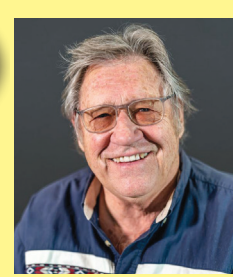

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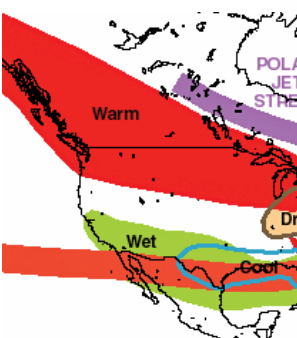

Perez listens to public speak out on STRs

Editor's note: This article is continued from last week's A1 story about Riverside County 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez's May 1 Town Hall meeting regarding short-term rentals (STRs).

Perez and the STR committee are attempting to develop recommendations for changes to the county's STR ordinance. A current moratorium on new STRs in the unincorporated areas of the county will expire in October.

Public comments at the meeting indicated a spectrum of sentiment, but many of the speakers readily identify themselves as being on one side or the other: Either they are neighbors who have experienced a disruption in the "quiet enjoyment" of their homes, or they themselves rent a house as an STR or wish to, and speak of their "equity," the right to "responsibly" rent their property, and the need for that extra income to pay a mortgage.

People come here for peace, quiet, and the freedom that comes from being on the periphery of the heavily regulated urban environment. This has a downside also: It's nice being able to put a small building in your backyard without having to explain to Code Enforcement, but you may not approve of the way your neighbor utilizes this freedom, and response from authorities will be slow at best.

STR owners who spoke were mostly owners of a single cabin they rent out "occasionally." No one stood up and identified themselves as an investor with dozens of STRs in different areas. The common story is one of decades as a visitor, the decision to buy a vacation home and the purchase being made possible by STR income. Some have lost a spouse and found STR income a way forward in hard times. All these people identify as "responsible" and "good neighbors." Many repeated that their tenants are "families," not here for a wild party. It is hard to know how exactly they vet their renters and how the modern internet driven system allows them to know that their renters are "good people," however.

One of the larger local management companies, a 20-year resident who counted themselves as "among the first to implement all the new regulations ... my signs were the first ones up. I'm the one who gets up at 10 o'clock at night when one of my housekeepers might say to me, 'There's seven cars at that house and it's only for eight,' and I'm driving over there." She claimed that county personnel have said that most complaints stem from "1 to 2% of STRs," and holds that conscientious owners and managers should not be punished for the negligence of those few, something all STR owners seem to agree on.

Love of community was professed by all, but Marge Muir, a broker with 66 years on the Hill admonished, you need to know the community to be a part of it. "Meet your neighbors, don't just send them a letter ... You are going to have to be a part of it; don't just be an owner." It is axiomatic that loving a thing one does not understand may lead to its destruction.

Concerned neighbors also dwelt on "infrastructure," primarily water and sewage and fire safety. Longtime residents recall that most of the houses used to be empty, and that seemed "a shame," but that greater occupancy strains infrastructure designed for part-time use. As to fire and evacuations, one resident had two words "Paradise, California." STR owners are required to post an evacuation plan, but as one noted, "I am not qualified to put together an evacuation plan." Muir responded, "There is a master plan for evacuation ... in place since 1985 ... updated every year," and directed the public to the Mountain Area Safety Taskforce.

Neither STR owners nor neighbors were satisfied

Perez's next STR meeting May 24

Riverside County 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez has scheduled the next meeting in Idyllwild for short-term rental (STR) policy from 5 to 7 p.m. Wednesday, May 24, at Town Hall.

At the May 1 listening session on STR policy in Idyllwild, Perez announced he would like to return to the community to meet again in three weeks. Next week's meeting will be a follow-up meeting to provide input to Perez and to the committee that is working on STR policy as well as the Riverside County Planning Department. The meeting will be in-person and is open to the public.

Enough evidence to hold Solis Delgado 'to answer'

Local restaurateur Luis Solis Delgado, 44, of Idyllwild, went before the Riverside County Superior Court last Friday for his preliminary hearing.

According to the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, "This is not a trial — but it is a hearing at which the judge determines if there is sufficient evidence to require the defendant to stand trial in superior court. Normally just enough evidence is presented to 'hold the defendant to answer.' No jurors will be present, since the judge alone decides if there will be a trial."

Enough evidence was presented so the next step is an information arraignment set for 8:30 a.m. Friday, May 26.

He is incarcerated at the Southwest Detention Center on \$5 million bail.

He is charged with eight felony sex charges involving two minor female children beginning in August 2015 and ending Wednesday, April 26, 2023, the day before he was arrested. One of the felonies has an enhancement that the victim was particularly vulnerable, which he has denied. He has pleaded not guilty to all eight felony charges. He faces life imprisonment if found guilty.

Reappearance of an El Niño may bring a very wet winter

The Hill has just passed through a very wet winter. One which has almost entirely eliminated drought conditions throughout the state. It is not too early to begin to think about what the atmospheric and oceanic environments will deliver in winter 2023-24.

Last month, the National Weather Service's (NWS) Climate Prediction Center stated, "... a 62% chance of El Niño developing during May-July 2023." Last week, Weather Channel meteorologists reported "... an 80% chance of an El Niño climate pattern forms as early as July."

Then on May 11, the NWS Climate Prediction Center reported, "... transition from [El Niño-Southern Oscillation]-neutral is expected in the next couple of months, with a greater than 90% chance of El Niño persisting into the Northern Hemisphere winter."

The import of this forecast is that El Niño weather conditions usually bring hotter summers and wetter winters to Southern California. While this is not always the case, historically these patterns typically occur with El Niño conditions.

"It looks like it is going to be a big one with major implications globally," said Daniel Swain, a climate scientist in the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles. "... more high confidence of a major El Niño event to moderate to strong, perhaps very strong. There is a growing consensus it will be a big one."

El Niño, which means "the little boy" in Spanish, is a major climatic event caused by changes to ocean currents in the Pacific Ocean. El Niño is a naturally occurring phenomenon that results from interactions between the ocean surface and the atmosphere over the tropical Pacific.

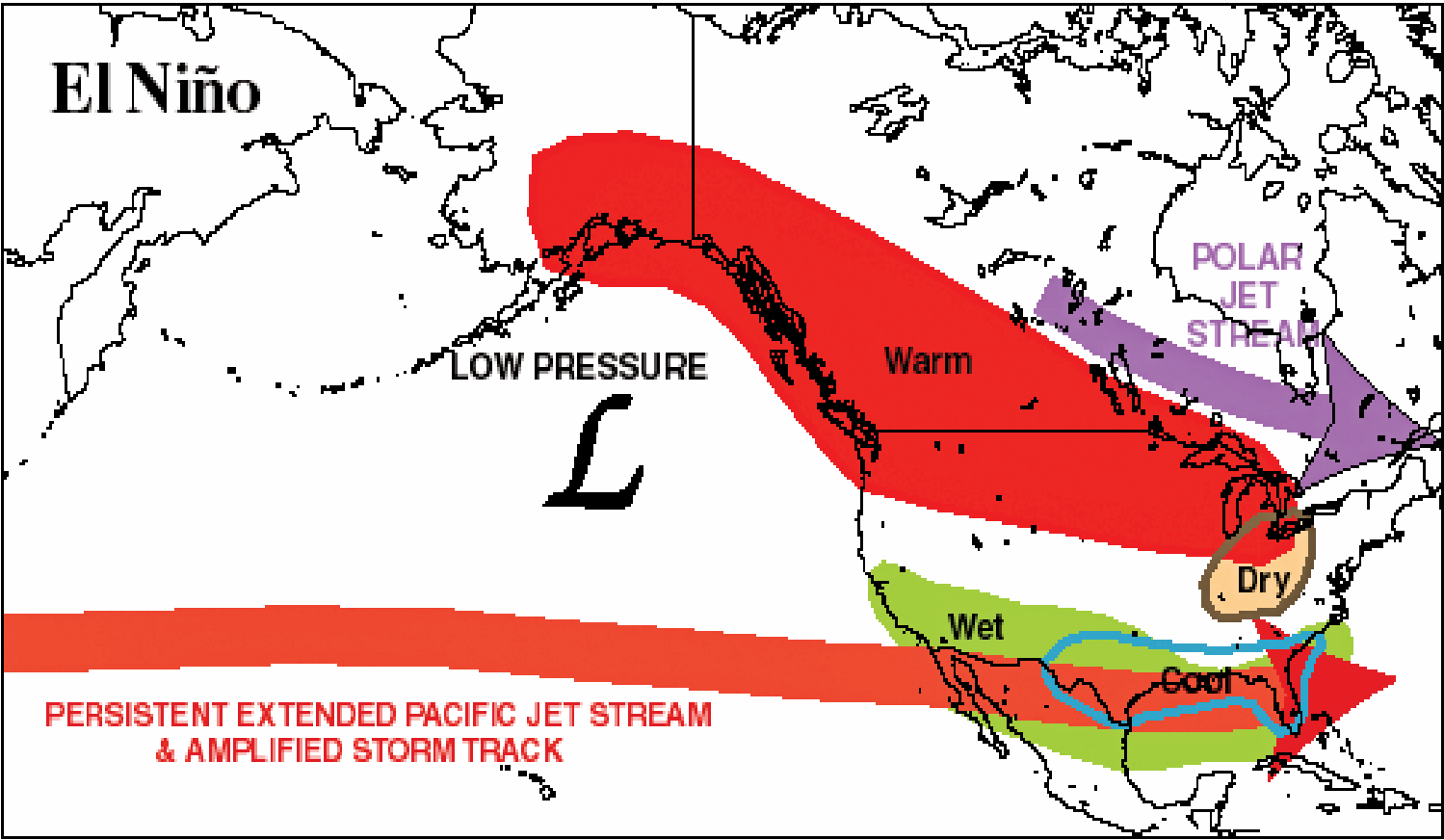
During winter El Niño episodes feature a strong jet stream and storm track across the southern part of the United States, which often results in an exceptionally stormy winter and increased precipitation across California and the southern U.S., and less stormy conditions across the northern part of the country.

The last El Niño event occurred between February and August 2019 and was quite weak.

La Niña, or "the little girl," is a cooling event triggered by changes to the same ocean current system that generally brings the opposite weather conditions.

The expectation is for late summer to warm up considerably from the current temperatures and the likelihood of

a very wet winter. "Next winter's precipitation of El Niño is strong to very strong. I expect to see a strong tilt in odds toward wetter than average conditions in California," Swain said in his YouTube broadcast May 8.

The NWS forecast stated, "The combination of a forecasted third westerly wind event in mid-late May, and high levels of above-average oceanic heat content, means that a potentially significant El Niño is on the horizon. While at least a weak El Niño is likely, the range of possibilities at the end of the year (November-January) include a 80% chance of at least a moderate El Niño to a [approximate] 55% chance of a strong El Niño."

But in the fall of 2015, there were predictions of major rain and possible flooding in Southern California through winter 2016. That never occurred. While oceanic temperatures were higher than normal, the atmospheric winds did not support the forecast.

Swain and others also are concerned that El Niño will push global temperatures up, but that is more likely in 2024 than this summer.

Bill Chappell, of National Public Radio, reported, "As hot as the Earth's weather has been in recent years, it's about to get hotter: El Niño is on the way, with warmer sea temperatures promising new weather extremes, U.S. and international forecasters say."

Forest Service looks to incorporate climate change policies into forest management: Comments sought

Next steps

And on April 21, 2023, the Forest Service issued a Federal Register notice requesting comments on how to create new policies or apply current policies to foster greater climate resilience. Questions that can be addressed include:

- What kinds of conservation, management or adaptation practices may be effective at fostering climate resilience on forests and grasslands at different geographic scales?
- How should Forest Service management, partnerships and investments consider cross-jurisdictional impacts of stressors to forest and grassland resilience at a landscape scale, including activities in the wildland urban interface?
- What are key outcome-based performance measures and indicators that would help the agency track changing conditions, test assumptions, evaluate effectiveness and inform continued adaptive management?

As part of this effort, the Forest Service has developed a Forest Service Climate Risk Viewer for public feedback. (To be reported in next issue.) The viewer has the capability to "... illustrate the overlap of multiple resource values with climate exposure and vulnerability and includes current management direction on National Forest System lands. The viewer allows for a place-based analysis of the need for climate adaptation to maintain, restore and expand valued forest ecosystem and watershed characteristics. Additionally, the viewer supports identification of gaps between current management and potential conservation and adaptation practices," according to the Federal Register Notice.

PCWD catches up after April meeting canceled

The Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) Board of Directors held its meeting last Wednesday, covering two months of business because the April meeting was canceled. All directors were present as was Fred Parker, CEO of Comtronix.

Corrected financial statements were submitted for December 2022 to February 2023. Office Manager Becky Smith explained that some banking service charges had not been previously reconciled, and that she wanted the board to know about the corrections.

The Third Quarter Budget comparison was accepted. Percentages were on track for the annual projections, the one unusual expense being \$50,000 for a new truck, which was paid for out of reserves. The truck is now “built out” for the job and is, according to General Manager Jeremy Potter, “What I wanted it to be.”

The April financial statement also was accepted. This included \$3,863.94 for a new ice machine. The old one, “cheap” and purchased through Amazon, “melted down” as soon as the warranty expired and was unrepairable. The new one was purchased from local business Sandlin and Son, who will be able to repair it. Sandlin also installed the machine, explained proper cleaning and maintenance and supplied ice during the interim. The machine is used not only to cool the water work crews bring along for on-the-job hydration, but is part of PCWD’s support for firefighters during incident response. Another item on the statement, the crew repairing freeze damage to a “dip tank,” also falls into that category; the tanks, one fixed and one mobile, are used by firefighting helicopters.

Potter’s Operations Report for March showed production “down from last year, even down from last month, which is good, [fewer] leaks” ... Static well 10 is “up 24 feet pretty much instantly. I’m hoping it rises more. It’s been at 110 [feet] in years prior. We got up to 130 ... We still see snow up on the peaks, it continues to rise.” Other wells are also rising but “we have a couple that are down, that need to be fixed, that will be in the works next week.”

Potter also reported on Smart Earth Technology (SET) valves and Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) meters, a class of networked technology. The new meters have been installed on “all the production side, all the wells, the inlets to our treatment plant.” The individual meters are beginning to go in: 2-inch meters for Buckhorn and Coulter Pines, 1-inch for Hummingbird Park. The first one was installed “just across the street” to confirm that the remote monitoring and control functions work. Already the meters are beginning to provide useful information. “Hummingbird, the very next day we noticed on the computer continuous flow through the night, 5 gallons an hour ... we notified Hummingbird they might have a small leak.” Smith added that PCWD got a \$430 discount because, facing a delivery delay, Potter sent a truck and trailer down to Banning to pick up the four pallets of meters and valves.

Potter also explained that broken meters are now being replaced with the new ones. The bulk of the replacement will happen by “book” or meter reading route, of which there are seven. The first book reaches from behind the office up to Mountain View Drive. Once the meters are installed the customer portal will be set up.

Potter has begun searching for a snow blower attachment to avoid plowing in the future. A quote will be forthcoming from a vendor, Scott Equipment, who has sold to the Arrowbear area. That quote should be presented at the June meeting.

In new business, Resolution 577 proposed re-

moving meters from accounts that have not paid for over a year. Smith provided examples: In one case, a resident died with no next of kin. While the meter is still active the account gets bigger. In another case, a house burned down, the lot was sold, and in 15 years no payment has been made. “This would give us the ability to remove that meter. If they want to replace it, they would have to pay the standing current price for the meter, plus whatever is due on the account. These accounts have \$3[,000], \$4[,000], \$5,000 balances. We have liens on them.” The old Resolution 266 was sent to legal counsel and up dated. “It costs the district money to continue to maintain these services and we’re not getting paid for it.” The resolution was approved.

Resolution 578 imposes standby charges, \$30 per acre or portion thereof, for parcels “not served by active metered service.” The resolution was accepted. The board’s acceptance triggers a public notice requirement for a public hearing at the June 14 board meeting.

The draft budget for fiscal year 2023-24 was reviewed, with projected income and expenses balanced at \$1,261,000. Potter noted that the loan to cover the new valves and meters was incorrectly labeled “New USDA Loan Payment,” but should be “New Government Capital Loan Payment.” That amount, \$85,610, makes up the bulk of the district’s \$117,850 in “Equipment, Loans and Liabilities.” Among differences from last year, Potter noted “a little more for part-time ... and fuel, utilities.” Smith noted that they “have not yet received the amount we are going to owe for the unfunded liability. They usually send that out in May.” Insurance is being reviewed and new quotes will be coming in. Potter also explained that tank #2 will need to be replaced, and the plan is to pay for this out of reserves, as that account builds up over the next few years. The completed budget will be presented next month.

The last piece of new business was a request from Comtronix, a small, family-owned radio relaying company that rents a building from the district. It has fallen into arrears and now owes over \$12,000 it is unable to pay. The company has been renting from PCWD since 1988. It has lost customers; Riverside County has built its own facility, Hemet Unified School District also has made other arrangements for its “trunking system,” as has Hemet Valley Ambulance. Comtronix continues to serve the state park and SSD Alarm from the building.

President Robert Hewitt recommended that another member form an ad hoc committee to discuss the issue with Hewitt, and get back to the board and Comtronix. Lou Padula volunteered to meet with Hewitt and staff. Assistant Office Manager Jennifer Hayes also will be present so that she is fully briefed since Smith is retiring at the end of November.

Also noted under “correspondence” was a Certificate of Excellence awarded by the Special District Leadership Foundation, “an independent, nonprofit organization formed to promote good governance and best practices among California’s special districts.” The certificate notes that by completing the foundation’s program, PCWD “has proven its dedication to being fully transparent as well as open and accessible to the public and other stakeholders.” Potter noted the contribution of staff to “empower the public with information and facilitate engagement and oversight.” Among the elements that earned the certificate were “ethics training for all board members, properly conducting open and public meetings, and filing financial transactions and compensation reports to the State Controller in a timely manner.”

The next meeting is 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 14, at the PCWD office.

with the county’s role. One former public health nurse who has repeatedly complained about septic effluent from a neighboring STR said the county was “overwhelmed” and that the people answering complaints needed “to be told where Idyllwild is.” When Perez asked whether this situation had improved in the last six months, as the Special Enforcement Team (SET) was activated, the answer was “no.”

On the other side, one owner told of being targeted by a neighbor who told him he was “waging a war on STRs” and saw himself as “the tip of the spear.” They suggested there should be a way for STR owners to respond to complaints they believe are harassment, to bring “balance to the complaint system.” This owner said the relationship had improved over time, a newsworthy story in itself. The “tip of the spear” neighbor spoke to this reporter after the meeting and explained that a broader involvement in neighborhood issues led him to take a more nuanced view of the situation.

Both owners and neighbors complain about the lack of solid facts. A part-time resident who “worked with San Diego County for 22 years ... oversaw TOT” [Transient Occupancy Tax] and was involved in drafting that county’s STR ordinance has been requesting information from the county. They shared with the Crier what purports to be April’s STR certificate list for 92549. The county has not responded to the Crier’s request for confirmation, but the list includes 499 active permitted STRs. A visit to AIRDNA, a website that aggregates STR information from a variety of platforms for investors and renters, shows listings for “584 Active Rentals” in Idyllwild/Pine Cove, implying 85 unregistered.

The issue of a “cap” comes up from citizens on both sides of the issue, and the number being cited is 10% of total homes. A quick survey of the three water districts found a total of 4,538 meters, some of which are businesses, implying that the existing number of certified STRs is already over that suggested cap.

STR owners have several well-organized groups they can join that advocate for them, but concerned neighbors seem to lack a “lobby.” They share information, and perhaps misinformation, on various Facebook pages. It is hard to have a meaningful discussion without facts, and one frustrated owner of a second home they use as an STR lamented this lack. “That’s the county’s job.”

Several STR owners in the Mountain Center/Garner Valley area described their situation as different from that of “town” rentals. “The loudest noise we have is the frogs.” Where properties are further apart, they would like more freedom. One resident whose permit expired pleaded for a “case-by-case” approach to permits. Ordinances, however, are written to be applied mechanically as conditions are fulfilled and not at the judgement of bureaucrats. The question before the county becomes: Where are the lines to be drawn? Are owners of a single “second home” to be treated differently from investors who own several? Can residents who live on-site be treated differently than absent owners who hire a management company?

An ordinance without enforcement is a fiction, and “people policing people” not a practical solution. “People say ‘Just call your neighbors and tell them you’re concerned,’ but that’s not realistic ... retaliation is a really big thing.” One part-timer who rents their cabin out summed up the lack of clarity on the reality of enforcement: “I don’t know who is supposed to come and visit a home when there is a violation” and asked if “that’s something that is done professionally and provided by people who have supervisors ... to hold them accountable ... to standards of conduct. I would hope those people are vetted ... trained in peaceful intervention.”

The formula heard several times is that money from permits or TOT should come back to the community to do this. TOT goes to the general fund, but permitting fees, (\$740 for new permits, \$520 for renewals) may be used for enforcement. The former San Diegan involved in their ordinance put this at the top of their recommendations: That the county “hire one-and-a-half compliance officers. They will be a community resident, they will understand our neighborhood and they will understand the values of the community.”

This citizen told the Crier that the one question the county did not answer was whether there has been any enforcement at all of current regulations. Have any fines ever been levied in our area? The county has not yet answered the Crier’s request for clarification on this issue.

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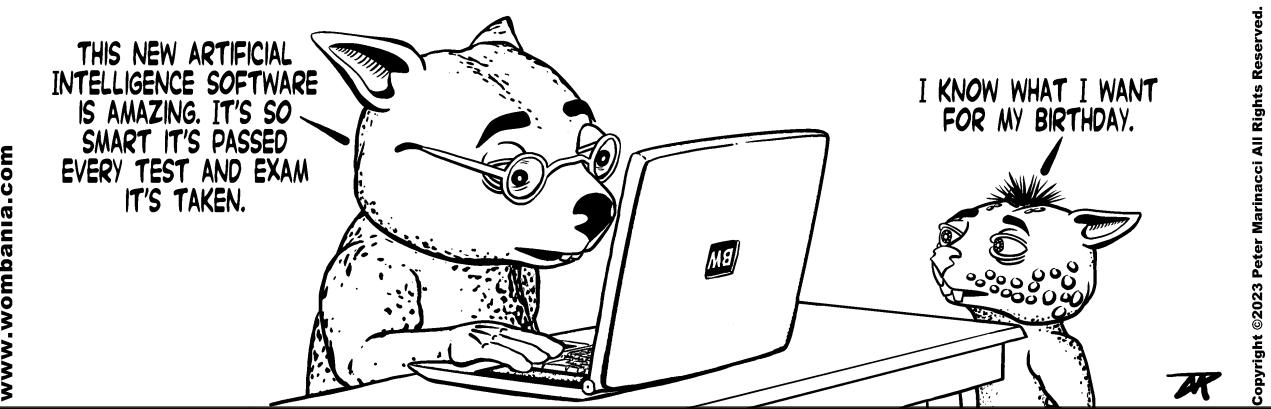

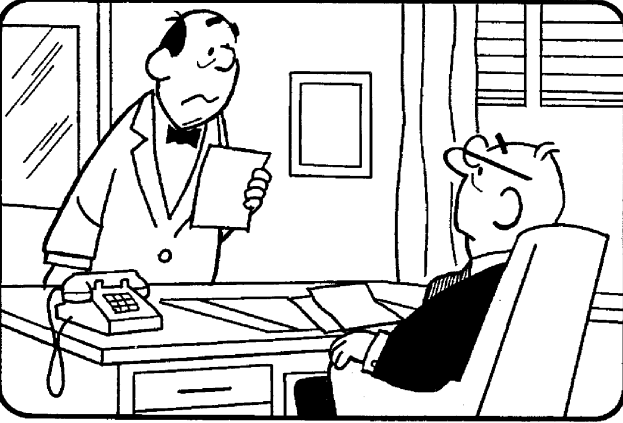

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State phasing in zero-emission truck and heavy-duty vehicles

Following the March 31 waiver to California’s Clean Air Act regulations for heavy duty trucks from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) approved a rule that requires a phased-in transition toward zero-emissions for medium- and heavy-duty vehicles and locomotives.

Under the new rule, fleet owners operating vehicles for private services such as last-mile delivery and federal fleets such as the Postal Service, along with state and local government fleets, will begin their transition toward zero-emission vehicles (ZEV) starting in 2024. The rule includes the ability to continue operating existing vehicles through their useful life.

In other words, diesel-run vehicles, including locomotives, will be banned over the next decade.

The rule offers flexibility in achieving these goals. For example, last-mile delivery and yard trucks must transition by 2035, work trucks and day cab tractors must be ZEV by 2039, and sleeper cab tractors and specialty vehicles must be ZEV by 2042.

Through the end of 2022, nearly 1,950 medium- and heavy-duty trucks, bus and delivery vans were sold in California. In Riverside County, there are now 42 ZEV — 29 buses and 13 trucks.

“We have the technology available to start working toward a zero-emission future now,” said CARB Chair Liane Randolph. “... this rule provides manufacturers, truck owners and fueling providers the assurance that there will be a market and the demand for zero-emissions vehicles, while providing a flexible path to making the transition toward clean air.”

Following Gov. Gavin Newsom’s 2020 executive order to develop new rules, last summer CARB approved regulations requiring 100% of new car sales in California to be ZEVs by 2035. This rule also applied to light-duty trucks.

The Advanced Clean Truck regulation of 2020 requires that manufacturers produce and sell increasing quantities of medium- and heavy-duty ZEVs and near ZEVs in California. Specifically, by 2035, the percentage of new truck sales that should be zero-emissions are 55% for Class 2b-3, 75% for Class 4-8 and 40% of semitractor-trailer sales.

The Advanced Clean Fleets rule includes an end

to combustion truck sales in 2036. An analysis of the sales and purchase requirements estimates that about 1.7 million zero-emission trucks will hit California roads by 2050.

To support the needed infrastructure and services to make this transition, agencies across government have committed to the Zero-Emission Infrastructure Joint Agency Statement of Intent, which lays out the basic tools for direct communication and funding the extensive network of electric charging and hydrogen stations required to help get California to zero-emissions by 2045.

Together these rules are expected to provide benefits to communities such as Long Beach and San Bernardino, which have been besieged by diesel exhaust and smog-forming emissions from heavy truck traffic and trains.

With the help of federal and state new incentives and rebates, sales of ZEVs has steadily, and now rapidly, grown. In the first quarter of 2023, nearly 125,000 ZEVs were sold in California. Cumulatively, more than 1.5 million ZEVs have been sold in California, representing about 21% of total market share of new automobiles.

Don't Stick Around!

The top eight-point finishers of the year in each division go into playoffs in August, September and October to determine the club champions. 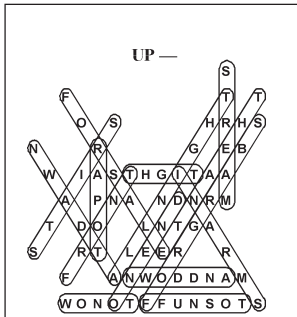

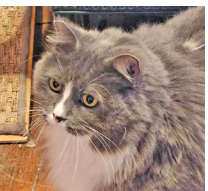

The traditional Mother's Day snowstorm arrived two days early, leaving almost 2 inches of snow that disappeared quicker than the flapjacks at the annual Lions Club Mother's Day breakfast.

30 years ago - 1993
After many delays, the Strawberry Creek Bridge was finally opened. It was a particular relief to business owners who stated that their businesses had suffered devastating losses since construction began in March 1992.

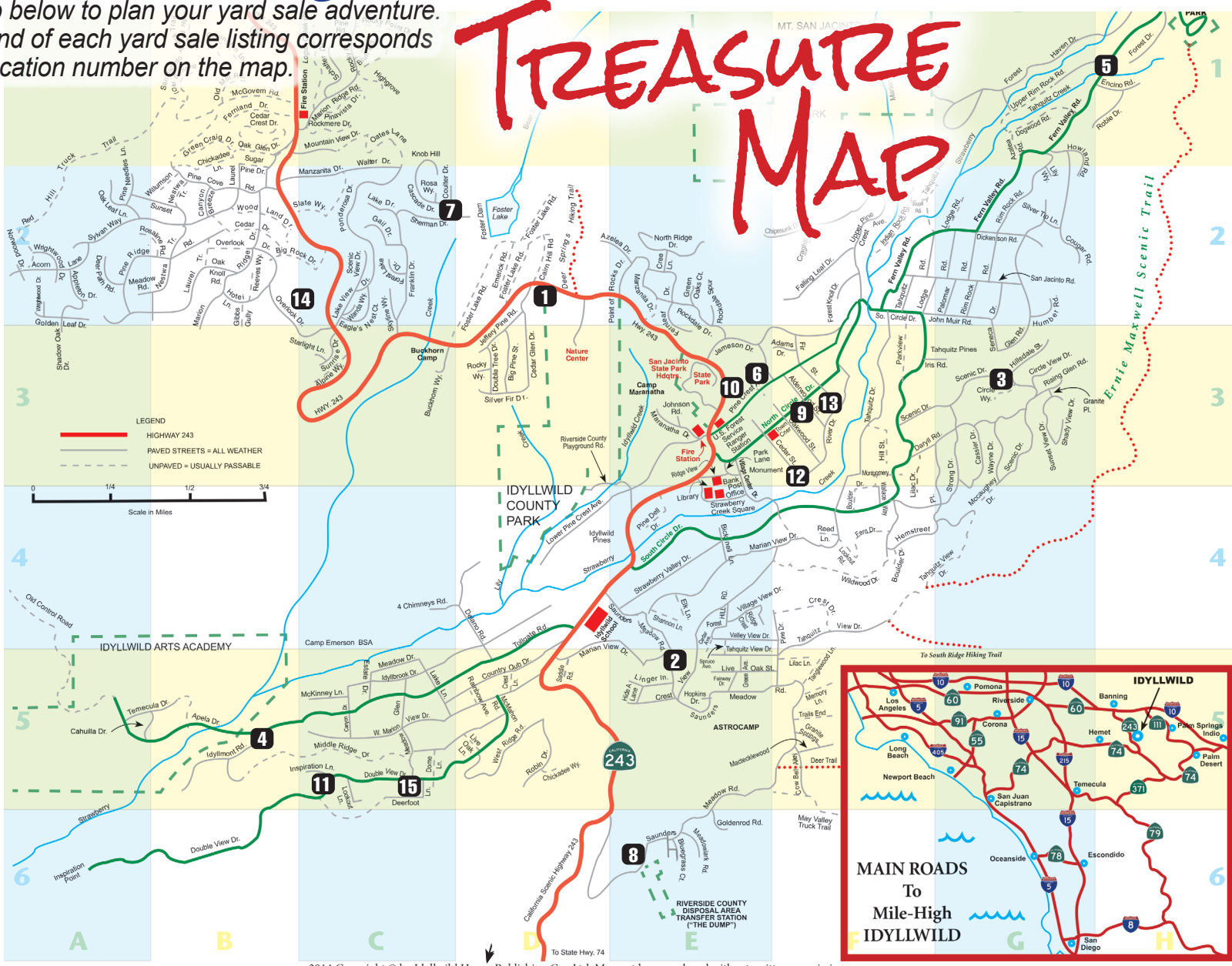

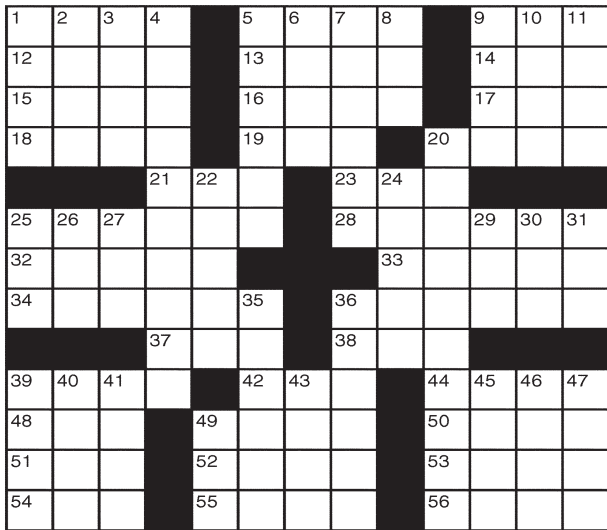
