Parole for German tourist killer back to Parole Board

Birte Pflieger provided the Crier with an update on the parole process for convicted murderer Thongxay Nilakout, the man who killed her mother and nearly killed her father during a botched robbery at Indian Vista Point near Lake Fulmor in 1994.

In December 2022, a state hearing panel recommended Nilakout for parole. The full board approved the request, but Gov. Gavin Newsom has referred the case back to the whole Parole Board for a hearing, scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, June 20. Nilakout is to be the 11th case heard that day.

The governor, in his comments, asked the full board to consider “whether Mr. Nilakout can be safely released at this time” and noted that... “The psychologist who evaluated Mr. Nilakout identified current areas of concern that include the ‘life crime involving extreme violence against unknown and vulnerable victims, [his] participation in documented negative behavior through 2014, and some ongoing deficits in awareness or understanding related to life crime or subsequent negative behavior.’” While noting that Nilakout had showed some improvement, the governor asked “the full Board to assess whether Mr. Nilakout has sufficiently mitigated his risk factors, and whether his release on parole is consistent with public safety.”

Nilakout was 17 at the time of the murder. He was originally sentenced to life without parole, but a 2012 U.S. Supreme Court decision ruled that mandatory life without parole sentences for juveniles violated the Eighth Amendment, although it left judges the discretion to issue such terms in murder cases.

Pflieger presented arguments against parole for Nilakout: She believes he has not “aged out” of his criminal mindset. He is not yet 47, and recidivism decreases markedly for men after 55. Nilakout admits to shooting the Pfliegers, but his denial of certain facts, she says, makes “his expression of remorse ring hollow.”

She notes that although Nilakout claims to have rediscovered his Buddhist faith shortly before his 2015 parole hearing, he participated in a prison riot in 2014. “He is still learning how to follow rules in the controlled environment of a prison. He is not ready to be paroled.”

Pflieger also claims that Nilakout’s parole plans are “seriously flawed. “He intends to return to Banning and work as a driver for an older brother who owns a single truck. In prison he completed a truck driving theory class, but would still need to undergo training that costs, on average, about \$5,000. He also has a history of road rage. Pflieger said that Nilakout “has not had a visitor in over 20 years,” and casts doubts on his ability to reintegrate into his family.

There is also an immigration angle; Nilakout is a Laotian national with a green card. He could be detained by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) upon release, but Laos does not accept deportees so he “would likely be released from ICE detention either immediately or within six months.”

A tour of the IWD sewer plant

Last week the Crier took a tour of Idyllwild Water District’s (IWD) wastewater treatment plant, in service since 1970. IWD recently approved a five-year program of rate increases to pay for a replacement for the facility, at a projected cost of over \$7 million. Funding also is being sought from the state to lift some of that burden from rate payers. Unless a majority of the district’s sewer customers submit written protests before the end of the June 21 public hearing, the 13% a year rate hikes will begin to show up on bills and the project will go forward.

Before the tour, IWD General Manager Leo Havener and Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman answered a few questions about the rate study and the proposed new plant.

Q: The new plant will have increased staffing?
LH: The proposal adds one new employee this year, so there will be two.
Q: The rate study assumes little growth in water consumption, and income from water?
LH: Correct.
Q: What is the distribution of sewer services between commercial and residential customers?
HS: Residential accounts: 422; commercial accounts:165. Residential EDUs [equivalent dwelling unit]: 460; commercial EDUs: 952.
Q: The study assumes annual inflation of 5%, but it has been historically below 3%.
HS: I looked up the rate last night, it was 9.1%.

We learned at recent public meetings that the plant’s capacity is 250,000 gallons per day, but normal flow is around 110,000. During wet winters, influx and infiltration raise the flow over 200,000. The system has room for expansion. It serves District 1 of IWD’s map. If a developer wants a new branch within that zone, they would have to request it and “work with the district.” Expanding service beyond District 1 would require Local Agency Formation Commission approval. The new plant will have the same capacity. Raising it would require new permitting.

Operator III Danny Campbell, charge of its day-to-day operation, led the tour of this piece of Idyllwild’s aging critical infrastructure.

The raw sewage enters the plant at the “headworks,” a concrete sluice. Here it is filtered through a perforated metal screw-shaped screen in an auger. When the level in the sluice rises, indicating a clogged filter, the auger takes a turn and exposes clear filter. This removes coarse debris. Things like concrete and asphalt turn up. And rags, lots of rags.

Reactions to Newsom’s ‘build more’ policy are mixed

In an effort to avoid lengthy delays for dozens of state-funded construction projects, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed an Executive Order and proposed 11 trailer bills to accompany the Legislature’s fiscal year 2023-24 budget to be adopted this month.

Nearly all the proposed changes address environmental laws and procedures. Consequently, a unanimous consensus supporting these actions has yet to form.

The governor’s package is intended to streamline and to improve the overall permitting process, thus accelerating construction. It would make various changes to California law for certain projects in order to reduce delays and project costs. This includes expediting the time for judicial review of environmental cases for certain projects and addressing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) processes such as cumbersome procedures around document retention and review.

Just last week, organizations supporting the governor’s proposals and organizations requesting more time to review, if not oppose, these steps both sent letters to the Legislature. And dozens of organizations throughout the state signed both letters.

The business community’s June 5 letter, signed by more than 100 signatories, began, “[We] are writing in strong support of Governor Newsom’s plan to stream-

El Niño weather is here

Meteorologists and weather forecasters have been threatening or promising, depending upon your appreciation for weather changes, the arrival of a new El Niño pattern.

On June 8, the National Weather Service’s Climate Prediction Center released an El Niño advisory. The release stated, “Collectively, the coupled ocean-atmosphere system reflected the emergence of El Niño conditions ... indicates the continuation of El Niño through the Northern Hemisphere winter 2023-24.”

While the chances of this El Niño becoming a strong one remain at 56%, the chances of it exceeding moderately strong next winter are now 84%.

El Niño conditions bring warmer than average sea surface temperatures to the central and eastern Pacific Ocean. Consequently, an El Niño pattern will usually bring more precipitation to Southern California, much more rain and snow if the El Niño is a strong one. However, the last El Niño, which occurred in 2018 and 2019, was considered weak.

“Typically, moderate to strong El Niño conditions during the fall and winter result in wetter-than-average conditions from southern California to along the Gulf Coast and drier-than-average conditions in the Pacific Northwest and Ohio Valley,” according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration press release.

But in the months preceding next winter, temperatures will be warm to hot. Scientists are already observing increased oceanic temperatures.

“A warming El Niño is expected to develop in the coming months and this will combine with human-induced climate change to push global temperatures into uncharted territory,” said Professor Petteri Taalas, secretary-general of the World Meteorological Organization.

While El Niño alone may not create record heat, Michelle L’Heureux, climate scientist at the Climate Prediction Center, said in the press release, “Climate change can exacerbate or mitigate certain impacts related to El Niño. For example, El Niño could lead to new records for temperatures, particularly in areas that already experience above-average temperatures during El Niño.”

Before the heat arrives, California’s mild and cool spring is expected to continue at least until the end of June.

“An extended period of unusually cool conditions — a bizarre pattern — extends across the Northern Hemisphere,” said Daniel Swain, climate scientist in the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles. “The quite extreme conditions elsewhere greatly contrast with California’s relative mild and cooler conditions.

“[This] broad hemispherical anomaly that has been persistent for 30 to 40 days looks to continue through June,” he added.

line critical infrastructure projects. We urge the legislature to work with the Administration to adopt these proposals as part of this year’s State Budget process.”

They described Newsom’s package as critical and believe it would “... streamline permitting, cut red tape, reduce time-consuming litigation and make other changes that will take years off of the timeline of projects while saving taxpayers, state and local governments and businesses hundreds of millions of dollars.”

Separately, the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) announced its support. “ACWA applauds the Governor’s leadership in announcing actions aimed at streamlining the delivery of infrastructure projects — actions which will help ensure critical water infrastructure projects are built at the pace and scale needed to respond to the growing impacts of climate change,” said Dave Eggerton, ACWA executive director.

However, a few days earlier on May 31, a coalition of environmental groups sent an eight-page letter describing their specific concerns with the judicial streamlining and administrative record review trailer bills.

This letter had eight signatures, including the California Environmental Justice Alliance, Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice, and Physicians for Social Responsibility-Los Angeles.

The letter began with objections to using the budget process to address these policy issues. This is insufficient time, which prevents meaningful public debate, and it lacks transparency, they argued.

The first objection to expediting the judicial review process (limiting it to 270 days) was a concern that low-income and environmental justice (EJ) communities may lack the resources and time to act in the period. “Many residents of EJ communities face significant barriers to securing legal representation in the first place, and expedited timelines further challenges their legal right to pursue a claim.” And they argued that it was both unnecessary and impractical.

The comments about the preparation of the administrative record began with a more conciliatory language: “While some of the bill’s provisions appear to be reasonable and feasible for shortening legal timelines, we are concerned about the bill’s main provisions that create barriers for low-income and EJ communities from adhering to the profound changes.”

In his news conference, Newsom described one project that generated more than 290,000 pages of environmental documentation. He wants to reduce the time from planning to building, as the state did for two re-

cent sports stadiums in Sacramento and Inglewood.

But there were specific objections, such as allowing a government agency to assume the responsibility if the petitioner fails to complete a petition within 60 days or get an extension. The group also objected to narrowing the definition of an “internal agency communication.” This might limit transparency and diminish access for a vulnerable community.

The Public Policy Institute of California released its latest poll and found that last week, while a majority of state residents are pessimistic about the short-term economic future, “On the heels of the May budget revision, majorities of adults (55%) and likely voters (56%) continue to approve of the way Gavin Newsom is handling his job as governor.” While 80% of Democrats were in this category, 80% of Republicans felt the opposite.

However, the dependence of the Legislature to guide residents is weaker. “Californians are divided when it comes to the state legislature and their own state legislator, with about half approving and half disapproving of each. For both the legislature and their own legislator, about seven in ten Democrats approve, while majorities of Republicans and Independents disapprove.”

The governor’s press release estimates these proposals to modify the environmental laws could cut project timelines by more than three years, save businesses and state and local governments hundreds of millions of dollars and reduce paperwork by hundreds of thousands of pages.

Examples of the projects the governor hopes to accelerate include solar, wind, and battery storage projects; transit and regional rail construction, clean transportation, including maintenance and bridge projects; water storage projects funded by Proposition 1; the Delta Conveyance Project; semiconductor fabrication plants; and wildlife crossings along the I-15 corridor.

IWD reviews next year’s budget

At Saturday’s workshop, at which only one member of the public attended, the Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors reviewed the proposed budget for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which begins July 1. Approval of the budget is planned for the June 21 board meeting.

The total (water and sewer) proposed operations budget is \$2.4 million and total revenues (usage charges, fees and other revenue sources) are estimated to be \$3.3 million, yielding a project net savings of \$982,000.

However, General Manager Leo Havener and Director Steve Olson, of the IWD Finance Committee, proposed a capital improvement budget of \$1 million. So total expenditures will exceed the expected FY 2023-24 revenue by \$17,600.

This difference will be easily covered by an expected reserve balance of \$3 million. This is the third consecutive year IWD has begun the new FY with \$3 million in reserves. FY 2022-23 has an estimated net income of \$700,000 before capital costs of about \$800,000.

Water program

Total expenses in FY 2023-24 for the water operations are projected to be \$1.7 million, an increase of \$100,000 over current estimates for this year or about 5.8%. The FY 2022-23 budget approved last spring estimated the current year’s expenses would be about \$1.7 million, indicating about \$100,000 savings thus far.

The largest expenses are payroll and health insurance. For FY 2023-24, these two accounts will total \$921,000, an increase of nearly \$75,000 or 8.7%. However, current estimates for payroll and health insurance are about \$65,000 less than the budget projection last spring.

In spring 2022, the board approved a capital improvements plan totaling \$1.26 million for the water program. About half the total was expended through May. Nearly \$800,000 was assigned to the Strawberry Creek pipeline project. This year about half the funding was applied to pipeline replacement. \$500,000 in the FY 2023-24 proposed budget is for an environmental assessment work to continue this project, which is about two-thirds of the water capital improvement budget.

Havener did complete recoating Tank 2 at Foster Lake and proposed the recoating of Tank 3 for next year. Other possible projects for FY 2023-24 included digging a new well,

he told the board.

President Dr. Charles Schelly and his colleagues did ask that Havener include the costs associated with Riverside County’s repaving of North and South circle drives, which will affect IWD’s pipeline covers.

Sewer program

Expenses to operate the sewer program are estimated to be \$585,000 in FY 2023-24. This is an increase of \$106,000 over the FY 2022-23 approved budget and \$40,000 over the current estimate for FY 2022-23.

Similar to water, the largest portion of the budget is for payroll and health insurance. The project cost for FY 2023-24 is \$251,000 or about a third.

Employee costs are a lower percentage for the sewer program which has higher electric costs to run the plant, as well as basic expenses to keep the plant operating.

The sewer capital program for FY 2023-24 is only \$250,000 for a new generator and blower. While the plans for a new treatment plant are completed, work will begin in FY 2024-25, according to Havener.

The purchase of the additional land for the new plant should be completed before the June meeting, Havener said. The next step will be environmental studies and preparing an environmental assessment. Following that, a grant application will be prepared.

While discussing the sewer program, Schelly indicated his expectation that the proposed new rates would be approved and in effect on July 1. With the plan to construct a new treatment plant, he asked Havener to develop a separate plan to ensure that properties in the sewer district are being assessed fairly.

Schelly was concerned that some properties, which may have been single family units when the sewer district began operations, have become multiple family properties and the equivalent dwelling unit (EDU) fee for the property does not reflect this increased usage. He asked Havener to develop a plan for auditing the district’s EDUs.

Building maintenance

Before the budget workshop, the board held a special meeting to discuss the current status of the conditions of the district’s headquarters building.

At the May 17 regular board meeting, Havener told the board the contractor selected to do the refurbishment had recommended that the building be tested for asbestos first.

If it were present, its removal could significantly increase the work and costs.

At the June 10 meeting, Olson, also of the Building Committee, reported, “There is no asbestos.” He asked his colleagues to approve a request to fund remediation costs of \$35,000.

With remediation, the district will have knowledge of the building interior condition under the walls.

“We’ll get a new assessment,” Olson explained. “We’ll know how good or bad the building condition is and whether to rebuild without destruction or whether to raze the building.”

This was approved 3-0. Directors Peter Szabadi, Steve Kunkle and Olson voted “Yea.” Schelly was not present for this portion of the meeting.

Reserves

IWD estimates its total reserves (water and sewer) will decrease \$17,600 from the current projection of \$3 million by June 30, 2024. This amount, \$2.98 million, is 30% greater than the total (water and sewer) operating expenses for all of FY 2023-24.

In other words, IWD could collect no revenue for a year and still have about \$700,000 available for the next year. That’s equivalent to between three and four more months of no revenue.

Currently, Riverside County’s reserves policy is to maintain about 25% of discretionary income. That is about \$250 million, and it has about twice that amount for this and next fiscal year.

However, County Executive Jeffrey Van Wagenen is proposing to change the reserves goal to two months of operating expenses. In his message to the board of supervisors, he wrote, “The projected reserves balance of \$555 million is below the new Government Finance Officers of America Best Practices of maintaining no less than the equivalent of two months of regular General Fund operating expenditures. This new policy will be established after the adoption of FY 2023/24 budget.”

Estimating the county’s operating expenses at about \$6 billion, the new reserve goal will be about \$1.2 billion. Two months of operating expenses (water and sewer) for IWD would be about \$400,000.

However, the planned water treatment plant costs are expected to exceed reserves unless IWD is able to obtain grant money to help reduce its costs.

We need a new sewer system

DEAR EDITOR:

We are all concerned with the ever-increasing cost of living, especially here in Idyllwild, but we also understand that we must spend money to make our town safe and thriving. Everyone agrees that our more than 65-year-old sewer needs to be replaced. It has long exceeded its normal useful life; it has been kept in operation by constantly needed repairs. We cannot live in the shadow of its possible failure which would mean a disaster for much of the economic life of our village.

The opposition recognizes the need and that the cost of replacement is likely to exceed \$6 million but claims that the Idyllwild Water District (IWD) has failed to pursue a grant to cover the expense. The opposition does not understand the process of obtaining grants. Of course, IWD will be applying for grants. Grant applications require a complete set of plans, acquisition of land and ecological clearance (CEQA). We have been engaged in this process for the last two



years. First, IWD obtained a grant for \$125,000 to study the present system and to choose the appropriate replacement facility. The district has spent \$260,000 on engineering and is presently engaged to acquire additional land from Idyllwild Arts for the new plant. Grant applications for funding, whether gifts or loans at reduced interest rates, can only be pursued when these initial steps are completed. (Grants usually cover only 50% of the costs.)

The district has retained the services of experts to file for grants with water agencies and state and federal governments. Grant applications are a very time-consuming process; it may take as much as a year to get a response or approval. The sewer district has built up reserves of almost \$2,000,000 to cover the anticipated construction expenses.

At this time, one must assume there is a real possibility that the construction costs will have to be covered by a government underwritten loan payable over 30 years. This is the basis of the proposed rate increase. Should the district receive any grant that will reduce our overall costs, of course an appropriate reduction of the rate will be considered in line with the board's obligation to serve our community.

The choice is obvious given our needs.

The raw “input” is sampled in a refrigerated closet adjacent to the headworks. The refrigeration ensures that the sample reflects the condition of the waste entering the system, before the plant's micro-organisms have gone to work. Samples are regularly tested in the district's own on-site lab and records kept. Samples from various points in the process also go to the Santa Ana Regional Water Quality Control Board.

“Sometimes we get violations. This place is old,” said Campbell. The regulating agencies can “force rapid repairs,” and getting things fixed quickly is always more expensive, he said.

The wastewater is split. Depending on flow, some may go into a holding, or “equalization” basin. The rest goes on to secondary treatment. At night, when flow goes down, the equalization basin keeps the secondary treatment running.

The main component of the system is secondary treatment, a circular tank with three sections; 33,000 gallon anoxic (no dissolved oxygen), 88,000 gallon aerobic, and 40,000 gallon settling or clarifying areas. Here, biodegradable organic material is digested by microbes. The water in the first section is opaque and muddy looking, by the third it begins to resemble pond water.

Water is recirculated between the three sections by pumps, so the water will have passed through the sections several times before leaving secondary treatment. The tank has a skimmer on the surface and a scraper on the bottom to remove scum and sludge. A pair of powerful air pumps, located next to the office and lab, pump air through a huge hose to aerate the aerobic tank. Here a visitor notes one of the most visible workarounds in the present plant: the old underground pipe is hopelessly corroded, and now an immense black hose snakes across the office stairs (watch your step) and the asphalt yard, to the tank.

Around the plant are various control panels no longer being used because they are no longer compatible with newer equipment. Sophisticated-looking 1960s-era control panels sit unused, replaced by what looks like home sprinkler timers. A desktop computer in the lab runs an old Supervisory Control And Data Acquisition system. It still monitors input and output, and does connect to cell phones to inform staff of anomalies, but is “no longer real time,” as there is a five-minute delay, making it useless for fine adjustments.

A generator exists for backup with an automatic system to bring it online in the event of a power outage. The system is biological and has to be kept alive.

In the main pump room sit two large pumps that move the mass of water through the plant. One is idle — a dropped tool disabled it and repairing it will require demolition. The problem lies beneath 6 feet of concrete. Temporary plumbing keeps the system going. The pump room also contains chlorine. Campbell said, “We don't typically add a lot of chemicals.” The process is mostly the work of microbes and the chlorine just slows them down when needed.

MATTER OF FACT

In last week's story on Idyllwild Water District (IWD), we reported that money had been returned to the state when an earlier attempt by IWD to replace the wastewater plant failed. The money that was returned was to study the possibility of returning treated water to the aquifer around Foster Lake.

Broadcast burning on the San Jacinto Ranger District

The U.S. Forest Service (USFS), San Bernardino National Forest, San Jacinto Ranger District has planned a prescribed firing operation for about 2,500 acres on Thomas Mountain, west of Garner Valley and southeast of Idyllwild and Mountain Center. This operation will occur Thursday, June 15 to Thursday, June 22.

According to the USFS, this project, as with many other fuels treatment projects, undergoes extensive analysis to best determine the proper treatment methods that will best benefit the landscape to meet the purpose and need of the treatment. In this case, multiple treatment types have been used to prepare the area for broadcast burning. This includes hand thinning and piling of vegetation followed by the burning of piles, mastication, tree/oak limbing and thinning, and removing fuels on the perimeter of the planned broadcast burn. Once the areas of thickest vegetation are either removed or thinned, broadcast burning is used to remove the understory of the timber canopy and/or areas of thick and decadent brush. This allows new and healthy vegetation to grow and prosper, enhancing the resiliency of the landscape.

More than 100 USFS firefighters and partner agencies will be involved in active ignitions, which will last for five to seven days. These ignitions will be carried out through ground-based and helicopter aerial operations. After the active ignitions, several days will be dedicated to mop-up, securement and patrolling, as needed.

During these operations certain areas will be temporarily closed to the public: Forest Road 5S13, Tool Box Springs Yellow Post Sites, Thomas Mountain Yellow Post Sites and the Ramona Trail. These closures are implemented for the safety of both the public and firefighters involved in the operations.

Broadcast burning can be beneficial for protecting and enhancing habitat and foraging areas of multiple species of wildlife by removing invasive species and promoting the growth of native vegetation. It also can help reduce the risk of severe wildfires by reducing the buildup of forest fuels, and improving the health and resilience of the ecosystem by reintroducing fire to the landscape at a planned interval.

During broadcast burning, fire is spread across the landscape in a controlled manner, typically using specialized equipment such as drip torches or aerial ignition devices. These fires are closely monitored to ensure they remain within the designated area and do not spread beyond control.

Prescribed fire plays an important role in forest health and in reducing extreme wildfires and their negative impact, according to the USFS. These fires also help reduce heavy fuel loads while simultaneously opening the conifer forest structure and maintaining the health of meadow habitats. Fire also is used to enhance native plant communities and cultural landscapes and wildlife habitats. Another goal is to provide defensible space for communities and developed areas within and surrounding the San Bernardino National Forest.

With all fire comes smoke, and the USFS works to mitigate smoke impacts from prescribed fires on the communities in the area. While smoke may be visible in the area during the prescribed fire operation, individuals with respiratory issues or sensitive conditions should take precautions to avoid exposure to smoke. The San Bernardino Nation Forest will provide updates and information about the prescribed fire operation to the public as needed. 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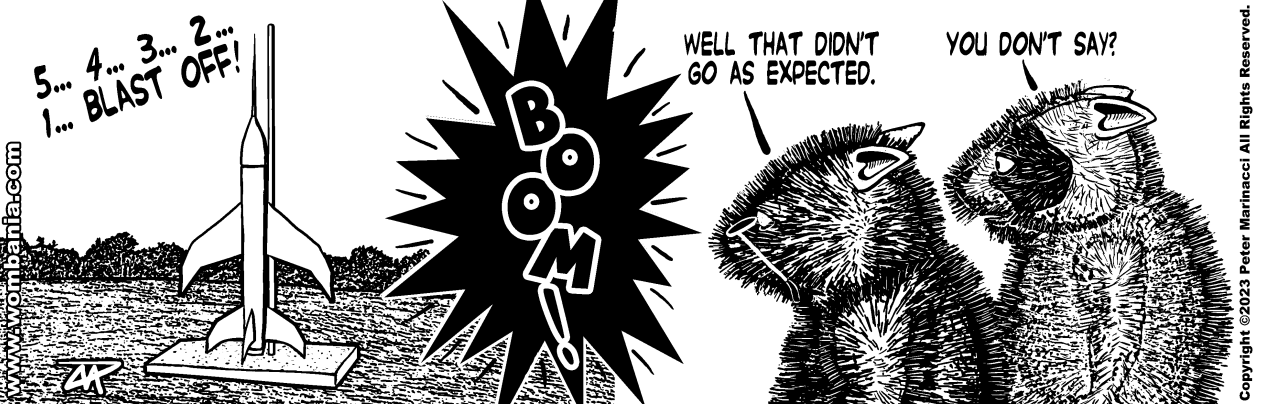

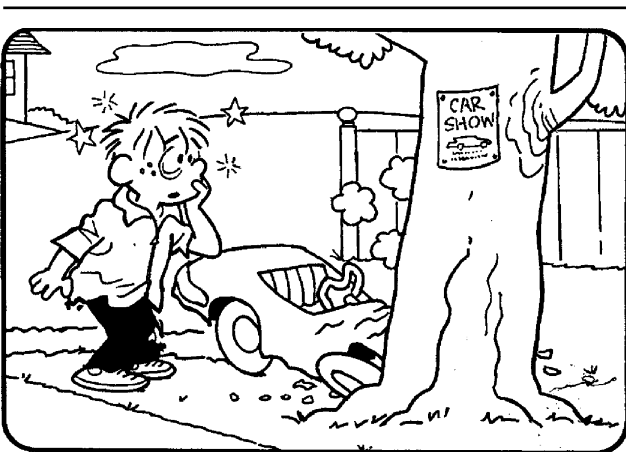

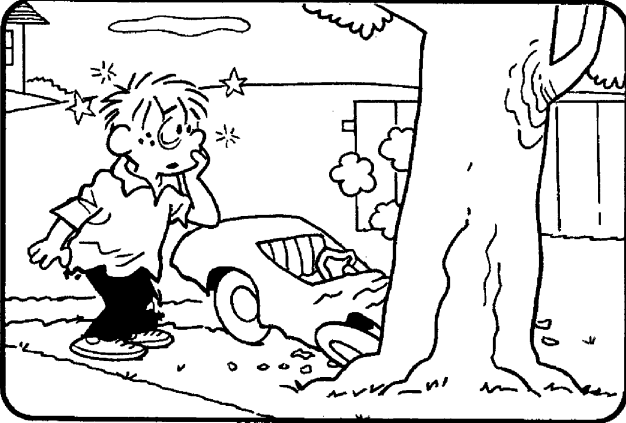

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IWD cannot choose a director; up to Perez now

Idyllwild Water District (IWD) directors reached an impasse Wednesday night, June 7, when the four were divided on two candidates to replace Director Gene Schneider who resigned April 5.

The candidates — R. Mitch Davis and Jessica Priefer — both have extensive water utility backgrounds. Davis retired as an operator with the Yuima Municipal Water District in Pauma Valley where he worked with imported, ground and surface water.

He has American Water Works Association certificates in cross-connection control program specialist, water quality laboratory analyst and water use efficiency practitioner. He is California licensed as a grade 4 water treatment operator and as a grade 3 water distribution operator. He has a degree in

water technology programs.

He and his wife have lived in Idyllwild since 2010.

Priefer is the assistant general manager of Fern Valley Water District (FVWD). She has worked for FVWD for 17 years and at Ferrellgas for 10 years before that.

She grew up in Idyllwild and has raised her two children here. She has been an IWD water (not sewer) customer for more than 20 years.

In her letter to the board, she said she had not pursued running for the board in the past out of concerns for a conflict of interest between the districts but she conferred with Best, Best and Krieger, IWD's attorney, and was assured that no conflict would exist because the two districts do not overlap.

At the meeting, Davis said he has attended three IWD meetings, is retired and wants to help the community.

Priefer was not at the meeting but on vacation. However,

President Charles Schelly reached her by cellphone.

Attorney Ryan Guiboa again reassured the board that if any overlapping occurred, she could recuse herself.

After much questioning of her and none of Davis, the board voted. On the appointment of Davis, the board voted 2-1-1 with Vice President Peter Szabadi and Steve Kunkle in favor, Steve Olson not in favor and Schelly abstaining. On the appointment of Priefer, the board was an equal 2-2 vote with Olson and Schelly in favor.

Schelly allowed for a five-minute recess to see if two of the directors could discuss and try to change minds but the vote following the break came back the same.

IWD has now sent a letter to Riverside County 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez recommending both candidates and asking him to appoint a new director. He has 30 days to decide.

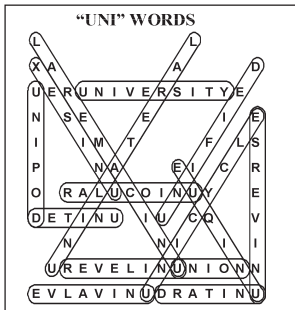

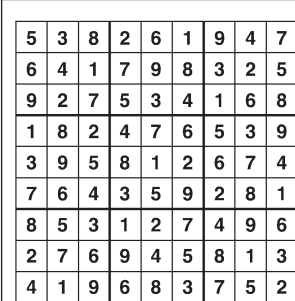

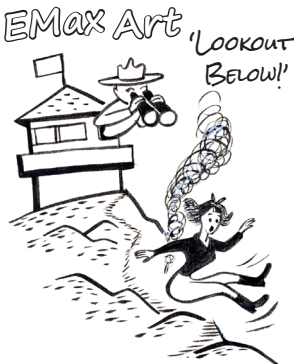

The intention of the project is to enable community and foster interpersonal relationships. Winks lead a series of community mental health workshops last summer as part of Idyllwild Forest Health Project’s continued engagement with Idyllwild’s environmental and social well-being.

Many people come to Idyllwild for the sense of community, meeting neighbors instead of strangers everywhere they go. The pandemic strained many connections, and many local organizations are experiencing “aging out,” as older members pass away or become less active and a new generation is needed to take up the torch. The events, and Idyllwild Love, aim to help anyone wishing for more involvement with their fellows to find out what the town has to offer.

Winks directs attention to the Harvard Adult Development Study, a longitudinal study started in the 1930s, showing that the quality of our relationships with other people is the key to a long and healthy life. The study’s current directors have published their findings in a book, “The Good Life: Lessons from the World’s Longest Scientific Study of Happiness.”

The aim of Idyllwild Love is to introduce more Idyllwilders to two types of organizations: recreational common interest groups and volunteer-driven community service groups. The group considered various sectors of its “target” audience, including elders, youth, newcomers, families with children and new businesses. The project is still in the idea phase, and Winks heard many suggestions, including an Idyllwild Welcome Wagon, separate sections or days for different groups, free food, moving the event to IdyPark, a series of “TED-type” talks, “IDY talks.” Those with long experience organizing local events shared practical concerns about organization and communication.

Afterward, Winks wrote, “The intended focus is to recognize that the coming together is the gold we want to mine. It’s camaraderie and relationships that Idyllwild offers in great abundance ... (T)his is the key that opens the door to a lifetime of well-being. And you have to join in to benefit from it. The next step is to talk with more recent transplants to find out what would be most helpful to them in a community meeting.”

The Idyllwild Garden Club held its annual Wildflower Show at Town Hall.

An Idyllwild fire truck led Hill residents on the first leg of the annual Bike-A-Thon the Soroptimist International of Idyllwild sponsored.

35 years ago - 1988
The largest framed building on the Hill, the 16,000-square-foot Husch Hall dormitory, was dedicated on the campus of Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts.

30 years ago - 1993
Youngsters on the

Hill were looking forward to having a real kick at camp. The All-England Soccer Academy would have two camps to teach soccer technique, style and rules. Coach Andy Thomas had applied for the position in England.

25 years ago - 1998
Lake Fulmor got stocked with 400 pounds of trout and a ton of truck by Brad Willis, a California Fish and Game employee. When delivering the trout, he got out of his truck, engaged the parking brake and put a block behind the front tire. But the truck began to roll and ended up 15 feet below the surface of the lake. The truck was a total loss, but an angler said the fishing was great.

ran the shop. After 27 years of teaching, he and I ran the shop together.

TC: You and your dad got along pretty well?
DH: Wonderful. It was really nice being able to work together until he passed away last year. (At 92, February 2022.) We were on the forefront of the mountain bike craze, starting in 1978.

TC: Dad was a bike enthusiast?
DH: Yes.
Hunt took me behind the counter, where dozens of Bud's race numbers hang on the wall, and pointed out his medals in front.. "He raced the 'Masters' category (an age group) and participated in the Fireman's Olympics."

TC: You built bikes, too?
DH: I became a custom frame builder. Idyllwild Framesets was the business. I made about 50 custom frame sets. We have a mountain bike museum; everything we did around '77 to '88. Examples from each year. A lot of BMX when we first opened up.

TC: You do welding?
DH: And brazing. I have a bachelor's degree in Industrial Arts from Humboldt State, emphasis in metals. I got to be trained by three of the most famous frame builders in the U.S. One was Albert Eisentraut in Oakland, Brian Bayliss in San Marcos ... Gary Helfrich. He taught me titanium welding in Oregon.

TC: Titanium? It's light and strong, right?
DH: All of my bikes were steel or titanium. They both have a "lively" feel. Carbon fiber and aluminum have a "dead" feeling.

TC: Did you began your studies in pursuit of being a bike designer?

DH: I was a forestry major originally, growing up in Idyllwild. Most of the forestry majors were lumberjack tree cutters. I decided I didn't want to do that. I took a year off, and Don Neal, from the Strawberry Bicycle Shop in Hemet, suggested industrial arts.

TC: You worked with the frame makers as an apprentice?
DH: Only a couple weeks each, but it was apprentice-like training.

TC: Was it your dad that got you interested in bikes?
DH: I got him started on bikes, actually. I like to say that he inherited it from me.

TC: You must make a lot of friends here at the shop.
DH: It was so fun watching my dad visit with people. People would come by just to visit, not even bring their bike in for repairs, just visit with Bud. He had a lot of stories. Mom was born and raised up here, he came up around '54. We called them the oracles; if you ever had a question about Idyllwild, you'd ask them.

TC: Your folk both passed away last year?

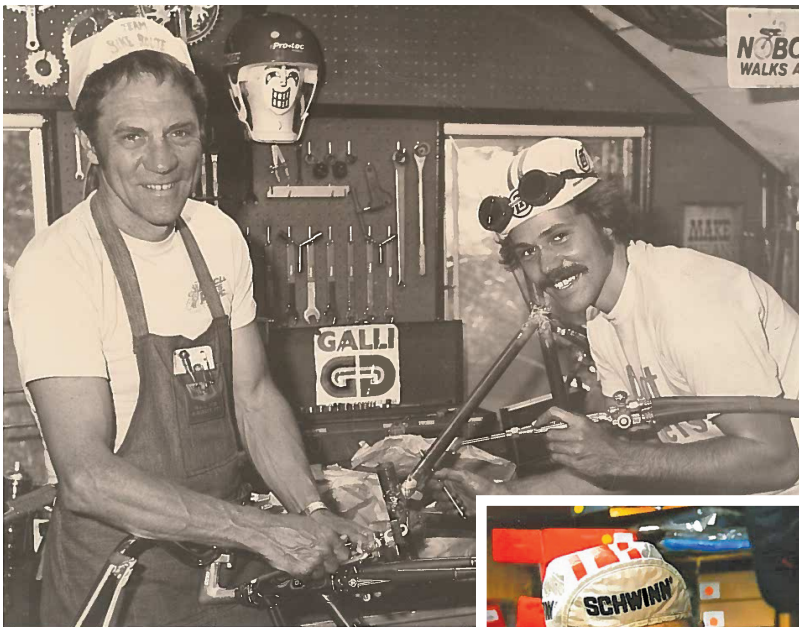
DH: Mom passed away a few months after Dad. Both at home, with family around. The way to go.

Hunt also mentioned his time in Kinetic Sculpture Racing. These are wild contraptions recalling monsters, school buses, the yellow submarine or a carnival side show that are judged on artistic value as well as speed.

DH: While at Humboldt State, I built kinetic sculptures for the World Champion Kinetic Sculpture race, a human-powered, three-day, all-terrain race.

TC: All terrain?
DH: Water, sand, asphalt, mud. Multi-person vehicles ... five-person one year, four once, one year as an individual. The last year, wife Kris, and Mom and Dad, and my aunt and uncle were my pit crew. They won the award for best pit crew.

While visiting Dave in the shop, folk stopped by with and

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without their bikes.

A couple stopped in. They came to town to get Hunt's help restoring an old Schwinn. She bought it brand-new in 1960 in Hemet. A member of the Sexy Generians racing team stopped by. The team used to participate in the "24 Hours of Adrenalin" race that was staged at various locations in North America, including a local course through Garner Valley, from Hurkey Creek to Thomas Mountain. Relay teams competed to see who could complete the most circuits of the circa 10-mile loop, how far can you go in 24 hours. At the Bike Route, they find everything from complete restoration to advice on changing a tire. They usually find what they need. "We try to keep one of everything," and Hunt is "faster than Ebay."

The crowded shop shades into collection territory. "We like to ride our Schwinn tandems in the 4th of July parade, so see you there. We have about 10 tandems, we like to find couples that can join us." Hunt only sells used bikes now, and recycles what he can't repair. "People trade them in or just give them to me. I can't throw them away, I don't have it in me. My dad didn't like to throw things away either. We used to take bikes to an orphanage in Mexico. We need a new charity. To a lot of people in the world, a bike is like a car is here ..."

TC: Essential transport?

DH: Yes.

Having completed 50 years at the Bike Route, Hunt is "planning 50 more." The Bike Route is at 54095 Pine Crest Avenue. These days he is there from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday to Thursday.
