

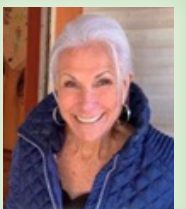

## Local business owner arrested on child sex charges

Local restaurateur Luis SolisDelgado, 44, of Idyllwild was arrested Thursday, April 27, on Acacia Avenue in Hemet and booked on five felony charges — one count of lewd and lascivious acts with a child under 14 years of age and four counts of sodomy with a child under 10.

"I was informed detectives are actively working this case and, to avoid compromising the investigation, are not releasing details at this time," said Riverside County Sheriff's Sgt. Wendy Brito-Gonzalez of the Media Information Bureau.

However, on Tuesday, May 2, the Riverside County District Attorney's (DA) Office filed eight counts of felony in Riverside County Superior Court dating as far back as Aug. 12, 2015, when one of the children was well under age 10 and up until April 26, 2023, when the other child was under age 14. The victims are two female children, according to the complaint, and involved sexual intercourse or sodomy, or oral copulation.

Solis is currently being held at the Southwest Detention Center with cash bond recommended at \$1 million. His arraignment was set for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday after press time.

"Because there are multiple underage victims, the defendant faces a possible life sentence," said District Attorney Information Specialist John Hall on Tuesday.

California judges instruct juries: "A defendant in a criminal case is presumed to be innocent. This presumption requires that the People prove a defendant guilty beyond a reasonable doubt." (Judicial Council of California Criminal Jury Instructions, no. 220.)

## Christy Holstege challenges Assemblyman to rematch

The next election for California's Assembly seats is the 2024 Presidential Election. Last week, nearly 18 months before the election and about a year before the primaries, Christy Holstege, Palm Springs council member, has announced her challenge to Greg Wallis, the current Assembly District 47 (AD) incumbent.

In 2022, following the state's redistricting of Assembly seats, most of the Hill communities were assigned to Assembly District 47. Nearly 70% of the voters in this district lived in Riverside County, the balance in San Bernardino County.

During the summer and fall, Republican Wallis and Democrat Holstege campaigned for votes to represent the district.

Finally in early December, the vote count was complete. Out of a total of 169,419 ballots submitted, Wallis had 85 more votes than Holstege. The 0.06% difference was the closest State Assembly race since 1994.

Last week, only four months after the count was completed, Holstege has announced her plans to challenge Wallis. When asked if the decision was hard after the tough and grueling campaign, she replied, "No! It was easy, I'm committed to the district and still the most experienced candidate."

"It felt hard to know I was so close, to come within 85 votes," Holstege continued. "Look at the turnout; it was only 54%. Less than half the voters selected the candidate. It was heart wrenching for my supporters."

Regardless of how she manages her cam-

paign this time, Holstege acknowledged that the 2024 will be much different than the 2022 campaign. Next year's will be a Presidential Election.

"A lot more voters will come out next year," she noted.

In the press release announcing her candidacy, Holstege said she will hold a series of community listening sessions throughout the district.

"I'll be coming to every corner of the district, including Idyllwild," Holstege said. "I'm committed to being directly engaged with the voters. There was a lot of misinformation from my opponent last year."

She specifically mentioned two opposition ads. One described her as "Bad for Healthcare." Yet she feels that endorsements from the California Medical Association and nurses group refute that ad.

The second ad claimed Holstege was going to be bad for the economy. "I served as mayor of Palm Springs and we had strong economic growth," she countered. In her press release, she added, "I have delivered real results to this region. From securing millions of dollars for injured workers and winning seniors Social Security benefits as a civil rights attorney, to obtaining \$36 million for new housing and homeless services as a city councilmember, I have ensured that our residents get the resources they deserve."

In her press release, Holstege also stressed, "Campaigns are not about one person, they are about people and the future of our region. As a mother to a young child, I care deeply about our future ... Our community is diverse



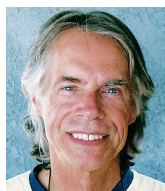
**Christy Holstege** is again running for state Assembly District 47 against **Greg Wallis.**

and inclusive. We deserve a voice in Sacramento that reflects our shared values."

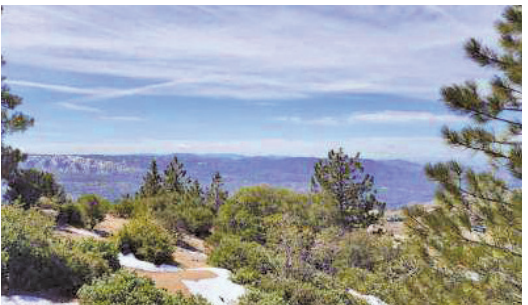
She is the first candidate to announce for the AD 47 race and currently the only Democrat seeking it. She acknowledged that she is not aware of any other candidates looming for the primary and doesn't foresee competition then.

Holstege lives in Palm Springs with her husband, Adam Gilbert, their 2-year-old son Aden, and their dogs, Layla and Ollie. She earned her law degree from Stanford Law School and has been a member of the Palm Springs City Council since 2017, serving as mayor from 2020 to 2021.

# May weather will look similar to March — wet and cool

The relatively balmy April temperatures and sunshine replaced the dismal and turbulent March weather. The beginning of May brings another change, almost a second act. Cool weather began to return Monday. The National Weather Service (NWS) forecasts its continuation, along with some precipitation, until the end of the week and recently described the current Southern California weather patterns as a “roller-coaster ride.”

The precipitation forecast for Idyllwild was about a half inch of rain between Wednesday and Thursday. But this new low may also bring back snow around the 5,000- to 5,500-foot elevations, according to the NWS Monday. Possibly 1 to 4 inches of snow may occur above 6,000 feet.

Affirming the “roller coaster” comparison, the snow forecast follows Saturday’s 106 degree high in Palm Springs Saturday, which tied the high temperatures also reached April 29 in 1959 and 2013.

On Monday, May 1, the NWS forecast for this week stated, “Drying and gradual warming is then expected into next weekend, but with high temperatures remaining below average through Sunday [May 7].”

Daniel Swain, a UCLA climate scientist, issued the same forecast late last week. “There will be yet another dramatic shift in the prevailing weather regime over California as a cutoff low pressure area sets up shop over or just west of NorCal by below average levels once again, although it’ll be less pronounced than recent cold spells.”

But he did think it would be colder this week, just not a great likelihood of a major storm.

Longer term, the NWS expects the month of May to be cooler and wetter than average.

Looking beyond this spring, Swain sees a greater than normal likelihood a major (perhaps super) El Niño event next winter that would “rival historic records” with increased odds of a wetter than usual winter.

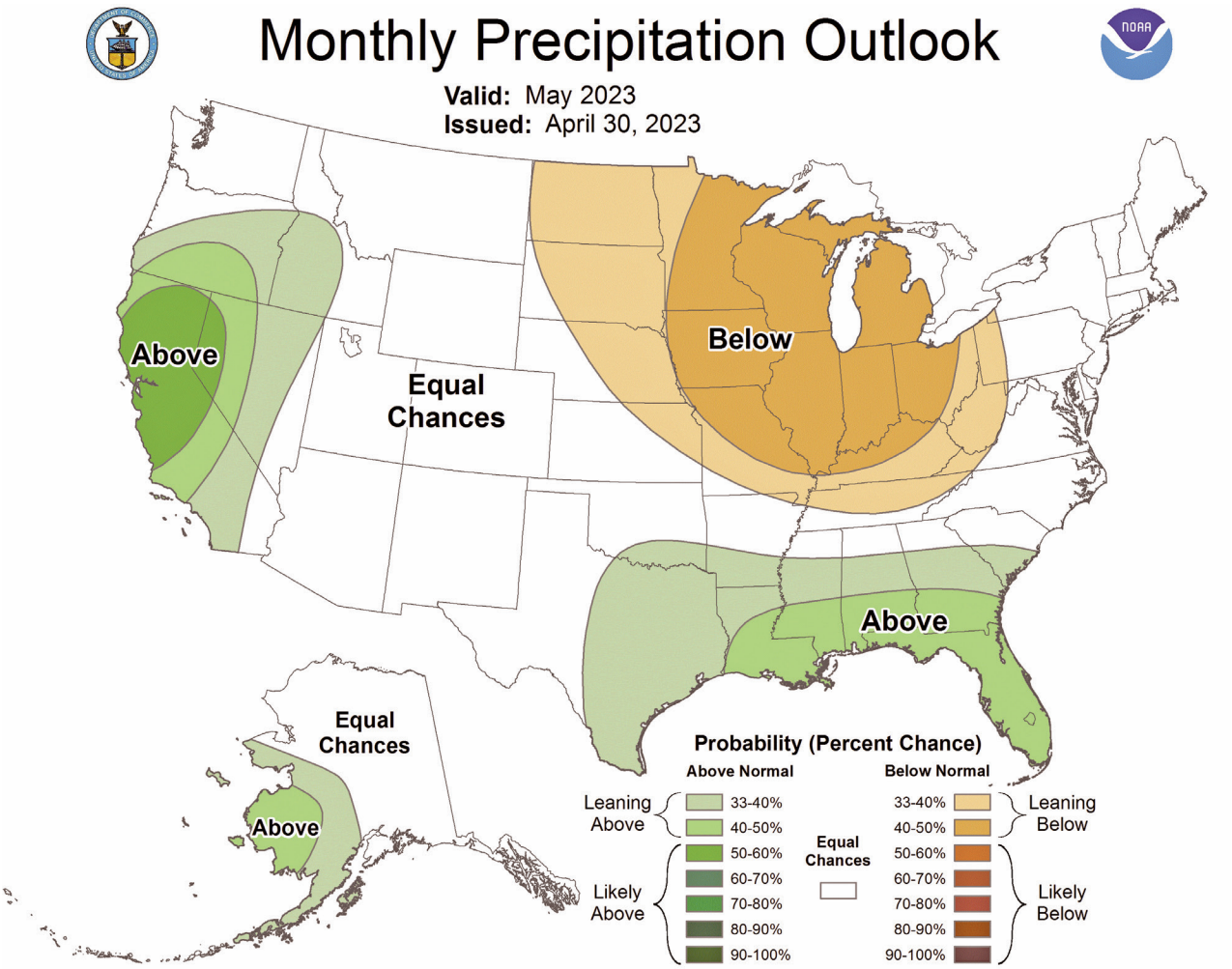
The reprieve from the voluminous precipitation was welcomed. That rain and snow has helped the Hill and the state recover from the threats of another drought year.

At the Idyllwild Fire Station, nearly 13 inches of rain fell during March. That is half the long-term average (25.7 inches) for the rain year (Oct. 1 through Sept. 30). Since Oct. 1, 2022, Idyllwild has recorded 25.4 inches. Keenwild Ranger Station recorded rainfall is al-

most 20% greater than the annal average, with 29.9 inches since Oct. 1, of which nearly three-quarters fell since the beginning of 2023. The Pine Cove Dutch Flat weather station has recorded nearly 30 inches since the year began Oct. 1.

As of Jan. 10, only three months ago, all of California was considered in one of the four drought stages. As of April 25, less than four months later, more than two-thirds (68%) of the state is free of drought. Two months ago, Feb. 28, only 17% of the state was drought free. More than three years ago, in January 2020, was the last time this much of California was drought free.

At the beginning of 2023, more than a quarter of the state was in either extreme or exceptional drought, the two worst conditions. As of the middle of January, none of the state was classified in either of those drought stages.



## The labyrinth at St. Hugh’s

Idyllwild, the place we all call home is a literal idyllic place where folks find peace, centering and healing.

Surrounded by nature we find these things in the beauty and majesty in which we are immersed daily.

But did you know that here in our little town is a labyrinth, an ancient practice for prayer, spirituality, peace and healing.

That labyrinth is in the outdoor courtyard at St. Hugh’s Episcopal Church right here in Idyllwild. Established and constructed in 2008 by the people of St. Hugh’s, it is free and always open to the public.

Labyrinths became a very popular form of Christian devotion in the Middle Ages and were found all over Europe, both inside buildings (usually churches) and outside. The labyrinth at St. Hugh’s is modeled on the one embedded in the floor of the nave of the Cathedral Chartres in France. For centuries it was covered with a large carpet; only in recent years was it “rediscovered” and returned to its intended use.

The Chartres Labyrinth is an 11-circuit labyrinth. This means that the walker will complete 11 circuits before reaching the center, and another 11 before returning to the entrance/exit.

Labyrinths are intricate patterns of symbols, usually circular. They are designed as a purposeful path to the center and back out again. There are no obstacles, no puzzles to figure out, nor dead ends to avoid. The destination is assured.

The labyrinth walker is engaged in a deeply meditative discipline, simply putting one foot in front of another, honoring the journey itself and what it has to divulge or teach. There is no set time for how long it takes to walk a labyrinth since each one is unique. Some may take only five minutes, while others may be significantly longer.

Patterns range from simple to complex, and sizes

of labyrinths vary. Walking a labyrinth requires you to merely follow the pattern, with no puzzle to figure out. This lets your mind focus on your meditation or prayer.

There is no “right” way to walk a labyrinth. You will have a unique experience. Moreover, you will have a different experience each time you walk.

You will notice that you approach the center several times, each time turning away. This mimics our experience in life — our journey to the fulfillment of our goals is rarely a straight path. In time, with dedication to following the path, you will suddenly find yourself at the center.

In the center you will notice six “petals.” You may occupy one of these petals as your space for as long as you wish. In the very center of the center you will notice two symbols: the letters alpha and omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet recalling from the New Testament the words, “I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end” (Rev. 22:13).

The alpha and omega in the middle of St. Hugh’s labyrinth was placed to remind people that God, however one envisages God, is the beginning and the end of life’s journey.

Before leaving the center, ask yourself if there is anything you wish to leave there as you prepare to reenter the world. Examples might be, “I leave my anger about \_\_\_\_\_ and move through release into forgiveness,” or “I let go of the life I had planned in order to accept the one that is waiting for me.”

When ready to begin the journey out of the labyrinth, one will repeat the same pattern as they approached the center. This, too, mimics life. On the walk out, one can allow their imagination to activate ways in which they can integrate their experience with the world to which they are returning.

As one finishes, turn toward the center and acknowledge the sacredness of the space and the presence of all creation that surrounds and upholds you.

A resurgence of interest in labyrinths, coinciding with an increased focus on personal self-awareness and spiritual growth, has recently occurred.

Parks, schools, hospitals and churches have incor-

porated labyrinth patterns into decor, landscaping and recreation areas. They are used to relieve stress and aid rehabilitation, for exercise and to stimulate creative thinking and problem-solving.

Labyrinths also are incorporated into meditation and reflection practices. Recent studies have shown that walking a labyrinth design engages both the left and right brain activity to create a holistic, simultaneous processing experience.

Labyrinth walking is a form of active meditation that can help people break free of thoughts or behaviors, allowing them to focus their intentions or clear their mind as they let their body move through the pre-determined pathway.

Learning more about how to walk a labyrinth and what to expect can help make the most of the experience.


The labyrinth at St. Hugh’s was created to be a place of centering for all who wish to partake. It is located at St. Hugh’s Episcopal Church, 25525 Tahquitz Road.

# Local review board discusses downtown signage

The Local Review Board (LRB) for the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District (IHPD) held its regular quarterly meeting at the Idyllwild Library last Thursday. Present were board President Terry Shirley, members Stephanie Yost and David Cutter, and Bridget Lawlor, Historic Preservation Officer with Riverside County Regional Park and Open Space District. Absent was board member Warren Monroe. This was Cutter's first meeting on the board.

Old business included the IHPD website. Yost has been spearheading this effort. "We will have something to present, probably before the next meeting, so hopefully at the next meeting we can approve the information going on the new website," Yost added, "My plan is to do what we call wire frame — the layout and structure — to get that to the group, to have people approve that." Filling in the information will be easier once the structure is there.

Shirley brought up the board's request to Supervisor V. Manuel Perez' office for financing for the downtown IHPD sign program. "I've contacted his chief of staff Steven [Hernandez]. I haven't heard back. Yost said she had also mentioned it to Perez, and she and Shirley both hope to bring it up at or after this week's Perez meeting Monday night. This request has been lost in the shuffle as redistricting, which took effect for this district this January, required local groups to forge relationships with a new supervisor.

Yost shared photographs of the blue and white utilitarian signs used by Shane Stewart on his properties, and also the bas relief plaque placed at the entrance of Town Hall. She had the information about the company that produced that plaque because, as Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) president, she coordinated with the previous owners when Town Hall was transferred to ICC. At the January meeting she shared that the 12-inch-by-18-inch bas relief metal plaque cost \$649 in 2021. There are 57 "contributing" buildings in the IHPD.

Lawlor provided an update from the county: "Tony Pierucci, Parks and Open Space Bureau chief for Planning, Development and Interpretation, will be moving on. His last day is tomorrow. He got his dream job in Northern Virginia. His new position will be a deputy director role over at Gunston Hall." (Gunston Hall is the 1,754 mansion of "Forgotten Founder" and author of Virginia's Declaration of Rights and Constitution George Mason. Mason, a slaveholder himself, refused to sign the U.S. Constitution because it lacked a Bill of Rights and declined to deal with the institution of slavery, which he viewed as "slow poison.")

Lawlor continued, "With full hearts and happiness for him we're going to be seeing him go. Right now we are in the process of bringing someone on in his place." Shirley noted that Pierucci had been "focusing on grants. He was the one that mentioned the COVID funds that each supervisor received."

Lawlor also provided an update on applications to fill the vacant seat on the board. In addition to two applications the LRB forwarded, there are "at least two" applications that came directly to the county, and her office has sent them along to the supervisors. Lawlor

said she is pushing Perez's office to nominate a fifth board member.

"Know that, as I get the requests, I am pointing them in the right direction and am also following up with the supervisors' office to make sure that those applications are being received. Hopefully, I'll have an update soon," Shirley asked about a timeline for this. Lawlor answered that she hadn't been given one yet but is talking with Pierucci's office about the "onboarding process." Lawlor explained that she had come in the picture just as Cutter, the most recent appointee, had come on board, and so has not seen the process firsthand. Yost brought up the question of term limits. No one present knew if there was a limit on the term of LRB directors.

The next meeting is noon Thursday, July 27, at the Idyllwild Library.

## Tuesday night quake

The U.S. Geological Survey reported a 3.6 magnitude earthquake about 7.5 miles north-northeast of Banning at about 11:57 p.m. Tuesday, April 25.

The quake was felt throughout the Idyllwild area. No damage was reported.



Lake Hemet full; district settles lawsuit

Lake Hemet Municipal Water District (LHMWD) General Manager Mike Gow reported at the April 20 board meeting that Lake Hemet is full. “Irrigation water for the next year at least is expected to be entirely from mountain stream flows and lake releases.”

A settlement agreement was reached April 20 in Riverside County Superior Court between Lake Hemet resident Nancy Kutsch and LHMWD over flooding that occurred in summer 2019 in the residential area. Gow reported that the settlement resulted in no payment

from the district “for any prior and future claims relating to flooding at the lake or creek.”

The lawsuit was filed in August 2020 against John Koeberer, president of Basecamp Hospitality; Urban Park Concessionaires, who runs Lake Hemet facilities and is part of Basecamp; and LHMWD. Each defendant’s settlement occurred April 20.

Idyllwild Attorney Kenneth Carlson represented Kutsch. William Patrick Cronican represented Urban Park, and Jenna Anne Henninger and Joseph Michael Wojcik represented LHMWD.

The case involved terminating the lease agreement on the land where Kutsch lived due to flooding.

A special Pacific Crest Trail report

On Monday afternoon, April 24, I went to the post office to pick up my mail. As usual this time of year, there were many PCT hikers there picking up their supply packages and discussing their trail adventures. Hiking the PCT is a major undertaking and I really admire them all. But one group really caught my attention.

It was a young family and they were obviously on the trail. I first spoke to the youngest, Maddie, 7, and applauded her efforts. Then I spoke with her brother, Noah, 9, and their parents, David and Emily Grimm. What a delightful and adventurous family. They are from Maine and have set aside six months to hike the PCT.

They left Campo near the Mexico border a few weeks ago and will go as far as they can. They are doing their version of trail homeschooling and seemed very healthy and happy. We exchanged stories and I told them a little of my history here. I arrived here in 1949 with my mother, and older brother and sister when I was 4 years old.

Then Emily mentioned that she had a connection to Idyllwild that also went back to 1949. Her grandmother, Norma Duke, then 20 years old, worked at the Koffee Kup (now The Red Kettle) that year and met Anthony Dolci, Emily’s future grandfather. This really caught my attention, as my mother, Dorothy Schneider, also worked at the Koffee Kup that year. They most likely knew each other, but there’s no way of knowing for sure.

But the possibility was intriguing and it enhanced my connection with this wonderful family. We exchanged addresses and took photos, and I told them I’d try to get their story in the local paper. So here you have it, and I will report updates as I hear from them.

Free household hazardous waste collection in Idyllwild

The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources (DWR) has scheduled a free household hazardous waste collection event from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 13 at the County Road Yard, 25780 Johnson Road in Idyllwild (next to the Idyllwild Fire Station).

The event is open to all Riverside County residents, whether one lives in one of the county’s 28 cities or in one of the communities that are unincorporated.

Accepted items include used motor oil, paint, anti-freeze, household and automotive batteries, pesticides, cleaning products, sharps (needles/syringes or lancets) in a sharps container, unused medication (except controlled substances), fluorescent lamps, and electronic waste items such as televisions, computers, VCRs and telephones.

The collection will not accept explosives, radioactive material, ammunition, asbestos, compressed-gas cylinders over 40 pounds, or infectious or medical waste other than sharps.

Limit the amount of waste transported to no more than 15 gallons, or 125 pounds maximum per vehicle. Individual containers should be no larger than five gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.

The event will accept residentially generated household hazardous waste items only. Waste from businesses or nonprofits will not be accepted.

DWR offers these events as an opportunity for Riverside County residents to keep hazardous waste out of the county landfills and ensure it is properly managed. In addition to events such as this, household hazardous waste can be taken for free to the department’s permanent collection site in Palm Springs, 1100 Vella Rd. from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on nonholiday weekend Saturdays.

Lisa Middleton seeks state Senate seat

Lisa Middleton, a Palm Springs City Councilwoman as is Christy Holstege, has announced her entry in the race for state Senate District (SD) 19. The desert cities (Cabazon east and south to Palm Desert) and San Bernardino County incorporate much of the district. It does include the Hill neighborhoods from Pinewood north to Banning.

The 2024 election will be the first for the newly redistricted Senate seats with the odd number assignment since the December 2021 redistricting. Thus, there is no current incumbent.

In her announcement statement, Middleton stated, “I’m not running to represent the blue team or the red team — I’m running to represent the people of Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

“I spent most of my adult life working in state government — helping ensure that workers injured on the job got the compensation they deserved, and fighting fraud, waste and abuse. I have seen government succeed, and I have seen it fail. The difference always comes down to leadership.

“It is time that the counties of San Bernardino and Riverside, and the 19th District receive our fair share of California’s budget. Our region is one of the fastest growing regions of the country. To win the 21st century, we need a local and regional infrastructure built for the 21st century. We cannot wait to address climate change. It is past time we ensure opportunity for all does in fact include everyone.

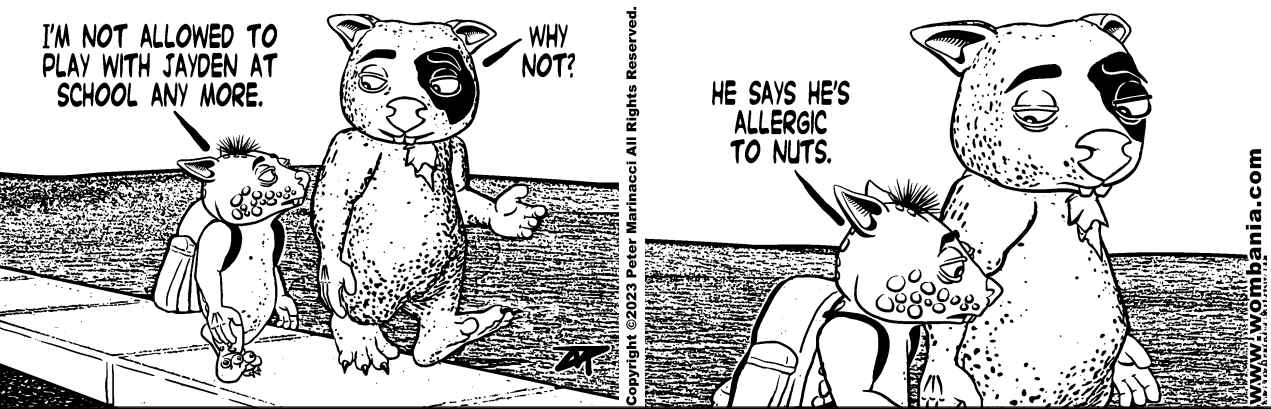

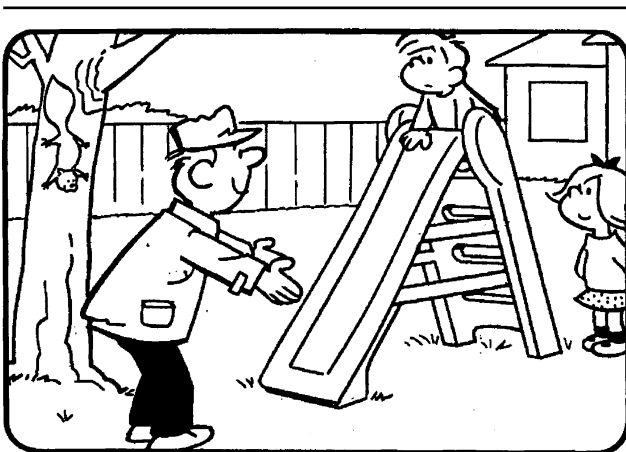

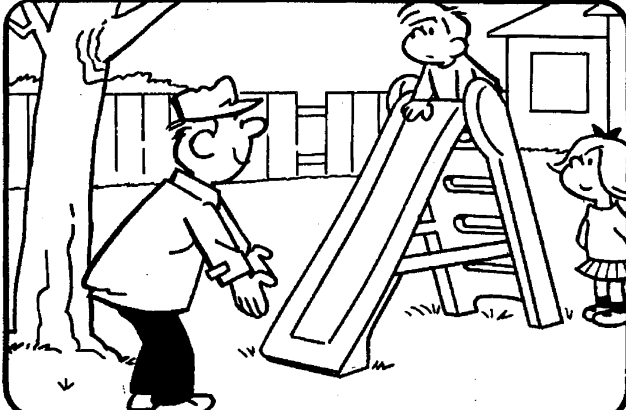

## ART'S CORNER

The ending of a calendar period is a somewhat somber occasion, whether it be that of a year, a month or a season; it signals a place for some type of reflection, both for the time just past and the prospects for coming events. Thus it is with the divisions of an academic year; with the disciplines well studied and tested, leading to an advancement, either graduation or another transition into the multifaceted world of nonstudent life. So with the ending of Idyllwild Arts Academy's spring term, and the consequent final orchestral concert, Lowman Hall was filled with both kinds of anticipatory expectations from students and faculty alike.

Saturday night's short program, focusing on the theme "Triumph of the Human Spirit," began modestly (and somberly) enough with George Theophilus Walker's "Lyric" for string orchestra, in the composer's arrangement of a movement from his string quartet (originally titled "Lament").

Admittedly somewhat programmatic, in that it reflects the Black American experience by virtue of the composer's memory of his grandmother who was born into slavery, the work never ventured into sentiment of any kind, but sustained an understated nobility in the presentation of long melodic lines, something of an uplifting of "the human spirit" and not necessarily achieving of any "triumph." Evenness of tonal production in a drawn-forth slow tempo was the principal effect needed, and the larger than usual string contingent, led most capably by graduating senior Concertmaster Der-

rick Giuntini, was more than up to the task.

With such a peaceful calm settled over the audience, one was scarcely ready for the effective presentation of a larger than usual orchestral work. The case of Dmitri Shostakovich's "Symphony #5," as a paradigm for individual human achievement in the face of totalitarian and bureaucratic obstacles, is well-known; the composer wrote it in response to both musical and political critical disdain. The outer movements offer the composer's rejoinder; subtle ironies in structure and sound reveal a message of hope (again, not exactly "triumph") in that the efforts of composition demand due respect from any authority, designated or not, and the elements of that effort should not be wasted.

The two inner movements (marked "Allegretto" and "Largo") also present an ironic compounding, from the somewhat frivolous waltz tempo in the first instance to the slowly-rising curve of fear (or paranoia) exhibited in

the latter case. The large orchestra — with a full complement of winds and brass (including five French horns), plus harp, piano, xylophone and percussion, in addition to the aforementioned string ensemble — proved well-equipped to bring forth Shostakovich's essential message; for these players, it was indeed a triumphant realization in the last full-chordal cries of the final movement, and the audience reaction matched the resultant harmonies throughout the hall.

In short, it was a splendid conclusion to a somewhat stressful season, however still bristling with expectation for both the academy and its students.

**55 years ago - 1968**  
Only a slight indication of smog damage to ponderosa pines in the San Jacinto Mountains was reported by the U.S. Forest Service. In the Lake Arrowhead area, however, the forest was said to be dying.

**50 years ago - 1973**  
Results of an opinion survey conducted by a University of California, Riverside team showed that mountain residents thought their communities were good places to live. The biggest advantage cited was the “natural environment.”

**45 years ago - 1978**  
An intensive pesticide program was started to rid Dark Canyon Campground of traces of bubonic plague. The opening of the camping site would be delayed at least two weeks until U.S. Forest Service officials determined there was not more than one flea on every rodent they examined.

**40 years ago - 1983**  
The Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the acceptance of Goldenrod Road into the County Road Maintenance System.

**75 years ago - 1948**  
A handful of energetic men, women and children scrambled up and down Strawberry Creek, building little dams. The purpose was to deepen the pools and provide quieter living conditions for fish.

**70 years ago - 1953**  
The Chamber of Commerce published a 32-page pictorial magazine called “We Live in Idyllwild” that featured photographs of the mountain, its hillfolk and town activities.

**65 years ago - 1958**  
Rotarians were trying to form a club on the Hill.

**60 years ago - 1963**  
The Rev. Eugenia Horowitz opened Chapel in the Pines on Tollgate Road for metaphysical services.

**35 years ago - 1988**  
Fund-raising continued for the proposed Idyllwild-area emergency radio station with the sale of WNKI buttons, designed by local artist Jan Jaspers-Fayer.

**30 years ago - 1993**  
Idyllwild Library had a new reading room thanks to the space being donated by Maureen Jones and funds for refurbishment by Elva Bess Cook.

**25 years ago - 1998**  
Idyllwilders would have a say on a controversial Hemet Unified School District policy barring donations that “created undue controversy.” The policy was made after a resident offered to donate gay-oriented library materials.

**20 years ago - 2003**  
Idyllwild parents and local artists, in response to the elimination of art in the school curriculum, helped the Idyllwild PTA form the smARTS committee, which would provide supplies, artists and parent volunteers to set up art classes.

**15 years ago - 2008**  
An under-age drunk driver hit a power pole on South Circle Drive near Wildwood Drive, knocking out power for 1,642 Southern California Edison customers. No injuries were reported from the collision.

**10 years ago - 2013**  
Residential burglaries were reported to have decreased after Hemet Station Sheriff’s deputies conducted a weeklong Idyllwild crime sweep in August 2012, according to the Hemet Station. Arrests were made, drug houses were cleared out and, according to the Hemet Station, the raid seemed effective in reducing crime.

**5 years ago - 2018**  
The Riverside County Department of Environmental Health planned to increase the trash-service fees for Idyllwild, Anza and Pinyon. That July, the trash service would increase to \$136.68 until July 1, 2019. By July 2022, the trash service fee would be \$216.00 annually.

**1 year ago - 2022**  
Mountain Communities Fire Safe Council was a recipient of one of 13 Listos California trailers and tool kits (Listos means “ready” in Spanish) from the California Fire Safe Council which also awarded a \$200,000 defensible space grant at the end of November 2021 that was launched January 2022.



In May 1973, the Idyllwild Post Office yielded to progress when keys replaced combination locks. Not only that but 152 additional mailboxes were installed. The post office then had 900 boxes, “more than enough to take care of current applications.”
