Forest Service will begin pile burns and eventually broader prescribed burns

According to the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF), Garner Valley is the site of pile burning in the next few weeks.

The wet weather has delayed the planned burns, which were scheduled for last week, in the Cranston Reforestation Project, according to Lauren Blake, forest fuels prevention officer for the SNBF.

"Administrative sites like the Forest Service fire stations will work on burning their piles at their stations for the rest of this week," she added. "And if Cranston is not ready, they will continue at the stations next

Joshua Tree man sentenced in fatality

A Joshua Tree man was sentenced to two years in prison for a fatality that occurred in 2021 on Highway

On Jan. 31, Nathan Daniel McConnell, 40, pleaded guilty to gross vehicle manslaughter and reckless driving causing serious injury on May 9, 2021.

McConnell was driving northbound on Highway 243, north of Miller Ranch Road at a speed between 73 and 79 mph. Charles James Shacklock, 31, of New Springfield, Ohio, was driving southbound on High-

Due to McConnell's speed, he was unable to negotiate a left-hand curve and applied the brake while entering the curve. He lost control, rotated clockwise toward the east shoulder ascending a slope. McConnell rotated the wheel the other direction to correct, coming down the slope, traveling through two lanes of traffic counterclockwise into the Outlander.

The force of impact caused Shacklock's vehicle to travel off the road through a wooden sign into a fence coming to a rest, blocking the southbound lane and the shoulder.

He was pronounced deceased at the scene.

More cases dismissed, court explains

Last week, the Town Crier reported on the Riverside County Board of Supervisors asking the county executive and its legal staff to develop recommendations to cope with the dramatic dismissal of criminal cases before they could come to trial.

The Riverside County Superior Court issued some comments about the situation last week. District Attorney Michael Hestrin also issued another statement regarding the continuation of these dismissals.

In his press release, Hestrin noted that the number of dismissed cases since October has exceeded 1,500. This includes both felony and misdemeanor. The misdemeanor cases cannot be refiled, he stated.

However, he specifically addressed three criminal cases, all felony child sexual assault charges, that were dismissed in late January. The defendants and the case numbers were Norman Martinez Garcia (RIF2101260), Daniel Cintron (RIF2002317) and Angel Torres Salas (RIF2002269).

In each instance, the district attorney's office told the court that it was prepared to begin the trial. Nevertheless, each case was dismissed because there was no judge available. However, Hestrin's office has refiled new cases against each defendant.

According to Hestrin, the cases were dismissed "... due to the court's inabili-

ty to begin the trial within the timeframe required by law ... 'Our office opposed Judge Prevost's decision, arguing that the court's decision to leave several courtrooms closed while their judges attended training, along with other judges being out ill, justified a short continuance of the case,

Precipitation continues to give hope of lessening drought

Considerable rain and snow have fallen throughout California since the beginning of 2023. And the Hill has incurred its share of cold and wet weather.

Last week, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) announced the results of its second snow survey of the winter season. At the Phillips Station, DWR measured 85.5 inches of snow depth, which is a snow water equivalent of 33.5 inches. The snow water equivalent measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack.

The Phillips Station's snow water equivalent was 193% of average for this location Wednesday, Feb. 1. Statewide, the snowpack is 205% of average for this

Two months remain until April 1, when the state snowpack usually peaks. According to DWR's press release, the agency conducts five snow surveys at Phillips Station each winter near the first of each month, January through April, and, if necessary, May. The next survey is tentatively scheduled for March 1.

Locally, cold temperatures and precipitation have been abnormally present. The National Weather Service's (NWS) San Diego office reported that Idyllwild has had a severe winter so far. January's average temperature was 38.2 degrees, which is 4.8 degrees below the normal average temperature for the month. That was the largest dip in Southern California.

Rainfall has reached 13.9 inches, which is 9.17 inches greater than the normal January precipitation of 4.74. This also was the largest variance from normal in Southern California.

However, the precipitation was mostly in liq-

uid form. NWS recorded only a trace of snowfall in Idyllwild, compared to the average of 6.3 inches in January, although Idyllwild Fire Department recorded 3 inches of snow last weekend.

Speaking of the Northern California snow, Sean de Guzman, DWR's Snow Surveys and Water Supply Forecasting Unit manager, said in the agency's release, "Large snow totals like today are a welcome sight but also present new challenges for water managers as they walk the fine line between water supply and flood control. As we move into the snowmelt season in the spring, water managers will work to manage flood risk and optimize the snowpack's water supply benefits during peak demands in the summer."

"California has always experienced some degree of swings between wet and dry, but the past few months have demonstrated how much more extreme those swings are becoming," added DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "... While today's results are good news for water supplies, we know from experience how quickly snowpack can disappear if dry conditions return in the months ahead.

At the end of December, more than a third of California was designated as either extreme or exceptional drought. As of Jan. 31, none of the state was in either classification. Now nearly 90% of California is in either moderate or severe drought stages.

For the next three months, February through April, NWS is forecasting equal chances of below average or above average precipitation for Southern California, with the same likelihood on warmer or cooler temperatures.

"For the period of mid-January through April, drought is most likely to persist across Southern California," the office reported.

The new bivalent booster dose vs. the Omicron XBB.1.5 variant

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reports that the COVID XBB.1.5 is now the predominant variant in circulation in the United States, currently accounting for 66.4% of new COVID cases. It is likely that this variant will continue to spread, says the CDC. Preliminary indications are that the updated COVID boosters provide protection against XBB.1.5 and other recent Omicron variants for at least the first three months after vaccination. "Those who are up to date on their COVID-19 vaccinations have the most protection to fight off an infection caused by XBB.1.5," the CDC advises.

The CDC continues to rate Riverside County among the "low community level" counties in the country. CDC recommended actions for low community levels are: "Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines. Get tested if you have symptoms. Wear a mask if you have symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19. Wear a mask on public transportation. You may choose to wear a mask at any time as an additional precaution to protect yourself and others."

On Tuesday, Feb. 7, the Hemet Unified School District dashboard reported no cases of COVID among either students or staff members at Idyllwild School. Hamilton elementary reported one student and two staff members with COVID. Hemet High reported one student and no staff members with COVID, while Hamilton secondary reported one student and one staff member with COVID.



Perez appointed to state environmental board

Last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom appointed V. Manuel Perez, Riverside County's 4th District supervisor, to the California Air Resources Board (CARB). This position requires Senate confirmation and there is no com-

Since 2018, Perez has been a member of the governing board for the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD), which is the air pollution control agency for Orange County and major portions of Los Angeles, San Bernardino and Riverside counties. During his time there, Perez has encouraged greater use of renewable energy in the county.

For example, SCAQMD developed the Coachella Valley Residential Energy Efficiency Retrofit Program and provided \$1 million to upgrade homes in disadvantaged communities located in Coachella at no charge to the homeowner. The program was targeted to homes located in communities where air pollution is major problem.

These upgrades made residential homes more energy efficient and improved air quality, including replacing lightbulbs with LEDs, installing smart thermostats, insulating attics, and air sealing to reduce the amount of air that leaks in and out of homes.

As a result of his activities with the SCAQMD, in October, Perez was invited to speak at the Association of Women in Water, Energy and Environment Clean Air Day 2022. He discussed the burden of air pollution on Southern California residents — especially those who live in low-income, minority communities close to the

But his concern about air quality preceded his time on the board of supervisors. Perez served three terms in the state Assembly, beginning in 2008. Near the end of his tenure, in 2014, he was elected as the Democratic Majority leader. Before that, he served as chair of the Select Committee on the Renewable Energy Economy in Rural California.

During his time in the Assembly, Perez worked on reliability in addition to cost. many environmental issues and submitted supporting bills. Among his efforts was facilitating renewable energy development in the desert region through streamlined permitting and local planning grants. He also assisted in obtaining the approval for a clean-burning, natural gas power plant to bring \$900 million in investment, hundreds of jobs and energy reliability to the re-

One of his major efforts was a bill to push California utilities to procure more than half their power from renewable resources, including geothermal energy from the Salton Sea. The bill would have raised the state's renewable energy target from 33% in 2020 to 51% in 2030. It also would establish a new approach to energy planning for the state's utilities, requiring them to consider energy efficiency, greenhouse gas reduction and grid

Other legislation included securing \$2.3 billion in clean tech economic recovery bonds to help local governments attract business and create jobs, and focusing state level attention on the heavily polluted New River and securing funds to draw down nearly \$4 million in federal grants to begin its clean up.

His environmental passion has continued during his time on the board of supervisors. Last year, he served as chair of the Riverside County Transportation Commission, which includes elected officials from the county's cities and supervisorial districts.

From July 2021 to 2022, he served as president of the Salton Sea Authority Board of Directors.

Unfortunately, neither Perez nor his staff responded to a request for comment about his appointment to the



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

to do so, or if unable to do so safely, slow down when they see amber flashing lights on Caltrans vehicles, law enforcement, and other emergency vehicles and tow trucks. Failure to obey the "Move Over" law can result in fines up to \$1,000, plus points on your driving record.

The statewide contest ran from Nov. 21, 2022, through Jan. 20, 2023. Safety Sam will be used by Caltrans districts for community outreach and engagement efforts. The mascot's image will also be used in materials aiming to inform the public about the importance of the "Move Over" law and work zone safety.

With safety as its top priority, Caltrans is using the Safe System approach to achieve its goal of reducing to zero the number of fatalities and serious injuries on state highways by 2050. This approach builds on its ongoing work to improve safety throughout its network and on all transportation projects the department funds or oversees, which includes "complete street" features that provide safe and accessible options for people walking, biking and taking transit.

LAO on state budget: 'Prudent,' but more cuts needed

On Jan. 10, Gov. Gavin Newsom released his proposed fiscal year (FY) 2023-24 budget. Total expenditures will be nearly \$297 billion, of which \$223 billion will be for the General Fund accounts. Because anticipated revenues will not meet the budget needs, the proposed budget has a \$22.5 billion deficit.

Shortly after, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) issued its preliminary review of the governor's propos-

In summary, the LAO concluded, "Both our office and the administration project that the state faces a manageable budget problem this year. The governor addresses the budget problem primarily with spending-related solutions ... Notably, the governor does not propose using any reserves. This approach is prudent given the downside risk to revenues posed by the current heightened risk of recession."

The administration's projections and the LAO's are close for FY 2023-24. The LAO's projection is about \$4.5 billion less than the governor's \$22.5 billion budget problem. Consequently, both the LAO and the administration agree that the state must prepare for budget problems.

However, the LAO is more pessimistic about the state's revenue collections in the next few years. The LAO anticipates that "revenues will be lower than the administration's projections for the budget window, particularly 2022-23 and 2023-24."

The governor's budget proposal expects operating deficits of \$9 billion in 2024-25, \$9 billion in 2025-26, and \$4 billion in 2026-27. "Future budget problems," said that may be restored if revenue improves.

the LAO. With anticipated declining revenue, the LAO also expressed concerned about the proposed budget's effect on future budget balances.

While the proposed FY 2023-24 budget is balanced (even with declining revenues), the future year budgets are not and that means the proposed budget is when to begin addressing this situation. The LAO suggested that the Legislature could consider its own solutions to the advancing budget issues and "... avoid enacting a budget that plans for future deficits ...

"We recommend the Legislature: (1) plan for a larger budget problem and (2) address that larger problem by reducing more one-time and temporary spending," the LAO recommended.

A few options the Legislature might consider, according to the LAO, include converting some of the proposed spending-related delays into actual reductions; also, more out-year trigger reductions, increasing revenues or shifting costs between funding sources.

Because the state constitution requires the state to pass a balanced budget, the governor must propose solutions when the administration estimates the state faces a budget problem. "The state has many types of solutions — or tools — for addressing a budget problem, but the most important include: reserve withdrawals, spending reductions, revenue increases and cost shifts (for example, between funds)," the LAO stated.

The governor's proposed budget employs mostly spending adjustments. These represent about 75% of the deficit reduction and shifting costs are most of the balance, according to the LAO.

The proposed budget uses three types of spending adjustments: actual reductions, delays and trigger cuts

The governor's budget addresses the estimated budget problem without using funds from the state's reserves. The LAO supports this approach.

In his news conference, Newsom made clear, "We're not touching the reserves. We'll be cautious and prepared for the May revision. I'm presenting the January budget with a fluid mind-set. We'll know more in May, so we're not touching the reserves yet."

Ultimately, the continuing revenue declines could result in the administration recommending using re-

But until that point, the LAO recommended that the "Legislature avoid enacting a budget that plans for future deficits. A key way to accomplish this would be by reducing proposed spending delays and making more spending-related reductions instead. However, the Legislature also could address future year deficits by adding trigger reductions (rather than restorations) -t o trigger off more multiyear spending if needed — or by using other budget solutions, such as revenue increases or cost shifts.'

The LAO's specific recommendations total more than \$14 billion in spending reductions and delays. "To hedge against possible lower revenues in May, we also recommend the Legislature plan for a larger budget problem by identifying more than \$6 billion in spending reductions," the LAO added.

Besides the LAO, state legislators also had comments on the budget proposal. State Sen. Scott Wiener, a member of the Appropriations Committee, has said, "We're analyzing the impacts on transit of the governor's proposed budget. It's not pretty. The proposal allows transit to go over a devastating fiscal cliff (huge service cuts). Plus, it imposes [a] multi-billion cut on transit capital

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

Riverside University Health System-Public Health (RUHS-PH) is offering the clinics in partnership with OptumServe.

"We continue to see significant impacts to our hospital emergency departments with individuals seeking COVID-19 testing and/or COVID-19 therapeutics. We have an opportunity to remind the community that there are additional resources to assist with accessing COVID-19 testing and medications," said Misty Plumley, program chief for Immunizations and Emergency Response.

The one-stop-shop allows patients to be tested for COVID-19, have a telehealth communication with a doctor and receive an oral antiviral treatment — all during the same visit. Riverside County, like other regions throughout the state, has seen a sharp rise in COVID-19 cases over the past several weeks.

Hestrin said in the release.

"I understand the need for ongoing training, however, when our courts are experiencing a crisis and engaging in the mass dismissal of cases, victims of crime deserve the right to be the priority," said Hestrin. "Over the last three months, the courts have dismissed over 1,500 cases, some of which are serious felonies such as these three sexual assault cases involving children."

While acknowledging the shortages of judges, the Superior Court listed several reasons for dismissing

The first, and primary reason, was the shortage nal trials. of judges. According to the most recent assessment of judicial needs based on county population, Riverside County should have 112 judges but only has 90.

Consequently, there are more cases ready for trial than judges available to oversee the proceedings and the California Supreme Court has established reasons for continuations.

Brendan Steele will tee it up this week in the \$20-million Waste Management Phoenix Open on the TPC Scottsdale Stadium Course in Scottsdale, Arizona. Through Thunderbirds Charities, this tournament raised more than \$10.5 million for local charities last year alone.

The native Idyllwilder has enjoyed considerable success in this event, having played it in each of his 13 years on the PGA Tour. He has amassed a record of six top-20s, including four top-6s, two of which were top-5s in this event.

Brendan currently stands 93rd on the FedExCup list and 113rd in the Official World Golf Ranking. He tees off Thursday at 12:28 p.m. playing with Ryan Palmer and Danny Lee and Friday at 7:43 a.m. playing with Palmer and Chris Kirk. The tournament will be telecast on the golf channel with CBS joining in on Saturday and Sunday.



The nonprofit Mountain Disaster Preparedness (MDP) has donated two automated external defibrillator (AED) units to the Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) for placement at Idyllwild Town Hall and Butterfield Amphitheater.

Before moving off the Hill, volunteer MDP board member and Co-Chair Medical Director Dr. Dick Goldberg contacted ICC in May 2022 about emergency preparedness needs ICC might have. 

Like a ghost, the snowy owl glides through the air in soundless flight. This owl is different from most owls because it hunts during the day and at night. Most owls hunt at night. In the arctic region, the summer days and nights are always light. An owl waiting for darkness to hunt would starve before the dark days of winter arrive.



Many animals can blend into their environment. This is called camouflage. There are few trees on the tundra, so the snowy owl's white plumage blends with the snowy world of the northern arctic.

In the spring, when the snowy owl makes a nest, the snow has started to melt and the brown earth shows through patches of white snow. The female snowy owl's soft white feathers are streaked with brown so she cannot be seen as she nests on the ground.

Here are three other animals that blend into their habitats, or homes. Can you unscramble their names?


All owls have excellent sight so that they can spot creatures like mice that run fast along the ground. Owls' eyes are not the same as human



eyes. We move our eyes in their sockets to see from side to side. The owl must turn his head to see in different directions. Owls also have a third eyelid, which protects the eye.

It is a milky white eyelid that comes up from the bottom of the eye. Its purpose is to clean and refresh the owl's eyes. This third eyelid is called a *nictitating membrane*.
