# **IWD** hires interim general manager

The Idyllwild Water District (IWD) Board of Directors is moving toward filling the vacancy created by the termination, after a month's administrative leave, of General Manager (GM) Leo Havener. The board met Saturday, Jan. 27, to discuss hiring a new GM.

President Charles Schelly said at the Jan. 17, public meeting that a new GM could not be hired until the end of Havener's leave, but that a consultant might be brought on to assist the board in running the operations of the district sooner. That person might then become an interim GM, and that the hiring of a permanent GM requires a slow, public process. An interim GM would be able to apply for the permanent posi-

The Saturday meeting began with public comment from past Director David Hunt, who read a letter and provided a copy to the Crier. He asked the board to "please make fiscally responsible decisions. Please do not hire another GM with only administrative experience and no water certification. We need a GM with at least T3 and D3 certifications and lots of field experience, not another 'pencil pusher' who hides in the office." He also asked that the next GM be a local resident and not a commuter, and that that board "not hire a 'consultant' with the intention of solving problems by hiring and firing."

The board then went into closed session to discuss the résumés of several candidates for consultant/interim GM. That afternoon, Schelly told the Crier by text that the board had "reached tentative agreement for employment as interim GM beginning February 5th. Contract details available once reviewed by BB&K our counsel and signed by both parties." The new interim GM will be Curt Sauer, a former Joshua Tree National Park superintendent. Other candidates were considered, but Sauer was recommended by the "committee" (Schelly and Steve Kunkle) and agreed upon by the full board. His résumé also will be "available upon em-

This was at least the second special session in a week; the agenda for a Wednesday night meeting listed the subject as "significant exposure to litigation pursuant to paragraph 2 section 54956.9. (two cases)." This part of the state code says that public agency boards may meet in closed session to confer with legal counsel about potential litigation. Paragraph 2 is one justification for such a session: "A point has been reached where, in the opinion of the legislative body of the local agency on the advice of its legal counsel, based on existing facts and circumstances, there is a significant exposure to litigation against the local agency.'

Tyla Wheeler was one of two IWD employees fired in the last few months after making complaints about Chief Water Operator Joe Reyes, complaints that IWD legal counsel allegedly upheld. It was Havener's seeming unwillingness to address these complaints that led

Wheeler was reticent to discuss the content of communications between herself and the board but would tell us this: "I understand that the board is trying to do the right thing by Brian and myself. This is in the works and will take some time. I believe we were really heard at that (1/17) meeting."

It was clear from statements at that crowded public meeting that neither Wheeler nor Water Operator Brian Wilson were looking at litigation as their first option, but were hoping to be reinstated, and to once again serve IWD and the community.

# Lightning strike in Idyllwild causes damage

Lightning struck a tree in the front yard of a home on Pine Crest Avenue with explosive force during a storm on the night of Monday, Jan. 22. Neighbor Holly Owens told the Crier that although no one was seriously hurt, one neighbor suffered temporary hearing loss "that seems to be slowly resolving." Another, in their kitchen, was "knocked off her feet."

Other damage Owens noted included shattered or cracked windows in 10 houses, damage to electrical systems and appliances, and a power line "downed by the top of the tree that was struck." Edison was able to restore power within hours.

Joel Feingold, responding to a call from a friend, came down and surveyed the damage. He was surprised to find that the house closest to the tree did not suffer broken windows, "like the eye of a hurricane," with the blast wave possibly hitting the roof harder than the walls.

He noted that the neighbor who temporarily lost his hearing had stepped out on the porch with his dog to witness the incredible downpour and hail. The dog was reportedly unharmed. David Hunt, who lives a few hundred yards up the road, told the Crier that although he did not have any broken windows, items he displayed on his windowsills were knocked off by the shock wave.

The tree itself has two huge gnashes along most of its length from the bolt. Even at week's end, one could still see shreds of wood from the tree hanging from power lines, and windows secured and boarded up. Feingold told the Crier that he notified the sheriff's department and requested extra patrols for the street, and "they respond-

Owens observed, "Windows and appliances can be replaced, people cannot. I am most grateful for our neighbors who look out for each other, and for the concern and calls from others in the community to check on us."

Sheila Zacker also checked in on a property close to the strike. She expressed "thanks to IFPD [Idyllwild Fire Protection District], they were very supportive." They came "right away" and were able to keep the downed power line from causing more trouble until Edison arrived.

The homeowner whose tree was struck declined to comment to the Crier, but was evaluating the tree. Trees may survive being struck by lightning, but may also be weakened in ways that are not immediately apparent.

# Grab the umbrella: rain is coming

This past summer's forecast of a strong El Niño has been somewhat disappointing, perhaps, for Hill residents. While last year's precipitation washed away the drought conditions, so far this water year (Oct. 1 to Sept. 30), precipitation has been sparse and far less than aver-

For the first four months of the water year, the longterm average for Idyllwild is 11.8 inches of rain. As of Jan. 27, the Idyllwild Fire Station has recorded 5 inches, less than half the average for the September through January period.

Keenwild Ranger Station has recorded 5.6 inches, or almost half the average, and the Pine Cove Dutch Flat station has recorded 7.3 inches, the most of the three lo- By Wednesday night and Thursday, the first of severcal weather stations, but still less than the average.

Only last week, on Monday, Jan. 22, San Diego had "a thousand-year" storm. The airport recorded 2.7 inches of rain, more than the monthly average, and some areas east of the city received 4 inches of rain, causing devastating flooding.

The Hill neighborhoods got a soaking, too, although this downpour was not as severe as in San Diego or the February 2019 storm. On the Hill, Dutch Flat absorbed 3 inches and Keenwild recorded 2.5 inches between Jan. 20 and 23.

While still below long-term averages, the forecasts for February expect significant precipitation.

Warning Coordination Meteorologist Alex Tardy at the San Diego Office of the National Weather Service (NWS), in his Jan. 25 YouTube post, said, "The Jet Stream is getting very strong, very powerful with wind speeds greater than 200 miles per hour." He noted that this is similar to the Jan 22, conditions and would bring greater than average rainfall to Sothern California. He stressed that "greater than average" does not necessarily mean heavy, but above normal for this period.

But by the beginning of February, Southern California may be the recipient of several heavy precipitation events. NWS is forecasting above normal precipitation throughout Southern California through the middle of February.

"So there are probably some inhibiting factors at play in the Pacific that are suppressing Southern California rainfall so far this winter... so far," wrote Miguel Miller in the "Coast to Cactus Weather Examiner," the NWS San Diego January newslet-

"The very wet storm of 22 January could be the first of many wet storms lining up to hit California, and it quickly brought

some stations up to normal season-to-date rainfall. As of this writing, more wet storms are on the way in early "Through Friday, rainfall will range from 1.5 to 2" February. There's a lot of time and potential for February and March to keep the water spigot turned on," he concluded.

Daniel Swain, meteorologist and climate scientist at the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles, also expects multiple storms over the two weeks.

... a storm is coming to California next week. The jet stream is further south. A sequence of storms is coming to Southern California. A solid 10-day major storm activity in Southern California ... looking at significant impacts in Southern California beginning in five to seven days," he said Friday on his YouTube channel.

Over the weekend, rain pummeled the Northwest. al storms should arrive in Southern California. By next weekend, the first week of February, cooler and wetter weather will impact the Hill.

"A high risk of heavy precipitation is designated for portions of the Southwest and southern California, Feb chance)."


inches near the coast to 2 to 3 inches in the mountains with one-third to one-half inch in the deserts," according to the NWS forecast Jan. 30.

'The snow level will rise to 6500 to 7000 feet Thursday morning, then fall to 4000 to 4500 feet Friday night. Snowfall of a few inches is possible down to around 5000 feet ..."

On Jan. 29, the NWS had this forecast for Feb. 6 to 9, "A high risk (greater than 60% chanced) of hazardous, heavy precipitation is forecast February 6-9 across southern portion of California and the Southwest ... heavy snow is expected at higher elevations."

Even CalFire has accepted the precipitation forecast and on Jan. 27 issued this alert, "CAL FIRE is urging California residents to prepare for significant winter storms across California next week."

Longer term, NWS is predicting that "El Niño is exected to continue for the next several seasons, with ENSO-neutral favored during April-June 2024 (73%



# Bridge may be finished in August



## Harper was to leave **Abrams' ranch on Sunday**

Keith Harper was seen leaving the Bonita Vista ranch of missing Mountain Center resident Dia Abrams at around 7:30 a.m. Monday, Jan. 29. According to a neighbor, he was driving a Ford pickup truck pulling a

Harper and lawyers for the court-appointed trustee for Abrams' estate signed a stipulation last week agreeing that Harper would leave the missing woman's ranch by Jan. 28, and "forever stay away." The "Stipulation and Stay Away Order" also alleges that the trustee has credible evidence that Harper has removed trust property, and gives him until that day to return it, including a vintage army Jeep, exercise/gymnasium equipment, and Abrams' red Suzuki 4WD ATV. The order allows Harper to claim ownership of these and other items, but he must document any claims. Abrams was known to collect antiques, jewelry and even expensive firearms, and to have safes and many storage containers for her treasures.

Harper still has an April 23 court date to argue that he should receive over \$300,000 for his activities as "trustee" from the time of her disappearance on June 6, 2020, until his removal as trustee, in November 2023. This includes personal funds he claims to have spent during this time, compensation for "30,000" hours of work (this is 24 hours a day for three-and-ahalf years) and \$50,000 for legal expenses. This last figure was included in the October 2022 agreement under which Harper was allowed to stay on to care for the ranch.

The agreement also stated that Abrams' estate would be divided 50/50 between Harper and Abrams' two adult children if she is not found by June 6, 2025, and if none of them is found responsible for her death.

This last condition is known in California as the "slayer clause," and is stated as "Perpetrators disinherited if found to have been involved in Dia Abrams' death/disappearance."

In previous filings with the court, the trustee has asked for Harper to account for many things beyond income and expenditures. Among these are information regarding a "safe previously located next to the garage at the Ranch," a "tractor purportedly stolen from Trust property," "two burglaries" of the ranch "which Respondent alleged resulted in great agony to (Dia's) dog Dasha for three (3) weeks," and any police reports he filed over these matters. He also was asked for "inventory, status, and welfare of the livestock currently" on the property.

Abrams loved horses and donkeys and had at least one miniature pony. She also loved and adopted stray dogs. Harper has, through a series of delays and a recent last-minute substitution of attorney, managed to avoid providing this accounting. He will need to reconcile these losses against his claim to diligent trusteeship.

Reporting by David Gotfredson of CBS8 highlighted an odd detail from the beginning of the story: The original search warrant that allowed the police to enter and search Abrams' Bonita Vista Ranch also authorized search of a second property, but conflated her Tool Box Springs house with the Hop Patch Springs home of Diana Fedder. Fedder was given power of attorney and named, along with Harper, as trustee in a trust filed two weeks before Abrams' disappearance. Gotfredson noted that, "It remains unclear whether officers ever searched" the Tool Box house. The warrant described Abrams' house correctly; two stories and blue, but gave the address of Fedder's single-story beige house, and then stated that the house could be identified by a sign giving the number of Abrams' house.

Another of Abrams' properties, 15 acres at the far end of Bonita Vista Road known as Sky High Ranch, was searched within days under a second warrant, and a large marijuana growth there was seized.

Sources have confirmed that there has been a police presence on Bonita Vista Road this week and that the court-appointed trustee has also "staked out" the exits of the ranch. They are expected to move a caretaker in immediately.

Bruce Dennis is the incumbent District 4 member of the Riverside County Board of Education. Dennis was appointed to the board in 2011. He won his first election, for reelection, a year later and has subsequently been reelected in 2016 and 2020. This year, he is seeking his

fourth full four-year term.

Dennis, 65, was born in New York and then moved to California. He has been a resident of the Inland Empire for more than 40 years. Many of those years he was a postmaster for the U.S. Postal Service.

He is a frequent Hill visitor. On New Years Day, he and his family hiked Devil's Slide Trail to Deer Springs Trail rather than watch football. So, he is familiar with Idyllwild, the Hill and its trails.

A week before Christmas, he posted this note and several pictures on Facebook, including one of Tahquitz. "I love the mountains. The first pic is my goal in March, Tahquitz Peak."

He has been married for 42 years. He and his wife, Robin, have a daughter who is a college professor. Dennis also now has a granddaughter.

He got involved in education oversight when his daughter was in school. His wife is a former teacher and now, Dennis said, his granddaughter is his motivation. She keeps him "focused on the needs of today's students."

# **MESSAGE** FROM THE **PRESIDENT**


DEAR IDYLLWILD ARTS COMMUNITY,

Lillian remained an active member of the Board of Trustees until 2020, when she was honored as a Lifetime Trustee, a designation bestowed to her alone in the school's history. IAF Board Chair Jeff Dvorak remembers: "During our many years together as members of the Board, I was fortunate to witness Lillian's savvy and strategic business leadership in action. She possessed keen observation skills and was able to synthesize information, draw enlightening conclusions, and quickly identify and focus on the most efficient path to achieve meaningful solutions, inspiring her peers along the way. She was truly an extraordinary person."

Lillian and Jon gave generously of themselves to the school, philanthropically supporting William M. Lowman Concert Hall (named in honor of Idyllwild Arts Foundation's founding Head of School), Nelson Dining Hall, Krone Library & Museum, and Pierson Dormitory (named in honor of Lillian).

Jon and Lillian's influence throughout Southern California represents excellence in the arts, and in 2014, Idyllwild Arts Academy began awarding the Jon and Lillian Lovelace Outstanding Artist Award to an exemplary young artist in each year's graduating class. Lillian once said: "There's something so rewarding about helping to contribute to learning of any kind, but it's especially fun if it's something you're interested in and see someone learn and grow as they become adults. All the arts are so important for bringing our country and people together in a very healthy and fun way."



Founding Head of School William (Bill) Lowman recalled how "devoted and generous" Lillian Lovelace was. "Her deep and abiding belief in the value of the arts in American society and the key role that Idyllwild Arts would play sustained the mission of Idyllwild Arts. I'm personally grateful, professionally grateful, and so thankful that they were in the orbit of ISOMATA supporters and stepped up to help Idyllwild Arts achieve its potential in the world of arts education."

The magnitude of Lillian Lovelace's participation, contributions, and leadership will forever leave an indelible mark on Idyllwild Arts Foundation. We will remember Lillian Pierson Lovelace during our annual Founders Day celebration in Idyllwild, California on June 22, 2024. # Mental health and homelessness proposition on March ballot

Besides a primary for president, U.S. Senate and Congress, and many state offices, the March 5 ballot will include Proposition 1.

This proposal is multifaceted. It combines a \$6.4 billion bond

with changes to the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), initially approved in 2004. Not only do these proposals intend to provide mental health care and drug or alcohol treatment to people, a large aspect is aimed at homelessness.

#### Mental Health Services Act

California counties receive between \$10 billion and \$12 billion annually for mental health and drug treatment services. About 20% to 30% of these funds come from a state tax on high income tax

Counties can only spend the MHSA money on treatment for people with mental illness and prevention programs for people who may develop a mental illness. While counties can spend MHSA money on treatment for drugs and alcohol, the people receiving treatment must also have a mental illness, according to the Legislative Analyst Office's (LAO) analysis of the proposition.

Prop 1 does not change the tax income, but it directs a greater share of this revenue to the state and, more specifically, limits how counties may use their remaining share. In addition, the LAO noted, "The proposition also requires the state to spend a dedicated amount of its MHSA money on increasing the number of mental health care workers and preventing mental illness and drug or alcohol addiction across communities.

Prop 1 requires counties to spend more of their MHSA money on housing and personalized support services such as employment assistance and education, according to the summary on the Secretary of State's website at https://voterguide.sos.ca.gov/propositions/1/.

Some counties already use their MHSA funds for this purpose. But for those who do not, they would have less funding for other mental health services, such as treatment, response to a mental health crisis or outreach. However, Prop 1 will continue to allow counties to use MHSA money on treatment for drugs and alcohol for people without a mental illness, according to the summary.

About two-thirds of the bond funding would be for added locations for mental health care and drug or alcohol treatment. The types of places that would be built with bond funds would depend on future decisions by the state. Of the \$4.4 billion to be set aside for this purpose, about a third (\$1.5 billion) would be allocated to local governments and tribes.

The other area supported by the bond funding would be housing for the homeless or at risk for homelessness. Prop 1 would make \$2 billion available in grants or loans to local governments to convert hotels, motels and other buildings into housing, or con-

These programs also will target people who have mental health, drug or alcohol challenges. Half of this \$2 billion would be set aside for veterans.

The bond funds might provide space for 6,800 people to receive mental health care and drug or alcohol treatment at any one time and build up to 4,350 housing units, with 2,350 set aside for veterans, according to the state's estimates.

In a December poll the Public Policy Institute of California conducted, vast majorities of Californians supported these types of ef-

forts to address the growing homelessness problem.
"Overwhelming majorities of adults and likely voters (77%) each) also support converting empty office spaces in cities into af-

fordable housing (oppose: 22% each adults and likely voters)," said the poll's authors. And the majorities were consistent across parti-

Also, the poll found: "More than three in four adults (77%) and likely voters (76%) say they support building developments of tiny or small homes across the state (oppose: 22% adults, 24% likely voters)."

In its statement, the California Budget and Policy Center expressed several positive achievements that could arise from Prop 1's approval. For example, the expansion of services to substance use disorder treatment without requiring mental health issues

However, the center also was concerned that, "This initiative presents beneficial aspects as well as potentially adverse consepands the scope of the MHSA and prioritizes funding for people the tax or providing new revenue to support existing county be-

While the League of Women Voters of California acknowledg-

Îts opposition is consistent with the Budget and Policy Center's concerns. "Under the changes this measure makes to the [MHSA], more of the money received by counties must be used for housing of a certain group of patients and for intensive, personalized support services like assistance finding employment and accessing educational opportunities. This reallocation reduces the funds available for other mental health services that counties currently offer to patients, like treatment, crisis response, and outreach. It has the overall effect of reducing counties' ability to set priorities based on local needs for mental health services."

ing. "The bond portion of the measure was rushed through the legislature with last-minute amendments that opened the door to

health care programs because the funds shifted to the state will cut existing county-level mental health services. In their opinion, "the results will be devastating at the local level — cutting programs, firing healthcare workers, ending services for thousands of people, and many of these services won't survive Prop. 1's cuts."

The supporters point to the expansion of community-based services for mental health and addiction. Services across the state serve 10s of thousands of Californians each year. They stress that it will provide treatment rather than incarceration and help homeless

The supporters include the California Professional Firefighters, California Association of Veteran Service Agencies and the California Chamber of Commerce. As of Jan. 20, the main pro Prop 1 funding committee had more than \$14 million available to advocate for

Opponents include Mental Health America of California and the California Association of Mental Health Peer-Run Organizations. "Californians Against Proposition 1" has not reported any

tobacco withstands challenge

The U.S. Supreme Court declined to consider a case involving California Senate Bill (SB) 793 and 2022's Proposition 31, prohibiting the retail sale of certain flavored tobacco products. Thus, SB 793, enacted in 2020 and that California voters approved a referendum on two years later as Prop 31, are both upheld.

Less than three weeks after Prop 31 was approved, attorneys for R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, R.J. Reynolds Vapor Company, and other Reynolds tobacco subsidiaries filed an emergency lawsuit in the U.S. Supreme Court requesting that the proposition and its enforcement of SB 793 be enjoined. Although the court did not accept the emergency litigation, the tobacco companies continued to pursue their litigation through the normal court

On Jan. 8, 2024, the court declined to hear this case and offered no comment or explanation for the decision. This case should end the companies' efforts to repeal SB 793.

The tobacco companies argued that the California law conflicted with federal law, specifically the Tobacco Control Act. The authority to regulate cigarettes resides with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and not individuals, was the tobacco companies' argument.

While states have some authority over cigarettes, such as locations for sale and minimum age of buyers, they do not have authority to ban the sales, argued the companies.

California replied that current laws clearly give states such authority.

California's Department of Justice told the court that Reynolds is more concerned about those who won't be able to buy the flavored products than the millions of young children and teens who become smokers after using these products.

The Supreme Court took no position, thus allowing both SB 793 and Prop 31, which more than 63% of voters approved in November 2022, to continue in force. More than half (55%) of Riverside County voters cast "yes" for

Now a second law regulating flavored cigarettes went into effect Jan. 1 this year. Assembly Bill 935, signed in October, strengthens SB 793. Now the penalties on retailers who do not comply with SB 793 will be greater and it also changes the definition of a retail location.

The penalties for a first offense will be \$400 to \$600 and go into the thousands for multiple infractions of the law. Retail locations will now include any building in which cigarettes are sold and will include any vending machine, vehicle, mobile unit, booth, stand or concession that sells tobacco products directly to the public.

# Longtime **Idyllwild** native is new recreation director

The Crier met with Idyllwild Community Center (ICC) President Stephanie Yost and ICC's new Director of Recreation Johnny Wilson at his office next to Town Hall. He has been at his new post since Nov. 15, and spent several weeks shadowing the last director, Bridget Noer.

His duties include all of ICC's recreation portfolio: adult and youth sports, the Skate Park, Dog Park and Pickle Ball courts, the Butterfield Amphitheater, and the playground at the future ICC site. Town Hall activities include afterschool activities and child care (Program Director Leo Rodriguez reports to Wilson), Fit After 50 (two instructors) and Jazzercise (run by a contractor who rents the space). His duties also include rentals for special events, the weekly Sunday Farmer's Market, and a food bank, Feeding America, on the first Tuesday of every month.

Yost pointed out that although she takes the "laboring oar" (rowing crew term) during undertakings like the tree-lighting ceremony, ICC board members like herself are all volunteers.

Present sports activities include adult volleyball and the recently restarted adult basketball, with youth baseball and hopefully adult softball starting in spring. Planning goes on year-round, with the Summer Concert Series on Yost's plate even this week.

Wilson has a few ideas about new programs to expand recreation at Town Hall: ping pong, line dancing, other dance classes including salsa, and a parent/child singing and dancing class for the under age 4 set, "Francesca's Little Dance Class."

Yost underlined that part of the recreation director's

that, too."



# State offering loans to first-time buyers

The state's Dream For All Shared the maximum amount. Appreciation Loan Program will first-time homebuyers this spring. Homeownership is not an easy hurdle to overcome in California. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the California homeownership rate is 57%, the second lowest of all 50 states.

Agency (CalHFA) announced the second iteration of this program on

It is aimed to help first-time buyers obtain and occupy a house anywhere in California. It provides eligible buyers with up to 20% of the home purchase price to be used for down payment and/or closing costs. The maximum loan is \$150,000 or 20% of the sales price or appraised value, whichever is less.

The program and opportunity are extremely popular. Last year was the first time these loans were offered. Nearly \$300 million was available on a first-come basis. In less than two weeks, the total available funding was allocated to more than 2,100 applicants. This year, about \$225 million is available, which would fund about 1,700 at the plication. The initial and important maximum loan amount of \$150,000 or more if all borrowers do not need

be available for new California the process from first come to a lot- er number. CalHFA approved lendtery for all of eligible applicants.

Besides one of the applicants being a first-time homebuyer, this year the state has added another criterion. They also must be a first-generation buyer.

A first-generation buyer, accord-The California Housing Finance ing to CalHFA, is "... a homebuyer who has not been on title, held an ownership interest or have been named on a mortgage to a home (on permanent foundation and owned land) in the United States in the last 7 years, and; [t]o the best of the homebuyer's knowledge whose parents (biological or adoptive) do not have any present ownership interest in a home in the United States or if deceased whose parents did not have any ownership interest at the time of death in a home in the United States."

The state also will consider anyone who has been a resident in fosresidential care for large groups of children by nonrelated caregivers, as first-generation.

Several steps are necessary before submitting the actual loan ap-

action is contacting and obtaining a CalHFA approved lender. They are responsible for preparing a pre-ap-This year, CalHFA has changed proval letter and providing a vouchers may be found at www.calhf ca.gov/homebuyer/lenders.htm.

There are also income limits for applicants. In Riverside County, the limit is \$149,000.

While the loan does not accrue interest, there are conditions if the property is sold. If it is sold or transferred, the homebuyer repays the original down payment loan, plus a share of the appreciation in the value of the home. Generally, this percentage will be the same as the Dream Loan's percentage of the purchase

All details of the new process had not been released with the announcement of the 2024 program. CalHFA said in its press release, "The program voucher website has a targeted launch date in April" to submit prequalification letters.






