IWD board hears of more delay on WTP

The Board of Directors of Idyllwild Water District met on Wednesday August 21. The board heard that the initial engineering for the Wastewater Treatment Plant replacement has been delayed until September, with GM Bill Rojas saying he is working on an alternative to the present firm. At a public hearing, the board voted to raise the stipend for directors from \$50 to \$75, the amount the other two local districts pay.

Rojas’ Operations Report outlined projects in progress and completed, and legacy problems discovered. Two large pumps at the core of the Wastewater Treatment Plant, one for sludge and one for aeration, were finally returned to service. EL-CO has completed the Strawberry Creek raw water diversion line up to Jameson Drive and Pine Crest Avenue and will begin the section to Fern Valley Road in a “couple of weeks.” The filter material that removes the trace amounts of Uranium found in Foster Lake well 1A is being replaced, at a cost of almost \$55,000. Several of the district’s generators were discovered to be non-operable. Rojas will get a quote to start a program of regular inspections.

Rojas noted that the Strawberry Creek Diversion has been offline for “a very long time.” He worked with staff, showing them how to operate and shut the system down. It is now online and pumping water into Foster Lake. Directors asked him to find out what limits may exist on IWD’s claim to water from the diversion, and whether there are seasonal restrictions. Rojas has also met with Victor Jimenez of Fern Valley Water District to get their help preparing for the eventual replacement of the Diversion; FVW will begin marking their own lines in the area around Tahquitz and Fern Valley Road before the geotechnical work begins. Rojas had a series of Zoom meetings with the firm doing the CEQA for the project, Terra Nova, and the engineer who is competing the drawings.

Rojas said the crew is providing data for the new state-required Lead and Copper Service Line Inventory. He explained that it is not practical to dig up all the service lines, which are on private property, but the state is not expecting that the process will be completed by the October deadline.

The directors expressed exasperation at the news that the initial 30% of engineering for the WWTP replacement project has been delayed again. In May we

heard that the firm, Specialized Utility Services, “expected” they would be able to provide these initial drawings and documents by June 28. In July this was pushed back to the end of that month or the beginning of August. The new date is September 6, and the board members and GM expressed the desire to hire a different firm to complete the project, Rojas saying that “they have proved themselves unworthy.” Before leaving, interim GM Curt Sauer hired Dudek to review the initial report when it arrives, and they might also be contracted to finish the engineering.

In response to questions about whether there was any legal remedy for these delays, or a deadline in the original contract, Vice President Peter Szabadi noted that Covid created delays, and Schelly noted that original deadlines were rendered moot by the District’s delays in obtaining title for the land, something the former GM did not finish. The sale complete, the deed had to be submitted several times to the county this year due to small errors.

The meeting included a public hearing on an ordinance to increase their compensation from \$50 per meeting to \$75. The stipend had once been \$100, and the manual still contains that number. Director Steve Kunkle asked President Charles Schelly to explain why he had added the item to the agenda. Schelly said that the other local water districts pay their directors \$75, and he would like to, as a “token,” follow their lead. He added that preparing for meetings takes time, and although he appreciates the volunteer spirit, and volunteers himself with various groups, this is an elected position, and as a paid position it has a higher level of accountability by law than a volunteer position. Schelly floated the idea that if any director does not wish to receive all or part of their stipend, CFO Shouman might create a fund or “pool” into which they may donate their checks. The money might then be used for district needs or public charity, at the board’s discretion, as it would not be public money. Kunkle said that he was against the raise, although he understood that the president and vice president had more duties. (The president is required to meet with the GM before each regular meeting to create an agenda and is paid for that meeting.) Kunkle also said that the plan for a donation fund would have to be presented to legal counsel, and other directors agreed. The motion to raise the stipend passed 3-2, with Schelly, Szabadi and Davis voting for, and Kunkle and Steve Olson against.

The next meeting will be September 18.

Moderate fire between Banning and Poppet Flats closed Hwy 243

Last Thursday afternoon, the Edna Fire broke out just south of Banning and north of Poppet Flats, near Mt. Edna Road and Highway 243, which was closed for several hours.

Officer Johnathon Torres of the CHP confirmed that around 3:30 p.m., a black Chevrolet Colorado pickup truck was reported off the roadway after a collision, which then caught fire. The CHP Traffic Incident page reported that a person in black shirt and blue jeans was seen walking down the highway away from the crash. Torres reports that the driver did not stay on scene but was arrested on separate charges by Riverside Sheriff’s officers with the Cabazon station.

The Fire was reported about 3:40 p.m. Thursday and burned 33 acres in light vegetation.

By 8:25 p.m., Cal Fire reported that the Fire’s forward progress had been stopped and was 75 % contained. In its Friday morning report, Cal Fire stated containment is now at 95 %.

Sixteen fire engines responded to the Fire and several helicopters. More than 150 personnel helped control the Fire.

County board approves Idyllwild Fire tax advance

At its Aug. 27 meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the request from the Idyllwild Fire Protection District for an advance of its fiscal 24-25 property tax revenue.

At its March 26 meeting, in anticipation of what has become an annual need, the IFPD Board approved Resolution 539, requesting an advance of \$400,000 from County.

From July through the middle of December, the District’s cash flow is limited to ambulance collections because it receives no property tax or assessments during that period. The agreement states that the transfer to IFPD will be made within a week of IFPD’s approval of the agreement contract with the County.

The advance will be repaid, with interest, in Decem-

ber and January when Riverside County makes its first distribution of property tax receipts to the cities and special districts. The County estimated the interest would be about \$5,900 this year.

If the property tax distributions are insufficient to cover the advance, IFPD must still repay it by June 30, 2025. However, this has not occurred for any of the previous requests.

The County limits the use of advanced tax revenue to “any normal operating expense of the District included in the district’s fiscal year 2024-25 budget.”

The Commission has requested a \$400,000 advance each year since 2016. In 2014, it was \$300,000 and in 2011, it was \$450,000.

California’s constitution and Government code have provisions, which allow the County to temporarily advance and transfer funds to special districts. The limit is 85 percent of the anticipated revenues for the current fiscal year.

Robert J. Priefer: Idyllwild Community lost one of their own almost a year ago on 9/11

It has been almost a year since one of the members of our Idyllwild Community passed on September 11, 2023, a date that is impossible to forget.

Robert J. Priefer should be acknowledged and remembered not only for his involvement in the community of Idyllwild since the 1970s (1974 to be exact) but also for the personal interactions and connections he had with members of the community, and his devotion to family.

Robert graduated from Ohio State with a BA in Architecture. He moved to Palm Springs in the early 1970s and found himself coming to Idyllwild to enjoy the change of seasons. He designed well over 200 buildings –homes and commercial projects - on the Hill and many in places like Rowe, NM; Coronado, CA; and La Bufadora, Baja, Mexico.

One can see his designs everywhere one looks in Idyllwild, from individual homes to commercial buildings such as Town Center, Oakwood Center, Idyllwild Brewpub, FERRO Restaurant, Creekstone Inn, Aroma Café Complex, and the bell tower of the Queen of Angels Catholic Church to name some.

He summed up his design emphasis and style in this way: *“I believe/strive in creating light filled spaces that are sensible, natural and functional. By not having a particular style or agenda I feel free to listen to the clients’ wishes and translate their programs into reality. As a sculptor of space, I believe it imperative to integrate the structure with the environment and particularly using the building site and its characteristics as the foundation of the design process. The next step is designing from the inside out, which is the heart and soul of good design. Form truly does follow function.”*

I met Robert in 1997 when I moved to Idyllwild, having lived overseas for 15 years. The mountain drew me up here as if to remind me that my life needed to be here. Having owned property since the late 1980s I asked a real estate agent if they could recommend an architect. I met Robert and felt an immediate connection. We eventually became not only partners for life but partners in business and in every sense of the word.

Saying goodbye to him on September 11, 2023, was the most painful thing I’ve ever experienced. I’ve wanted to honor his memory, but it’s taken almost a year to sit down and write this. I’ve asked his friends and colleagues to contribute to his memory and the impact he has had in this community.

Janice Lyle worked with Robert in creating the Idyllwild Community Center. She wrote: “Idyllwild was so fortunate to have been the place that Robert Priefer chose to live, because he so loved this mountain and its people. And for every one of those years, the community benefited from the ways in which Robert contributed to it.

I only knew Robert for his last 10 years—we met when I became president of the Idyllwild Community Center in 2013. Robert had been a major supporter of the idea of a community center for decades, going back to the 1990s. He wanted better facilities for kids to play team sports and helped in whatever way he could to make that happen.

Robert’s architectural skills were appreciated by Dave Butterfield who was encouraged by Robert to make an initial donation of land and dollars for the Idyllwild Community Center. Robert spent more than



ten years in countless committee meetings to develop the vision of an ICC facility that met the County of Riverside’s requirements. That work was arduous, requiring unceasing interactions with all levels of the county planning, building and safety, and parks departments.

Robert was someone who didn’t want the limelight. He simply wanted to make things happen in the most direct way possible. He was a pragmatist who knew that the realities of the situation demanded compromise and he was able to work through difficult negotiations to achieve the goal. Together, we were able to get the Conditional Use Permit, secure significant CDBG funding, and work with the County Supervisor and his staff to keep the project going. A different ICC building will be completed in 2024 and is the result of many recent efforts by the new ICC board and president Stephanie Yost, but its foundation was secured by Robert Priefer.

Robert was a wonderfully creative person who didn’t follow tradition as his only guide, but always wanted to try something new. He found beautiful architectural solutions to rehabilitating older buildings such as the Idyllwild Brewpub and Ferro’s which are great examples of his thoughtful design work that repurposed older structures, giving them a new life. There are many individual owners of private residences who revel in the spaces that Robert created for them. I thought the aesthetic results of his problem solving were amazing, as was he.”

Dave Butterfield writes: “Robert was instrumental in many of the things we’ve done. He was involved in or responsible for many of our contributions to the community. He was at ground zero on the Outpost, ICC, FERRO, Brewpub, IdyPark, and Town Hall as an instigator, advisor, or both. He was a good friend, trusted advisor, and creative talent. Our Idyllwild isn’t the same without him.”

Jim Marsh who is the architect who has been instrumental in completing the Idyllwild Community Center main building writes: “I was honored to get the opportunity to work with Robert. He inspired me both professionally and personally. I marveled at his creativity. Often, when I run into a design problem, I ask myself WWRD (What Would Robert Do).

Now there is a big void in Idyllwild. To put Robert’s impact in perspective, he lived and worked in Idyllwild longer than Ernie Maxwell. He was instrumental in recreation on the Hill - coordinating, coaching, and playing the entire time. He was the heart and soul of the Idyllwild Community Center project. He spawned the idea more than 40 years ago and worked towards its creation ever since. It was his relationship with Dave and Loie Butterfield that advanced it from a dream to reality. He was delighted to see the playground, PAR course, amphitheater, and a parking area get built, and of the building is under construction! His imprint in Idyllwild will last forever.”

Mike H. writes: “Robert had been talking about starting the amphitheater project. After months of delays there was one final thing to be done. It was in no one’s contract and no funds had been set aside. It was the final step to get the job moving. It was during March 2018 when pre-construction of the amphitheater was scheduled to begin. Robert was the head of the committee for the Idyllwild Community Center. Contractors were scheduled to break ground but no one had committed to cap the nearly 30 ft natural well on the amphitheater site which had to be done before construction could begin.

Being the practical man that he was, Robert contacted some friends among the Idyllwild locals who volunteered to cap the well with him. That day was scheduled for Easter weekend. I showed up with my tractor. I asked Robert where everyone else was. He replied ‘That’s how things work around here.’ It was just the two of us. When no one else could do it, Robert took the lead. His can-do attitude and love for the community laid the foundation for that project, all the while looking at the comical side of life and turning an impossible situation into a memorable weekend.’

Annie W. writes: “I only knew Robert somewhat casually. We were parents of children in the same grade. He was Ryan’s dad, and I was Lindsay’s mom, our titles for the first 20 years of our children’s lives. We also shared friendships with other people. He was always smiling and happy. The thing I remember about him most was that he was kind, so kind. He seemed to be very gentle, and he loved his kids so much. He was my “friend,” but I didn’t spend any real time with him, unfortunately. Every time I saw him, he would greet me and everyone else with warmth and friendliness. That is an unusual trait these days - to greet everyone with kindness and warmth and sincerity and look into their eyes and make them feel seen. What a gift!”

There were and are so many in our community that have stories about Robert. I could write a book. He touched each and every one with his kindness and compassion.

He leaves behind an entire community as well as a family that he was devoted to: his four sons – Jordan, Brennen, Ryan, and Wyatt; his two step-daughters - Erin and Evynne; four grandchildren – Kate, Archana, Jayden, and Payton; three great grandchildren – Kohen, Karter, and Kennedy; and brothers and sisters – he was second oldest in a family of seven boys and three girls.

Ours was a family that blended so well he would often say how blessed we were. And we were. We are so blessed to have shared time on this planet with you, Robert. We miss you and we love you, always. Till we meet again, All My Love, Em.

County offers 6-month report on Short-Term Rental program

At the Aug. 27 meeting of the Riverside County Board of Supervisors, John Hildebrand, Planning Director, presented the Department’s six-month report on the implementation of revised Ordinance 927.2, “Regulating Short-Term Rentals”.

This follows the Feb. 1 opening of the Tier 1 application process for new STR certificates. The application period ended on May 1. The Report also described Code Enforcement’s actions taken to enforce the Ordinance since the beginning of 2024.

Tier 1

Ordinance 927.2 was effective on Jan. 11 and established a cap or limit of 500 STRs in Idyllwild (including Pine Cove). At that time, 462 STR certificates had been issued for this area, which allowed the County Planning Department to issue an additional 38.

The first properties to be eligible for a STR certificate, according to 927.2, were owners who had been paying the Transient Occupancy Tax between Sept. 13, 2021 and Sept. 13, 2022 but did not have a certificate.

They would be granted the certificate if they provided proof of having paid the TOT during that period and meeting all other eligibility requirements. If the number of operators who met these criteria exceeded 38, a lottery for the remaining STR certificates on the Hill would be needed.

However, Hildebrand reported that a lottery was not needed. Although 51 operators submitted applications for Tier 1 eligibility, 34 certificates were issued. Since the cap is 500, four more certificates may be issued pursuant to Tier 2 requirements.

There were also separate limits for the Wine Country – Residential, Wine Country – Equestrian, and the Wine Country – Winery. These situations were similar to Idyllwild. While there were Tier 1 certificates available, the number approved left the total certificates below the cap. So, Tier 2 applicants were eligible for submission in all three Wine Country areas, too.

No Tier 1 lottery was necessary because the number of eligible operators falling under the overall caps and some existing operators not renewing their certificates.

“Tier 1 notifications to the eligible operators have been sent,” the Six-Month Report stated.

Once final approval of the new Tier 1 operators occurs, the Tier 2 process will begin with a public notice. If the number of Tier 2 applicants exceeds the available certificates under the cap, a lottery will be conducted to award the new STR certificates.

Enforcement

Since Jan. 1, the County’s Code Enforcement’s dedicated STR team has conducted 866 inspections Countywide. They have issued 539 cease and desist orders, issued 166 notices of violation, and imposed citation fines totaling \$56,000.

During the seven months from January through July, Code Enforcement has opened 319 cases involving Ordinance 927.2 and closed 306. There have been 126 after-hour complaints, too.

Beginning Friday, Aug. 23, Code Enforcement planned to initiate a 90-day STR Concentrated Enforcement Operation in Wine Country.

Next Steps

The only recommendation included in the Report was asking the Board to request an annual STR report every fiscal year.

In an email to the Town Crier, Hildebrand added, “Every Ordinance has a shelf life and should be reviewed and amended as needed over time. The STR Ordinance, as will be discussed during the hearing next Tuesday, appears to be working the way it was intended. We’ll listen to what the public has to say and consider any further changes, if needed.”

However, in advance of a future budget review, the Report noted that the one dedicated staff position for managing the STR program is not sufficient, and the board should expect a request for additional support staff.

Planning is currently testing a beta version of mapping software to identify STRs throughout the County. When available, this software will show the location of an STR issued certificate, including the certificate number, responsible operator’s contact information, and occupancy limits.

“This will become a publicly available mapping tool,” according to the Report.

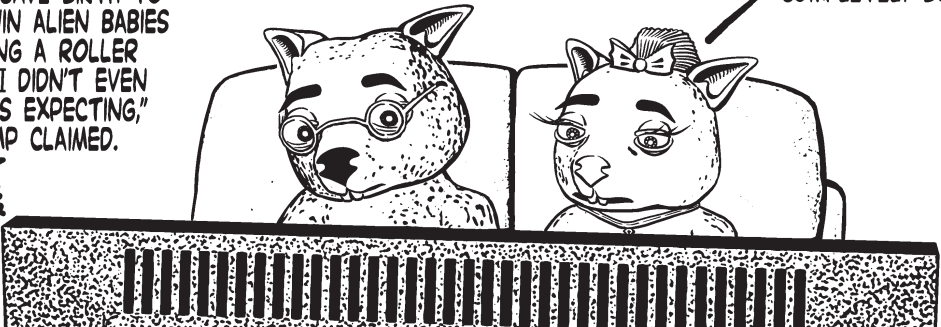

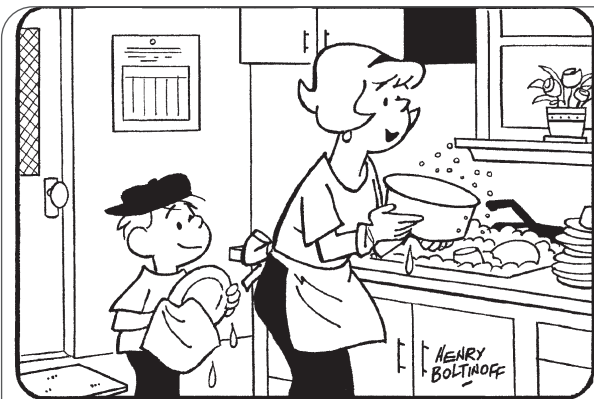

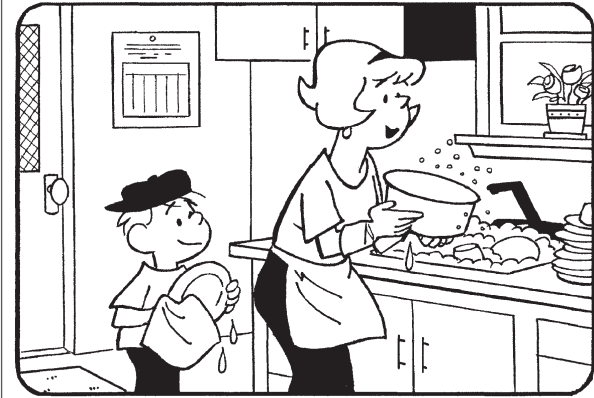

Summer Concert Series finale with US Marine Concert Band

Thursday, August 29 will be the final concert of Idyllwild's free Summer Concert Series' 25th anniversary season. The finale will feature the 45-piece US Marine Corp Division 1 Concert Band. The Band has been visiting Idyllwild for over 40 summers, and they have participated in the Summer Concert series since its inception in 2000. There will be no opening act due to the complexity of the stage and sound set-up required for a band of this size, and the music begins at 7PM.

This will be Captain Eric Kyne's third time leading the band in Idyllwild. He will share conducting

duties with Staff Sergeant Tutor, an Enlisted Conductor whose first responsibilities included organizing this concert, and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Steve Giove, retired, who led many concerts in Idyllwild while stationed on the west coast. Master Sergeant Timothy Otis, retired, will be performing on trumpet.

The 1st Marine Division is the oldest, largest and most decorated division of the US Marine Corps, and the wind ensemble one of the nation's finest military ensembles. Kyne told the Crier their program will be "a far-ranging evening of music from classical to jazz, Afro-Cuban Latin to our standard repertoire of Patriotic marches." The group travels extensively across the US. "It has been a busy summer for

us and the following day we will be performing at the Rady Shell with the San Diego Symphony for an evening of Tchaikovsky."

Local Author Speaks on Edible and Medicinal Plants

Local author and herbalist Greg Tilford is starting a series of talks in Idyllwild. He will be speaking about edible and medicinal plants of Idyllwild and signing copies of his book *Edible and Medicinal Plants of the West*, at Speakeasy Bookmarket on Sunday September 1, at 2 p.m. Tilford, the author of five books, will also have copies of his first, *The EcoHerbalists Fieldbook*, for sale.

Tilford's journey from law enforcement officer to herbalist began in Idyllwild, where his experiences as a fire lookout on Tahquitz Peak led him to delve deeper into nature's mysteries and rekindle a childhood interest in wilderness survival and native plants. He and his wife moved to Montana and became "wildcrafters," finding and harvesting wild plants for market. There he began to study the ways that wild animals use herbs, "zoo-pharmacognosy."

Tilford's focus has lately been natural and holistic pet care, with his latest book *Herbs for Pets, the Natural Way to Enhance Your Pet's Life*. This work has made him an in-demand speaker at schools of veterinary medicine across the US and Canada, and in Japan. He will be giving a lecture at Town Hall on September 19th on canine and feline nutrition and herbs as supplements and remedies.





The Lily Rock Chamber Music Festival returns for its third year on Labor Day weekend. The festival is a project of the Manhattan Chamber Players, a group that includes two string players with roots in Idyllwild, Brendan and Brook Speltz. This year there will be three concerts: Friday and Saturday at the Idyllwild Arts Academy's Lowman Concert Hall, and Sunday at St. Hugh's Episcopal Church. The concerts are all free, although a \$20 donation is suggested.

The Manhattan Chamber Players will be joined by a

number of west coast guests, including local cellist David Speltz, father of Brendan and Brook, and Kaila Potts Smith, violist and IAA Music Chair.

The Friday concert will feature a Brahms trio for clarinet cello and piano, a Dvořák piano quartet, and a contemporary sonata for violin and piano by Seth Grosshandler. Saturday's program includes piano quartets by Mozart and Brahms, Grosshandler's Suite for Clarinet Quintet and a cello duet by Friedrich August Kummer. Sunday's concert will feature a string quartet and clarinet by Mozart.

Grosshandler studied music before studying law. He worked 35 years as an attorney, moonlighting as a

pianist with chamber ensembles in the New York and Chicago areas. Since retiring in 2018 he has focused again on music and has been commissioned for several orchestral works. In his works classical romantic forms and textures smoothly transition into modern harmony. A review of the Suite for Clarinet Quintet's premiere called it "lively, optimistic, harmonically activating a wide spectrum, and warmly engaging..."

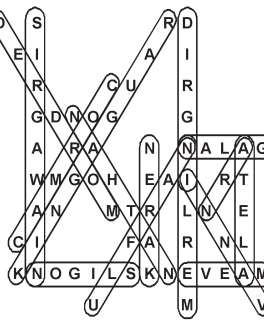

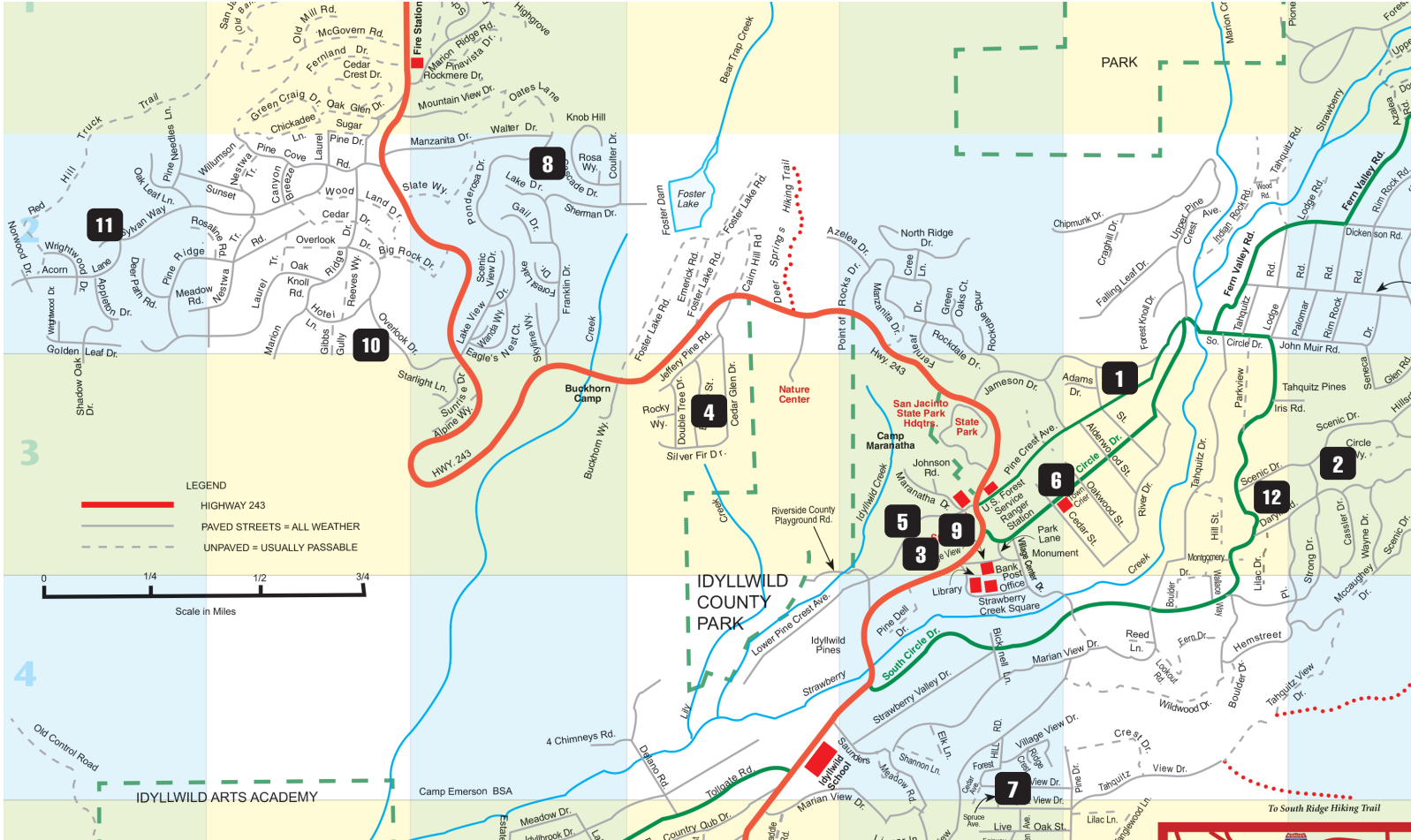
