# Lara moves forward with directive to improve insurance rate review process

On Aug. 9, California Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara issued a Bulletin setting the steps his Department will take to clarify and to limit the time needed to review a rate request from an insurance company. In addition, he specified what he expects from the carriers in terms of a complete rate application.

The intent of his Bulletin is to reduce the uncertainty of the time needed to approve the request. This has been a major issue with carriers for several years and has contributed to their withdrawal from certain California

In May, Gov. Gavin Newsom proposed a trailer bill with the Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget to address most of these issues. However as of Aug. 15, neither the Senate nor the Assembly had taken any action on the proposal, supposedly because it was about policy not budget issues. Therefore, Lara proceeded with his administrative

"Consumers are hurting, businesses continue to lose coverage, wildfires are ravaging our state -- and we do not have the luxury of time," Lara said in his press re-



ues to be up slightly over last year, which followed a wet winter, but about 16% below 2022. Customers irrigate more during dry years. Their static measuring well, #10, seems to have plateaued, rising a little over an inch to 60.52 feet. Water loss was reported at 11%, higher than the very low figure of 3.5% given in June. Potter said that the crew would continue to look and listen for leaks.

The installation of new smart meters is on route 6 of 7, "on target to finish at the end of September." The crew is currently working on Laurel Trail and Nestwa. One of the advantages of the new meters is in leak detection. Steady flows will be monitored and flagged in real time, whereas now figures are only reported bi-monthly when meters are read manually.

Well #25 has been refurbished and is producing 40 rpm. One of two wells in the Dutch Flats area that suffer from iron ore build up, it was producing half that amount before the cleaning. The cost of the operation was over \$19,000. The other well that is scheduled for refurbishment, #26, was shut down when its production fell to 5 gpm. Its refurbishment should cost the same, said Potter, and the two projects will use most of the well-work budget for this financial year.

GM Potter asked the board to buy 15 days of his accrued overtime as he deals with the aftermath of a home fire. The board agreed.

The Board heard that an owner is offering the district first refusal on a half-acre parcel of land on highway 243 adjacent to their Dutch Flats land. The owner says that it was appraised three years ago for \$90,000 but would give the district a discount. Potter said he would get the property appraised before entering into negotiations.

Potter submitted a Vehicle Replacement Plan for the district's seven vehicles, with their expected lifetimes. It included buying a new Toyota Tacoma this year. He also said that the replacement engine for the non-operating 2013 Tacoma had been purchased and would arrive in two-and-a-half months, at which time he and his crew See PCWD, page A3



lease. "I am ultimately responsible for fixing this crisis, and I am moving forward to meet my commitment to complete long-needed reforms this year.

"Today, I am strengthening my department's ability to enforce timelines set more than 30 years ago under Proposition 103. Reducing unnecessary delays is critical to getting our state's insurance marketplace back on track," he said describing his actions.

Since 1968, the rate application review and approval process has extended beyond Prop 103"s statutory deadlines, approaching seven months. These changes, according to Lara, will be considered the largest reform since Prop 103 was enacted.

A year ago, Lara developed a plan to address these issues. In September 2023, he released his "Sustainable Insurance Strategy"

# Wildfire threats increasing as Fall arrives

While wildfire season is considered year-round in Southern California, late summer and early fall are the season most ripe for larger than normal wildfires. Temperatures remaining hot, fuel moisture dropping, and the greater frequency of Santa Ana winds are primary conditions to enhance wildfire threats and danger.

Already, wildfire incidents in 2024 have significantly exceeded 2023. Through Aug. 16, Cal Fire has reported 5,210 wildfires greater than 10 acres, slightly more than the 5-year average of 5,061. These fires have burned a total of nearly 822,000 acres. For the same period in 2023, 4,350 fires had burned only 116,000 acres. The five-year average of acres burned in the same period is 376,000, about 45 % of the 2024 total thus far.

Firefighting agencies are preparing and issuing warnings of the approach dangers. On Aug. 1, Cal Fire's Southern Operations Prediction Services wrote, there is a "... moderate tilt in the odds towards above normal large fire potential over the next 4-months."

They expect more grass and brush fires for several reasons. This spring and winter were relatively wet, and this vegetation is beginning to dry out. The absence of any prolonged drought conditions will relatively reduce the chances of fire in the large timber ar-

Although the report added, "However, these larger fuels have become more susceptible than previously due to the anomalously hot and dry July."

Meteorologists have noted that July 2024 has been the hottest July on record for most of California away from the coast.

On Aug. 12, the National Interagency Fire Center issued their Report, which expects "Above normal significant fire potential is also forecast for portions of . . . southern California in August and September. Most reas of California and the northwestern US will return to normal potential in October, but the southern California coast and mountains will have above normal potential through November."


In addition, two weeks ago, the Climate Prediction Center of the National Weather Service issued its monthly El Niño report and declared a La Niña watch for fall. While the data is neutral in the short term, the NWS believes there is a 66% chance that La Niña conditions will form between September and November.


In anticipation of this possibility, the NIFC advised agencies that La Nina conditions will enhance the likelihood of vegetation drying more and raising fire

"Due to the likelihood of a predominant warmer and drier pattern for this forecast period, there is a moderate chance of above normal significant fire potential, ... becoming more focused on the southern California coast and mountains by October and November."

"The stage is therefore set for a potentially fiery autumn-perhaps much more so than 'usual'-but we could get lucky (or unlucky) with early rains, offshore wind events, or fall lightning events," wrote Daniel Swain, meteorologist and climate scientist at the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at the University of California, Los Angeles. "That is to say: while the predictable aspects of autumn fire risk are ringing alarm bells, that isn't always the whole story (based, essentially, on luck in one direction or another). But I do think it's quite likely that this autumn will feature much more active fire conditions not only in California (where this is not uncommon) but also across portions of the interior West..."



would install it. The plan includes selling a 2021 Chevy Tahoe that is in "excellent" condition but is not as useful as a truck. Its ability to carry seven passengers is rarely used. We also heard from Potter that one of the district's vehicles had been in an accident several weeks ago when another driver attempted a U-turn near the Nature Center. Insurance is taking care of the damage, and the truck will be repaired.

The board heard that office assistant Kayley Rainbolt has asked to begin training in operations, work that would lead to receiving D1 and T1 certifications. This would allow her to participate in jobs like leak checks and "escrow readings," where meters are read manually for a final billing. Potter, in answer to questions from the board, said that Rainbolt would not be reclassified, but the extra skills from cross training would help with work orders and improve her understanding of the system, and might lead to occasional overtime hours. He also confirmed that the district would pay for the training and testing.

The board also passed two resolutions necessary for the November 5 elections, when two directors, Becky Smith and Vicki Jacubac are up for re-election. As of the meeting, there were no new candidates. One resolution asks for the Registrar of Voters to include PCWD on the ballot and agrees to reimburse the county for their share of the costs; the other stipulates that candidates, not the district, will pay for candidates statements of qualification if they wish them to be included in the voter information package.

Three-Day Survival Pack

### Top of the Barrel

- Flashlight, radio, batteries
- First aid kit
- Prescription medicines for you, your family or

- Adhesive tape 2" width roll
- Sterile bandages 2" and 4" width roll Ace, butterfly, and triangular bandages
- Gauze pads (4" x4")
- Bandages, strips
- Cotton tipped swabs
- Miscellaneous
- Scissors, tweezers, tissues, a thermometer, your first aid handbook, and a pocket knife

### Middle of the Barrel

### Food

- 3-day supply of food requiring no refrigeration
- Date all food items
- Examples include canned tuna or pork and beans, nonfat dry milk, dried fruit, canned orange or tomato juice, peanut butter, and water (1-2 gallons per person per day)

### **Bottom of the Barrel**

BEDDING: sleeping bag/blankets and a plastic

- CLOTHING: Change of clothes (possibly for several days, gloves, sturdy shoes, and a jacket
- ,(toothbrush/paste, deodorant, feminine supplies, etc.), towels.
- Entertainment: Books, cards and/or games and paper and pencil
- FUEL & LIGHT: Flashlights, matches, candle, signal light, and possibly a sterno canned heat
- MISCELLANEOUS: Water purification tablets, liquid chlorine or household laundry bleach, eye dropper, and, if needed, kitty litter (to help with sanitation for human waste)
- EQUIPMENT: Can opener, dishpan, dishes and utensils (disposable), and depending on where you will go to a shovel, and a bucket (plastic bag liners)
- SUGGESTED ADDITIONAL ITEMS Cash, cooking utensils, heavy-duty aluminum foil, bar soap, an outdoor grill, camp stove, chafing dish, etc., bucket, a hammer and assorted tools, household cleaner and detergent, and filament tape
- INFANT NEEDS (if applicable) Infant supplies and toys for children



I want to be strong for her, but I can't stop crying and then I get upset because I'm not being strong for her.

Dear Reader:

"I'm not being strong for her" is a belief, like everything else we're going to talk about in our first two minutes together. Of course, it's always excellent practice to be aware of what we are believing and to choose carefully — even more so in an acute situation like this when your beliefs will be challenged with every new bit of information you receive and every conversation you have with intimates and family. To get at what you're believing, I'd ask what it's all meaning to you. Some examples might be: she'll die young; she'll never know grandchildren; it's so sad; it's wrong; it's unfair; I'll lose my best friend; I'll have to change my whole life. You can see that these beliefs (not being strong; dying young; grandchildren; best friend; change) are not at all factual. They may or may not be true and good practice always means choosing on purpose what to believe. Others (sad; wrong; unfair) are judgments, which separate you from your mom, the person you want to be strong for. So, what if all judgment was removed from the equation? It would change the energy dramatically and I'd love to know what you notice by attempting it.

**Dear Spiritual Workout:** 

My girlfriend complains all the time that I don't get her. It's really frustrating because it usually happens after we've had some kind of issue and sometimes it lasts a week or two or more. I don't think it's that I don't understand her, I think it's that I just that I disagree with her about how to handle certain issues and problems. Eventually it all blows over but then it happens again. Can this ever change?

The short answer is yes, of course it can. If I were talking to both of you, I'd start with some questions. For both, of course, what do you want? # Newsom signs package of legislation strengthening prosecution of retail and personal property crimes

Last Friday, Aug. 16, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed a package of 10 bills intended to crackdown on retail theft and property crime throughout the State. Collectively the new laws authorize stronger and tougher penalties for repeat offenders of these crimes and offers prosecutors additional tools to file for felony prosecutions.

In his press release, Newsom said, "Let's be clear, this is the most significant legislation to address property crime in modern California history... While some try to take us back to ineffective and costly policies of the past, these new laws present a better way forward making our communities safer and providing meaningful tools to help law enforcement arrest criminals and hold them accountable."

Collectively this legislative package addresses several different issues related to the arrest and prosecution for retail and personal property theft.

For example, it creates stricter penalties, mandates sentencing enhancements and creates new crimes. It also provides authority for arrests in situations where the law enforcement officer did not witness the crime.

Another vital change is the opportunity to aggregate the value of stolen goods. Even when the crimes cross county lines or involve different victims, prosecutors may now total the value of the stolen goods in order to seek felony convictions. Currently, these individual acts may only meet misdemeanor criteria.

There are also stronger penalties for smash and grab theft actions.

Criminals may now be prosecuted for personal thefts from cars, even if they were unlocked. Penalties for theft of possessions in cars will increase too.

Finally, Senate Bill 1802 extends the organized retail theft legislation permanently beyond its current expiration on Jan. 1, 2026.

Democratic legislative leaders were happy with approval of the package. Nevertheless, Republican leaders were less enthusiastic. One of their gripes was an effort this spring to include language in the bills that would repeal them if Proposition 36 were approved this November.

"Today, Gavin Newsom is taking a victory lap for signing a bill package to address retail theft. Strangely, he glossed over his effort to sabotage the drug, homelessness and theft reforms in Prop. 36 by jamming poison pills into these very same proposals," said Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher. ". . . While these bills are a win for Californians, they almost didn't happen because Newsom wanted to play politics with public safety."

These bills do not obviate Proposition 36, which will be on the November ballot. Prop 36 will amend Prop 47 approved in 2014. Prop 36 makes several key changes related to punishments for theft and drug crimes. It increases punishment for some theft and drug crimes in three ways: turns some misdemeanors into felonies, lengthens some felony sentences and requires some felonies be served in prison.

### Stuck semi blocks 74 at bridge project

A truck and trailer, unable to negotiate the narrow, single lane stretch of highway 74 where the Strawberry Creek bridge is being rebuilt, stopped traffic on Sunday morning. Officer Johnathan Torres of the CHP provided these details: At approximately 10 a.m. on Sunday, August 18, the CHP received a call that a big rig was blocking highway 74 near MM 53. It was determined to be a tractor trailer combination vehicle carrying other vehicles, and involved in a filming detail that was to take place in the mountains. During travel they discovered they were unable to continue. CHP assisted them turning the vehicle around. Traffic was affected in both directions for a couple of hours but there was no accident.

### Head-on collision closes 243 Friday night

At approximately 7:54 p.m. on Friday, August 16, a two-vehicle crash occurred on Highway 243 south of Forest Service Road 3E08, near the Keenwild Fire Station. Officer Jonathan Torres of the CHP provided these details: A grey 2020 Subaru, driven by a 35-yearold female from Idyllwild, and a silver 2013 Ford C Max driven by a 40 year old male from Wildomar collided when the Subaru, northbound, entered the southbound lane. The crash resulted in minor injuries to both parties, and both were transported to Eisenhower. Alcohol and drugs are not suspected to have been involved.

According to the CHP traffic website, delay in the arrival of ambulances meant the drivers remained in their cars, blocking both lanes, for almost two hours.



# Digital driver's license available in California

Last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced that California will now offer digital driver's licenses and state IDs. Either will be available on mobile devices through Apple Wallet or Google Wallet. These new capabilities will allow residents to keep and show California driver's licenses and ID cards using their iPhone, Apple Watch, or

"We're partnering with two iconic California companies – Apple and Google – to provide convenient, private and secure driver's licenses and ID cards directly on people's phones," Newsom said in his press release. "This is a big step in our efforts to better serve all Californians, meeting people where they're at and with technology people use every day."

These new capabilities are part of the State's Department of Motor Vehicle's broader mobile Driver's License (mDL) pilot, which launched last year. Since the pilot began, more than 500,000 Californians have added an mDL to their phone. The mDL pilot program is limited to 1.5 million participants.

For information and details on the mDL, go to the website at www.dmv.ca.gov/ portal/ca-dmv-wallet/.

To get started, an individual must have a smartphone. The CA DMV Wallet app can be downloaded from either the Apple App Store or Google Play.

DMV says iPhones must be at least iPhone 6s or 6s Plus with iOS 14 and newer. Android Users must have, at least, an Android 8 or newer. Android 10-based

EMUI 10 devices are not supported, according to the DMV. Once the app is on your smartphone, you can open it and will be prompted to log into your personal MyDMV account or create one. If you have an account, you may be prompted to provide your DL# and/or SSN# to upgrade your account to access the

Once set up, the mDL has several uses. mDL can be used for age and identity verification at select locations and airports, including Transportation Security Administration checkpoints. Additionally, your mDL can be used to log into your MyDMV account or apply for a CA Disabled Person Parking Placard. You can also use the mDL Reader in the CA DMV Wallet to verify another mDL holder's identity in real

Security is one difference between a digital license and a physical license. CA DMV Wallet uses your phone's FaceID, TouchID, or PIN to securely tie your mDL to your device. mDL will only share necessary info, while a physical card will share your name, photo, birthdate, and address all at once, according to DMV.

"We continue to expand the availability and acceptance of digital licenses and identification cards, while ensuring the highest level of privacy and security," said DMV Director Steve Gordon in the press release.

There is no cost to use the mDL.

The DMV stressed that loading a California ID in an Apple Wallet or Google Wallet, or mDL in the California DMV Wallet app does not replace the requirement for individuals to carry a physical card. Law enforcement, state government agencies, and businesses are not yet accepting the mDL. However, it does make it easier for Californians to validate their age and identity at participating businesses and air-

Besides trying the mDL, DMV has expanded more services into online solutions rather than trips to the local DMV office and time in lines.

Since June 3, the DMV has only been processing the following transactions through alternative, out-of-office options:

- Simple vehicle registration renewals that are not past the due date.
- Driver's license renewals that do not require an in-person visit.
- Requests for copies of vehicle registration records, which show a vehicle's ownership history.
  - Requests for copies of driver's license records, which show a driver's history. Replacing a lost or stolen driver's license/identification card.

"We don't want our customers to have to wait for service, and they don't have to," said Gordon. "The DMV is becoming a mobile-first operation, and simple renewals are easy self-help transactions that don't require an office visit. Just go online. It will save you time, and it will save time for the Californians in our offices who need to be there. We have also shortened the time it takes to receive vehicle stickers and driver's licenses. In most cases, you'll have your item in less than two weeks."

### Julia

Continued from A3

After a over month hiking together what are your impressions of Julia?

"Julia didn't seem like a teenager. Sometimes I had to remind myself, 'she's 17.' She seemed worldly actually - for sure. She could easily advance her ideas forward with the 7 of us guys. She is a force of nature.

"She's also a planner – let's say the group would want to camp at a certain spot at the end of a 20-mile day. Julia would be like – okay. Then a side hustle would emerge. I think Green Valley Smokehouse is on the way – and then she suggested we hike till 11pm to a special campsite. And we did both.

"She definitely also sees the hike as a food tour. Food is a side objective."

Describe the treacherous trek through the Mo-

"The 23-hour day we hiked through the Mohave desert reminded me of a movie where two people got stuck hiking in Death Valley.

"We started that hike early evening from Hiker Town – by early dawn we were exhausted. Me and Julia continued trying to hike in the middle of the day, it was hot, we had not slept except for ½ hr. at dawn. By noon I literally could not move. She said, 'ok rest 2 minutes.' I said no, I need 5 minutes – let me eat some sour worms to gather my strength. She said 'NO.' We knew we could die there. I said, 'I need to get my strength to get out of here.' That's when she started crying. I felt miserable that I made her cry, but the situation was terrible. I did not know what I was supposed to do.

"Somehow, I got up and started walking while listening to 'Ordinary Pleasure' about a hundred times. The chorus goes: 'Maximize the pleasure, even with all this weather, be the one to make it better'.

"It's such a extremely unlikely, weird, unimaginable friendship. Like it is the strongest friendship I have ever had. We hiked together for a week then with our trail family for another 6 weeks. A few of the guys asked me: 'when Julia skips ahead what are you going to do?' I didn't realize it then, but they were asking if I was going to go with her?

"I never felt so understood as I do with Julia. They say you can never really understand what someone else is going through. But somehow – she completely seemed to get me. I do not know how – despite never experiencing anything like what I was describing, our lives were so different."

### Julia's update:

"On Aug 1st I passed into Washington State – crossed The Bridge of the Gods, was welcomed by trail angels – and given an apple, the state's official fruit.

"Washington is beautiful, but hiking was challenging because the fires were so extreme. The topography is largely rural in nature. If one trail is closed it could mean rerouting a hundred miles. I encountered 5 big ones [fires] that affected the PCT route in Washington. The rural town of Trout Lake up until then...was the worst.

"Lightning woke me at 4am. I knew it would trigger another fire and I had to get out now. I threw my stuff in my bag and practically ran through the forest. Once there, the lightning was louder than I'd ever heard! What would I do in summer camp, I asked myself? I turned on my headlamp and my flashlight, put on en-

ergizing music and said to myself this going to be great and danced my way through the forest till dawn, heading 16 miles out of the forest to a road crossing, arriving eleven hours later.

"It gets worse. I eventually hiked to Glenwood, a town of 200 people. I spent the night and did my last zoom essay class for my college application requirement. Then I hired a driver to get back on trail, only to find the road and the trail were both closed. Now I was stuck in a town with its only access being a one lane forest service road. From Glenwood I could see the fire at Trout Lake growing. Many hikers evacuating Trout Lake had found their way to this tiny town just as I had. I started planning to get back on trail at White Pass. But no, this was not a good idea. The entire region is fire prone there are hundreds of fires burning."

"By 10:30pm me and all the hikers realized the Trout Lake fire was definitely coming our way. Again, I packed in haste realizing Glenwood had issued a level 3 evacuation order. I called my parents apologizing for the urgency – but there were simply no evacuation vehicles and hikers were frantically calling friends and relatives in Seatle. It was a 5.5 hour drive to get me out."

"I was terrified. My mountain lion fears faded rapidly. The fire was 4 miles away – we knew it had grown 10,000 acres in a matter of hours. I encouraged my parents by text, to HURRY! Meantime, hikers were standing by the side of the road while the tiny Glenwood community drove out and emergency vehicles headed the opposite direction into the area.

"A few hikers were waiting with me for my parents when a shuttle showed up and offered them a ride 20 miles south. Then another van showed up heading towards White Salmon. Ultimately, all the hikers got picked up. By the time my parents arrived, I was one of the last to leave the area.

"I asked them to drop me in Kalama, a railroad town right off I5. As the crow flies it was a good hundred miles west of where I needed to get back on trail at White Pass – or 250 miles by car.

"The next day I hired a private taxi service for \$300 to drive the distance to the trailhead. I hiked out of White Pass towards Snoqualmie where hikers were stalled mid trail. We had to back track to Chinook Pass - fire was just ahead. I hitched out of Chinook Pass and headed home. That night I slept on the couch in my mom's home office. I knew I was heading out the next day to finish the PCT and didn't want to get to comfortable.

"The Enchantments Wilderness area offered itself as a delightful detour; it's an area I'd always wanted to explore. The next day I finally got back on trail at Snoqualmie."

For Julia, next week will bring completion at the PCT Northern Terminus in Canada... stay tuned.

Many questions linger in this writer's mind as I followed Julia trek these past months. I was curious how her mother came to view her daughter's process of organizing and implementing this extraordinary journey – these are Donna Barnett's thoughts:

Did you always know Julia would be destined to do something out of the box like this?

"This is the sort of thing her father and I should have anticipated because Julia always seemed most happy when learning something new, eating a new food, traveling someplace unusual, or trying something difficult.

When she becomes interested in anything, she won't let go of it until she understands everything about it and experiences it completely."

What have you learned about Julia since she first embraced the idea of hiking the PCT – until now when she's almost complete?

"I am awed by Julia's physical discipline, but it is her mental strength that is most surprising and impressive. She has found herself alone in some truly terrifying situations. The biting black flies in the desert caused serious wounds, and some hikers quit because of them after just a few days.

"The mosquitos in Oregon caused panic attacks in others. She's dealt with essential equipment breaking or going dead. She's been in multiple lightning storms where there is simply no safe cover. And of course, she came face to face with a mountain lion alone in the middle of the night. At 17, she simply has not experienced fear like that. It blows my mind that she can face these obstacles without panicking and work through the fear and pain until the next moment, when she is literally crying because she is so happy."

Plucking Julia out of a burning forest – what was that like?

"Her dad and I did drop everything and jump in the car, but it was still a 4–5-hour drive to reach her. A sense of urgency and fear rose gradually, versus an immediate emergency. But that changed as things just kept getting worse and worse with the fire getting closer and closer.

"I was not entirely freaking out because we were always in contact with her, and we knew she was not alone, but as people left the town one by one and she kept texting I did drive faster and faster and swore at slow drivers in front of us more and more.

"I remember worrying because there was only one road out of town, and I pictured cars lined up to escape, but by the time we got there almost everyone had left. Julia was one of the last remaining people in the town. Hikers had scattered and no one really had any plan or idea of what to do.

"What concerns me most is it seemed that every lightning strike during the night created a new fire the next morning, and of course Julia could be 30 miles from any evacuation route. The logistics of trying to secure rides to partial sections just to piece together some path on the PCT, only to worry about a new fire popping up, became too much for many and lots of hikers have just given up altogether. It has been very frustrating and disheartening to witness.

"The fires have been scary in a physical sense, but just as bad, they create logistical chaos that makes me skeptical that anyone will be able to 'through' hike the PCT, in future.

"Julia's been surprisingly fine with the chaos, much more than me, and she has continued hiking even if it wasn't on the PCT. For example, she hiked the Rim Trail around Crater Lake in Oregon and day hiked The Enchantments in Washington. Given these extra excursions she overall hiked probably more than 2000 miles due to the fire closures and despite skipping the Sierras. Her body looks completely different. She appears strong and tanned, yet bruised, and cut. She also seems more mature than she did in May when she said goodbye to her dad and I and headed north toward Idyllwild from the Southern Terminus at the Mexican border."




