Supervisors take another gander at STR ordinance

Tuesday, Nov. 28, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors reviewed another revision of Ordinance 927.2, "Regulating Short Term Rentals" (STRs). The board held a hearing on the initial proposed changes Nov. 7. After the hearing and discussion among the supervisors, they asked staff to consider several more changes and bring the new revision back to the board.

Many of the new changes would affect either Idyllwild (including Pine Cove) or the Wine Country or both.

This draft makes no changes in the language for caps or density of STRs in Idyllwild. The cap would remain 14% of the current 3,567 residential units. When approved, Ordinance 927.2 will allow up to 500 STRs in Idyllwild and Pine Cove. And the density restrictions remain 150 feet between STRs.

When the proposed changes are approved, certified STRs within 150 feet of another properly certified STR may continue to renew their certificate. The county will use the attrition of existing certified STRs to enforce the density limit. So STRs that may be adjacent to each other can continue to operate according to the revised ordinance.

Changes in ownership of existing STRs certificates and the eligibility of STRs without a certificate, but which may have been paying the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT), are discussed below.

Ownership and transfer of certificates

The limitation of only two STR certificates per person was the first issue that evoked questions and concerns from board members. Also, the transfer of ownership and the accompanying county certificate within a family raised more concerns. Currently, there are no limitations on the number of STRs a person may own.

Board Chair Kevin Jeffries (1st District) and Supervisor Karen Spiegel (2nd District) were concerned about this limitation and, in particular, how a family with more than two STRs could shift the ownership among family members.

The previous draft of 927.2 limited ownership to no more than two certificates in Idyllwild and no more than two in the Wine Country. If the ordinance were passed with this language, existing owners with three or more STRs in either area would have been exempt for three years. After that time, any request for renewal of an STR certificate must comply with this limitation.

However, Jeffries was concerned about how it would affect families with multiple STRs and local businesses, especially if a family wanted to transfer ownership to another family member. The reason is that the STR certificate does not transfer with property ownership. For example, if a couple owned STRs, one died and the estate passed the property to their child or children, the new owners would have to apply for a new STR certificate.

"I'm not interested in penalizing these owners if they've been in compliance and been a good neighbor," Jeffries said during the discussion earlier this month. "What does it matter if they own four or five?"

The revised STR ordinance allows the transfer

President declares disaster emergency in county from Hilary

Last week, President Joe Biden declared that a major disaster exists in parts of California affected by Tropical Storm Hilary that passed over the Hill during the middle of August. In Riverside County, the storm caused major flooding, mudflows, road closures and damage to critical infrastructures.

The declaration also ordered federal aid to supplement state, tribal and local recovery efforts in these areas.

While federal funding is available to state, tribal, eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations for repairing or replacing facilities damaged by Hilary, Shane Reichart, senior public information specialist and public information officer for the county's Emergency Management Department, lamented, "He did not approve 'Individual assistance.'"

The Federal Emergency Management Agency money will cover the county's expenses on a 75% cost-sharing basis. Federal funding also is available for hazard mitigation measures statewide. State assistance should cover 75% of the costs not covered by the federal funding, according to Reichardt.

"That's a huge benefit for the county and cities," he stated. "It provides significant relief." In Riverside County, the cities of Calimesa, La Quinta, Palm Desert, Indio, Indian Wells and Desert Hot Springs, as well as the Morongo Band of Mission Indians, submitted local proclamations of emergency.

Hilary brought prolific rainfall. Amounts recorded on the Hill included 11.7 inches on Mount San Jacinto Peak, 7.8 inches at Snow Creek, and Pine Cove and Alandale (Stone Creek) received about 3.3 inches, while Keenwild and Vista Grande were in the 2.5-inch range.

For homeowners and businesses, the Small Business Administration (SBA) has other forms of funding. On Sept. 20, SBA Administrator Isabel Casillas Guzman said in a press release, "SBA's mission-driven team stands ready to help California's small businesses and residents impacted by tropical storm Hilary."

"Low-interest federal disaster loans are available to businesses of all sizes, most private nonprofit organizations, homeowners and renters whose property was damaged or destroyed by this disaster," added Director Jeffrey Lusk of the U.S. SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

Businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. SBA also offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

SBA also can lend more funds to businesses and homeowners to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future. Disaster loans up to \$500,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$100,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property, including personal vehicles.

Interest rates can be as low as 4% for businesses, 2.375% for private nonprofit organizations and 2.5% for homeowners and renters with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition, according to the

4th District Supervisor V. Manuel Perez, in coordination with the Riverside County Executive Office and Emergency Management Department, said in a news release, "This is huge, and it is a very good thing!"
"Hurricane Hilary touched just about every city and unincorporated community in the Coachella Valley. It's the most costly natural disaster in county history, and most of the damage was in the Coachella Valley. The hurricane was unique and never happened before in our lifetime."

Riverside County will be coordinating with the California Office of Emergency Services to schedule a briefing for operational area partners (Riverside County cities, tribal nations and special districts) where more guidance for the federal public assistance process and cost eligibility will be given.

County executive paints rosy picture for financials

“As of the FY 2023/24 First Quarter Adjustments Report, the county continues to maintain a strong fiscal standing,” was the Executive Office’s summary of Riverside County’s current budget as of Sept. 30, the end of the first quarter of fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which ends June 30, 2024.

Not only are revenues expected to grow this year, but FY 2022-23 ended with a larger surplus than was expected. The revenue forecast is \$1.175 billion and the net county costs are planned for \$1.25 billion, yielding a \$50 million surplus at the end of the fiscal year.

The first quarter review was presented to the board of supervisors at its Nov. 28 meeting. The surplus from previous years will be \$624 million, an unexpected increase of \$69 million, 12%. County Executive Jeff Van Wagenen explained that there were two unexpected causes for the larger than forecast reserves balances — larger savings and more revenue.

Overall, county costs were lower than expected because of “salary savings achieved countywide, stemming from ongoing challenges with staff retention and recruitment.” This difference was nearly \$42 million.

Secondly, FY 2022-23 revenues were about \$125 million greater than originally estimated. The largest increase was \$48 million in interest. The final property tax collections were \$37 million greater than projected, and sales and use taxes were \$12 million more. The actual revenues were \$37 million greater than the estimate during the FY 2023-24 budget preparation.

While the final review of FY 2022-23 resulted in a surprising increase in reserve balances to \$624 million, the initial review of FY 2023-24 projects revenues to continue to increase. In the 1st quarter review, Van Wagenen’s staff projects revenue from property taxes, interest, Mo-

tor Vehicle in Lieu and Residual Assets to be nearly \$32 million greater than the June projections.

The current reserves balance of \$624 million is greater than the county’s two benchmarks for emergencies. Board policy is 25% of total discretionary revenue which would be \$285 million of the current budget. The other benchmark from the Government Finance Officers Association is two months of operation costs or \$612 million.

The county does project a slight increase in the unemployment rate, from 4% in 2022 and 5% in 2023 to about 5.6% next year. County population is expected to continue to grow, attracted by increases in the affordable housing market.

Besides the overall assessment of the county’s economic situation, Van Wagenen did recommend several budget adjustments. Most of these were approved at board meetings earlier this fiscal year. For example, at the Oct. 31 meeting, the bboard approved \$1.4 million for five more positions for the registrar of voters and printing costs. At the Nov. 7 meeting, the supervisors approved interpreters for board meetings and that will cost \$96,000.

However, Van Wagenen did recommend two specific changes in the report. The first was \$18,412 to maintain the county’s required one-third of the operating costs for the Local Area Formation Committee. This year, the county obligation is \$368,144 and only \$349,732 was included in the June budget.

The second increase was \$550,000 to Facilities Management for litigation settlement fees.

After these recommended adjustments, the General Fund Appropriations for Contingency will have a remaining balance of \$17.3 million.

The 2nd Quarterly fiscal review is expected at the end of February 2024.

In retirement, they enjoyed traveling all over the world or cruising the oceans with friends. Be it fishing, camping, riding motorcycles or playing golf, Bill enjoyed it all.

Our father was a bugle player for his battalion. While moored at Catalina surrounded by 500 of our closest strangers, our father would play “Reveille,” thus waking up the entire harbor at 0400 hours.

Genevieve passed Sept. 2, 2022, and William passed Sept. 5, 2023. They are survived by their two sons William (Colleen) of Idyllwild and Russell (Digna) of Hemet; grandchildren Amanda (Alex) of Anza, Abigail (Richard) of Pine Cove and Natalie of Portland, Oregon, and great-grandson William of Pine Cove.

Services with honors will be held at Arlington Cemetery, Riverside, at 10:30 a.m. Friday, Dec. 8, 2023, with a reception to follow in Hemet at 1:30 p.m.

of an STR certificate among family members if two conditions are met. Once a property is transferred, a request to transfer the STR certificate must be made within 180 days. Secondly, the new owner will have to “demonstrate” their family relationship.

The tentatively approved relations are “spouse, domestic partner, child, stepchild, grandchild, parent, stepparent, mother-in-law, father-in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, grandparent, great grandparent, brother, sister, half-brother, half-sister, stepsibling, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, aunt, uncle, niece, nephew, or first cousin (child of aunt or uncle),” according to Section 4f of the proposed revision.

Regarding the total number of STR ownerships, the county will now permit STR operators with more than two STR certificates to keep them without relinquishing any.

However, no new STR certificates will be issued to this owner and future new STR owners in Idyllwild or the Wine Country will be limited to two certificates.

In its recommendations to the board, the county identified the number of multiple STR owners in Idyllwild and the Wine County. Locally, 80 people have two STR certificates, 10 have three certificates, and two people have four and two others have five certificates.

Transient Occupancy Tax

Two different situations came to the attention of the board and planning staff. Some STR owners who have rented out STRs did not have a STR certificate; but they did register with the county’s treasurer-tax collector and paid the TOT for a minimum of one year. The initial changes to 927.2 addressed this issue, how the owners could be recognized and how these properties would affect the proposed cap.

The second situation was a group of STR owners who rented their property through Airbnb, which paid the TOT. However, Airbnb made a single tax payment for all of these STRs. And its privacy rules prevent identifying individual owners.

The new revision would give these owners a period to submit a request for eligibility to the county with information such as account details, payment receipts and operating timeframes. These would be reviewed, and the eligibility of these properties determined.

However, the planning staff advised that the number of potential eligible units is unknown and therefore, its effect on the cap limits is unknown. Consequently, they recommended limiting the number of potential new STR units from this group to 10, until more specific data is known.

Unpaved roads

The approval of an STR on an unpaved road has been of particular concern to many Idyllwild residents. The board did hear this distress and asked the staff to reassess its occurrence.

However, staff did not recommend a change. Their reason was “we collectively concluded that due to all various roadway conditions from County vs. privately owned, maintenance responsibilities, and road types, such as concrete, asphalt, decomposed granite, or compacted dirt, it was problematic implementing a specific restriction and applying it consistently and equitably. Furthermore, we are characterizing STRs as a residential use and therefore they should be allowed wherever a residence has been permitted.”

STR czar

At the last meeting, Supervisor V. Manuel Perez (4th District) recommended that there be an STR czar for the county. This person would be the focal point for all STR issues, whether from certificate applicants, owners or neighbors.

In their report, the planning staff indicated that it already has a dedicated employee for these issues. Further, there is a toll-free 24/7 Code Enforcement call center, which can be reached at 951-955-2004.

The STR owner will be notified and a Code Enforcement officer will visit the site and evaluate the request. The officer has the authority to issue either an administrative citation or a Notice of Violation.

Changes continued in the current draft

Planning staff identified several changes from the current STR ordinance, but which were already included in the initial 927.2 draft. One is that the signage for an STR must be posted in a place that is readily visible from the public view.

Responsible guests must acknowledge that they have read the “Good Neighbor” brochure and seen the video.

Fines for STR violations may also be imposed on the “Responsible Operator” or “Responsible Guest” as well as the STR owner, pursuant to section 14.e.

Wine Country

Supervisor Chuck Washington (3rd District) expressed concern for the residents of an area

generally located north of Calle Contento and east of Temecula. This neighborhood includes 120 parcels located within the unincorporated area of Riverside County, but not within the Wine Country Community Plan.

They felt that approval of the revised ordinance would result in more STRs in their neighborhood. According to the county, this area includes 120 parcels, of which 35 are vacant and 85 have a residential structure. Currently, there are already 16 permitted STRs, which is 19%.

Since the area is not within the Wine Country Community Plan, the planning staff recommended that the revised ordinance specifically list the parcel number of these properties. That is now section 4.gg. They also recommended increasing the cap for the Wine Country residential area by 16 to accommodate existing certificates in this area.

And they also agreed to increasing the cap for the Wine Country winery area from 114, 15%, to 129 certificates, or 17%.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

At the conclusion of the report, the staff explained why CEQA does not apply to Ordinance No. 927.2 and Ordinance No. 927.2 is exempt from CEQA.

The principal reason is that no new construction is proposed in the ordinance. It is merely the procedure for regulating STRs. There are no new buildings, or county improvements authorized in the ordinance.

Public comments wanted on potential drought strategies

At the Nov. 15, meeting, as part of the California Water Commission’s (CWC) work in support of Water Resilience Portfolio Action 26.3, commission staff presented for discussion a draft white paper containing potential strategies to protect communities, and fish and wildlife in the event of long-term drought. Commission staff interviewed experts from both the U.S. and abroad and convened a working group of agencies and organizations with special knowledge and interest in the topic to develop preliminary drought strategies. Staff sought feedback on these preliminary strategies via tribal small-group discussions, outreach to interested parties and public workshops. With this input, the commission proposes four potential drought strategies: scale up groundwater recharge; conduct watershed-level planning to reduce drought impacts to ecosystems; better position communities to prepare for and respond to drought emergencies; and support improved coordination, information, and communication in drought and non-drought years. “These strategies are forward-looking, and build on work underway by California’s State agencies to suggest ways to help California better protect communities and fish and wildlife from the impacts of the state’s inevitable

droughts,” according to a CWC news release. The commission will present its final white paper to the secretaries for Agriculture, Environmental Protection and Natural Resources, who requested the commission’s engagement on this topic. The draft white paper can be viewed at https://cwc.ca.gov/-/media/CWC-Website/Files/Documents/2023/11_November/November2023_Item_12_Attach_1_FinalDraft-WhitePaper_Final.pdf. Comments may be submitted to cwc@water.ca.gov until Friday, Dec. 15. Commission staff will consider feedback from the commission and the public to produce a final draft of the white paper that will be presented to the commission for approval at the January 2024 meeting. The nine-member CWC uses its public forum to explore water management issues from multiple perspectives and to formulate recommendations to advise the director of the California Department of Water Resources, and as appropriate, the California Natural Resources Agency, the governor and Legislature on ways to improve water planning and management in response to California’s changing hydrology. Searching for a job to work remotely? Avoid scams and identity theft

Found a job listing to telework as a Spanish translator or a data entry clerk with great benefits and pay? Scammers are impersonating real employers on legitimate platforms like ZipRecruiter and Indeed. When you respond, they might even schedule interviews and send you paperwork that looks legit. But it’s all a scam to get your information and steal your money or your identity. Here’s how to know you’re dealing with a scam. Everything moves really fast. As soon as you apply, the so-called employer only wants to schedule an interview using Signal Messenger or similar text-only apps. You agree, answer a few questions — and bam, you got the job. The next thing you know, they’re asking you to fill out direct deposit and tax forms with your bank account and other personal information. In some cases, they might send you a large check with instructions to set up your home office. But by the time you realize the job is fake, the scammers already have your money and information. To avoid job scams without passing up a good job opportunity: • Do some research before you apply. Look up the company online or call using a phone number you know to be real. If you can’t verify the job opening, it could be a scam. • Talk to someone you trust. Describe the offer to them. What do they think? This also helps give you vital time to think about the offer. • Never pay for a job or equipment. Honest employers won’t ask you to pay upfront, and they won’t send you a check and then tell you to deposit it and send them part of the money. Those are scams. Report phony job opportunities to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov and the website where you saw the job posting. Did you give personal or financial information for a job that turned out to be fake? Go to IdentityTheft.gov to report it and get a recovery plan.

USPS Operation Santa Letter Adoption now open

Anyone interested in sending children and families some holiday magic this season can now adopt a letter written to Santa by visiting USPSOperationSanta.com.

USPS Operation Santa turns 111 years old this year. The program relies solely on random acts of kindness and the generosity of strangers. It allows people to help children and families have a magical holiday when they otherwise might not — safely and securely. USPS Operation Santa is not a guaranteed gift-giving program.

Since Sept. 18, the Postal Service has received letters from across the country and has been delivering them to Santa’s U.S. workshop at 123 Elf Road, North Pole 88888. Letters sent with First-Class Mail postage and complete, accurate and legible return addresses have been opened, reviewed and posted on USPSOperationSanta.com. People can begin reading and adopting letters today.

Instructions for letter adopters

- Visit USPSOperationSanta.com, register and have identity verified.
- If potential adopters are unable to complete their ID verification online, they will be provided with a code and given instructions on how to complete verification in person at a local post office.
- Once verified, the adopter will receive a welcome email with detailed information on how to participate in the program.
- Potential adopters can read letters and choose one or more to fulfill. Once a letter is chosen, adopters must

follow the directions they were sent in their welcome email to ship gifts.

- Packages must be shipped via Priority Mail service, but gifts do not need to be in Priority Mail-branded boxes.

- Letter adopters are responsible for postage fees to ship the gift packages.

Tips for reducing shipping costs

Postage to ship packages is based on size, weight and distance. Here are some tips to lower costs:

- Use Priority Mail Flat Rate boxes, free at the local post office. Take a box with you when shopping and only purchase items that can fit in the box.
- Adopt a letter from your state or a nearby state.
- Pay careful attention to the dimensions of the gift — especially the size and weight. Shipping heavy, oversized packages can be expensive.
- Consider a gift card instead of purchasing larger, heavier items. Gift cards need to be sent in a Priority Mail envelope, 4 inches by 6 inches or larger, to accommodate the shipping label.

Accept no imitations

There is only one USPS Operation Santa program, sanctioned by the U.S. Postal Service. Fulfilling wishes through the official Postal Service program is voluntary, and any organization asking for money to adopt letters is in violation of the laws under which the Postal Service operates and is not condoned by or affiliated with the Postal Service.

20 years ago - 2003
The Idyllwild Transfer Station’s green-waste disposal area was staying open seven days a week because a dangerous amount of slash was accumulating from so many trees and bushes being cut down.

15 years ago - 2008
The call came late Saturday morning. Within another hour, Idyllwild Fire Protection District’s four-man crew was in the midst of the Freeway Complex Fire in Corona, near Highway 91. For more than four days it closed 12 miles of the highway and burned or damaged homes in three counties.

10 years ago - 2013
The U.S. Forest Service was closing nearly 16,000 acres in the San Jacinto Ranger District for the next 12 months. In July, the Mountain Fire burned nearly 27,500 acres, resulting in significant trail damage from Garner Valley north to Saddle Junction.

5 years ago - 2018
In July, Lt. Jr. Grade Danielle McKnight, an Idyllwild native, received her Naval Aviator’s wings while stationed at the Naval Air Station in Milton, Florida. McKnight was then stationed in San Diego. She was a helicopter pilot and training to fly the Navy’s Sikorsky SH-60/MH-60 Seahawk.

1 year ago - 2022
As of 4:21 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 23, the final results for Assembly District (AD) 47 seat in the California Assembly remained too close to call. Christy Holstege, the Democratic candidate, continued to lead her Republican opponent, Greg Wallis. But with about 168,000 ballots counted within the whole district, Holstege’s election night lead of nearly 10,000 votes had eroded to 52 votes. She had 50.02% of the ballots counted.
