal then, but you wouldn't be able to manually read it by that point either." The meters also store their readings for 120 days, so in the event of a disaster, the data would still be safe.

One director brought up the possibility of hackers gaining unauthorized access to the system. Nick answered, "That's the beauty of cellular. Every ATM that you use is using this same machine grade cellular, it's fully encrypted, encrypted enough to send bank data. It would require government level knowledge to hack into."

As to the long-term reliability of the meters, SET warranties them for 20 years. The first 10 years there is a no-questions-asked replacement policy. The next 10 years there is a pro-rated discount on replacements. The batteries also are warrantied for 20 years. The city of Riverside has 80,000 of these meters. They have been in use in Germany for more 25 years, according to Nick. Employee training is included, as many refresher courses as are required, and the website has a live chat feature if users forget where to find something. The meters measure flow through ultrasound, so there are no moving parts.

Nick demonstrated what it is like to navigate a system using real time data from a Smyrna, Georgia, utility, scrubbed of some identifying information but allowing the group to see, for example, that a leak had been spotted at 2 a.m. one morning, a mismatch between input and output valves. Notes attached to a file recorded that crews sent out to look discovered that contractors were going to one of the city parks to fill up their trucks every morning at 2 a.m.

The detail recorded by each meter includes a log of automatic cleaning turns, a record of when a valve has been opened or closed and by whom, all flow data from the time of installation, alarms for tampering and backflow events, and ambient temperature. All installation and repair events are also saved for posterity. Alerts can be sent to the office or the customer in case of low temperature, unusual flow, continuous flow for customizable lengths of time, or when a target usage amount is approached. So, a user can receive an email or text if their water usage approaches a budgeted amount, if the line is likely to freeze or if their water is running for a selected

The system also allows photos and notes to be uploaded for each meter, so a crew can note the location of a meter if it is difficult to find and photograph the installation so workers can choose their tools before leaving the office. The entire history of each meter will be available to workers through tablets or smartphone.

The SET representatives also explained that the transition to the new system will not require entering all that new information by hand. Their software has an install app that communicates with the present software, UBMax, to discover existing accounts and all their data. When each new meter is installed, the last reading is entered. The device automatically captures the new device's serial number and the new read, and begins submitting data to the office.

Government Capital, a private firm that lends to governments and utilities, will finance the project. The projections by SET suggest savings from the beginning, at least in opportunity costs. By eliminating meter reading, PCWD is projected to save \$26,000 a year. These employees can instead be repairing leaks and replacing line, so that may be an opportunity cost and not a cash flow item.

The SET audit estimates \$60,000 annually from improved meter accuracy. Mechanical meters only measure flow well within a range; high flow may not register correctly, and low flow may not move the impeller that detects usage. Meters become less accurate over time, and some of the old meters, according to General Manager Jeremy Potter, "are not registering all the water they are using."



Local man charged with felonies

A 32-year-old Idyllwild resident was arrested at 5:10 p.m. Monday, Dec. 19, 2022, on Highway 243, on three felony charges stemming from a fatal traffic collision in 2020. His bail was set at \$50,000 and he was released Thursday,

At about 3:18 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 16, 2020, Victor Javier Sanchez, then 29, with an unknown address, was driving a Dodge Challenger northbound on Highway 79, just north of Dugan Drive, at about 50 to 60 mph on a downhill curved portion of roadway, according to a California Highway Patrol (CHP) report.

Michelle Schulberg, then 50, of Aguanga, was driving a 2018 Subaru Outback southbound on Highway 79, just north of Dugan Drive, at about 45 to 50 mph on an uphill curved portion of roadway, approaching the Challenger.

Sanchez, who was traveling behind traffic directly ahead, traveled across the solid double yellow lines direct-

off the roadway onto the dirt shoulder, west of the roadway, and come to a stop. The Challenger stopped partially within the northbound and southbound lanes. CHP, American Medical Response (AMR) and CalFire re-

sponded to the scene. An AMR paramedic pronounced David Schulberg, 60, of Aguanga, the passenger in the Challenger, deceased at the scene. He was the spouse of the driver.

Michelle Schulberg and Sanchez suffered major injuries while a 17-year-old unnamed female passenger from Temecula in the Challenger suffered moderate injuries. The three were transported to Inland Valley Medical Center.

Sanchez's first physical arrest occurred Sept. 11, 2020, "due to the subject's major injuries, and he was hospitalized until it was safe for him to be booked into jail," said CHP Officer Mike Lassig of the Temecula station. Lassig did not respond to why Sanchez was arrested last December.

Sanchez is being charged with three felonies: vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence; a divided highway

violation; and reckless driving causing bodily injury.

Schulberg was a "40-year veteran California law enforcement insignia collector ... "according to Police Collector News Editor Mike R. Bondarenko. He had worked for both the Compton and El Monte police departments, according to Bondarenko.

Sanchez's court day in Murrieta is set for Thursday, March 23.

Local man given two years probation for felony

An Idyllwild man was given two years probation for a felony count of possessing ammunition when prohibited from doing so.

Patrick Eugene Price Jr., 28, was arrested in Hemet at 6:45 p.m. Dec. 28, 2022, on a bench warrant after a search of his residence turned up weapons and ammunition.

Price had a prior conviction of felony vandalism May 31, 2021, and given less than four years of probation that doesn't end until 2025, that prohibited him from possessing ammunition and weapons.

Riverside County Sheriff's Deputy Daniel Godnick, in a court document in support of the arrest warrant, said he went to the Cascade Drive residence in Idyllwild

"I was familiar with Price because I had arrested him for a felony warrant in August 2022 at the same location.

"Upon arrival at the residence, PACT personnel attempted to contact any occupants inside the residence at the property. I walked through the unlocked gate into the backyard.
