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

## Fern Valley access to Humber Park to be temporarily closed

Beginning Sunday, Oct. 1, vehicular access to Humber Park will be restricted to hikers coming down Devil's Slide Trail or coming from town along the Ernie Maxwell Trail.

Since last month, Riverside County has been doing major road work, including reconstruction and repaving, on several roads in Idyllwild. This includes Fern Valley Road, the only way to access Humber Park by car or bicycle.

Fern Valley Road will be resurfaced from South Circle Dr. to Humber Park, about 1.7 miles. However, just before the entrance to Humber Park, the county needs to construct a retaining wall below the road edge.

Because of the equipment and narrow area, the county will need to close access to Humber Park for vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians for about two weeks when this portion of the work commences. Also, parking will not be per-

mitted on Fern Valley Road during the closure.
When this occurs, the U.S. Forest Service will post signs on the Pacific Crest Trail, especially at the juncture with Devil's Slide Trail, so that hikers will know they can still get into town for food, rest or mail via the Ernie Maxwell Trail,

which has access in the Humber Park parking lot. "We're not issuing a [park] closure order. The trails are open," stressed Gustavo Bahena, public affairs specialist for the San Bernardino National Forest.

Weather and other events could alter the schedule, Andrea Suarez, the county's information consultant, stressed.

Besides the retaining wall before Humber Park, the county also plans to adjust water valves and guardrail height along Fern Valley Road. Other work will include placing a shoulder edge, re-applying pavement striping, and removing and installing various signs.

The other roads where work has been done are Saunders Meadows Road and South Circle Drive. Resurfacing of .7 miles of North Circle Drive also is part of the project.

The county Transportation Maintenance Yard and Lawler Lodge are the two specific locations where resurfacing will be done and may affect traffic passing near

The approximate cost for all the roadwork is \$5.1 million. For more information before and during the project work, a Construction Hotline (877-277-5343) is available to call. Also, Riverside County Transportation has a website with project information at: rcprojects.org/Idyllwild.

## Strawberry Creek Bridge improvement

Caltrans will begin work on a \$17.9 million bridge retrofit and upgrade project on Highway 74 at Strawberry Creek between Mountain Center and Valle Vista, as well as Morrill Canyon Bridge near Lake Elsinore.

The project was awarded to Beador Construction Company of Costa Mesa. The project will upgrade and preserve the historical bridges. Improvements will include retrofit and upgrades with slab overlay and new guardrail systems on the existing bridges, bringing lane and shoulder widths up to current standards.

Strawberry Creek Bridge will begin late September. The construction schedule is subject to materials availability and weather conditions.

The hours of operation will be from 6 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. seven days a week. Temporary traffic signals will occur with one-way traffic control at each end of the

## Audit argues for greater **CPUC** oversight of utilities costs, rate requests

At the end of August, California State Auditor Grant Parks released his agency's audit of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and the California Public Advocates Office (Cal Advocates). The audit looked at the agencies' review and participation in the rate requests from California's three largest electric utilities and natural gas company — Pacific Gas & Electric, San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E), Southern California Edison (SCE) and Southern California Gas Company.

The review assessed how CPUC and Cal Advocates conducted and participated in the hearings for increases of electric and natural gas rates.

While the audit found no criminal nor scathing behavior, the conclusions clearly show that both CPUC and Cal Advocates could do more to ensure the public understood the reasons for rate increases, as well as ensuring that the utilities were making the expenditures for which their rate increases were approved.

In his letter to the governor and Legislature, Parks wrote, "CPUC and Cal Advocates need to strengthen their monitoring of utilities' costs, and the CPUC needs to provide greater transparency when authorizing rate changes.'

Parks is concerned with electric rates California users are paying. Not only did he acknowledge, "Californians currently pay some of the highest utility rates in the country," he argued that the two state agencies could do more to oversee utility expenditures and rate requests.

Electric rates have climbed significantly the past seven years due to the utilities' soaring costs. The auditor noted that SCE's costs grew 15% between 2017 and 2020 and then another 37% between 2020 and 2023.

While the utilities are legislatively authorized monopolies, the increase in costs and subsequent rate of growth is not simply monopoly manipulation. Several important trends have and are still occurring that have a significant effect on these companies and can be seen throughout the Hill communities.

Over the past two decades, the frequency and extent of wildfires has grown by 60%, from 347,000 incidents in 2007 to more than 554,000 last year. While the acreage burned was about 311,000 in 2022, it was greater than 2.5 million acres in 2019 and 2020. Six of the seven largest fires in state history have all occurred since 2020 and only six of the 20 largest fires occurred before

Expenses to repair fire damage and to mitigate future fire damage have grown considerably for the state's largest utilities. The CPUC reported that SCE's wildfire-related costs have grown from nearly \$290 million in 2019 to more than \$1.7 billion in 2021, representing about 12% of its total annual revenue requirement.

Another trend affecting utility costs is creating an unexpected consequence to electricity rates. Utilities are encouraging greater private use of solar electricity. First, these customers are using less electricity, which results in a loss of revenue. Secondly, the utilities also compensate these customers for any solar-generated power fed into the grid. ## How strong will El Niño be this winter?

As autumn arrives, and the temperatures cool and rain diminishes, people can enjoy some time outside hiking, eating, shopping and being with friends.

But winter follows autumn, just as crying and dirty diapers follow the birth of a beautiful baby.

The winter of 2023 was a relatively wet season for Southern California. Meteorologists and climatologists are now assessing what weather conditions may occur in 2024.

El Niño conditions have already appeared in the tropical Eastern Pacific. Typically, El Niño brings a wet winter to Southern California, but not always and several recent El Niño winters have been dry.

During most of the summer, weather scientists have concluded that a strong El Niño has arrived. The Climate Prediction Center of the National Weather Service (NWS) has already issued an El Niño Advisory.

"Forecasters are more confident in a 'strong' El Niño event," NWS reported on Aug. 10. "El Niño is anticipated to continue through the Northern Hemisphere winter (with greater than a 95% chance through December 2023-February 2024)," was the Sept. 3 forecast.

While many of the models are congruently predicting a strong El Niño, at this point, before winter, these are simply probabilities.

'However, there are many varieties or 'flavors' of El Niño that can contribute to different climate outcomes in California, and only time will tell if this winter has above or below average rains and coastal storms," wrote Joseph Smith, staff geologist for the California Coastal Commission for its meeting Sept. 6

Daniel Swain, climate scientist at

the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles, on his YouTube broadcast last week, noted some possibility that "strong" may be premature.

Besides the oceanic temperature differentials that define an El Niño or La Niña, atmospheric temperatures also play an important role. The water temperatures between the east and west Pacific are indicating the arrival of a strong El Niño.

However, the Northern Pacific has warmed, which can increase the air temperature affecting the jet stream this winter. If this occurs, the chances of a strong El Niño diminish if the jet stream does not drop further south.

So while the models suggest "a relatively classic El Niño winter where central and Southern California experience wetter than average conditions ... it could have a relatively dry and warmer condition," he noted.

But Swain eventually opined that the wetter weather is more likely. His conclusion was, "It is more likely than

usual to be a dramatic winter in California," primarily during the January March period.

He hypothesized that the oceanic temperature

differentials may generate storms that might have the potential to carry even more moisture than normal tropical storms.

#### FTC warns about new AI technology

You get a call. There's a panicked voice on the line. It's your grandson. He says he's in deep trouble — he wrecked the car and landed in jail. But you can help by sending money. You take a deep breath and think. You've heard about grandparent scams. But darn, it sounds just like him. How could it be a scam? Voice cloning, that's how.

Artificial intelligence (AI) is no longer a far-fetched idea out of a sci-fi movie. A scammer could use AI to clone the voice of your loved one. All he needs is a short audio clip of your family member's voice — which he could get from content posted online — and a voice-cloning program. When the scammer calls you, he'll sound just like your loved one.


So how can you tell if a family member is in trouble or if it's a scammer using a cloned voice?

Don't trust the voice. Call the person who supposedly contacted you and verify the story. Use a phone number you know is theirs. If you can't reach your loved one, try to get in touch with them through another family member or their friends.

Scammers ask you to pay or send money in ways that make it hard to get your money back. If the caller says to wire money, send cryptocurrency, or buy gift cards and give them the card numbers and PINs, those could be signs of a scam.

If you spot a scam, report it to the Federal Trade Commis-

sion at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.



## FDA approves and authorizes updated COVID-19 vaccines

Monday, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) took action approving and authorizing for emergency use updated COVID-19 vaccines formulated to more closely target currently circulating variants and to provide better protection against serious consequences of COVID-19, including hospitalization and death. Monday's actions relate to updated mRNA vaccines for 2023-24 manufactured by ModernaTX Inc. and Pfizer Inc.

The FDA published the following explanations:

"Consistent with the totality of the evidence and input from the FDA's expert advisors, these vaccines have been updated to include a monovalent (single) component that corresponds to the Omicron variant XBB.1.5.

"What You Need to Know:

- "Individuals 5 years of age and older regardless of previous vaccination are eligible to receive a single dose of an updated mRNA COVID-19 vaccine at least 2 months since the last dose of any COVID-19 vaccine.
- "Individuals 6 months through 4 years of age who have previously been vaccinated against COVID-19 are eligible to receive one or two doses of an updated mRNA COVID-19 vaccine (timing and number of doses to administer depends on the previous COVID-19 vaccine received).
- "Unvaccinated individuals 6 months through 4 years of age are eligible to receive three doses of the updated authorized Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine or two doses of the updated authorized Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine.
- "The FDA is confident in the safety and effectiveness of these updated vaccines and the agency's benefit-risk assessment demonstrates that the benefits of these

Monday, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration vaccines for individuals 6 months of age and older out-DA) took action approving and authorizing for emerweigh their risks.

- "Individuals who receive an updated mRNA COVID-19 vaccine may experience similar side effects as those reported by individuals who previously received mRNA COVID-19 vaccines as described in the respective prescribing information or fact sheets.
- "The updated vaccines are expected to provide good protection against COVID-19 from the currently circulating variants. Barring the emergence of a markedly more virulent variant, the FDA anticipates that the composition of COVID-19 vaccines may need to be updated annually, as is done for the seasonal influenza vaccine.
- "The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices will meet tomorrow (Sept. 12), to discuss clinical recommendations on who should receive an updated vaccine, as well as further considerations for specific populations such as immunocompromised and older individuals.
- "Manufacturers have publicly announced that the updated vaccines would be ready this fall, and the FDA anticipates that the updated vaccines will be available in the near future.

"Vaccination remains critical to public health and continued protection against serious consequences of COVID-19, including hospitalization and death,' said Peter Marks, M.D., Ph.D., director of the FDA's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research. 'The public can be assured that these updated vaccines have met the agency's rigorous scientific standards for safety, effectiveness, and manufacturing quality. We very much encourage those who are eligible to consider getting vaccinated.""

While more solar power is good and reduces demand on the utilities' produced power, it has little effect on fixed costs. The utilities must still maintain distribution lines and other infrastructure features, such administrative staff.

While the CPUC has approved including the new and growing costs in the revenue requirements for the utilities, it has an incentive to manage and reduce expected costs in order to improve its net income.

This is the principal focus of the audit report. Parks and his staff are recommending that CPUC and Cal Advocates do a better job reviewing rate requests and expense claims.

"In a 1996 decision, the CPUC observed that an investor owned utility may retain as profits the savings it generates from reducing operating costs below projections in the general rate case proceeding," the auditor noted; then stated, "utilities may have an incentive to generate profits by overestimating their operating costs and then characterizing the difference between their estimates and their actual costs as cost savings."

From 2006 through 2022, SCE's actual rate of return has been higher than its authorized rate of return six times, but not once in the past six years. In the past three years, the actual rate of return has been between 3.28 to 3.77 points below the authorized return. However, SDG&E's actual rate of return has exceeded its authorized return 14 times in the same period.

The auditor points out that the CPUC's collection of cost data varies and does not always verify projected costs. Consequently, neither the CPUC nor Cal Advocates can ensure that a utility has actually completed the work whose costs have been approved

However, the auditor identified CPUC's Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety as an important source and potential collaborator to review and to ascertain specific expenses. "Energy Safety Office is required by law to approve or deny utilities' wildfire mitigation plans, and it oversees utilities' compliance with wildfire mitigation requirements."

Not only could this office's reports be used during a rate hearing, but the auditor suggested that more evidence, such as photographs, may be required to confirm the completion of work for which costs are claimed.

Reinforcing the value of conducting such audits or reviews, the report noted that in 2023, the CPUC did audit SCE's cost recovery application for wildfire mitigation and vegetation management costs for 2021.

"The audit found, among other things, that SCE had overstated operations and maintenance expenses for fire risk mit-

igation, overstated its requested revenue requirement, and sought to recover unsubstantiated capital related revenue requirements," and this report concluded, "Such findings can underscore the importance of scrutinizing cost recovery applications closely."

The audit report basically found that CPUC and Cal Advocates "... lack processes to ensure that utilities' projected costs are not overstated ... [and] ... lack a process to identify areas in which the utilities achieved cost savings." Both weaknesses could be mitigated if the CPUC and Cal Advocates also strengthened their efforts to verify that the utilities actually completed the work for which rate increases were approved.

The CPUC response did not reject the auditor's findings and suggestions; however, CPUC was not willing to whole-heartedly accept them either.

The CPUC did agree to ensure that utilities clearly explain their actual rates of return and where projected costs exceeded actual costs. CPUC noted that this information is available, but it would implement a process to highlight it. This will help administrative law judges to further analyze this result.

However, because of its quasi-judicial responsibilities, it cannot require reports from other agency divisions to be considered in a rate proceeding. But it will encourage staff to be more aware of other agency reports.

This elicited a response from the state auditor: "We are perplexed by CPUC's response. ... The CPUC has broad authority to develop rules that govern how utilities apply for cost recovery and to compel utilities to provide any information necessary to justify those costs. ... Different divisions within the CPUC and other state agencies publish reports that may demonstrate whether a utility has completed the work for which it is requesting to recover costs. Thus, we stand by our recommendation."

But overall, the auditor believes the CPUC can do much more to help the public understand electric and natural gas rate decisions. However, the CPUC agreed and disagreed.

Primarily, the CPUC argues that it is the utilities' responsibility to keep the public informed since they are publicly owned. The CPUC should not engage directly with the utilities' customers.

And again, the auditor objected: "The CPUC mischaracterizes our recommendation. Our recommendation does not suggest that the CPUC should communicate directly with utility customers. .... Our recommendation specifically states that the CPUC should determine the exact approach for communicating energy rate increases to utility customers, ... the CPUC is the public agency responsible for regulating utilities to ensure that customers have safe, reliable utility services at reasonable

Later, you will have an opportunity to vote for the top three 2023 nominees. Group voting, e.g. collecting a list of signatures at a meeting, is not permitted. Votes must be on original, not copies of, ballots available in the Town Crier.

The honor, now in its 13th year, is given to an individual or group who best represents Maxwell's spirit of community and volunteerism. After a Town Crier committee determines the top three nominees from the community's input, the community gets to vote on the final awardee.

Prior awardees demonstrated a tangible and salutary effect on the community providing a spark of volunteerism that mirrored Maxwell's dedication to the community and his many volunteer activities that benefitted the community.

# County board approves Idyllwild Fire tax advance

At its Sept. 12 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the request from the Idyllwild Fire Protection District (IFPD) for an advance of its property tax revenue.

IFPD requested an advance of \$400,000 from the county in July. The advance will be repaid, with interest, in December and January when Riverside County makes its first distribution of property tax receipts to the cities and special districts. The county estimated the interest would be about \$6,500 this year.

From July through the middle of December, IFPD's cash flow is limited to ambulance collections because it receives no property tax or assessments during that period.

The county limits using advanced tax revenue to "any normal operating expense of the District included in the district's fiscal year 2023-24 budget."

If the property tax distributions are insufficient to cover the advance, IFPD must still repay it by June 30, 2024. However, this has not occurred since the first request.

The commission has requested a \$400,000 advance each year since 2016. In 2014, it was \$300,000 and in 2011, it was \$450,000.

California's constitution and Government Code have provisions that allow the county to temporarily advance and transfer funds to special districts. The limit is 85% of the anticipated revenues for the current fiscal year.







## County bolsters fire engine staffing during peak fire season

Riverside County Fire Department made a significant increase in staffing on 10 engine companies that serve the county's protected areas, which went into effect Aug. 7. Up from the previous three, the decision to assign four firefighters per engine marks a 25% increase in response staffing. This proactive measure aims to enhance community safety and protect lives and property during Riverside County's peak fire season, which typically occurs in late sum-

With recent observations of unprecedented growth in grass and brush due to last year's rains, the county faces an elevated risk of rapidly spreading fires, making it crucial to bolster firefighting capabili-

By augmenting the staffing levels, the Riverside County Fire Department aims to contain fires at their early stages, significantly reducing fire spread in vegetation. This will contribute to keeping fires smaller, ultimately saving lives and reducing property dam-

Moreover, the decision to staff engine companies with four firefighters enhances the department's capacity to combat structure fires with increased efficiency. This change provides a safety component known as "two in - two out," ensuring that firefighters operate within a safer environment during firefighting operations.

The proposal for this staffing increase was put forth by Riverside County Board of Supervisors Chair Kevin Jeffries, representing District 1. Recognizing the critical need for enhanced firefighting capabilities, Jeffries' proposal garnered unanimous support from the board and was successfully incor-

## Historic homes featured in annual home tour

The Idyllwild Area Historical Society (IAHS) will hold its annual Idyllwild home tour, "A Timeline of Treasures," from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 16. Six homes will be on the tour, taking visitors from early 20th century cabins to mid-century moderns and beyond, and from careful preservation to imaginative remodeling. The tour is the group's biggest fundraiser.

This year, IAHS President Charlotte Groty said advanced ticket sales have surpassed total sales from past years, so visitors should be prepared to park a little further than usual from the homes, and sometimes wait to enter.

"The popularity of this year's tour has exceeded our expectations. You may experience longer waits and lines at some of the homes, however our all-volunteer team will do its best to advise waiting times and organize parking so that all can enjoy these treasures. The time inside each home may be a bit less than in past years, but we truly hope that all our guests will understand and enjoy our special homes.

Those who decide to brave the crowds will be treated to an exceptional lineup that will satisfy lovers of history, architecture and real estate, and sate the natural curiosity of those who wonder how their neighbors live. Groty provided the Crier a synopsis of this year's attractions:

"It's rare to see the inside of an original 1910 Strawberry Valley cabin, especially one that was built by hand 113 years ago. This little gem was purchased by this family in the late '20s and maintained carefully ever since. It features an original stone icehouse, a unique find in our village. This is your chance to dive back into the past and imagine what it was like to live on this mountain before running water, electrical power, telephones, and even auto-

"Your next stop will also bring you back in time to old Idyllwild but now it's 1928. This cabin is 500 square feet of living history. It features very clever built-ins which were quite necessary as you will see as you walk through. It remains unchanged today with its original doors, windows, hardware, and a very special wood burning stove — which the fami-

ly still uses to cook Thanksgiving dinner.


"For the next home, we move forward to the 1930s and find what started life as a quaint fishing cabin. Gradually over the years it was enlarged and in the 1950s the house was a lodge and still has the original sign out front. The original pocket kitchen which served the lodge guests is still intact. The current owners are artists and have lovingly renovated this home and added a wooden bridge through nearby trees leading to their breathtaking artist's

"Many homes are an evolution, with a modest start but visions of what might be possible. We now approach one that began life as a 1920s bungalow. The owner, in partnership with a very skilled local contractor possessing an artistic vision, has undertaken a complete and grand transformation inside and out. They literally 'raised the roof' and added new windows, a skylight, and a new loft. The stonework, by one of our local craftsmen, is stunning and the spaces feature unique local artwork.

'For those of us who crave Mid-century Modern, we present a later work by architect E. Stewart Williams. Mr. Williams was a highly respected architect throughout the Coachella Valley, with works that include the Palm Springs Art Museum, Frank Sinatra's 'Twin Palms' residence and many others. This 1982 home features a towering 35-foot ceiling with a 30-foot glass wall that makes the forest outside seem like a part of the home.

"With five traditional homes there must be one more that is out of this world. Climb 39 rock steps back to the future with a 1960s vision-evoking Jetsons-like space travel. It is a registered California Historical Landmark. Built in a factory with structural reinforced fiberglass, it features just 520 square feet of living area. It's now the owners' historically restored private hideaway perched on rock high above the street. With that, access will be limited due to the rock steps to reach this futuristic gem."

Tickets are \$25. Online sales are closed, but some tickets may be available starting at 8:30 a.m. on the day of the tour, at the will-call pop-up in front of the Idyllwild Inn, 54300 Village Center Dr. Those who purchased tickets online will need to bring their receipt or a copy on their mobile device to will-call. They also will be required to fill out a waiver of liability. Wear comfortable walking shoes.

#### ART'S CORNER

The prospects of the Labor Day holiday weekend always bode well for the Idyllwild area, regardless of ever-changing weather patterns and the ever-increasing plethora of yard sales and other outdoor activities. To this mixture of community togetherness, the joint coordinators of the Manhattan Chamber Players, Luke Fleming and Brendan Speltz, both dedicated musicians as well as advocates of Hill-based living, joined with their select cohorts to bring together three varied programs in the second season of the Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival. As much as it was anticipated from the group's presentations of last year, a different sort of performance species was indicated from the start of the proceedings, and in its realization more than effective.

Perhaps a bit of background information in advance of the first days of September would have resulted in a better audience turnout. However, in view of the eminent musical scholar Percy Alfred Scholes' statement that "chamber music is not entertainment for crowds," to deliver a pleasant evening (or afternoon) of music designed for lightweight public approbation is no small undertaking, and as previously, Messrs. Fleming and Speltz proved equal to the task.

The opening Friday evening at Lowman Concert Hall started with one of the choicest bits of the string quartet repertoire, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's "Dissonant Quartet" K. 485 (one of the set of six quartets dedicated to Haydn). Deriving its sobriquet from the unorthodox initial measures, it soon came to be solidly based in a major mode that all the performers exploited to the fullest extent, not only in the first movement, but particularly in the "Andante cantabile" and the final "Allegro molto," both demonstrating the composer's dramatic and quasi-operatic styles to the listeners — one would think even Franz Joseph himself would have been impressed in the ensemble's presentation.

Following some well-deserved applause, violinist Brendan Speltz and cellist Brook Speltz essayed Maurice Ravel's difficult and not often heard "Duo Sonata," in which the

Following a short break, and further expository statements from co-coordinator Fleming, the "Piano Quintet, Opus 57" of Dmitri Shostakovich was played, with associated pianist Dominic Cheli sounding the dramatic opening bars, as well as the fugal theme of the second movement in an appropriate manner. The remaining three movements of the piece gave out the composer's characteristic mixture of comic irony and grim terror, not surprisingly since the work issued from the initial phase of the Second World War and the Hitler-Stalin pact. The players certainly conveyed all of the work's mixed emotions with an inspired vigor, and the concluding movement was received enthusiastically.

A somewhat more varied program ensued the following Saturday evening (again in the sonorous confines of the Lowman auditorium) with the playing of Richard Strauss' "Sextet" from his final opera "Capriccio." Intended as a romantic offering for the opera's heroine, the composer drew on primal motivic impulses from his previous works in the genre, along with subtle references to his tone poems (this listener caught bits of "Ein Heldenleben" and the "Symphonia Domestica" as well as "Don Juan" in the interspersal of string tones) in a genial summation of early 20th century tonalities in a scaled-down context, suitable for the transmission of inherent heartfelt ensemble playing.

The remainder of Saturday's program featured more virtuosity from Mr. Cheli, in two movements of the "Suite for Solo Piano for the Left Hand" by the tragically fated Erwin Schluhoff, and the pianist's own arrangement/condensation of Erich Wolfgang Korngold's "Much Ado About Nothing" solo piano suite. The former work featuring sparkling keyboard effects one generally associates with two-handed pianists (particularly in the "Zingara" movement); the latter being a compact version of the Shakespeare's drama, combining brisk joviality and misallied romance with more than a tinge of Korngold's later "Old Hollywood" style. Mr. Cheli also availed himself brilliantly in the concluding presenta-

composer's less impressionistic tendencies were brought to tion of Antonin Dvorak's "Piano Quintet in A Major, Opus 81," with the outer movements bringing out the late 19th century tradition, and the innernost two movements reflecting the nationalistic Central European dance rhythms, with the string ensemble's bolstering provision of supporting harmonies, and once more, a grateful audience applauded.

Sunday afternoon's proceedings, in the outdoor setting of St. Hugh's Episcopal Church's courtyard, featured only two items, but both were major compositorial efforts that required the utmost care and attention of both players and auditors. The open-air event was somewhat crowded (pace Dr. Scholes), but the atmosphere was as inspiring as the musical presentation.

The four movements of Mozart's "String Quintet in GMinor" (K. 516) achieved its proper solemnity in the ambient of the church's proximity, and without it being overly somber, it evoked the circumstances of its composition during Mozart's father's final illness. The work's inner movements (a somewhat dampened minuet and trio, and a more spiritual slow movement) received the proper respects from the players, and the finale brought together a conclusive hope and resolve, with the major mode predominating.

A short interval followed, and then the performers gave out an even-tempered and energetic rendition of Johannes Brahms' "String Sextet in G Major, Opus 36," that emphasized the composer's transition from his early piano pieces to his maturer works, as Brahms became more of a master of contrapuntal writing. Again, the ensemble's expert coordination was most evident in the outer two movements, but the contrasting sections of the scherzo received the proper attention to tempo as well as a harmonious blend of sound (most notable in this setting). The final movement was equally propulsive, and the attendees gave out a distinctly well deserved approbation.

Once again, this reviewer wishes to congratulate all participants — violinist Grace Park, violists Connie Kupka and Kai Potts-Smith, and cellist David Speltz, as well as the aforementioned principal players, and one should further encourage the community's support of their prospective projects in its planning of a third Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival for next year's late summer season.


