Supervisors extend STR moratorium; expect new ordinance within year

At its Aug. 29 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved an extension of the moratorium on issuing new short-term rental (STR) certificates in Idyllwild (including Pine Cove) and the Wine Country.

The new Ordinance 449.253 is effective immediately and will expire in one year or once revised Ordinance 927.2 (STRs) goes into effect, whichever is sooner.

While the final vote was unanimous, 5-0, Chair Kevin Jeffries (1st District) made it clear that he was agreeing to the extension reluctantly. Last October, when he voted for the current extension, which expires Sept. 9, he thought that would give the Planning Department sufficient time to draft, discuss and present a revised STR ordinance. Regardless, John Hildebrand, Code Enforcement director, told the board that state law prohibits any further extensions for this purpose. And he expects to bring a proposed STR ordinance to the board for review within a few months.

"This [request for extending the moratorium] is for one year, the maximum time frame," he told the board. "We don't intend to take that, but we're not sure how much time — six months or a year. But we're moving on the project as we speak."

The proposed revised Ordinance 927.2 was presented to the Planning Commission Aug. 23. The commission recommended the board approve it.

Public speakers

Several Idyllwild residents or owners of STRs in Idyllwild did make statements to the board during the public comment period.

Two veterans of this struggle — Joel Feingold and Jon Brown — addressed the board.

Feingold supported the extension and approval of the revised ordinance. He mentioned several issues or problems the expansion of STRs in the community has imposed on both Idyllwild and Pine Cove residents. For example, while he understands how using one's house, whether primary or secondary, as an STR will help pay costs such as the mortgage, he lamented the occasions where the proximity of an STR requires the neighbors "... to help pay the mortgage with their serenity."

He is concerned that housing costs are increasing due to demand for STRs, thus changing the composition of the community's population. "We need affordable long-term rentals for the workers and for the old-timers who support our community organizations."

Brown, another long-term resident and an STR owner, opposed the extension and wants the board to delay changing the STR ordinance for a few years. This would allow both planning staff and the board sufficient time to obtain better understanding of how last year's changes will affect the issue, thus more effectively assessing changes. "Governing should have its own Hippocratic

Copter crash preliminary report released

The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) has released a preliminary report on the helicopter crash that took the lives of Cal Fire Assistant Chief and Idyllwild native Josh Bischof, Cal Fire Capt. Tim Rodriguez and contract pilot Tony Souza. The crash occurred while Bischof and Rodriguez were responding to the Broadway Fire, near Cabazon, Sunday evening, Aug. 6.

The report states that at 6:44 p.m., two helicopters assigned to the fire collided midair. The smaller craft, a Bell 407 registered as N555AS, was destroyed, and the larger, a Sikorsky s-64 registered as N4037S, landed safely with only minor damage to its landing gear.

The two helicopters took off from Hemet Ryan Airport (HMT), the Bell at 6:34 p.m. and the Sikorsky three minutes later. Traveling north-northeast, the Bell crossed the western spur of the San Jacinto Mountains and completed a 360-degree, counter-clockwise loop over the foothills before entering the valley and heading northeast toward the fire.

The Sikorsky took a more direct path to the northeast. The report relies on ADS-B data to determine the flight paths, Automatic Dependent Surveillance-Broadcast, a system that broadcasts an aircraft's position, enabling ground air traffic stations to track it. This data showed the two craft "on a converging flight path, until the time of collision, located about 2 nautical miles west of the Broadway Fire, at an altitude of 2,375 to 2,400 feet mean sea level. The fire was about a mile south of the I-10 freeway.

The report continues: "The wreckage of the Bell came to rest on a steep and rocky hillside about 1,050 ft off the last recorded ADS-B data point. A post-crash fire ensued and consumed the fuselage. The debris

path was about 950 ft by 550 ft, in which all major components of the helicopter were located.

"The beginning of the debris path was identified by a piece of delaminated main rotor blade, which was about 560 feet east of the approximate collision area."

The impact was described as follows: "About 830 feet southeast of the first delaminated blade component, a ground scar as determined to be the fuselage's initial impact point. It was followed by a 20-foot-long ground scar ... that extended to the engine, which was displaced and located adjacent to rock boulders. The main wreckage was found about 45ft east of the engine." Other components came to rest within 470 feet to the west of the main wreckage.

The report implies that the Bell rotors collided with a Sikorsky tire. "The right main landing gear tire was damaged, with an approximate 12-inch portion not located."

The report describes the weather conditions as clear with no cloud ceiling, and VMC, Visual Meteorological Conditions, meaning conditions in which pilots are able to navigate and maintain safe clearance from terrain and other craft visually. The wind speed was noted as 9 mph, and the visibility at 10 miles. All information in preliminary reports is "subject to change."

NTSB reports state that "The NTSB does not assign fault or blame for an accident or incident; rather, as specified by NTSB regulation, accident/incident investigations are fact-finding proceedings with no formal issues and no adverse parties ... and are not conducted for the purpose of determining the rights or liabilities of any person."

Final reports do attempt to document and understand the chain of actions by pilots and ground control leading up to an incident. These final reports may take a year to be "adopted" and published.



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Hot or drenched sums up Hill weather in 2023

This year, 2023, has been one of many weather surprises, extremes and changes — from winter’s record precipitation to the moderate spring, a boiling summer and then a rare hurricane appearance last month.

In the final weeks of July, Idyllwild set five high temperature records; then last week, another high temperature record was tied. On Wednesday, Aug. 30, the daytime temperature reached 93 degrees. In 80 years of weather data, the only other time 93 degrees occurred on an Aug. 30 in Idyllwild was recorded in 1955, nearly 70 years ago.

While the record heat remains our most recent memory, perhaps precipitation will be the actual long-

term memory from 2023.

Hurricane Hilary brought more rain to the Hill, but this merely added to the volume that has fallen throughout the year. The National Weather Service (NWS) defines a “water year” as the precipitation recorded from Oct. 1 through Sept. 30 of the following year.

As of Aug. 31, three local weather stations had already recorded more precipitation in the 11 months of the current water year than the water year average for the past 75 years. The average since 1948 has been 25.7 inches in a year.

At the Idyllwild Fire Department, 28.5 inches has been recorded since October 2022. At the Dutch Flats station, NWS has 32 inches and at the Forest Service’s Keenwild Station, 33.2 inches have fallen.

In the past 10 years, the average precipitation has been 21.9 inches, about 85% of the longer-term average. The Dutch Flats and Keenwild recording stations have already exceeded the annual average in precipitation since Jan. 1.

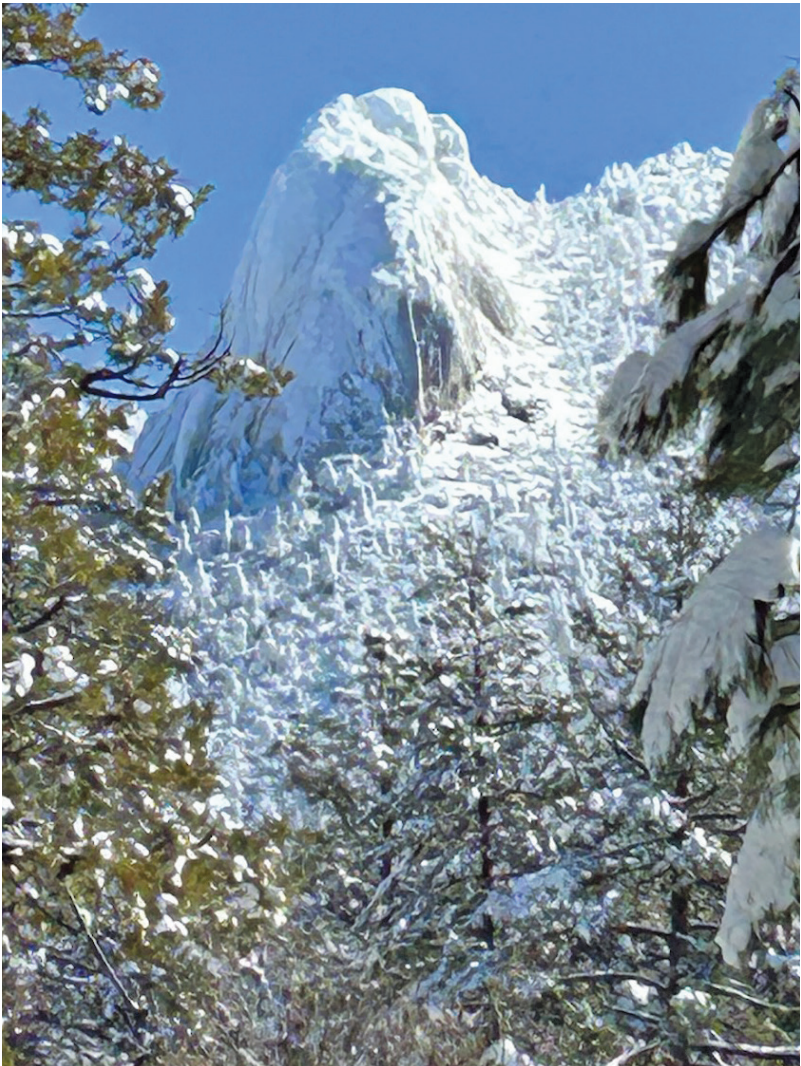
For the Hill, NWS is reporting 36.8 inches of precipitation so far this water year.

All of this rain has virtually eliminated drought conditions throughout the state. As of Wednesday, Aug. 30, only 6.6% of California was in a drought condition. Slightly more than 5.3% was abnormally dry and 1.3% is suffering from moderate drought conditions. None of the state is incurring severe, extreme or exceptional drought.

August 2019 was the last time this much of California was void of any drought conditions.





Harper seemingly concedes that, as Abrams' boyfriend, who continues to live on and manage her properties, he is a natural suspect, but asserts that he loved her and "people do not kill people they love."

No arrests were ever made. The program concluded with an appeal to viewers to contact the Riverside County Sheriff's Office if they believe they have seen Abrams or if they have any information that may help authorities locate her or learn what happened to her.

Sunday, Sept. 3, an episode of the "Disappeared" television series entitled "Love and Lies in Idyllwild" aired on national television. DirecTV carried it locally on channel 285, the Investigation Discovery Network. The episode concerned the June 6, 2020, disappearance of Dia Abrams, who at that time owned three properties in Garner Valley, including a 166-acre horse ranch and two other residences.

The program consisted largely of extensive interviews with persons involved with Abrams, including close friends Diane Fedder and Julie Sanford, Abrams' boyfriend, Keith Harper, who managed her properties with her, Matt Owens, who is attorney for Abrams' children, Clinton and Crisara, and Jenny Kirchner, who at the time of Abrams' disappearance, was a reporter and photographer for the Idyllwild Town Crier newspaper. By means of those interviews, the following information was presented:

Legal issues abound. Dia Abrams was not included in the will of her late husband. Clin-

ton and Crisara were included in a trust her husband set up for them. Harper and Fedder were original trustees of Dia Abrams' trust, but Fedder has since resigned.

Abrams was reported missing by Harper when she did not return one night to any of her homes. She is not believed to have gone away on her own because she left behind her purse, her cellphone, her truck and the keys to it, a large sum of cash, her dog and many farm animals.

Friends of Abrams conducted extensive searches of her properties for her. Psychics were employed to attempt to learn what happened to Abrams. On the suggestion of one psychic, Riverside County Sheriff's dive team searched Lake Hemet for her body. Harper indicated in his interview that he believed that search was perfunctory and incomplete.

Abrams' relationship with her children was not warm. Fedder related that Abrams once told her, "If anything ever happens to me, my son Clinton did it." She notes that Clinton did not participate in the extensive searches for Abrams. Clinton released a written statement asserting that he had a loving relationship with his mother and that allegations casting blame on Abrams' family are made by others to cover their own responsibility for her disappearance.

oath," he told the supervisors. "Do no harm and do not make the cure worse than the disease."

More specifically, he asked the board to address the issue that many STR owners, especially on the Hill, were not notified last summer to renew their STR certificates before the moratorium took effect in September. Many of these people continued to pay the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT), but eventually the county had them stop renting because they did not have a current certificate.

"They were never properly notified. When they discovered their permits had lapsed, they had no recourse to rectify the expiration. Give the prior permit holders an immediate path to rectify the expired permits," he recommended.

Many of the other speakers were caught in this situation. They had STRs in Idyllwild or Pine Cove, which were listed on Airbnb, paid the TOT and had no complaints. Yet, they failed to recognize the need to renew it, their certificate expired and the county could not renew it during the moratorium.

Geraldo Morales invested in a cabin he wanted to rent but did not realize that a moratorium was pending. "I was caught by surprise and not one word from the county," he said with disappointment and opposed extension of the moratorium.

Darica Diers, an STR owner in Idyllwild, explained to the board that STR owners contribute to the local economy. Not only did she pay more than \$9,700 in TOT in 2022, but salaries and wages to her staff were nearly \$23,000.

Others in similar situations included Isabelle Dubois, Nan Harrold and Amy Stahl-Gunduz. They all opposed the moratorium's extension. Harrold suggested that STR owners selected

through the lottery be given some time, such as six weeks, to ensure their property will comply with the STR regulations before the county initiates an inspection of the facility.

Board comments

Except for Jeffries, most of the supervisors' comments were brief or questions. Supervisor V. Manuel Perez (4th District) asked Hildebrand to have more enforcement data on the number of complaints about STRs and their disposition when he brings the proposed revisions to the board. Before the vote, Perez noted, "I'm not ready to lift the moratorium."

Supervisor Karen Spiegel (2nd District) asked why Mountain Center was being removed from the moratorium extension. Hildebrand responded that the concentration of STRs in that neighborhood was different and "doesn't pose the challenge as it does in Idyllwild."

Supervisor Chuck Washington (3rd District) stressed that the moratorium was always intended to be temporary, "... never the intent to have the moratorium go on forever. Staff had to analyze the impacts of STRs, which had gone well beyond what the communities could stand."

Jeffries agreed with the original moratorium but was disappointed that it needed to go beyond the original year.

"I do not like extending the moratorium. I understood the reason the first time. But property rights exist on both sides of the fence. Not only the owner but the neighbor. But I feel the county staff should have been able to address these issues by today," he said.

However, Jeffries, along with his four colleagues, voted to approve the extension for up to one year or when Ordinance 927.2 becomes effective.

Charging stations coming to I-10

Caltrans begins work on a \$4.9 million project to install Zero Emissions Vehicle Charging Stations on I-10 near Banning, Blythe and Yucaipa, weather permitting. Completion date is tentatively May 1, 2024.

Caltrans crews begin work at the east and westbound Whitewater rest areas, and the eastbound Wildwood rest area on the I-10.

Regular hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays. No lane or ramp closures are expected on a regular basis but may take place intermittently to move equipment into the rest areas.

The new ZEV charging stations will utilize a portion of the existing parking lot. Use caution when around the work area.

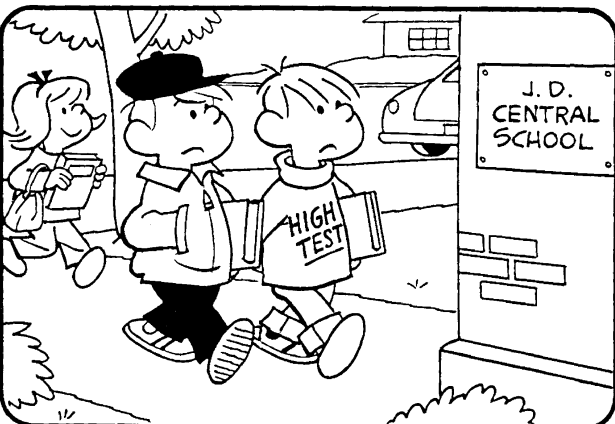

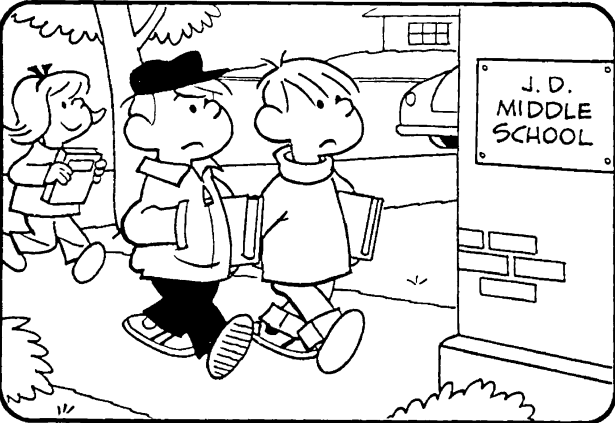

Supervisors approve agreement with Cal Fire

The renewal of a joint fire services agreement among the state, county and local cities was approved at the Aug. 29 meeting of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors.

This agreement will cover three fiscal years, beginning with the current one, 2023-24, and will expire June 30, 2026.

County Fire Chief Bill Weiser made the presentation to the board. It will address fire protection, advanced life support (paramedical), technical rescues and hazardous materials responses.

“We are an all-hazard fire department,” he said. Later he added, “This is the most advanced fire department that I know of.”

For fiscal year 2020-21, the first year of the prior agreement, the cost was \$212.9 million, of which more than half was paid by the county’s cities for fire services. The first year of the new agreement, which began July 1, will cost \$281.1 million. The county portion of the \$68.3 million increase is about \$34.8 million.

Much of the total increase will be for salaries, as the new agreement will have the firefighters’ workweek shift from 72 hours to 66 hours. This was negotiated with state officials.

Weiser noted that currently, Riverside County Fire Department (RCFD) staff a fire station with eight personnel per week, so that three are there every day. Beginning next year, nine personnel will staff each station.

During his presentation, Weiser said the current vacancy rate was 12.8%. But that does not account for the 73 new hires in July and another 24 to begin in September. However, he shared that in recent years RCFD has had to invest more in recruitment than previously. “In the past we didn’t have to advertise, but that’s not true now. We have a recruitment task force for Riverside County,” he stated.

The greatest number of vacancies is in the Firefighter II (paramedic) group. Weiser believes that during the pandemic when schools were shuttered, fewer graduates and individuals were looking for this work.

After Weiser’s presentation, there was little discussion and the board unanimously approved the new cooperative agreement.

Family planning 99th birthday for Earlie Mae

The family of Idyllwild resident Earlie Mae Brosterhous is preparing to celebrate her 99th birthday, which will occur Thursday, Sept. 14. Although census figures are a little vague, she may be our oldest resident. The Crier spoke with Earlie Mae and her son Gary this week to find out more about her life and times.

Earlie Mae was born in 1924, in Portsmouth Virginia, to Lemuel and Earlie Mae Johnson. Her father was disabled in the “Great War” (gassed) and had a pension. Her parents handed their own names down to their first two children, Lemuel and Earlie Mae, who were joined by a younger sister, Mary Lou.

Gary told us that he had always assumed his grandmother was born in early May, but found out that she was named after the doctor that delivered her, a Dr. Earlie.

Earlie Mae recalled that her brother Lemuel, who as an adult worked in the shipyard there in Portsmouth, made Mary Lou a little row boat. Mary Lou would coax her older, but less adventurous, sister into trips across the Elizabeth River to Norfolk, where they would have lunch. Their parents had the means to provide their children enrichment activities like piano lessons and “elocution” classes. She enjoyed Home Economics class at school.

During the war she worked as a secretary at the shipyard. It was there she met her husband-to-be, Ray. “One of the ensigns there at the shipyard, who was married, said a ship was coming in with a fellow he wanted me to meet. He used to set me up with dates.” Earlie Mae recalled her first impression of Lt. Brosterhous: “It was good ... His kindness, he was really sweet. Everybody loved Ray.” And Ray, according to Gary, adored Earlie Mae. After a year dating, the pair married and moved to California. Ray, nine years older than his wife, already had an engineering degree from UC Berkeley.

The couple had five children over a span of 17 years: Ray II, Mary Lou, Patricia, Dennis and Gary. These children have in turn produced 14 grandchildren, and six great-grandchildren. “I really got something started, didn’t I?” quipped the near-centenarian. Two of the children, Patricia and Ray II, became attorneys. Ray II served as deputy attorney IV for the state of California.

Despite nearly 80 years in California she still has her Southern drawl, and a twinkle in her eyes. “I like to have

fun” comes out often, along with “I’m a party person.” Happy hour around the Brosterhous house is 4 o’clock, and she enjoys a bourbon and Coke “every day.” Sometimes a shrimp cocktail. She always loved to “over-decorate” for the holidays. Just last year Gary came home to find his mother had decorated their 7-foot Christmas tree by herself; at least as high as she could reach. She is still getting around without walker or cane, and “she still folds all of our laundry for us.”

Earlie Mae and Ray lived in Long Beach, where Ray worked for the city for 30 years, retiring in 1980 from his position as director of Building and Safety. In the early ’70s, the family built a little cabin in Idyllwild. Gary recalls; “Dad was very hands on. He had it framed and shelled, and members of the family finished it. I put insulation in as a 10-year-old with my mom.”

In 1980 they built a full-time home up here for retirement. “Dad’s hobby was building things. He wanted to correct all the things he thought were shortcomings in the cabin.” Even in retirement, Ray continued to work with local architects, designers and builders, names like David Lilieholm and Robert Priefer. He contributed architectural services to the construction of the new firehouse for the Idyllwild Fire Department (IFD) in 1984, one of many contributions from local professionals and tradespeople that brought the project in under budget.

Earlie Mae and Ray found a social circle in the Rotary Club and Queen of Angels Church. She was a Rotary Ann and chaired many committees at the church. They participated in the Idyllwild Garden Club Home Tours; Ray had a green thumb. They donated to causes like IFD and a new radio tower for WNKI. Ray was on the board for the Pine Cove Property Owners Association.

While raising their family, Earlie Mae and Ray took the kids across the U.S. and Canada. During retirement, Ray and Earlie Mae traveled the world; Australia and New Zealand (“beautiful”), China (“Shanghai”), Europe (“France, Belgium, Italy, the Netherlands”) and the Holy Land (“Bethlehem, Jerusalem, Egypt.”) They went to Hawaii at least 20 times. “Sometimes twice a year. Our friends had a place in Kona.”

Sometimes they traveled with neighbors and church-fellows, the Shinkles. Other friends included Cal and Anne Ashby, Ralph and Violet Hamilton, and Mike and Fran Valen.

When the challenges of Hill life became too arduous, the couple moved to Hemet. Ray continued to come back to Idyllwild for Rotary meetings, Gary meeting

him at the Cranston Ranger Station to drive the mountain road. Ray died passed away in 2007, at 92. In 2020, during the pandemic, Gary moved Mom back up to Idyllwild, where she occupies a “granny flat” adjoining the home where he and husband Gary Agner are raising their now-teenage daughters, Emily and Sarah.

Gary said his mother “loves dogs, in particular Max, our rat terrier. Gary [Agner] brought him home from the pound and the dog has never forgotten.” Max is known affectionately as “that rotten little dog” on account of his ferocity toward all those who fall outside the small circle of his favored humans. “She always had Scotties and Westies, at one time one of each.”

Earlie Mae still reads the Crier regularly. She enjoys reading about developments in the community: things like the new community center and the amphitheater; groups like Helping Hearts on the Hill (Sarah Oates visits weekly). She likes to see the community spirit here. She is still learning new things: local artist Denise Gioeli gives her art lessons twice a week, and her home is decorated with her watercolors of flowers.

The family is planning a small event at home for her 99th birthday, but plans are underway for her 100th, next September. “Hopefully at the new community center, if not, at Town Hall. Maybe Mayor Max will come!”

Phyllis Mueller’s “office of Mayor Max” will celebrate the first birthday of Mayor Max III and Vice Mayor Meadow from 1 to 3 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 9. Mountain Paws will host the party and the public, human and four-legged, is invited.

Mueller promises a lively time: VIPs both human (Leonard Purvis, formerly captain of Riverside County Sheriff’s Hemet Station) and furry (Ajay the Llama, “We’ll try to make sure he doesn’t spit.”). Special guests will include Max and Meadow’s mother, Storm. The family have not seen (or smelled) each other since the pair were picked up in Utah in November 2022. Two members of this year’s litter, Hawkins and Cassie, will accompany Storm. Food, refreshments and even a band are included.

The various Mayors Max have been the figureheads of an impressive philanthropic and animal welfare activism effort by Mueller and her husband Glenn Warren. They have been fielding a golden retriever mayor since July 1, 2012, so are now two months into their 12th year.

“It has been wonderful, a complete joy,” she said. “A lot of work, but I love doing it. For example, during COVID I did 1,400 private visits at my house. I made them drive to the house; I couldn’t draw a crowd. They met him on the driveway; they had to wear masks. I only allowed one car at a time. They lined up in the driveway. The school and hospital visits we did on FaceTime, and we did meetings on Zoom. Across the U.S., Malaysia, the UK, Brazil. We still do that. We do it in real time; we got a call 11:30 one night, guys having a party. They wanted to meet the mayor. And girls are of-

ten so effusive.”

Mueller estimates that she and the mayors have met over 1 million people during this adventure. This is not implausible; taking out a year for COVID-19, that still leaves over 500 weekends; and anyone who has visited or passed by the throngs of visitors that mob Mayor Max and his entourage downtown during their weekly “meet and greets” will agree that 2,000 a week is a possibility. Then there are the innumerable visits to hospitals and senior living facilities, and parties: “Labor Day I have so many events: Private parties, a bachelor party, a wedding, the Idyllwild Area Historical Society ...”

Then there is the more serious part of the mission: helping people in material or spiritual need. “We have created Mayor Max’s Peace on Earth Team, called POET, and that’s where we ask people to help create peace on Earth through their loving actions.” It is not a charity seeking donations but seek to find donors (“angels”) who can help a neighbor. Several elders experiencing or in danger of homelessness have been assisted in finding affordable rentals or given RVs or trailers. Beyond comforting words for those in grief, they have managed to find pro-bono help for those in dark passages. She coaches and mentors when she can and remains a friend to those she meets.

“My husband and I are in the

How did Sue find this fossil?
“I was pretty lucky,” remembers Sue. “But it does take more than just luck,” she admits. Sue Hendrickson also knew the right kind of rock to explore.

Fossil Hunters Know Rocks
Different layers of rocks were formed at different times in the earth’s history. This chart, called a **stratigraphic column**, can help you discover in which kinds of rocks T. rex fossils could be found.

Time	Rock Layer	Description
Paleocene 56 to 65 million years ago		Mudstone—flood plain deposit, contains mammal fossils
Cretaceous 66 to 144 million years ago	 	Sandstone—river deposit Shale—deep ocean deposit, contains ammonites, mosasaurs and plesiosaurs
Jurassic 145 to 199 million years ago		Chalk—ocean deposit, contains marine reptiles
Triassic 200 to 251 million years ago		Sandstone—river deposit
Paleozoic 252 to 541 million years ago		Limestone—shallow ocean deposit, contains shells

 In North America, Tyrannosaurus rex lived between 66 to 90 million years ago. They did not have wings to fly or fins to swim.

Why is this T. rex named Sue?
Because it was found by Sue Hendrickson. She found the fossilized bones of this amazing T. rex in the summer of 1990 when she was a fossil hunter for the Black Hills Institute of Geological Research in Hill City, South Dakota.

75 years ago - 1948
"Don't look for the Town Crier next week," advised the editor. "We're skipping every other week to do our winter chores."

70 years ago - 1953
The Marais-Miranda folk opera "African Heartbeat" premiered at the Bowman, but the weather was so cold the audience huddled in blankets.

65 years ago - 1958
Anza Electric Cooperative was conducting a survey to see how many potential users there might be for telephone service in Anza.

60 years ago - 1963
The Palm Springs

Aerial Tramway was getting set to open.

55 years ago - 1968
Prolonged drought had turned brush lands into a living tinderbox. Low rainfall had been recorded for more than 18 years.

50 years ago - 1973
Five occupants of a house on Fern Valley Drive barely escaped death when their house, along with two cars, was destroyed by a fire. The fire originated from a can of ashes removed from the fire-place and placed on the deck. Burn holes could be seen in the bottom of the burned-out can. The family dog perished.

45 years ago - 1978
More than 51,000 people visited the mountain area over Labor Day weekend, according to figures the U.S. Forest Service compiled. Of that number, 23,648 visited Idyllwild.

40 years ago - 1983
The Garner Valley Volunteer Firefighters barbecue was called a "great success," with

nearly 700 people attending the dinner and dance. Proceeds were to be used for fire and rescue equipment.

35 years ago - 1988
Heavy, last-minute enrollment and a power outage added to the usual hectic activity at area schools during the first day of the new school year.

30 years ago - 1993
The Disaster Preparedness Committee was working to purchase caches of medical supplies for each of its Neighborhood Collection Points on the Hill.

25 years ago - 1998
The fifth-annual Jazz in the Pines festival was very successful with a 25% increase in attendance over the previous year.

20 years ago - 2003
The Bobcats, an Idyllwild American Youth Soccer Organization that Chris Read coached, came back champions of a regional tournament. The five girls went undefeated in four games to win the girls under age 10

tournament.

15 years ago - 2008
Internationally recognizable Camel and Marlboro man Bob Beck died at home in Idyllwild after a difficult struggle with cancer.

10 years ago - 2013

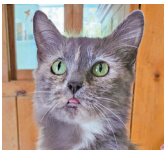
