**Results of Hilary felt on mountain**

Hurricane Hilary promised rare weather. She arrived Sunday as a tropical storm and has departed. Some of her highlights include 11.7 inches of rain falling on Mt. San Jacinto's Peak. This was the largest amount of rain fall recorded in Southern California as of 5 a.m., Monday, Aug. 21. Closer to Idyllwild, 7.8 inches were recorded at Snow Creek. This was the eighth largest rain volume dropped from Hilary. Pine Cove and Stone Creek received about 3.3 inches, and Keenwild and Vista Grande were in the 2.5 inch range. Idyllwild Fire recorded 0.78 inches from early Sunday morning until early Monday morning. Winds also were strong. Although the strongest wind was 84 mph on Black Mountain, they ranged from 40 mph on the Hill to 62 mph recorded at Rocky Point in Pine Cove. Another weather record was set Sunday. The maximum temperature Sunday was 64 degrees in Idyllwild. This was the lowest recorded "high" temperature for that date since 67 degrees was recorded 40 years ago in 1983.

Locally, a tree came down on the Idyllwild School grounds during the storm and another on Middle Ridge Drive, taking out a power line. Idyllwild Community Center lost a pine tree at Town Hall and another pine at the amphitheater that took out a piece of fence and damaged the rail for the load-in ramp. Wind damage affected Miss Sunshine's business in the plaza. "We had heavy winds and trees into some power lines but no major damage and no injuries," said Idyllwild Fire Chief Mark LaMont. The three local water districts were asked about damages. Fern Valley Water District General Manager Victor Jimenez said, "No storm damage to us, thankfully!" Idyllwild Water District Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman said a tree fell in the septic tank area but no major damage occurred. Riverside County proclaimed a local emergency Monday because of Hilary. The proclamation will go before the supervisors at their next regularly scheduled board meeting Tuesday, Aug. 29 for ratification. "This emergency proclamation could help make the county eligible for potential federal and state assistance, including repairs to damaged areas," according to the news release. "It also allows the county to quickly procure items necessary for emergency response and repair. "Responders from fire departments, law enforcement agencies, emergency management departments, public works agencies and flood control departments are currently assessing the damage caused by the Tropical Storm. Known damage at this point include a 911 outage in the Coachella Valley, flooding on the 10 Freeway, as well as in neighborhoods, business districts and roadways." Mt. San Jacinto State Park campgrounds are closed for safety concerns and will reopen when those concerns pass. Eastbound Interstate 10 was closed at Haugen-Lehmann due to mudslides until around noon Monday. So was Highway 74 west of Cahuilla Way in Pinyon Monday with no easy way to reach the desert communities for some time. Highway 243 sustained damages and was reduced to one lane north of Pine Cove at Round Robin Drive on Monday. While Hilary has passed, the National Weather Service on Monday forecast the possibility of monsoonal moisture arriving Thursday. In advance of Hilary's arrival, Gov. Gavin Newsom issued a Proclamation of Emergency, which included

**Times set for memorial services**


Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department announced livestream for celebrations of life of two fallen firefighters. A native Idyllwild firefighter died Sunday night, Aug. 6, along with two others in a helicopter that collided with another helicopter in Cabazon while responding to a wildfire. Cal Fire Assistant Chief Josh Bischof was riding with Capt. Tim Rodriguez and Tony Sousa, a contract helicopter pilot, when their helicopter collided with another helicopter carrying two people during the Broadway Fire that started at Broadway Street and Esperanza Avenue in Cabazon. The other helicopter landed safely. Bischof's helicopter crashed, killing all three occupants. "In the wake of the profound losses the community has experienced, the Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department is committed to ensuring that all who wish to pay their respects can do so," Cal Fire wrote in a news release. "As such, livestreaming options will be provided for the celebrations of life for Rodriguez and Bischof via the Cal Fire/Riverside County Fire Department YouTube Channel." **Solis' case dismissed but refiled**

Former restaurateur Luis Solis Delgado, 45, of Idyllwild, had his case dismissed last week but remains in the Southwest Detention Center on \$5 million bail. District Attorney (DA) Public Information Specialist Brooke Beare said the deputy DA on the case told her "there was an issue with the availability of witnesses, so the case was refiled. The prelim[inary hearing] is currently set for 8/28 ...". He was charged with eight felony sex charges involving two minor female children beginning in August 2015 and ending Wednesday, April 26, 2023, the day before he was arrested. He pleaded not guilty to all eight felony charges. He faces life imprisonment if found guilty.

Riverside County. He also ordered state agencies to prepare for emergencies.

The state deployed 7,500 personnel in Southern California — including 3,900 highway patrol officers and 2,000 Caltrans workers — to aid local communities, and it dispatched resources for swift water rescue teams in high-risk areas.

According to Newsom’s press release, the Emergency Medical Services Authority had assets on standby, including California Medical Assistance

Teams to augment local capacity, aid in evacuations and support medical needs in communities with flooding.

The California National Guard prepositioned more than 350 soldiers and two dozen high water vehicles. Cal Fire prepositioned nine swift water rescue teams and urban search and rescue teams along with 290 engines.

Cal Office of Emergency Services, through the California Fire and Rescue Mutual Aid System, deployed a total of over 700 local government firefighters and support staff, as well as 15 swift water rescue teams, two urban search and rescue companies, and three regional ur-

ban search and rescue task forces.

And about 2,000 Caltrans maintenance personnel in the region were on 12-hour shifts, 24 hours a day. They installed pumps in flood-prone areas, such as Pacific Coast Highway/State Route 1 in Orange County, and monitored burn scars for potential mudslides, especially in northern Los Angeles, San Bernardino and Riverside counties.

Besides the deluge, a major earthquake occurred Saturday near Ojai. The 5.1 shake was felt throughout the SoCal area.

# IWD reviews several projects in the works

Idyllwild Water District (IWD) held its monthly board of directors meeting Wednesday, Aug. 16.

Ratepayer David Hunt presented a letter outlining complaints. He claimed that the water bill for an unoccupied house had gone up by \$50 with the new rates that went into effect last month. He did not provide any evidence to back up the claim and left immediately after reading the letter.

Before leaving, Hunt also complained about Chief Financial Officer Hosny Shouman and General Manager Leo Havener working part-time but drawing full salaries.

Havener, speaking to the Crier this week, explained that because of a lack of office space, he and Shouman are allowed to work from home some days; "It's complicated; he and I are what are called 'exempt employees,' which means he deals with things I am not allowed to listen in on, and vice versa." Until the office space repairs are finished, this situation will continue. Havener added, "Truth be told, we are working more hours at home than we would be at the office."

Among other complaints was the cost of an election for the empty seat on the board. The letter described "a year of 2-2 tied votes" as the directors could not decide between two apparently qualified candidates. Supervisor V. Manuel Perez also declined to make this decision for rate payers and so a vote is scheduled for March 2024. At least recently, all decisions by the board are being made unanimously, albeit after much, sometimes contentious, wrangling.

Havener's operations report showed water production up slightly from last year, but near average. It also included 130,000 gallons for mainline leaks. Havener noted two important leaks, one on North Circle and one on Tollgate. The latter, ironically, was caused when Riverside County Department of Transportation workers, excavating the new drainage line for the surface water that has plagued the neighborhood since 2021, struck a line. The leak was reported quickly; Director Steve Kunkle was across the street at the time.

Director Peter Szabadi asked if IWD had to pay for the repair. Havener answered that yes, public agencies do not charge other public agencies, but this is a two-way street and the county helps IWD when needed.

Director Steve Olson did his usual drilling down on pumping data for the wells. Each month Havener provides a report of well production data. For each well in service, it lists production as both cubic feet and acre feet, whether the well is full-time or part-time, and a gallon per minute (gpm) figure. Olson noted that the gpm figure is an average arrived at by dividing the total production by the number of minutes in a month. He would like to know how much the wells are really capable of producing, and Havener has in the past agreed that the system is capable of producing more than it presently does.

Breaking down each well's production by number of minutes in service is not a task Havener welcomed. Olson implied that if a well is producing halftime now, it could produce twice as much if left on 24 hours a day; but wells do take time to recharge.

President Charles Schelly noted that it has often been stated at board meetings that the numbers do not reflect a dynamic situation exactly. When Kunkle noted that "we used to have" those numbers, Havener took a brief walk to compose himself. Schelly opined that the averages give a pretty good idea what is going on. Havener noted that a great deal of data is recorded through the Supervisory Control Automatic Data Acquisition System.

Havener's report noted a spike last year in expenditures when Edison gave the district one bill for electricity for the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) for the entire year. That and the influx of water into waste lines due to heavy precipitation were the two most unusual items on the annual report.

The July 2023 financial report showed water revenue of \$181,399 and expenses of \$127,278; a net income of \$54,121. Sewer revenue was \$70,765 and expenses \$42,583, a net income of \$28,212.

Olson and Kunkle provided an update on the repair of the lower office building. EZ Mold did a test after the remediation by Servpro, and detected one more area that requires removal. Servpro will have to return, and after it has done its work, EZ Mold will be called to test again.

They are getting ready to ask contractors for bids on the repair. Plastic has been wrapped around the damaged area to isolate the areas for testing; testing should be done inside the building, inside the walls and outside in the environment. With holes in the wall, this was hard to do. Schelly said the new wall should have cinder blocks for the lower 3 to 4 feet to keep water out. A member of the public asked if asbestos had been found, as this was an initial concern. Schelly replied that no asbestos had been found.

A number of projects came up for votes on the agenda:

In replacing pipeline along Jameson Drive, El-Co, the same company laying pipe for Fern Valley Water District, has bid \$363,000 for the next 800 feet of pipe. The project is being done

year by year, section by section. Havener added that the funding for this is not in the Capital Improvement Plan.

The other project on the agenda, the Strawberry Creek Diversion, will take over a year before it is ready to go, and so some of the 500,000 budgeted for it will be spent on the Jameson pipeline. As to timeline, he said that depends on the contractor's availability, but Schelly said "as soon as possible." The board approved the project.

The board also voted to approve purchasing a new Toyota Tacoma truck. The price is a \$46,816, but Shouman said the insurance company has sent a check for \$30,990.63 for the truck recently totaled. There was a brief discussion of electric vehicles, with Havener averring that they charge and perform poorly in freezing weather, and cost upward of \$100,000. Schelly expressed his hope that the new truck will be operated by the district's best driver, one with an immaculate driving record, and that he would like it to last a good long time. This year district employees had three crashes.

Another item considered and approved by the board was Shouman's proposal to offer \$2,400 retention bonuses for employees who stay on the job at least a year. Turnover has vexed the district and this is an attempt to reward loyalty. The question of pension plans came up: Shouman explained that Cal Public Employee's Retirement System (CalPERS) is very expensive and the district has a pension plan that employees and IWD pay into, with payout also being dependent on the earnings of the fund, which have been, in recent years, flat.

He added that prospective employees have turned down job offers because of the district's nonparticipation in CalPERS. Schelly noted that turnover has been a problem for IWD for at least a decade. After some tailoring of language, "calendar year" was replaced with a period running Dec. 1 to Nov. 30. This gives a festive, holiday theme to the bonuses but means that some employees may work 23 months before getting a bonus, while others will be rewarded after exactly a year.

The program will be retroactive; employees on the job more than a year will receive a bonus this December.

The next item was an authorization to begin moving surplus funds into the California Cooperative Liquid Assets Security System (Cal CLASS), up to a limit of \$500,000. Schelly noted that a small amount had been invested there and the fund had done well.

Shouman said that presently, the Local Agency Investment Fund has \$3 million. The initial investment in Cal CLASS was \$25,000, and the board agreed to add \$75,000 now and authorize future investments up to \$500,000.

The board also voted to approve an agreement with Terra Nova Planning and Research Inc. for the proposed Strawberry Creek Diversion and Pipeline Relocation Project, near Fern Valley Road. The \$84,605 agreement is to include "a CEQA-conforming Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration, exhibits and associated notices, technical reports and regulatory permit applications." The project is projected to have a footprint of less than 500 square feet, and to be constructed next to the existing diversion in the creek.

There will be two new "reaches" of 8- or 12-inch underground pipeline to take the raw water to treatment. One will be about 245 feet, through a "relatively undisturbed wooded" area west of Tahquitz Road and within a district easement. The second "reach" will go about 300 feet, running south of Fern Valley Road within that road's right of way. Existing pipelines, where above ground, will be removed; where buried it will be abandoned after capping or filling with cement. Before any of that work can begin, many reports will be filed with state and federal offices. IWD has already paid \$18,000 to get the study started.

Vice President Peter Szabadi also briefed the board on the conversation he and Havener had with the project engineer for the new WWTP, Nathan Thomas of California Rural Water Association. The present contract is for the firm to complete 30% of the engineering. At that point, IWD will be eligible to apply for grants to fund the plant. Thomas said half of that preliminary engineering is done, and that the 30% point will take about four more months. They will need to have access to the property, which can only happen once the purchase has been completed, which should be soon.

The balance of the engineering is expected to take a year and cost \$300,000 to \$400,000. Their obligation also includes initial CEQA applications, which are required for grant applications. The company also will help with the grant process, including identifying sources and providing a grant writer. Legal counsel also has been asked which funding sources they should pursue. Kunkle noted, "We have four months to figure out where we will look for grants."

Kunkle also asked Havener for more information on the recent sewer pipe video inspection and cleaning with Houston and Harris. Havener said the information has been recorded. He will review it and share it at the next meeting, along with an assessment of what still needs to be cleaned or repaired.

The public session ended and the meeting continued in closed session as the board considered negotiations on the purchase of two land parcels, one for the WWTP. The next meeting is 6 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 20.

# FVWD budget surplus growing, streamflow bountiful

In a brief meeting last Thursday, the Fern Valley Water District's (FVWD) board of directors reviewed the end of fiscal year 2022-23 financial results and appointed a committee to review conservation incentives.

Last year's budget surplus topped half a million dollars.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023, FVWD's income was a pleasant surprise. As a result of higher-than-expected tax revenues, the total income of \$1.9 million was 10% greater than forecast when the budget was originally approved in June 2022. The tax revenue was \$170,000, more than 20% greater than the original projection of \$750,000.

Expenses were about \$100,000 or 7% less than the original projection. Both the operating and capital expenses contributed to this savings.

Operational savings totals \$55,000. The greatest savings was \$17,000 for employee benefits. Repairs, maintenance and salaries also were \$24,000 less than projected.

However, costs for filtration and chlorination grew 50% from \$40,000 to slightly more than \$60,000. This was largely attributable to the increase cost for the carbon changeout. FVWD General Manager Victor Jimenez said the district is now purchasing chlorine in bulk rather than trying to generate it at the filter plant.

"The equipment failed and is obsolete and replacing it with a new chlorine generation system would cost a fortune, so we opted to go with liquid chlorine deliveries," he said in an email. "We only have to order it every 12-18 months or so, so it is much more cost effective for us."

The capital budget was smaller than normal for fiscal year 2022-23 since no pipeline projects were started. Nevertheless, the total capital expenses were \$44,000 less than the projection. About two-thirds of the savings occurred because FVWD did not purchase new vehicles as planned. The balance was due to less spent on equipment and data control software.

The total budget surplus as of June 30 was \$510,000, more than twice the original estimate. FVWD's current cash reserves are about \$1.75 million.

During the review of the current budget, there was discussion about trying to reduce mailing costs for bills by sending them via email. However, Jimenez told the board, "We don't have enough email addresses."

President Gary Erb urged the staff to continue to solicit email addresses for customers in an effort to "go paperless."

Besides financial matters, the board discussed its current conservation incentives. Besides barrels for collecting rain, they recognized other options. Several years ago, FVWD, and other districts, provided a rebate when a customer installed a low-flush toilet. Currently, the district uses a rain capture program for rain barrels.

Director Jon Brown noted that his rain barrels are still full from the winter and spring precipitation and suggested the possibility of other incentives.

Consequently, Erb created a conservation committee, composed of directors Brown and Kevin Scott, to consider revising the policy or incentives.

"But it has been under utilized so we are going to be looking at some sort of customer-based leak detection program for the near future," Jimenez noted.

The district's water production was up 17% in July compared to June, according to Jimenez's operations report.

Water supply continues to be surface water, thanks to the bountiful precipitation this winter. Groundwater provided only 6% of July's water compared to 40% in July 2022.

"The creeks are fine just the way they are," Jimenez told the board.

Total 2023 water production, through June, was 15.2 million gallons, which is less than the same period in 2022 and less than the 10-year average for

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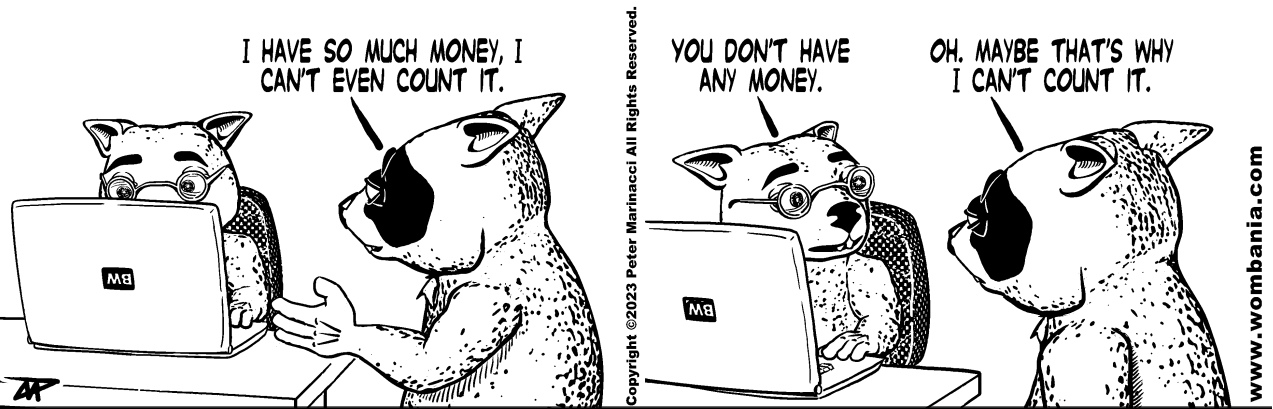

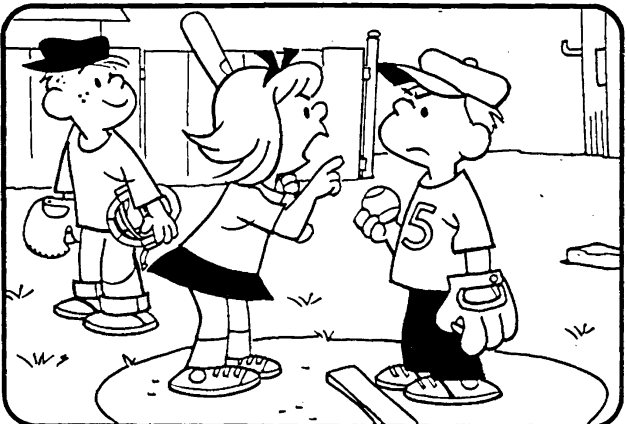

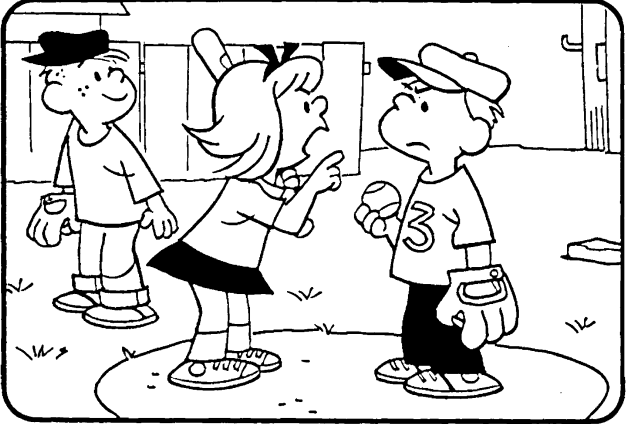

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# Local’s ties to Maui drive him to fundraise

Local resident Richard Montañó spent time last week in front of the post office doing his part to help survivors of Maui’s historic and devastating fires. He has some personal history in Maui and his son, Dylan, lives just outside Lahaina with his wife Rachel and their two children; a daughter who will soon be 5 and a son who is less than a year old.

Montañó has been in Idyllwild 48 years. Residents may remember him as, for 30 years, the proprietor of Mountain Footwear. Before that he tended bar for the Chart House and the Gastrognome.

He has been surprised at the outpouring of support by locals. “I can’t believe how many people here in Idyllwild know Maui, and Lahaina in particular. And people recognize that,” as Montañó puts it, “it could happen here.” Idyllwild and Lahaina seem to have a spiritual connection; if you like one, you’ll like the other.

“He’s OK,” he said of his son. “He’s been living there a long time. The money I’m raising is going to the people he’s helping, not to him. Dylan and Rachel were fortunate in that their kids and home were safe, but both lost their jobs when Lahaina was wiped out. Probably 10,000 are not working now.”

Front Street, the main commercial district, is “all gone, employees are gone, a lot are leaving.” There has been no electricity; water must be boiled. Phone service was also out. Wednesday last week, Montañó was able to speak with his son for five minutes; before that they had only managed a few words before the signal cut out.

As of Thursday morning, he had raised “over a grand” in addition to directing donors to several charities including The Maui Salvation Army and the Lahaina Cultural Center, Na’Aikane O Maui. The center held much of the area’s written history and

documents; Lahaina was the capital city of the Hawaiian Kingdom. The king had a small brick palace there, and another, later, and very stylish one, in Honolulu. That charred banyan tree you see on the news is on the site of the old “Brick Palace.”

Montañó became a father late in life. Now 86, Montañó was 44 when Dylan was born, and the new father gave up tobacco that year, anticipating the challenges of being an older dad. He remembers taking his son to his first Grateful Dead concert, dressing the then-13-year-old in tie-dye. “He’s a good human being. That’s the only thing I wanted him to be.” The apple, it seems, did not fall far from the tree.

Dylan, according to his father, is a master chef, and locals call him Chef Dylan. He worked his way through a lot of upscale places there: Marriot, Ritz Carlton, Royal Lahaina, including a high-end Mexican place called Frida’s Beach House after Frida Kahlo.

He is now one of many volunteers distributing food, water groceries, “whatever we can get them.” Maui is about a week from the mainland by ship, and, “Everything has to be shipped there; it’s backlogged, going real slow.” Even in normal conditions, packages take their time getting to the islands. “He’s telling me the boats are parked there and can’t be unloaded. The main port is burned.”

Although Montañó does not plan to continue sitting in front of the post office, he has other ideas to help, including “Music for Maui,” a musical fundraising event at the right local venue with local talent.

Father and son alike are attached to their homes. “He loves it there; he’s never going to come back. He wants us to move there, but I love Idyllwild, I’m never going to leave ... As I age, I might have to ... I enjoy life, I’ve been married 50 odd years. Marcia.”

## The Blue Breeze Band wraps up ISCS next week

Idyllwild's 2023 Summer Concert Series (ISCS) concludes Thursday night, Aug. 31, with The Blue Breeze Band at 7 p.m. Opening at 6:05 p.m. will be local singer/songwriter Terry Jo Stratton, accompanied by Lenny Hansell. This is the second year ISCS founder Ken Dahleen has stretched the season to nine shows.

The Blue Breeze Band perform a blend of past and present hits, highlighting Motown, rhythm and blues, and soul classics, while mixing in more contemporary hits. The band's energy is contagious, and their job is getting all kinds of crowds up and dancing. Leader Harold Wherry told the Crier about the band's recent activity: "This year we have performed at the Rose Bowl, grand opening for a Mazda dealership, two upscale malls, Japanese Gardens, corporate events, 4th of July celebration, lots of concerts in the park and several weddings. We have traveled as far north as San Luis Obispo and as far south as San Diego."

In addition to a horn section and bass, drums, keyboard and guitar, the Blue Breeze has a full chorus of vocal talent. Its lineup includes seven musicians. Wherry plays guitar, and is joined by singer Melodye Perry; Richard Moorings on keyboards, trombone and vocals; Tim Anderson on sax and vocals; Tyrone Griffin on trumpet and vocals; Jason Carpenter on drums and vocals; and bassist Eric Ward.

Wherry mentions that members of the band can be seen singing "doo-wop" in the Amazon feature film "Something From Tiffany's," and Harold himself plays guitar in the Warner Bros. movie "Why Do Fools Fall In Love."

Opening will be Terry Jo Stratton, one of Idyllwild's talented song-birds. Her original song writing chronicles the twists and turns that took her off the beaten path and here among us.

She told the Crier her story, one that will reverberate with many who have found sanctuary in our mountain community. "I have been on the Hill since the summer of 2016. I was without a permanent home and camping in Garner Valley, trying to figure out my next move in life. It was a very low time for me but not hopeless." A job at the old Sky Island health food store, making friends, waiting tables at Café Aroma, were all stations on the way to a fulfilling life full of the music she had always dreamed of making.

"I met Lenny while working at Café Aroma in 2017. His band, The Len Tones, was a real highlight for me there. So much fun. I began playing gigs at Café Aroma when I wasn't serving food, and gradually established myself as a singer songwriter in Idyllwild."

That brings us to Lenny Hansell, a multi-instrumentalist, singer, songwriter and "band master" originally from Hartford and Windsor, Connecticut. Over the years he has woven himself into the fabric of Idyllwild musical life, a generous and valued collaborator, loved by listeners and players alike.

As a teen he learned not just the instruments (starting with drums and bass) but also the "band craft" necessary to turn a bunch of players into a team. Hansell left home at 17, after auditioning for a Colorado rock and roll band over the phone. After a couple of years, he joined a western swing band touring Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. Forty-five years ago, he ended up here in Idyllwild. For 15 years he, along with the redoubtable Bill Plummer and Scotty Fulton, worked as Gas, Food and Lodging, Idyllwild's steady rolling working band. Hansell is happy to be backing up Stratton, and once more opening for his favorite among the many bands Dahleen brings to Idyllwild for ISCS.

These free concerts, funded completely by donations from local businesses, groups and individuals, are among the high points of summer life here in Idyllwild. 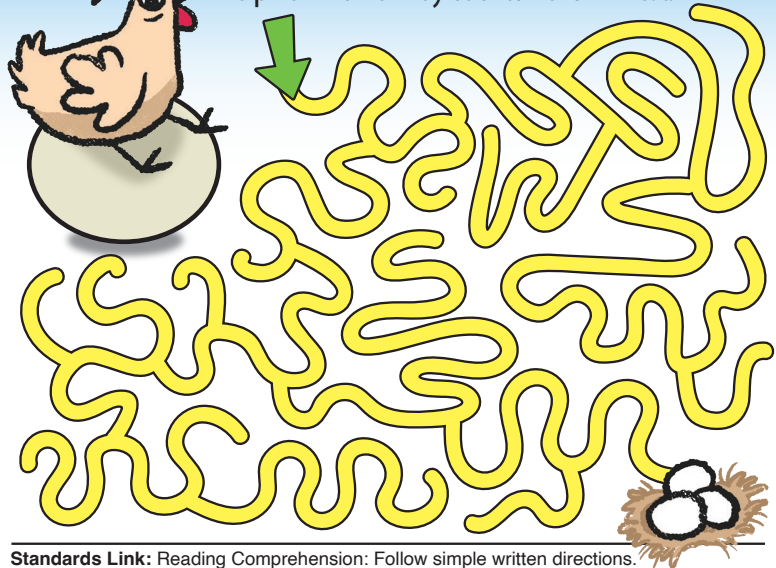
Ostriches lay their eggs in shallow pits they scratch into the dirt. Mother and father ostriches take turns lying on top of their eggs. The mother's brown feathers camouflage the egg in the day. The father's black feathers camouflage it at night.

Baby ostriches are only about 10 inches (25cm) tall. They weigh about 2 pounds—less than 1kg.

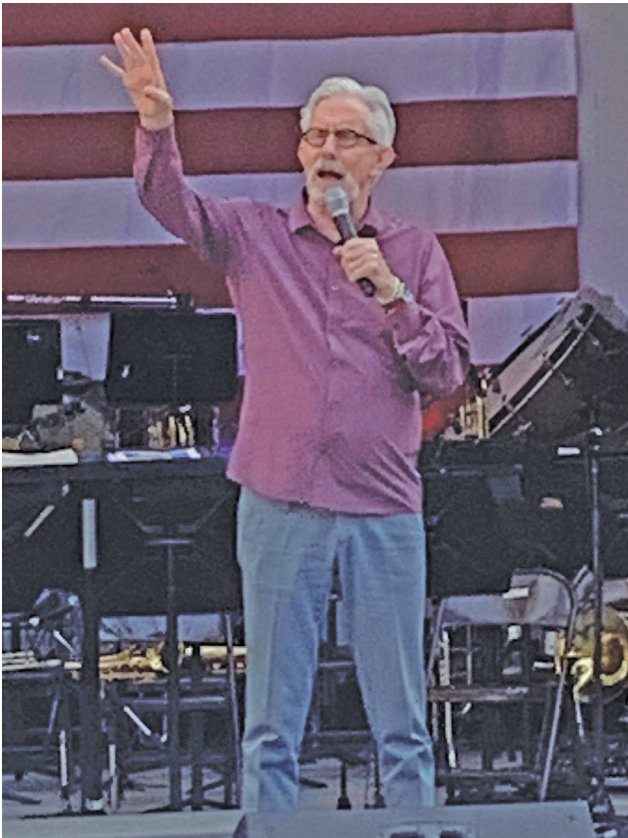

**Paul:** Yes, I'd love to be part of a family that wants a loving, loyal companion.

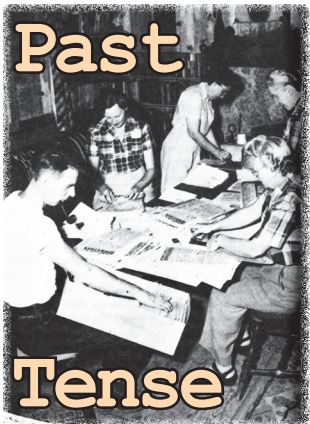

**Past Tense**

**75 years ago - 1948**  
At long last, a suitable place was found for a mountain branch of the county library — a small building on the Fern Valley Lodge property. Volunteer librarians were being sought.

**70 years ago - 1953**  
Sierra Club members of the rock-climbing division again tackled Tahquitz Rock. Several new routes had been opened up, the most challenging being Traitor Horn.

**65 years ago - 1958**  
A surprise party honored Nan Bohlen, last of a family of pioneers in Anza. She had sold the homestead and was preparing to leave the Hill.

**60 years ago - 1963**  
The Idyllwild Elemen-

tary Band party, tired but triumphant, arrived home from Europe after traveling nonstop for almost 40 hours.

**55 years ago - 1968**  
The Vietnam War affected the local school cafeteria. Dr. Robert Ferris, superintendent of schools, reported that because more supplies were going to Vietnam, surplus food used for the school lunch program had declined drastically.

**50 years ago - 1973**  
Nationwide meat shortages were affecting restaurants and markets on the Hill. Taylor's still had plenty of hamburgers to sell, but steaks were limited.

**45 years ago - 1978**  
More than 115 students and staff members were expected for the opening of the seventh-annual Wildwood Senior High Music Camp at Idyllwild Pines.

**40 years ago - 1983**  
The Hemet Unified School District Board of Trustees hired a professional research and planning firm to complete initial reports and assessments on all sites

proposed for the Garner Valley secondary school.

**35 years ago - 1988**  
Investigation was continuing into the arson fire that burned for more than three days and consumed 1,073 acres south of Banning.

**30 years ago - 1993**  
The Hemet Unified School District Board of Trustees reviewed a feasibility study on mandatory drug testing for high school students engaging in extracurricular activities.

**25 years ago - 1998**  
WNKI, the Hill's emergency broadcast radio station, celebrated its 10th anniversary and received a new transmitting device from KATY-FM that would allow a wider area of broadcast.

**20 years ago - 2003**  
Robert Lindquist, Lake Hemet Municipal Water District general manager, said that future development of Garner Valley would depend on the results of a new groundwater study of the Garner Valley basin.

**15 years ago - 2008**  
The Idyllwild Cham-

ber of Commerce led a discussion of the Riverside County noise ordinance in an attempt to solve the controversy between restaurant owners, musicians and patrons who wanted to hear live music performed in town and people who objected to the noise.

**10 years ago - 2013**  
EarthWitness Foundation was hosting a fundraiser for victims of the Mountain Fire. The event was to include a comedian, musicians, a silent auction and hors d'oeuvres.

**5 years ago - 2018**  
Jeremy Greene, 23, of Oceanside, was arrested for the stabbing of Darryl Schollt. Greene was charged with three felony counts, including assault with a deadly weapon and possession of a firearm.

**1 year ago - 2022**  
In the July operations report, a 19% loss of water raised the eyebrows of Idyllwild Water District directors. General Manager Leo Havener said he did not know why so much, 275,000 gallons, was lost. He supposed it could be a leak that no one told IWD about.
