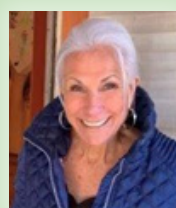

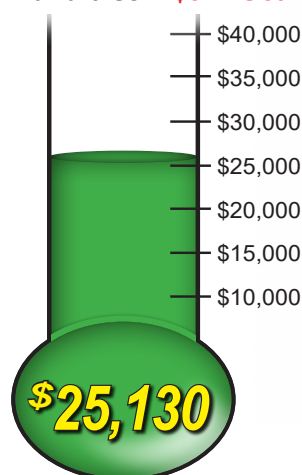

Idyllwild resident Dena Van Slyke dies in crash

Many in Idyllwild are grieving as they learn the news that a car crash in Escondido on the evening of Saturday, June 24, claimed the life of Idyllwild resident Dena Van Slyke. Her husband Lee Van Slyke was seriously injured and transported to a hospital in Escondido where he is expected to recover. According to the California Highway Patrol (CHP), three cars were involved in the crash at about 5:45 Saturday evening on Interstate 15 near Old Highway 395.

Another injured person was a 28-year-old Hemet resident. There is no further information on this individual. The CHP representative could not confirm how the crash occurred but did say that one driver was arrested on suspicion of driving under the influence.

Dena and Lee shared their time between Idyllwild and San Clemente. Both have been involved in various organizations on the Hill, including the Associates of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation (IAF) and Idyllwild Arts.

Through these organizations, they met the founders of the Karimu Foundation in Tanzania. Their journey with Idyllwild Arts began as a Foundation Council member; they attended events and performances often bringing Dena's mother Madgel Friedman. As an Associate, Dena met Julie Roy and learned of the International Writing Club that meets daily via Zoom.

"Dena loved attending events at the school," said IAF President Pamela Jordan. "Her true passion was theater and she and Lee often attended theatrical productions. She also loved taking songwriting workshops in the summer and always looked forward to the final performance. Dena's infectious smile, her passion for life and her warm heart for our students will be remembered forever."

Through the Foundation Council, they were introduced to the Associates. All three became members: Dena, Lee and Madgel. Dena and Lee's support began immediately by attending meetings, sponsoring events, supporting the auctions and always bringing fresh, new ideas. Madgel was not able to attend as many meetings and events but she would often be on the Hill so the Associates and Idyllwild Arts could join in her birthday celebration.

As an Associate, Dena was introduced to the Theatre and Film and Digital Media chairs; she used these connections to honor her late father Arthur Friedman, UCLA Professor Emeritus. Dena, with the support of the International Writing Club, had nearly completed a book on the life of her father.

"When someone shares their passion with you, which instantly resonates at the deepest level, you know you have a lifelong friend," said Roy. "That's the way I met Dena on July 10, 2022, at an Associates

County STR small group meetings in limbo

STR Ordinance change on horizon

Revisions to the Riverside County's Short-term Rental (STR) Ordinance (927.1) are likely to go before both the Planning Commission and the board of supervisors in late summer or early fall, according to Felisa Cardona, public information officer for the county's Transportation and Land Management Agency, which includes the Planning Department.

Sept. 9, when the current moratorium on new STR certificates for the Hill and the Wine Country expires, would be a tentative deadline for approval of changes to 927.1.

In March, the Planning Department organized two groups of residents and STR owners from Idyllwild and the Wine Country to discuss their particular issues about STR regulation.

The last meeting of the Idyllwild STR working group was in May. A mid-June meeting had to be canceled and a follow-up has not been scheduled. Thus far, about seven working group meetings have occurred as well as two open Town Hall sessions specifically dedicated to STR issues and concerns. While there may be one more Idyllwild STR meeting, a date has not been set, according to Cardona.

Meanwhile, several of the members have recommended the county set a limit of 400 STRs in the Idyllwild and Pine Cove area. They estimate this would be about 12% of the housing units on the Hill.

Also, they would like to see a minimum distance of 200 feet between STRs. Mark Dean, a working group member and president of the Pine Cove Property Owners Association, is a proponent of this limitation since he shares a property line with five other houses, three of which are often STRs.

"With owner grandfathering, their [certificate] is protected until the ownership changes. This may not result in reductions [in the number of STRs] and resident quality of life improvements for years, and for some decades," wrote Woody Henderson, a member of the working group.

According to Henderson and Dean, Oxnard has implemented very similar limitations in its city code ordinance.

"I talked to these people and they have got it all figured out. It is not a big deal," Dean said.

"I think it is clearly working," said Bryan MacDonald, an Oxnard Council member and mayor pro temp. "There were people not pleased with the decision. But we wanted to be respectful of privacy of property and balance the interest of both sides and we wanted to avoid lengthy litigation."

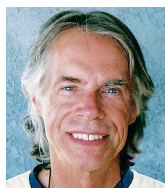
Jon Brown, another member of the working group, feels much of the urgency and concern with STRs on the Hill has diminished with the passing of the COVID limitations. "It isn't a current problem," he stated. "The number of complaints has dropped."

With respect to the cap on the number of STRs, he argues that would be unfair to future homebuyers. Anyone with a current and active STR certification will be able to keep it. Consequently, Brown believes it may be a decade or longer before a new certificate could be issued for a Hill STR.

In his opinion, this limitation will reduce house sales since anyone who may be interested in buying on the Hill and might want to use the home occasionally as an STR to help finance it, will be unable to secure an STR certificate for years.

Regardless of the outcome of potential changes to the STR Ordinance, the county is planning to establish stronger enforcement of the ordinance. The recently approved Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget provides new funds for both the Sheriff's Department and Code Enforcement to establish dedicated staff to its enforcement.

Board approves FY 2023-24 budget — no deficit

Last week, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors unanimously (5-0) approved the budget for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which began July 1.

The total budget, including local taxes and state and federal funds, is \$8.6 billion, an increase of 15.1%. Half the overall budget goes to two areas — \$2.5 billion (or 28.7%) for the Riverside University Health System Health and Hospital Services portfolio and \$2 billion (22.9%) for the public safety portfolio. Another 20% funds human services programs.

The county's discretionary budget, which totals about \$1.2 billion, is structurally balanced, County Executive Jeff Van Wagenen said in his submission to the board. Reserves at the end of FY 2023-24 are anticipated to be about \$555 million.

At the last board meeting on June 13, the board added about \$25 million to the proposed budget from the Augmentation Fund that Van Wagenen had established for this purpose. Most of this added funding was for public safety programs.

Important for the Idyllwild area and the Wine Country, \$1.5 million for enforcement of the county's Short-term Rental (STR) Ordinance (927) was included in the total. These funds will create a special enforcement team of sheriff's deputies and add 10 positions to Code Enforcement.

In a separate action at the same meeting, 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez had the board approve allocation of his share of the Unincorporated Communities Initiative funding. Of the \$2 million available to Perez, he recommended \$350,000 for equipment and capital purchases needed for the Code Enforcement's STR team.

In his request to his colleagues, Perez wrote, "The County of Riverside Code Enforcement Department is establishing a dedicated Short-Term Rental (STR) team to address the increasing number of Short-Term Rentals countywide. The provided funding will assist in the formation of the STR Team by assisting in the funding of equipment and capital needs."

According to Darin Schemmer, Perez's communication director, Bob Magee, director of Code Enforcement, said, "Code Enforcement is grateful for the support and confidence Supervisor Perez and the entire Board has shown by their recent Budget actions. We will work quickly to fully staff, train, deploy and equip the new Short Term Rental Team. The funding for equipment will go to: new vehicles, desk top computers, radios, cell phones, tablets, printers and scanners."

During the discussion of the budget, 2nd District Supervisor Karen Spiegel expressed concern that the county may not be able to obtain grants if some expenses or costs are needed before qualification or upfront.

"One of my concerns, which could be long-term, is our ability for grants and capital funding that need to be spent before we are reimbursed?" she asked.

Van Wagenen agreed and replied that county staff is already exploring the possibility of a revolving loan or simply setting aside money for that purpose. He used the parks department as an example where a low credit loan could be used to obtain the funds for the initial work that would be recovered in the final grant allocation.

In his summary of the budget for the new fiscal year, Van Wagenen wrote, "This budget makes good on our promise to improve the quality of life for those who live, work, and enjoy life in Riverside County. We are investing in the well-being of our residents. We are transforming the way we deliver services, making them more efficient, accessible, and responsive to the diverse needs of our community. We are seeking systemic equity, recognizing that where you live should not determine how well or how long you live and believing that everyone deserves equal opportunities to thrive. We are working to be ready for, respond to, and recover from the unexpected. And, we are striving to achieve fiscal stability."

IWD in turmoil over filling seat

The Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors did not vote last Friday night to hold a special election in November to fill the seat Gene Schneider vacated in April this year.

In a June 7 meeting, the four remaining directors were split on two candidates, R. Mitch Davis and Jessica Priefer.

Because of this, IWD sent a letter to Riverside County 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez asking him to choose. It would then go before the board of supervisors for a final decision. The supervisors would have 30 days to decide.

Instead, the supervisors sent it to the registrar of voters for a special election in November or March 2024. This required a resolution from IWD. But the resolution failed Friday because of lack of a second to the motion to approve it.

The four directors, Dr. Charles Schelly, Peter Szabadi, Steve Kunkle and Steve Olson, will have to decide at the next meeting whether to have a special election in March 2024.

Dena and Lee supported the Associates whenever there was a need. After the passing of Dena’s mother, Madgel, a substantial gift was made in her honor supporting the Scholarship Fund of Idyllwild Arts. Lee became the recording secretary of the Associates. Even when traveling, Lee would make the effort to attend the Associates’ meeting via Zoom. Being fans of music and the arts, they began the tradition of being the musical sponsor of our events.

I saw that Dena brought joy and life to all in the Associates. Her presence would light up the room with lively conversation and intuitive questions. She always knew the Associates mission and worked hard to fulfill that vision. Dena will be missed; our meetings and events will lack her generous heart.

Dena and Lee became more engaged in Idyllwild Arts. They attended many productions, especially film and theater, throughout the Academy year. Less than a year ago, Lee became a member of the Idyllwild Arts Foundation Board of Trustees bringing his financial expertise to the Board and Finance Committee. Idyllwild Arts looks forward to Lee’s return to the board of trustees when the time is right.

“While Lee joined our board of trustees only a year ago, he and Dena have been connected to Idyllwild Arts for many years,” said Jeffrey Dvorak, trustees chair. “They shared a passion for so many things, including arts and education. 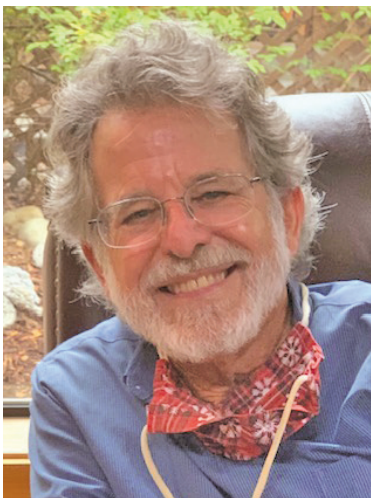

Michael “Mickey” McLane, a longtime friend of the Van Slykes said they are “contributors” to society. The Van Slykes not only contributed with their money, but with their hearts.

Dena and Lee were members of the Center for Spiritual Living, Capistrano Valley. “Beyond her creativity and endless ideas, I will miss her tender and generous heart,” said Rev. Alice Reid.

STRs threaten our safety

DEAR EDITOR:

I was very happy to read the article about “IFPD workshop on Mutual Aid and fire prevention,” in the May 25 issue of the Town Crier. It’s tempting to say that no one appreciates the fire departments more than I do, after being here for 50 years and experiencing all kinds of fires, including some that required evacuation.

Years ago I made a sign for the rear window of my car that says “I Love Firefighters.” Still, I know better than to say that because I know there are many people up here who have the same appreciation and gratitude for our fire personnel, first responders, volunteers, emergency crews, etc.

I was also pleased to see that local agencies are looking at the Paradise Fire where more than 80 people died while trying to evacuate. One thing that caused so much destruction in that fire was strong wind that drove the flames faster and farther than normal.

That leads me to my concern that, even though the



past three fires up here that required evacuation went smoothly, there was no element of wind to deal with. We can get Santa Ana winds and strong winds coming out of the north, as well.

Also, those three fires happened before the advent of 500 short-term rentals (STRs) in this area. If each of these STRs has three cars for their renters, that means there are 1,500 more cars that have to be evacuated. There could be as many as 4,000 or more people having to evacuate on a busy weekend or holiday, counting locals, STRs, day visitors, campers, hikers and people staying in hotels and motels.

In the Cranston and Mountain fires, Highway 74 was closed, so everyone had to evacuate on Highway 243, a road with only one lane in each direction.

I have the utmost faith in our fire departments up here, but allowing more STRs will only make this area more prone to fire hazards, and potential evacuation problems that could create dangerous situations for locals and visitors alike.

Ultimately, STRs are negatively impacting our once safe and peaceful mountain communities, and they endanger all of us by overwhelming the limited carrying-capacity of this area.

Monitoring reports to be improved for forest

The San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) proposes to update its land management plan monitoring program by making reports more concise and easier to read. The change would continue to satisfy requirements of the Southern California National Forests Land Management Plan (LMP).

Public input is requested and comments about this administrative change will be accepted up to 30 days from June 29. Comments can be emailed to Evan Surek, a SBNF National Environmental Policy Act planner, at evan.surek@usda.gov with the subject line “San Bernardino NF Monitoring.”

The 2006 Forest Plan monitoring program informs forest management of resources on the plan area, including by testing relevant assumptions, tracking relevant changes, and measuring management effectiveness and progress toward achieving or maintaining the plan’s desired conditions, goals and objectives. The monitoring reports indicate whether a change to the plan, management activities or the monitoring program, or a new assessment, may be warranted based on the new information. The program was updated in 2016 to conform to new direction from the U.S. Forest Service 2012 Planning Rule.

The reports can be found on the forest website under “Monitoring Reports” at www.fs.usda.gov/main/sbnf/landmanagement/planning.

The update would narrow the scope of the biennial reporting to include only questions that make up part one, which fulfills eight monitoring requirements of the 2012 Planning Rule, plus social, economic and cultural sustainability through a series of 20 questions. The proposal would eliminate parts two and three from the LMP monitoring program and take effect beginning with the recently published 2019-20 biennial report, while eliminating parts two and three from all future monitoring reports.

Changes to the monitoring program, excluding plan revision or amendment, can be accomplished through the administrative process. Altering a question or an indicator is considered a substantive modification to the monitoring program and may be made after notification to the public and consideration of comments.

Governor gains budget and permitting change agreement

Last week, California’s Legislature and governor agreed on a budget for the new fiscal year and fast tracking the bills for reform of the permitting process for major projects construction. These steps were achieved because they agreed to a compromise that removed the Delta Water Tunnel, which is under the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta, from Gov. Gavin Newsom’s package of 11 bills.

FY 2023-24 budget

The approved budget for the new fiscal year (FY), which began Saturday, July 1, totals \$310.8 billion. It funds most priorities and sets aside \$37 million for reserves. Overall, school districts are likely to see an 8.2% increase from state funding.

Both the governor and Legislative leaders were pleased with the budget agreements, especially since the initial proposal would have a \$31.5 billion deficit. This was avoided by \$16 billion in funding delays as well as cuts in some programs.

“We’ve attached new accountability measures for transit and homelessness investments,” Newsom said in his press release. “And we are accelerating our global leadership on climate by fast-tracking the clean energy projects that will create cleaner air for generations to come.”

And Senate President Pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) added, “The final budget we passed today is fiscally responsible, protects our reserves, and avoids cuts to core programs — all without increasing taxes on the middle class. This is exactly what we meant when we said we wanted to ‘protect the progress’ California has made in recent years.”

“This is a budget for the future,” said Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood). “The Assembly has consistently fought for early childhood education and I’m proud that this budget includes up to \$2.83 billion in one-time funds for child care reimbursement increases, all while protecting budget reserves of \$37.8 billion.”

But that potential deficit looms over future budgets, according to the Legislative Analyst’s Office and the Republican leadership.

Republican Senator Roger Niello (R-Fair Oaks), vice chair of the Senate Budget Committee, offered this opinion in June immediately after the initial budget approval. “It is disappointing to see my Democratic colleagues pass a budget that over-

spends. This budget relies on unrealistic revenue assumptions and will lead to multi-year deficits.

“Passing this budget meets the state deadline, but it is nothing more than a shell game that fails to meet the needs of taxpayers. I fear this placeholder budget largely ignores the economic uncertainty that will negatively impact Californians in the future and put us in an even deeper financial hole.”

Legislation

In addition to the funds to operate the state this year, Newsom signed an Executive Order and proposed 11 trailer bills to accompany the Legislature’s FY 2023-24 budget.

The governor’s package is intended to streamline and to improve the overall permitting process, thus accelerating construction. The entire package would make various changes to California laws for certain projects in order to reduce delays and project costs. This includes expediting the time for judicial review of environmental cases for certain projects and addressing California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) processes such as cumbersome procedures around document retention and review. While these “trailer” bills have not yet been passed, hearings have been held and passage is expected this week.

Among the bills are ones to expedite judicial review of environmental litigation and to streamline the creation of an administrative record for the project.

Senate Bill 149 addresses the expedited judicial review proposal. The Senate Select Committee on Infrastructure held a hearing last week and released a report on the proposed changes.

“SB 149 makes a broad swath of energy, transportation, water, and semiconductor projects eligible for expedited judicial review under the California Environmental Quality Act ... To be eligible for streamlining, projects would need to be certified by the governor by Jan 1, 2032 and approved by the public agency by Jan 1, 2033 ... The streamlining provisions for certified projects include a 270-day judicial review period for a CEQA case, including all appeals, as feasible, and a requirement that public agencies concurrently prepare the record of proceedings and the administrative process,” according to the state Senate’s report.

There also will be bills authorizing more wildlife crossing under and over highways and to change the state’s ability to contract for portions of the construction work.

Assembly Bill 146 extends the “existing authorization for the California Secretary of Transportation to assume the responsibilities under the National Environmental Protection Act [NEPA] of 1969 for railroad, public transportation or multimodal projects by extending the January 1, 2025 sunset to December 31, 2033 and expands the authorization to include local projects.”

The authority that allows the state to assume responsibility to enforce NEPA rather than the federal government for road projects began nearly 15 years ago. The results demonstrate a quickened environmental review process. The authority for rail and public transit projects started in 2017 as a pilot program that has been extended twice, in 2020 and 2021. It currently expires in 2025.

Examples of the projects the governor hopes to accelerate include solar, wind and battery storage projects; transit and regional rail construction; clean transportation, including maintenance and bridge projects; water storage projects funded by Proposition 1; the Delta Conveyance Project; semiconductor fabrication plants; and wildlife crossings along the I-15 corridor.

While there was plenty of vocal concern about the time available to review Newsom’s legislative package, the final agreement did receive support from the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC).

“The Legislature significantly strengthened the proposed trailer bills in order to better protect communities and the environment,” said Victoria Rome, California director of government affairs at NRDC. “Despite being forced into the truncated budget process, legislative leadership upheld core environmental protections and included the public in the process of creating a pathway to accelerating our clean energy future.”

“The updated trailer bills will ensure needed protections for communities and biodiversity, even as we build out the desperately needed clean energy infrastructure necessary to address the climate and biodiversity crisis,” she concluded. Rome felt that protection for important endangered species such as California condors, sea otters, sandhill cranes and other fully protected species will continue without diminishment.

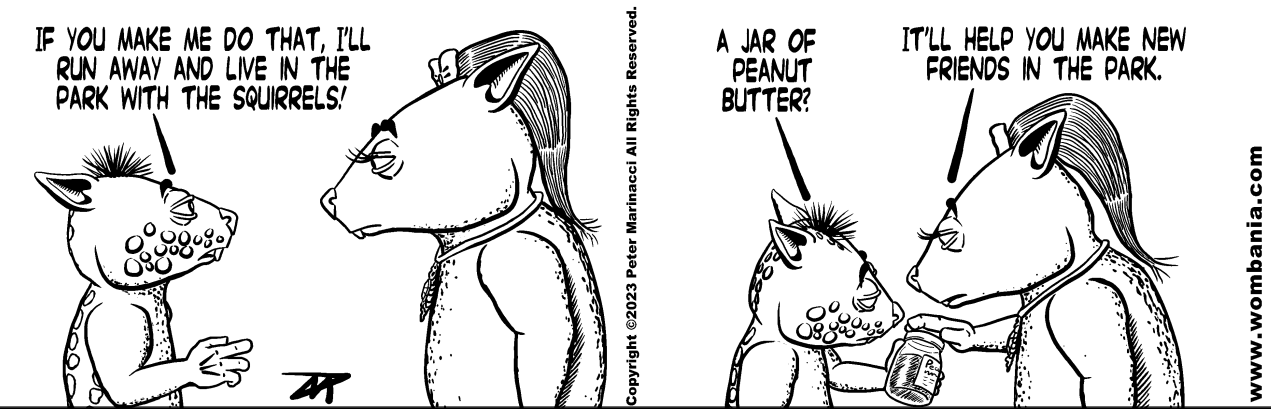

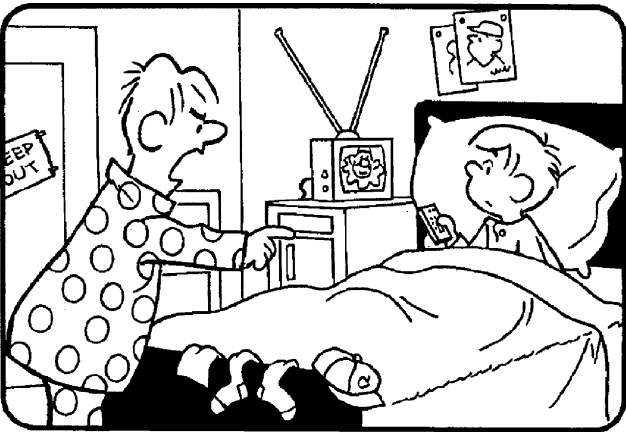

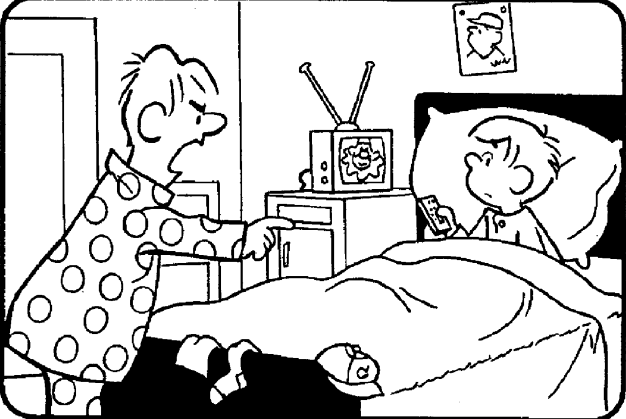

ABC’s new liquor license authorizations next month

The California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) will be announcing the authorization for the issuance of new on-sale general and off-sale general licenses, and authorization for the inter-county transfer of on-sale general and off-sale general licenses next month.

From Sept, 11, 2023, to Sept. 22, in counties where such licenses are available, applications for new original on-sale general and off-sale general licenses will be accepted at district and branch offices. During the same period, priority applications will be accepted for the intercounty transfer of on-sale general and off-sale general licenses, as authorized.

Prior to the priority application period, the department will announce how many new licenses are authorized based on statutory authorizations and limitations. The department will provide a list of counties eligible for added on-sale general and off-sale general licenses.

Only one priority application will be accepted

from any one applicant per county for each type of license. A fee of \$17,335 is to be paid when filing an application for a new original general license and a fee of \$6,570 is to be paid when filing a priority application for the intercounty transfer of a general license. Only a certified check, cashier’s check or money order will be accepted for payment of the application fee, which should be made payable to Alcoholic Beverage Control.

If the number of applicants within a county for a particular type of license/transaction is equal to or less than the number of licenses available, all applicants will be notified that they have 90 days to complete a formal application for their specific premises.

If the department receives more applications than there are licenses available, a public drawing will be held. Priority drawings for new licenses will be scheduled the week of Oct. 23. To participate in the drawing, an applicant must have been a resident of California for at least 90 days prior to the date of

the scheduled drawing. Successful drawing participants will be notified that they have 90 days to complete a formal application for their specific premises.

Unsuccessful drawing participants will be automatically refunded their application fee (minus a \$100 service charge) within 90 to 120 days of the priority drawing but will retain their priority ranking until a new priority list is established in 2023.

If an applicant owes money to California taxing agencies, a claim against the priority application fee may be made by the taxing agency. If such a claim is made, the amount owed will be deducted from the priority application fee at the time of refund and re-mitted to the taxing agency.

Series organizer and Big Band Staff leader Ken Dahleen said Owens is another of the artists he has worked with off the Hill, and invited to Idyllwild. “Sharon Owens is Barbra Streisand in the Vegas ‘Legends Show.’ She tours the world. I was out on tour with her for seven weeks earlier this year. She is incredible.”

Owens has made a career out of her uncanny sonic and visual resemblance to Streisand. In addition to her work with the Legends in Concert franchise, she has won many competitions, including Fox TV’s “Performing As ...” in 2005. For over 10 years she has performed “Barbara and Frank, the Concert That Never Was” on the Las Vegas strip, and around the country. In addition to a sold-out engagement in London’s West End, she tours Australia, Canada, Holland, Belgium and Asia and has entertained aboard cruise ships for Royal Caribbean, Princess and Norwegian cruise lines.

ISCS is a manifestation of Dahleen’s love of Idyllwild and live music. As a contractor, he has the sound and lighting equipment, and the crew, to put on professional shows in a big venue like the Butterfield Amphitheater. Series Vice President Pete Holzman said that Dahleen’s contribution to the series is “the equivalent of a \$50,000 line item.”

Working with his Big Band Staff and other ensembles, Dahleen meets a certain class of performer, and the invitation to play Idyllwild has a draw all its own. He told the Crier last year that musicians are more willing to do outdoor gigs that are not over 100 degrees. Previous artists have confirmed there is a benefit for Idyllwild’s cooler climate, and the town itself is a draw for visiting artists, many of whom decide to make a weekend of it. Dahleen’s crew also appreciates the cool.

He started the Big Band Staff in 1989. “We are all studio musicians. We all work together in different organizations and studios. They’re first-call guys all over the Southern California area. They take the calls at casinos to play for major stars. We’re expected to get it right the first time.” The group made the rounds. “We were popular throughout Southern California. Organizers always invited a big band to their summer concerts,” Dahleen said. He kept wanting to perform in Idyllwild, but there was no venue. Finally, in 2000, the right group of locals came together to provide the funding for the series. Since then it has grown from four concerts to nine, each week a different style to provide something for everyone.

The concerts are all free, but donations are gratefully accepted. Funding is met through contributions from the community, and the series always starts on a wing and a prayer. The budget this year is \$36,900. Contributions, checks payable to Idyllwild Summer Concert Org, may be sent to P.O. Box 1542, Idyllwild CA 92549-1542, or call (760) 413-4638.

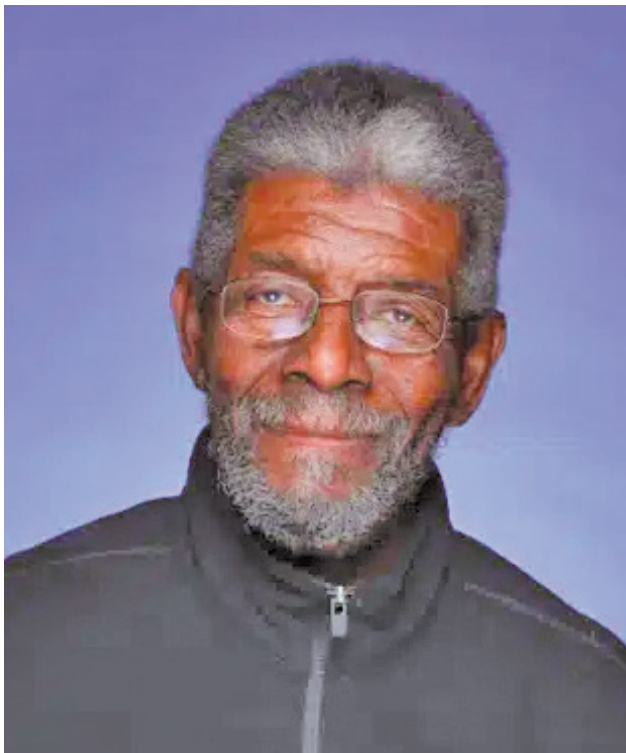

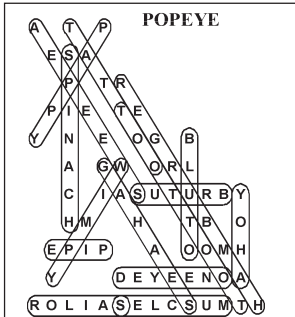

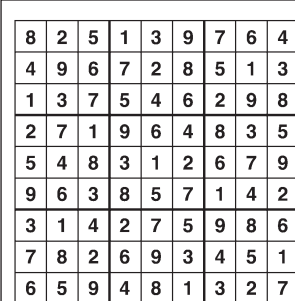

Paul and Alma Wood came to Idyllwild on their honeymoon and decided to stay. So they opened a self-service laundry.

65 years ago - 1958
Lots at Tahquitz Lake Estates were going for \$2,995. The development was advertised as "a paradise of beauty and culture."

55 years ago - 1968
"It could happen here," warned Town Crier, as it reported that polluted air was killing thousands of Southern California pines.

50 years ago - 1973
Idyllwild Fire Department reported that the number of emergencies handled by its fire and rescue personnel had nearly doubled in four years.

45 years ago - 1978
The feasibility of establishing a 30-acre natural preserve on the 200-acre USC-Idyllwild campus was being studied by campus officials in cooperation with the Izaak Walton League, according to Dr. Allen Koenig, campus director.

40 years ago - 1983
Medal of Honor recipient Col. Lewis Millett was the grand marshal of the Idyllwild Fourth of July Parade. Lora Steere, 96, also was a star attraction of the parade in her decorated wheelchair.

35 years ago - 1988
A closed session of the San Jacinto Mountain Water Study Agency Board was set to discuss "impending litigation" stemming from the recent termination by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency of a grant for the proposed

Idyllwild-area sewer expansion.

30 years ago - 1993
The U.S. Forest Service closed Boulder Basin and Marion Mountain campgrounds for an undetermined length of time to combat the outbreak of fleas on squirrels carrying the bubonic plague.

25 years ago - 1998
A five-year lease was signed by Med-Data Inc. for the old Cornet building in Strawberry Creek Square. The building had been empty since the Cornet store closed its doors in November 1996 after 18 years in the community.

20 years ago - 2003
An awaited \$3.3 million grant was released to help battle the bark beetle infestation in San Bernardino and Riverside counties.

15 years ago - 2008
The Riverside County Grand Jury publicly released a report that determined the local fire department had used intimidation against individuals, had violated open meeting rules and was underskilled in medical emergencies.

10 years ago - 2013
Idyllwild House Publishing Co., Ltd., owned by Jack and Becky Clark of Idyllwild, purchased the Idyllwild Town Crier from Tindle Newspapers Ltd. of England. Becky had been publisher-editor from 1996 to 2009, and had worked at the newspaper for many years prior.

5 years ago - 2018
The distance between the Idyllwild Fire Station and the American Medical Response unit near Foster Lake was no longer considered "zero," with respect to Riverside County dispatching an ambulance to a medical emergency on the Hill. The county changed the policy that said, "For purposes of closest ambulance the AMR Pine Cove Unit and IFPD ambulances are considered equal distance."

1 year ago - 2022
An Idyllwild man, Erik Mortensen, 39, was killed in a solo-vehicle collision on the Fourth of July on Highway 74 while driving his Harley-Davidson bobber motorcycle.

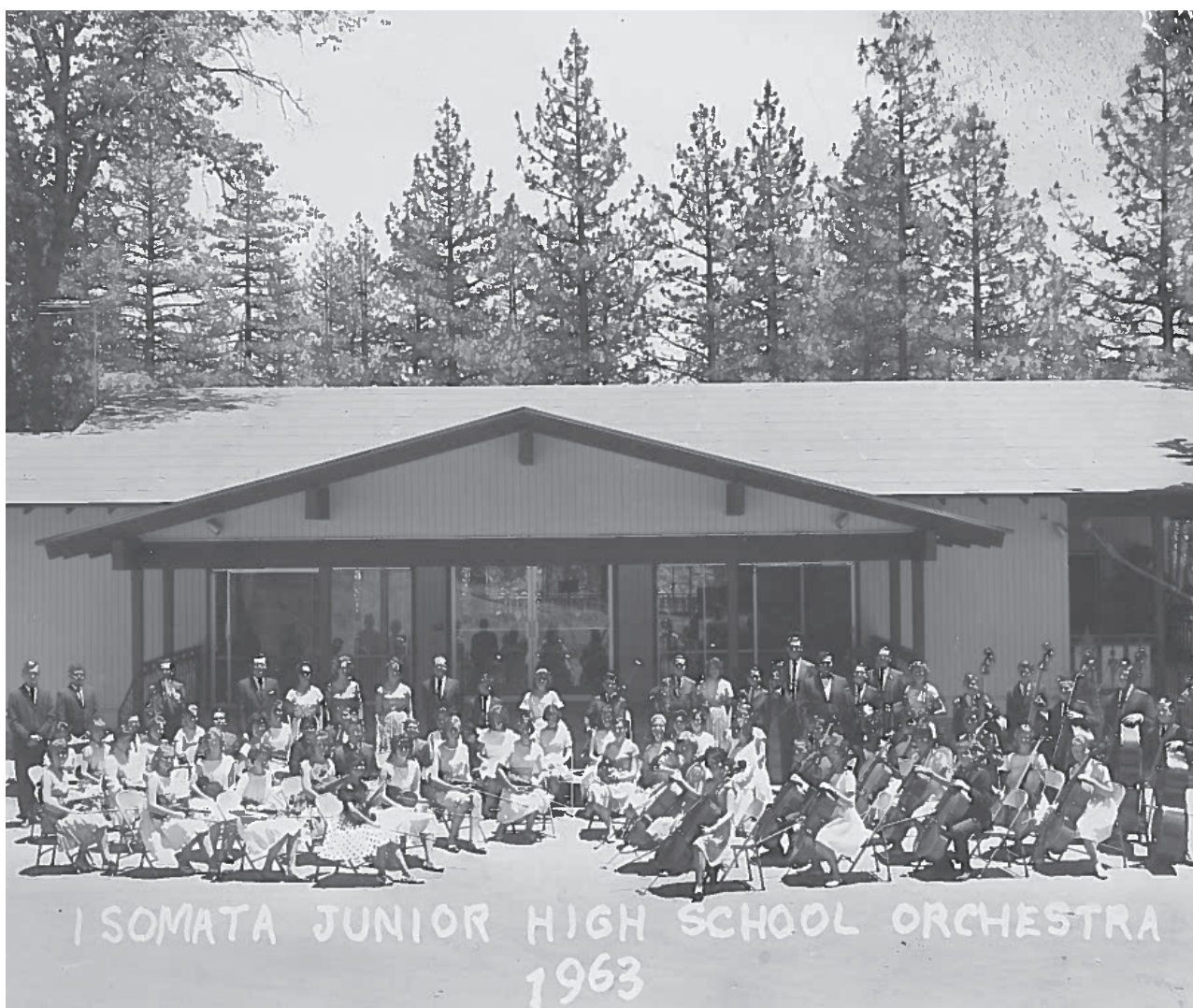
