## IWD sets rate increase public meetings

In its May 17 meeting, the Idyllwild Water District's (IWD) slimmed down board of directors approved two assessment fees, returned the district to a water conservation Stage 1, heard the latest on its building rehabilitation, and announced several special meetings or workshops to be held before the next regular meeting currently planned for June 21.

With a vacant directorship and Vice President Peter Szabadi on personal travel, only three directors were present, the minimum for a quorum and to take any actions. Attending the meeting was President Dr. Chip Schelly and colleagues Steve Kunkle and Steve Ölson.

The board held two public hearings — both for parcel assessments — during the meeting. Annually, the board must approve resolutions setting assessment standby fees on undeveloped parcels within both the overall water district and the sewer

The fee for each is \$30 per acre or less. The fee applies only to undeveloped parcels and helps the district install pipelines and ensure water and sew-er capacity in a neighborhood that would benefit the future development of these parcels. Thus, the cost of infrastructure is shared with the current customers and potential future customers who will seek these services in order to build on their prop-

There was no public comment on the resolutions and the board approved both unanimously.

General Manager Leo Havener reported the latest information on IWD's efforts to renovate, and to remove mold and possible asbestos from its headquarters building.

The latest bid, which he solicited, was for \$21,000. However, that appears to be just for mold removal and repair. This contractor suggested that Havener solicit another contractor to analyze the premise for the possibility of the presence of asbestos. He plans to do this soon, and this is actually the

"Before any work is done, he recommended we do an analysis of whether asbestos exists," Havener told the board.

Havener also announced several special gatherings — Town Hall meetings and workshop — before the next regular board meeting on June 21. At 5 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday, May 30 and 31, IWD will hold "Town Hall" meetings. These are intended to give the rate study contractor an opportunity to explain the rationale for the increases and how they will be applied. Also, it will allow customers and the public time to ask questions and to discuss the proposed rate increases with the contractor and staff.

Havener said these rate increases will be on the agenda of June 21 board meeting for approval. If approved, they would be effective July 1.

A week later, on June 7, there may be a special board meeting to fill the vacant board position created when GenoeSchneider resigned.

Finally, at 10 a.m. Saturday, June 10, the dirctors plan to conduct a workshop as they draft next year's budget (fiscal year 2023-24). The final budget proposal will be on the agenda of the June 21 meeting for approval and should be available for public review when the agenda is posted.

Water production for the first four months of 2023 was 24.4 million gallons. The first two months were 2.3 million gallons greater than January and February 2022, but March and April were 3.4 mil-See IWD, page A4

## Losing candidate files lawsuit against Riverside County


In November, former Riverside County Auditor-Controller Paul Angulo lost his bid for reelection to Ben Benoit. On April 24, Angulo filed a \$1.480 million claim against the county as a result of its certification of Benoit winning the election.

Angulo argues that the state requires a county auditor-controller to have "... certain experience and formal training." He argues that Benoit is not qualified and should not have been on the ballot.

But the county points out that the ordinance, 583.1 containing these qualifications was repealed.

State Government Code section 26945 specifies the qualifications for individuals to hold the office of county auditor. The options include a degree in accounting, a CPA license, or experience as a county auditor. However, the following section, 26946, specifies, "The provisions of this article shall become effective in only those counties in which ... the board of supervisors by a unanimous vote, at a regular meeting with all members present, enacts an ordinance adopting the provisions of this article. The ordinance so adopted may be repealed by the board of supervisors at any

Riverside County did adopt Ordinance 583.1 in December 1997; however, Ordinance 583.2 was subsequently passed in August 2001, more than 20 years ago. This ordinance repealed 583.1. See Angulo, page A7

## Six county areas subject to fire season closure

Several areas within Riverside County have been closed to public access because of high potential fire danger. At its May 25 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved County Fire Chief Bill Weiser's recommendation to close six areas - North Mountain and Indian Canyon, Whitewater Canyon, Ramona Bowl (closed daily noon to sunrise), Bautista Canyon, Steel Peak and the Eagle Canyon/Tin Mine area.

The closures will be effective June 1 and will continue

covered with grass, grain, brush or forest and situated in a location that makes suppression difficult, resulting in great damage. Although drought conditions have been removed, the winter precipitation has created a very extensive grass crop. 



# IFPD workshop on Mutual Aid and fire prevention

The Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) Board of Commissioners held a special meeting Tuesday, May 16. Henry Sawicki, a former commissioner who lost reelection, will assume the seat Cristina Reitz recently vacated.

Although announced as a policy workshop for the board, the majority of time was taken by presentations from IFPD Chief Mark LaMont and former IFPD employee Dan Diaz, now a battalion chief with the Cleveland National Forest. They presented a review of fuel reduction projects around the community and explained IFPD's Mutual Aid agreements and contributions.

LaMont told the board that fire agencies voluntarily enter Mutual Aid agreements. Each agrees to help the others in emergencies while always maintaining a "draw down" level of staffing to deal with anticipated local need. In return, IFPD has a large network of partners in which to rely.

In the aftermath of this winter's heavy snows, IFPD responded to Mutual Aid requests from San Bernardino County for the Running Springs, Big Bear and the Arrowhead area, sending 11 people. The main part of this work was helping to clear the nearly 3,000 miles of roads in those mountain communities to free the nearly 40,000 residents and visitors trapped by snow that reached rooftops. LaMont added that San Bernardino County Flre Chief Dan Munsey will come to Idyllwild to further discuss the "After Action Review" for this event soon.

Although clearing snow is not the first thing that comes to mind when thinking of firemen, LaMont called it part of the "all risk nature" of public safety agencies. In the San Bernardino Mountains snow event, skip loaders and 60 dump trucks had to be rounded up to remove snow too deep to plow, and the gas company was contracted to provide backhoes to open up the berms for individual driveways. IFPD also assisted in distributing water and medication, managing the runoff with hay bales and k-rails, and restoring power to 30,000 customers within four days. Of the 13 casualties reported, LaMont said nine were people already on hospice care, and two others were from traffic incidents. LaMont said no community can afford the infrastructure to respond on its own to events like that. He is pursuing an offer from Munsey for one of that county's Sno-Cats.

Another incident illustrating IFPD's Mutual Aid activities was a fire the prior week in Mecca. There, crews cut lines to protect homes from a brush fire "spotting" as embers blew ahead of the fire, creating many small fires within a 200-acre section.

LaMont announced that IFPD recently stood up its first "hand" crew, not an engine company, but a team to cut fuel-breaks, either as preparation or during incidents. Regulations require at least 14 members in a crew, and this group has 24. The crew is a noteworthy accomplishment as fire departments around the country struggle to hire firefighters, he said.

The longest presentation was Diaz's update on fuel reduction projects, fire breaks. "The only way any community combats a fast-moving wildland fire is by being prepared for it," he said. Even then fires are not completely controllable, but the goal is to steer them, and "it takes every single thing that you've got to hold (fires) outside ... communities."

The review focused on fuelbreaks that surround the valley on three sides. These are the South Ridge and West Ridge projects, Strawberry, and the new Bear Trap project. He noted that IFPD plans for a "seven-year re-engagement," as after five to seven years the break "is not really viable." The placement of the breaks is based on a strategic evaluation of the landscape and the community.

The Strawberry fuelbreak runs from "west of Pine Cove down toward West Ridge, down in the Strawberry (Creek) drainage." The new Bear Trap project is east of and roughly parallel to Strawberry, backing it up in that vulnerable direction, a "belt and suspenders" system. Unlike the others, it is built entirely on private property, Camp Emerson and Buckhorn Camp. There are now two 30-foot wide open swaths with a 90-foot pile of brush in the center. When weather cooperates, control burning of that brush will start, a little at a time, in what is called "chevroning" or "tiger striping." Diaz also noted the "mastication" treatment given to the edges of highways 74 and 243 to give a "buffer" along evacuation routes.

Diaz also gave accounts of historic incidents like the Cranston Fire and explained how the fuels reduction projects had made the defense of Idyllwild possible.

In response to a question from Commissioner Stephanie Yost about evacuation zones, LaMont provided some insight into the Mountain Area Safety Task Force (MAST) plan. MAST does provide pamphlets to residents explaining evacuation

routes and processes, and home preparation, but the master plan itself is not "forward facing," or public, because it reveals in detail the tactical vulnerabilities of the area. Shelter-in-place areas are known by first responders but residents would only be directed there by first responders in an emergency. LaMont cited successful early evacuations in 1996, 2013 and 2018 as evidence that the plan works.

He also noted that "we are currently working with the MAST partners to create an electronic version that can be forward facing ... over the last year." He added that in general, evacuation is simple: "You go north or you go south on 243." Of course, further details will be provided "through WNKI ... the sheriff ... and all of our other resource capacity." He underlined that zone evacuations are used to avoid the bottlenecks that led to casualties in the Camp Fire, and recommended the Public Broadcasting Service special "Fire in Paradise" for "lessons learned and mistakes that were made"

The last part of the meeting was the review of basic board policies: definition of policies; adopting and amending them; copying public documents; public contributions (IFPD is not a 501 nonprofit, ask your tax preparer about the deductibility of donations); credit card usage (commissioners don't get them); benefits (commissioners also don't get these); membership in organizations (the board may join associations); and Rules of Order. These were all read, discussed and approved.

## Grand jury concerned about time for offload of emergency patients at hospitals

When a medical emergency occurs outside a hospital, the time it takes for first responders to transport the individual to a hospital for care is critical. And the care received during this period has been the focus of recent attention.

Both a grand jury and the Riverside County Board of Supervisors are concerned about emergency care in the county. The latest is a Riverside County Civil Grand Jury (GJ) report about the time it takes to transfer a patient from the ambulance to the hospital's care. Last month, the supervisors expressed their concern with the work of the county's ambulance contractor, American Medical Response (AMR).

For the first time since 2015, when Riverside County awarded the emergency ambulance service contract to AMR, the bboard has denied AMR's request to extend the contract's expiration date.

The GJ has focused on the delay it takes to officially transfer patients to hospital care after the ambulance arrives at the hospital. It is not unusual for this transfer to take more than 30 minutes. It happens enough that the emergency service administrators have officially named it, "Ambulance Patient Offload Delays" (APOD). First responders — ambulance or fire crews — who are responsible for the patient until the hospital takes over, call it "wall time."

According to the GJ report, "County departments, state government and hospital emergency departments have not improved in any significant way."

APOD applies to patients with nonthreatening emergencies. Patients with trauma, stroke or heart issues are immediately accepted and transferred to emergency treatment areas.

Other patients may have to wait for available space or staff to help. Until the hospital takes responsibility, the transfer teams, and occasionally this includes a fire paramedic, must stay with the patient. Consequently, the ambulance or its crew cannot respond to any other call while awaiting the patient transfer.

The GJ reported there were more than 38,000 APOD incidents at Riverside County hospitals in 2022. That is nearly a 20% increase in three years.

In a joint letter to the state Health and Human Services Agency and the Emergency Medical Services Administration, the president of the California Professional Firefighters and the California Hospital Association urged the state to find solutions to the problem.

"Efficient and timely transfer of care between EMS providers and hospital emergency departments is imperative. A delay in the transfer of care creates stress on EMS system participants and their response times but most concerningly, delays care for the patient," wrote

The state's Emergency Medical Services Agency (EMSA) set the standard for a delay at more than 30 minutes. Based on the county's EMSA reports, there were nearly 800 APOD in the week from Feb. 26 to March 4, this year. That's about a quarter of all patient transports to local hospitals. And the transport crew is unavailable for other calls until the hospital accepts its patient.

While ambulances are the required vehicle for ground transport to hospitals, sometimes fire crews also are affected. Emergency dispatch (9-1-1) will send both a fire crew, which includes a paramedic, and an ambulance to the site of an emergency. Sometimes the emergency is so critical that the fire team paramedic will travel with the ambulance to the hospital

Of course, that means this fire vehicle is out of service until its full crew is available. This is the reason APOD is a critical problem. Not only ambulances, but occasionally, fire engines are out of service.

Riverside County has 17 hospitals. The occurrence of an APOD varies among them. During that same week, four local hospitals — Eisenhower, JFK, Palo Verde and Riverside University — had APOD for less than 6% of the transports to that hospital. But noticeably, three hospitals — Hemet, Riverside Community and Temecula — had APOD during more than 50% of the transports to their facilities. This represents almost 400 patients, more than half the APOD during that week.

A variety of reasons can cause a delay. According to the GJ, the California Hospital Association (CHA) explains that the potential for delays can be caused by "limited physical space, limited staffing and other issues in recent years, such as the pandemic, patients with substance abuse, and patients with behavioral health needs using the hospital emergency departments for care or medications. County residents sometimes have no primary care doctor and use the hospital emergency departments for their routine medical needs."

The CHA in its own report noted, "An increase in staff does not increase space in other care settings where patients who do not need emergency services should be transferred. Many hospitals are already using hallways, waiting rooms, disaster tents, and other areas to increase capacity. In addition, COVID-19 has taken a toll on the health care workforce — not just in California but across the country — and hospitals are facing the worst staffing shortage in recent memory."

To reduce APOD, the Riverside University Health System (RUHS) has taken several steps, according to the GJ. First, RUHS changed its parking area to better accommodate first responder vehicles.

The emergency department now has a dedicated nurse to triage ambulance arrivals. Some equipment, such as X-rays and labs, are now located in the emergency room to avoid the time to move the patient. Walk-in emergency patients are treated in another area.

To address a period when several ambulances may be out of service, Riverside City and Corona have established additional ambulance staff or squads to be available when other ambulances are unavailable.

In its conclusion, the GJ made three recommendations to the county. The first was for the supervisors to review, approve and support programs, including telehealth and Safety-Net Ambulance Programs. These may reduce ER demand or alleviate the shortages when APOD augment.

The second recommendation encouraged EMS to help other county hospitals to systematically work with the Riverside County EMSA to implement improvements similar to RUHS and other high-performing hospitals using "best practices" to decrease APOD.

Thirdly, as an interim solution, Riverside County Fire Department and AMR use available personnel to relieve delayed fire and/or ambulance teams at the hospital emergency departments.

The board and county agencies have 90 days to respond to the GI.

The supervisors did take some action to try to identify solutions. In January 2002, they approved a request from Supervisor Kevin Jeffries to extend the responsibility of its Fire Ad Hoc Committee to include "working with EMD and other relevant County Agencies to help resolve APOD/Wall Time problems in Riverside County."

But extended wall times are not a unique Riverside County problem. In January 2021, the state Assembly Committee on Emergency Management held an oversight hearing on the impact of APOD on emergency responses

This year, Assemblymember Freddie Rodriguez (D – Pomona) introduced Assembly Bill 40 to address this issue. On April 19, the Health Committee approved the bill 15-0. Last week, the Appropriations Committee also approved it unanimously.

Besides telling local EMSAs, such as Riverside County's, to set an APOD of 30 minutes, AB 40 requires acute care hospitals with emergency departments to meet that standard 90% of the time. Also, hospitals would be required to develop an APOD reduction protocol by June 1, 2024, file the protocol with EMSA and require EMSA to monitor monthly APOD data to ensure the standard is being met.

After the April action, Rodriguez said in a press release, "Extended wall times impact everyone in our emergency medical system as first responders are unable to respond to their next call, the patient they are currently waiting to offload does not receive timely care, and the next patient calling in a life-threatening situation cannot be picked up and transported expeditiously. Patients deserve better, and concrete policies must be adopted to alleviate this issue and ensure timely care."

lion gallons less than last year. For the four months, production was about a million gallons less than 2022

Consequently, Havener recommended the board move back to Water Conservation Stage 1 from Stage 2

However, usage during this period is nearly 13.6% greater than the 10-year average for these four months, although Havener said production was back to normal. With no discussion, the board unanimously accepted his recommendation.

The district's Ordinance 66 is for adopting a water shortage contingency plan. The ordinance provides for five water shortage levels. Stage 1 — Water Supply Watch — is the lowest of the five and is defined as "... while near-term supply and storage conditions may from time to time improve due to wet weather, there are continued long-term challenges that warrant continued wise and efficient use of water. ... Under Stage 1 conditions, the District's Basic Capacity Ratio (BCR) is 0-50%. Customers are requested to continue to use water efficiently and practice sensible voluntary water conservation."

The principal criterion for determining in which water conservation stage the district will be using for conservation limitations is called the BCR. This is simply the prior month's water usage divided by the district's supply capacity. Havener's Operations Reports indicates the BCR was 50% in April. For the last six months, the BCR only exceeded 50% in January.

## Forest Service has online tool to assess threats to forests; comments desired

A year following policy enunciations from President Joseph Biden and Tom Vilsack, secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, about dangers to the country's forests, the U.S. Forest Service is responding. In developing its policies, the agency is requesting public comment and opinion about "How should the Forest Service adapt current policies to protect, conserve, and manage the national forests and grasslands for climate

Also, the Forest Service has developed an online tool (Forest Service Climate Risk Viewer) to help identify and to assess "wildfire and climate change-driven vulnerabilities, threats, and risks to key resources and values in the National Forest System."

The Forest Service also is seeking comments on its Beta version of the Viewer, which is available at https://storymaps.arcgis.com/collections/87744e6b-06c74e82916b9b11da218d28

The viewer has the capability to "... illustrate the overlap of multiple resource values with climate exposure and vulnerability ... [which] allows for a place-based analysis of the need for climate adaptation to maintain, restore, and expand valued forest ecosystem and watershed characteristics."

This capability is accomplished with the use of 28 datasets such as rainfall, snow, watersheds, old growth and mature forests, and much more that are available at the state or national forest level. The Forest Service stresses that the Climate Risk Viewer is "not intended for local or site-specific planning."

Nevertheless, because of the shape of the San Bernardino National Forest, the San Jacinto Ranger District of data included are time lapse is clearly identifiable on these maps.

Climate vulnerability and climate exposure were the two key terms coming from the president's April 2022 Executive Order (www.whitehouse.gov/briefing-room/presidential-actions/2022/04/22/executive-or-





## **FVWD** revises investment policy

The Fern Valley Water District's (FVWD) Board of Directors changed its regular monthly meeting to the third Thursday from the third Friday of each month. The resolution establishing the change was approved unanimously last week. The next regularly scheduled FVWD board meeting is 9 a.m. Thursday, June 15.

Since FVWD has a four-day workweek, the change will benefit staff who will not have to come for the fifth day on weeks when the board meets.

In other action, the board agreed to revise its investment policy. Currently, all of the reserves and cash are deposited with the state's Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). Most California local governmental agencies (cities, counties and special districts) rely on LAIF to protect and to provide interest on available reserves.

Harrison Stenberg of Time Value Investments (TVI) in Seattle, Washington, made a presentation to the board on other possible financial strategies. Examples of investments were bonds, including U.S. Treasury notes. These were all yielding more interest than LAIF currently offers.

Stenberg stressed that FVWD should limit its investment in any particular bond to less than \$250,000. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures investments up to this amount. This agency also insures individual bank accounts.

TVI clients include cities, counties, colleges and local districts, such as hospital, irrigation, water and sewer, schools and others.

After discussion, the board agreed to amend its policy to allow for the purchase of other investments besides LAIF. FVWD has about \$1.9 million in reserves with LAIF.

The initial plan is to leave about half its reserves with LAIF and to invest the other half in federal CDs and bonds. The difference should generate about \$20,000 or more for the district annually. The board also approved another financial action to improve its cash management. Unani-

mously, the directors approved taking action to predeposit funds with the state that would cover future pension liabilities payments accruing for staff until retirement.

The state, through CalPERS, offers programs to help reduce future retirement costs associated with retirement benefits other than the actual pension. FVWD currently participates, along with nearly 600 other California agencies, in the California Employers' Retiree Benefit Trust Fund (CERBT). By joining this trust fund, California public agencies can help finance future costs for retiree benefits such as health, vision, dental and life insurance, in large part from investment earnings CalPERS provides.

At the May meeting the board approved a second agreement with CalPERS that will help fund the pension costs. This program, California Employers' Pension Prefunding Trust Fund (CEPPT), is dedicated to prefunding employer contributions to defined benefit pension systems. Like the CERBT fund, earnings from this fund can help finance future costs in large part from investment earnings provided by CalPERS.

The CEPPT is only four years old and has about 75 other public agencies as members.

The CEPPT program allows [us] to pay down and eliminate pension liability payments by completely funding our portion of the retirements in advance," said General Manager Victor Jimenez.

The board also quickly reviewed its draft fiscal year (FY) 2023-24 budget. Total income is currently projected to be about \$1.8 million, about \$12,000 less than the projection for FY 2022-23, which ends June 30.

Expenses are higher, about \$1.3 million, in order to finance several pipeline projects, yielding a projected deficit of about \$870,000, which would be financed with a portion of existing reserves. The work, which will involve replacing pipelines, valves, hydrants and services, will be in the Howland, Cougar and Silver Tip street neighborhoods.

Excluding capital expenses, the operating budget is projected to be about \$1.3 million. This is about \$75,000 more than the current estimate for the end of FY 2022-23,

but only \$15,000 more than the approved budget.

The board will approve its FY 2023-24 budget at the

June 15 meeting.

In the first four months of 2023, FVWD water production of 9.6 million gallons was about 775,000 (8.8%) gallons greater than the same period in 2022, although the April production decreased 15%.

While there are some minor leaks and meter failures, nothing major has been identified. Jimenez will consider using leak detection equipment to determine if more leaks have not appeared on the surface yet. All of the known leaks have occurred in older pipelines, he added.

All of the district's meters were replaced between 2018 and 2020, Jimenez said. While there were some bad meters, these have mostly been replaced already, he added.

Former board Chair Tom Mullen told his colleagues, "If this ordinance [583.2] is adopted, these enhanced qualifications for candidates will be repealed and the minimum requirement for candidates for auditor will be a registered voter in the county of

"... No additional action has been taken since then to increase the qualifications to run for Auditor," county Senior Public Information Specialist Yaoska Machado wrote in September, after discussion with the Registrar of Voters Office.

Nevertheless, Angulo is asking for four years of salary at \$245,000 annually and \$500,000 for pension benefits, plus any attorney fees.

In his handwritten claim, Angulo repeatedly refers to Ordinance 583.2 as the basis for the requirements to be an Auditor-controller. Benoit does not have the educational accounting degrees. However, Angulo does not acknowledge the ordinance has been re-

"The question is do board approved ordinances matter or not? Are they to be arbitrarily applied depending upon whom the board favors? Do fair elections matter in Riverside County," Angulo argues.

While he wrote that he has no intention of embarrassing the board, he is willing to go to trial if his claim is rejected. The basis for possible litigation, in Angulo's opinion, is "corruption of the electoral process, gross negligence, obstruction, retaliation, and dereliction of duty.

On May 8, the board wrote Angulo acknowledging receipt of his claim and formally rejecting it.

Besides claiming that Benoit is legally unqualified for auditor-controller, Angulo also claims Benoit has withheld legally owed travel expenses due to Angu-

"Further, in retaliation, the new, yet unqualified auditor-controller, withheld certain lawfully ap-

proved travel costs due the complainant."

Angulo did not respond to a request for comment about his claim.

**ART'S CORNER**

Whenever the occasion arises for a live music concert here in the various set locations in Idyllwild, hope issues forth for a glorious outpouring of sound which, given the opportunity, should be able to roll down the mountain ridges with the fluid ease of the many creeks and rivulets now in evidence. Thus, Monday, May 15 evening's Spring Chamber Music Recital at the Lowman Concert Hall promised further relief for the senses to those in attendance.

The proceedings began somewhat somberly, as well as traditionally, with the first movement of Edvard Grieg's "String Quartet in G Minor"; an unexpected choice of material that is certainly not springlike in nature. However, the four players sustained the proper natural spirit of the work, giving well-deserved sonority to the chiefly tonal resolutions demanded by the composer throughout, ending on a unison chordal cadence in the minor mode that the performers seemed to consider well-placed. Generally what was effected was a well-meant introductory establishment of complimentary string sound put forth vigorously enough as required.

Featured in the program's next three items were the lower registers of sound, most effectively presented by bassoonist Robert Nael. The opening movement of Georges Auric's "Trio for Oboe, Clarinet & Bassoon" had the insistent dash of good humor present in most of that composer's works, with asides from all the instruments pointing toward a happy conclusion. There followed the complete "Quartet for Bassoon, Violin, Viola and Cello" of Brooklyn-born bassoonist / composer Bernard Garfield, expressly a work designed to show off the the instrument's capabilities in the hands and fingers of a more than competent performer, as Mr. Nael is without a doubt.

That talent's display was bolstered by the following first movement of the Rimsky-Korsakov "Quintette" (for flute, clarinet, bassoon, horn and piano). Admittedly written as a conservatory exercise piece, the movement nevertheless featured instrumental interplay, not always with equal motivic impulses, which all five players essayed with more than evident delight at their individual pro-

The stage was thus set for the major opus on the program, the first movement of Antonin Dvorak's "Piano Quintet in A Major." The string complement, led by 1st violinist Derrick Giuntini, supplied the rapturous sound and lively folk rhythms of the composer's mature period, with another solid basis provided by pianist Zeyu Wang in the more conventional slower sections, giving a feeling of correctness and (in contrast to the Grieg) a resolution well-placed in the major

Somewhat of a surprising conclusion to the concert was offered by percussionists Uchyu Ono and Haru Imanishi, with their choice of the piece "Catching Shadows" in the two-marimba version by Mexican-American composer Ivan Trevino. This proved to be a workout for both performers; effectively chasing as well as catching the evanescent strands of sound produced in tandem. Both players reached a satisfying complimentary production of mallet work, and the audience was left with a relaxed and pleasing variety of sonic experiences. One always should hope for more of the same during the coming months, should all be well in the meantime.
