Court pushing through on local business owner's arrest

Local restaurateur Luis Solis Delgado, 44, of Idyllwild, was arraigned in Riverside County Superior Court Tuesday, May 2. The Southwest Detention Center had set bail at \$4 million but the district attorney's (DA) office recommended \$1 million and later filed for an increase to \$5 million. Judge Timothy F. Freer approved this request. Solis Delgado remains in custody at the Southwest Detention Center.

He has retained private Attorney Alejo Lugo to represent him on eight felony sex charges involving two minor female children beginning in August 2015 and ending Wednesday, April 26, 2023, the day before he was arrested. One of the felonies has an enhancement that the victim was particularly vulnerable, which he has denied. He has pleaded not guilty to all eight felony charges. He faces life imprisonment if found guilty.

At the Felony Settlement Conference Monday, May 8, the two sides were unable to resolve the case. A Preliminary Hearing was then set for 8:30 a.m. Friday, May 12.

According to the DA's website, "This is not a trial — but it is a hearing at which the judge determines if there is sufficient evidence to require the defendant to stand trial in superior court."

Two items filed in court May 2 were a criminal protective order and a protective order for law enforcement body-worn camera evidence — the evidence of which was filed.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department will not give any details on the arrest to the public until trial, citing an ongoing investigation.

Solis has been very involved in three restaurants in town for many years: Fratello's, the Lumber Mill and Manzanita Cantina and Grill, and one recently, the Pine Cone Restaurant.

He works with many family members at the restaurant. His brother, Manny Solis, is owner of Mama Mia's and Mama's Egg House.

After the arrest, Manny Solis wrote on FaceBook May 1: "Hi guys, although I am not involved in ownership of all these businesses, I wanted to share a message with you regarding The Lumber Mill, Fratello's, and Manzanita:

"As many of you know, there has been an incident regarding one of our business members. We understand your valid concerns, and while this incident currently involves only accusations and not convictions, we are taking this situation seriously.

"We want to inform you that immediate actions are being taken to completely remove Luis Solis from his share of ownership of The Lumber Mill Bar and Grill, Fratello's Ristorante and Pizzeria, and Manzanita Cantina and Grill. As he was not the sole owner of any of these establishments, they will continue to be run by other members of the company. This will ensure that our employees, who are members of this community, friends, neighbors, and family, will continue to have employment to support themselves and their families.

"Additionally, Luis Solis has never had ownership, in part or in full, of Mama's Egg House or Mama Mia's Crepes and Dessert."

Solis Delgado also served on the Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) board since January of this year. ICC President Stephanie Yost said, "ICC expects to continue to work with the family as food vendors. They just donated 300 very fancy cookies for the participants at the Easter egg hunt. I value their contribution at community events."

When asked how he felt about the news of the arrest, Chris Johnston of Idyllwild said, "It's definitely a stain on the community. I don't know what to say."

STR Committee meets with Perez and the public

Monday, May 1, the Local Short-Term Rental (STR) Committee held a public Town Hall meeting with County 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez. On the stage with Perez were Planning Director John Hildebrand and local STR Committee members Joel Feingold, Woody Henderson, Jon Brown, Anna Duitruk, Mark Dean and Jane Oliver. Members of the Sheriff's department and code enforcement also were present.

The hall was full. Although public comments were sometimes animated and often elicited response from the crowd, participants did adhere to Perez' requests for decorum and civility. Members of the committee were clear about their positions on one "side" or another, but also clear about working together respectfully. Almost every statement included an invocation of balance, fairness and equity, even when the speakers seemed to agree about little else but their love for the mountain communities.

Perez' opening statements promised a "series" of these meetings and acknowledged that for "those of you who live here, those of you that have STRs, those of you have that raised your families here, this is a difficult issue." Perez admitted that, although aware of the issue on a county-wide sense, the perspective from the Hill is new to him. "Although we have short term rental struggles in the 4th District ... in the desert it's very different from the area up here."

Brown, an STR owner, provided background on the STR ordinance back to 2016.

Oliver owns the Sunflower Bakery and "bakes stuff." Her business depends on both locals and visitors. Henderson introduced himself as Fire Safe Council president, and interested in finding middle ground. "In our discussions, which are going well, the county is not considering zoning area limitations or phase-outs upon the expiration of your certificate. All current legal certifications will be protected as long as you own the property. The cap and density limits that we are talking about will only apply to new applications" and will make existing certificates more valuable.

Feingold chose to read a note given to him by "a downtown business owner" who could not be present. "By mixing people that are on vacation into neighborhoods that are designated as residential you are creating a disenfranchised group of citizens. Hotels were positioned in specific areas enabling a place where visitors could stay without having a negative impact on residential neighborhoods, aka the place where citizens live."

Brown mentioned his 40 years in Idyllwild. "It would be fair to say I'm kind of on the opposite side of Joel here ... I come at it from a different point of view. In my view Idyllwild has always been a vacation home community, it's never been a residential community. Some of us choose to live here ... but the reality is that the full-time residents have always been the minority of properties up here ... We're trying to find that happy balance ... and address the very real issues that come up."

Duitruk sits on a board of a few STR associations and is involved in a few nonprofits in the community. "What I am hoping to bring is that knowledge and insight from other communities that have advanced in terms of ordinance and enforcement."

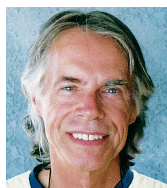
Dean is president of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association. "I started getting involved because I'm completely surrounded by STRs. I see a lot of good, but I see all the bad too."

At that point the public was invited to comment on the problems they are experiencing, or good things that have been done. Brown suggesting that speakers not repeat the same concerns but try to cover unheard issues.

Their concerns expressed included noise (exacerbated by geography), parking and uncivil guest behavior. "Whoever comes here has to understand who we are, what this place is. If they can understand that and coexist without interrupting and destroying that which we cherish, from my standpoint they are welcome."

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County sells land to Pine Cove Water

Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) will grow by 18 acres in the next month.

At its May 2 meeting, during its function as the board for the Regional Park and Open Space District, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the sale of surplus land from the county Parks Department to PCWD.

The expected cost to PCWD is \$140,000, which will come from reserves. The approved resolution anticipated that the county would complete the transaction by June 2. However, Darren Schemmer, communication director for 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez, shared the following with the Town Crier: “The final purchase agreement should be coming to the board for final review/approval in late June. That item will have all of the purchase details included.”

The Parks and Recreation Department has determined that the land is not suitable for visitor or campground use because of its steep slope and presence of jagged rock outcrops.

The 18-acre parcel is near Rocky Point and Thousand Trails. PCWD has had three wells drilled on the property for several years. The county action memorandum also stated, “... the property is vacant with the exception of a restroom building, which will be demolished prior to the sale.

“The land purchase is important to the district, not only because of the three wells that are currently on the property, but also due to the four wells that are below it, in that draw [a small valley],” Jeremy Potter, PCWD general manger said in an email to the Town Crier. “[We want] to ensure protection of these

wells; o]wning the property upstream is beneficial in the quality of our water.”

The board’s resolution does state that this property will be maintained as a public park and recreational area. Further, the district cannot transfer the land to another owner without approval of its voters.

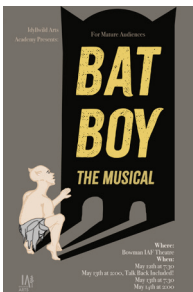

Spring wildfire threat lower than normal

The outlook for the 2023 summer fire season continues to be cautious but better than 2022. Winter’s rain and snow have greatly improved fuel moisture content. Last week’s cool weather and modest precipitation also delayed the drying of fuels, especially at the higher elevations of the San Jacinto Mountains.

Idyllwild and most of the Hill communities are between two distinct fire zones. At the lower elevations (near the bottom of the Hill) are the grassy environments. The second, which encompasses Pine Cove and higher elevations, is more forested. Besides the benefit of diversity, during fire season, these areas create two different fire threats.

Grass fires can ignite below and move up the slopes and forest fires can ignite and be blown down toward homes and people. Fire officials are careful to assess both areas for possible wildfire threats to the Hill neighborhoods.

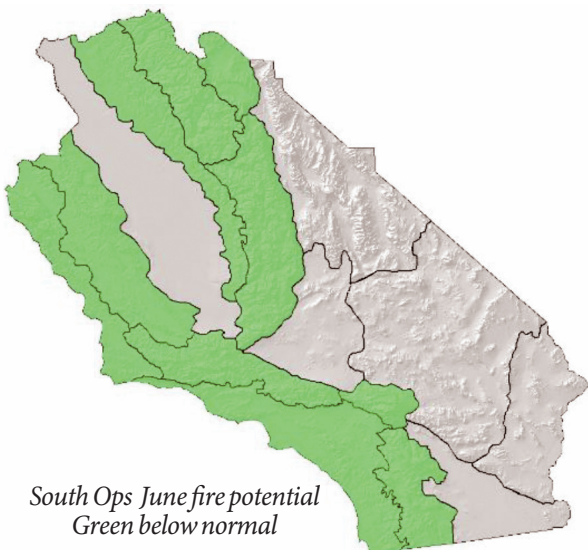
Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Chief Mark LaMont noted, “... the winter precipitation that brought (much needed) record rain and snow fall and brought nearly all of California ‘out of drought conditions’ will likely ‘delay’ the onset of our upcoming season[. H]owever, this delay will likely be short-lived, and an ‘average’ fire season is being predicted throughout California for 2023.”

Sharing similar thoughts was Cal Fire’s Tim Chavez, assistant chief for Wildfire Forecast and Threat Intelligence Integration Center, when asked if he thought fire season might shift more toward late summer or fall. “Well, that depends. High elevation [higher than 6,000 feet] I still believe fires will be delayed until August or September. At lower elevations, it’s pretty much too late. The grass has reached the end of its life cycle, and any moisture from here on out will constitute only a delay of a few hours or days. By June 1 we should be busy with grassfires that last a day or two.”

And Riverside County Fire Chief Bill Weiser shared the same concerns about grass fires and woodland fires peaking later in the summer. “My thoughts of fire season are with the grass crop in the lower and mid elevations when it does cure, our initial attack fires will be increased when measured to the past two years. These fires have the potential to spread quickly and become extended attack fires that last more than one day.”

The Predictive Services Unit for Cal Fire’s Southern Region noted that the danger of grass fires is wind spreading them and pushing the conflagration up the slopes. However, the higher live fuel moisture in the vegetation as the grass yields to shrubs and brush is likely to slow and diminish the fire.

Weiser and Predictive Services also do tend to expect the 2023 fire season to be at its greatest later in the summer. “I think the upper elevations with the amount of

prolonged moisture this winter and spring will cure later mid to late summer or fall. The issue is the dead component in the brush and trees still exists, the dead fuels are going to dry out and be a carrier of fire,” wrote Weiser.

South Op’s conclusion was: “This competing combination of factors may lead to a delayed but ultimately near normal lower elevation fire season. However, such fires tend to be shorter in duration and less straining on resources than higher elevation fires involving heavy timber, the likes of which are expected to be below normal this year. So resource demand within the geographic area is likely to be below normal most of this summer.”

Currently, firefighting professionals expect this summer to be slightly below normal and any significant fire activity to be delayed. But they stress, wildfires are always possible in this environment.

LaMont advises Hill residents to “Be prepared, be vigilant, and be educated.” Prepared means to abate your property. IFPD property inspections will begin the week of May 15. Vigilant means to be watchful and aware of emergency notices. Educated means reading about abatement and home hardening techniques.

Meanwhile, IFPD will continue to train and work with other agencies, such as Cal Fire, the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management and the Sheriff’s Office in case of emergencies on the Hill, he added.

Almost identical comments were shared by Weiser: “The public needs to take precautions not to start fires, whether working, i.e., welding, clearing vegetation with a metal blade, using internal combustion engines without a spark arrester or when playing. [Be] careful with any open flame either as a cooking fire or warming fire.

“People staying vigilant and making decisions that safeguard our open spaces is always the key to a moderate fire season,” Weiser stressed.

She and her husband Norm were board members at the library. Among other things, they took part in the planning of the library when it moved to its location on Lower Pine Crest and then again to it’s current location in Strawberry Creek Shopping Plaza.

Bonnie was an active member of PEO and continued this service work for our community after needing to move off the Hill. She was a deacon at Beaumont Presbyterian Church and also here at the Idyllwild Presbyterian Church. She also loved being a regular part of the quilting guild, Idyllwild Mountain Quilters.

Bonnie is survived by her three children Keith Doshier of Chatsworth, Kay Doshier of Panorama City, and Kris Doshier of Calimesa, and her brother Dean Bailey of Idaho.

There will be two memorial services in honor of Bonnie and all are welcome.

Services are 1 p.m. Friday, May 19, Beaumont Presbyterian Church, 702 Euclid Ave., Beaumont, and 2 p.m. Sunday, May 21, Idyllwild Community Church, 54400 North Circle Drive.

County plans road work this summer

The Riverside County Transportation and Land Management Agency plans some major road resurfacing work in Idyllwild this summer.

At its May 9 meeting, the board of supervisors approved the request from the Transportation Department to solicit bids to do 4.7 miles of road resurfacing in and near Idyllwild this summer. The total estimated cost is \$4.8 million.

In Idyllwild, the work will be along Saunders Meadows Road, from Clubhouse Road to Highway 243. Also, North and South Circle drives will be repaved and Fern Valley Drive will be resurfaced all the way to Humber Park.

Other work in Idyllwild includes the roads with the department’s Idyllwild Operation Yards near Johnson Road. North of Idyllwild, the department plans to resurface access roads in and around Lawler Lodge and Alpine Cabins.

The North and South Circle work will affect some Idyllwild Water District (IWD) infrastructure. A major underground pipeline runs along these roads and IWD has several manhole covers for access. The resurfacing work must not seal these access points; consequently, IWD will have to pay the county for special work to protect its pipelines. Also, there will be more repaving of Highway 243 in front of the district’s office. Consequently, the Transportation Department will ask for two bids: one that will treat this infrastructure specifically and one that leaves the work to IWD.

According to IWD Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman, the district is likely to rely on the county’s contractor.

Humber Park closure upcoming

Editor’s note: The San Jacinto Ranger District released this notice.

The Humber Park trailhead and parking lot, which includes the Devil’s Slide Trail (3E05) and Ernie Maxwell Scenic Trail (3E07), will be inaccessible on a three-day window during this timeframe, given ideal conditions, between May 15 and June 5. Spray contractors will be mitigating an infestation of Goldspotted oak borer beetles (GSOB). In 2022, the same operations were successfully performed.

With windy or rainy weather, this work and the closure may be postponed, re-evaluated or performed if the GSOB have emerged.

Alternative trails into the San Jacinto Wilderness include:

- Deer Springs Trail (3E32)

- South Ridge Trail (3E08)
- Marion Mountain Trail (2E14)

To manage the already-infested trees and limit further spread and tree mortality, the San Jacinto Ranger District will be spraying a California-registered insecticide on large, high value oaks in this area. Spraying must be done at or before the beginning of the “flight season” (mid-May through October) when adult beetles emerge from beneath oak bark and spread to un-infested trees.

GSOB has caused extensive oak mortality in San Diego County and is now spreading north throughout Southern California. There is a potential for significant economic, ecological, cultural and aesthetic losses in the region as well as threats to public safety from hazardous dying trees.



Free household hazardous waste collection in Idyllwild

The Riverside County Department of Waste Resources (DWR) has scheduled a free household hazardous waste collection event from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 13 at the County Road Yard, 25780 Johnson Road in Idyllwild (next to the Idyllwild Fire Station).

The event is open to all Riverside County residents, whether one lives in one of the county’s 28 cities or in one of the communities that are unincorporated.

Accepted items include used motor oil, paint, anti-freeze, household and automotive batteries, pesticides, cleaning products, sharps (needles/syringes or lancets) in a sharps container, unused medication (except controlled substances), fluorescent lamps, and electronic waste items such as televisions, computers, VCRs and telephones.

The collection will not accept explosives, radioactive material, ammunition, asbestos, compressed-gas cylinders over 40 pounds, or infectious or medical waste other than sharps.

Limit the amount of waste transported to no more than 15 gallons, or 125 pounds maximum per vehicle. Individual containers should be no larger than five gallons nor weigh more than 50 pounds.

The event will accept residentially generated household hazardous waste items only. Waste from businesses or nonprofits will not be accepted.

DWR offers these events as an opportunity for Riverside County residents to keep hazardous waste out of the county landfills and ensure it is properly managed. In addition to events such as this, household hazardous waste can be taken for free to the department’s permanent collection site in Palm Springs, 1100 Vella Rd. from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on nonholiday weekend Saturdays.

Forest Service looks to incorporate climate change policies into forest management: Comments sought

A year following policy enunciations about dangers to the country’s forests from President Joseph Biden and Tom Vilsack, secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Forest Service is responding and requesting public comment and opinion on “How should the Forest Service adapt current policies to protect, conserve, and manage the national forests and grasslands for climate resilience?”

Executive Order and Secretary’s Memorandum

On Earth Day 2022, Biden issued an Executive Order (EO) whose purpose was to strengthen American forests — especially mature and old-growth forests on public lands.

Forests are important for various reasons and constituencies, he averred when writing, “We go to these special places to hike, camp, hunt, fish, and engage in recreation that revitalizes our souls and connects us to history and nature. Many local economies thrive because of these outdoor and forest management activities, including in the sustainable forest product sector.”

Two months later, June 23, 2022, Vilsack responded with his Secretary’s Memorandum.

Both Biden and Vilsack recognized that these forest areas were being lost, damaged and continue to be threatened. And both warned that these dangers were becoming more imminent. “Here at home, the primary threats to forests, including mature and old-growth forests, include climate impacts, catastrophic wildfires, insect infestation, and disease.”

Vilsack was more specific. He stated, “A primary threat to old-growth stands on national forests is no longer timber harvesting, but rather catastrophic wildfire and other disturbances resulting from the combination of climate change and past fire exclusion.”

The consequence, he added is “... wildfire-driven deforestation is a reality, with some forests unable to recover, resulting in conversion to non-forested systems.”

The intent of both the Executive Order and the Memorandum was to initiate efforts to “Conserv[e] old-growth and mature forests on Federal lands while supporting and advancing climate-smart forestry and sustainable forest products is critical to protecting these and other ecosystem services provided by those forests.”

Policy direction

Biden’s EO gave both the secretaries of Agriculture and Interior a year to develop an inventory (regardless of species) of mature and old-growth forests on federal lands.

With this inventory, both departments were to assess and evaluate the continuing threats to the mature and old-growth forests under their management. Wildfire and climate change were specific threats that were to be judged.

Next, they were to develop policies to implement and to put into practice for climate-smart management and conservation strategies to protect these forest areas.

Separately and specifically, Biden ordered them to “develop a Federal goal that charges agencies to meet agency-specific reforestation targets by 2030, including an assessment of reforestation opportunities on Federal lands and through existing Federal programs and partnerships.”

Biden’s EO was not limited to the domestic agencies. He also ordered the Secretary of State to take actions to help old growth forests throughout the world.

Vilsack ordered the chief of the Forest Service to update the agency’s firehatched risk map, and develop a digital tool “... to assess climate change vulnerabilities and risks to ...” the National Forest System.

Finally, he directed Chief Randy Moore to develop policy recommendations for climate resilience and carbon stewardship on Forest Service lands. This would include methods to evaluate the merit of classifying certain agency lands as “not suitable for timber production.”

Forest inventory

The inventory of federal lands was completed several weeks ago. The report is called “Mature and Old-Growth Forests: Definition, Identification, and Initial Inventory on Lands Managed by the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management.”

The report noted that these forest lands were dramatically different across the country and between states. The two examples were the sequoias, often 250 feet tall and 30 feet in diameter across the tree’s trunk, and the dwarf pitch pines in New Jersey, which are only 14 feet tall and several inches in diameter.

Old growth and mature forests are about two-thirds of forested land for the two agencies. About 91 million acres are in the National Forest System and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) manages about 20.9 million acres.

About 38.6 million acres or more than a quarter of the Forest Service’s total forest acreage is either wilderness or in inventoried roadless areas. Most of the BLM lands are in the “Other” category, but 3.2 million are classified as either wilderness or in a wilderness study area.

The most common tree species found on these lands are pinyon/juniper and fire/spruce/ mountain hemlocks, according to the report. This summer, the Forest Service and BLM will co-host public workshops focused on sustaining resilient pinyon-juniper ecosystems, according to a Forest Service press release.

More than a quarter of Forest Service lands have been adversely affected by insects and wildfire over the past 15 years.

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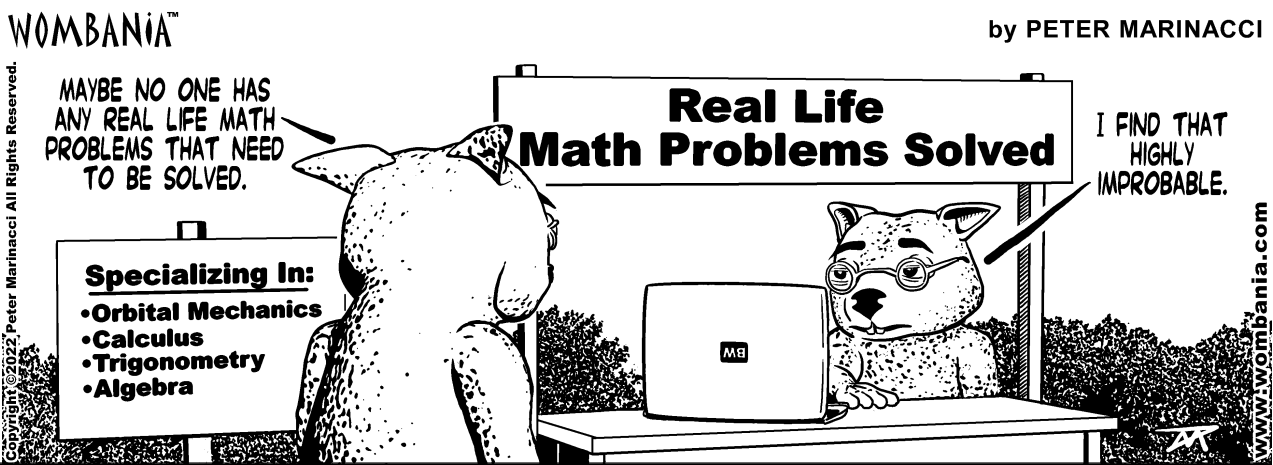

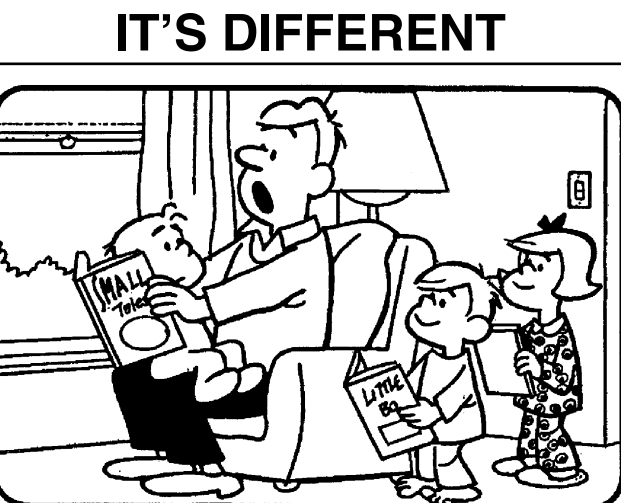

Investors are running a business in a residential area, selling the peace and quiet of local neighborhoods like a resource they can mine. “They are not local people. Local people care, they respond, they are part of the community.” “The priorities of a business owner are not the priorities of a resident.” There is the sheer number; “I’m just sick of so many people having them all over town.”

Issues came up of equity and the right to profit from owners’ real estate. A moratorium may seem reasonable, but if you have made decisions based on your ability to rent out your property, a yearlong pause in that income may mean losing it was a concern. One speaker told of discovering their permit had expired and could not be renewed. “I called, I wrote letters, I cried, I couldn’t sleep.

How could this happen? I purchased this house, every-
thing was done, and now I can't rent it out."

Locals who manage STRs take pride in their performance,
and say the many should not be punished for the actions of the
few: "When I speak to the code enforcement officers, when
I speak to the sheriff, when I speak to the people who used to
work at the office of the permits, all of them said that it was 1 to
2% of STRs that were a problem. So I would have preferred that
we address the problem vacation rentals. I truly believe that, if
we had addressed that before, we wouldn't be here today."

STRs are part of the larger, volatile housing market.

Paul Carman talks about taking students to jazz fest

The Town Crier had the opportunity to catch up with Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) Jazz Faculty member Paul Carman this week. He and his students recently returned from one of the high points of their year, the trip to the Reno Jazz Festival. This tradition for jazz educators across the West is now in its 61st year, and like many things in the world, it has returned in a new form after the limits imposed by the pandemic. This year, over 100 student ensembles participated, and IAA was again among them.

TC: Is the academy getting back to a normal program?

PC: Yes, it's been back to normal for a while. There was one year that was teaching Zoom-wise; actually just one semester and a-half that was really screwed up. Obviously, you can't teach ensembles on Zoom, so I was giving them recording projects. Other classes, academics, I was doing by Zoom. We had to do two sessions a day. Our students are all over the world, so I would have to do those classes twice a day, one time for Eastern Hemisphere, once for Western Hemisphere.

TC: The new thing this year is going back to Reno?

PC: Yeah, the Reno Jazz Fest didn't happen for two years because of COVID. Then the third year it was going to happen, and they ended up doing it virtually, and we participated virtually; we sent in videos of our ensembles playing. Those videos got looked at and judged.

TC: Weak tea for a live performance medium?

PC: They were doing the best they could. The other thing about the Reno Jazz Festival is it's not just performance competition. There are also workshops and master classes to participate in, by world class jazz musicians.

TC: That's happening again?

PC: That happened this year and we were there in person.

TC: Is there anything that stands out about those workshops?

PC: They were all outstanding. I went to as many workshops as I could fit in. You can't go to them all. There will be like three on Saturday. Everyone I went to was outstanding. Also, they have concerts; one by a vibraphonist, Joel Ross, the other by a trumpet player named Marquis Hill. Those concerts were very, very inspiring. They gave the kids an idea of what's happening on the cutting edge of jazz right now.

TC: New places to go?

PC: It's amazing. And both of those men also gave master classes that were incredibly inspiring.

Carman explained the biggest change in the festival: "The Reno Jazz Festival used to be competitive, and you would win trophies; first, second, third place, other categories, outstanding improv, best sax player, etc. ... I don't believe that music should be competitive; it's not like a football game. Because of that, I tried to not take my students to these festivals. But I decided it would be good for them to have the experience of playing under pressure. That simulates what actually happens to professionals. Like in a recording studio, the red light goes on, pressure. When we used to go to this festival, when it was competitive, we would always win first, second or third place. And about five years ago the festival tried to go noncompetitive. They polled all the jazz directors that had attended in the past, and the majority liked the trophies, the accolades to bring home. They didn't feel the same way I did about competition in music. The faculty at University of Nevada at Reno are very modern, very forward thinking. That was about five years ago. Then we got COVID. They took that as their chance to change it; when it came back it was not competitive.

What they did instead was expanded what they call feedback sessions. You would perform and then you would get feedback from the judges. The sessions used to be brief, 13 to 15 minutes. They expanded that to about 35 minutes. The judges were able to go into much more detail in their feedback to the performing groups.

These judges are all top-notch, world-class educators. My combo got feedback from two very accomplished, very good jazz educators, other than me.

TC: These things mean more when a stranger tells you.

PC: Yes. It's not competitive, but that doesn't make it less pressure. They are still playing in front of three judges that are scribbling while they are playing. They can see them.

Carman mentioned another benefit of the festival: the reality check. "The kids are isolated up here. Obviously, we get very good musicians up here, but they don't always know it; they don't get to hear their peers. They don't usually get to hear other high school musicians.

When they do, it helps their confidence. Several times my students came up to me and said, "I heard this high school combo, and they weren't that great." They are surprised at the level. They don't realize where they are, in the top 10% of high school jazz musicians. This all just helps their confidence. To think of being a professional jazz musician is daunting. They ask themselves, "Can I do this, can I really do this?" I always tell them "Of course you can," and they can hear me say it over and over, but until really hearing their peers do they realize, "I'm doing pretty good here." Then their confidence level starts rising. That is more powerful than me saying it.

TC: That's another kind of educational experience?

PC: A confidence booster.

Carman underlined the role of the pressure a festival exerts on young players. "Back to their performing and performing in front of judges that have never heard them before. I'm the only one who knows how they performed under pressure. I'm the one who was there during the last few rehearsals. I tell them, "Instead of going for trophies, listen to me tell you how you did under pressure." I've been doing this festival for 13 years. They always rise up under pressure, they always play just another notch better than they did at their last rehearsal. That thought I had years ago, "I'm going to take them to this thing, concerts, master classes, and it will be a good experience for them to play under pressure," and it is. When they become professionals, I want them to have that behind them. They've got to get it right. These festivals simulate those high-pressure situations.

TC: Back to the recovery of normalcy, what about your program overall?

PC: It's smaller; due to COVID our whole school is smaller. Our Jazz Department is just seven students, normally there's 12 to 15.

TC: You were always a lot smaller than the schools you used to compete with, right?

PC: We competed with high schools that had 3,000 kids. The jazz combo of six kids is selected from 3,000 kids. The jazz combo is always the best kids.

TC: There has to be a happy medium, but there are also advantages to a small program?

PC: One aspect of the return is that our department is smaller and growing, and will be back to its normal size. There are some positives, more individual attention. For example, we have one saxophone player in the department. He would normally be playing in our upper-level combo, but that leaves the other group without a lead instrument, so he is playing in both combos. But that's cool for him. He's learning twice as much material in every concert cycle. For him it's a benefit.

TC: Like real life for a working musician?

PC: Yeah. This happened last year. We had one bass player. He played in both ensembles. It was a positive experience.

TC: It's an incredible life you're living.

PC: Yeah. Oh, I am blessed. I moved up here to raise my small children in a small town. I didn't even know the school was here. I commuted off the Hill every other day for three years to do my gigs in L.A. I was teaching at Cal State Fullerton. I found out about the school, the school found out about me. Now I'm working there five days a week. I've always loved teaching, and now I'm teaching at one of the most amazing schools you could possibly think of. My kids are grown up, 22 and 21. I'm gonna keep teaching until I fall over. I'll be like Marshall [Hawkins]. I'll keep going. Like most musicians, I don't have a retirement plan. I don't want to retire. I can't imagine what retirement would be like for me.

Carman added an appreciative note to the IAA. "One more thing: This was a stretch financially for the school to send us. I want to thank the school for seeing the value of this experience and doing what they could to make it happen for us."

Phil: Now that is fun!

Pepper: Right! On Memorial Day weekend. There will be lots and lots of pet items and household items.

75 years ago - 1948
Fern Valley Mutual Water Company installed a 420,000-gallon water tank on Strawberry Creek.

70 years ago - 1953
A record-breaking crowd of anglers hit the Hill for the opening of trout season. A crowd of 1,500 to 2,000 lined banks of Strawberry Creek shoulder-to-shoulder on opening day.

65 years ago - 1958
Tahquitz Lake Golf Club reopened, adding a cocktail lounge and dining facilities.

60 years ago - 1963
The Winter Park Authority announced that the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway would not begin operations until August. It had been scheduled to open in April, but weather conditions caused delays.

55 years ago - 1968
Cyril Blackburn was considered the luckiest man in town. He wasn't at home when his hot water tank blew up in the basement, tore a hole through the floor, ripped out stairs, blew walls off the foundation, burst through the roof and finally came to rest a half-mile away from what was left of the house.

50 years ago - 1973
A Riverside youth climbing Tahquitz Peak fell 120 feet and landed in a tree. Other climbers rescued him. He suffered only minor injuries.

45 years ago - 1978
A Hemet Unified School District trustee squashed a student-initiated proposal to designate
