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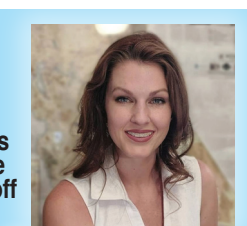

San Jacintos receive massive amounts of snow

Wednesday evening, March 1, the National Weather Service (NWS) reported that another 17 inches of snow fell on the Hill. This is in addition to the 12 to 24 inches from two previous storms just a week before.

Total snowfall for Idyllwild was reported as 34 inches and 49 inches, slightly more than 4 feet, on San Jacinto Peak, according to NWS.

Thursday, March 2, wasn't a dry reprieve. Nearly three-quarters of an inch of rain fell from Pine Cove to Garner Valley. While the weekend was cloudy with potential drizzle, NWS was more optimistic about the coming week.

"There are definite signs of change in the works though ... all of the global models show a pattern change to warmer weather is on the way. There is fairly good consensus that this will be noticeable late next week, and should continue through mid-month," according to NWS Saturday morning.

All of the snow and its effect on driving conditions raised concerns about the upcoming Idyllwild International Festival of Cinema, which will open Tuesday, March 7. However, founder and director Stephen Savage said with aplomb, "It's going to be what it's going to be. The forecast is for clear skies and warmer temps, and only a fool would require chains with perfectly clear roads ... by Monday, Tuesday, we'll be done with all of that for sure."

But this week, the U.S. Forest Service did close access to the entire San Bernardino National Forest through March 16. The order was necessary due to the roads being nearly impassable, to limit demands on emergency responses, staff needed to address local forest emergencies and potential avalanches.

Besides the precipitation, the weather was extremely cold. Idyllwild set another record for a daytime maximum low temperature. On March 1, the warmest temperature reading in Idyllwild was 32 degrees, which is 5 degrees lower than the previous record of 37 degrees nearly 40 years ago in 1981.

Other local areas also recorded new "low high daytime temperatures". For example, Big Bear's high was 27 and Palomar Mountain only reached 32. However, the new record "low high" in San Jacinto was 49 degrees and Escondido tied its previous record of a maximum high of 53.

During this extreme cold, portions of the Hill again

Before Bonta, ACLU sought investigation of sheriff's office

Two weeks ago, California Attorney General Rob Bonta announced that he was opening an investigation to determine whether the Riverside County Sheriff's Office has engaged in a pattern or practice of unconstitutional policing.

While he did not mention any specific incidents, he did refer to "... concerning levels of in-custody deaths, troubling allegations of excessive force and misconduct." Also, he stressed that he was reacting to community concerns about the sheriff's office.

"When some communities don't see or feel they are being treated equitably by law enforcement," Bonta said in his press release, "it contributes to distrust and hurts public safety."

But he didn't refer to a September 2021 letter to his department from the Southern California unit of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) Foundation that specifically requested, "... [he] initiate a pattern or practice investigation into the Riverside County Sheriff's Department (RSD)."

"For years, this Department has demonstrated a pattern of racist policing practices, rampant patrol and jail deaths, and a refusal to comply with recommendations from oversight agencies and a court-mandated consent decree. Riverside County residents, particularly residents of color and low-income residents, have suffered immeasurably as a result," the ACLU wrote as the reason and need for such an investigation.

The nine-page letter then enumerated eight areas and several specific incidents the ACLU felt were intolerable and examples of inappropriate law enforcement behavior.

The ACLU said the sheriff's office had rejected previous grand jury recommendations. The ACLU stated that since 2014, different county juries had issued eight separate reports about the sheriff's operations.

"The RSD has rejected nearly every recommendation made by the County's Civ-

il Grand Jury to improve the Department's operations over the last several years," the ACLU stated and attributed the refusal to adopt grand jury recommendations to both former Sheriff Stan Sniff and current Sheriff Chad Bianco.

The ACLU also criticized the sheriff's office for how it responded to COVID-19's threat to prisoners. In April 2020, only a month after the pandemic was seizing the country, Prison Law Office, a Berkeley non-profit public interest law firm, filed an emergency motion to protect county inmates from the virus.

The U.S. District Judge granted the motion to have the sheriff's office develop a plan for the safety and care of prisoners. The sheriff and Prison Law Office filed a joint plan in July.

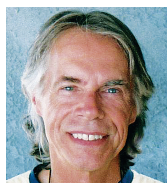
Between March 2020 and May 2021, nine people died in Riverside County jails, but it is not known if any died from COVID-19 or its complications, according to the letter.

In February 2021, the Desert Sun reported, "State corrections officials say they're confident the Riverside County Sheriff's Department is doing all it can to correct previous violations related to inmate safety and ensure the incarcerated are protected during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic," and added that inmates had been provided masks and cleaning supplies, "all of which helps limit the transmission of COVID-19." At that time one inmate and two officers had died from COVID.

Besides fatalities within the jails, the ACLU included fatal shootings attributed to deputies making arrests or responding to calls. The ACLU alleged that most of these deaths did not involve threats with a dangerous item to the officers nor involved a mental health crisis.

Other issues and incidents were cited in the letter. It is not known to what, if any, extent this was Bonta's motivation to initiate the investigation, which is just beginning. The ACLU's Southern California unit did not respond to requests for comment about the letter or Bonta's recent action.

lost power for periods of time, according to Shane Reichardt, senior public information specialist for the county’s Emergency Management Department (EMD).

“The longest was about 12 hours and, of course, due to heavy branches falling on the power lines,” he said and added that EMD kept in close contact with Southern California Edison and the local fire department in case of other potential emergencies.

Despite the amount snow on the Hill, it was considerably less than in the San Bernardino Mountains north of the San Jacinto Mountains. For example, Lake Arrowhead received more than 5 feet of snow during the late February storms and another 41 inches March 1. Snow Valley had 78 to 90 inches as of Feb. 26 and reported another 24 to 40 inches March 1. Cumulatively, that is 8 to 11 feet of snow.

Statewide, the snowfall was enormous. North of San Bernardino it was even greater and some ski resorts had to close temporarily. In every area of the state, the snowpack exceeded its average depth for April 1 and especially for early March.

For the entire Sierra range, the reading was 170% of April 1 and 190% for March 3, but in the Southern Sierra, the current depth was 230% compared to the March 3 average and 210% of the April 1 average.

San Bernardino County was one of 13 California counties where Gov. Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency due to the problems created from the most recent enormous snowfall. Several major highways in the San Bernardino Mountains were closed due to the snow accumulation. As they were slowly cleared, the county and Cal Trans District 8 provided escorts up the mountain

for several days. Locally, by March 3, highways 74 and 243 were open in both directions to Idyllwild. On Friday, for Highway 243, Cal Trans District 8 required chains on all vehicles (except 4-wheel drive if they had snow tires on all four wheels) from the intersections of 243 with Highway 74 in Mountain Center and I-10 in Banning. By Saturday morning, neither highway had any driving restrictions. All of this precipitation will yield long-term effects on the region. The danger from both wildfire and drought has been reduced.

Cal Fire expects fire conditions to improve noticeably in the short term. Last week, the Predictive Services unit forecast was, “Large fire potential is expected to remain at a near normal level for the next several months. In the more immediate timeframe, recent rains should keep live fuels with well above normal fuel moisture. Dead fuels — especially larger diameter fuels — should retain moisture through the end of March.

“Little, if any, fire activity is expected over 7,000 feet throughout the spring due to the current heavy snowpack. Therefore, given these factors, large fire potential and resource demand should be near normal levels this March [to] June,” they concluded.

Besides a lessening wildfire threat, drought conditions have significantly changed since Thanksgiving. Three months ago, all of California was considered in some stage of drought. As of March 1, nearly 16% of the state is free of drought.

And at the end of November, nearly 40% of the state was in either extreme or exceptional drought, the two worst conditions. As of last week, none of the state was considered that bad. More than half of California is only abnormally dry or moderately dry.

San Bernardino National Forest temporarily closed for public safety

Editor's note: The following is from an SBNF press release. The release did not say how this order would be enforced.

To better provide public and community safety due to the recent extreme weather the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) of the U.S. Forest Service announced a temporary closure of all forest lands, including the San Jacinto Ranger District. This closure is to be in effect from 11:59 pm. Friday, March 3, through 11:59 p.m. Thursday, March 16.

This emergency forest-wide closure is necessary to protect public safety in light of severe winter storms that have impacted the area this week, causing California's governor to declare a state of emergency for mountain communities in San Bernardino County. Roads are impassible in portions of the forest and emergency response is difficult due to the extreme amount of snow that has fallen. Avalanches are being reported in the area.

Residents of communities within and neighboring the forest have become stranded and are running low on food and water. State and local partners of the forest are working to clear roads and conduct rescue operations.

This Closure Order will improve access through National Forest System lands for first responders and those attempting to leave or access their homes, while minimiz-

ing the number of rescue operations that must be conducted. Also, National Forest staff resources are needed to address this winter storm emergency, leaving insufficient resources available to manage less-impacted portions of the forest in the usual manner.

Pursuant to 36 C.F.R. § 261.50(e), the following persons are exempt from this order:

- Persons with a Forest Service Permit No. FS-7700-48 (Permit for Use of Roads, Trails, or Areas Restricted by Regulation or Order), specifically exempting them from this order
- Owners or lessees of land in the area
- Residents of the area, including recreation residence permit holders
- Any federal, state or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty
- Persons engaged in a business, trade or occupation in the area
- Persons holding valid permits authorizing them to use the Bonita Ranch Campground or the Lytle Creek Firing Line, in accordance with the terms of their permits; and holders of valid ski passes issued by Forest Service-permitted ski resorts that remain open for business.

State and feds extend tax deadline to October

The state and federal emergency declarations will affect taxpayers — individuals and businesses — affected by these storms. Riverside County is included in these declarations. Below is information on what is possible and how to obtain more information.

California emergency tax relief

Business owners and taxpayers impacted by California's winter storms are now eligible for emergency tax relief from late payment interest and penalties.

“As communities across the state continue recovering from the damage caused by the winter storms, California is working swiftly to help recovering Californians get back on their feet,” Gov. Gavin Newsom announced in a press release March 2. “The state is aligning with the Biden Administration and extending the tax filing deadline in addition to the tax relief announced earlier this year.”

To help alleviate some of the hardship many have endured during this trying period, the Franchise Tax Bureau (FTB) has extended the filing and payment deadlines for individuals and businesses in California until Oct. 16, 2023.

This relief applies to deadlines falling on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before Oct. 16, 2023, including the 2022 individual income tax returns due April 18 and the quarterly estimated tax payments, typically due Jan. 17, 2023 and April 18, 2023. Those payments were previously extended to May 15, 2023 for those impacted by winter storms and now extended to Oct. 16.

“Help is available for California businesses,” California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA) Director Nick Maduros said. “If you cannot file or make a payment on time because of the storms, please

reach out to us, and we can offer some relief.” Impacted taxpayers can request relief:

- In person at one of the field offices
- By phone at 1-800-400-7115 (CRS:711), Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Pacific Time), except state holidays.

Federal tax information

Following the disaster declaration the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued, individuals and households affected by severe winter storms, flooding and mudslides that reside or have a business in [the affected counties] qualify for tax relief.

The declaration permits the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to postpone certain tax-filing and tax-payment deadlines for taxpayers who reside or have a business in the disaster area. For instance, certain deadlines falling on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before Oct. 16, 2023, are granted more time to file through Oct. 16, 2023.

As a result, affected individuals and businesses will have until Oct. 16 to file returns and pay any taxes originally due during this period. This includes 2022 individual income tax returns due April 18, as well as various 2022 business returns normally due March 15 and April 18. Among other things, this means eligible taxpayers will have until Oct. 16 to make 2022 contributions to their IRAs and health savings accounts.

The Oct. 16 deadline also applies to the quarterly payroll and excise tax returns normally due Jan. 31, 2023. Also, penalties on payroll and excise tax deposits due on or after Jan. 8, 2023, and before Jan. 23, 2023, will be abated as long as the tax deposits were made by Jan. 23, 2023.

Scholarship season is here

Mutual Aid offers help during and after snow crisis

Idyllwild Forest Health Project is the nonprofit that sponsors the Mountain Communities Mutual Aid (MA). MA is a platform where people can express what they need or what they can offer. The food program arose out of this idea because people expressed concern for their food security at the start of the pandemic.

Currently, people can post requests for pretty much anything (except for cash gifts/donations to themselves) by posting on MA's Facebook group <https://www.facebook.com/groups/MCCMA> or calling/texting 951-468-0110 or visiting <https://mountainaid.net/> and clicking on “Get Assistance.”

Some recent service requests have included snow shoveling and hauling firewood, as well as deliveries of food and other necessities.

“We want people to understand that by expressing their needs on the platform, it enables other members to experience the pleasure of helping their neighbors,” said MA Coordinator Mara Schoner. “In most cases, once the needs are expressed, the solutions emerge. This ‘give and take’ builds a stronger community.”

If an affected taxpayer receives a late filing or late payment penalty notice from the IRS that has an original or extended filing, payment or deposit due date that falls within the postponement period, the taxpayer should call the telephone number on the notice to have the IRS abate the penalty.

The IRS automatically identifies taxpayers located in the covered disaster area and applies filing and payment relief. But affected taxpayers who reside or have a business located outside the covered disaster area should call the IRS disaster hotline at 866-562-5227 to request this tax relief.

Sheriff applying for OHV law enforcement grant

The Riverside County Sheriff's Office is applying for a total of \$265,157 from the California State Parks Off-Highway Motor Vehicle (OHV) Recreation Division Grants and Cooperative Agreements Program funding for law enforcement projects.

The Hemet station area is about 750 square miles. Most of the area patrolled is accessible to OHV-style vehicles. The area is comprised of both state and federal wildlife areas, Bureau of Land Management (BLM) areas and Riverside County Wildlife Habitat Conservation Land.

Hemet Station's area has several OHV approved riding areas such as Bee Canyon and Hixon Canyon riding area in Anza. The approved riding areas are about 20 to 30 miles. The Hemet Station is experiencing increased issues with OHV riders riding all the unapproved areas, which encompasses several hundred miles, along with illegal marijuana growers using OHV style vehicles to travel to their grow sites. The patrol area covers the unincorporated areas of Aguanga, Anza, Cahuilla Tribal Nation, East Hemet, Garner Valley, Gilman Hot Springs, Green Acres, Idyllwild, Lake Riverside, Mountain Center, Pine Cove, Pine Meadow, Ramona Tribal Nation, Sage, San Jacinto and San Jacinto Riverbed area, Santa Rosa Tribal Nation, Soboba Hot Springs and Valle Vista.

The Hemet Sheriff's Station area includes mountain, valley, desert and wilderness areas. The area has hundreds of miles of open space and contains all types of weather, such as snow, rain, high winds, extreme heat and debris flow after two large wildland fires in the area. Hemet Station area has various open

space habitat protected areas that have seen multiple issues of fencing being cut and OHV tracks in the protected area.

The Sage area has had specific incidents of trespassing in protected areas and OHV tracks have been discovered and recorded by Riverside County Park rangers and Riverside County biologists.

Hemet Station has had 2,000 to 3,000 illegal marijuana grows and has recovered several illegal OHV-style vehicles. The station has seen proof that the growers use these vehicles to travel from grow site to grow site. Over 100 firearms also have been recovered. This has become a serious officer safety issue for anyone patrolling OHV areas.

Within the jurisdiction of the Hemet station, many areas exist where endangered species are being directly negatively impacted by illegal OHV activities on the lands that have been acquired for their protection. In the San Jacinto River wash, which sees daily OHV trespassing, San Bernardino Kangaroo Rats and Least Bell's Vireo regularly have their burrows collapsed or nesting behavior disturbed.

Further south, in the Sage and Aguanga areas, the same can be said for Aguanga Kangaroo Rats and Coastal California Gnatcatchers. To the east, in the Anza area, OHVs frequent prime Quino Checkerspot Butterfly habitat, where OHVs have been implicated as being a major cause of mortality of young caterpillars who enjoy sunning themselves on open trails. The Southwestern Willow Flycatcher is an endangered bird and OHV activity in closed areas could disturb its nesting areas. The Arroyo Toad is an endangered toad and can have its

burrows collapsed by OHV operation in closed areas.

Due to this destructive potential, Multi-Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) ranger staff spend a great deal of time addressing the issue of OHV trespassing. In 2022, rangers contacted numerous OHVs on or approaching conserved land. However, MSHCP rangers do not possess citation authority and have little recourse in these interactions other than a verbal warning and an escort off the property.

Many more contacts were attempted but were unsuccessful as the individuals fled the area. During the same time, rangers discovered and repaired cut fences and damaged gates or locks associated with illegal OHV activity. In 2020, the U.S. Forest Service had to cut most of its program related to OHV enforcement and education. This increased the burden and need for the Riverside County Sheriff's Office's involvement in OHV matters. To address the issue, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office Hemet OHV Team was formed to actively patrol no-go areas within Hemet's jurisdiction. The OHV Team will cite illegal OHV operators and guide OHV riders to legal riding areas. The Hemet OHV Team educates OHV riders on where to ride and provides maps to show legal riding areas within the Hemet jurisdictional area.

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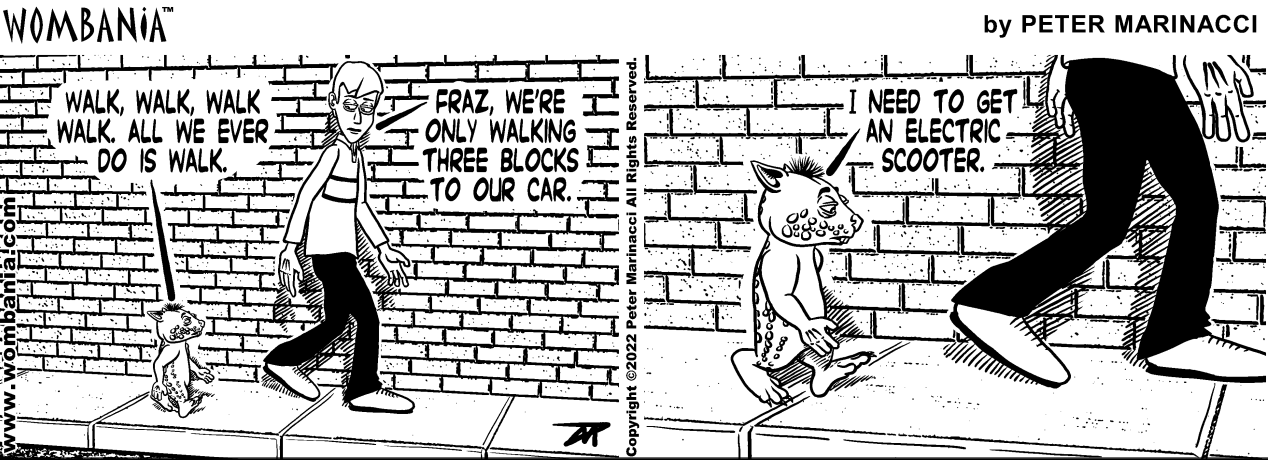
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County cracking down on unpermitted STRs

On Oct. 25, 2022, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors agreed to impose a moratorium on issuing new certificates for short-term rentals (STRs) in the Idyllwild, Pine Cove and Wine Country areas of Riverside County. The moratorium on issuing new certificates was to last until Sept. 9, 2023.

Before the moratorium deadline, the county has instructed its contractor, Deckard Technologies of San Diego, to initiate action.

On Feb. 21, the contractor began sending letters to owners of STRs in the county, according to Felisa Cardona, the public information office for the county's Transportation and Land Management Agency, which includes the Planning Department.

Three types of letters have been sent. The first and largest set went to permitted and legally operating STRs. Its purpose was to inform them of the new rules (such as off-street parking requirements and signage which should display the STR certificate number, the name and phone number of the responsible operator, the maximum occupancy, and the phone number for the county's 24-hour Code Enforcement and clearly visible from the street) and their need to comply with these.

The second group of letters went to STR owners outside the moratorium area. These STRs appear to be operating without a county certificate for STRs. The letter informed

them of the need of and how to comply with the county code.

The third letter, and most relevant to Hill residents, went to unpermitted or expired operations within one of the moratorium areas of the Hill and the Wine Country. These letters directed the operators to cease operations.

Nearly a third of the 1,900 letters mailed went to STR owners in the second and third groups. These people were told they have 30 days to comply or cease operations. If they continue to operate after the 30-day deadline, the county may seek a cease and desist order, according to Cardona.

"Our Call Center has been fielding these calls and answering the questions of the operators," Cardona wrote. "Some of them will need to shut down until the moratorium is lifted and/or the board gives further direction."

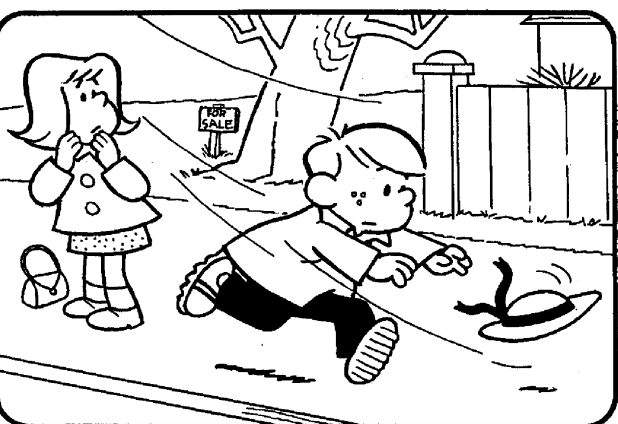
In Phase 2 of the effort, the Planning Department has begun holding stakeholder meetings with the intention of formal public hearings in the future.

The contract with Deckard was approved nearly a year ago. Among its responsibilities is developing and implementing an online system for registration and management of all STRs.

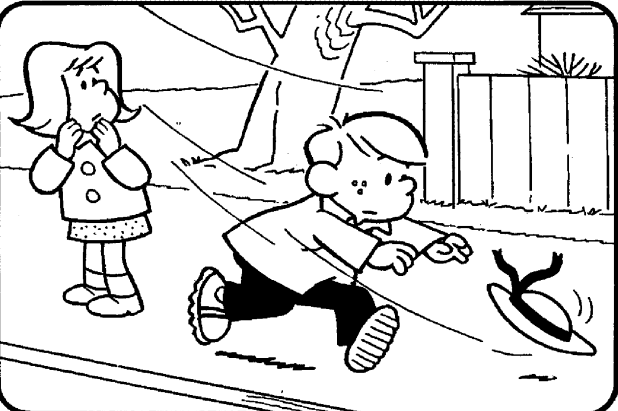
Also, STR owners will be able to access the online system to make payments for registration of STRs, renewing certificates and submitting the Transient Occupancy Tax from the rentals.

Finally, the county has access to reporting tools, such as the ability to identify and contact unpermitted, but operating, STRs.

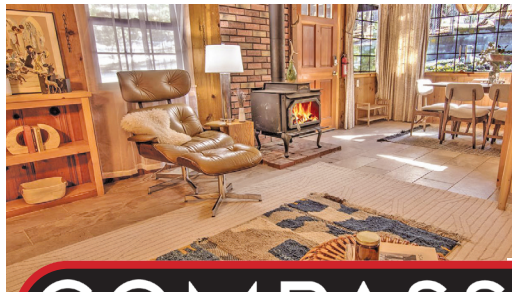

How Brian Parnell's unique venue, AudioWild, took root

Brian Parnell has taken a circuitous journey to end up an Idyllwild. Like so many of us, a chance taken paid off in the satisfaction that comes from being part of a community that supports self-expression. Readers with an ear for the pulse of 21st century rock know him as one of the founders of Throw the Goat, a local band that achieved global success. His new venture is AudioWild, a venue and recording studio in "downtown Idyllwild" serving musicians and other audio dreamers and bringing together fans and performers for intimate concerts that rock the house without keeping the neighbors up. The Town Crier sat down with Parnell recently to get his origin story on the record.

TC: What is your backstory, how did you come to Idyllwild?

BP: I graduated from Montclair High school in beautiful Montclair, California in the year 2000. All through middle school and high school my friend Tyler Campbell, we worked on music together, incorporating our home computers into the recording process. At the time the OS was Windows 95. Windows 95 came with a program called Sound Recorder

TC: That was good enough to get you started?

BP: That was pretty cool, you could mix files together, reverse it, speed it up, slow it down. We started sampling drum beats from whatever CDs our parents had in their collection, ZZ Top albums, things like that. After we graduated I ended up getting a gig as a guitar technician. It's worth noting that Tyler now works for Space X and plays banjo in a two piece band called Giving Up The Ghost with his wife Marie Regalado. I recorded a few of their songs which I think will be released later this year.

TC: You got a job with a touring band?

BP: A band called theStart. I was a fan. The band was comprised of members from bands I was into in the mid to late 90s. They formed this, in my opinion, super group. In those days there were message boards on bands' websites where you could interact with bands and chat with other fans around the world. We had a little tight-knit unit of fans of this band, and I ended up meeting them at the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) trade show. As a plus, for the teenagers in attendance, there's a lot of big celebrity musicians to sign autographs and stuff, so I was pretty stoked on that and brought my little CD booklet for them to sign. They saw my badge; at the time my dad had a guitar and amp business in Upland, California, I'm pretty sure he only opened that shop just so he could get a NAMM membership, I didn't understand why he was so excited about it, but I definitely got it after attending.

So they were looking at my badge and it says "Parnell Guitar and Amp Repair," and at the time I wore a beanie, obnoxious neon green, that said "puke" on the front, a nickname I got in my teenage years, definitely earned it. They were like "Wait, are you the 'Puke' from our message board?" "Yeah, that's me." "And you know how to repair guitars and stuff?" "Yeah." At a weird point in my life where I'd quit my job, and I'd dropped out of college, and I didn't know what the hell I was going to do I got an email asking if I wanted to "roadie" for them for one show in Santa Ana at the Observatory. I did, I was a drum tech for that show and it worked out well, and they

asked if I wanted to do a one week tour with them in a van and trailer. I was like "Sure." That worked and they were like "OK, we've got two months that we're doing with Sugar Ray in a tour bus doing arenas." This was in 2001, like the height of Sugar Ray's career. I was a touring guitar technician for 10 years. For theStart, and then I moved to England for a little bit, I was working for a band out there. Came back to the states. I ended up in Idyllwild ... I came back from a tour in 2005. That year we toured with Garbage and a band called Gold Finger. My buddy Tyler, I'd been talking with him, and his parents moved when we graduated. I was like, "Where the hell they moving?" "Some little mountain town, Pine Cone or something." It turned out they had moved up here and opened Merkaba, the purple tea shop. Tyler moved up here for his own personal reasons. He was telling me about the town and was like, "Hey there's a lot of artists, a lot of musicians, we can work on music like we did in the old days, what do you say?" At the time I was in Niagara Falls, New York. I called his bluff and moved 3,000 miles and lived in his laundry room for a few months until we found a place with enough bedrooms.

TC: You and your friend found a place and settled in to finding things you could do up here?

BP: We already knew how to record music. We started messing with more modern stuff that was still free and available, honing our skills. It was the same situation we were into in high school, a project with two guys and a computer that you couldn't recreate live, so we never really got a band going, per se. But I always wanted to be in a band. Then 10 years on the road ... being a fly on the wall for the collapse of the music industry, and (the rise of) Napster and iTunes. When we got back from that first tour, like four months later, the first iPod came out, and iTunes. So, everything completely changed. The band I was touring with, we were in tour buses and stuff, and the next thing you know it's a van and trailer again, and they have to go back to their DIY punk rock roots. So, I got to learn how the whole label system works, and how the DIY punk rock scene works, and then go to the UK and learn their whole system. Then I end up in Idyllwild after a marriage that fell apart and not knowing what to do. A buddy of mine up here was like, "Hey, some of us are getting together to jam, do you want to play guitar, we hear you're a guitarist." I'd known them for years and never played for them. I had to get a guitar and amp out of storage from my ex's place. We got together in a little two-bedroom shack in Pine Cove with shag carpet. I'd only come out to California for a two week visit to see what I could salvage of my life, figure something else out. The only rule was that I didn't want to do anything that I had done previously. Jamming with these guys the vibes were super cool. I was like, "Can I just stay here and sleep on the couch and we can do this?" It was like, "Yeah, no problem!" My two-week visit ended up being ... 12 years. That ended up becoming Throw the Goat. None of us anticipated how popular we were going to end up being with the young folk in town.

TC: It worked out.

BP: It worked out really well. Our first show was so packed we couldn't fit any more people in that building; there were people on the sidewalk looking through the windows. It was crazy. At Bone Daddies, where Mountain Maniacs Arcade is now.

TC: You hit a nerve or filled a need?

BP: For sure. Our group, our age group had only just started reproducing and getting married and that sort of stuff. Everyone was looking to party it up; we were a party kind of band for sure. Those early glory days were definitely something else. Then it became work. Our first tour was a UK tour. I was so glad because I had always wanted to have a band, now I was able to apply all this stuff I had learned for a decade: OK, this is how you work with a publicist, this is how you do this, this is how you do that. There's no way we would have been able to book a UK tour.

TC: You knew the details, the business, the technology and the drudge work, too?

BP: The ins and outs, I'd been soaking it up like a little sponge.

TC: Your first tour in the UK, it's great for a small-town band to hit the world that way.

BP: Everybody was so excited for us and we just stepped over all the other bands in the scene. We gave people the impression we were this really big professional band right out of the gate. We were still very, very green, wet behind the ears, with delusions of grandeur ...

TC: But you could put something out there.

BP: We ended up coming up with something that people were interested in and strangely enough, that first album, we called it "Black Mountain," still to this day, when I check all our streaming numbers, it's still one of our most popular releases. Even though that was over 10 years ago.

TC: You recorded it yourselves?

BP: Demo recorded at "Goat House" with Michael McDole, no longer with us. The album — (we) found a place in Temecula called The Vault. A venue, store, rehearsal place, recording studio. Engineer Alex Papas — I met in 2002 on the Warped Tour, one of the many connections I was able to incorporate in the early days of the band. We learned a lot being in the studio with Alex. It's kind of hard for me to listen to the first album; we weren't all that prepared to go into the studio and there's a lot of ProTools trickery ...

TC: Only you know what really happened?

BP: Yeah. Everybody else was super stoked and it took so long to do it. Afterward, the album's out and anyone I'm riding in a car with ... the first thing they would do is put on "Black Mountain." I'm like, "This is the last thing I want to listen to," but everybody's so excited, you don't want to be a jerk (laughs).

Parnell went on to describe the inevitable "life takes over" and the band "started losing people one by one." Once the band started going through a revolving door of members it lost some local interest.






