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More rain and snow likely coming soon

The fears that the drenching January 2023 rains would be followed by no precipitation the rest of winter and early spring as happened in 2022 have not occurred. Some rain and snow fell on the mountain in early February along with record cold temperatures.

"Heavy snow possible. Winds could gust as high as 85 mph with dangerous wind chills," the weather service advised.

The National Weather Service's San Diego office has reported that winter has been very cold on the Hill. Idyllwild's average temperature in January was 38.2 degrees, which is 4.8 degrees below the normal average temperature for the month.

Then Tuesday, Feb. 14, the weather service reported that the daytime high temperature reported in Idyllwild was 34 degrees. The lowest daytime "high" in more

than 30 years was 35 degrees in 1990.
Punxsutawney Phil's "Spring is coming" forecast may have been optimistic for the Hill. This weekend, the weather service forecast more wet weather for the Hill in the coming weeks. Sunday night, this forecast transformed into a Winter Weather Watch for the Riverside County mountains from Tuesday evening until Saturday afternoon. See Precipitation, page A2

Steele moves to LIV Golf League

Brendan Steele is shifting from the PGA Tour to the LIV Golf League, the native Idyllwilder informed the Town Crier Sunday evening. Brendan withdrew from the PGA Tour's Genesis Invitational tournament before teeing off last Thursday. The LIV Golf League is financed by the Public Investment Fund, the sovereign wealth fund of Saudi Arabia.



"LIV" is the number 54 in Roman numerals, which is the number of holes that will be played in LIV events. Forty-eight players on 12 teams will compete with shotgun starts and no cuts. LIV tournaments are simultaneously individual and team. For team competitions, Brendan joins the HyFlyers GC, captained by Phil Mickelson. "Shot-gun start" means that teams will be teeing off simultaneously at different holes, so the course will be filled with competitors all at once.

On its website, the LIV declares that it is "here to modernize and supercharge the wonderful sport of golf by taking the sport to new levels of excitement and engagement with generations of fans. With events across the world, the LIV Golf League is bringing the game — and those who love to play and watch it — to new places."

Brendan played on the PGA Tour for more than 12 consecutive seasons, from 2011 through part of the current 2023 season, winning three events: the Texas Open in his first year, and the Safeway Open in Napa twice thereafter. He was runner up thrice and placed third another three times while amassing 35 top-10 finishes. See Steele, page A2

"I will miss working at Idyllwild," Ng said. "It is near and dear to my heart and it has a good strong team.

In 2012, when she started at Idyllwild, it was shortly before the current library facility opened in Strawberry Plaza. For the past 18 months her librarian responsibilities have included the Anza Valley Community Library, too.

Ng brought impressive credentials to her positions. She has a master's degree in Library and Information Science from UCLA, an undergraduate degree in English from California State University, San Bernardino, and additional postgraduate studies in English and Library science.

Ng has four children, is very close to her niece and has five grandchildren, too. Her three daughters are still in California. Ng was born in Southern Illinois and her father was an Air Force colonel, which is an important background element.

When asked why she was moving on, her first response was, "It's a domino effect. Library director got a different job, another interim moved up, jobs roll over." But eventually, she admitted, "I'm a military brat. I can't stay in one job a long time. I need change. I'm really good at change and new challenges. Every organization

Her career began in 1980 as a law librarian. After 42 years as a library professional, Ng has seen numerous changes in libraries and their operations.

"Tons of change in my career," she began. "When I started, everything was done by hand, now it's virtual. There has been a huge jump into 'e-books' and audio books.

Earlier this month, Vermont State University announced that it was shifting to an all-digital library system as of July 1. University leadership said this would enable students to access study materials from home or elsewhere without having to come to campus. However, librarians will be available to help students find research sources.

are never going away, but their format will be different," Ng said, and then drew the analogy to music on tapes and CDs. "The LP vinyls are still here, just vintage now."

Another change Ng has helped establish is the shift to patrons from the primary purpose of protection and care of the library's collections. "Service has changed," she acknowledged. "In my first job, the focus was on the right order of the collection. Now the focus is on the people.

'Even at Idyllwild, when I started, the focus was on collections and has shifted to people. The staff provides superb customer service," she said proudly.

She mentioned another change - no more late fees - that is being considered in Riverside County and has already been implemented in other counties and states. Los Angeles and San Diego have already abandoned the practice as well as New York. Several Riverside city

libraries have adopted this policy, too. RCPLS may decide in the next month or two.

Another significant change in library services is the introduction or expansion of social service opportunities, Ng noted. "There is more focus on uses when the doors open. For example, access to the lounge for the homeless. Some libraries now have social workers ...

"We don't spend a lot of time working directly with them, but we do have ways to serve them," she stated. "Although they have no address, they are still patrons and the library is theirs too."

Other examples of the library's expansion of services or community opportunities, Ng added, were opening the facility for nonlibrary purposes, such as COVID test-"The future for hard back books may change. Books ing, vaccines and blood donations. Then she stressed, "We've become a community center."

Among her memories of the 10 years at Idyllwild Library is working with the Friends of the Idyllwild Library, an organization with a century of history, she noted. "They are partners with the library."

There has been an increase in the number of book clubs. Now fiction is not the only topic, there are children's books and a president's book club among other new additions.

The Idyllwild Library is not the sole source of Ng's attention and joy living in Idyllwild. She has volunteered for the Idyllwild Scholarship Fund and is still a member. She has maintained her connections with the Girl Scouts, as a member of the Girl Scouts of San Gorgonio Council in Redlands, and has interest in a Daisy or Brownie troop here.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) notes that COVID XBB.1.5 is the predominant variant in circulation in the United States, and it likely will continue to spread. Keeping up to date with COVID-19 vaccinations offers the best protection to fight off an infection caused by XBB.1.5, says the CDC.

Two systems are coming. The first, which will pass over the Hill, on late Tuesday and Wednesday will be the weaker of the two, although stronger winds will accompany this cold system.

So overall confidence is fairly low in rain and mountain snow amounts for the late Tuesday/Wednesday time period," the weather service reported Saturday.

Later this week, approaching the weekend, the second system will bring more rain; however, since it will be significantly colder, snow elevations will drop to about 2,500 feet. Idyllwild might receive a foot or more of snow, according to Monday's forecast.

"This storm will be more of a precipitation maker ... this storm may gather up a big fetch of subtropical moisture, and combine with a lot of upper level energy and 26.2 inches. The local totals are already approaching cold core to generate periods of heavier precipitation, with heavy snow in the mountains at elevations as low

as 2,500 feet, we could see significant impacts due to the heavy precipitation," the weather service forecast Sunday.

While the weather forecasting models are not together on the amount of rain, a few do predict several inches of precipitation and more snow. "Uncertainty remains in how heavy the precipitation could be and what the timing of the highest impacts will be, but confidence is beginning to increase that this could be moderate to high impact," according to the weather service.

What comes next is uncertain, but the possibility of lingering winter weather has a decent chance. "For next weekend, the cold upper low could become cutoff from the mean flow and generate continued precipitation, potentially heavy at times, through next weekend, before the storm finally ejects into Arizona and New Mexico by Monday Tuesday (Feb. 27-28)," according to early weather service forecasts.

The yearly average rain on the Hill have been about three-quarters of the annual rain since the rain year began Oct. 1.







First public water rate study meeting goes badly

The first public meeting Wednesday, Feb. 15, did not go well for consultants Idyllwild Water District (IWD) hired to complete its rate study.

Three main areas in which Bartle Wells Associates failed, according to IWD directors:

1) Using fiscal year (FY) budget figures of fiscal years (FY) 2020-21 and 2021-22 versus actual and available figures to base its initial rates. 2) Not adding capital budget figures that existed into the FY 2022-23 analysis.

3) Using reserve funds to pay for projected losses, reducing the funds from more than \$3.5

The concerns came following consultant Michael DeGroot's presentation to the board and the few audience members who showed for the first public meeting on the subjects of both water and

sewer rates, handled separately. In one scenario, DeGroot recommended an 8% water rate increase each year through FY 2032-33. In another, he recommended a 50% increase in FY 2023-24 and then 5% each year through FY 2027-28, then drop to 2% each year through FY 2032-33.

The numbers were shocking to the directors.

Director Steve Olson, speaking on the budget vs. actual numbers, said, "I bet this information is available and probably available the better part of eight months. It changes [the numbers] a lot. We are down way under budget ... We're ahead. We've got seven months of [FY 2022-23] ... The last

thing we want to do is inflate the starting points."

DeGroot also presented numbers not in the board packet and received an admonishment from

requirement has passed.

In the 8% per year recommendation, Vice President Peter Szabadi noted the reserves depleted. He asked, "How much are we reducing the reserves?" DeGroot told him from \$3.5 million in FY 2022-23 to \$414,000 by FY 2032-33.

"We don't want to deplete the reserves," said Director Steve Kunkle. Schelly pointed out that the reserves are used for capital improvements, not to cover operating losses.

"What is the theory of selling something for 10¢ that costs 15¢? Doesn't make any sense. What business would do that?" asked Szabadi.

And, "An increase the first year by 50% doesn't

make sense," he added. "We need to reasonably recapture our expenses."

Audience member and former IWD Director Dave Hunt suggested applying tiers to commercial rates as IWD currently does for residential. "In the last study, we didn't raise the commercial rates high enough," he said.

Hunt also said, "8% [increase] a year in water is extreme; 10% a year in sewer even worse. Customers aren't going to tolerate this. I know I won't."

He also spoke about short-term rentals (STR)

LAO increases likely deficit, urges preserving reserves

The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) continues to forecast declining state revenue for the current fiscal year (FY) and next year FY 2023-24. Last month, after Gov. Gavin Newsom released his 2023-24 budget proposal, both the LAO and the administration's Depart-

ment of Finance had foreseen a drop in revenue.

Newsom's proposed FY 2023-24 budget requested total expenditures of nearly \$297 billion, of which \$223 billion will be for the General Fund accounts. Because anticipated revenues will not meet budget needs, the proposed budget has a \$22.5 billion deficit.

A few days later, the LAO issued its preliminary review of the governor's proposal and issued another review, which is more pessimistic than the first, this

Last week, the LAO released another assessment of the evolving fiscal environment. This estimate says that the chances of a budget deficit have increased and its size in both FY 2022-23 and FY 2023-24 will be larger than anticipated.

"... we estimate there is a two-in-three chance that state revenues will be lower than the Governor's budget estimates for 2022-23 and 2023-24," the LAO advised. "Our best estimate is that revenues for these two years will be roughly \$10 billion lower — implying a larger budget problem by about \$7 billion.

"Under the administration's projections, the state faces operating deficits of \$9 billion in 2024-25, \$9 billion in 2025-26, and \$4 billion in 2026-27," the LAO continued and noted that the state's constitutional spending requirements prohibit this deficit spending.

The LAO report offers several recommendations for

the state Legislature to consider as it works on the current and proposed budget. However, the LAO continues to recommend that the state's financial reserves. which are near \$35 billion, should not be used to avoid other short-term actions, such as program reductions or

The LAO explained why it recommended waiting to the use any reserve funds to offset deficit spending. The main benefit of reserves is that they help the state to maintain its core spending over the long term, despite the state's volatile revenue structure ... Using reserves now to maintain the recent spending peak would mean the state would have [fewer] reserves available to pay for its core services if revenues declined further or in the event of a recession.'

The LAO urged the Legislature to defer using reserves unless actual revenue collections fall another \$10 billion, which would be less than historical averages and consequently require changes to the state's core spending levels.

In lieu of using reserves, the LAO suggested the Legislature could consider eliminating future deposits into the state's rainy-day fund; reducing more one-time and temporary spending; or increasing revenues on a temporary basis.

The LAO specifically mentioned that the current budget and future year proposals include nearly \$30 billion in one-time or temporary spending actions. While affordable when initially proposed, these items may need to be postponed or abandoned.

About half this amount (\$15.2 billion) is part of the current year budget, according to the LAO. These steps would protect reserves for possible worse situations, such as a recession, and have negligible effects on the state's core spending.

An occasional reminder: The Ralph M. Brown Act, which is codified as California Government Code sections 54950-54963, is open-meeting legislation that governs only local public agencies. (State public agencies are governed by separate legislation.)

Six presently active local governmental agencies on our Hill are governed by the Brown Act: the Idyllwild, Pine Cove, Fern Valley and Lake Hemet Municipal water districts, the Idyllwild Fire Protection District, and the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District. The Idyllwild Town Crier is the sole media monitor of these agencies for our Hill.

These public agencies are not owned by the board members and administrators who run them; they are owned by you. The board members and administrators work for you. They make decisions as to how to spend your tax dollars — and what services you get for them. The board members hire the administrators, but you vote the board members in or out. The Town Crier reports to you on the happenings at the meetings of these local public agencies because you are not always able to attend them yourselves. The TC also reports on the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, the Hemet Unified School District and the Mt. San Jacinto College District regarding matters that affect us on the Hill.

This is perhaps the TC's most important ongoing work for

What an enormous compliment to Craig and his journalism. Those farmers were willing to trust their local newspaper to attend a public meeting important to their livelihoods and to publish a thorough and accurate report, planning to base their reaction to the meeting on what Craig wrote.

What a tremendous ongoing responsibility falls on local journalists everywhere — not only to attend the meetings of their local public agencies, but to write a thorough and accurate report of the important happenings at those meetings



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

PCWD remains in Stage II water conservation

At the Pine Cove Water District (PCWD), General Manager Jeremy Potter reported liquid assets at \$741,238.71. Across two checking accounts, receipts totaled \$159,651.57 and disbursements \$128,476.15, including a \$50,000 payment into the Local Area Investment Fund where PCWD invests. The total in that account was reported as \$649,882.79

He reported that water production is more than last year, but less than two years ago. PCWD produced 6,686,840 gallons, of which 6,124,213 was accounted for, a loss of 8.5%. This takes into account the "huge" leak repaired across from Franklin Drive, which he described as about 40 gpm, for "who knows how long." The leak, on a hydrant spur, never surfaced, but was found with listening devices. Other leaks included a "big break near McGovern" Road which, once it finally surfaced, "was bubbling up on the highway," phones were ringing, and the crew "had an audience" for the repair. The first calls were received Saturday morning, crews worked until 9 p.m. Potter confirmed to the Crier that that night a temporary sleeve was installed and that the crew finished the welded repair on Tuesday.

A board member asked about seeing trucks from American Leak Detection on the Hill. Potter explained that the company is sometimes called by customers to work on their side of the meter on complex systems. He also iterated that the new meters will make leak detection quicker and easier.

Static well #10 was at 132 feet, down 1.3 feet but expected to rise with recent precipitation.

Mention was made of Jon King's trail reports (sanjacjon.com) and snow pack in the high country is now around 4 feet. One director chimed in, "I remember when we used to have 10 feet."

Potter reported he is working on the government capital loan documents; they are about to be finalized. "As soon as that's finalized, we'll be getting our equipment, start putting the new valves and meters in, starting with well meters. Customers one by one.

Stage II Water Conservation rules continue "even though we see snow and rain." PCWD's website describes modest but "mandatory" rules under Stage II: Stage II is mandatory compliance. Customers are required to limit irrigation of outdoor plants and gardens to the period between 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. daily and stop all water runoff. Customers cannot fill or refill swimming pools and/or spas, except the small amount needed to replace evaporation in already filled pools. Vehicles can only be washed using a bucket and a hose with a shut-off nozzle. Immediate repairs must be made to any and all leaking water lines and faucets in houseIT'S DIFFERENT

hold plumbing and yard piping. Customers must also cease watering native vegetation and unplanted areas for dust control. Restaurants shall only provide drinking water to patrons upon specific request.

A board member also asked, "How long will it take to swap out a meter?"

Potter answered that "under ideal conditions ... less than 10 minutes where the new valve is "close to or less space than existing. If it is bigger, if we need to shorten a valve or nipple, it might take another halfhour or less." The company (Smart Earth Technologies) estimated PCWD will be able to install 20 meters

"If additional usage qualifies as an extra unit we should change our policy," said Schelly.

Director Gene Schneider noted two manufactured homes near his house and asked how many meters." Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman said one. "They should at least be charged [extra] for sewer," said Schneider.

Most of the directors expressed dismay at the presentation's inaccuracies and told the consultants that at the next presentation, they expected the starting point to begin with actual and not budget numbers, noting that FY 2022-23 numbers could even have been used since IWD is seven months into the year and under budget; that capital improvement figures needed to be in all the years; and that the reserve funds were not to be touched to fund operating losses.

In other business, General Manager Leo Havener said the drought plan is "pretty far along." Directors instructed Havener to revise the current drought plan they believe doesn't make sense. Havener pointed out his biggest challenge. "One component is the location of the bottom of the pump in the well[s] ..." We have to "determine in the draw down where the bottom of the pump is, not the bottom of the well."

He said he would make the new drought plan presentation at the next board meeting.

Shouman told the board that Foster Lake, IWD's reservoir, is at 17 feet. "That's a foot below overflow," said Havener. The lake has been dry for at least three years.

'I predict that by the end of March we won't be in Stage 2 [water conservation] any longer," said

In other business, Schelly said he had met with Idyllwild School Principal Tim Poseley about establishing a water education scholarship to be given to an Idyllwild high school senior. He said the item would be on next month's agenda for board

Also, directors formed a budget committee, as well as an Administration Office Building Maintenance ad hoc committee.

Havener and Shouman have long complained that their offices need maintenance. An EZ Mold lab test "... did detect elevated levels of penicillium/aspergillus mole spores present at the inside air sample taken at Leo's office at time of inspection as compared to the outside air sample taken at time of inspection." The inspection occurred Jan.

Havener wants to use ServPro and Sean Townsend to remove the mold.

Stephen Savage — film maker and Idyllwild lover

Hollywood has used Idyllwild as a movie setting for decades. For example, in 1961, Elvis Presley's "Kid Galahad" walked Idyllwild's streets and rode around Garner Valley's ranches. Before expanding to "50" or more in the 21st century, "Shades of Gray" was shot here in 1997. Throughout the first two decades of this century, the Hill has been the background for dozens of features and fulllength films.

But how many do you remember? I asked a local actor to recall films where Idyllwild was the location, even if it represented another location. The response was "Can't think of any other movies [besides 'Kid Galahad'], sorry."

One of the more prolific filmmakers who has taken advantage of the small town and bucolic character of Idyllwild is local Stephen Savage. Now an Idyllwild resi-

Savage has used Idyllwild in three of his major films, "Cosmic Radio" (2007), "Legacy" (2010) and "Vertical" (2013), which prominently features Tahquitz Rock, one of the world's premier climbing destinations, as well as many Idyllwild businesses and locations.

While Savage's filmmaking has brought actors, gaffers and behind the scenes crews to the Hill for weeks, he has done much more for the community. In 2010, he inaugurated the Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema (IIFC).

IIFC is not an ephemeral event, such as shooting a film. IIFC is a recurring celebration and in March, it returns to Idyllwild for the 14th year. While the previous two years were a virtual festival because of COVID restrictions, the live festival returns to town and the Rustic Theatre Tuesday, March 7, and continues for six more days, until the evening of Sunday, March 12. And once again, more than 100 films from a dozen countries will be available for viewing.

While Savage is from Orange County, his family has had property on the Hill since the 1950s. He spent many summers here and eventually moved to Idyllwild in 1995, after time in Los Angeles and England

From an early age, movies were a passion for him. "Before VCRs and DVDs, I would get up at 1 or 2 a.m. on a school night to watch a special movie." And "watch" meant study. But these early film analyses took a second place to his initial desire for music.

"I had a musical family. My mother played the piano and sang. My uncle played the piano and guitar," Savage said, relating his initial desire to follow in their footsteps. At age 17, he was in a junk band.

It traveled a lot and even had a recording contract. After 10 years of traveling around the world, he realized, "It never became what I expected."

His avocation for film study had waned but not disappeared. So, he decided to try to find a place in the industry "just get a job and hired." He was hired and worked until he became a gaffer. But he also matriculated to the Los Angeles Film School as the oldest student.

Then it became "lights, camera, action!" for Savage.

Savage had a grasp on how to help Idyllwild and expand his career. IIFC was his next production. To start and achieve this adventure, which was not a solo performance, he needed reliable, dependable and competent people, such as his friends — Co-founder Trinity Houston, Andrea Charles and Paul Calderone, among many.

But one of the most critical partners, Savage accentuated, were the Stewarts -- Shane, Asley and Christine - who owned the Rustic Theatre in 2010. Being a novice film event producer, Savage had some initial idea of the costs; but he soon realized that having a venue to show the films would be a major expense.

"I wouldn't have passed year one without Shane. He had the foresight that [IIFC] would be good for the town," Savage emphasized.

Savage did approach Ashley about the cost for renting the theater for about a week. "Shane called and offered it free for the first year so it could get off the ground," Savage recalled. "I give Shane and Ashley a lot of credit for stepping up in that first year."

He was so grateful that he named one of the early festival awards the Stewart Award. "And it will come back this year!" he said proudly.

IIFC has shown films at many other venues. The Caine Learning Center, Town Hall, Silver Pines Lodge, Idyllwild Library, Idyllwild Pines Camp and other sites have been part of IIFC in different years.

"But the Rustic has been the only constant that we can count on," Savage said. "It at-

tracts visitors new to town." The 2023 IIFC will be live again at the Rustic and Town had to be virtual because of the dissatisfaction with that limitation. In 2022, he vowed that IIFC 13 would be the last if film aficionados continued to be banned from attending in person.

However, he did acknowledge that streaming films online offered a lesson to learn. The festival staff is considering streaming some films, not only because it increases the number of films in the festival, but its primary benefit is some "real-time" feedback on the movie. "We can livestream commentary during the film's presentation. We would know how many are watching a film and possible comments while it is playing," Savage suggested.

Another future addition is likely to be accreditation from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences for showing Oscar eligible short films at the IIFC. "That will open more doors and more films," Savage highlighted.

Another door he already opened and that has stayed open since the festival's inception was "International." This is not simply a place holder to puff up the name. Every year, the festival's inventory includes films from more than a dozen countries, such as England, Scotland, Australia, Brazil, France, Iran, Mongolia and many other countries. Also, "Vertical," which premiered here, was the winner of the Best International Feature Film Award at the London International Film Festival in 2015. Not only does the cinematography, but the grand jury and advisory board have an international composition.

FTC warns about 'Tank' claims

Before you spend money on that "Shark-approved" miracle invention, weight loss product, or keto diet pill, are you sure it's really been through the Tank? Really sure? Scammers are using fake Shark Tank celebrity testimonials and endorsements complete with doctored photos and videos — to generate buzz and profits. Before you click and buy, follow this advice and

Here's what to do if you're wondering whether something is Shark-approved:

- Approach celebrity testimonials with caution. Look for product reviews on your own. Search the product online and put words like "scam" or "problems" or "complaints" to see what others are saying about the products.
- Go directly to the source. Don't click on a link or ad. Instead, check out a full list of all businesses that have been on the show at abc.com/SharkTank.
- Remember: the government doesn't review or evaluate supplements for safety or effectiveness before they're put on the market. Your health care professional is the most important person to ask whether a supplement is safe for you. Even a natural supplement can be risky depending on your health and the medicine you take.






