

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

# Forest open, road closure order expires June 30

On March 18, the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) announced the closing of most of its internal Forest System Roads. The closures would expire June 30 and were the result of ... "Significant winter storms in February and March 2023 [that] have resulted in extreme snowfall on the higher elevation terrain of the forest and continuing rains/snow melt is affecting road conditions at lower elevations," according to the Forest Service's press release.

All five SBNF districts, including the San Jacinto and four districts in the San Bernardino Mountains, were being treated the same although the recorded snowfall in the northern districts was between two to four times the volume of snow falling on the Hill.

While San Jacinto Peak received much more snow than the lower communities, access to it is limited to trails, not roads. A total of 31 San Jacinto Ranger District (SJRD) roads or portions of those roads have been closed.

The two exceptions provided in the order were for persons with a Forest Service Permit No. FS-7700-48 specifically exempting them from this order and any federal, state or local officer, or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty.

Forest Service staff stressed that the forest areas, such as hiking trails, were not closed. People could access areas by walking, snowshoeing, skiing or other nonmotor vehicles.

SJRD Acting District Ranger Susan Zahn explained the local closures in an email to the Town Crier: "With so many storms, providing snow and rain, and more snow, many of the mountain roads have proven to be difficult in navigating or even impossible in higher elevation portions of the forest, possibly making access for emergency response more difficult — impacting public and employee safety. There have been unusual reporting of avalanches throughout the forest, including the San Jacinto mountains."

One avalanche, on the eastern side of the mountain, was captured on a phone camera and the video posted on Twitter in early March.

"In lower elevations where snow has melted, there is concern about possible resource impacts of people driving in muddy areas and even sometimes off-road," Zahn continued. "The district has been able to do cursory surveys of road and building damage but has not been able to get to the higher elevations, as yet, to check these areas for resource concerns."

More specific assessment of the local conditions was provided by Lee Beyer, SJRD recreation forestry technician. "Due to the significant amount of snow at the higher elevations, many obstacles, such as fallen rocks and trees, as well as erosion channels from the rain on snow events are hidden."

"I am aware of reported trees across the road on Black Mountain Road (reported by a volunteer who was hiking)," he added. "Santa Rosa and South Ridge usually have trees and rocks of various sizes on the roads in the springtime."

The Forest Service officials stressed that their staff regularly survey the road conditions. Consequently, many of the roads may be reopened before the order's June 30 termination.

The National Weather Service's current forecast for April through June is below average precipitation in Southern California, which may help advance the reopening of many of the roads.

However, Beyer advised, "If significant road issues are found (significant erosion, or large boulders on the road) then road conditions could require longer term closures until the repairs can be completed or obstacles are removed."

Lake Fulmor is currently closed due to restroom remodeling.

# IWD may have violated Brown Act in rate votes

Last week's Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors vote for new rates in a special meeting occurred in apparent violation of the Ralph M. Brown Act, the state's open meeting law.

The vote was taken under the title "Discussion Items," whereas in order to vote, the item should fall under IWD's "Action Items."

Following Bartle Wells Associates' Michael DeGroot's presentation, the board voted for an 8% per year rate increase over five years for water. It passed 4-1 with Director Steve Olson the no vote.

A 13% increase each year over the next five years for sewer rates, passed 4-1 with Peter Szabadi the lone no vote.

The Town Crier reached out to President Charles Schelly to let him know of the violation but did not hear back by press time.

The next step was to be public meetings so the directors and water study agency can explain to the public the needs for the increases and then the public has the right to vote on the increases.

Proposition 218 "established voter approval requirements for general and special taxes and provided the initiative power to voters to reduce or repeal any local tax, assessment, fee or charge."

# Local man convicted for fatal collision

A 32-year-old Idyllwild resident was convicted for two felony charges stemming from a fatal traffic collision in 2020.

Victor Javier Sanchez was convicted for a total of 3 years and 8 months in state prison on felony charges of vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence and reckless driving causing bodily injury. Probation was denied.

At about 3:18 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 16, 2020, Sanchez, then 29, with an unknown address, was driving a Dodge Challenger northbound on Highway 79, just north of Dugan Drive, at about 50 to 60 mph on a downhill curved portion of roadway, according to a California Highway Patrol (CHP) report.

Michelle Schulberg, then 50, of Aguanga, was driving a 2018 Subaru Outback southbound on Highway 79, just north of Dugan Drive, at about 45 to 50 mph on an uphill curved portion of roadway, approaching the Challenger.

Sanchez was traveling behind traffic directly ahead, traveled across the solid double yellow lines directly toward the Outback's front end. The Challenger collided into the front of the Outback, causing it to veer partially off the roadway onto the dirt should, west of the roadway, and come to a stop. The Challenger stopped partially within the northbound and southbound lanes.


CHP, American Medical Response (AMR) and CalFire responded to the scene. An AMR paramedic pronounced David Schulberg, 60, of Aguanga, the passenger in the Outback, deceased at the scene. He was the spouse of the driver.

Michelle Schulberg and Sanchez suffered major injuries while a 17-year-old unnamed female passenger from Temecula in the Challenger suffered moderate injuries. The three were transported to Inland Valley Medical Center.

Sanchez's arrest occurred Sept. 11, 2020, "due to the subject's major injuries, and he was hospitalized until it was safe for him to be booked into jail," said CHP Officer Mike Lassig of the Temecula station.

Schulberg was a "40-year veteran California law enforcement insignia collector ..." according to Police Collector News Editor Mike R. Bondarenko. He had worked for both the Compton and El Monte police departments, according to Bondarenko.

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

### Official end of the COVID emergency less than a month away

The Department of Health and Human Services plans to declare the federal Public Health Emergency for COVID-19 expired at the end of the day on May 11, saying, “Over the last two years, the Biden Administration has effectively implemented the largest adult vaccination program in U.S. history, with nearly 270 million Americans receiving at least one shot of a COVID-19 vaccine.”

As of Monday, April 10, the Dashboard of the Hemet Unified School District reported recently confirmed cases of COVID at Idyllwild School and Hamilton elementary as being no students and no staff members. At Hemet High, one student and no staff members are reported as confirmed cases, while Hamilton secondary reported no students and one staff member with COVID.



# Forest Service receives warm welcome at House Appropriations Hearing

Thursday, March 23, the U.S. House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior, Environment and Related Agencies held its hearing on the U.S. Forest Service’s proposed budget for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which begins Oct. 1. Michael Simpson (R) of Idaho chaired the hearing, which several other representatives attended and asked questions of Forest Service Chief Randy Moore, the only Forest Service witness. He also provided a five-page prepared statement before taking questions from the subcommittee members.

Both Simpson, Rep. Chellie Pingree (D) of Maine, the ranking minority member, and other committee members were supportive of the Forest Service budget request. Wildland firefighting and the proposal for firefighter pay increases, as well as housing and health support were well received by all the subcommittee members.

In her opening statement, Pingree said, “We are very supportive of the administration’s commitment to supporting wildland firefighters and their families through better compensation, and safe housing and providing health and well-being assistance.”

Her first question to Moore was what would be the consequence to the proposals if the budget level were kept at the FY 2020 to 2022 levels.

“If we were to have budget cuts in this area, we would have to reduce the number of firefighters,” he replied directly. Regardless of the level of firefighter reductions, the benefits — compensation, housing and health — would still have to be provided to those firefighters still employed, he maintained.

“There has to be a correlation; we have to treat employees like we value them,” he stressed.

If the Forest Service increases its firefighting staff, would that merely shift firefighters from state, tribal or local units to the federal agency, asked Rep. Mike Cloud (R) of Texas.

Moore emphatically replied, “No . . . Most of the Forest Service’s hiring is at the lower levels, so we’re not taking from other entities. We’re bring people in and training

them. The FY 24 budget is such a blessing to the agency. It gives us an opportunity to pay federal firefighters a fair compensation [compared] to nonfederal firefighters.”

Rep. Mark Amodei (R) of Nevada also discussed the need for housing to help lower paid employees.

Moore agreed that Amodei was focused on the crux of a larger problem — recruiting. “When I look at some of our locations across the country, more and more of our communities are beginning to be really expensive — particularly at the lower end of the grade [pay] scale . . . Depending on where you are, that’s not enough to pay for rent.”

This may result in the Forest Service having to relocate its offices. “We have some locations where we ask if we have enough presence there to continue to stay in the community,” Moore related.

The hazardous fuels reduction program was a concern of Rep. Josh Harden (D) of California. He asked if the Forest Service plans to expand its efforts to reduce hazardous fuels.

Moore replied that the size of untreated areas might be in the millions, the Forest Service tries to focus on fire sheds. These are areas of about 250,000 acres. According to its fire research staff, treating 20 to 40% in these areas will make a significant reduction in the potential wildland fire threat in that area. In FY 24, the Forest Service plans to treat about 134 fire sheds, which is slightly more than half.

This work will benefit about 200 communities throughout the country, Moore mentioned. “I’m pleased with the FY 24 budget. It doesn’t do everything, but it does do a whole lot.”

Simpson asked Moore for a 10-year plan to expand and improve the Forest Service’s wildfire air resources. He has had support to accomplish this effort to create a “small fleet of aircraft” from previous forest chiefs and agriculture secretaries but its cost is too much to include in a single budget request.

He also opined that better aviation equipment might allow for night firefighting when wildfires’ intensity tends to diminish.

Moore agreed and described the Forest Service’s efforts to employ nighttime firefighting with a special helicopter in Southern California and its hopes

to expand this program.

Timber sales was one program with which several members were disappointed in the Forest Service’s efforts and progress. Rep. Derek Kilmer (D) from the state of Washington expressed those feelings directly. He told Moore, “We’re failing to provide meaningful harvest levels.”

Kilmer was specifically concerned about the low volume of timber sales in his district, which includes the Olympic National Forest. He noted that historically nearly 20 million board feet (BF) of timber had been sold in this area; the current plan is 10 million, but the actual sales level was only 3 million BF.

“We’re not getting support from the service that we need . . . we’re failing the communities we live in,” he concluded.

In response, Moore promised that the level of timber sales nationally will increase. In fiscal 2022, the Forest Service sold nearly 3.4 billion BF, an increase of more than 10%. The goal over the next five years is sales totaling 4 billion BF. Implementing the Wildfire Crisis Strategy will help achieve that goal.

Timber sales in recent years have been slower as the Forest Service revamps its internal management of sales and the services it provide. For example, the Forest Service has implemented a new program, with grant funding, to develop innovative timber products and industries. The cross-laminated timber program has led to the construction of six plants across the country.

“We’re creating new industry,” Moore replied. The intent is to provide both a consistent but stable market of wood to these new industries. And 10 million BF is still the goal for the Olympic National Forest.

Several members also expressed support for integrating new technology into the service’s firefighting toolbox. Attention was given to the greater use of drones during wildfires and satellites to evaluate fire progress.

Moore concurred and described the service’s initial efforts to employ more of these technologies in its future firefighting repertoire. He added that dependence on remote fire towers was going to be less as the Forest Service deploys a new camera system capable of detecting smoke.

EPA grants waivers to state for zero emission truck rules

On March 31, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) granted two waivers to California Clean Air Act regulations for heavy-duty trucks. This will allow the state to proceed with its goals of manufacturing more zero-emission vehicles (ZEV), including trucks.

Following Gov. Gavin Newsom's 2020 executive order to develop new rules, last summer the California Air Resources Board (CARB) approved regulations requiring 100% of new car sales in California to be ZEVs by 2035. This rule also applied to light duty trucks.

But a waiver from EPA for new motor vehicle emission standards was necessary. As part of the process, CARB requested two waivers for regulations relating to heavy-duty vehicles and engines.

“Under the Clean Air Act, California has longstanding authority to address pollution from cars and trucks. Today's announcement allows the state to take additional steps in reducing their transportation emissions through these new regulatory actions,” said EPA Administrator Michael S. Regan.

With these waivers, the state indicated it will require truck manufacturers to accelerate their sales of ZEVs. CARB will continue its process of setting increasing ZEV manufacturing standards starting from 2024 through 2035, including implementing the Advanced Clean Trucks (ACT) rule.

The ACT regulation requires that manufacturers produce and sell increasing quantities of medium- and heavy-duty ZEVs and near ZEVs in California. Specifically, new truck sales should increase to 55% (Class 2b-3), 75% (Class 4-8) and 40% of semitractor-trailer sales to be zero-emissions by 2035.

EPA also stated that the waiver addressed both the Zero Emission Airport Shuttle Bus Regulation and the Zero Emission Powertrain Certification.

The bus shuttle regulation establishes steadily increasing zero-emissions levels for airport shuttle fleets at California's 13 largest airports. The powertrain rule establishes certification requirements and optional emission standards for 2021 and subsequent model year medium- and heavy-duty ZEVs and the zero-emission powertrains installed in such vehicles.

Upon learning of the EPA decision, Newsom said, “This is a big deal for climate action. Last year, California became one of the first jurisdictions in the world with a real plan to end tailpipe emissions for cars.

“Now, thanks to the Biden administration, we're getting more zero-emission heavy duty trucks on the roads, expanding our world-leading efforts to cut air pollution and protect public health,” Newsom said in his press release. “We're leading the charge to get dirty trucks and buses — the most polluting vehicles — off our streets, and other states and countries are lining up to follow our lead around the world.”

California and other states who are taking the same direction represent 22% of the national truck market. Eight states have moved to adopt or are working to adopt ACT.

With the help of new federal and state incentives and rebates, nearly 19% of cars sold in the state in 2022 were ZEVs. Going forward, the governor and the Legislature have dedicated over \$5 billion to the transition to cleaner trucks and buses.

State will oversee review of potential consolidation of two water agencies

An evaluation of the merits and potential problems of merging the Thomas Mountain Mutual Water Association (TMMWA), in Garner Valley, and the Lake Hemet Municipal Water District (LHMWD) is about to begin.

The State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) will oversee the technical assistance review that is expected to start this spring. This step will require at least a year or more, according to Patty Anderson, TMMWA president, and LHMWD General Manager Michael Gow. And the state's Division of Financial Assistance will provide grant funding for the work.

The county's Department of Environmental Health (DEH), who currently oversees the TMMWA system, has encouraged this process. The county foresees several benefits.

“The larger system will allow access to more resources. Costs such as billing, operational equipment, operational personnel and new water sources can be shared as opposed to purchasing alone,” wrote DEH Deputy Director Brent Casey. “Ultimately the consolidation will allow for more sustainability.”

In general, SWRCB's Division of Drinking Water “... encourages all small water systems to physically or managerial ‘consolidate’ — join with or to form a single larger one,” according to Drought Communications Officer Dimitri Stanich with the SWRCB Public Information Office.

“This improves the system's reliability and sustainability through economies of scale,” Stanich added. “A larger number of customers reduces the individual costs and secures regular and reliable funding to operate, maintain, and manage water systems.”

Speaking specifically about the TMMWA, Stanich said, “[It] is a small single source water system with limited technical, managerial and financial capacity, and would benefit from consolidation, physical or managerial. The goal of the Technical Assistance assignment is to evaluate the water system's infrastructure, define the improvements necessary to consolidate (physically or managerially), assist in the development of a consolidation agreement, and complete and submit a construction funding application to our Division of Financial Assistance.”

Gow has provided some information to his board, including his concurrence and willingness to assist with a review. But the LHMWD board has neither discussed the issue nor taken a position.

Gow emphasized, “Nothing has been determined including LHMWD's or TMMWA's willingness to move forward, if any connection to the existing system will be part of it, the management or organizational structure of LHMWD's involvement, improvements, funding, etc. ... Please understand this not a commitment by LHMWD in any form and is only intended to advance the matter with the state.”

The idea originated more than a year ago. In February 2022, Anderson wrote the SWRCB at the suggestion of EHD county staff, requesting a review of a possible consolidation. The possibility of a consolidation and the need for a letter were discussed at the TMMWA board meeting that month.

If any construction is necessary to enable potential consolidation, Stanich said, “The timeline for submitting a completed construction application and the costs associated with the project are [to be decided].”

However, Gow noted that the two systems are not currently connected and opined that it may be possible to consolidate with improvements to the TMMWA infrastructure without creating a physical connection between the two systems.



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





## Art Department offers much — for nonartists, too

This week, the Crier met Marla Sparks, proprietor of Art Department, which shares with Mountain Pottery the newly remodeled building at the corner of Pine Crest Avenue and Maranatha Drive, one of local developer Shane Stewart's projects. Together, the two businesses make up a "creative corner" where locals and visitors alike will find the unexpected, an essential element in any work of art.

TC: How did you find Idyllwild?

MS: My husband and I both own the business; his name is Chris Sparks. We both grew up in LA and moved here during the pandemic, like a lot of other folk. My parents are local artists and we followed them up here with no real plans but to get out of the city and never go back. We had never lived in a small town; it's very sweet and I love the community. I had a job doing set design and event production where I was often anonymous on set and was frequently just referred to as "Art Department" in lieu of my name, so I thought it was a fun name for the shop.

Chris and I were always talking about the niche that needed to be filled; there were so many creatives up here but no art supply store. There had been Jack Farley's, but that was before our time. Our talking was always in the abstract, not like, "That's going to be us!"

TC: How did the other shoe drop?

MS: This property came on the market. We felt inspired by the blank canvas (pun intended), particularly the big empty lot used for years to park on, which just had so much potential ... The building had just been remodeled, it felt like a great opportunity to bring some new life to this historic corner.

TC: 100 yards from downtown is in the boonies?

MS: It's not downtown, but you could throw a rock and hit it.

TC: And you pulled the trigger?

MS: We did. It really worked out because Helen was looking to move and she's a wonderful neighbor; it makes it feel like a little creative corner at the edge of town.

TC: How did you figure out the mix, what to carry?

MS: We have a lot of traditional art supplies geared toward local artists with name brands people recognize. We also have a lot of DIY kits and weekend projects, great for part-timers and visitors. We get a lot of local support, including a lot of home-school kids. We carry a lot of kids' stuff; we also have a big assortment of miniature supplies. (Shows mini-colored pencils, 1-1/2 inches long, tiny water color kit, a sketch pad to scale, tiny stationary, a 2-inch-by-2-inch canvas.)

TC: There is a surprising amount of variety here!

MS: We try to hit every category. It's a small space but we have a little bit of everything. We have 700 square feet and try to fill up every inch with curated items that appeal to artists from all mediums and all skill levels. We make a point of trying to carry smaller brands and independent makers. We carry prints by Melissa Lakey, who grew up here. Our gifty stuff is all from smaller brands from around the world. We carry watercolors from a small brand that makes their own paint and then puts them in tree slices from their own backyard. We also do a lot of custom orders for locals, things too specific to carry. On the other hand, we get a lot of people come and say, "I don't do this, I'm not creative, I'm not an artist." Then they see something that clicks and they get inspired to make something. Idyllwild Arts has been very supportive, helping us ensure that we carry different things. We did a show for one of their classes recently in our Tiny Gallery.

TC: The Art Garden next door is an interesting plus. How did that come about?

MS: We contracted Kenny Gioeli for the landscaping and local Gary Parton (Alpenglow) donated some lilacs. We wanted it to be a space where people could work on art, take classes or just hang out.


TC: You offer classes?

MS: We do, weather permitting. Classes and workshops are held outside. We offer classes like watercolor, collage, weaving and lettering. We'll have a schedule posted soon on our website as well as on our bulletin board outside.

TC: Any parting thoughts?

MS: We have loved integrating ourselves into the community. We co-host Pints in the Pines annually with Wild Idy. It's a great family-friendly festival that celebrates local art culture with beer and live-mural painting, and benefits a different Idyllwild non-profit each year. We've loved working with ARF and Living Free and really enjoy the opportunity to give back locally while having a great time doing it. This year's festival will be Aug. 19. We feature artists from all over California, like Skye Walker, Sara M Lyons and Nicholas Danger. Dozens of breweries (backboned by Sierra Nevada and Strainge Beast Kombucha) enthusiastically support the event, which we put on with the help of local volunteers. Each year the festival has grown and we hope this year is no different. CREATURE CORNER

Last week in "Days of Our Nine Lives," ARF cats discussed the dreaded shedding of fur.

**Harley:** In addition to shedding that we discussed last week, what else is of note in the spring?

**Phil:** That's a good question! There is a good checklist for pet guardians to review as we move into spring.

**Don:** Right! First on the list applies to dogs, and it deals with heartworm. Heartworm disease is a potentially devastating disease that can cause heart failure and potentially death if left untreated. Treatment is costly and can be difficult. Prevention is the key in heartworm disease.

**Phil:** And it's an easy prevention! The second on the list is about a mountain pest: ticks. Ticks can carry many diseases, some of which can be dangerous, such as Lyme Disease, so dogs who frequent the outdoors need prevention! And if a dog travels off of the Hill to visit others, she might also need flea prevention. But up here on the mountain, she's safe. Fleas don't live at our altitude!

**Atlas:** This spring weather inspires many pet guardians to get their dogs on leashes and go for hikes, walks and maybe even jogs.

**Harley:** Atlas, you're correct, and that brings us to another point on the spring checklist: exercise!

**Pepper:** If human and dog have been inactive all winter, they should ease slowly into activity. They might start with leashed walks and shorter play sessions, then gradually work up to maximum activity.

**Harley:** Starting all at once can lead to injuries and sore muscles. Ouch!

**Phil:** But getting the dogs out and about is a great idea.

**Harley:** And we indoor cats really appreciate our people when they bring the outdoors inside.

**Atlas:** Let us experience the sites, smells, sounds of the great outdoors, but safely inside!

The West Area Planning Council approved the 610-space Baldy Mountain Recreational Vehicle Park proposed near Mountain Center by Jack Garner, Garner Valley rancher.

**40 years ago - 1983**  
A 147-foot pine tree on Tahquitz Drive was declared a public hazard and was cut down by Mike Pearson, owner of Pearson's Wood Service in Mountain Center.

**35 years ago - 1988**  
Because of changes made in General Telephone's equipment in Idyllwild, Hill residents would be able to have a choice of long-distance telephone service providers.

**30 years ago - 1993**  
Plans were being made for the fourth-annual Timber Festival sponsored by the Lions Club and held at Idyllwild County Park. One of the competitions would be the greased pole climb.

**25 years ago - 1998**  
Local resident Conor O'Farrell starred in the HBO mini-series, "From the Earth to the Moon," which told the story of space missions that led to the United States putting a man on the Moon. He could be seen in episodes one, five and eight.

**20 years ago - 2003**  
Elizabeth Monson of Pine Cove, in support of her Jewish faith and culture, spent three weeks of her vacation volunteering in the Israeli Army.

**15 years ago - 2008**  
Declining interest, aging membership and an

inability to recruit new members was hampering the Idyllwild Lions Club's activities.

**10 years ago - 2013**  
Mayor Max, Idyllwild's first mayor, passed away in his sleep Tuesday night, April 2. The mayor (a golden retriever) was 12 years old and had had health problems for several years, according to his chief of staff, Phyllis Mueller.
