Eviction notice for Keith Harper at ranch

The legal struggle between the adult children of missing Mountain Center resident Lydia "Dia" Abrams and Keith Harper, who identifies himself as Abram's fiancée, has passed another milestone, as eviction papers were posted on the gates of the Bonita Vista Ranch during the first week of De-

The court-appointed trustee in the case, Richard Munro of Invenz Inc., has taken this step after having Harper removed as trustee of Abrams' estate in November. The notice is addressed to Harper and "all others in possession," and instructs them to vacate within 60 days. It prohibits them from taking any property of the trust including vehicles, furnishings, jewelry, tools, etc., and specifically names several unusual items: a wooden horse and a red vintage fire truck.

The notice also states that although the trustee does not need to "provide a just cause" for the eviction, there are such causes. It goes on to allege the following: that Harper has withdrawn property from the rental market with the intent to sell it; that he possesses firearms on the property; that he has "maintained or committed" a nuisance on the property; that he has failed to make "insurance, utilities, and other necessary" payments; that he has marketed the property as short-term rentals without authority.

The Crier's last coverage of this story presented Harper's latest "theory" about Abrams' disappearance. He began, this fall, to talk about two videos: one taken during a burglary Memorial Day weekend of this year, and another supposedly taken the day Abrams disappeared. Harper said both showed two males and a female, identical or nearly so. The burglary seems to have actually occurred; three people, whose names Harper supplied, were arrested on Apple Canyon Road on May 27, served about six months behind bars and were released in November.

That much is true, but Harper connects this event and the three perpetrators to a video he claims to have given to the police. In this alleged video from June 6, 2020, according to Harper, the same three perpetrators accost Abrams, one of the men strikes Abrams with a wrench and Abrams falls. Diana Fedder, named as co-trustee of Abrams' estate in her May 2020 trust, told the Crier that the cameras had stopped working over six months before that day, and there was no video from the ranch from the end of 2019 until Abrams' disappearance. The video installer wanted a hefty fee to monitor the cameras, money Abrams said she did not have. She and Abrams tried, and failed, to access the video feeds.

Beyond this flaw in his story is a greater implausibility; that Harper could see a video of three evil-doers murdering the woman of his dreams, and then never mention it during countless interviews and depositions over three years. As one Mountain Center resident who knew Abrams well, and also interacted with Harper, put it, "The guy is not even a good liar." This is perhaps the most likely theory that explains the facts.

In other attempts to confirm elements of Harper's back story, the Crier reached out to the Utah Department of Corrections, where Harper claimed, in a June 2022 deposition, to have worked over 20 years. He has described his job as supervising other parole officers and being in charge of "intensive supervision." He said in the depo, "I think I had 20 years, four months, and six See Eviction, page A6

Conservancy working to protect Strawberry Creek

A local real estate professional shared with the Crier an email conversation that spoke of a project "protecting" the section of Strawberry Creek from Idyology to Idyllwild Pines, making it a "public resource, formalizing in-perpetuity environmental protections [with] accommodations for low-impact public use."

The Crier was unable to confirm the content with the purported sender, but did receive a response from CEO Ed Sauls of the California Land Conservancy (CLC), a nonprofit that describes its mission as to "encourage and facilitate the preservation, protection or enhancement of land in its natural, historical, agricultural, forested, or open space condition or use."

According to Sauls, "Strawberry Creek is a treasure that is of historical importance to both the people and wildlife in Idyllwild. Its reliable flow supports rare natural resources, it provides unique recreational opportunities, and it is stunningly beautiful.

The California Land Conservancy is looking into the feasibility of conserving Strawberry Creek for current hill residents and future generations. There is a lot to learn and understand about Strawberry Creek and we are still early in our process of evaluating the project including potential public and private grants to secure its preservation.

"We will be pleased to keep the Town Crier and hill residents apprised of our progress and we welcome input from you and others in this important adventure.

The "ownership" of the creek is a legacy of the original subdivision of land within the valley into parcels. The Johnson family are often referred to as Idyllwild's original developers, but Gerald Johnson "married into" a project begun by the family of his wife, Eleanor Potes Johnson. Those who own land abutting the creek, or have seen county parcel maps, know that the land on which the creek flows is not included in their parcels, but rather combined into a series of long thin lots that snake between the individual lots. A number of other thin plots connect the paved roads with the creek.

One of the original selling points of what was then called Idyllwild Mountain Park Co., or Idyllwild All Year Resort Co., was the presence of a pedestrian path along the creek, allowing residents and visitors alike to walk from Fern Valley to town (and further) without setting foot on paved roads. A number of access points are memorialized on the county maps. Many are continuations of named roads passing between private property to the creek. Oak-See Strawberry Creek, page A6





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If it's El Niño, are the storms coming?

Last month, Warning Coordination Meteorologist Alex Tardy of the San Diego Office of the National Weather Service (NWS), was in Idyllwild at the invitation of Mountain Disaster Preparedness.

Tardy spoke in general about weather forecasting and specifically about the coming winter predictions.

"We can predict well in 6 to 10 days pretty accurately," Tardy said with pride, then lamented that longer range forecasts were less reliable because the presence of many conditions that create and change weather are not yet present and known.

The lower reliability of long-term forecasts was apparent last week. In his Dec. 6, video, Tardy said, ly to bring the jet stream further south.

Is a stormy and wet January a guarantee? Not yet,

according to both meteorologists.

In his blog, Swain wrote, "... the critical time for California remains about 2 weeks out, then the nose of this powerful jet core would possibly arrive near the coast. Will it make it all the way, and will it still be remarkably strong? Will it direct a sequence of strong/moist storms into California in the days following? I'm leaning toward yes at the moment, but as always ... things can change, and this is still a fair distance in the future. Uncertainty is high, but this certainly has potential."

Recent El Niño weather conditions have not produced very rainy winters. In fact, the two most recent wet winters, including 2023, were when La Niña conditions were present.

This year, the NWS sees a very strong El Niño in the Pacific now.


While Tardy leans toward more precipitation next

month and during winter, he did not have the benefit of Swain's more recent analysis.

"I have high confidence in a wetter winter than not. December was distinctly different than January through March will be," Swain concluded in his broadcast.

But both men cautioned about this year's snowpack. With an expectation of a warmer than normal winter, even with greater precipitation, it is more likely to rain. And the warmer temperatures will prevent the ground from getting cold enough to prevent whatever snow may fall from accumulating.

"There are some indications that January will be wet but not February." And this precipitation wouldn't arrive until the holidays.

However, two days later, Daniel Swain, meteorologist and climate scientist at the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles, shared a slightly different view and confidence about the approaching winter weath-

For the next two week, they both agreed. "It will remain dry and warm for the next few weeks," Swain began, then added, "I expect [it] to change rather dramatically and quickly ... I think it will get a lot wetter in the months to come."

The difference in the confidence of their views for the future was Swain had the benefit of an analysis that aggregated several weather models. The summary indicates that a very strong jet stream will develop south of Japan in the next two weeks and move east across the Pacific Ocean.

This, in combination with the El Niño conditions in the equatorial Pacific, is likely to bring several Pineapple Express storms to Southern California because these combined pattern changes are more like**Turning 65? Medicare can** be confusing, but I can help



Large wildfire chances plummeting this winter

The National Weather Service's forecast of an El Niño winter has strongly affected the prognosis of wildfires in the next few months. Fire services, state and federal, are expecting a cooler and wetter winter from December through March.

The December report from the Predictive Services Unit for Cal Fire's Southern Region said "[with] normal precipitation for Southern California ... the odds tilt in favor of large-fire potential to remain near normal." And normal for this period is "zero."

Currently, no drought areas exist within the state, and only two are "abnormally dry" in the desert. These conditions and the expectation of a wetter than normal winter significantly reduce the forecast of major winter

"The combination of above normal fuel moisture for $\,\,$ to a lack of previous events to predict from."

larger dead fuels and live fuels coupled with the El Niño pattern and absence of drought support this tilt in the odds for the December 2023 – March 2024 4-month period," Cal Fire concluded.

The Wildfire Forecast and Threat Intelligence Integration Center (WFTIIC) reports no fire weather watches nor red flag warnings. The sole active fire is in Northern California.

The WFTIIC Significant Fire Potential maps from December through March indicate no anticipation of above normal fire threats anywhere in California.

However, it should be noted that the National Interagency Fire Center did express some caution about the appearance and effect of the predicted El Niño. "There is greater forecast uncertainty than typical for El Niño due to other climate, teleconnection, and ocean temperature patterns that do not often coincide with El Niño leading

Fire insurance is topic at **Elders meeting**

was focused on the issues surrounding fire insurance for Hill residents. The event was called "The Ins & Outs of Home Fire Insurance," and the featured speaker was Bob Severns of Severns Insurance Agency in Hemet. Severns has provided coverage for Idyllwilders for many years, and as a FAIRplan broker, still writes policies here.

Severns began by outlining the situation homeowners are in; traditional carriers are not allowed to "non-renew" in high-risk areas, but may increase the rates, and some have seen their premiums double or quadruple. The FAIRplan, set up to be an insurer of last resort, is now the only option for many in areas affected by wildfire.

One change this year is the adoption of ZESTY AI, a model used to determine the wildfire risk of individual properties. ZESTY considers data like slope and wind behavior in addition to the condition of a property to determine a home's fire risk. This, in turn, determines the premium each homeowner pays.

Because the evaluation of a home fire risk is now highly individual, the insurance companies also must offer discounts when certain risks are eliminated or mitigated by the homeowner. The discounts for "hardening" a structure may, according to Severns, add up to 14%, but they are

Severns also clarified that FAIRplan is not a state-run program but rather one the state re-This month's meeting of IDY Elders & Others quired private carriers doing business in the state to create. The terms of its mission are determined by court decisions as Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara and the private carriers sue each other. As an example, the court has upheld a requirement that the FAIRplan offer comprehensive or "wrap around" policies, but this has not been implemented.

At present, homeowners buy a FAIRplan policy that covers fire, lightning, smoke and a few other perils, with add-ons available, but they also must purchase a Difference in Conditions (DIC) policy covering, among other things, falling trees, liability, theft and water damage (but not flooding.) The DIC, in turn, does not cover earthquakes; most Californians have no coverage for

As FAIRplan has taken on more policies, the increased workload has slowed the process down, according to Severns. He also noted that the "platform" on which quotes are generated changed on the first of this month. The system is inundated with requests, and waits for quotes are now seven days. So, shop early.


Voting for FVWD directors

Dear editor:

This letter authorized by the board of directors for the Fern Valley Water District is intended to respond to the Town Crier's Nov. 23, 2023 letter from Danny and Colleen McDonald.

First, let us make it abun-

dantly clear that the district has always followed California's Uniform District Election Law. In the particular situation raised by the McDonalds, the Uniform District Election Law allows the district to request the county board of supervisors to appoint the directors to



This allows the district to save taxpayers' money in order to keep rates low, in addition to the time savings. In the case where a vacancy occurs between elections, the statutes under which Fern Valley Water District is established requires vacancies to be filled by appointment by the board (Calif. Water Code section 34707.5).

We know the McDonalds already know this since we've previously written to them about these issues in response to the many letters they have written to the district over the years.

Challenging director vacancies and pipeline completion consume FVWD meeting

Last Thursday, the Fern Valley Water District's (FVWD) Board of Directors held both a special meeting to choose a new director and a special regular meeting. The board had to cancel its November regular meeting because of the lack of a quorum. It also planned to cancel its next regular meeting, which would have been Dec. 21, because of its proximity to the Christmas holidays. This special meeting addressed business items for both meet-

Besides approval of past minutes and financial reports, the only action taken was approval of a \$500 Christmas bonus for each staff member. In 2022, the board increased the bonus from \$250 to \$500, but did not want to make another increase

The directors did discuss a letter, which was printed in the Nov. 23 edition of the Town Crier, from district constituents Danny and Colleen Mc-Donald.

The McDonalds expressed concern and disagreement with the FVWD board's intention to appoint a person, rather than call a special election, to replace former Director Gary Erb, who resigned in October. As a landowner district, they argued that all directors should be chosen by voters and not the

They have had previous discussions and exchanges of letters with the board about this issue. In 2017, General Manager Victor Jimenez and FVWD's general counsel responded to a similar expression of a lack of elections to fill vacancies.

"While we concur that the Uniform District Election Law applies to the District's elections," wrote Ward Simmons of Best, Best and Krieger, FVWD's general counsel. In his 2017 letter, Simmons stated that the California Water Code specifies the process for filling vacancies between elections.

Section 1780 (a) of California's Water Code specifically states, "Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a vacancy in any elective office on the governing board of a special district, ... shall be filled pursuant to this section.

After notifying the county's registrar of voters, "The remaining members of the district board may fill the vacancy either by appointment pursuant to subdivision (d) or by calling an election pursuant to subdivision (e)," reads section 1780 (c), which is what the FVWD has consistently done when filling vacancies between elections.

The district has 60 days to appoint a replace- from the budgeted amount." ment. If this occurs before half the term has occurred, then the seat will be on the ballot at the next general election. If it is after half the term, the appointee will complete the term and then must stand for election to a full term.

If a district cannot make a decision for a new board member, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors can appoint a replacement. If it fails to fill the seat, then a general election will be held. Idyllwild Water District (IWD) chose this path after former Director Gene Schneider resigned in March 2023. The board did not choose a replacement and neither did the supervisors. Now IWD voters will make the decision.

In more than 15 years, FVWD has not had to hold a general election to fill a board seat. FVWD can hold general elections in August of odd number years. One election would be for three seats and two years later for the other two seats. At least since 2009, the number of candidates has never exceeded the number of seats to be on the ballot, therefore, the registrar of voters recommends that the supervisors simply appoint those candidates, saving the cost of an election.

After discussing their procedures for filling a vacancy, the board agreed that its counsel should reply to the McDonalds.

In water business, Jimenez reported that production in both October and November was slightly greater than those months in 2022. The district is still able to divert stream flow from both Tahquitz and Strawberry creeks for most of its water needs. Groundwater usage was about 10% compared to nearly 50% a year ago.

Total production from January through October was 28.3 million gallons, which is 4.6% greater than production from the same period in 2022, but 5.8% less than the average for the first10 months of the previous five years.

During the discussion of expenses, Jimenez credited timers on the wells for the \$1,000 reduction in the electric bill. The timer equipment installed on the wells shuts off well production during peak hours between 4 p.m. to 9 p.m.

He also noted that the 14.1% of unaccounted-for water was up this year. However, "There are more leaks this year because of the pipeline repair," Jimenez told the board. "But there are fewer long going leaks. We repair those as soon as noted. But the pipeline completion used more flushing of wa-

He also reported on the completion of the pipeline work this year and wrote, "The project went very well despite more rock-related delays than expected ... The final cost to complete the project and the additional 75 feet of 8-inch main on Glen was \$1,198,470.31 resulting in a savings of \$66,529.69

El-Co Contractors was definitely a good partner, Jimenez opined. It also aided the district during the time FVWD's backhoe was broken. El-Co helped to transport it for repair and loaned a backhoe during that period.

Board wants to study separating coroner from sheriff

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors has directed the county's chief executive officer to examine the ramifications of separating the Coroner's Office from the Sheriff's Department. The vote was unanimous on the proposal Chair Kevin Jeffries (1st District) and Supervisor V. Manuel Perez (4th District), who joined with Jeffries on the proposal at his request, submitted.

Since 1999, the Riverside County Coroner's Office has been part of the Sheriff's Department. California is just one of three states that permits counties to combine these two offices. In California, only 10 counties have separated the two offices.

The coroner investigates and reports on all violent, sudden or unusual deaths of persons within the county as established by California law.

In an Oct. 31 letter to the board, a number of community groups, led by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Southern California, urged the board to take this action.

"Studies support this separation; it is proven that Coroners operating under Sheriff's Departments are more likely to underreport officer-in-

volved deaths," noted the ACLU.

"Families who lost loved ones in Riverside jails have noted these same issues outlined above. Additionally, many families have yet to receive autopsy reports one year after their loved one's death," the letter continued. "The separation of these offices reduces the perception that the process is unduly influenced by law enforcement."

Seven members of the public spoke in favor of the idea, but there was no discussion among the directors before their vote.

Vonya Quarles, executive director co-founder of Starting Over Inc., was the first speaker. Starting Over blends direct services with civic engagement and public policy work. The organization helps some of Southern California's most vulnerable populations by addressing homelessness, recidivism and reentry.

"If 47 states are mandating separation and only three do not, it is not just a matter of a perceived conflict it is an actual conflict," Quarles began her statement to the board. "... To separate these two [the coroner from the Sheriff's Department] is clearly one way to bridge the growing divide between people and the Sheriff's Department. Separation is not an attack on the law enforcement."

Two mothers and a sister of men who have died in-custody of the Riverside County Sheriff's Department also spoke in favor of the proposed study.

Lisa Matus's son, Richard, died Aug. 11, 2022, while in custody. She has had great difficulty confirming the circumstances and cause of his death.

"To not separate these offices will continue to hinder closure for families," she said. "Swift resolution is crucial for closure in anyone's death."

Kichard's sister Candance Cortez also urged the board to approve the study. Lisa and family filed a lawsuit against the Sheriff's Department in March

Naomi Bravo, whose son, Cristian Viramontes, died in-custody Feb. 5, 2023, also supported the proposal. His family has also filed litigation against the county and the Sheriff's Department.

"While there is no evidence of any improprieties in Riverside County regarding the operations of the Coroner's Office under the Sheriff, the optics of a potential conflict of interest can lead to a loss of confidence in our institutions," wrote Jeffries and Manuel in their request to their colleagues.

But the question is not new to the county. The 2017-2018 Riverside County Grand Jury also looked at this issue, and recommended that as an alternative to separation, the sheriff reestablish "an agreement with acceptable terms, with an adjacent County, to perform autopsies of in-custody deaths."

From 1999 to 2005, Riverside County had an agreement with Orange County to do this, but after its expiration in 2005, it was not renewed.

No one from either the Sheriff's Department or the Coroner's Office addressed the board about the proposed study.

Nevertheless, because of the past views and actions statewide, the county should be prepared to know what the "potential costs, savings, legal issues, organizational structure, and labor considerations" might be, Jeffries and Perez wrote in their proposal. A final report is expected from the CEO in 90 days.

days," and that he also worked in Youth Corrections, as director of recreation, at the State Industrial School in Ogden.

A Utah Department of Corrections human resources analyst found a record confirming that an employee with Harper's name and birthday worked with the Department of Corrections from 1981 to 1994. The archivist added this note: "This former employee did have previous experience with the State of Utah starting in 1971, but it was not with the Department of Corrections."

So, in this case, Harper's story is at least generally true, and his law enforcement experience was not limited to his short stint behind bars in Colorado. His numbers give precise detail, not 23 years total, nor 13 years in the actual department. He also claims to have earned a master's degree in physical therapy and physical education from Brigham Young University, but the school does not confirm attendance or degree status without a power of attorney from the stu-

Friends of Abrams say she speculated that Harper suffered from dementia. One said that Harper used multiple identities and had identi-

fication with alternate names on it. Frequently, the account he gave of his law enforcement career was full of exaggerations but short on consistency or depth of knowledge, they said.

He liked to say he worked with the Drug Enforcement Agency or strike teams, but when pressed for detail, he clarifies; as a corrections officer, he worked side by side with members of other agencies.

The Crier has not yet received a call back from the Sheriff's Deputy in La Plata County, Colorado, responsible for Harper's registration as a sex offender, but asked if Harper carrying a firearm is a violation of the terms of this registry. Requirements for the offender registry are tiered, and a misdemeanor convict like Harper is treated differently from a child sex offender or other felon.

Harper has not responded to the Crier's request for comment on this story. It is not known if he is still living at the Bonita Vista Ranch, the event and wedding venue he re-christened "Cali's Great Escapes.

He still has a court date Dec. 21. If he appears, he will either have to produce an accounting of his trusteeship or pay sanctions of \$1,500. But he has until at least late January to move out or fight the eviction in court.

wood Drive is the best marked of these and is still in use. Others have disappeared through neglect or been fenced in.

Property owners may build a fence along an easement but may not block it. Sometimes seen are "no trespassing" signs posted in such a manner as to imply that the road or path is private, when they should be turned so that a pedestrian or motorist knows they may travel a path but may not pass between the posts on either side of the path.

The ownership of the lots on which the creek flows has remained with the Johnson family. It was one of several assets, central to Idyllwild's identity, and thought of as public, but held privately. Town Hall was another of these properties, and when the Chamber of Commerce was dissolved, the deed reverted to the Johnsons, who were relieved to find a community-minded buyer, aware of its practical and historic importance, in Dave and Lois Butterfield.

But the creek has remained in private hands, although we have known for many years that Jay Johnson, grandson of Gerald, was seeking a way to maintain the integrity of the creek and make its public access permanent and legally protected. Johnson told the Crier he is not ready to make a public statement about this, but confirmed that negotiations are well underway.

ART'S CORNER

Every yearly scheduled event presented at the Lowman Concert Hall on the Idyllwild Arts Academy (IAA) campus promises treasures of sound production from a wide-ranging talented student body to the most distinguished guest artists.

This is particularly true of the programs regularly slated for the end of the fall and the beginning of the winter season, when audiences seem to be most receptive to the program's musical selections.

And so, when prior to the second Fall Concert of this year, the return of the Los Angeles-based string ensemble Delirium Musicum proved as well-timed as well-effected, this listener received an unexpected further delight. Starting straight off, and accompanied by a small student contingent (ably led by violinist Abigail Regua), the joint forces essayed a string arrangement of the song "The Earl-King" of Franz Schubert. The resulting augmentation only served to heighten the work's various nuances throughout, and the ensemble's Artistic Director Etienne Gara passed forth congratulatory remarks to his Idyllwild

The remainder of that Friday evening's program (minus the students), subtitled "Cabinet of Curiosities," featured a mixture of contemporary popular and classically-based mood and/or movie music, more or less exactly as written — from crowd-pleasers such as the "Danse Macabre" by Camille Saint-Saens and the overly-cliched "Adagio for Strings" of Samuel Barber, to the string workout of Dick Dale's Middle Eastern-flavored "Misirlou" and the excerpts from Bernard Herrmann's score from "Psy-

Included also was a genial nod to nature, in the playing of Gabriella Smith's "Cactus Yucca Scrub" from her "Desert Ecology" suite.

Not to be put off lightly, the full string orchestral arrangement of Johann Sebastian Bach's "Chaconne" from the solo violin "Partita #2" was an effective final piece; however, with Mr. Gara's forces always ready to give extras, they responded with an encore of the energetic first movement of the "Winter" concerto from Antonio Vivaldi's "Four Seasons," thus satisfying all auditors in a spectacularly designed presentation.

On the following Saturday evening, when the IAA Orchestra presented its second fall program (subtitled "Isn't It Romantic," as before), a differing set of principles ensued, though with similar anticipatory fervor. An engagingly large contingent of guest artists (again in the brass and wind sections) led the concert off with a late work of the American composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, the funeral march from his incidental music for "Othello"; characteristically stately and tragic by turns, under the exacting baton of Music Director Daniel Bassin.

There followed an exposition of a fairly challenging item in the late Romantic repertory — Jean Sibelius' one-movement "Symphony #7 in C Major" — a work generally interpreted as either a concate-

nation of somewhat-related thematic structures, or as a quasi-Wagnerian (or Richard Straussian) rejoinder to what used to be labelled as "modernism" (i.e. Schoenberg, Stravinsky). Dr. Bassin opted for the latter approach, and though some of the cadential sections seemed to be out of place, the piece effectively ended in a proper C natural mode, and led to the audience's gratification.

The highlight of the evening followed the intermission with a complete performance of Sir William Walton's "Concerto for Viola and Orchestra" in its revised setting for expanded orchestral forces. This featured the 2023 IAA Concerto Competition's Grand Prize winner, Seoyeon Bay, as soloist, displaying her prodigious talent in keeping the balance of sound production throughout, while being accompanied by an obviously well-rehearsed large orchestra — particularly in the work's third and final movement, where changes of mode and rhythm effect the "romantic" aspect of the composer's intentions. Ms. Bay was amply rewarded by her colleagues, as well as from an appreciative audience that included a goodly number of her fellow stu-

Then on the Monday evening following these weekend events, the IAA Department of Music presented its late fall Chamber Music Recital in Lowman Concert Hall to a relatively small group of listeners (in contrast to the previous two evenings). The opening movement of Ludwig van Beethoven's "Ghost Trio" (Opus 70 #1) was infused with a respectful "spirit" (no pun intended); pianist Katerina Sommers gave out both impetuosity and temerity for her violin and cello participants to model upon.

There followed a few more or less trivial selections; a movement from Giuseppe Maria Cambini's "Six Trios for Flute, Oboe and Bassoon" (Opus 45), plus two movements from Francis Poulenc's "Sonata for Horn, Trumpet and Trombone" (with Dr. Bassin's appearance as trumpeter adding to the composer's typical whimsical piquancy), and the St. Pierre "Variations on 'La Folia' " (for flute, clarinet and oboe) — all of which displayed the extent of the virtuosity for all involved.

More serious matters were dealt with in the final programmed selections, in particular the two string quartet ensembles, playing respectively the Adagio movement from Beethoven's "String Quartet #1" (Opus 18 #1 in F Major) and the "Notturno" third movement of Alexander Borodin's "String Ouartet #2 in D Major"). This listener/spectator was most impressed by the professionalism evidenced in the makeup of both grouping involved (notably that led by violinist Rentso Stavrev).

Professional quality was also the case in the work which separated those two ensembles; Jean Francaix's "Quatuor" (for flute, oboe, clarinet and bassoon), with its first two movements played in reverse order, gave forth the further talents of the orchestra's principal players. So indeed, a pre-holiday surfeit of live music seemed most welcome in a world so troubled and tensed as at present; for our part here on the Hill, one can only anticipate the further generation of soundings to come, which are in many cases, already

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




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Palms to Pines Golf Association names champions


