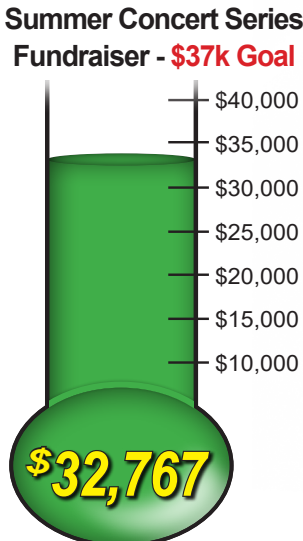

Heat and more heat follow cool spring

With extremely hot weather arriving in California last week, the critical and obvious tips are to stay cool, stay hydrated and look after friends and family.

In anticipation, both the county and the state posted warnings and suggestions for dealing with the temperatures.

The state created a website: heatreadyca.com/.

The county announced the availability of numerous cooling centers, including the Idyllwild Library. This cooling sanctuary is available from noon to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday. Other county cooling centers may be found at <https://capriverside.org/cool-centers>.

In advance of the scorching heat, meteorologists from the National Weather Service (NWS) and academia posted and tweeted warnings of the coming record-breaking heat.

In compliance, NWS recorded a 100-degree temperature in Idyllwild last Saturday, breaking the previous recorded high of 97 degrees in 2003.

Although the Idyllwild Fire Department only recorded a high temperature of 98 degrees Saturday, NWS's Anza recording station got to 104 degrees in the late afternoon and Keenwild Fire Station recorded 100 degrees shortly after noon.

And it is not over. Sunday, July 16, NWS issued an

Caltrans sets dates for Highway 243 work

Caltrans begins work on a \$470,000 emergency project to rehabilitate and repave Highway 243 in Idyllwild, weather permitting.

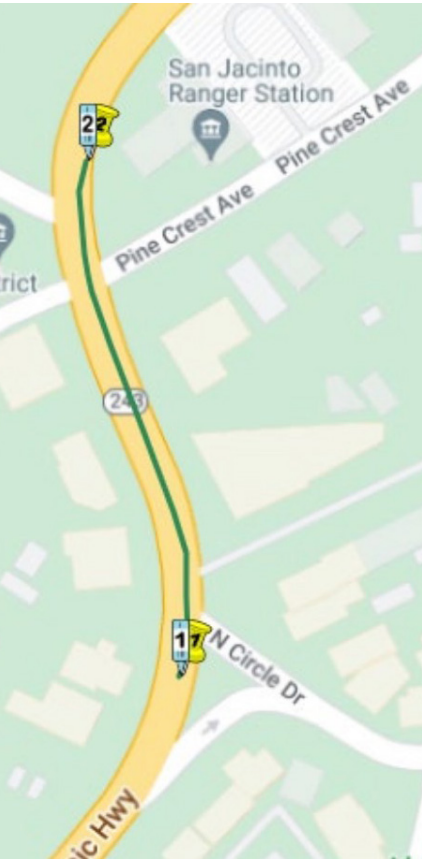
Crews will be working from just south of North Circle Drive to just north of Pine Crest Avenue.

The schedule is from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Saturday, July 17 to 22; and from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday, July 24 to 28.

Crews will be paving the roadway and replacing the pavement delineator markers and striping.

Expect one-way traffic control with flagging throughout the construction zone. Use caution and follow all instructions from flagging officers for safe passage.

California Highway Patrol will be on site to assist with traffic safety. Speeds will be reduced by 10 mph.

Court to consider changing county supervisors' districts

On May 19, the plaintiffs challenging Riverside County's supervisorial maps submitted a request to the Superior Court to prohibit using the maps approved in December 2021 depicting the five county supervisor districts. These supervisorial districts were used for the 2022 elections. In the 2024 elections, voters will be selecting supervisors for the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd districts.

The lawsuit, on behalf of Inland Empire United and six individuals, is challenging the legality of the December 2021 board-approved redistricting plan for supervisorial seats.

In the May filing, the plaintiffs' attorney requested the court to prohibit the county, the supervisors and the Registrar of Voters "from using the 2021 Redistricting Plan for Board of Supervisor districts in the County of Riverside in any future election and compelling them to comply with their mandatory duties under the Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions Act ... by adopting a new redistricting plan before the March 2024 election that complies with the requirements of the FAIR MAPS Act, including the requirements that the plan comply with the California Constitution and the federal Voting Rights Act by not unlawfully diluting the voting power of Latinos in Riverside County ..."

Both Registrar of Voters Rebecca Spencer and Chief Operating Officer Juan Perez responded and told the court that in order to devise and approve new district boundaries in time for the 2024 primary elections, the county would need to begin by Aug. 1.

"The signature in lieu of filing fee process for the March Primary Election will start on September 14, 2023. The precinct boundaries have to be final and complete prior to this date in order to issue the paperwork for the correct district based on the candidate's residence address. To meet this deadline, we must receive any new Board of Supervisors map no later than August 1, 2023," Spencer said in her submission to the court.

excessive heat warning for much of the Southern California mountain areas, specifically including Idyllwild and Pine Cove. "Excessive heat warning remains in effect until 8 p.m. PDT, Tuesday ... Dangerously hot conditions with high temperatures of 95 to 105 below 5000 feet."

Then Monday, July 17, NWS's longer term forecast reported, "The current deterministic forecast has more widespread moderate Heat Risk for Thursday into the weekend for the valleys, some inland coastal areas, and the lower elevations of the mountains which would support a return of Heat Advisories for at least some of those areas if the currently forecast warming holds."

A week ago on July 11, preceding the heat wave, Daniel Swain, a climate scientist in the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles, said as it approached, "The next heat wave will be more significant. It has the potential to break quite a lot more records ... California's temperatures are about to change. Fuel moisture is about to change. This not a brief one-to-two-day event, but a prolonged multi-day event that might last considerably longer than a week."

And the NWS's San Diego Meteorologist Alex Tardy said July 11, "There is the potential for extreme and extended prolonged heat wave ... from July 12 through July 19 or longer and near record highs July 15 and 16." On July 16, nearly a week later, the NWS forecast for next week was, "Strong high pressure aloft will maintain hot weather inland into next week, with periods of high clouds."

In anticipation of this dangerous heat, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced his "Heat Ready" campaign last Monday.

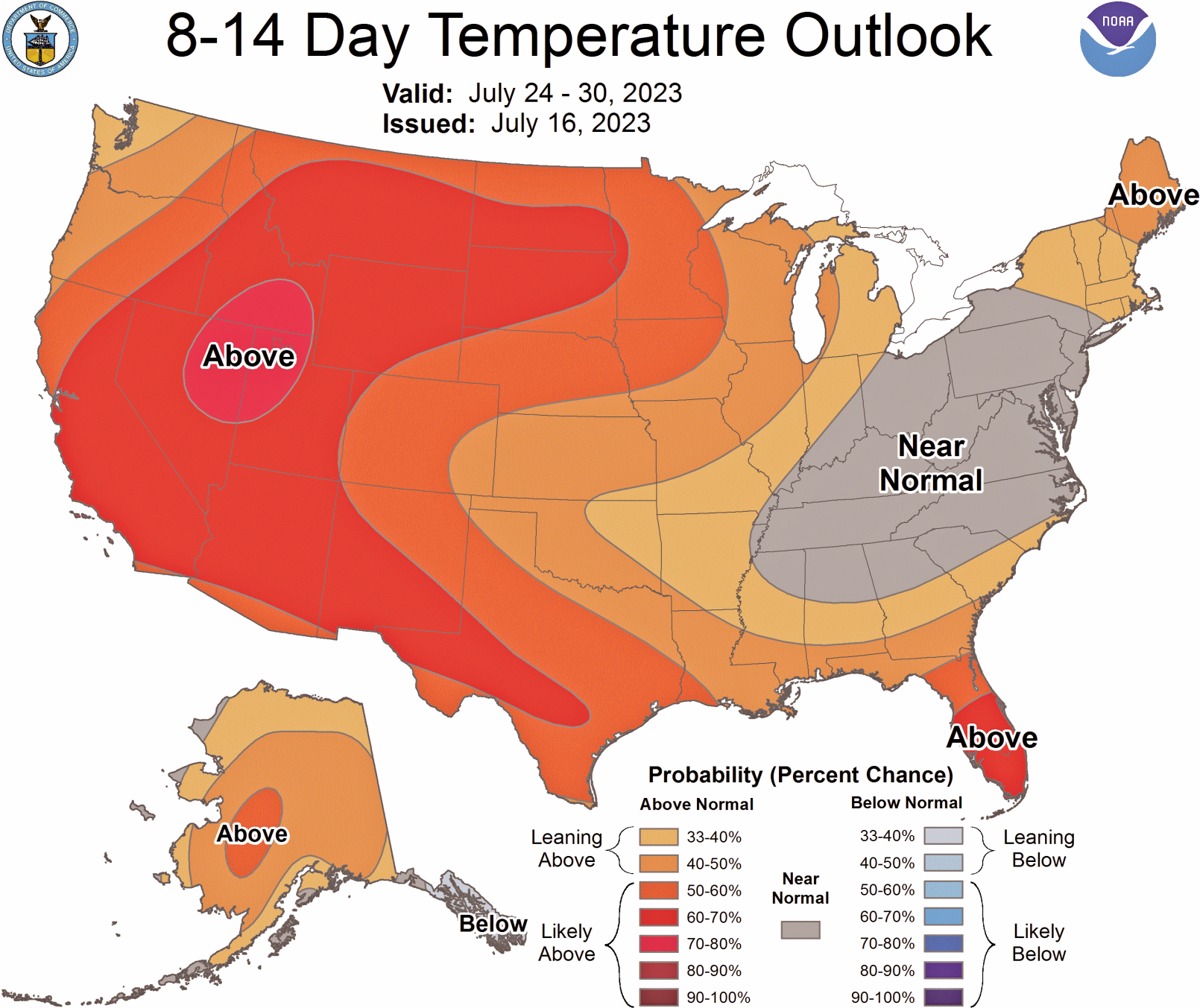
"The impacts of climate change have never been more clear — the hots continue to get hotter in our state and across the West putting millions of Californians at risk," said Newsom in his news release. "California is launching Heat Ready CA as another tool in the state's arsenal to protect people from extreme heat. We're asking everyone to stay alert to changing weather and take the necessary steps to keep themselves and their families safer from deadly heatwaves."

The two-year, \$20 million campaign focuses on heat-sensitive groups at highest risk, including those 65 years of age or older, workers, and individuals with chronic illness, disabilities or who are pregnant. The campaign is part of the governor's Extreme Heat Action Plan, which has access to more than \$400 million, to guide the state's response to heatwaves, according to the release.

"Heat-related illnesses such as dehydration, heat

exhaustion and heat stroke, as well as respiratory problems, are among the potentially dangerous effects of extreme heat," said California Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly.

The Public Policy Institute of California recently released a poll of state residents and asked several questions about the weather.

Is extreme weather a problem? "Yes" said 35% of those surveyed. Another 41% identified it as "somewhat of a problem" and only 24% don't perceive these extreme events as any kind of problem.

Nearly 45% of residents acknowledged they have been personally affected by some type of extreme weather in the past two years.

The survey noted, "To prepare for the future effects of climate change, such as flooding, storms, and wildfires, a solid majority of Californians (62%) say it is very important for the state government to pass regulations and spend money now on these efforts (27% somewhat, 11% not too important). Majorities across demographic and regional groups say it is very important, while partisans are divided."

Planning Commission to consider new permit for Pine Springs Ranch

Wednesday, July 19, the Riverside County Planning Commission will hear a request to approve a conditional use permit for new construction at Pine Springs Ranch. The ranch is in Apple Valley on the east and north part of Garner Valley along the San Jacinto Mountains.

Planning staff has completed an environmental review and prepared a mitigated negative declaration, with conditions for the commission's approval. All documents supporting this determination are located at the Riverside County Planning Department, 4080 Lemon Street, 12th Floor, Riverside.

The ranch is on 315 acres. The Seventh Day Adventist Church operates the ranch as a summer youth camp and a retreat center. The ranch was damaged in the 2013 Mountain Fire.

According to the planning staff report, "Current capacity of the camp facility is approximately 500 people based on dining hall and meeting space limitations, but the bed capacity is for 700 people." At completion of the proposed construction, capacity would still be 700 guests.

The new construction will add about 60% to the ranch's building space. The facilities occupy about 56 acres of the total site and the new facilities would still occupy about the same area. Construction will be spread over the next 15 to 25 years and be dependent upon financial availability.

In the first phase of construction, the operators plan to remodel or add the following: new dining hall, duplex cabins, meeting cabins, remodeling of the multipurpose building, a recreation pavilion, expansion of the pool house, snack shop and game room, classrooms and improve the parking area.

Later phases will include an administration building/welcome center, wooden tents, bathhouses, duplex cabins, staff dorm, new outdoor amphitheater, remote prayer chapel, and a nature and astronomy center with petting zoo.

Background

The campground and facilities are not new. The camp was originally constructed in 1961 and was in some form of operation from then until Public Use Permit (PUP) No. 431 was approved in 1981 for the camp as it generally exists to-

day, according to the planning staff.

The camp has been in regular operation since this PUP was approved. At some point following the PUP's approval and likely the mid-1990s when digital records became active, the zoning on the site changed from Rural Residential to Natural Assets, 160-acre minimum.

Variance for building height

Several of the new structures will exceed the height limitation of 20 feet, but that will be permitted for several reasons. First, the topography across much of the parcel is quite steep and due to that, the development of the existing and proposed campground is concentrated in the less steep portions of the site. Also, there are oak trees and drainage areas that are to be avoided as well that further concentrate the area's potential for development.

"This creates a unique feature of the project site, separate and distinct from similarly situated properties. This concentration of uses within the smaller portion of the site necessitates that uses and buildings be more intense and taller in height to accommodate the guests and service areas for them," planning staff noted.

Also, there is precedent. The Ronald McDonald Camp in Mountain Center, which was most recently approved through Conditional Use Permit No. 3204 Revision No. 1, historically had variances approved for exceeding maximum building height and is under the same zoning classification of Natural Assets for similar reasons as this project to accommodate typical building design height and size to accommodate campground activities.

Mitigated negative declaration (MND)

The county performed an environmental study, which resulted in a MND. These were done in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The documents were circulated for public review per the CEQA Statute and Guidelines Section 15105 but no comments have been received, according to planning staff.

The staff recommendation is that the project, as reviewed and conditioned, will not result in any potentially significant environmental impacts with the incorporation of the mitigation as required under the MND. It conforms with existing code requirements.

Life Tribute Erwin Keith Froehlich 1936-2023

E. Keith Froehlich, 87, died peacefully at home Tuesday, July 4, 2023, in Palm Desert.

Born March 10, 1936, in Redlands to Nina Mae and Glenn Froehlich. Keith spent most of his early life on the Hill in Idyllwild.

Keith received an undergraduate degree in 1961 at San Diego State, and then served a term in the United States Army. It was during this time he met his first wife, Bonnie Lee Pitts. They were married in August of 1961. After Keith's Army discharge, he pursued a master's of theology degree and graduated in 1966 working as an associate pastor in the United Methodist Church in West Hills.



After Michael (1963) and Tedd (1965) were born, Keith decided that he could provide more help to his community by becoming a therapist/social worker. He received a master's in social work from Fresno State in 1971 and moved to the San Fernando Valley to pursue his new career working as a social worker at the VA hospital in Brentwood and a therapist in the valley.

Keith and Bonnie moved back to Idyllwild in 1980 to take over the Idyllwild Inn from Nina and Glenn, and spent a decade upgrading the property and enjoying the Hill life. Keith moved back to counseling work when the inn sold in 1990 and worked with the health center team at Idyllwild Arts until his retirement.

After Bonnie's death in 2007, Keith found new love and companionship with Sandy Clark and remarried in 2008. Much to his dismay, he was forced off the mountain in 2011 by a heart attack, and ultimately had to settle closer to sea-level in Palm Desert.

Keith is survived by his wife Sandy and her extended family; sons Michael and Tedd, their spouses Tracy and Paul, and five grandchildren all of whom he adored.

An open-house celebration of his life is at 3 p.m. Saturday, July 2, at the Rustic Theatre. Keith excelled in a lifetime of giving. In lieu of flowers it is suggested that donations be made in his name to your favorite charities.

PCWD continues smart meter installation

The Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) board of directors met Wednesday, July 12 for a brief meeting, about 15 minutes. All directors were present.

The budget review for the financial year fourth quarter was left off the agenda and so will be discussed next month, along with the annual audit.

The board discussed and approved the June financial statement. It showed receipts of \$105,117 and disbursements of \$84,357. Liquid assets, including funds in the Local Area Investment Fund, stand at \$919,441.

General Manager Jeremy Potter reported that production, 3,192,270 gallons, was about the same as last year, but almost 1 million gallons less than 2021. Static well #10 is at 72.5 feet, up 8-1/2 feet, as high country snow melt continues to replenish the aquifer. Hydrant maintenance, valve exercising and flushing are being completed.

Potter told the board that the installation of new smart meters and remote-controlled valves will continue into fall, weather permitting. The project is "more than halfway through book 1," of the four books in which the PCWD meters are listed. This is the "main focus" for the crew, and they are completing "about 10 a day."

Potter also spoke of a new hire. An ad was placed for a part-time maintenance worker to help free up full-time staff for meter replacement. The position is a strictly hourly, with no benefits, "temp" position. Several applications were received and the new hire "starts Monday."

The purchase of the Pine Cove Park property from the county will go before the supervisors at their Aug. 31 meeting for final approval. Potter mentioned the intention to keep the small restroom building for storage, possibly sealing off the septic system and repairing the roof and fascia. Many downed and dead trees are on the property, and the "B" crew from the Pine Cove Fire Station, Engine 3172, will use the 19-acre parcel for fuel reduction training.

The snow blower attachment for the skid-steerer has been ordered with delivery expected this month.

The next meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 9, at the office.

County approves CSA fees for 2023-24

At its July 11 meeting, the board of supervisors held a public hearing on the fees applied to parcels within the Riverside County Service Areas (CSA).

Michael Franklin, development manager for the Office of Economic Development, presented the proposal to the board.

"The public hearing is to adopt the county service area charges for fiscal year 23-24," Franklin told the board. "This will cover all of the special assessments that we charge for all special services provided to all the CSAs throughout the county."

After Chair Kevin Jeffries (1st District) opened the hearing for public comment, no one asked to speak. The board then unanimously adopted the new fees with a 3-0 vote. Supervisors Chuck Washington (3rd District) and Yxstian Guitierrez (5th District) were absent.

CSA 36 is located in Idyllwild. Its \$35 fee is for lighting, and parks and recreation. These CSA fees are collected through county property tax bills. The \$35 is applied to the 3,568 parcels within Idyllwild. Pine Cove parcels are not included in CSA 36.

CSAs provide municipal services to residential neighborhoods such as landscape maintenance, street lighting, street sweeping and road maintenance. The services that each community receives are determined during the planning phase of new development.

These fees are authorized by state law. The intent was to give county boards another means to finance and provide needed public facilities and services within unincorporated areas of the county. Consequently, the fees for each CSA depend upon its purpose and are not standard for every CSA.

"Given the site is already developed with a campground that has been in use since 1961 the generally proposed use to re-entitle the existing campground would not alter the current character of the area. The limited expansion of the camp facility proposed by the Conditional Use Permit would not be a substantial expansion in the scope of the types of uses or number of people on the site that would also similarly maintain the character of the area," the staff reported to the commission.

With the state's direction on greater zero-emission vehicles, the permit will require parking for electric vehicles and one charging station.

Governor signs infrastructure package of bills

On July 10, Gov. Gavin Newsom's infrastructure streamlining package of bills accelerating construction timelines became law. The governor signed five bills the Legislature passed the week, as well as 19 other budget-related bills.

Newsom's set of infrastructure bills are intended to strengthen the clean electric grid, to improve and ensure safe drinking water, to expand the state's water supply and to bring the transportation system into the 21st century.

"For decades, infrastructure projects critical to our future have stalled because of a pervasive mindset of 'no.' With this legislation, California is saying 'yes' to building the clean energy, safe drinking water and transportation projects we need to deliver on our world-leading climate action. Now it's time to roll up our sleeves and build California's future," Newsom said in his press release.

To accomplish these efforts, the legislation will speed up construction, expedite court review, streamline permitting and address the cumbersome California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) processes.

For example, Newsom's press release explained how project work can be done faster. "Current construction procurement processes drive delays and increase project costs. The legislation includes methods to offer a streamlined process for project delivery to reduce project timeframes and costs."

Regarding the other improvements, the legislation eliminates some opportunities for simple procedural delays and requires the courts to move environmental cases more quickly.

Finally, with these changes, Newsom is hopeful that California will qualify for more federal grant money or more easily meet the stipulations. According to the release, "Establishes a Green Bank Financing Program within the Climate Catalyst Fund so that the state can leverage federal dollars for climate projects that cut pollution, with an emphasis on projects that benefit low-income and disadvantaged communities."

Not only did the legislative leaders help move this package forward in less than two months, but they offered positive support following the bill's enactment. Senate President Pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) said, "We have passed a responsible, equitable budget and finalized a legislative package on infrastructure that maintains California's values on the environment and climate preparedness, while at the same time builds for our future and creates a place where working families can access quality jobs."

Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas (D-Salinas) added, "... The legislative package on infrastructure, as well, strikes a crucial balance: spurring future growth and good-paying jobs while defending our environment..."

Examples of the projects the governor hopes to accelerate include solar, wind and battery storage projects; electric transmission, transit and regional rail construction, clean transportation, including maintenance and bridge projects; water storage projects funded by Proposition 1; the Delta Conveyance Project; semiconductor fabrication plants; and wildlife crossings along the I-15 corridor.

While there was plenty of vocal concern about the time available to review Newsom's legislative package, the final agreement did receive support from the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC).

"The Legislature significantly strengthened the proposed trailer bills in order to better protect communities and the environment, said Victoria Rome, California director of government affairs at NRDC. "Despite being forced into the truncated budget process, legislative leadership upheld core environmental protections and included the public in the process of creating a pathway to accelerating our clean energy future."

Grand jury looks at its 2021 STR report

This month the Riverside County Grand Jury (GJ) issued a follow-up report to its June 2021 report on the county's implementation of its Short-term Rental (STR) ordinance and its initial revision of Ordinance 927 (regulating STRs). The board of supervisors did approve changes to Ordinance 927 in October 2022.

In its 2021 report, the GJ made four recommendations. These included creating and offering a neighborhood complaint form; more Code Enforcement staff to manage a revised ordinance; greater collaboration among the Planning Department, Code Enforcement and the Sheriff's Office; and the databases used for the STR certificates and the transient occupancy tax be better reconciled and synchronized.

In large part, the GJ found that its recommendations were included and part of the county's new regulation over STRs.

The single concern was Code Enforcement's staffing level. However, this new finding was probably before the board adopted the Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget.

The GJ noted, "With the changes in Ordinance 927.1, Code Enforcement will complete the implementation of Recommendations 1, 3 and 4. However, Recommendation 2, regarding staffing, has not been increased to the desired level to properly enforce the ordinance."

The GJ was concerned that Code Enforcement needed 16 more staff and had only received eight.

In December 2021, the board approved County Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen's recommendation to increase the Code Enforcement budget by \$770,000 and 10 positions.

And last month, the board agreed to the request from Bob Magee, Code Enforcement director, to add 10 more positions for STR enforcement, thus achieving and exceeding the initial 2021 recommendation for Code Enforcement staffing.

149 passed and was signed. In a press release, the council wrote, "SB 149 is primarily directed at addressing the protracted CEQA lawsuits oftentimes used to stop or delay infrastructure projects in California, including water supply and storage projects. Ag Council supported this measure to provide tools to more quickly advance desperately needed water supply and storage projects in California."

And the California Special District's Association (CSDA) also expressed its support for the infrastructure package signed last week. Director Kristin Withrow wrote in a press release, "On Monday, July 10, Governor Newsom signed his infrastructure streamlining package into law. The package will accelerate critical infrastructure projects and help California achieve its climate and clean energy goals. The package was originally introduced as 10 budget trailer bill proposals in an effort to help reform the infrastructure processes in California. Of the 10 proposals, 5 advanced as part of the budget negotiations. CSDA's legislative committee took an overall support of the Governor's infrastructure package with a special focus of support on 3 streamlining proposals, pertaining to CEQA, judicial streamlining, and administrative records, as they aligned with CSDA's long term strategic goals to help special districts cut red tape and deliver on critical infrastructure needs. Those 3 proposals were part of the package that was signed into law."

California Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Jennifer Barrera repeated the chamber's support for the governor's initiative: "CalChamber appreciates the Governor's leadership on infrastructure. The package of bills passed today is an important step forward in helping California achieve the state's ambitious climate goals. This legislation will help reduce litigation and unnecessary delays in much of California's infrastructure development and we look forward to the Governor signing these bills into law."

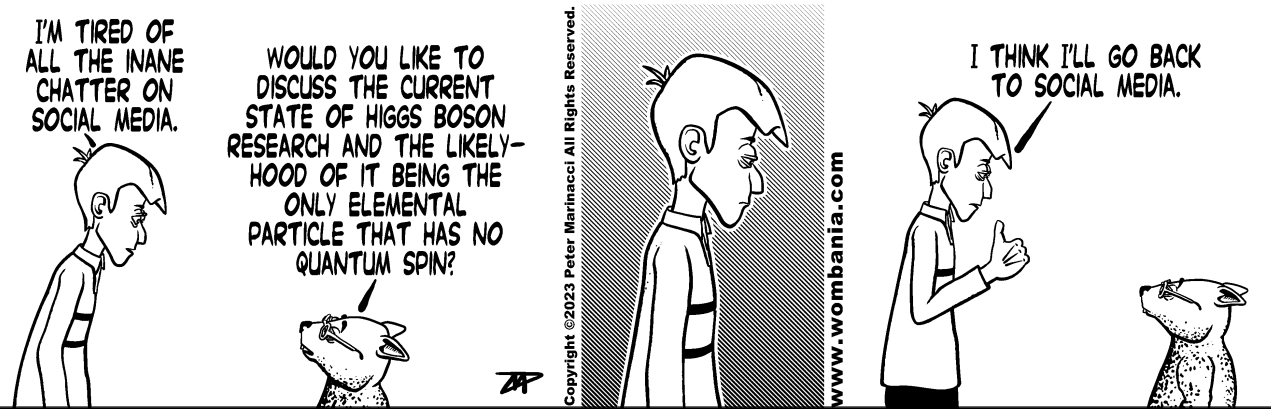

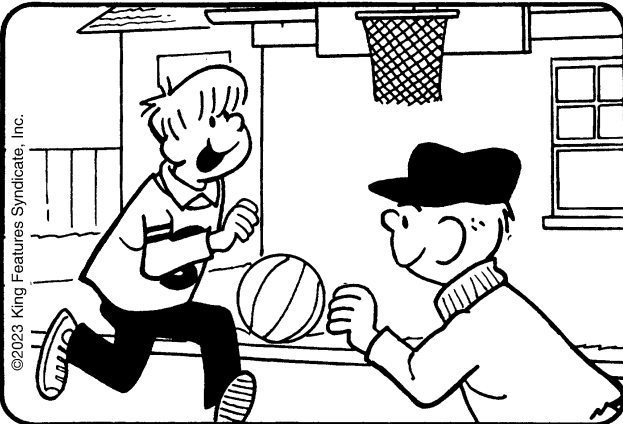

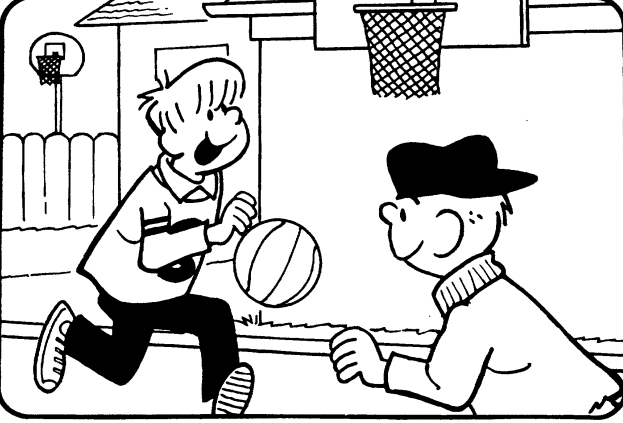

On June 23, Perez stated in his response, “It is my understanding that Petitioners in this lawsuit are asking the Court to expedite discovery and briefing in this case in the hope of resolving the litigation in time to potentially have a new map for the 2024 Board of Supervisors election ... the County would have already needed to be well into a new line-drawing process by now to comply with the law and to have any possible chance of meeting the Registrar’s August 1, 2023, deadline to receive a new map for the 2024 Board of Supervisors primary election.”

Perez, who chaired the Redistricting Committee in 2021, noted the law’s requirements for public hearings (four minimum) and the time needed to prepare for the hearings and to incorporate com-

ments and ideas into potential supervisorial districts.

“In 2021, the map-drawing process took approximately one year to complete. First, the County assembled an Executive Office Technical Committee (EOTC) that first met on December 18, 2020, and that began planning the subsequent steps of the map-drawing process,” he added.

Currently, the Court has asked for the County’s response to the plaintiff’s request on Aug. 7. Two weeks later a case management conference will be held. Further responses from both the plaintiffs’ legal team and the County on Aug. 28 and Sept. 11. Then a hearing on the motion will be held on Sept. 18.

“Petitioners’ goal is to have this case resolved before the 2024 election. Petitioners’ May 19 motion for issuance of a peremptory writ of mandate is pending before the court ... We expect the court

will be signing an order formally setting this case schedule shortly,” Matthew J. Murray, attorney at Altshuler Berzon LLP and part of the plaintiff’s team.

If a decision or judgment is not reached before the March 2024 election, the petitioners’ lawyers (the ACLU) told the judge, “Petitioners reserve the right to move for a preliminary injunction before the March 2024 election if a writ petition hearing is not scheduled to be heard and resolved before the pre-election deadlines leading up to that election.”

However, in a recent email, Nicholas Reiner, senior press strategist for the ACLU of Southern California, wrote, “Our goal remains to have a lawful map in place for the March 2024 election, and we are continuing to consider all of our options.”

Brooke Federico, county public information officer, said in June, “We continue to look forward to a resol

Terri Olsen and The Perfect Blend next week

Idyllwild's free Summer Concert Series (ISCS) continues Thursday, July 27, with Terri Olsen and The Perfect Blend. Opening will be a trio of Idyllwild jazz stalwarts, Paul, Bob and Bill (Carman, Boss and Saitta.) The music begins at 6:05 p.m., with the headliner taking the stage at 7 p.m.

Olsen is a summer concert veteran, having appeared with The Perfect Blend regularly, one of the proven crowd-pleasers that series organizer Ken Dahleen lines up each year. Olsen and the band cover what they call "The New American Songbook," including rock and pop with Broadway standards new and old.

While still in college, 18-year-old Olsen developed show business discipline, playing five shows a day, six days a week in a musical revue at Marriott's Great America. In L.A. she studied dance, acting and comedy, working up from commercials into bigger roles. Moving on to New York, her first Equity show was "Seven Brides for Seven Brothers" where she played Martha and understudied Debbie Boone for two years. She then performed in Broadway shows: "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," "Into the Light," "Starlight Express" and "Jerry's Girls."

Returning to California she has worked nonstop. After two years with the Fabulous Palm Springs Follies, she formed her own band, The Perfect Blend, always in demand at posh desert night spots, including Frank's Place at the Indian Wells Resort Hotel. The Perfect Blend is made up of Alex Danson on keyboards, Larry Holloway on bass, David Bronson on drums and Phillip Pollerana on congas and vocals.

The modestly named trio opening up, Paul, Bob and Bill, need no introduction to Idyllwilders, or local jazz fans in general. Stalwart is defined as "loyal, reliable and hardworking," and these three old friends fit that bill. Saxophonist Paul Carman is part of the backbone of Idyllwild Arts Academy's (IAA) jazz program and has led a string of original jazz groups including Triorbits and Fourbits, in addition to his work with IAA faculty Marshall Hawkins and Barnaby Finch.

Bob Boss has been a part of San Diego jazz life since 1983, but has spent a lot of time and made a lot of friends in Idyllwild, including teaching at IAA. Boss and Carman both have been busy with this year's Jazz in the Pines. Boss notes that this will be his third time at ISCS. "I did one with Marshall Hawkins and Sherry Williams, and another under my leadership with Marshall, Michael Peed, Roy Gonzales and the late Ramon Banda. We had a wonderful time. The community was a great audience."

Joining Carman and Boss is bassist Bill Saitta. A busy man in the Coachella Valley, Saitta has been one of the most enjoyable bassists in Idyllwild's lively scene.

The concerts are all free, but donations are gratefully accepted. The funding is met through contributions from the community, and the series always starts on a wing and a prayer. 


Wash your penny. Rinse it and dry it well.


As drops are added, they gradually mound into a dome instead of just flowing off the penny. Each drop raises the surface of the dome, until it gets too big and breaks.

The dome shape is caused by **surface tension**.

Surface what?

Surface tension is caused by the grouping of molecules. Under the surface of the water, each water molecule attracts and is attracted to molecules on all sides of it.

The surface molecules are attracted to the molecules below and to the sides. But there is nothing above the surface molecules to pull upward. The surface molecules pull together and act like a "skin" on the surface of the water.



Dean Martin and Elke Sommer were in town filming scenes for "House of Seven Days" at the Tirol, Lake Hemet and the dump.

50 years ago - 1973

Residents of Coulter Pines trailer park appeared before the Pine Cove Water District board complaining of "pounding" water pipes. Tom Wick, district maintenance manager, said the problem was air in the pipes due to a "rinky-dink water system."

45 years ago - 1978

In the wake of Proposition 13, County Service Area 36 faced budget cutbacks that forced suspension of the

Town Hall summer recreation program.

40 years ago - 1983

The University of Southern California announced it would sever ties with the Idyllwild campus of ISOMATA after the summer session.

35 years ago - 1988

Anxious Hill residents got updates about the progress of the Chimney Fire from the new Idyllwild emergency radio station, WNKI. The blaze came within 2 miles of Idyllwild.

30 years ago - 1993

A group of Hill residents returned from Mexico after they helped people left homeless because of floods.

The Fort suffered

vandalism. Three of the carved wooden animals were torn from the roof where they were bolted and then tossed to the ground.
