

County offers temporary restrooms until permanent ones built

Until the public restrooms planned for North Circle Drive in front of the Mile Hi Plaza are completed, 4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez and Riverside County have arranged for restrooms in the Fort to be available temporarily to the public.

At their Sept. 12 board meeting, the supervisors unanimously approved allocating \$25,000 for operating and maintaining temporary facilities.

Suzanne Holland, director of the county's Office of Economic Development, told the board that the permanent restrooms would be ready in about six months.

The staff recommendation to the board said, "The Office of Economic Development is currently engaged in construction of public restroom facilities located in the core commercial tourism district of Idyllwild to serve visitors, guests and local residents; construction is expected to be completed by the end of 2023. With the need for immediate safe and sanitary restroom services for tourism, the County's Department of Environmental Health has negotiated temporary use of private facilities for public use during construction."

The need for temporary restrooms initially rose at a community meeting with Perez. Stephanie Yost, Idyllwild Community Center president, raised the question about the need for public restrooms before the county has constructed a permanent facility.

"We got Environmental Health engaged on this and they helped brainstorm and explore a number of solutions. Assisting the Fort was the idea that stood out as the most preferrable and practical solution," wrote Darin Schemmer, communications director for Perez, in an email to the Town Crier.


"We know that there are quite a bit of tourists who visit Idyllwild," said Perez in his press release. "While we have a brand new public restroom coming in, which will be very helpful for the town and comes after many years in the making, we also wanted to see how we could address a short-term situation where there had been no or very limited public restrooms available in the meantime. I appreciate our county team for working on this after our listening session in Idyllwild and making this a win for the community."

The funding source is a portion of the Funding American Rescue Plan Act – funds that Riverside County received to support economic recovery efforts that were damaged and negatively affected by the COVID pandemic.

'Idyllwild was impacted by COVID due to its shut down and the shuttered venue of tourist activities," Holland told the board. Even though permanent visitor restrooms are being constructed, she stressed, "... the weather changes and interest in coming to the Hill for tourism and activities ... have begun to revive the need for the public restrooms sooner.'

The new restrooms will be in a 210-square-foot facility along North Circle Drive within the Idyllwild Historic Preservation District (IHPD). The county included IHPD's construction guidelines as part of the specification package. These facilities will be compliant with the Americans with Disability Act.

The total cost for planning, construction and installation was estimated to be about \$580,000.

Redistricting litigation settled

The litigation filed against Riverside County opposing its December 2021 redistricting of the five supervisorial seats has been settled and no changes to the current boundaries of the supervisorial districts will occur.

Thursday, Sept. 14, Yaoska Machado, senior public information specialist for the county, provided the following statement, "The County has entered into a settlement agreement with IE United and other plaintiffs regarding the 2021 Redistricting process. This agreement preserves the map of the current Supervisorial District boundaries, which was adopted after extensive public participation over several months, and reflects the County's ongoing commitment to increase participation in the electoral process."

The proposed settlement was initially announced Wednesday, Sept. 13, in a press release from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLÚ) in Southern California. This stated, "Today, Inland Empire United and six county residents reached a settlement with Riverside County that will increase political access for historically underrepresented communities in the tenth most populous county in the U.S."

While the plaintiffs and their attorneys negotiated and agreed to the settlement, it still fell short of their goal.


"We still do not believe that the county chose the most fair map and we would've loved for this suit to end with a new one, but the map was a symptom of a larger problem," said Sky Allen, executive director of Inland Empire United. In an email to the Town Crier, Allen wrote, "The reason we entered this fight was to make our local government more fair and more accessible, specifically for Latine residents and voters. I'm proud that this settlement achieves such strong commitments to improving education, outreach, and ac-

While the county does not have to revise its current supervisorial districts, it did agree to significantly improve its service to Spanish-speaking residents

and outreach to them during elections and primaries. In the settlement, the county agreed to expand voter outreach and education. Examples of this include voter workshops or community forums in advance of elections. The use of media — social, print or video — to advertise these sessions or an upcoming election, how to register to vote or how to vote is another option.

For these efforts and initiatives, the county has agreed to spend a minimum

HUSD meeting at **Idyllwild School covers much**

Hemet Unified School District (HUSD) held its board meeting this month at Idyllwild School Tuesday, Sept. 12. The board visits Idyllwild usually once a year. The six members of the board and Superintendent Dr Christi Barrett were joined by five other district employees and an audio-visual team, and over 40 members of the community, mostly Idyllwild School faculty and staff.

A bit of local color was provided by Idyllwild School third grader Cooper Jones Darling, who led the "Pledge of Allegiance" before receiving an award for his improvement in math and reading

Idyllwild School Behavioral Support Specialist Briana McGrew an award for her impact on, among other things, citizenship, academics and attendance, and a check for \$500.

Hamilton High School's National Honor Society President Olivia Lopez gave an update on the activity of her school's sports teams.

The board oversees a district with an annual budget over \$300 million, and the agenda was quite long. A number of decisions made during closed session were announced at the beginning of the public session, including the appointment of a new principal at McSweeney Elementary School, and the suspension without pay of an employee links to documents that explain each item. One expending dismissal.

Action items for the open session numbered 18, and a "master motion" rolled 58 small items into one vote. Another 10 items dealt with Community Facilities Districts, the districts that are voted into being when a developer sets out to build more housing that HUSD will serve. Informational reports were given on finances, this year's summer session, and the district's progress toward implementing new state standards for ethnic studies.

Assistant Superintendent Dr. Nareyda Gonzalez briefed the board on the progress of developing the district's Ethnic Studies program. By 2025, the district must begin offering these classes, and by 2030 they will be among the requirements for graduation. They will be part of the "A-G" curriculum (seven basic subject areas) and multiple options to comply will be embedded into 10th grade Social Studies or 11th grade U.S. History classes.

Gonzalez also presented a report on this past year's summer school program. This year summer classes were offered at six sites, with transportation available. Days were long, nine hours, with four hours for academics and five for Expanded Learning Opportunities Programs. This included field trips to March Air Force Base and the Western Trustee Jeremy Parsons also presented Science Center, and career exploration trips. Some students told their teachers they had never been outside Hemet.

HUSD board agendas are available online, with ample with a local impact was an "Approval to File Notice of Exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act" for a project to replace HVAC equipment at Idyllwild School. The notice explains that the project intends to replace heating and AC for classrooms 1 to 4 and 14 to 22. The existing units, the Notice of Exemption states, are "over 20 years old and have exceeded their useful life. They require continued maintenance to remain in working condition and are prone to routine failure." Because the replacement involves "negligible or no expansion of existing" use, an environmental impact report is unnecessary.



Riverside County Waste is holding its bi-annual, free Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) day from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 23, at the County Road Yard, 25780 Johnson Road, next to the Idyllwild Fire Station, for residents (not businesses) only. These are the guidelines for disposing HHW at the site:

• It is illegal to transport more than 15 gallons or 125 pounds of HHW per trip.

Secure leaky containers and loose loads.

• Transport in a box away from passengers (in the trunk or bed of your vehicle).

of \$1.75 per voter in any district where the turnout rate — ballots divided by registered voters in the most recent statewide primary election in a nonpresidential election year was lower than the countywide voter turnout rate for that election.

The county also agreed to translate notices, agendas and minutes of board of supervisors' meetings into Spanish.

And also to offer Spanish interpretation during board meetings or hearings. This may be accomplished with headsets for members of the public attending the session in person or via software for those watching or listening remote-

The county concurred in its statement, "The agreement demonstrates the County's continued effort to ensuring equal opportunity for all of its residents to participate in the voting process by providing additional investment to enhance education and outreach in those communities with low-voter turnout and providing Spanish translation of Registrar of Voters official notices and forms, legally required documents, and public meetings.

Foundation of Southern California, concurred, hoping these types of services would expand to other California counties.

While both the ACLU of Southern California and Inland Empire United concurred in the proposed settlement, there was some disappointment that new maps for supervisorial districts were not part of it. Both Gomez and Allen expressed similar sentiments.

"Communities need information to fully par-

ticipate in the democratic process, whether it is information about how to vote or about what the board will be discussing at a meeting," said Gomez in the press release. "While we are disappointed that the County did not adopt a new supervisorial map, this settlement opens more doors for our Latine community members in Riverside to participate in the future health and success of their home regions."

And Gomez added, "Our goal was to ensure that Latine voters have equal opportunities to participate in the political process, and the settlement includes many important commitments that move us towards that goal."

"I'm disappointed that litigation was needed to get these Spanish translation services, but with full context I'm not surprised," Allen wrote in an email to the Town Crier. "To my knowledge, there isn't a jurisdiction in all of California that is offering full language translation serselves in our local governing chambers," Allen vices, so hopefully Riverside County can besaid in the ACLU press release. The lawsuit challenging the December 2021 board-approved redistricting plan for supervisorial seats based on the 2020 census was filed in June 2022. The basis of the action was Inland Empire's argument that the redistricting plan did not comply with the California Constitution and the federal Voting Rights Act. The new districts diluted the voting power of Latines in Riverside County.

During the board's redistricting discussions and debates in December 2021, District 4 Supervisor, V. Manuel Perez was the lone vote against the current redistricting plan.

But this January in an interview with the And Julia Gomez, staff attorney at the ACLU Town Crier, Perez acknowledged that the current board does reflect diversity of the population. Yxstian Gutierrez, 5th District supervisor, joined him on the board, so there are two Latinos. Chuck Washington, of the 3rd District, is black and Karen Spiegel, representing the 2nd District, is a female.

"It was a different time back then. Is the litigation still necessary? That's up to the ACLU. But I don't think so; that's just me. It's far better now," Perez concluded.

Insurance among issues at **PCWD** meeting

Pine Cove Water District (PCWD) Director Lou Padula had a number of questions regarding items on the financial report at last week's meeting. Two had to do with insur-

Another item questioned was a check for almost \$2,000 to former General Manager Jerry Holldber. This was for an "80% full propane tank" to be used at Rocky Point to service the emergency generator for the communications unit. A new tank alone would cost \$3,500, General Manager Jeremy Potter noted.

Padula also inquired as to fees from PNC bank: A \$250 service charge was a bimonthly charge for all the electronic transfers from customers paying bills, and \$43 was the charge for a large electronic deposit from the Local Area Investment Fund.

Potter gave the operations report, beginning with static well #10, which has risen .8.4 inches to 69.9 feet He noted that last year the well level was 140 feet. "Good winters bring full wells," he said. Rain also means less demand, so production is down slightly: about 12% from the last two

Installing new smart meters continues: the first two of seven books (meter reading routes) have been finished. Old The family plan for the less expensive plan is less than the meters are being sold for \$2 each to a recycler, and the first check for \$600 was received.

When time allows, the crew is repairing and replacing the last hydrants with discrepancies discovered during the summer's inspections. A few had leaks between the meter and the hydrant. Several on Overlook Drive had been slated for replacement for decades. As new lines are being laid, some old hydrants will be removed.

Well #13, near Thousand Trails, has been completely refurbished. It was inspected with a camera, and Potter described seeing the sides of the bore through solid granite, and the cracks through which water was entering the well "just pouring in." The well is about 400 feet deep, with the pump 300 feet down. Once the water has been tested it will be brought online.

Purchasing Pine Cove Park from the county is moving forward; it is expected to enter escrow on Sept. 15.

The district's two temporary employees have begun laying blocks for the new vehicle maintenance pit. Once that is done the wall will be grouted and when cured, backfilled. Then prepping for the 60-foot-by-20-foot concrete slab will begin. Material for the shade cover is on hand.

Potter has been pursuing a mower deck attachment for the skid-steer. A new one, capable of cutting saplings up to 7 inches, would cost \$10,505, but the district's tractor mechanic, Ted Johnson in Garner Valley, found a slightly used unit for \$2,600. It will take out saplings up to 4 inches and "we only need to cut grass," Potter said. Potter plans to haul the skid-steer down to Lake Skinner and demo the attachment before purchase. Last month, PCWD paid \$2,300 for mowing its lot in Dutch Flats.

Director Lou Padula had a number of questions regard-

ing items on the financial report at last week's meeting. Two had to do with insurance: The district, in addition to its responsibility for medical insurance under CalPERS for full-time employees (\$9,363), also pays for life insurance (\$98.93 monthly, and checks were issued on first and last of this month, the next month being paid a few days early) and ADOM, in which the district reimburses employees up to a \$1,000 limit for audio, dental, optical and medical ex-

President Robert Hewitt asked Office Manager Becky Smith to brief the board on an upcoming increase in health insurance premiums: As of Jan. 1, they are set to rise 12 to 15% on top of a "huge increase" last year. The monthly \$9,363 payment to CalPERS adds up to over \$112,000 a

A table of available plans was included in the packet. Presently, employees are given a choice of PERS "gold" and "platinum" plans. No significantly cheaper options are on the list. They may opt for a plan that includes only themselves, one dependent or a whole family; the district has covered the amount up to the one-dependent plan, and employees pay the difference if they wish to cover their whole

Next year, one-dependent plans will be \$1,718 and \$2,431, and family plans will be \$2,234 and \$3,161 monthly. other plan with one dependent, and so the popular option. Employees on the gold family plan will begin to pay \$516 unless the board changes its policy.

Presently, Smith, slated to retire late this year, is the only employee on the platinum plan, with the other five fulltime employees opting for gold. After retirement, employees may opt to continue their coverage, with the district contributing a "minimum maximum" of \$120, but Smith said she did not intend to do this.

Smith and Potter both described the present plans as good ones, even "top of the line." The gold offers 80/20 copays, the platinum 90/10. The gold has a good network, but platinum allows a wider choice of specialists. The plans are PPOs and doctors on the Hill are providers within them.

Smith recommended the board form a committee to review current policy and consider how much the district is willing to pay. She will continue to talk to CalPERS to determine what options the district has; PCWD's contract with the system may limit how it restricts employee choice. "It's my understanding ... that we can pick from any of these [plans]," she said. "Kaiser does not insure anybody in the 92549 ZIP code, Peace Officers [plans] wouldn't be [for] us ... But the district has the right to set a cap." Smith also provided the board with the earlier resolution (#144, from 1981) that sets the present policy, and an amendment from

Hewitt asked directors Padula and Vicki Jacubac to form an adhoc committee and report back with a recommendation and resolution for the November meeting. His own opinion: "I know it's a lot of money, but if there's one thing we should be spending money on, it's our people."

The board meets next at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 11.

New trial date set for Solis on Halloween

Former Idyllwild restaurateur Luis Delgado Solis, 45, had a new trial date set at his information arraignment Monday, Sept. 11. The new trial date is Tuesday,

His case was dismissed in August because of the unavailability of witnesses and the Riverside County District Attorney filed a new case.

In the first case, Solis was charged with eight felony sex charges involving two minor female children beginning in August 2015 and ending Wednesday, April 26, 2023, the day before he was arrested. He pleaded not guilty to all eight felony charges.

In the second case, filed charges are seven felony sex counts to which he has pleaded not guilty. He remains in the Southwest Detention Center on \$5 million bail.

He faces potential life imprisonment if found guilty.

Telemedicine for emergency responses coming to county

At its Sept. 12 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved an initial three-year contract with TELE911 that will allow the county's emergency response agencies real-time telemedicine evaluation. Several months ago, in response to a county jury report on hospital transfer time, the county Emergency Medical Services Agency (EMS) promised to submit a telemedicine proposal.

Low-acuity patients and patients who refuse ambulance transport to an emergency department and may be at high-risk if they are not transported may benefit.

"In addition, through TELE911, EMS desires to maximize EMS resource availability and improve [Emergency Department] bed capacity in Riverside County by properly referring medically triaged lower acuity 911 calls and linking patients to a variety of resources when safe and appropriate ... It has been shown in multiple published research studies that a significant percentage of EMS patients transported to a hospital ED may be safely treated in place through an approved telemedicine program," EMS said in its recommendation to

Although unanimously approved, telemedicine will not be immediately available. Dan Bates, deputy EMS coordinator for the county, explained that each of the county's emergency response agencies has to develop its own separate agreement with TELE911. For example, each city within the county, as well as Riverside County, must reach an agreement with TELE911. However, he did not think this would be a significant delay.

'This will give us options for individuals' safety," he added.

During the discussion of this item, 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington said, "I'm really excited about the progress we're making ... Riverside County is taking innovative steps to prevent long wall time and get our ambulance and firefighter paramedics back into the streets.'

Since March 2022, TELE911 has been providing telemedicine services. Besides California, it also operates in Florida and Texas, Brad Bihun, operations manager for TELE911, said. Within the state, Alameda and Kern are the only other California counties to use this option for emergency calls.

County EMS officials have been concerned about the care for patients and the ability to respond to timely emergency situations. A county grand jury report also spoke to these issues.

In May, the grand jury reported about the time it takes to transfer a patient from the ambulance to the hospital's care.

The grand jury focused on the delay it takes to officially transfer patients to hospital care after the ambulance arrives at the hospital. It is not unusual for this transfer to take more than 30 minutes. It happens enough that the EMS administrators have officially named it Ambulance Patient Off-





Local sisters to perform in El Cajon

Two Idyllwild sisters are blazing trails artistically with the premier of their second project as Cinballera Entertainment, melding elements of cinema, ballet and opera. Tiffany, 22, and Rebekah, 19, are daughters of James and Teresa Brannan. Their new production, based on material from Tolkien's "Lord of the Rings," is called "Lady of the Ring," and will take place from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Friday Sept. 22, which is also "Tolkien Day," at Water Conservation Garden, 12122 Cuyamaca College Drive West, El Cajon. Tickets are \$25. For more information, visit cinballera.org.

Cinema, ballet and opera are infrastructure-intensive art forms, with costly productions and hierarchical structures where performers are "cogs in a machine," but the Brannans have found a way to express their own visions within the traditions they love. Their first production was "Stolen Love: a Chamber Ballopera." It combined a comic opera — Menotti's "The Old Maid and the Thief" — with an original ballet based

on that composer's only piano concerto.

"The Lady of the Ring" tells its story twice: once through a chamber opera based on a song cycle Tolkien himself commissioned, supplemented with adaptations of art songs; and then again through an original ballet set to a Shostakovich piano concerto. The work will be realized by "a fellowship of nine performers." The intent is to release video productions of Cinballera's projects.

The Crier spoke by phone with Tiffany Brannan this week to find out more about the sisters and their latest project.

TC: Were you and your sister Idyllwild Arts [Academy] (IAA) students?

TB: No. Both of us were home-schooled, and graduated at 13, but we studied privately with excellent teachers who also taught at IAA. We've been studying privately with college professors for singing as well as dancing since we were young. I became a professional journalist and Rebekah became a professional ballerina, and now I am a professional opera singer.

TC: Tolkien is a popular franchise. TB: A lot of people like to do their own take on it.

TC: And this is explicitly a woman's take?

TB: Yes. Instead of the Dark Lord, we made it a Dark Lady, and then after she is killed by Smeagol (who becomes Golem), her spirit is in the ring, and so anyone who puts it on sees her spirit, as Precious. Instead of just an evil mastermind tell the story the songs are portraying.

genius she is also a femme-fatale.

TC: And femme fatales are juicy roles for an opera singer?

TC: What are some favorite femme fatales from opera?,

TB: Carmen is maybe the most famous. There is Delilah in Saint-Saëns' "Sampson and Delilah," there's the Queen of the Night in Mozart's "Magic Flute." She was seductive but she was also very dangerous, and similar to the Dark Lady.

TC: You are premiering the work at the Water Conservation Garden? That sounds dry?

TB: Yes, the conservation garden. It is very beautiful. It has a couple of water features. Mostly it is showing how a California landscape can be laid out to minimize water usage. This garden has a wonderful amphitheater available for events, and we're bringing our own stage.

TC: You wouldn't want a dancer to go "en pointe" on con-

TB: No.

TC: And the music is a piano?

TB: Electric piano.

TC: Who is playing?

TB: Abe Fabella, a very accomplished pianist and music director for many venues. He played for our previous show and we're using him again. TC: So, the piece is two parts. First a concert?

TB: We put together our own opera using music by Donald Swann. He wrote the song cycle, "The Road Goes Ever On," and Tolkien collaborated on it, in 1967.

TC: How would you describe the musical style?

TB: Very typical of English art songs from 18th century. High musical quality, but more playful than what you'd find in the movies ... It gives you a kind of insight into what kind of music Tolkien thought would go with his story. We are using six out of the seven songs in the cycle, changing the words

TC: You drew from sources in several languages, including Tolkien's invented Elvish?

TB: In addition to the cycle, there are 15 art songs; we changed the lyrics to fit the story — one in German, one had Portuguese and instead we put in some Elvish text, it's the "One Ring" song that we put in as an opening song. Besides those two, the thing is in English, so it's very accessible.

TC: You don't need to be a native Elvish speaker?

TB: No. One other thing that makes it easy to understand is that between songs we have Bilbo reading from his book, to

Bilbo's "book" is the hobbit's autobiography; during his adventure he often thinks of writing a memoir, to be titled "There and Back Again, A Hobbit's Holiday." The Brannans have apparently discovered his legendary "Red Book of Westmarch.
